Several changes have taken place in the parish during the last three months and many houses have changed hands. As it is very difficult for the Rector to know all the changes that take place, it would be of great service if members of the congregation would notify him when new houses are taken or new families move into the parish.

By kindness of Miss Greene, a bed-rest and invalid's table have been placed at the disposal of the parish. Applications should be made to the Rectory.

During the summer months two former members of the Sunday-School, Ethel Meyers and Nettie Nash, have been married, and two members of the Chancel Guild, Florence Scarth and Helen Macdonald. While wishing all of them every happiness, we cannot help also congratulating ourselves that only one of them has left Toronto. Ottawa is not so very far. We also warmly congratulate Capt. Wyatt on the result of his travels and hope that Mrs. H. F. Wyatt will not be less happy in Toronto because it has so little of the beauty of Lochnagar. The choir has sustained another loss in Mr. Cave-Browne-Cave's departure for Quebec where, no doubt, he will find a place in the old Cathedral. We noticed, with pleasure, that Mr. Alec Ireland and Mr. Blanchford took their old places in the choir during a summer visit to Toronto.

By the time the next magazine is issued we hope to report some solution of the coal problem and that our usual Parochial Guilds can resume their winter's work in some assurance of warmth. In the meantime the Sunday School is going on and is in great need of two more Sunday School teachers and also of some one to take the place of Mrs. Francis, whose departure from the parish leaves the Infant Class without a head. Is there no one who could offer to tell Bible stories and teach hymns to these little children?

ST. GEORGE'S PARISH MAGAZINE.

The Annual Harvest Festival was held on Sunday, Oct. 5th, and was marked with appropriate services. The church looked really lovely with symbolic grain and the golden and red of flowers and fruit. The services in the morning were well attended but during the afternoon and evening thunderstorms and drenching rain utterly prevented many going out. We would not care to measure the thankfulness of St. George's people by the number who expressed it on Sunday night. Happily there is still another day given us to be thankful, and, no doubt, all defaulters will turn up at 8 or 11 on Oct. 16th. Many complaints have been raised as to the "sense" of having two Thanksgiving Days, so this is one reason—the other is that the Church needs the two offertories. The one on the Sunday is parochial and the offertory applied to our own needs; the one on the Thursday is national and the offertory given to the diocesan mission fund.

Special preachers during the summer have been the Rev. Canon Welch, Rev. E. C. Cayley and E. J. Haughton.

St. George's General Purposes Committee met on Monday, 6th Oct., to consider the financial situation before the winter season begins, as

well as other matters affecting the church. Mr. Weller submitted the account of receipts and expenditures for the half year, 1st of April to 1st Oct., including the outlay for necessary repairs.

The auditors' report for the same period was also submitted. The Committee, after fully discussing the accounts and statements of Messrs. Weller and Heath, found that the affairs of the church were in more favorable condition than was to be expected at this period of the year. The only discouraging part of the report was the amount in arrears both for pew rent and envelope offertory. The final conclusion of the Committee was—that, assuming the immediate payment of all arrears, a 25% increase of the offertory all round would not only pay the current expenses but also free the church of debt by Easter. The Rector was requested to make this statement from the pulpit.

At the meeting of the Church Committee on Monday it was suggested that a board containing a notice of church services might be placed at the corner of Queen and John streets, and also that printer's ink might well be employed in the service of the church, whether in the way of a weekly leaflet or advertisement. Both suggestions were adopted.
