Larish Notes.

February 15th being Ash Wednesday, there will be a celebration of the Holy Communion at 8 a.m., and at 11 o'clock the Commination Service and the Holy Communion. There will be the usual Wednesday Evening Service at 8 o'clock. On Sundays during Lent the Rector will preach a course of sermons in the mornings, and addresses on Foundation Truths will be given by the Rev. Edward Cayley in the evenings. Other services and announcements will be made later on, and will be printed and distributed in the pews.

Special preachers during January have been, the Reverends the Provost of Trinity College, G. F. Davidson, and Edward Cayley.

The Provost's Bible Class is now an established fact, and every Monday afternoon at 3.30 a fair sized congregation is gathered in the Church, to study under him the history and contents of our "Divine Library."

On Friday, January 6th, a treat was given to the Infant Class. The usual tea was much appreciated by the children, and afterwards presents were distributed. These toys and dolls were all hidden away behind a temporarily erected post office, and great was the joy of the children, when, on presenting a ticket at the wicket, they received an interesting parcel addressed to themselves. Some of the dolls were charming enough to delight even grown-up people, and many thanks are due to Mrs. Spink who so beautifully originated the costumes.

The upper school held their festival on Thursday evening, January 26th. Tea was served at little tables at 6.20, when about 130 children sat down. Afterwards came an entertainment by February 2nd, being the Feast of the Purifica-some of the scholars who had been previously prizes were distributed and some carols sung.
