We have received the July number of "The Thousand Island Park" publication, from which we learn that the managers have made arrangements for the summer work at that popular resort for Christian workers, upon a scale equal to, if not surpassing the programme The meetings announced of former years, are the Sixth Annual Camp Meeting July 11th to 18th; Scientific and Esthetic Conference, July 21st to 27th; International Christian Temperance Camp Meeting, July 28th to Aug. 1st; Sunday School Parliament, Aug. 4th to 16th; the International Society for Investigating and Promoting the Science of Teaching, Aug. 16th to 21st; Christian Summer Training College for Lay Workers, Aug. 22nd to 25th; Course of Lectures on Social Science, Aug. 26th to 31st. The Summer Training College for Lay Workers promises to be of special interest to Y. M. C. A. workers. The express object of this gathering is the discussion of such topics and methods as will be most helpful to lay workers and evangelists in our churches, and various other Christian organizations

'Some of themost eminent Christian workers in America will be present. No effort will be spared to make this four days' meeting most helpful to all lay workers, both men and women, in the church.

"Earnest workers of the Y. M. C. A. from various points, but chiefly from Toronto, Canada, have purchased three lots at the Park, and erected thereon a commodious building, which contains lodging rooms, a large reading room, and public hall."

During the past week we have been favored with a visit from Mr. E. D. Ingersoll, Railroad Secretary of the International Executive Committee. He visited this city partly in the interest of our railroad work, and during his stay met with our Executive and the Railway Committee, and it is hoped the result of the interview may prove beneficial to the work.

The number of young men applying at our rooms for employment is very large: and any employer needing workmen, of any class, would be performing an act of charity by leaving their address with the Secretary.

The Gospel Service on Sabbath last was well attended, and the interest was maintained throughout. These meetings have been blessed to the conversion of souls. Christian friends, we ask your prayers that the success may be still more marked.

A LESSON TAUGHT BY A SPIDER.

One summer evening while in my study, my attention was attracted by the operations of a spider which had built its web across one corner

of the window. It had woven the long threads which were to serve as supports of the web. upon the work of weaving which it had just commenced. As I looked, it occurred to me that I would sever one or two of the long threads and watch the result. No sooner had I cut them, than the spider darted off out of sight. After a few minutes it cautiously returned to the centre of the web, and I naturally expected to see it at once resume its weaving. But nothere it stood for a while, looking round as though *hinking what had better be done. Then it commenced travelling up and down examining each thread, until at last it reached a broken one. No sooner did it discern the break, than it set to work splicing and mending it. Then it went to the others in turn, and when they were all repaired, it returned to the centre, and resumed the work of weaving. The little thing

seemed to realize that until those broken parts were repaired there was no use in proceeding with the work. Its web would always be weak and insecure.

Dear fellow worker how are you working? Is there a feeling of insecurity? If so, why is it? Examine yourself. Go back over your past history since you first entered the service. Do you discover a point where communion with the Master has been broken? Is not this the secret of your weakness? I beseech you, learn a lesson from the little spider. Do not proceed further until all has been made right. Remember your work will ever be unsatisfactory, and unstable if the mainstays of the web of your life's work are not properly connected.

Arriving at Great Western Station, (No. 27) pass up Yonge to Queen, and one block westward to the Rooms.

BOATS.


