BOOK AND TRACT COMMITTEE.

This Committee met on Monday, 12th April, 1869, and adjourned to Thursday, 16th April. On Thursday, 16th April, the Committee met.

Present .- Rev. Dr. Beaven and The Provost.

1. An application was received from Mr. Whitacre on behalf of the recently establish d Sunday-school at Elmvale, Township of Flos, requesting Catechisms, Sunday-school Liturgies, and Testaments for a school of twenty-five.

Granted, 1 dozen Catechisms, 1 dozen Catechisms broken into short questions, 1 dozen Testaments. The Committee have no Sunday-school Liturgies at their disposal.

2. The Rev. R. Cleary applied for Prayer Books for distribution in the mission of Mono, and for Catechisms.

Granted, 26 Catechisms, and 26 Catechisms broken; also 20 Prayer Books. As the Prayer Books are so cheap, Mr. Cleary is strongly recommended to sell them whenever he can, and to re-purchase from the Society with the proceeds.

3. The Rev. R. Harrison applied for a set of Service Books for Beverley Church, now twenty years old, and another set for the congregation of Strabane.

Granted, a 4to set of Service Books for the church, and an 8vo Bible and Prayer Book for the congregation at Strabane. N.B. The 4to set cannot be obtained until the next arrival of stock.

4. The Rev. H. D. Cooper, of Fergus, applied for Prayer Books and Hymn Books for a congregation in Luther, averaging 125.

Granted, 50 Prayer Books. The same recommendation is made to Mr. Cooper which is made above to Mr. Cleary.

The Society has no Hymn Books in stock but those of the Christian Knowledge Society, and of those only a few.

Gore and Wellington District Branch of the Church Society.

Extract from Report presented at the Annual Meeting held in Christ's Church, Hamilton, on Tuesday, the 16th March, 1869.

The Managing Committee of the Gore and Wellington District Branch of the Church Society in meeting the members and friends of the Church on this the Twenty-sixth Anniversary of the Society's existence, address them with mingled feelings of satisfaction and regret. In the year 1842, the Society was ushered into existence in the City of Toronto, amid a distinguished assemblage of the leading Clergy and Lay-members of the Church. Many were the eloquent addresses with which its nativity was hailed—great were the rejoicings at the laying of its foundation stone,

and fervent were the prayers that it might long flourish and prosper as the hand-maid of the Church, and as a powerful instrumentality for sending the gospel by an authorized ministry to evangelize the heathen Indians of this continent, and to build up in the faith those of our fellow-churchmen who had left the Christian shores of Great Britain, and who were to be sought out in the wild settlements of the country where they were scattered as sheep not having a shepherd. For more than a quarter of a century has it been engaged in prosecuting this hely work, and with what success let multiplied churches and congregations, and settled ministers, and parsonage-houses, and the regular ministrations of the Church through the longth and broadth of the land bear witness. What, within the last fifteen or twenty years, was both in a natural and a spiritual sense a wilderness, has undergone a wenderful transformation. The labourers who have gone forth to till the neglected soil have been, in many instances, abundantly blessed, and the prediction of Isaiah has been verified --"The wilderness and the solitary place shall be glad for them, and the desert shall rejoice and blossom as the rose."

The Society under whose suspices there changes have been accomplished is now pussing away-a recent Act of Parliament has made provision for its incorporation with the Synod or great representative body of the Church in this Diocese, and we are now assembled for the last time to hold an anniversary meeting of the much undervalued and much misrepresented Church Society. parting with an old friend and we always feel sad at the performance for the last time of any act to which we have been accustomed. Hence our feelings of regret upon the present occasion. We must not, however, regard the change as if we were colebrating the funeral obsequies of the Church Society, but rather as solomnizing its nuptial rites; for we henceforth behold the Church Society and the Synod united in intimate and indissoluble bonds. We anticipate a new and vigorous career for the various holy objects which they will seek to accomplishwe are assured of a more hearty and cordial co-operation on the part of the Laity we recognize in the simp'ified machinery a wise economy of time and money, and we confidently trust that the resources of the Church for each one of its great and important objects wi" be henceforth vastly multiplied and increased. The cause of missions—the support of the widows and orphans of the Clergy—the aiding in the erection of churches—the circulation of the Holy Scriptures and the book of Common Prayer—the fostering of Sunday-schools—the education of young men for the ministry-these various objects will all be prosecuted by Committees of Synod appointed for the purpose, and thus every individual of every congregation in the whole Diocese will have through his representative a voice and an active part in administering its missionary and charitable funds. Let then the misgivings, the suspicion and the distrust of the past be forgotten; let all minor differences sink into the shade, and let the friends and members of the Church unite with one heart, and one hand, and one purse to help forward the mighty work of sending the Gospel through the Church to the poor wild Indian, and to the destitute settlersto those on whom the light of the Gospel bath not yet shone and to those among whom it is well nigh extinguished The report of the collections throughout the various parishes and missions is very imperfect—the task of collecting having been much impeded, especially in country parts, by the storms and snow-drifts that have prevailed during the last six weeks. As far as they have been received, they compare on the whole favorably with the last year, but the Committee are not in a position to pronounce definitely upon their success until they receive further information.

The number of missions deriving assistance from this district branch of the Church Society is now eight, and by a resolution adopted this day by the Managing Committee, four more are recommended to be established without delay. Each of the missions of Maryborough and Peel, Rockwood, and Mount Forest, is to be divided into two; and the township of Minto is to be established as a separate mission. It is cheering to see that the Church is animated by such an active missionary spirit, and that while the country is advancing in every kind of material prosperity—in its agriculture, its commerce, its railway communication—its spiritual and moral improvement is not to be overlooked; that Christian peeple are to be invited and urged to embark in larger missionary undertakings and to

invest their substance more liberally in an enterprise that cannot fail to be remunerative, if undertaken in a spirit of love to God and love to Christ and love to the soils of our fellow men; for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it, "Every one that hath forsaken father or mother or sisters or brothers, or houses or lands for my sake and the Gospel's, shall receive an hundredfold, and shall inherit everlasting life."

Gore and Wellington District.

Extracts from Missionary Reports sent in to the Secretary of the District Branch.

ROCKWOOD MISSION.

The Rsv. Johnstone Vicars writes as follows:—" The Church Society is undoubtedly doing a good work in the back settlements, and desorvos our support and our prayers. Look at this mission of Rockwood with its eight stations, in five of which services have been held regularly every alternate Sunday during my incumbency of the past three years. In three of those stations there was no church organization. Now they have their churchwardens, delegates, and other officers. In one they have a nice comfortable brick church with all the necessary furniture except a font; that is at Erin. At Reading School-house the people have procured surplice and scarf, and erected a shed. They have also a bible and prayer book for the Clergyman, a number of hymn books for use at the time of service (a present from a gen-leman in Toronto), and a good box to keep all these articles in. At Hillsburgh where divine service had never been held until about eighteen months ago, now the people have procured a surplice and scarf, as a beginning, and they come in crowds to join in our Church of England prayers."

MISSION OF BEVERLY AND PARTS ADJACENT.

The Rev. Richard Harrison writes as follows:—"During the past year the mission of Beverly and parts adjacent has been in the state of transition from a position of almost entire dependence upon the Church Society to that of comparative independence. Under the peculiar circumstances of the mission at the time of my acceptance of it, I judged it best not to avail myself of the provision of the Church Society in the matter of Parochial guarantees, and preferred to throw myself as well upon the liberality of the people of the mission, as upon the generosity of the Mission Board in making allowance for an exceptional case. I was not disappointed in either respect."

The Mission Board has kindly granted me assistance to the extent of \$200 per annum. The people have, at two stations, contributed towards my stipend at the rate of \$200 each station: together \$400. At a third station—the oldest but feeblest in the mission—a private endowment exists to the amount of \$45 per annum accruing from rent of 100 acres of land; besides which the congregation, consisting of only four or five families, have a subscription list of about \$35 for the stipend. Monthly services (lately changed to fortnightly) have been given at two new stations, viz.: Morriston and Governor's Road. At the village of Mockton in Beverly, a stone church is on the eve of erection, about \$1100 having been subscribed—\$400 of which have been paid over on the site and building expenses. At the other principal station—Strabane with Freelton in West Flamborough—measures are being taken for the erection of another church. The contributions of the people of the mission for the various church objects have amounted to about \$1000."

"I have endeavored to impress upon my people the propriety of contributing for sacred purposes, chiefly, and as far as possible, through the sacred medium of the offertory; and the record of their quarterly collections in the Church Chronicle, as well as the ordinary offertory, testify to the growth of the feeling which I have endeavored to cultivate.

From the increase in the amount of the quarterly collections, some corresponding falling off might be anticipated in the Parochial collections; but the partial canvass of the mission already made, enabling me to forward something over \$60 at present date (March 11), leads me to hope that further efforts on the part of the collectors may result in a considerable addendum before the closing of the books on the 30th April."
