

#### VICTORIA.

Business continues fairly steady in jobbing lines and of course the retail trade is expected to increase materially between now and the holidays. The markets have shown several prominent features this week. Manitoba Hungarian flour has advanced 10c per bbl. Dry granulated sugar is quoted at \$3 per ton lower in Victoria, as the refinery now quotes the same prices in Victoria that formerly were forb, Vancouver.

Eastern creamery butter is le higher, American hams are 1c lower and pure lard Jc.

Money continues scarce with collections necessarily slow.

The Vancouver News-Advertiser says: "On account of the approach of the Christmas holidays, business is fairly brisk at present, and it is satisfactory to note that during the last few days, collections have improved a little. An unfortunate difficulty has occurred at one of the leading local industries during the past week, whereby a large number of hands left work, and the mill was consequently shut down. At the present time of quietude, it is unfortunate that such an affair should ocour, but happily the difficulty has been settled and the mill has started up again. Mining work has now shut down for the season, and large numbers of men employed up country are now returning to the city, The summer's work has been very satisfactory and at the opening of navigation in the spring, there will be great activity in mining matters. In wholesale, business at present is fairly good and collections show some improvement. In Nanaimo trade continues steady, but in Westminster it is reported as very quiet."

#### GROCERIES AND PROVISIONS.

The B. C. Refinery has announced that prices formerly quoted at Vancouver are now applicable to Victoria and in future their sugar will be delivered in warehouse in Victoria for the same figures as at Vancouver. Jobbers quote an advance of le in the refinery prices. The importers of China sugar have lowered their price of dry granulated sugar to meet the refinery prices. American and Canadian hams are weak. American have dropped le and pure lead he per lb. A carload of eastern creamory butter has been lately received and is quoted 25c for large and 27c for small tubs, being le advance on former figures. Large shipments of Mediterranean dried fruits have arrived during the week. Asanticipated, like the first lots received, the quality of

Valencia raisins is much below the standard of former years.

### A MINING BUREAU.

Mr. Kellie is to be congratulated on having been successful in passing through the Legislature a resolution in favor of a Provincial Bureau of Mining, which was subsequently followed by the introduction by Hon. Col. Baker, of a Bill providing for the establishment of such an odice by the Government. We have repeatedly expressed ourselves in favor of a departure of this kind and at the same time pointed out the great advantages which were certain to result from it. Henceforward with a well appointed, though not necessarily expensive office, it will be possible to give ocular demonstration, without the necessity of visiting the localities concerned, of the character of our resources, whose extent is so well known that but little additional proof is necessary.
