Juar as we go to press a telegram is received from Charlottetown, P. E I., stating that the Scott Act has again been sustained. This is the second rereal that has been tried in Prince Edward Island. The Scott Act was adopted by Charlottetown on April 24th, 1879, and went into operation on May lat of the following year. Danger to the Desperate and Daring Perjurers.

On Thursday of last trate Young held a preliminary investigation in the case of Bennett, of George town, who was charged with perjury in swearing falsely in a case in which he was charged with violation of the Scott Act. 
