This great institution owes, under God, much of its success and excellent organization to her zeal and farsightedness. Many can remember when it stood in relative obscurity on Sullivan Street, and can contrast it with the present fine institution, as it now stands free from debt in the open spaces of the west end. Her care for the orphans was untiring up to the very end, and no more appropriate mourners could have been chosen to follow her than these children who will "rise up and call her blessed."
