THE IMPROVEMENTS.

The Committee to whom it was referred by the Vestry "to decide upon the manner, style, and designs of the decorations," have considered it prudent to hasten slowly, and have therefore postponed their decision upon the question referred to them until the financial part of the scheme is more matured. In the meantime they have decided to execute a part of the work for which sufficient means are available, and a beginning has been made accordingly. The chancel has been selected for this work, and is to be decorated throughout in accordance with the designs which have been exhibited for the inspection of the congregation.

It will be observed that wooden mouldings have been introduced into this work. These are not for ornament merely, but to correct, or rather counteract, defects in construction of the arched ceiling of the chancel.

PAROCHIAL NEEDS.—Besides the means of meeting ordinary expenditure—

- Debt, \$3.500, should be paid off, or at least reduced, but the ordinary revenue is insufficient
 to provide funds for this purpose. One dollar monthly from every pewholder would
 soon extinguish it.
- 2. The improvement of the Church, to render it more worthy and suitable for the sacred purpose to which it is consecrated. \$3,000 is wanted for this, and would be provided if every family in the Congregation gave a moderate sum towards it.
- 3. \$1,000 for the erection of the Phoebe Street Mission Hall, and subscriptions to maintain the Mission.
- 4. Donations and bequests towards an endowment, of which there is at present a sum of \$295 only.

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
