

CHURCH EXTENSION.—A proposal has been made, and is under consideration, that St. George's should join with another of the older parishes in helping to establish one of the proposed new parishes, the situation of which would be at Seaton or Dovercourt. The help asked from us is the giving of a moderate sum towards the purchase of a site for the future Church, on which, if secured, the people interested will themselves undertake to erect a small building suitable for present requirements. Our contributions to Mission work are not at all what they should be, and we should be glad of the opportunity of taking up and promoting a definite object such as is proposed.

VEXATIOUS DELAYS.

PAROCHIAL NEEDS.—Besides the means of meeting ordinary expenditure—

- 1. Debt, \$3.500, should be paid off, or at least reduced, but the ordinary revenue is insufficient to provide funds for this purpose. One dollar monthly from every pewholder would soon extinguish it.
- 2. The improvement of the Church, to render it more worthy and suitable for the sacred purpose to which it is consecrated. \$3,000 is wanted for this, and would be provided if every family in the Congregation gave a moderate sum towards it.
- 3. Donations and bequests towards an endowment, of which there is at present a sum of \$280 only.

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
