$\$ 50,000$, but some $\$ 27,000$ is locked up in renl estate. Last Spring he claimed to have a surplus of $\$ 47,000$, but bas greatly extended his business since then.

Fhorbnt, general storekeoper, Iberville Que., whose falure we noted in a previons issue was, it apperrs, a victim of misplaced confidence, having endorsed paper for $\$ 1400$ disconnted by the defauler Esinhart, late major of Iberville, and who only recently oblained release from St. Abans jail. Florent's own business liabilities are said to have not excecled $\$ 500$, but, owing to the St. Jenn Bank having pressed for the claim above named, he was compelled to close his store.

Wa. Giesen, the Landon dry goods dealer referred to in last issue, has not yet effected $\pi$ settlement. He was formerly a clerk in the store of Mr: John Beatie, of that city, who retired some eight years ngo. Green lind been promised a partuership at the retirement of Vr. John Beattic, whose brother Thomas, who took over the London business, rehused to grant. Green and another clerk named Wallace formed a partnership, and commenced bosiness, which lasted only $a$ short time, as Mr. John Beatic shortily afterwards started. Mr. Green in the dry goods line, in opposition to Mr. Thos. Beattie. The new renture, however, never becamer great success; Mr. Green had not. sufficient infuence to drave custom from the established houses, and, besides, he is clarged with extravagnat living, etc. The assets consist altogether of stock, which is said to have been run down very mucli; some time ago he sold offalmost everything by auction, and it is thonght there is little, if anything, left for unsecured creditors... THE RIVERS AND STREAMS QUES. TION.
An unusual amount of misrepresentation has been promulgated on the subject of the Ontario Act providing for the use by the public of all rivers and, streams within the Province, and which has been twice disallowed by the Dominion Government. No class of the mixed population of the Dominion is so deeply interested in Provincial autonomy as the French Canadians, and yet one of the leading French organs of the Province of Quebec has not hesitated to join the ranks of those who by a total perversion of facts are endeavoring to sustain the very objectionable course which has been followed by the Dominion Government in regard to this Act. We shall cite the precise words of La Mrinerve, the journal
above referred to. Commenting on a paragraph in the speech of the LieutenantGovernor of Ontario regarding the Rivers and Streams Bill La Minerve states that it was "en présence du fait que sur seize "juges que ont été appelés à donner leur "opinion sur la constitutionalité de ce " bill pas moins de treize ont déclaré "qu'il était inconstitutionel et ont ap"puyć la position prise par le gouverne" ment fédéral."
We shall translate the passage: "In "presence of the fact that out of six" teen judges who have been called to "give their opinion upon the constitu"tionality of that bill, not less than "thirteen have declared that it was un"constitutional, and have supported the "position tuken by the Federal Govern"ment." We have italicized the misrepresentations of La Ninerve. The Richmond Guardian in an article copied without comment by the Montreal Gazette, although the latter journal has never ventured to make it similar assertion editorially, states with reference to the Ontario Streams Bill, the "unconstitu" tionality of which has just been declared "by the unanimous decision of the "Supreme Court, which sustains Sir "John's opinion, and emphatically con"demms Mr Blake's." We are bound in charity to assume that the foregoing remarks have been written owing to an entire misconception of the point at issue, which we shall again explain. The decision of the Supreme Court has no reference whatever to the Ontario Streams Bill. On the contrary it is a complete justification of the necessity of legislation. The original Ontario Act was introduced some tro years ago in consequence of the decision of a judge to the same effect as that recently given by the Supreme Court. The point at issue was the right of a riparian proprietor on a stream not navigable to make improvements on his property, and then to refuse all the pro. prietors above him to make use of those improvements on paying the customary tolls. We do not pretend to state with accuracy the points in controversy, nor is it necessary for our present purpose that we should to so. The facts are in substance that one lumberer on a nonnavigable stream refused to permit another to use the improrements he had made, and for the use of which he had previously levied tolls. We have seen it stated that provocation was given by the party pretending that he had a legal right to use the improvements. We do not pretend to know exactly what occurred, but relief was sought in the Courts of Justice, The first decision, as we have
pointed out, was that the riparian proprietor had the legal right to prevent the public from using his improvements, and it was in consequence of that decision that the Ontario Government brought in a bill not to apply to the particular case in point, but to declare that on every stream in the Province of Ontario, improvements made in order to facilitate the passage of lumber, etc., should be free to the public on the payment of equitable tolls. Meantime the case in litigation was cairred to the Ontario Court of Appeal, and decided in favor of the right to use the inprovements without an act. It was on an appeal from that decision that the Supreme Court recently decided the contrary way. Had its decision been different, there would have been no occasion whatever for the Ontario Act. It is of course open to discussion whether the Ontario Act has made adequate compensation to those who undertake to make such improvements as those which have led to this unfortunate controversy. One thing is clear, viz., that no distinction is made. The Act is general, and of course all persons similarly situated on all other streams would be bound by it. It has not been denied that in such cases expropriation is justifiable, but it would be most incon. venient if the Province was compelled to expropriate in every case in which a proprietor might choose to exercise what we are bound after the late decision to assume are his legal rights. As to the adequacy of the compensation, it surely will not be pretended by La Ninerve that the Dominion Government is a better judge than the Provincial Legislature on that point. The law must either be suffered to stand, and proprietors must be permitted to refuse the public the use of improvements on non-navigable streams, or some mode of compensating such proprietors must be provided by the Legislature. We need not, however, pursue the argument on this head. The subject is clearly one with which it is competent for the Provincial Legislature to deal. The Act is a general one, and it cannot be supposed for a moment that the nembers of a Legislature would deliberately sanction a mode of compensation to proprietors generally with reference to a particular case. Even Legislatures do notalways give satisfaction when dealing with questions more or less affecting private rights. No one would pretend to argue for a moment that the Ontario Streans Bill is as much an interference with private rights as the recent Irish Land Act. And yet the Toronto Mail styles it "an Act to confiscate one "man's property and give it to another
"for political services." We trust that our Quebec contemporaries will perceive that instead of the decision of the Supreme Court being against the Ontario Act, that Act has been passed in consequence of the present state of the law, as declared by the ${ }^{\text {B }}$ Court.

## BANKRUPTCY LEGISLATION.

We called attention in a recent number to an interesting report, made to the New York Chamber of Commerce by Mr. D. C. Robbins on the subject of bankruptcy legislation. We have since had an opportunity of reading two reports made to the convention of the American Bankers Association on the same subject, one by the Hon. C. C. Bonney of Chicago, President of the Illinois State Bar Association, the other by Mr. I. H. Hinchman, President of the Manufacturers and Merchents Bank of Detroit. Mr. Bonney commenced his address by stating that the necessity of a National Bankruptcy law is almost universally admitted, and that the practical question is not, whether we shall have a bankruptey law, but what the provisions of the law shall be. He thinks that there will be a concurrence of opinion among business men that the proceedings in cases of bankrupey should be "short, sharp and decisive." The law should neither be so easy as to encourage carelessness or fraud, nor, on the other hand, should it be so stringent and severe as to drive embarrassed debtors to reckless and desperate expedients. It should be an honest law, and should encourage fair dealing. Mr. Bonney is of opinion that the bill now before the Senate of the United States, and which, with some slight modification, was approved of by Mr. Robbins, would be the best solution of a very difficult problem. The truth is that no creditor likes to receive less than 100 cents in the dollar, and it is only after the bitter experience of the absence of any law to secure the equitable distribution of insolvent estates that creditors are forced to admit that an insolvent law of some kind is absolutely necessary. Mr. Bonney admits that the bankruptcy laws which have existed have not given satis. faction and such beyond doubt is the case in Canada. He maintains that the United States system of equity has been conducied under a few rules prescribed by the Supreme Court of the nation. These rules are plain and simple, and the prac. tice of the court and the jurisdiction and powers of its officers are well understood. Mr. Bonney maintains that the equity system has never been tried in bankruptcy cases, and he thinks that a full and fair trial of the experiment should be given
without hesitation. He appended to his address a copy of the bill pending in the Senate of the United States and reported from the judiciary committee.
Mr. Hinchmat commenced his address by remarking that bankruptey is one of the most clifficult questions that business men have to consider, or Congress to legislate upon, He said that there was a great difference of opinion as to the proper provisions of a bankruptey law, or as to the necessity for it, "save only after" a panic or a great financial crisis." Mr. Hinchman seems to concur in opiaion with Mr. Bonney and Mr. Robbins that the bankraptcy jurisdiction should be exercised by the Suprene Court, but he would only sanction such a law at times of commercial panic. The remarked, and doubtless very correctly, that the history of bankrupt laws shows them to have been very unjust, and very unsatisfactory, subjecting both debtor and creditor to great unnecessary loss. Mr. Hinchman entered largely into details of the losses consequent, as he pat it, on the bankrupt laws, but, as might be more correctly stated, by the bankruptcies themselves. He entered at some length into the losses sustained while the last bankrupt laws were in force, but he did not pretend to argue that the failures would not have occurred had no such laws been in force. On the contrary, he gave a list of the fallures daring a series of years, which is very interesting, and which is, in our opinion, cal. culated to disabuse the public on a point on which there lias been no little mis. conception. No effort has been spared to persuade the Canadian people that the depression which prevailed subsequent to the year 1873 might have been prevented by the adoption of $a$ higher tariftNow it cannot be denied that in the United Stintes there was no lack of protection to clomestic manufactures, and it is therefore important to direct attention to the experience of that comntry during the disastrous years from 1573 to 18 is, Mr. Minchman submitted a table showing the number of frilures in the United States, and the amount of liabilities dur. ing a series of years. In the live years from 1862 to 1866 inclusive, the arerage ammal failures were 940 , with liabilities $\$ 22,181,180$; in the live years from 1867 to 1871, the number was 2729 , wihh liabilities $\$ 81,781,000$; from 1872 to 1876 , the number was 6382 , and amount 8179 ,382,200 ; from 1577 to 1881 , the hast year furnished, the number was 7004 , and amount $\$ 134,022,010$. It is desirable to point ont that the last five years include three from 1579 to 18S1, when the reaction had taken place, and it is there-
fore proper to divide them. The average failures in 1877 and 1878 were 9675 , with liabilities of $\$ 212,526,534$; while in the three years from 1879 to IS81, the average was in number 3105 and amount $\$ 81,685,601$. This last arerage is not materially different either in number or amount from the failures during the five years from 1867 to 1871 . The above figures should couvince every intelligent enquirer after truth that no system of protection will be a safeguard against commercial tiepres. sion. On the main question, the only difference between the two gentlemen who treated the bankuptcy question before the Bankers Convention is that one holds that legislation of a permanent character is absolutely necessary, and that it shonld be of a very different character from what has been in force in times past, as well in Great Britain and the United States as in Canada; while the other admits the necessity of such legislation on special occasions, and is inclined to concur in its being entrusted to the Courts of Justice to control the proceedings.

## THE NEW QUARTERLS.

However widely we were compelled to diter with the Bystander on a great number of public questions, we shared in the general regret felt at its temporary sus. pension, and are therefore gratified to find that it will be continned as a quar terly review of "Current Events, Canadian and General." 'The reason assigned for its issue as a quarterly is that "a monthly issue was found too constant a tie and too frequent an interruption of other work." 'Ihe quantity of matter will be considerably reduced, six of the old monthly numbers containing as many pages as the four quarterly issues. The opportunity has been taken to mise the price nearly 70 per cent., which we feel assared will be generally approved of, as the old price of 10 cents for from 50 to 60 pages of original matter was much too low. The price of the quarterly is 25 cents for 78 pages. There are about 40 different subjects treated in the first number under live general heads, via, "The Dominion, including Ontario and Quebec," "The United States," "England," "Europe:" and "Thought and Opinion." "The opinions of the Bystander on leading questions are familiar to our, readers, and it is announced on the first page that " he has no new professions to make." He is "more than ever ouposed to party government," and "he deprecates the perpetuation of dependency." In both cases he announces that "he takes things as they are," adding that he "only protests against
"the waste of the people's "earnings in a "hopeless conflict with the ordinances of "nature." The foregoing expression is rather vague, but, judging from former forecasts, we infer that the "waste" against which the protest is made, is public expenditure on Canadian works that, in the event of amexation being our destiny, might be dispensed with.

The topics in the Bystrinder, in which we feel specially interested, are of course those relating to commercial matters. As might be expected from one who is strongly opposed to party connection, both the Govermment and the Opposition are freely censured, but especially the former. With regard to the Opposition it is said that "thry had changed their "Ieader, they had not changerl their "editor, and the editor crossed the policy. "of the leader on the main question in "the decisive hour." We confess to being mystified by the above statement, which is followed by another equally mysterious, " nor was the policy of the leader, well clefined. It is not in commercial questions that he is mostiat home." It seems that the Globe, which must be the organ referred to, crossed a policy which was not well defined, the leader not being at home in commercial questions. Without pretending to have followed very closely the speeches of the leader or the articles in the Globe and other organs of the Opposition, we have been under the impression that there has been no material difference of opinion between them. They have not pretended to be free traders in the strict acceptation of the term, but have assailed particular items in the tariff, notably coal, in cletail. We doubt whether there has been any difference of opinion between Mr. Blake and the Clobe that would justify the assertion that the latter croosed the policy of the former. The hadebeen moreover under the impression that Mr. Blake had devoted a great deal of attention to commercial questions.

The Bystander seeus clisappointed at the extent to which the protective policy has been carried. The cry in 1878 was for "adjustment," but now they have "'openly declared for protection." We confess that we are surprised to find any one who doubted in 1878 that if the Conservatives were successful, the poliey would be protection to home industries. The Bystander, however, is not very consistent. His conviction is not that " of a purist in Free Trade," but of one "who takes the rule of "political economy to be expediency in "the broadest sense of the term, en"bracing the future as well as the present, "sanctioning the special fostering of in-
"fant industries if it can be profitably "done." Now we apprehend that there are few protectionists who would not accept the above described concession as ample for a guide for the Finance ainister; who, we venture to affirm, would maintain that he had been guided precisely.by the principle laid down above. The Bystander thinks that Free Trade would be the greatest of blessings if possible, but holds that it is impossible, because "every nation is practically compelled to raise revenue by customs," and each will give "its own industries all the advantage in its power." He proceeds: "Jngland has "her tarifi, and udjusts it to her own cir"cumstances like the rest." This plain inference is that Engiand protects her own industries like the rest, and yet it is notorious that such is not the fact. England has long carried out consistently the policy of imposing a countervailing excise duty on all articles on which there are import duties. Spirits are, we believe, the only article manufactured in the United Finglom? and likewise imported, and the excise duty is the same as the customs.

It is desirable that it should be clearly understood that it is quite possible lo levy customs duties under a free trade system. The obstacle is chat Canadian public opinion is against free trade, and those who are called free traders in Canada are favorable to "incidental protection" as it is termed. 'the difference between the two parties is merely as to the extent to which protection should be carried. The Bystunder is, as ofold, in favor of commercial union; he states that "the commer"cial interests of the people at large are "over-pidden by those of a political class, "which has a special interest in the "present system, and fancies that com"mercial union would bring political union "in its train. Commercial union means a common tariff, a visionary scheme of the Bystander, wholly impracticable in the opinion of the best United States authorities. We doubt much whether the Bystander believes that commercial union would not of necessity bring political union in its train. The next sentence we own that we wholly fail to compreherd. It is as follows:-"Some of these very men have "done their best to weaken by partial "reciprocity the bulwark, the removal of "which by complete reciprocity they "camot contemplate withont transports "of alarm." We were not avare that any "partial reciprocity" was in force. Tho inconsistency of the Bystander on the protective system is most glaring. We are told in one place that " the imposition "of taxes not for the purpose of revenue "but for the purpose of excluding foreign
"goods and enabling the home manufae"turer to sell dear has been proved by "calamitous experience, and is pronounced "by every independent authority to be "the most costly and the most objection"able of all ways of euriching a few at the "expense of the people." This of course is just what the Globe is, constantly asserting; but on the same paige of the Bystander we find: "To adapt the Canadian tariff "to the requirements of Canada was right, "it was reght to raise the sum required " by increased taxation, insteud of continu"ing the futally seductive policy of lo:nes." Now we must repudiate on bebalf of one and all of the Finance Ministers of Canada the imputation that any one of them ever adopted as a policy the raising of loans to meet current expenditure. It will be found that since conferleration the revenue has been amply sufficient to meet all the expenditure, including a sinking fund for the redemption of the debt. The deficiencies during three years of severe depression were small when compared with the aggregate amounts of surplus in the years preceding and subsequent to depression. It is evident from other passages that the Bystander is well aware that the prosperity which the country has recently enjoyed has been shared by other countries both under free trade and protectionist tariffs, and that the depression which was felt in Canadia was general in the United' States during the same period, notwithstanding the very high protectire taniff which swas in force. He refers to "The general revival of tiade in which Canada has shared." Our observations on this branch of the review have extended to such a length that we must postpone our notice of some other topics of interest.

## MOVETENT OF GOID.

It appears that shipments of gold to New York have been made, though on a small scale, from England, and, owing to the very moderate reserve of the Bank of England, some apprehension is felt as to the consequence of further demands. It is believed that there is some ground for apprehenting an increase in the bank rate of interest, which would seriously disorganize trade. As to the cause of the threatened tightness in the money market, it must be attributed to the enormous expenditure of capital in the construction of railways. It is estimated that daring the current year twelve thousand miles of new railways have been constructed in the United States. In view of the complainte made of the scarcity of gold in England, and the disastrous consequences likely to follow a stringent money market, it is inconceivable that
her statesmen should neglect to adopt measures to economize the use of gold. It was well said by the Inte Mr. Bugehot that the practical effect of requiring the Scotch and Trisi banks to hold gold in. stead of Bank of England notes, which are not a legal tender in those parts of the United Kingdom was taking gold from the point where it was wanted and placing it where it is not requived. "Me Scotch and frish banks are compelled to bold gold for all issues exceerling an amount fixed by law. Then again the removal of the prohibition to issue fl notes in Eng . land would bring many millions of gold into the Bank of England, which is now distributed over the country. To people out of England it seems the height of absurdity to permit joint stock banks in Scotland and Ireland to issue $\varepsilon L$ notes and to prohibit the Bank of England, whose issues are all secured, partly by gold, and partly by nationalsecurity, from making such issues. If, by the adoption of such simple measures, the stock of gold in the Issue department of the Bank could be increased by fifteen millions of pounds, which is by no means an exaggerated estimate, there could be no objection to its being empowered by law to make loans to the discount department on the deposit of national securities at all times when the rate of interest exceeded 6 per cent. The knowledge that such relief was always obtainable would prevent that hoarding by capitalists which has always been the chief cause of panics in the money market.

## THE BUSINESS TAX.

It is stated that there are no less than four hundred actions taken by the Gov* ernment of the Province of Quebec against various incorporated companies, and that the said Government is determined not to accept a decision on a test case but to make the proceedings as vexatious as pos sible. We doubt if any similar instance of oppression can be cited in modem history. We have already entered very fully into the merits of this tax, but we think it may be desirable to call attention to the plea in the suits against the Ontario Bank, for which we are indebted to our evening contemporary, the Stom. The case is that of the Ontario Bank, and it is defended by Messrs. Abbott, Tait \& Abbotts. The case of the banks generally is evon stronger than is wist of an ordinary incorporated company. The Local Legislalure is emporered to rase a revenue by direct taxation within the Province for provincial purposes. The Ontario Bunk carries on its business under a Doninion Charter, its head oftice is located in the Province of

Ontario, and only about one-third of its shareholders reside within the Province of Quebec, where not more than one-third of its capital is employed; and yet those sharelohlders residing in Ingland, Scotland, the United States, Ontario and elsewhere, are taxed for local objects in the Province of Quebec. Surely, apart altoge. ther from the constitutional question, the vexatious proceedings of the Quebec Government present a much stronger case for the interference of the Dominion Government by the exercise of the veto than the Ontario Rivers and Streams Bill. The insurance companies applied to the Dominion Government to be heard by counsel against the Quebec Bill, but their application was refused, and no action has been taken on their petition for disallowance. We observe that the costs in the suits pending, and which it is said will all be carried to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, are estimated at $\$ 600$, 000 . There will be a heavy responsibility on both the Quebec and Dominion Governments for these harassing proceedings, which are generally looked on as agges. sive on the part of tihe French Canadians on the British population. It was publicly avowed by one of the Ministers that the object of the tax was to relieve the owners of real property in the Province and to make the business people pay the required tax.

## HORAIIO A. NELSON.

Montreal has to deplore the loss of another of its old and highly esteemed cilizens in Mr. II. A. Nelson, who expired at his residence, Mountain Villa, after ashortilness, on Sunday, the 24 th inst., in the 67 th year of his age. Mr. Nelson was born in Nrw Hampshire, U.S., but took up his residence in Cnnada upwards of forty jears ago, and carried on a- successful business, tirst in 1844, in partucrship with Mr. Isane Buters, but laterly, with his sons. On the retirement of Mr, Butters in 18G1, Mr. Nelson formed a co-jatinership with Mr. A. S. Wood, under the siyle of Nelson d Wood. A dissolution by limitation took place in 1866, when the eldest son, Mr. Albert D. Nelson, was admitted to a parmership under the name of Nelson, Wood \& Co. The funcual which took place jesterday was attended by a large concourse of prominent cilizens, many of whom had only a few short months before gathered at the same mansion to pay their last respects to the remains of her who had been his true helpmeet and companion through life.

When I remind you that iu 1880 we added $\mathbf{t i 2} 4,000$ to that necollat, that last year we radded $\pm 19,000$, and that during the present year we have increased the dividend from 5 to 6 per cent., at the same time feeling confident that we may be able still further to increase our reserve fund, I think you will agree with me that our business has been a very satisfinctory one and shows stendy progress.

Weare informed by the Treasury, unoflicinlly, that some braks have not made nuy response to the model charter and the letier which accompanied it in the curly part of this jear ; but we are also in hopes that this will be remedied, and that the Treasury will soon also be in possession of the views of all the chartered branss who will yltimately be affected hy the model chater. ## MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

## Thersday, 2Sth Dec., 1882.

The dulness in wholesale trade incident to the Xmas holidiys reached the climax this week, and the year closes with marked quietude in nearly all departments, but with good prospeets generally for the opening of new year. Merchants are buss balancing their books, to see how they stand, and preparations for the renewed netivity usunlly experienced in January sem to be receiving the largest share of altention. Dry goods, as usual at this period, are especially dull, but the buyers in the English markets are homeward bound, and prospeets for a satisfactory Spring trade are considered failly good. The suow roads in Eastern Ontario and this Province continue fairly good, but in Tloronto and some other Westerin centres there lias been no sleighing for $n$ week, and this, to gether with the midd weathor, has interfered with retail business in henvy winter goods; accordingly, remittances this',week have not been, on the whole, as good as they might have been. Money is readily obtnined at the banks, on good coliaterals at 7 to $7 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent., as to mame and date, and stock loans are obtaimble at 7 per cent. at bank on call ; between brokers the rates on eall and short time are 6 to G2. In Sterling Exchange there has been lithe business doing; sisty-day bills between banks negotinted at 108咟, demand drafts at $109 \frac{5}{3}$, and over the counter the rale is $108^{\frac{3}{4}}$. Drafts on New York sold at $\frac{1}{3}$ to ty prom. The stock market has continued quiet, under the holiday influences, the week lonving been greatly broken by adjoumments for Xmas and to allow the members of the Bond to attend thefuneral of Sir Hugl Allan. There bas been an ovidentimprovement in the narket the last two days, however, values being considerably stronger for wost securities ongthe list. Bank of Montreal sold up to $199 \frac{1}{2}$ to-day, with buyers closing at that figure, and 200 asked, Commerce adranced $1 \frac{t}{2}$ per cent todday, and Merchants 1. Ontario fell of 2 per cent. Richelieu and Oity Gas also suffered a fractional decline. The

Nortliwest Land Co. was quoted at 47s 6d today. See table of quotations on another page. Our usual nnuual table of the highest and lowest values of stocks in this market during the year will most probably appear in the nert issue.

Boots and Suors. - Few houses have yet sent out representatives with samples of spring goods; indeed, owing to the lock-out trouble with the lasters, nearly all the manafacturers linve got greatly behind with their orders for spring work, but while the "striking" lasters are nearly all holding out still against the agreement they were asked to sign, their places are being rapidly filled by new men, who up to the present have mostly worked in other departments. The lasting of a shoe does not require much skill, manufacturers state, and can be learned in a couplo of weeks. There are oniy 350 to 400 lasters in Montreal, and as new ones can be thus easily acquived, the old ones seem likely to be supplanted if they do not return to work on the manufacturers terms, viz, that they shall not be interfered with by the Union in the exercise of their right to employ whom they please in the factories. The practieal result then witl he the employment in future of girls upon fine "lasting" work, and the introduction of machinery for heavy work. A committee lias been appointed by the Manufacturers' Association to inspect certain macloines now in use in the States, enrly in January next. Payments generally continue good.
Dix Goobs.-Tbe usual Xmas holiday lull pevails. The travellers are all at home, they having found it useless to attempt sales to the country merchants this week. Stock-taking and balancing books keep the staff in several houses still engaged, and in some otbers the firm's travellers and heads of departments wero busily employed marking samples of new goods, and preparing generally for the spring campaiga to be entered upon next montla. Retril trade in both city and country is reported good, and payments continue fairly satisfactory.

Dainy Phoduce-There has been little business done here in butter during the week; stocks of all kiuds are believed to be only modernte, and the bulk of the supply is held by one firm, who will probably export it to Great Britain or the States. The offerings therefore, in this market are quite light, and prices rule firm. A lot of about 40 packages common summer grade was sold yesterday at 19 c for the local trade, and a lot of rolls in cases at 21c. Advices from Morrisburg state that orders have been received there direct from Liverpool for fine butter, at prices which may probably lead to further business. The firm tone of the cheese market noted last week has been sustained, but business las been confined to supplying the local trade. Fancy September make is not to be had at under 13c. In New York holders of fine and fancy stock of butter and cheese are very confident of the situation, and are only willing to negotiate on a basis of extreme price, the accumulation being sufficiently well under control. Buyers, however, Ggure closely to actual mants and positive orders.

Groceries.-The business doing in the wholesale grocery line is, as usunl at this season, moderate, valucs of goods may be called very little altered for chief staples. Teas.-There is no pressure of stocks of desirable Japans in chief markets, and from Japan intimatioif comes confirming the report that attractive Teas with value are coming forward very slowly. Prices are practically unchanged and firm for good Teas. The removal of United States duty of 10 per cent as stated to come in force there ist Janumy opens the door for shipment to United States, und it is expected that some Teas lying here will go forward. Sugars. - A steady ard conchanged market for all kinds-not much business to report.

Molasses dull but with quetations that may be repented from last week. Syrups also without change. Rice keeps at former values. Ooffees. - A tirmer tone and some advance in United Slates markets. Bottom in this article seems to have been fairly reached, and some reaction has set in. Not for many years has the lovers of geutine Ooffees a nore faromble opportunity of getting supplias low. Spices.-Pepp 'r continues ligh, possibly slightly relaxed. White Pepper scarce. Other Spices quict. Irruits.Valentias rather firmer and slightly higher. Good quality held 78 c on hervy lots up to $8 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$; some extra held 8 de to $9 j_{2} \mathrm{c}$. Malaga Layers continue scarce. Loose Muscatels dull. London Lajers in somo request. Currants, Sultanas, Figs, Prunes quiet. Almonds a little higher abroad, also Faluuts. Filberts dull. Brazil nuts very high at all points.

Flour and Gram.-The English whate markets have assumed a boliday aspect since our last report, but, while little business has been done, the tone of prices has continued. steady. Cnble advices to-day report the markets quiet but firm. The amount of brendistuffs on passage to the continent show a decrease of 40,000 qrs. wheat and imports in the United Kingdom for the week show an increase of 05,000 qrs. wheat, and 20,000 qus. corn, as compared with corresponding week last'year. The Western wheat markets are telegraphed about stendy to-day at: yesterday's closing fignres. The local breadstuffs market has been devoid of life or interest all week, the only business transpiring being in small lots for the local trade. The tendency in values for four is downward, as the market rules ensy, but for grain there is no change to note from last week.

Drugs and Cimmionls.-Tbe demand for goods in this line continues extremely light, and not much improvement is expected until towards the end of January. Stocks of goods so far as can be ascertained are pretty full, with the exception of Sal Soda, the stock of which is rather light; the price is therefore $\pi$ litule higher. The English market remains dull but firm. For forward delivery and also for yearly contracts, there is more enquiry ; but so far there has been little actual business. Shipment of chemicals fiom Iiverpool to Cnauda for November, 1882 :--345 tons, against 608 tons for Nor., 1881.

Funs--Olferings have increased somew hat, but the local demand has been pretty fully supplicd, and the bulk of stock now coming to market will have to be exported; hence the trade look for lower prices. Last week's figures are still maintained, however, as follows: Mink, $\$ 1$; red fox, $\$ 1.20$; to $\$ 1.25$ murten, $\$ 1$; otter, $\$ 8$ to $\$ 10$; betver, $\$ 2$ to $\$ 2.50$ per 1 ib skunk, 60 c to $\$ 1$; bear, $\$ 8$ to $\$ 10$ for large and $\$ 4$ to $\$ 5$ for small ; lynx, $\$ 2$ to $\$ 2.50$.

Charconl being now quoted at sin it to S6, and I. C. coke at S. 8.5 to S5. Cable advices from Liverpool report that market stenly, with a genemal disinclimation on the part of makers to contmet for forward delivery. Nothing loing in Canado l'hates, the senson being over, and prices rule nominal. Lombon eabtes this week qutote Ingot Fin limer, at 493 los for tine foreign, and 207 for Lamband Flager ; here holders ask 2tc, Goper remains stendyat 10de to 30c for janadim, anal Lead continues dull and unchanged. In Bar lron the marke contintues lifeless; a few car lots of ten tons each of Summerlee and Gartshertio bure been placed at very full ligures, viz., S27, and similar sized jots of Eglinton have been sold at siz.50. Fon forward lelivery lower figrures wonld certainly be necepted, hut business is nimost entirely contiverd to the mesent wants of small consumers. The statistical position of the home murket is considered firomble, slocks in store showing a considemble deerense, and the shipments an increase as compared with those of a year ago. The present stocks of pig iron at United Stutes ports are only t,000 tons, one-thind of the quantity at like date hast vear. Warmans are cabled stendy, having advanced to 50 s , nt which figure the market elosed steady.
Hides and Skiss,-No change to note in the general fentures of the market. Receipts of mative hides during the werk have shomn a slight falling otr, "s nisul at this period, and the demsend from taners has also been less active if anything. Prices are melnaged for both foreigen and domestic hidex, as also for sheepskins, which rule quiet and steady. Western States hides, we learn since writing the above, are easier and to to sic lower, with Enles of No. 1 Buff ai $9 \dot{1} \mathrm{c}$, and No. 2 at 8c. Secoud steers' hides quoted at 10c to 101 a , and dry salted western at 16 c for No. 1 aud 14 c for No. 3.

Itanmer.-Not much business doing for the rensons given iu late reports, nor is trade expected to become active until the difficulties in the shoe trade are fully settled. The prospects, howerer, are considered good, for the trade is believed to be on the whole in a sounder and more henlahy condition if anything than before the shoe lasters struck work. Had the manufacturers been able to continue they would most probably hare turned ont a large proportion of their orders by this time, and goods shipped in February and March, dated lst April or Any, might have been forced upon unwilling or nuprepared buyers, to the disadrantuge possibly of all concerned. Again, the stoppuge of the Jasters has afforded a good test of the financin ubility of the shoe and leather tade generally; of conse it were dangerous to foremst the future, but the fer small failures that have occurred in the shoe trade recently hare in wo way affected the renema condition of trade, and were generally discounted months ago. A few small sales of buff at i4le to 15 c , und of pebbled at 132 c to 14e have been reported.

Luyban.-Trade has fallen off, and little will be done for several weeks. Work is progresslug in the woods; the ronds in the bush are not very good for want of rain to fill the swamps and make a smooth, hard bottom; the light snow cuts throngh in a few days leaving bare roads. There are many enquiries for Ash lumber at higher prices, and other kiads of himber are in tair demand.
Ons.-Them is really nothing of interest to report. No round lot transactions hare transpired, and in the absence of a quotnble demand, Galues remain unchanged for all kinds. The supply of Steam refined seal, as preriously stated, is almost entirely in the hands of one firm, who are said to be holding for 95 s per Imp. gal. Latest sales reported were at 90 c for round lots.

Provishoxs.-In Liverpool yesterday lard advanced Gd and bacon declined Gd. In Chicago pork was rather easier, and closed $12 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$ per brl. lower than on Tuesday; lard was also weak, closing the to lue per 100 lbs. lower. The hog market opened and contimed stendy, With estimated receipls 34,000 and shipments 1,300; Tuesiay's ollicial receipts were 10,414 , The Western markels genemily during the week have ruled firm but steady. This market has been very quiet, and likely to continue so for another week; business sems to be confined to filling small country orders at Sel.50 to S.2 for Western or Camada ifess pork, and 140 to $14 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{e}$ for Fairbanks' lard and 133 c for Camada do.; the demand for lord is reported especially slow. Dressed hogs quiet and firm at $\$ 8.25^{\circ}$ to $\$ 8.50$ for car load lots, ania are retailing at SS.75. The prices asked at points of production are equivalent to $\$ 8.55$, lad down here. A few ents have been purchased in the West this week by a Quebec buyer, and a large number have heen bought up for the cut-meat trade for Wimnipeg accomet. It is believed by some prominent men in tho trade that the packing of Canadian pork wil! be small this season, as there seems to be little chance of the mice of hags being low. enongh to whrant any catensive packing. It is therefore expected that Western mess pork will chiefly supply the demand here daring the coming senson. It is moreorer generalls conceded ibat there is not nearly as many Canadian hogs cit to come formard this season as in previous years. Receipts of agys for the week have been fairly large, but the demand only moderate, and narket rules quiet at 25 c to 30 c , as 10 qunatity and guality. Uonsiderable quantities of limed eggs are understood to be lield in the combtry, hence this market rules lifeless, sales being confiued to supplying immediate requirements.

Pancs.-For goods in this line there is little, demand, as usual at this period, and prices romain nominal and unchanged.
Poularr.-Market has been less active the past week, bot quotations rule steady; at 10 c to 12 c for turkeys, $8 c$ to 10 c for geese and chickens, and 9c to 11c for ducks. In gane, venison is quoted at Sc per lh, for ordinary culs, and 10 c to lle for saddles; and partridges at S0c to s5c per brace. A choice case of turkeys whe sold yesterday at 12 de , but this kind of stock continues scarce and in demand.

Wool.-As usual during Nmas holidays, the demand for both foreign and domestic wool bas been reyy limited, and the outlook is rather dall. No notewortly transactions have occurred in this market during the week, and values remain as previousls quoted.

The past week has been quiet. Trade was dull, except in those particular branches in which meats and poultry and choice and fancy aricles are found. Produce during the past days of this week has been nearly nominal. It was yot expected that busivess in flour and grain rould be brisk. Provisions are also.rery quiet. Meats nud lard are easy; cheese is steady; and butter and eggs are steady also, but there is not much movement. Drugs hare been quiet. Hardware is not moring but in light orders. Boots and shoes have been slightly checked by the holidars and the soft weather. Groceries are also rery quiet. In all these trades stock-taking has been about concluded. Generally the operation bas proved that the business of the past six months has been better and more profitable than in the period similar in 1881. Dry goods are dull. The balanse of
opinion just now is against buying nny beavy groods; and the market for spring goods has not opened yet. The present week will be probably the quietest that we have known the stock market has been usually active in transactions, but prices bare been declining, and the market is decidedly reak. This observation is mude of bank stocks. Other securities, lomn companies and other stocks have been extremely quict, and nominal values are nearly unchanged. In bank stocks Montreal was weak. Ontario active but remained steady. Toronto was steadr, with few sales. Merchants' quiet and weak. Commerce was active and steads. Imperial inactive with slight change. Federal active and lower: Dominion quicler than for some time, but prices are steady. Standard was moderately active and prices steady. Canada Permanent sold 140 shares at $230 \frac{2}{4}$ and $232 \pm$ cx-div: London and Camadian sold 2,000 at 133 ; and Farmers' Lonn sold a few shares at 125. The moner market is unchanged. The reports from banks are ratious. With some, payments on notes are fair; in other cases there are complaints. Rates on eall loans are $7 \frac{1}{2}$ to 8 per cent. Good commercial paper is discounted at 7 per cent. Drafts on New York are at $\frac{3}{6}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ between banks.

Fuel.-Prices are weaker. Supplies here are large. The outlook at the mines warrants the belief that prices will be lower. Rate for all antbracite general at $\$ 6.50$; No. 2 store is sold in some jards at $\$ 5.50$. Wood is $\$ 5.50$ to $\$ 6$ per cord.

Lire Stock Trade.-The markets here bare become completely demoralized. After the butchers bad in their Christmas supply there has been a complete stoppage. At the two last market days there were only a fer ordinary cattle and other beasts. All the cattle that were in condjition for the narket were brought in for the Chtistmas market. unchanged, selling at $\$ 1.20$ for green, and 70 c to $\$ 1$ for country lots.
Fhoun and Meal.-The manket for flour bas been very quiet. There have been several gales of car lots of inspected extra at S4.15. Superior extras beld at $\$ 4.25$ for choice brands. Bags were offered yesterday at $\$ 1.95$, with a bid of S1.00. It is not thought that prices, or business, will improve for some time to come. There are now reported 125 barrels in store at the Norther:n sheds. Oatmeal is easy; a car lot sold at \$4.70 on the track, and the quotation is $\$ 4.70$ to $\$ 4.85$. Cornmeal is unchanged selling in small lots nt S4. Bran is quoted at $\$ 12.50$ n ton, with sales fow.

Wheat.-There has been no change in wheat for a week past. There is said to be a steady but not large movement in export, notwithstanding the high rates of freight, and notwithstanding the generally stationary price in Liverpool. There have been small sales of No. 2 Fall at 90 c f.o.c., and of No. 3 Fall at 88c f.o.c. And No. 1 Fall is nominal at 02c f.o.c. Spring whent is not in demand for export, and is taken in car lots by the millers. No. 2 has been sold last week at 92 c ; aud 90 c is asked for No. 3. No. 1 is held at 94 c ; all of them f.o.c. Goose is quoted on change at 81c. Speculative bids for February delivery are only 2 c and 3 c higher than present prices.
