IN MEMORIAM.

M. M. CAYLEY.

(From the Canadian Churchman.)

The deepest sympathy is entertained for the family of the Rev. Canon Cayley, Rector of St. George's, Toronto, on account of the much regretted death of Mrs. Cayley. She had been ailing for a good many months, but hopes had been entertained that she might recover, and she actually did rally more than once. For the last two or three months, however, it has been apparent that the end was not far off, and on Wednesday last, October 10th, at nine o'clock in the evening, the spirit passed peacefully away. The funeral took place on the following Friday afternoon. Service was held in St. George's Church at 3.30 o'clock, a congregation which filled the church being present. Among them were the Members of St. George's branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, and many members of the Diocesan Board, W.A., the boys from the Orphans' Home, and also a number of poor old people, who sat quietly crying as they thought lovingly of the friend they had lost. A large number of clergymen and laymen were also present. The service in the church was read by Rev. Prof. Clark, assisted by Rev. R. J. Moore, and the Rev. Marmaduke Hare. The choir of the church were present, and the hymns, "The King of Love my Shepherd is," and "Peace, Perfect Peace," were sung. Vases of white flowers were on the altar, and the oak coffin was covered with flowers, among them being a "Winchester Cross" in flowers, sent by the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary. The commitment service in St. James' cemetery was read by the Rev. A. J. Broughall, after which the choir softly chanted the "Nunc Dimittis." On the Sunday morning following the sermon at St. George's was preached by Rev. Prof. Clark, who took his text from St. Luke viii., 52: "Weep not; for she is not dead, but sleepeth." After enlarging upon death as a universal fact in nature and as connected with sin in man, he spoke of the victory over death by Christ, and of the new hope which Christians derive from

His work. Referring to the changes which had taken place in the parish, he spoke of the death of the Hon. William Cayley, beloved and honored, and the esteem and affection in which the Rector and his family were held by the parishioners, and finally of the beautiful life and character of the departed. If of anyone, said the preacher, it might be said of her, that "even her failings leaned to virtue's side." Hers was a nature so pure, so single and transparent that she could conceal nothing, and there was nothing that she needed to conceal. Of superior intelligence, but, above all, full of affection for her kind, and of care for all that concerned the well-being of humanity and the extension of the Kingdom of God, she too little considered her own strength in her eagerness to bring help and comfort to others. Even already, when her loss is scarcely known, and but partially felt, there come testimonies from all sides of the help which she brought to the poor and the needy, and the distressed in this parish which she loved so well. But what do words avail? Or how should my imperfect utterances satisfy the emotions which arise in the hearts of those who knew and loved her? She was a pure, unselfish Christian gentlewoman, full of affection and abounding in self-sacrifice; and I know not what more or better could be said of a disciple of Christ. She is not dead. She sleeps in Jesus, waiting for the glory of the resurrection morning.

Parish Notes

During Advent there will be services daily in the church. Matins at 9.30. Evensong at 5.30, except on Fridays, when it is at 5. The response to the Rector's appeal for a volunteer choir on Wednesday evenings has not been overwhelming, so far only four young ladies have come forward.

Special preachers during the month have been the Rev. Prof. Clark and Rev. R. J. Moore.

Mr. Hare's Bible Class for young men was opened on the first Sunday in November at 3 o'clock.

Miss Lowe's Bible Class for young women is held every Sunday afternoon at 3.30

The Thanksgiving Day was kept on Oct. 18, being S. Luke's Day, and a fairly good congregation assembled to give thanks. The offertory, as usual, was devoted to the Diocesan Missions.

This is the beginning of a season of hardships for many families, where the bread-winner is thrown out of employment by slackness of work. Boots and shoes for men and children are costly things for all, but especially for the poor. Will the kindly disposed, whom God has blessed, look over their wardrobes and see what they have to spare? Parcels sent to the Rectory will be gladly received and carefully dispensed.

PARISH VISITORS.

Many changes of residence have taken place in the parish during the autumn, and new people have come into many of our streets. It is impossible for the clergy to make any effective visitation of the 2,600 houses within the parish limits. They need the help of a band of Churchwomen, who, by the subdivision of the parish into small districts, can carry out a very effective system of visitation, and thereby add many families to the congregation. Several ladies have expressed their willingness to take part in this work, but to make it effective there is need of at least twenty more. The clergy will be greatly obliged if any who are willing to help in thus strengthening the congregation will give in their names with as little delay as possible.

THE MOTHERS' MEETING.

Distance from the Parish, and largely increased home duties have compelled Mrs. Hagarty to give up the charge of the Mothers' Meeting, which she so efficiently managed last year. The mothers are full of regret, as they felt that the meetings were both good for them and helpful. The work is far too important to be given up without an effort to sustain it. It is suggested therefore to our earnest Church women, who are interested in their poorer sisters, to pray that God would raise up some one fitted for the work, whose heart He would incline to offer for it.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CHANCEL GUILD.

Unlike most organizations the Chancel Guild holds its annual meetings in the autumn, and thus at once utilizes the enthusiasm and energy generated by these gatherings. The meeting was called for Oct. 16th, and was opened by Mr. Hare by prayer, followed by a few words on the work of Chancel Guilds. Reports were then read and officers elected.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The Chancel Guild, consisting of seventeen members, began their year's work in Oct., 1899, by working new cushions before the altar rails. These were finished and presented to the Church at Easter, 1900. A festal dossal was begun from designs furnished by S. John's Sisters, and the ordinary work of making and repairing surplices and cassocks has been carried on. The weekly arrangement of flowers on the altar, the care of the sanctuary, the washing and ironing of the linen, the care of the altar vessels, have all been continued, and the usual decoration of the Church at Christmas and Easter. Besides this regular work, work was done on garments for the Red Cross Society, and an entertainment was given in the spring to between eighty and ninety Church Workers. Everything has been paid for by the Guild, and the report of the year's work has much of encouragement.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

It was the Iron Duke who said that a mere secular education only made clever devils. The truth of this is made apparent every day. If our boys had been taught the fear of God in their school-days, irreligion would not be so widespread among our youths and young men, nor would the criminal class be so large as it is.

If parents would have happy homes, and their children an unfailing source of comfort, they must see to it that Christian instruction enters into their daily schooling. The education of the heart must be seen to as well as the education of the mind. For this reason we are glad to call attention to two schools within the parish where careful attention is paid to this matter, viz: The Church of England School, in charge of the Sisters of the Church, at 69 Baldwin St., and the Misses Mackellar's School, at 195 Beverley St. Moderate as the fees are at both schools, yet by far the most important consideration is their Christian character, with its fruit of good manners.
