#### ADJOURNED ANNUAL MEET-ING AND SOCIAL.

HE attendance at this meeting (held on Tuesday evening, 14th inst.) was very satisfactory. Tea was served in the Upper Reading-room at 6.30, and at 7.30 the Chair was taken by S. Caldecott, Esq. After devotional exercises and a brief address by the Chairman, upon "St. Paul as an example to Christian workers," the Chairmen of the following Committees presented their Annual Reports:—Reception—Waterside—Visiting—Railway— Employment-Boys, and Deaf Mute. Jem took off his cap and scratched his head a bit, in his own country way, and then said-

"No master I can't afford it."

"Oh I don't want you to do it for nothing: I'm willing to pay you!"

"I can't afford it.

"Why, man, it will put something in your pocket, and I'm sure you're not too well off."

"That's it; I can't afford it."

"Can't afford it? What do you mean?

You don't understand me!"

"Yes, I do, but I ain't quick of speech, do you see? Howsomeever, don't ye snap me up and I'll tell ye I ain't toc well off; that's as true a word as you ever spoke.
