Among the interesting papers contributed to the Economic Section of the British Association, at its recent meeting in Montreal, was one on the subject which is prefixed to these remarks; which was read by Mr. W. A. Douglas of Toronto We learn from the paper that the oldest of the existing companies worthy of mention was commenced in 1855 , and that in its first statement the cap:tal was $\$ 17,000$, and total assets $\$ 68,804$. The report for December,1883, enumerates 73 companies having an aggregate paid-up capital of $\$ 28,025,625$ and total assets $\$ 79,555,474$. The paid-up capital of the banks atthe, same date was $\$ 18,432,700$. The banks at least the principal ones, have been much longer in operation. These com; panies are, with hardly an exception, authorized to take money on deposit, and likewise to issue debentures. The deposits are limited to the paid-up capital,
and the total liabilities, including deposits, to three times the paid-up capital. The ordinary security for loans is real estate or stock in the lending company.
An interesting trble is given by Mr. Douglas shewing the rate of interest, charged between 1853 and 1884. There has been a steady decrease from 12 per cent for the first three years, 11 yer cent for five years, 8 to 10 for 9 years, to 7 per cent, which is the present rate. It is Mr. Douglas's opinion that the original mode, of louning, which was much on the principle of the French Credit Foncier, viz. by terminable annuities, including interest and security fund was found "bewildering to farmerb," and that the instalnent method has been largely, if not wholly, abandoned. Mr. T. Symons, in a letter in the loronto Glabe, takes exception to this statement, and affirms that the old system "proved the most simple and "beneficial plan that was ever devised "for their beneft." Mr. Symons pronounces the Cranada Landed Credit Company's system to have been a great success, and ascribes the change to an opposition to the original directors, who were replaced by others, who were favorable to the change of system. We own that we are unable to perceive the justice of the criticism. It seems improbable that, if the annuity system had been found satisfactory, it ;would have been found practicable to substitute another in its. place, or if the chinge had been made in the system of the original company to prevent others from adopting the system, which Mr . Symons contends is prelerred by the farmers.
Mr. Douglas gives the year 1874 as the period when extensive borrowing cornmenced in Enghand, the funds having been previously obtained from local sources. The amount borrowed on debentures now amounts to $\$ 25,679,803$, while the deposits have increased from $\$ 4,335,674$ in $187.4,10 \$ 13,161,5156$ in 1883 , in addition to which $\$ 3,591,460$ have been raised on debentures sold in Camada, making an increase in 9 years of nearly, 300 yer cent. Mr. Douglas has drawn attention to a striking difference between Ontario and Quebec in respect to the capitals of the loan societies and banks. The Loan Societies in Ontario have capitals aggregating $\$ 25,028,625$, while those in Quebec have only $\$ 2,570,821$. The Quebec banks have $\$ 36,298,760$ and the Ontario banks $\$ 18,764,500$. It must be borne ${ }_{i}$ in mind that the head offices of the largest banks, such as the Bank of Montreal, and Merchants, are in Quebec, while both do a large business in Ontario. The location of the head office is not a safe guide.

Mr. Douglas gave an interesting account of the aid rendered to commerce by science, which he illustrated by a reference to the transmission of money by oable to be invested on mortgage in Winnipeg, the transaction between London and Winnipeg via Torontn, which was commenced in London at noon, being completed before noon on the sume day, Mr. Douglas did not touch on one important branch of the subject, which we have fre: quently heard cimmented on. We refer to the immense indebtedness of the farmers of Ontario to the loan societies and its effect on the commerce of the. Province. That many farms have changed hands, owing to reckless borrowing, there is no doubt, but it may be that, on the other hand, the facilities for borrowing money on the whole have been beneficial. The public are indebted to Mr. Douglas for a very interesting paper on an important subject.

## RECIPROCITY.

We musi remind the Toronto cloze that we have more than once pointed out, not only the great importance, but the absolute necessity of urging the United States to come to an amicable settlement of their rights in regard to fishing in British waters. It was in consequence of a similar demand that the question was referred some twelye years ago to the Joint High Commission, which never even attempted to come to an agreement on the main point at issue. Untila decision shall be obtained from impartial arbitrators as to the meuning of that part of the treaty of 1818 which relates to the rights of fishing it is useless to attempt to negotiate on the suhject of reciprocity, The late Mr. Caleb Cushing pointed out that " the British view would "exclude citizens of the United States " from a large part of the productive fish "ing ground on the coasts of British "America;" and as he at the same time maintained the correctness of the United States view, the obvious solution of the difficulty is to leave the question to the decision of impartial arbitrators. : We hope that the Dominion Government is not neglecting to take steps to procure the amicable settlement of this question, although we can readily believe that the Government of the United States may be inclined to postpone action until after the Prềidential election.

We cannot at all concur in the Globe's opinion that the proper mode of proceed. ing would be for Canada to open negotiations for reciprocal free trade in natural products, in the hope of obtaining con-
cessions by the surrender of the fisheries. We have already had experience of the slight value placed by the United States Government on the right of fishing in Canadian waters, and we ought to know that the chief cause of their want of appreciation of our fishery rights arises. from their reluctance to ncknowledge our claim. The question in dispute can only be settled by arbitration, and we readily admit that unless it is so settled there will be serious danger of international complications after the expiration of the treaty. It will be absolutely necessary, while proposing arbitration as the true solution of the difficulty, to adopt measures to protect our rights as we understand them.

When the question of right has been settled, the value of the concession of the right of fishing will be so clearly estab- $f$ lished that it may be found practicable to make it a factor in the treaty negotiations. We are, however, strongly inclined to think that even if the fishery question were decided in our favor it wopald be found difficult to effect any satisfictory treaty of commerce with the United States. There is a formidable obstacle in the way, which is that the great mass of the population have no interest whatever in Canadian trade. Those engaged in the fisiery trade are a comparatively small portion of the people, and this is the chief concession that Canada has to make, while the agriculturists and lumberers of the North West are hostile to reciprocity with Canada, and not disposed to abandon what they think their own advantages in order to procure concessions for the fishermen of the North East. "Our belief' is that reciprocity will be found unattainable, but, ifso, it is only the more important that our fishery rights should be ascertained.

## OUR EXPORTGRAIN TRADE.

The continued stagnation of the grain trade at this port is the sibject of general comment, and shippers are beginning to apprehend that the through traffic from the West for English and Continental account is about to leave the St. Lawrence altogether. From the opening of navigation to September 10 the total exports of wheat and corn were $3,995,929$ bushels, against $6,005,927$.bushels for the corresponding period last year, showing s decrease of $2,009,998$ bushels ; and the aggregate of all kinds of grain for the same period was, $4,862,216$ bushels, against $6,998,702$ bushels last year, béing a decrease of $2,136,576$ bushels, as will be seen. by the following shipments from the
opening.' of navigation to September 10 1884, compared with the corresponding period lastiyear:-

The increase in our through grain traffic, which occurred immediately after the reduction of the Welland canal tolls, from 20 c to 70 c per $2,000 \mathrm{lbs}$, appears to have raised hopes that were too soon doomed to disappointment; and, in sooth, the free camals; of the United States are not without ample cause for complaint in the same direction, their traftic having fallen oll 225,000 tons during last month, as compared \&with the corresponding month in, 1883 . 'the following important admissions of the New York Commereial Butletin, of Soptember 12, are very significant: "The season has been an exceptionally unfavorable one on the State canals; and, nowithstanding the fact that tolls are no longer levied on merchandise passing either way, the business during the past month was even less than it was during the same month two years ago, when the toll system was in operation. This does not benr out the once popular theory that free canals would necessarily augment the volume of canal trade." The grain trade has of late undergone some extraordinary changes, and it does not appear that we have witnessed the last of them, as we notice that the shipments of wheat from Philadelphia, Baltimore, and New Orlerns, since the first of September, have exceeded those from Now York, Boston and Montreal, the combined exports from three Southern ports for week ending September 6 being $1,216,445$ bus., and from the three northern ports $1,010,313$ bus., showing 206,000 bus., in favor of the former. Another no less striking forture in the situation is that the canal traftic is being rapidly superseded by rail, and it seems that, it matters not how free the canals are, the railroads are bound to do the bulk of the carrying business. By the St. Lavrence route, however, very little grain is coming forward, either by rail or canal, and our steamship and transportation companies are sadly in want of freight. Who ever heard of ocean freights at this season of the year at $6 d$ and ls to Liverpool before, when the rates between now and the close of navigation usually ranged be-
tween $3 s^{\prime} 6 d$ and 5 s per quarter, and have gone as high as 5 s 6d and 6s? To demonstrate how badly this port is being left behind in regard to the through grain trade from the West wo may mention that its shipments of wheat for the two weeks ending September 10th were only 270,341 bushels against 545,526 bushels during the corresponding fortnight of 1833 , being a decrease of 275,185 . If we take the five American ports on the Atlantic sen board for the same period, the exports of whent will be found to have aggregated $4,722,332$ bus. against $2,225,791$ bus. last year, or an increase of $2,496,541$ bus. In other words, whilst the exports from the Athatic ports of the United States have increased over 100 per cent cluring the past two weeks, as compared with the same time last year, those from Canada have decreased more than one-half. This is an ugly showing, but it is true, and if any thing can be done to stimulate this important branch of our export trade it should be effected at once, as the close of navigation will be upon us in about two months.

## THF WESI INDIA QUESTION.

If we may judge from the tone of the Ministerial press in Canata, and from the utterances of the representatives of the British West India Colonies, at their 1ecent interview with the Earl of Derby, there is reason to feel serious alarm as to the outcome of the negotiations; which have been already opened with the High Conmissioners in London, and which are to be carried on by Mr. Solomon of Jamaica with the Dominion Government. One important fact seems to bo established beyoud doubt, which is that the cultivation of the sugar cane can no longer be carried on except at a ruinous loss. It is at least open to doubt whether the West India planters have not exaggerated the effect of the bounty allowed by foreign Governments on the exportation of beet sugar. Wheoretically the bounty system is not open to objection, and is in accordance with the practice of our Govemment and that of the United States. It is intended simply as a refund of duties levied in the form of an excise tax on the sugar exfracted from the beet. It has been found by practical experience that the bounty oltained by an exporter is invariably much more than the original payment. It would of course be practicable, by the imposition of countervailing duties, a course adopted in Canacla, to check the importation of the foreign beet sugars, but Great Britain will certainly not adopt such a policy.

A much more serious question for consideration is whether sugar can be produced as cheaply from the cane as from the beet, or, to put the case more plainly, will the total produce of the quantity of sugar canes that will yield a ton of sugar be equal in value to a crop of beets that will yield $\Omega$ similar quantity. Great im. provements have been made by the aid of chemical science in the utiliztion of what we may term the offal of the beel, and we have even heard that so profitable is this offal, that it equals the value of the sugar. If from any cause it should be found impossible for the cultivators of the sugar cane to compete with those of the beet, it may well be donbted wheiher any of the remedies which have been proposed would be efficacious. It ought moreover to inspire great reluctance on the part of the Canadian people to unite their destinies with those of the producers of an article of commerce who are at present at all events, by their own admission, inctrievably ruined.

The farorite scheme of the West India planters is to oltain reciprocal trade arrangements with the United States, and Canadian Protectionists who were but a few days ago anxious to obtain reciprocity with Spain or the Spanish Colonies are now advocating reciprocity with the West Indies. This, however, is not what the sugar planters desire. They are well avare that while free admission to the markets of fifty millions of people would be a great boon, simila admission to the market of less than five millions would be of little practical utility. Any scheme of recipro. city would be surrounded with difficulties, bolh in the United States and Canada. Both countries lave adopted a protective policy and even the tariff reformers in the United States would refuse to admit the sugar of foreign countries to compete with. that of their own refiners. The Canadian tariff has been framed in regard to sugar expressly to encourage the refineries, as well as the cultivation of beet. Is it seriously proposed to abandon the policy which has been deliberately adopted? Under the caption of Canada and British Guiana, we find in a contemporary the views of Mr. Elwin McLeod, who states a number of facts, all which have been repeatedly cited in this journal years ago, when we had occasion to criticise the yiews of Mr. Dustan, who wrote on behalf of the refiners. Mr. McLeod gives it as his opinion that " our sugar duties at "present are decidedly inimical to the
" trade of Demerara, and believes that the
"first solution of the difficulty will be to "fix the tariff" so that the sugars manu.
"factured in that colony will have an "equal, if not better, chance, will the " black grades of sugar in Cabadian con"sumption, and sees no reason why a "distinction should be made by our tariff "that is absolutely in favor of the poorest "qualities.". Mr. McLeod has simply expressed in 1584 what_ was told to the Canadian Commissioners who visited the West Indies in 1860, with the object of extending trade between the Dominion and hose colonies. The planters pointed out that whereas the?duties Timposed by the West india Colonies were very moderate, 'and strictly for revenue purposes, those imposed onflheir exports in Canada were discriminative in favor of the lowest_grades of 'sugar_which were used by refiners.
The same remark would apply to the United States, the common object of the Legislatures in both countries being to compel the consumers to use the product of the refineries, instead of the high grades of grocery sugar which are furnisied by the planters, ready for the consumers. We hardly think that so complete a change of policy is likely: to be adopted, and even if it were, it would not meet the case. The Canadian market is altogether too linited to absorb the West Indian supply,and this is probably the reason why some Jamaica !planters thave sought amnexation, in orler to accomplish the object 'which 'they have "in view, to the exclusion:of their fellow:colonists. We have yet to learn the result of the offers which doubtless will be; macle in the first instance to the United States, but,which are not likely to be accepted. Ourghrm conviction "; is "that po British , Ministry will cousent to the: imposition , by the colonies of the:Tmpire, of's' discriminating Inties against their Mrother, Country. Without such discriminating daties, neither the United States gnor', Canada would have any object to jgain by entering into reciprocal trade arrangements. As regurds our exports to the tropical colonies it is a matter of no importance whatever whether they are ádmitted at the present lowi rates of duty or free of all duty: We sball continue to send fish and jumber 'from: Canada, and the flour of the South will still be shipped from Southern ports. The difficulty will be, as was pointed out by Mr. Lubbock to the Earl of Derby, with manufactures, and precisely the same difficulty would arise in the event of negotiations with Canada. We believe, that these schemes of recip-
rocal trade rocai trade arrangements with the British or Spanish, West Indian colonies are alto. gether visionary; and as to federation
with one or more of those colonies it is a scheme which would be fraught with ruin to all concerned in it. It is in some degree satisfactory to find that the Ministerinal organ in this city is not prepared to go the length of federation, but we own that we are unable to comprehend how he reconciles reciprocity with the sugar colonies with protection to the refiners.

## THE FLOUR TRADE.

The report of a sale of 10,000 bbls of flour in these times would throw the trade of Montreal into quite a fever of excitement, and every one would be asking whio the wild and speculative purchaser was, although not many years ago such a transaction would have been regarded as only an ordinary occurrence; but things have" wonderfully changed since then. Montreal was once the great Hour centre of Canada, where all purchases were effected for Quebec, the Lower Provinces, Newfoundland, and the leinglish market, whilst to-day it is comparatively a bye market, its principal business consisting in filling orders for local requirements. Fornierly the Western millers knew of no market east of this city, whereas now they sell direct to all the chief centres between here and the seaboard. An inportant foreign element has also been introduced during the past twelve months, the trade here having been supplied by Anerican flour to a very large extent, and such is the footholdit has obtained that it will be a difficult matter to expel the invader, notwithstanding the abundance of the Canadian wheat crop. During the past five or six weeks the price of flour has declined 90 c to $\$ 1$ per bbl. on Superiors, and 75 c to 80c on Extras, and yet at present exceptionally low prices, when the former brand can be bought at $\$ 4.25$ and the latter at $\$ 4: 15$, there appears to be no inducement to anticipate future requirements, the speculative element being completely dead. Last week there was a larger export movement, the shipments being 40,000 bbls, but mostof this was on through shipment, and a considerable portion of it American flour. The total exports of flour at this port from the opening of navigation to September 10th was 369,664 bbls against $350,748 \mathrm{bbls}$ for the corresponding period last year, being an increase of 19,110 bbls. The stock of flour in this city is 39,475 bbls against 38,576 bbls a week ago, and 34,765 bbls a year ago.

## current buthts.

What between the almost weekly bulle tin of fimancial troubles from New York, New Jersey, minos and other States of the neighboring re-pablic-and the record being made in Canada by men here and hëre of gencrally admitted abjility, there is abundance of food for contemplation. Scarcely had the troubles of managingpresident Craig of the Exchange Bank and of his brother of the Montreal Loan \& Mortgage Co. ceased to form the subject of discussion than a still greater surprise burst upon us in the aflars of the Federnl Bank, a bank managed by a man whose confidence in himself was. second not even to that of his directors in the sume party. So pronomed was this confidence that it was shared by nearly everybody outside of some leadiug banks, except the Jouninis of Commane, whose article on the methods of the Federal enrly in October, 1876, gave rise to the bitter attacks made upon the editor from time to time in Toronto and Montreal dailies, in whith the word "blackmuil" was frequently used. This eventuated, scarcely two years ago, in an actiou at law against the editor of this journal, claiming on the part of the local manager dranges of $\$ 20,000$. The action hung lire, but did not choke off comment, and was only withdrawn after lle visit of president Nordheimer to Montreal on his argent expedition, scarcely three months since.
A few mornings ago a new sensation a waited the public, when it became known that the general manager of a day, Mi. Ingram-who has had control of the Montrenl branch and its up-town saviugs branch since its opening, scarcely two years ago-had departed for New York. This of itself might have caused only a passing notice had it not been followed by a scizure before judgment upou his effects at Pointe Claire, a suburban village up the river where the banker bas been living_since the sale of his magnificent houschold goods from his former town residence, a year or two since. Mr. Ingram, whose ability is at least equal to his discretion, is not likely to have become involved in any affair that could not bear another sile of the story, and is said to be determined to return to Montreal to fight it out. His departure will probably lead to some entanglement with one of the customers of the brink, which mayt result in disclosing a feature of banking not very common in Canada. James Wright \& Co. contracted a few years ago to build an addition to Mr. Lugram's then residence on Dorchester street, the amount to be $\$ 3,000$. The extra work raised it to some $\$ 3,5 \mathrm{c} 0$. The frm were allowed to open an account with the bank. Paper to the amonnt of six thousand dollars was discounted by means of a party who was ready to lend his name on condition of being allowed a moiety of the "commission" charged to the customer. When the note became due it was renewed for another mongh. We are not informed whether a commission was cha:ged this time-after the namner of legal geatlemen who negotiate short loans for the Outario farmers. Another trans, action involving a note for $\$ 4,000$, given, loug before that already referred to, was also a drag This note rras retired by placing
one half the amount of the face value to the credit of the account－this sum baving been phid in when due by the proprietor of an elegrant mansion for whom Wright \＆Co．were finishing＇a contract－and marking Wright \＆Co＇s．check for \＄2000，based upon a nesy nute for this latter amount．This note，which was renewed four times，appears to tuve remanined uncared for duiring seyeral months past，and is now harld ngainst the maker by the buak．Mr．Wright cluims that Mr．ligeram showed hime lis［lu－ gram＇s］chegue for this amount on the Nolsons Bank，dated the 29th May，mud he supposed that the note thad been retired by this clecgue，as he had heard nothing of it during the several monllis referred to．Wrigit \＆Co．now eluim． that Mr．Ingram ow＂s them © $\mathbf{3} 3040$ ，while the Federal bank chainus some $\$ 3,400$ from Wright $\&$ Co．There are two capiases nwaiting Mr Ingram＇s appearance on this site of the line． Mr．Wright wauts a certain $\$ 1,000$ cheque and his note．There may be another version of the affirir fortheomug，the which we shat be glad to publish．An evening paper shates diat Mr． Ingram denies being indebted to Wripht is Co． Mr．Ingram certainly owes it to himself to give some explanation tof the affinit．
The late genernl manager，H．S．Strathy，who has been employea as a sort of lield officer of late，is now in cuarge of the branch of the bank in Montreal．Mr．＇itrathy，who，accordangeto president Nordhumer，han＂＂lost his head，＂－ as he perlnps might say of any bunker who lent from if to id millions，or nearly the whole of tho bank＇s capitnl－to a specalator in Michigan lumber－is evidemly recovering his lost pres－ lige，and may yet redecm his right to the tille which his quondam admirers in Toronto once bestowed uron him．The result of the＂stock－ taking＂in the Montreal branch since the arrival of Mr．Strathy gives assets of $\$ 70,000$ in past due bills．Neither this branch nor the St ． Catherine street savings branch has evidently contributed much towards enrning a dividend for the shinteholders．
＇The Federal Bunk with its train of misfor－ tunes is still the sulject of discussion， when news arrives from Pictou，N．S．，of a large deflateation．Those who know any－ thing of Mr．＇Thimas Watsom，enslier of the Picton Bank for upwards of ten years past， will seareely credit anything of the kind con－ cerning him．That there is a heay sum wanting is not deaied，and the guarante companies， who are juintiy interested to the extent of $\$ 20,000$ ，have sent inspectors to investignte． The relations of a large local tamer to the bank are said to involve liabilities of $\$ 160,00 \mathrm{Q}$ ． Mr．Watson is again residing at Renfrew，Ont ， where he had formerly been agent of a brauch of the Brak of British North America．
The Bank of St．Hyacinthe is somerrhat exercised ovar some irregularities charged against L．P．Febert，the late necountant． It appears that there was no suspicion that anything was，wrong until recently when one of the directors iwas informed by a subordiante in the institution that an investigation would prove that inregularities ind taken place in the management．A private conversation between this director and his collengues was followed by an exnmination，which proved that unat－
thorized discounts had been granted to the extent of some $\$ 85,000$ to $\$ 30,000$ on uncertain securities，while overdrafts by certain customers largely incroused this amount．The account－ ant was conftonted with these facts，and endenvored at first to justify thom，but finally confessed to baving deait with his trust in several cases withont anthorily，but gave assurunces tint the bank would not be the loser as，though the cases referred to were not authorized，the money was secure．In－ vestigation was proceeding，duting which Mr． Hebert precipitately fled to the States，and it is thus fir found that rbout $\$ 50,000$ will probably be the amomat of his shorage．Sume of this as alleged by Mr．Hebert is secure，but there scems very little hope that this is nore than a trille in the sum total．Mr．Hehert has，it is ulleged，veen dealing in stocks in New York；and was badly＂satted＂during the re－ cent collapses．There are some ugly references to the character of certain cheques iuvolred．An－ other ense of default is reported agninst Bernard J．Gray，a clerk in the Quebec post ollice，who is charged with having made too free with the registered letters passing through bis bands． He is guaranted for $\$ 200$ ．

## THE LEGEND OF THE RECOLLETS．

The late A．T．Slewart would have nothing to do with what be called an＂unlucky man．＂ In these latter gears of the century，when un－ belief and agnosticism procham themselves as it were in the streets and from the liousetops， elbowing the failh in one form or another， which gives its name to the era，and roundly marks the flight of its years，it is worthy of note that a belief in luck is allowed to pass unchallenged，considering the frequent use of the torm－in such expressions as＂good luck＂， ＂bad luck，＂＂bard luck，＂＂hric＇s luck，＂and so ou．
There is a building in Montreal，erected on the site of a church which once echoed to the orisons and chants of the Recollet Fathers，who were among the figurants of our early histury． These holy men，it appears，were not at all reconciled to the manner is which they became dispossessed，and their property－their＂ciergy reserves＂－sceularised and converted to the pro－ fanc parposes of trade and commerce．In the fervour of his zent，one of then－so the legend runs－pronounced a curse upon any enterprise that should be established on that particilar spot of ground－the corner which hat belong－ ed to the old church．Be this as it may，in the course of time a fine warehouse was erectrd thereon；but，singular to relate，saith the chronieler，none of the ventures undertaken therein have thriven．
The Federal Bank branch was the late－t oc－ cupant，and it was hoped that the late manager had taken some steps to appense the wrah of the holy men and escape the pennlty－but the manner in which the usual later－day stilluess of the place was broken in upon one Sunday morning in June last－when a younger scion of the house of Strathy so nubly＂held the fort＂ －led those aequanted with the legend to doubt that the curse had been raised．＂Their belief in the text－＂the curse causeless shatl
not come，＂－was rudely shaken．As there may be thuse who believe that the entire troubles of the Federal Bank are due to its altempt upon the historical corner；the chronicler of a fumie reactionary period of belief will probabiy point to it as an oceurrence of course，for it is scarecty possible that in a time when Michigan shatl be as bare of forests as its seuthe：n neighbor is at present，any record will be forthe ming of how the historical institution put nenrly all its eggs into one liasket－or une or two puts－and hatche ed out so res jectable a pregray of ducks and drakes．At all events we pive the legend as it is recorded，and merely wish to remarli that it is doubtless as credible as the majority of thoso so celeverly versitied by the late Themas fn－ goldsby．

As the Federal Bank is comemplating the discontinuiance of the Montreal branch，and will probably withdraw before very long，the matison must cense to have any effect upon it－ a hint wheh，undar the circumstinures，is given for the bencift of the bulls and bars of the Stock Exchange．

## the sugar question．

The signs of improvement which appeared in the English and Oontiuental sugar markets ubout l．wo wecks ago were of brief duratien， the advance then established in prices haviog been lost，owing to the more favorable pros－ pects of the beet root sugar crop，the official estimate of Mr．Licht placing it at $2,500,000$ tons，or 200,000 tons in excess of that of last year．This accounts for London cables received in this city within the past few days being of such a weak uature，beet sugar polarizing 88 degrees having sold down to 12 s for prompt and October－Decenber delivery，bhawing a further decline of tid per cwt since last werk． Oane sugar has also been adversely affected， and values have receded $3 d$ to $\overline{6} d$ per owt since our last report，fiir refining muscovado selling in London at 12 s 6d．The crisis in the Austrian sugar trade，previously disenssed in the columes of the Jounsal，docs nut appear to be över，as quite a number of manufacturers who cuntraced with geowers last spring bave intimated heir inability to tuke delivery of beet at the price then agreed moon，which acion it is leared will rum a number of small growers．Last yon bect root in Anstria was selling at 1 to 1 marks，whilst the price this rutuma will，il is said，be lixed al 60 pemigs ber centuer，outside of contracis．In－this manr－ ket the supply of retined siggar is largi，flife produce of no less than sis relineries being oftered．Sumpiles of the New hahifax refinery were received bere on T＇uesday linst，which show grood quailits．Notwithstanding the continued low prices of gratulated，rrgular rates，it appents，are beiner shaded，whenerer an oplor－ tunity oceurs of phacing a round lat，and it is re－ ported that the agent of an busside refinery thas sold gramanted at G2e dillvered at Hamiloon and onter Western points．Yellow refined is selling at he luwest figures，yet reached．The raw cane product is in large suphly，but re tiners persistently hold of，and business，in consequence，is extremoly dull．The prepon－ derating influence which beet root sugne exerts upon the markets of the world has recently been demonstrated in a marked degree．For instance，as soon as it became knowf fabont three weeks ago，that there was aprobabiliiy of the beet crop falling below previous estimates， the market int once responded by an auvinc

## POST OFPIOE SAVINGS BANKS.

In our notice of Mr. Cumingham Stewart's interesting japer on the Ganadian Saviug Bunk system in our linst issue we omitted to refer to. a eery inportant teature in the original system, now nibathoned, but which it appears to us night be advantageously resumed. When the syiten was first established, the depositors were enabled to transfer their ordinnry 4 per cent deposits to a special 5 per cempocount in sums of not less than $\$ 100$, and repmynble only on three montlis inotice. On this system Mr. Stewart remarks in his paper that it was smooth $n$ its operation, intelligibie to the depositors, and that the interest was easily calculated. As however such investunents were deemed of a more pemannat chancter it was deemed expediont to transfer them to the finabee depriment and a special issue of 5 percent stock was substituted. It was found by experience that the new plan was hut well understood by the class of small depositors who use the postothice Savings banks, and who were unable to understand why, after paying their money to the prost oltice, they were lurned over to a new department, and obliged to receive their interestin a less convenient way. Owing to the fall in the value of money the Finance depiartment has censed to issue the 5 per cent stock and the savings Bank is paying the old late ot a per cent uniformly to all depositors. It strikes us that it would be sound policy to adopt the old system, under which the post-office department would pay 1 per cent more fur money deposited at three months' notice, reducing the mate ou call deposits to 3 per eent, which is that allawed by the banks and the Cily and District Susings Buak, and paying 4 per cent ou deposits of $\$ 100$ or more and reparable on three months notice. Such a change in the system sevus to us desirable, inasmuch as there ought lu be a difference between the rate of interest Hlowed on money reparable ai call and thit on notice, and, moreover, + per cent is tuo high a rite to pay on call under existing circumstuthes.

The demund holds off; and supplies accumulate, owing to the American makets ofleriteg wo inducement to ship at present prices. 'the exports of eggs from Canalia for lie fiscal your ending June 30,1883, were $13,451,410$ duzen, valued a $\$ 2,250,586$, most of which found a market in the United States. 'Plis is a very fivorable showing but it is feared that denitig the coming winter Oanadinn eges will enconiter sharper competition in the American markets than hitherto experinned, owing to the increased imports expeeted Jrom Germang and Denmerk. Last Mareln indge quantity of Geiman eggs were received in this eity from New York ater our supply was exhausted, and gave saisfaction.

Lumber-The lumber trade of the Dominion has buen in quite a slagnant condition for some time past, the shipments which have been made to Eughand having lurned out yery unsatisfictorily, resulting in some heavy losses from the very comuencement of the season, notwithstanding the exceptionally low freights that have ruled frotu this side. In fatt, it was the cheap frcights whici induced our exporters to take grenter risks, and shij) more heavily thian they onerwise would have done. Not only, are
the Canadiun and English deal markets erpressed but that of the United Slates 9 completely demoriaized for boards, scantlings, de., und if the market does not improve before the close of the season logging operations during the winter will be contined to very limited dimensions. It is hoped, however, that present low prices will create an increased consumption in the foreign markets, fund thus pave the way for an improvement in the trade of an important branch of vur exports.

There was explected to be some adrantage to trade this week, owing to low fares and the attractions of the industrial exhibition. Some of the wholesale houses report a mumber of visilors in consequence, but what is done is no real gain, as the business would hare been transacred sooner or later, and trade is not. much improved in any branch. It is nowapparent, what was conjectured, that there will not be an netive trade this year. ${ }^{\text {a }}$ Although it is not late for a general movement of grain, there are growing evidences that only where farmers are forced to sell will there be much whent brought to market. It may be that prices will not mend much even by next llay, but if there is a chance of them mending any: the farmers who nee able to liold their whent will not sell it at present prices. This will hare an effect on trade, and wholesale men of the first repur tation are not looking for developments beyond what they have calculated. It is even felt that payments will have to b: compulsory to some extent in many cases. The situntion is without parallel ihat the cointry shond be full of produce which it is felt cannot be converted, for the reason given, into cash. The struin trom delayed pryments is growing henvicr. A diminished trade would be brrae as insuiving only a reduced income, but obligations mist be descharged. The position of commercial men is still one of dilficulty. Financinl maters net quile unmbanged. Bank discoints are quiet, The rates are still 6 to $7 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent on commercial paper, and it is not likely that there will be iny ad vance. Call loans are quiet; rates on bonds and debentures and first-class security are 5 per cent; on loan shares 5 to 6 ; on bruk shares $\mathfrak{G}$ to 62 per cent.
