N.B.—The offertory for October last year as above, included \$121.76 given on Thanksgiving Day. Similar offerings on Thanksgiving Day this year, or on the Sunday following, November 3rd, will do much to lessen the difference between the collections of the two years.

PARISH NOTES

The parish Harvest Festival was celebrated on Oct. 13th, and was a day of sunshine and happiness. In the morning the sermon was preached by Bishop Reeve and very special singing and reading marked the day. Liberal thank offerings were asked for on behalf of the parish church, and as most of the pew-holders were present we trust all presented a gift.

On Sunday, Oct. 20th, the Rev. Pierre De Soun preached and held an after meeting in the interest of the United Thank Offering to be presented next year in St. Paul's Cathedral at the Pan-Anglican service. This offering is being gathered from all parts of the world, and will represent the gifts of the whole Anglican Communion. This diocese is expected to contribute \$20,000, and all such contributions will be sent back to the country which gives it, to be used for their own missionary work.

The Parish Guild held its first meeting of the season at the Rectory on Oct. 3rd. It was decided to hold a sale of work on November 22nd and 23rd, the first charge on the receipts being the sum of \$225 to pay for a new furnace for the Rectory. The present furnace is 30 years old, and unable to perform or extend its functions. It was also resolved that every woman of the congregation should be asked to contribute two articles to the sale, especially for the fancy work table, and to sell tickets. Tickets are ten cents each, or three for 25 cents, and can be obtained at the Rectory.

The Young People's Association of St. George's is a very vigorous society, and at the last meeting between 50 and 60 members attended.

We welcome several new members to the choir: Misses May and King, Messrs. Curtis and Capp and Masters Whitaker and Chapman.

The members of the Sanctuary Guild are busy embroidering the new white frontal, which it is hoped will be ready by Easter. The W. A. and St. Agatha's Guild are as usual preparing for their missionary sales.

October 31st was observed as Thanksgiving Day throughout the Dominion, and there were the usual special services at 8 and 11 a.m.

GIFT FETE III

This sale of work is to be the most ornamental of all the bazaars, and aims at reproducing a poppy garden in full bloom at the end of November. Two broad paths will cut across the school-house at right angles, bordered on each side with wide beds of growing poppies. The stalls will be rustic in character, and many yards of green wreathing will outline them and form garlands between.
