Tue a muher of comigrants from Great Britain and Irehand, in 1879, was 217,163 , against 147 ,663 in 18is. Ot this exodus 31,806 persons went to the United States, 40,954 to Ahstratia and 17,952 came to Canada. The number of immigrants was 53,973 , making the excess of emigration $163_{2} 190$.

Tus telephone is said to have the effect of destroying the business of insurance brokers in Chicago, theogh emabling the merctants to make their arrangemeats directly with the companies by word of month. Insurers greatly prefer dealing directly with principals, while the companies are, of course, very glad to save broker's commission.

A sewage steamer has been built for the corporation of Liverpool, England. The construction is novel, and the new buat has so far met the expretations entertained in regard to her. When folly londed the versel is stemmed some twenty miles out to sen, and there discuarged.

The St. Gothard tunnel in Swizeriand, recently completed, after over tight yenrs habor, is the largest in the world, and exceeds that of the Dout Cenis, the Hoosne and the Sutro. The total lengli of the Mont Uenis is 40,054 feet, or 7.6 miles; the Housac, 25,040 feet, or 4.74 miles; the Sutro, 31,370 feet, or 3.84 miles, while the St. Gothurd measures 48,500 teet, or 0.14 miles.

Sevmbal discrepancies have been discovered in the accounts of the iondon, Out., water commissioners, represemting a deficit of about $\$ 200$. The latter are made up of book accounts, $8:, 416.71$; stock and furniture, $\$ 1,662.17$; and real estate $\$ 1,200$, mortgaged for $\$ 1,000$. An cstimate is madethat the book accounts will hadly realize more than $\$ 1,000$, and the stock and furniture not more than 50 cents on the dollar. No offer of setilement has yet been made.

As the "Fifteen" puzale craze apears to be entering Cauadn, and laving some regard for the wits of people who have enough to worry them in trying to escape from the hard times, we furnish a solution which any person can ob$t$ ain for lrimself by the aid of a small piece of japer divided into sixteen squares and using fifteen little paper squares numbered, instead of wooden blocks. AT the meeting of the permanent committee of the Dominion Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition held in this city on Satmrdny Inst, the Chairman reported the results of his communication with the Quebec Government and the City Council Finance Committee, announcing their assent to grants of $\$ 12,000$ ench. It was then determined to rppoint $n$ sub-committee to superintend the erection of suitable exbibition buildings, and to confer with the City Passenger and other railway companies with a viow to
increased facilities. It was also decided that, in the event of a grant in aid of the Exhibition by the Dominion Government, the Committe should be anthorized to obtain the names of moper parties from the other Provinces as honorary directurs.

The Demont moder project was again before the United States Semate Committec on Commerce on Saturday last, and met with strong opposition. It was urged that the bridge would obstruct mavigation, thereby increasing the rates of treight for milions of tous of iron ore, lumber, grain, etc. Remonstrances were presented from the Legislatures of New York, Ohio and Wisconsin, and from the Bonrds of Trade of Cleveland, Milwankee, Pittshurgh and Duluth. Counter opinions were expressed on belalf of the friends of the scheme, the general bearing of which was that even should the bridge prove to some extent an obstraction, as in all probabiliy it wonld not, the adrantiges to acerve to the Western country from its construction were relatively of sumbiont extent and importance to justify the carring out of the enterprise.

Judament was given in the Supreme Conrt at Oltawa, on the 13 th inst., in the case of McQueen rs. The Phonix Insurance Company. This was an "ppeal from the Court of Appeal of Ontario tor payment of claim of $\$ 2,000$ upon stock of gools in Wiugham destroyed by lire in January, 1879. At the time the iusurance was effected notice was given to the company's agent that the loss, if any, was to le payable to Mr. MoQueen's cerditors, but this condition was not written upon the policy. The unanimuns verdict of the Conrt was in favor of the plaintiff, Justice Gwyme holding that the agent was
the correet person to whon to give such notice as had been given, and that the case was paralle with that of the Liverpool and London and Globe Insurance Company v. Wild, already decided by this Court.

Had fate ghted Bunss lived in our day he would hardly have written, " 0 , wad some power the filtic gie us to see ourselves as ithers see us," for the modern newspuper wonld surely have robbed him of all occasion for the expression of sucli a wish. Here is what the N.Y. Commercial Bulletin bas to say in reference to the delayed opening of the Welland Canal: "The repairs on the Welland Canal will not be finished until about the Eth of any. Owners of vessels chat have been had upall winter on take Ontario complatn of the bad manngement which hats thus dehayed these repairs unil so late in the season, and allege that there is no reason why the catal should not be thrown open for business while the repairs are progressing. As the brie Camal will be opea carly in Amid, the best thing shippers can do is to use that, and let the slow-going Canadian route take its time." Interested parties conversant with the facts must be left to answer whether or not this picture does "from many a bluader free us, and foolish notion."

## MONTREAL, MARCH 19, 1880

THE CURRENCY.
The fact that a public meeting has been held in the city of Ottawa under the presidency of the mayor, with the object of promoting the issue of inconvertible paper money, is calculated to be decply injurious to Canadian credit. It happens most unfortumately that this movement should be concurent with the amouncement by the Minister of Finance, that he is about to propose an increased issue of Dominion notes. Those who are opposed to that increase will, without doubt, endeavor to represent the Goverument as being favorable to inconvertible paper money. We should be truly sorry to believe for one moment that such a charge could be made with troth, and there was certainly nothing in the very brief reference made to the subject in the Budget speech to support it.

In Canada as in the United States the advocates of fiat money have profited not a little by the diversity of views which prevail among the supporters of a convertible currency. There are in both countries differences on what for our present purpose may be termed minor points, among persons who concur in opinion that no paper curvency should be
tolerated that is not convertible on demand into whatever standard of value it may be expedient to alopt One class would desire the continuance of the pre sent bank issues, another would favar the National Bank note system of the United States, which wonld require the banks to give Govemment security for heir issues, white a third would adrocate an exclusive Dominion note issue, comvertible on demand as at present, the entire protit going to the public. The diflerence of opinion between the tulvocates of these difterent theories hats been decidedly favorable to the adrocates of inconvertibility, and more especially as many of the arguments in fivor of a fiovermment convertible issue may be used in favor of the fiat money. For instance, both argue that " the ereation of money is the busi-
" ness of the State and not of at thaling "corporation," and both contend that the protit on that circulation which the people reguire for conducting their exchanges should acerue to the state and not to private corporations. Both again urge the danger of loss by the circulation of bank notes, which, thongh not legal tender, the public are nevertheless pactically compelled to reccive.

It is perhaps diflieult for those who have never studied the question to discriminate between so many conflicting views, and those who have paid attention to the speeches and writings of the advocates of fiat money cannot have failed to remark that they on all occasions make use of arguments, which might be urged in favor of a Govermment issue of convertible paper. It would probably be impossible to unite the adrocates of convertible paper money in support of any scheme, but it may be hoped that they will cordially co-operate in exposing the fallacies which are so perseveringly disseminated by the advocates of fiat money. It was rather unfortunate that at the Oltawa meeting persons came forward to oppose. Mr. Wallace, who, as far as it is possible to judge from the meagre reports, were noi very conversant with the subject. It has never boen denied that Govermment irredeemble paper, if made a legal tender, might be used as currency, but, on the other hand, if we did not tind so many intelligent men laboring under the delusion, it would be inconceivable to us how any one can fail to perceive, and especially with the experience of the United States before his eyes, that such a standard of value would be as variable as the winds of heaven. Better by far to adopt the old standind used by the aborigines, of beaver skins, which we admit would be uncertain enongh, than a
paper currency varying in amount from day to day and from week to week, and with each variation affeoting the value of all investments, of all debts, ambotomly of every commodity, but of overy deseription of labor. When we know that in tommer ages there were alehemists who were able to delude their fellow men into believing that they could transmute the baser metals into groh, we perhaps ought not to to surpised that Mr. Wallace and his conljutors should be able to persande their dupes that by stamping pieces of praper they can create money that will be received in exchange for the products of labor.
One catse of the existing detusion is an ideathey have got that gold hats no value as a commodity, but derives it from the fiat of the Govermment, and yet hey can searcely be unaware that in comitrids where gold is demonetized itmantains the same relative value in exchange ats com pared with silver. We confess that it is mortilying to think that in the deth century, in a country where education hats been widely extended, there shonld be found a considerable number of people so deluted as to believe that the fiat of a Govermment ean create an instrament of value.

## COMMERCIAL UNION.

We learn from a letter addressed to us by Mr. Wharton Barker, of Philalelphia, that he and the league with which he is connected, are making vigorous eflorts to procure some expression of Canadian opinion favorable to the scheme which was developed in the letter to the Hon. George Brown to which we recently called attention. 'That letter, he informs us, has been sent to all the mombers of the Dominion Partiament, while Mr. Barker has written specially to Sir 30 hm Macdonald and Mr. Mackenzie, in the expectation, doibtless, that those gentlemen will coalesce in order to carry it out. One might be led to anticipate a coalition in support of this scheme from the assurance given us by Mr. Barker that he has letters" from them both, which leads me "to believe that the Dominion Govern"ment are ready to appoint on their side "members of such a commission." Wo should not be surprised if some member of the House of Commons were to move for copies of Sir Johm Macdomald's correspondence with Mr. Barker on this very important sulject. Mr. Barker has not confined his negotiations to. Canadian statesmen. After conlerring with the Hon. Jolm Welsh, the late Minister of the United States to Great Britain, with the President of the National Board
of Trade, and with leading meabers of the Senate and House of Representa. tives, he has put the matter before the Hon. Nr. Evarts, Secretary of State, whl has discussed with him the mode of formiug a committee of five to meet five representatives of Canada. The suggestion, whether Mr. Evarts' or Mr. Barker's is not clear, is that the Secretary of State, one senator, one member of the Touse of Representatives, and two citizens selected by the l.resident, should form the Unitẽd States commission.

We should not imagine that any agreement arrived at by such a commission would be more likely to be approved hy Congress than one negotiated direct with the Secretary of State. Mr. Barker does not explan what the proposed commission is to consider. Is it to discuss the terms on which the right to fish in Camadian waters will be armated for another period of years, and likewise, the respective larift's of the two countries, or is the negotiation to be based on the adoption of a common tarifl on the principle of the \%ollverein? In the latter case dons the proposition mean that the suggested commission shatl prepire a tarif for the two combries, and armange for the distribution of the revenue? The whole scheme is so crude that it would be hardly possible to discuss it. We presume that we are acting in accordance with Mr. Baker's wishes in'giving the substance of his letter, and we may remark that he has published in the Now Sork llemba a letter containing substartially the same proposition as that suggested in the letter to the Mon. George Brown.

## FIRE INSURANCE IREPORINA.

It may not always be correct or just to julge a fire insurance company by the report it presents to its shareholders, as there is ever behind the figures, the fact, incapable of demonstration except by future events, and not always even then, of the real hazurd carried under the item of " mearned premiums;" as a fire company's ascertained loss ratio may have been so high as to have caused a weeding out of undesirable risks ; or these may have bunt themselves out so as to im . prove the quality of the average of those remaining in force; or, the loss ratio may have been so low as to induce carelessness such as may make the unexpired risks more costly than those previously matured; or, whilst the general average may be good, the loss ratio may have been disturbed by so exceptional a calamity as the Hamilton fire of August last, an occut-
rence which, as far as Canata is concerned, has not been equalled since the buming of the Tron Block in Toronto, and may not, -we tust will not,-be known agrain for many long years.

It is positively wrong to judge of the business of a company by its statement of receipts and expenditures, beeause of the (two) items whose true inwardness time alone cin demonstrate, vi\%, "unsettled losses" and "uncumed pre. miums ;" and because it is always neces. sary to remenber that an increasing business means a piling up of 'utave liability, while a decreasing business means a disbroporionate amomnt of present losses with a decrease of future contingencies.

Beside these, however, are the diflerent policies adopted by the compranies in the manizement of their business and the aceeptance of risks: one company by a bohd argressive policy may secure an extencled area of risks on classes of hazarals which another company may religinusly avoid, and yet, by avoidance of moral ame conltagration hazard, may profit by its adventurots spirit, the more especially as a larre premitum income. proteets from the disturbmee aused by such ocensional "extrot dinaties" as would serionsly afteet a company whose premium income was compilatively small.
'lhere is also the fact that one class of risks will have a fire epidemic in one season and another chass in the next. A series of conflagrations such as those of 1875, 1576 and $187 \%$ begiming with Quebee and ending with St. Toln, may be followed by a calm, as in 1875 , and this again by a continuous ilhmination by spomalic fires as in 1879 ; or, we may have a repetition of 1873 ami 1874 , in which years the fire companies were lalled into a feeling of security by their surprising immunity from loss.

Shameholders in their meetings should not be unduly elated or depressed by the experiences of any year, or of any series of years whose general character has been similar, because that the intent and purpose of tire insurance is to make risks which do not burn pay for those which do, and years of immunity provide for those of disasters; therefore, if they have confidence in the genemal management of their business, they should uphold it in times of disaster and be contented with moderate dividends in times of good fortune. Persons who are speculative or fretful or nervous should never have any connection with fire insumance, because they continually interfere with and im. perle the mangement, and by croaking or plotting do serious injury to institutions
so dependent upon the public confidence as are live insurance companies.

So far as the general public are concerned, they have soveral means of judg. ing as to the conlidence they should repose in a fre insumance company; for instance, the requirement of full rates, the inspection of its risks, the wording of its policies, and the arjostment of its losses; if these are done earefully, and in a busi-ness-like manmer, then its losses will always be pain, but, if low rates are accepted for the securing of risks, "risks" will certatinly be secared at the expense of safety ; and, if carelessness in wording, or inspection or aljustment be seen, then the not fir distant future may demon. strate the want of surety in that company's guaranties of indemnity.

We have been carefal so to preface our smmmaries of the reports as to prevent injustice to the companies by reasom of any misinterpretation of their figures.

The Vietoria Mutual presents a report from which it is not possible to ascertain more than the number of policies tio force in each of its branches, the amount at risk and the amount of losses incurved during the year. I'hese are:

Chaims amounting to $\$ 29,137.30$ have been paid, in addition to which there have been reported about $\$ 9,500$, on which the netaal liability may probably reach $\$ 0,000$ to $\$ 7,000$. Of this sum over 33, ,ino have been arrady paid, leaving an unaljusted liability of less than $\$ 4,000$.
'The Citizens' is an example of the prin. eiple that a series of eras, and not the experience of a few years, should govern the coneluct of an insumance company, as although it has lost money during the past few years, yet its general manager states that its dividends have exceeded an average of six per cent. to the close of 1879. This comprany has excited the ire of one of our respected contemporaries by deciding to let "by-gones be bygones," as it does not furnish a statement of its operations during the past yemr, but simply shows its claims to public confidence as demonstrated by its present assets and liabilities. Its list of assets shows investments unexceptionally
good, with an excess over liabilities of $307,6 \cdot 7.66$, notwithstancling its complifance with the very severe yet right standard of reserve, 1I. M. 4t jer cent., on outstancling bile policies. Possibly it may be wiser for this Company to publish a more full report in future, as it will then demonstrate its ability to bear long continued disasters, while being pre. pared to profit by a recurrence of good fortume.

The Western las "phucked a feather with the eagle in his eyrie," and countsits spoils with gratulations in its new baifding, its assets having increased by soo, Sis.56, although the Consolidated Pank stook is wholly writen off, premitim in. come increased by $\$ 110,50,20$, and in. terest account increased by $56,332.40$; the other side of the shield being represented by an increase of liabilities to the extent of $500,764.50$, a loss account increased by $\$ 210,805.95$, and an expense accomb inereased by $\$ 7,154.78$; the statement of disbursements daes not contan the $\$ 60,000$ paid for dividends during the past year. 1 fad not its shamoholers had the good sense to sustain its management through the vicissitudes of its early years, we would mot now have the pleasure of congratuhating them on so comfortable a dividend as lo per cent.
'The Dominion presents a statement whose form is tho most satisfactory; as every frossible information is contained in one or other of its schedules. It shows a surplus of receipts over expenditures amountirg to $\$ 16,050.68$, an increase of assets to the extent of $\$ 15,7 \pi 5,57$, amd of liabilities to the amount of ses, 374.54 , a
 and an interest account increased by 5254.94

The Foyal Canadian submits a statement which must needs be very interesting fiom the fact that the Directors, finding their United States branches temporarily unprofitable withont an immediate prospect of improvement, decided to discontinue them, consequently they had to demonstiate their right to the continued confidence of their Canadian patrons. 'lheir career so far had shown the absurdity of the management of a fire snsumane company by those wholly ignomat of the business, however "at home" they may be in their special callings, but now that the company has clecided to be a home company, and has a manager well versed in Camadian business, more stable and satisfactory results are to be expected, as, after all its adventures, its statement pre sents a "surplis to policy holklers" of $\$ 433.105 .01$, with a profitable home busi-
ness and a directorate loyal to the company and always ready to promote or pro. tect its interests, lit was natural that some feeling should be exhibited at the meeting, and that the mollifying influence of a dividend should compensate the shareholders for their disappointment with reference to their United States business, bowever justifiable or otherwise its dechation may have been. $f$ is to be hoped that the two items of insuts, very large of their class, via, bills receivable, $\$ 29, \$ 78.53$, and agents balances and sumdry debtors $552,018.45$, will be realized without delay, heing such as are sulyect to contingencies.

The Directors of the National met their shareholders with a proposition for the re-insumme of the $\begin{aligned} & \text { forment }\end{aligned}$ fisks (which has since been eflected in the Sovereign) and a liquidation of the aftairs of the company. Since neither the shareholders nor the directors, with fer exceptions, ever exertel any inlluence in its favor, but increased its expenses by their actions, this was the only possible fate of the company unless the conservative selection of risks hat met with years different from 1570 , when the best risks made the worst record; and even then the expenses in comection with its stock list would have made strccess very uncertain.

The Canada Fire and Marine makes a very complete report, showing an increase of 531,000 in premiam income as evidence of energy and popularity, its increase in income being over $\$ 40,000$, the reverse being an increase in unearned premitums of $\$ 19,000$ and of losses paid $\$ 21,000$. The return preminus and reinsurances which should be a deduction from the income are included in the agency accounts. The amount of expenses camot therefore be compared.

The Merchants Marine greets its shareholders with a fiye per cent. dividend; increased assets to the amount of $51 \%$, 405.29 ; a premiom income clecreased to the extent of 517,000 ; an interest, \&e., income increased $\$ 1,0: 6.41$; a loss account decreased $\$ 3 \overline{5}, 000$; an expense account increased by 51,000 , and $\mathrm{i}_{\mathrm{y}}$ y deduction and allowances on open accotints of $20,175.76$. The statement of liabilities is not made up as an insuance company's statement should be, as it omits unearned premiums, which in the President's address are stated to be $\$ 14,187.15$, and ontstanding losses, which are not elsewhere mentioned in the report-we trust mone exist, but, even so, that gratifying fact should be stated. The albsolute necessity of full and true statements is shown by the President's address, it which we read that " the losses
paid for business taken in 1879 were 820 , 790.14," whereas the Govermment report for IS7S states " total liabilities, excluding capital stock in all; countries, $519,595.85$, a discrepancy which should give the Directors patuse before the payment of a diviclend, the more especially as live. twellths of the company's assets are subject to contingencies, and the etcelems of the income account may Einclude $\$ 1,80$ appreciation 'in" valuation of Harbor Bonds.

## THE DOMINION NOlE ISSUE.

Although it is premature to discuss the sulyect of an increased issue of Dominion notes, there are some points which ought to be kept' in sview. 'The Monetary Tintes has fillen into an error in stating the present limitat ten millions of dollars, it being rally twolve, so that the bound is only eight millions instead of ten. 'That we admit is atarting amount; but it must be borne in mind that in taking power to issute to that extent, the finance Minister does not promise that he will do so. He will, it may be presumed, be guided by circomstances. He conten. plates preserving the convertibility of the Dominion notes, and as a necessary consequence he can only increase the amount by curtailing the bank issues, and that he can hardly do this year, unless by púting a heavy tax on the notes of certain denominations. It must be apparent that the Government contemplate an increased circulation of Dominion notes, and as too great a curtailment of the present issues would be injurious to the commercial community, it would be wise in the banks to meet the Government and consent to a moderate curtailment.

## TIDE BOUNDARM QUESTION.

## (Concluded.)

THE DE RE日NIIARD Caste.
In the year 1818 the guestion cume incidentally before the Criminal Court of Quebee, and we would by no means uncler. value the decision given by Chief Justice Sevell and his colleagues in firyor of the due north line. We liave, however, to consider some points which materially detract from the weight of that decision. The question before the Court was one of jurisdiction. A crime had been committed at a place called Dalles, in the vicinity of the Lake of the Woods, and the question was as to whether Dalles was in the Province of Upper Canada or in the territory west of it, in which latter case the jurisdietion would have been with. the Que-
bec Court. The American revolution had taken place since the Act of 1774, and there had been a treaty of peace in 1783, which as to boundaries, was modified by subsequent treaties. The Act of 1791 was passed to divide the old Province of Quebec, but it mast be bome in mind that the revolution had materially curtailed the territory of the Canarda of 1754, and moreover there was, as is evident from the treaties of 1794,1814 , and 1818 , great ${ }^{-1}$ certainty as to the southern boundaries of Upper Canada. We shall only cite the words of that part of the proclamation which is of importance to the present dis. cussion. "To ascend the said river (Ot "tawa) into the Lake Temiscaming and "from the head of the said Lake by a line "drawn due north (not northward) until "it strikes the boundary line of Hudson's "Bay, including all the territory to the "westward and sonthward of the said line "to the utmost extent of the countiry "commonly called or known by the mame "of Camada." Now it will be observed that the foregoing language is very comprehensive and accordingly it has been held, and it must be, ahmitted not without phasibility, that it gave to Upper Camada territory much'more extensive than that given by the arbitrators. On the trial of De Reinhard in 1818 , it was maintaned by two very eminent? lawyers, Mr. Andrew Stewart and the late Chiel Justice Vallieres, that the effect of the words above cited was to give Upper Canada much more teritory than the mere Mississippi boundary. On the other hand it was contended that the object of the det of 1791 was merely to divide the Chamat of 1774 into Upper am Lower Canmla. It witl be found on reforence to the arguments of counsel that the main point was, whether the territory of Gmata was ar was not extemted by the Aet of 1701. The counsel for the prisoner never raised before the Court the question of the Mississippi boundary as the true one by the Aet of 1744 for the reasons alrealy cited, but. they insisted that that Aef was merely temporay, and that the het of 1791 mast be taken as giving the correct boumd. tury. It is true that the puling of the Court was that northward must be conshrued due norih, but, as we have stated, this was without any consiteration having been given to the true meaning of the Aet of 1774 . A brief extract from Chief Tustice Sewell's charge will sullice: "To assert that he (he King) " intended by this that the limits of the "Province should be extended by the "separation appears to me repugmant to " the plainest principles of common sense, " and therefore I can't assent to it."

Again," what says the proclamation" "o " divide the Province of Guebec, not to "ardd to it, any more than to take away " from it." The whole argument between counsel was on the gutestion whether the Aet of find hat the effect of extending Wheteritory of Upier Comadia beyond hat assigned to Cham by the Act of 17-t. The different interpretations phacel on the Actof 1ith were never brotigh ander the consiteration of the Court, and as the whole Mississippi territory had been over fo years in possession of the United States, the points which seem so conclusive were never even raised. it may not be un: importan to remak that the abitrators allopted the ruling of the Cout in the Dekeinhathe case in 1818 so fite as to hod that the territory of Upper Canata or Gntario most be limited to that covered by the Act of 18it, although they diflered from it as to the construction phaced on that Aed as to the effect of the worl "uorthward." Uf course the trealy of ITs: had to be considered. The loomidary of the old Province of Quebee was the Mississinpi, but the southem boundary of Canada had heen established by the treaty of 178.3 to be a lince drawn from the most north-western point of the Lake of the Woods " on a due west course to the River Mississippi," so that it was clear that the Mississippi was recognized as the western boundary, another prof of the correctness of the interuretation phaced on the Actof 174.4.
mo. s. ग. bawson on the mocimatr.
In :un interesting memorandum on the early maps of the disputed teritory, writen so late as November, 1876 , by Mr. S.I. Dawson, he argues that, "the true spinitad even letter of the treaty" would require a line to be dawn dace west to the White Bath River. Mr. Dawson's main reliance in support of his interpetation of the treaty is that the geographers of the period were well aware that the soure of the Mississippi was far to the sonth of such a line, and consequently that they must have intemed the White Earth liver. It is mortunate for Mr. Dawson that he seems wholly unaware of the treaty of 170 between Cireat britain and the United States, one article of which eommeness: "Whereas it is uneer"tain whether the river Mississippi ex" tends so far to the northward as to be "intersected by a line to be drawn due "west from the Lake of the Woods in " the manner mentioned in the treaty of " peace between Mis Majesty and the " United states." The article proceeds to provide for a survey of he said river from one degree of latitude below the Falls of St. Anthony, and further, in case $i_{t}$

Should appear that the said river wouk not be intersected by such a line, then the piaties will regulate the boumdary aceording "to justice and mutual con"venience, and in conformity to the intent "of said treaty." Another treaty was mexntiated in IsIS, establishing the northwestem angle of the Lake of the Wools and al line drawn thence "due north or south, as the acose may be," until it interseeted the toth parallel of north latitude. Mr. Dawson will note by the italies that in 1815, 35 years alter the treaty of peace, the diplomatists were not sure whether the Lake of the Wools was north or south of the 49 h parallel of latitude. 'Whe anbitrators did not think fit to go west to look for a Mississippi or a White Earth River, but accepted the international boundary, deciding the only doubtrul point as to the western boundary against the claim of Ontario.

It seems to us a most mfortunate cir cumstance that the gentleman who is taking a prominent part in endeavoring to set aside the award of arbitrators appointed to determine the trae boundaries of the Province of Ontario should be committed as Mr. Dawson is, if we can believe the "Parliamentary Compamon," to the opinion that "the great central "region known as Algoma, extending from " the Slst to the 95 th meridian, that is "from French River to the Lake of the "Wools, should be formed intoa separate "Province." We can quite understand that the representative of Algoma may hold such an opinion, but, the question is not whether it would be expedient to create such a Province, but what are the legal boundaries of Ontario, and to allow a gentleman pledged to such an opinion to nominate a committee, and to endeavor to set aside the award of impartial arbitrators, is anything but ereditable to the louse of Commons.

The proclamation of 1791 defines the boundary between Upper and Lower Canada to be th line drawn due north from Lake Temiscaming until it strikes the tomalary line of ll talson's Bay. This is precisely the North Eastern terminus estah. lished by the arbinators. It is alleged that. it was always understool that the I ludson's lay Company were entitled to all the territory north of the height of land which divides the waters flowing into Hudson's Bay from those flowing into the St. Lawrence ; and Mr. Donald A. Smith, who has spent his life in the service of the Juctson's Bay Company, has been called before Mr. Dawson's commitiee to prove, what no one has disputed, that the Iludson's Bay Company always claimed that boundary ;
but, 25 Mr. MoD. Dawson correctly stated, "on no earthly anthority but the miselves." In order to discover on what authority the clear language of a proclamation issued in nccordance with an Ant of the lmperial Parliament could be inpugned, we naturally referred to the report in the canadian Hansard, of the discussion during the last 'ession on Mr. Dawson's motion for the award of the arbitutars. We found little in Mr. Dawson's own speech to aid us in our research. He commenced by relerting to the importance of the ques. tion. He proceeded to state that Onta. rio would get a linge extent of territory which she could not conveniently deal with, and that he (Mr. Diwson) had "always been of opinion : that a separate Provinee shond be created. Mr. Jawson conflued his criticism of the award chiefly to the Westem bommary, In regard to the Northem, he commithed a great arror when he alleged that what he termed the Hurson's Bay Comprany's "rights" "were confimed by treaties and acknowlededed "atter the treaty of Curecht by Fanceas "wellas England." Sucha-sertions only prove that Mr. Dawson has not stutied the suljert. Mr. Dawsom was tallowed by the Hon. Wm. Mcllougatl, who commenced by assuring the House that he had tor some Sears eiven attention to the sulject, and he was satisfied that the boumbary, as settleal by the artitratore, was mate by themelves. He sad that the artitators "asumad" that the Eastem boumary ran to Hudeon's Bay. Wit he, Mr. McDougatl, " dial hot hink dheme was any authority for hat.: He then proceeded to declare that the artitrators "had lound in "scme communications between the Im. "preml Govemmentand their officers in "this country the words, to the houndmy "of Huthon's bay." He further stated that "he had taken oceasion to look into " that point, and becaue satisfied that it "was a mere clerical aror in the conies "of the origimal report of the Attomey"General," and he added that " no one "would use that word boundary in des"cribing the shores of a bay." Now, it might be inferved from such hanguage that Mr. MoDougall was unaware that the expression to which he callerl attention, was used in the prothamation under the Statute of 1791, which certainly could not be properly described as "some communications between the Imperinl Govemment and their officers." Apain, when he heame satistied that this was a clerical error, could he have been aware that, in the commissions to the Earl of Durham in 1838, to Sir John Colborne in the same year, to Mr. Thomson in 1839 , to Lord Sydenham in 1840, to Sir Charles Metcalle
in 1843, to Lords Catheart and Elgin in 1840, the words', "the shore of Hadson's Bay" are invariably userl. Were all these commissions "clerical errors," or is this "a slight circumstance"? It is, however, of no patical importance under existing circumstances, what Mr. McDougall or Mr. Dawson may think of the award. The arbitrators were unanimously of opinion that the worls in the proclamation of November, 1791, which we have quoted already, justified them in declaring the North Eastern boundary as they did declare it. With reference to Mr. MeDougall's criticism of the term "boundary;" it may be remarked that when the Hudson's Bay territories were meant, the in ariable expression used was "boundary of the territory granted to the Merchant Adventurers, ete." The language of the earlier commissions was in strict accordance with that of the prodamation of 1791, but in Lord Durham's, in 183S, the words are, "by a line drawn due North from the heal of the said lake, until it strikes the shore of Hudson's Bay." In Lord Sydenham's the expression is :" until it reaches the shore of Iudson's Bay." No less thatu seven coumissions to successive Governors contain the wom "shore" instead of boundary. One more remark and we close this banch of the suiject. As regards the South Western and North Eastern boundaties, the abitrators found termiti which they considered sutisfictorily es. tablished as the true ones. From the South Western boundary, or the North Western angle of the Lake of the Woods, they bad to find a line to that terra incog mita. the Hudson's Bay territory, which was never delined in any instrument whatever. Agan, they had to find a line from the North Eastern boundary, which would include all the teritory to the sonthward and westward as far west as the Lake of the Woods, and which did not belong to the Ludson's Bay Company. The termini to the North East and South West being estahished, we should like Mr. MeDougall or Mr. Dawson to define a more correct boundary line than the one awarded, but in truth, all the objections are founded on a difference of opinion as to the disputed points which the arbitators were appointed to determine, and which they did determine according to strict justice.
ooNCLUDLNG REMARES.
The more the subject is discussed, the clearer will it be mude to appear that the extreme pretensions of the Hurlson's Bay Company, as was well said by Mr. McD. Dawson, never had any "earthly authority except themselves," and this was the unanimous opinion of Canadian statesmen and jurists in late years, until the Hudson's

Bay territory was acquired by the Dominion, when jerlousy of Ontario was allowed to influence the opinions of our statesmen. When the negotiations between the Governments ol the Dominion and Ontario commenced in 1572, the former at once adopted the very boundary which only three years before the same Government, represented by Sir George Cartier anl Mr. Mactougall, had dechared to be imadmissible, and, after a protracted correspondente, it was found necessary to resort to a conventional line. It was at one time proposed to refer the mater to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, and tho opinion of Sir Richard Bethell and Sir Henry Keating was taken as to whether the Crown "could lawfully and constitutionally raise for legal decision" certain questions inclucling the extent of the territorial claim. The opinion given was that the decision of the Committee of the Privy Council would not have any eflect as a binding jadicial determmation, although the questions at issue might be made the sulyect of a quasi-judicial inquiry. It is hoped that the foregoing statement may at least aid those who take an interest in a question, which is deemed very perplexing in arriving at a satistattory conclasion.

TIE Late TUN. I. L HULTON, wir.P.
No language that we could employ would convey the faintest iden of the gloom which pervaled the inhabitants of Montreal when they were startled with the announcement of the sudden death of their much.efteemed fellow-citizen, Luther Hamilton Hulton. Having become a resident of Montrealit an early age, and having been thoroughly identified with it from long residence, from having been its representative in Parliament, and from having formed here the strongest domestic and social ties, our citizens cannot but feel the loss of Mr. Holton in a special manner, but it camot be depied that the blow is one that has been infleted on the whole Dominion. The tribute paid to the virtues of the deceased statesman by members of the Ilouse of Commons of all political parties affords conclusive proof of the high estimation in which he was held. To him, indeed, the well known description of the Roman poet is most applicable :-

## Integer vita scelerisque purus.

A reference to Mr . Holton's public career would be a history of Canada from the period of its emancipation from the thraldom of irresponsible Govermment, up to the present day. Born in 1817 he had barely completed his twentieth year when
the rebellion broke out, and cluring the few following years we are not aware that he took any active part in public affilis. In 1S43 on the occasion of the resignation of the Ministers under Lord Metcalfe, Mre Ifolton, who had by that time become a jumior partner in the forwarling house of Hooker, Henderson \& Co., became an antive member of the Montreal Reform party, and supported the candidature of Mr. Drummond, who was its stablard beaver. He continued to take a warm interest in public afiairs, while his friends were fighting for their principles in opposition, and subsequently during the stormy period of 3849 , when Montreal was ahoost in a state of civil war. During the few years that followed, the old Reform party became disorganized both in Lower and Upper Canada, and the Hincks. Morin administration was defeated in 1854, when Mr. Holton was first elected to Parliament by a majority composed of Conservatives and of Liberals from Lower and Upper Canada. The result was the complete disorganization of the old Reform party. Itsleaders in Lower Camada, Messrs. Morin, Taché, Drammond, Chanvear and others, conlesced with the Conservatives from Upper Canadi, and were joinen by a considerable number of the old Reform party, while others, including Dr. Rolph, LIon. James Morris, and Hon. W. H. Merritt, joined the purty leal by Mr. Brown and Mr. Sanfieht Macdonald. Mr. Holton had from his entrance into Parliament attached himself to Mr. Dorion, now Chief Justice Sir A. A. Dorion, and was a prominent leader of the Lower Canada section of the Opposition. In course of time the leader of the united Reform party of Upper and Lower Canada was called on to form it government, and in 1858 Mr. Holton was invited to become a member of the Cabinet, which lasted only a few days. IIis party was not at the time in a majority in the House of Assembly, the defeat of the government having been caused by difference of opinion as to the proper place for the capital. In 1963, the Liberal party was in a position to assume office, but it was only after its reconstruction in IS63, on the retirement of Mr. Sicotte, that Mr. Holton joined it as Minister of Finance, which he held until the break up of the government in 1864, since which time he has been a devoted member of the liberal party, trusted implicitly by those who shared with him the responsibilities of leadership, and distinguished by his un. selfishness.
The funeral of the deceased statesman took place on Wednesday, and seldom has such a manifestation of regard for a public
man been exhibited. The immense procession was headed by the clergy and jurleges, and among the moumens, besides the near relatives aind intimate friends of the deceased, were the Speaker and about 80 members of the House of Commons of both political parties, the Administration being represented by three of its members, also Members of the Quebec Administration and of the Assembly, delegations from Chateaugaay, Huntingdon and Beauharnois, the Mayor and Corporation, the Board of Trade, the various mational societies, and an immense number of citizens. The pall-beturers were ten in number: the Ifonombles Chief Justice Sir A. A. Dorion, Sir A.'T. Gault, Sir F. Hincks, Messrs. Mackenzie, Mlake and Huntington, and Messrs. T. Workman, Cramp, Joseph Mackay and N. B. Corse. The funeral semiees at the American Presbyterian Churd were conducted by the Revs. Dr. Cominer, Bames, Wells and Stevenson. Dr. Cordner delivered the address, which was listened to with marked attention. A large number of the mourners attended the remains to the cemetery, and saw them consigned to the vault. It will he long before society recovers from the blow inflicted on it by the death of the truly patriotic statesman who is the subject of this notice.

We ate lead to touts on this noint as we are informed that some of the Shareholders have the impression that the Compmy has censed to exist, aml that the husiness has been transferted to the $A$ erricalthrad lasurance Company of Watertown. In order therefore that no such misunderstanding shatl exist, we have to remind you that nhthongh the Company censed to transanct Insuranee business in the month of April last, so long as fany liabilities whatever exist, the orgatization of this Compuny must continue. The Re-insumate is atrabsation of a circhanseribed matare between this Company and the Watertown, in no way attecting the existence of the former, nor the liabilites of the Shareholders; but is solely for the purpose of protecting the lolicy holders,
in confomity with the Insurance Net of $187 \%$ (vide 38 Vic. chap. 20 , sec. 15).
The Re-insurance above referred to (the adoption of which you entorsed at the Special General Deeting on the Both April last), lats been carried into effect, but not finally closed as the Memomadum of Agreenent for such Re-insurance provided, and to which we shall presently refer.
In the Report which we ladid before you on the daty above named, we stated that Re-insurance, not exceding a sum of $\$ 31,000,000$, would be effected by the Wittertown for a Premium of $\$ \mathbf{S i}, 500$; such Premium to be regulated in accordance with the amount re-insured, whe-
ther it should prove in the final statement more or less.
The Premium Notes which we have had on Fand we have found to be almost worthless. Any we hive plated in the hands of our Solicitors, whether in Toronto, Montreal or Quebec, the costs have agrgregated as mach or more than the face value of the notes. It was therefore evident that unless they were turned to some better accomi, the loss sustained wond be very serions; and in view of shel diflicaltios arising in their collection, we proviled at the time of the agrement with the Watertown, that all Pulicies on which the Premiam notes were not paid shonlat be considered cancelled hy the Wratertown, in ateordance with the conditions of ont Policies. After callulating how mach these eancelfed folicies wond rednee the re-insurance meminm for amome at risk, we find such reduction will be about $\$ 4,278.57$; naking the preminn to be pmid to the Watertwin, 558,22743 , instead of the sum of 562,500 . Ihis is assuming that they (the Whatertown) will allow us for all policies on which the premimm notes remain mapaid, whether such bulicy has been remoned by the assured to his office or not. By this result we consider the best hiss been done with the premium notes that cond be under such cirenamstances.
As regards the present liabilities of your Company, the 'Treasurer's linancial statement, which will be read to you immediately, gives them in detail, sulfice here to say that they momat in all to not less than Sen, 750,12 .
No expenses fave, or are being inentred except what lave been absolntely necessary for the purposes of winding up the concern in the most conomical as well ats expeditions manner possible. The Oflice statt; with the exception of the Secretary; was disponsed with in the early portion of the year. The Treasurer, Mr. Outhporton of the year. The Tremarer, inc. Cumsince June lasi, in which month Mr. Pennock (one of the Directors) was appointed to look after the collection of the ealls. Your Directers have made overtures to Mr. Melacod Stewat, respecting the breaking of the lease of these premises existing between this Compmy and him; and as the five year lease does not expire until April lath, 18s!, they hope to make a fivomble compromise with him, and racate the premises, and so emable them to rent a small office where the atinits of the Compmy can be administered quite as eflectually as at present. l'he amount reported for tire losies

## GENRRAL MARKETS.

Thumsbay, March 18th, 1880.
The most interesting fenture of the monkts for the week is perhaps the promised return at an eatly day of a normal state of the wheat markets, whereby the grataries of the west may be relieved of their exerssive burden, and commerce between Chicago and Liverpool be freed from insurmonatable speculative obstructions. Another difficulty will, however, immedatelyarise, so firas Montreal shippers are concerned, and indeed is alrendy present in the shape of inadequate railrond facilities and seaboard accommodation. Porthand cannot store the grain that is pressing upon her, and we understand that the Grand Tronk has now on track at that point some 1,000 cars laden with grain which cannot find storage. The dry goods trade is still active, though mather more quiet, owing to the completion of travellers' tonrs, und to the yet limited influx of merebant buyers under the special matesystem now in force. There is no change in the temper of the marke us to priecs, which are firmly mainained. " Hochehagn," "Yalleyfield" and "Stormont" publish new lists which will be found in detnit in our prices current. Hardware continues fairly active, and the reports from travellers highly satisfitetory. Glass is up 15 c . for all deserifltions. The leather market has a better tone in symputhy with New York, and more acllve inquiry is reported for sole. Hides ure down in accordance with genemal anticipations. Wool is very firm and dealings active. The butter and cheese markets are altogether uninteresting, and virtually closed for the senson. Noney is unchanged in rutes; a slightly improved inquiry is reported. Sterling exchange is done at 9 f for 60 -day bills between banks, and $\frac{1}{8}$ to $\frac{1}{}$ above this figure for ordinary demand. The Stock Exchange has again been the scene of a well-sustatined upward movement accompanied by a fair lut not unusual degree of activity. Ihe chatacter of the advance now sterdily pursued thootghout several weeks is unchanged from that last reported; it presents all the fentures of a constant absorption of stocks for investment, and ghond not fail to earry as surance of stability to shareholders. Speculation is commonly an incident and ontgrowth of long continued advances, as it is also of sustained or exceptional movements in any direction, and it :aturds perhaps occasion for surprise that so litule of the venturesome spirit has been developed at this time. It would be quite in aceord with precedent should the movement now in progress suddenly give birti to a sturdy speculative bantling with pronounced bull proclivities, and if the fabric of tade improvement, matred by a general inerense of earnings and decrease in the mamber and extent of insolvencies, be well woven, the contingency surggested becomes a strong probability. The chict' advances for the week are in People's Bank, 4 per eent., Ontario, 4, amd Jacques Cartier, 32. Other bank shares have aduanced almost withont exception but in less proportion. Of the more speculative stocks, Richelien Navigation has gained a litue, and City Gas, changes in which are frequently extreme and not un seldom erratic, has bounded up 5 per cent. The

There is every probability that consuners are willing to pay about this price, and, as reports of the deficit of the worlds crop are still unchallenged, but rather contimed by lapse of time, it would not appear mareasomable that a heabiliy, strong, improving matkel shouid soma advene. The possibility that hare stocks will be thrown upon the market, regarlless of price, is, huwever, a contingeney not to be lost sight of, as it may serve at any moment to hnow the matkets into confusion and turmoil, deterting the most careftll calculations.
