TRADE AND COMMERCE.

COMMERCIAL JOURNAL OFFICE. Tuesday Morning, June 11.

VICTORIA.

The volume of trade continues about the same, and prices indicate a numer feeling, and a brighter future for the market. There is a noticeable improvement in the feeling in trade circles with more of a disposition to inquire for goods.

Private advices from Vernon state that the prospects are very bright for an abundant harvest of wheat and fruit crops. There has been eleven days of rain which is considered unusual at this season, but is nevertheless beneficial to growing crops.

The Coast Sealing Fleet are preparing for Behring Sea, and are maki g their usual demands on the trade for provisions, &c.

With good crop and industrial prospects there is every reason to believe that this fall will witness a substantial improvement in almost all branches of business, for prices are now either inclined towards an advance or are decidedly firm.

GROCERIES AND PROVISIONS.

There are only a few slight changes in The market is reported quotations. glutted with Manitoba and North West dairy butter. A well known commission broker said: "There is any amount in warehouse of such inferior quality as to be unfit to sell as butter." The finer grades range from 15c to 18c per lb. Manitoba case eggs are also reported a drug on the market. Most of these dairy products are handled on consignment which will in point account for the over supply.

Latest advices quote creamery butter ing Company's brands per ib.: 9d per lb. f.o.b. at Sydney, which would cost 23c laid down here and is at present too high to compete with California

Present indications point to low prices for California dried fruits this season. The quantity dried will be much less than in 1895.

Pears were dried in very large quantities last year, but this season the pear crop-is very short and the fruit in demand for shipment fresh and canners use. The output of dried apricots will not reach fifty per cent. of last season. Prunes will be a fair yield.

Packing house products show no change. The market is somewhat duller except in beef products which are reported firm with a tendancy to advance.

Since the dissolution of the Canadian Association, the great bulk of the stock of vegetables on hand, particularly tomatoes,

prices on tomatoes have been advanced 72; cents per dozen, while peas and corn are quoted 21 cents higher. From all indications quotations will rule high for this season's pack on account of the reported damage to growing crops by frost.

SAN FRANCISCO COAL TRADE.

J. W. Harrison's San Francisco coal report dated May 30, says: Since the departure of the steamer "Alameda" the following vessels have arrived from Newcastle, N. S.W.:-"Chrysomene" 2,630 tons, "Empire" 1,579 tons, "Travancore" 3,125 tons, total 7,334 tons, As the total arrivals from Australia for the past 60 days, only foot up 13,110 tons, it is readily explained why our jobbers are carrying such small stocks, and asking prices are readily obtainable for cargoes here and nearly due. All that can possibly arrive here prior to August 1st will not exceed 16,000 tons, so that Australian grades should remain steady up to that time. With over 135,000 tons of coal tonuage engaged in the Colonies for this port, we are assured low prices for cargoes deliverable several months hence. Some of the ships named will not arrive here this year, as the cancelling dates in Australia of a large number will be November- December which makes the same due here in February-March next.

If British Columbia had not been such a liberal shipper to our market this year, coal quotations would have been much higher, as the deliveries of Colonial and English for the past five months have been very light. The last half of 1895 will show lower figures for fuel than now prevail, if the present outward grain freights should be maintained, and the outlook is very favorable for their sustenance. As the sellers for future delivery largely outnumber the buyers, sales for the moment are difficult to effect.

Col. "Nitrate" North, the English speculator, is a very active sort of person. A few days ago it was announced that he had formed a syndicate to control the supply of Zanzibar cloves, and to-day it is declared that he has applied the same tactics to camphor, with a result that the price is jumping daily .- N. Y. Merchants Review.

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
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
