

Commercial Summarn.

The Canadian Pacific Railway traffic receipts for the week ending September 7th show an increase of \$34,000 over those of the corresponding period last year, when the receipts were \$112,000.

THE traffic receipts of the Grand Trunk Railway for week ending Sep 6th, were as follows:-Passengers, \$132,535; mails and express, \$13,000; freight, \$216,869; total \$362. 404, a decrease of \$31,841 from the corresponding week last year.

THE Times, an evening paper of 32 columns, has at length made its appearance, and may be expected, judging from the numbers we have seen, to be an organ of the opposition. The Times will, we have no doubt, be conducted with energy and talent, and, we hope, with success.

Tue Grand Trunk Railway traffic receipts for the week ending September 6, 1884, were as [follows:-Passengers, \$132,535; mails and express, \$13,000; freight, \$216,869; total \$362,404, a decrease of \$34,841 from the corresponding week last year.

The receipts of hogs in the Chicago and other western centres continue to fall considerably below those of a year ago. The Cincinnati Price Current of September 11 says :-Packing returns for the week show a total of 75,000 hogs handled by Western packers compared with 105,000 for corresponding week last year. Increase in packing since March 1st 280,000 hogs.

THE price of cochineal has advanced lc in the American market during the past week, owing to an expected shortage in the crop of 50 per cent, which has been brought about by the price receding to 25c, which was below cost of production, 372c being the lowest price at which it is remunerative to growers. Prices in Boston are quoted at 23c to 25c for Teneriffe Silver, 26c to 27c for black, and 28c to 29c for ray black.



Apvices by cable have been received here from Liverpool, stating that sales of American apples were made there as low as 11s per bbl., and a despatch from Liverpool dated Sept. 10th reports that, the apples ex SS. Scythia from New York, which were landed in niedium condition, sold at 12s to 14s-for sound fruit. Here sales have transpired at \$2 to \$2,50 for good sound lots, but fancy kinds have brought \$2.75 to \$3.00.

The visible supply of cotton on Sep. 12, 1884, was 1,404,741 bales, against 1,617,856 a year ago, showing a decrease of 213,145 bales, but, as compared with that of two years ago an increase is shown of 154,518 bales. Late cables from Bombay state that accounts of the cotton crop in the districts tributary to that port are generally satisfactory. Floods are reported in some districts, but they have done little harm as yet. Since the monsoon set in the rainfall at Bombay has been 55.98 inches.

Tue British Empire Mutual Life Insurance Co. are now the sole possessors of the Exchange Bank building, having not only paid over the purchase price, \$110,000, but have wined off the mortgage of \$50,000 held on the property by the Standard Life Insurance Co. This fine property will undergo several important alterations before the owners take up their quarters in it. The liquidators of the Exchange Bank, who have removed to II Hospital street, expect shortly to be able to declare a dividend.

Advices from Boston reported a fairly active demand for wool last week, and prices for fine descriptions were steadily maintained, Ohio and Pennsylvania selling at 33de to 37de per lb., Michigan and Wisconsin at 29c to 31 to, and Territory at 18c to 24c. The aggregate sales for week ending Sep. 13 were 2,954,215 lbs, against 2,875,712 lbs the week previous, and 3,256,200 Leading Wholesale Trade of Montreal.



lbs for the corresponding period last year. The total sales of wool in Boston since January 1, 1884, have been \$5,551,229 lbs., against \$7,965,-745 lbs. for the corresponding period of 1883, a decrease of 2,414,516 pounds.

FROM advices received from English cable markets they do not vary much from those received a week ago the best American and Canadian cattle selling at 16c per lb., sinking the offal. At Glasgow the markets were easier, and American cattle were reported as selling at 143c to 15c per lb., but shippers are not anticipating much, if any, advance in prices for Canadian stock for some weeks to come, as at this season of the year, especially September and October, the markets depend much upon the home supplies of grass-fed cattle, many being brought into the Liverpool and Clasgow markets from the surrounding country.

THE CONTINENTAL TRADE. -Of late there has been an enquiry for wheat from Antwerp, and a sale has just been put through of 16,000 bushels on p.t. but known to be at a better price than English buyers are prepared to pay. Since this sale was made, a party here has been asked to make a firm offer of 64,000 bushels to a continental house, which it is thought may result in business. These enquiries are may result in business. believed to be on account of short contracts made some time ago at much higher prices. It is known that a prominent merchant in Antwerp sold a large quantity of red winter wheat early in the season for future delivery at 22 francs, which he has since bought in at 19 francs, and is now delivering it at a big profit. It is said that he has already filled in 1,500,000 bushels of his contracts, upon which he realizes a handsome fortune. It is estimated that his total gains this season on selling wheat for future delivery aggregate close upon a million dollars.

Appreces from Philadelphia state:-There is considerable studing from the circular prices for coal; tolls are lower than usual for this season of the year, and freights have never been lower than at present. Captains complain that to take cargoes at roling rates is not only profitless but an actual loss: Another week's stoppage of mining in this month now seems inevitable. If the "combination" would at an early date determine upon another week's suspension before October 1st, to be followed by one week in October, one week in November and two weeks in December, it would most likely hasten an improvement in the trade. The total amount of anthracite coal sent to market for the week ending September 6, as reported by the several carrying companies, was 51,468 tons, compared with 717,529 tons in the corresponding week last year, a decrease of 666,061

The Chicago lumber market was reported last week as follows by the Northwestern Immberman: Prices at all points are still demoralized. The disposition to unload is all the time manifest without any pretense of modesty in the avowal. Salesmen offer low prices as the principal inducement to buyers. There is even competition between sellers in the offer of low prices, which must incidentally tend to demoralization. The prevailing urgency to sell is, to a great extent, the result of the necessity on the part of dealers to obtain funds A dragging trade throughout the season, and mengre profits on sales; have reduced the bank balances of many dealers to the minimum. Stocks on hand must, in many instances, be sacrificed to meet maturing demands. There can be no hope of stronger prices while this state of things exists. The only salvation of dealers is to go slow about stocking up. The unfortunate part of this condition is that the retail yard man catches the infection, and also refuses to stock up, although his trade may be

ONTARIO LOAN AND SAVINGS COMPANIES.

Among the interesting papers contributed to the Economic Section of the British Association, at its recent meeting in Montreal, was one on the subject which is prefixed to these remarks, which was read by Mr. W. A. Douglas of Toronto-We learn from the paper that the oldest of the existing companies worthy of mention was commenced in 1855, and that in its first statement the capital was \$17,000, and total assets \$68,800. The report for December, 1883, enumerates 73 companies having an aggregate paid-up capital of \$28,028,625 and total assets \$79,555,474. The paid-up capital of the banks atthe, same date was \$18,432,760. The banks at least the principal ones, have been much longer in operation. These companies are, with hardly an exception, authorized to take money on deposit, and likewise to issue debentures. The deposits are limited to the paid-up capital, and the total liabilities, including deposits, to three times the paid-up capital. The ordinary security for loans is real estate or stock in the lending company.

An interesting table is given by Mr. Douglas shewing the rate of interest, charged between 1853 and 1884. There has been a steady decrease from 12 per cent for the first three years, 11 per cent for five years, 8 to 10 for 9 years, to 7 per cent, which is the present rate. It is Mr. Douglas's opinion that the original mode, of loaning, which was much on the principle of the French Credit Foncier, viz. by terminable annuities, including interest and security fund was found "bewildering to farmers," and that the instalment method has been largely, if not wholly, abandoned. Mr. T. Symons, in a letter in the Toronto Globe, takes exception to this statement, and affirms that the old system "proved the most simple and "beneficial plan that was ever devised "for their benefit," Mr. Symons pronounces the Canada Landed Credit Company's system to have been a great success, and ascribes the change to an opposition to the original directors, who were replaced by others, who were favorable to the change of system. We own that we are unable to perceive the justice of the criticism. It seems improbable that, if the annuity system had been found satisfactory, it would have been found practicable to substitute another in its. place, or if the change had been made in the system of the original company to prevent others from adopting the system. which Mr. Symons contends is preferred by the farmers.

Mr. Douglas gives the year 1874 as the period when extensive borrowing commenced in England, the funds having been previously obtained from local sources. The amount borrowed on debentures now amounts to \$25,679,803, while the deposits have increased from \$4,335,674 in 1874, to \$13,161,506 in 1883, in addition to which \$3,591,466 have been raised on debentures sold in Canada, making an increase in 9 years of nearly 300 per cent Mr. Douglas has drawn attention to a striking difference between Ontario and Quebec in respect to the capitals of the loan societies and banks. The Loan Societies in Ontario have capitals aggregating \$28,028,625, while those in Quebec have only \$2,870,821. The Quebec banks have \$36,298,700 and the Ontario banks \$18,764,500. It must be borne in mind that the head offices of the largest banks, such as the Bank of Montreal and Merchants, are in Quebec, while both do a large business in Ontario. The location of the head office is not a safe guide.

Mr. Douglas gave an interesting account of the aid rendered to commerce by science, which he illustrated by a reference to the transmission of money by oable to be invested on mortgage in Winnipeg, the transaction between London and Winnipeg via Toronto, which was commenced in London at noon, being completed before noon on the same day, Mr. Douglas did not touch on one important branch of the subject, which we have frequently heard commented on. We refer to the immense indebtedness of the farmers of Ontario to the loan societies and its effect on the commerce of the Province. That many farms have changed hands, owing to reckless borrowing, there is no doubt, but it may be that, on the other hand, the facilities for borrowing money on the whole have been beneficial, public are indebted to Mr. Douglas for a very interesting paper on an important subject.

RECIPROCITY.

We must remind the Toronto Globe that we have more than once pointed out, not only the great importance, but the absolute necessity of urging the United States to come to an amicable settlement of their rights in regard to fishing in British waters. It was in consequence of a similar demand that the question was referred some twelve years ago to the Joint High Commission, which never even attempted to come to an agreement on the main point at issue. Until a decision shall be obtained from partial arbitrators as to the meaning of that part of the treaty of 1818 which relates to the rights of fishing it is useless to attempt to negotiate on the subject of reciprocity. The late Mr. Caleb Cushing pointed out that "the British view would "exclude citizens of the United States "from a large part of the productive fish "ing ground on the coasts of British "America:" and as he at the same time maintained the correctness of the United States view, the obvious solution of the difficulty is to leave the question to the decision of impartial arbitrators. We hope that the Dominion Government is not neglecting to take steps to procure the amicable settlement of this question, although we can readily believe that the Government of the United States may be inclined to postpone action until after the Presidential election.

We cannot at all concur in the Globe's opinion that the proper mode of proceeding would be for Canada to open negotiations for reciprocal free trade in natural products, in the hope of obtaining con-

cessions by the surrender of the fisheries. We have already had experience of the slight value placed by the United States Government on the right of fishing in Canadian waters, and we ought to know that the chief cause of their want of appreciation of our fishery rights arises from their reluctance to acknowledge our claim. The question in dispute can only be settled by arbitration, and we readily admit that unless it is so settled there will be serious danger of international complications after the expiration of the treaty. It will be absolutely necessary, while proposing arbitration as the true solution of the difficulty, to adopt measures to protect our rights as we understand them.

When the question of right has been settled, the value of the concession of the right of fishing will be so clearly established that it may be found practicable to make it a factor in the treaty negotiations. We are however, strongly inclined to think that even if the fishery question were decided in our favor it would be found difficult to effect any satisfactory treaty of commerce with the United States. There is a formidable obstacle in the way. which is that the great mass of the population have no interest whatever in Canadian trade. Those engaged in the fishery trade are a comparatively small portion of the people, and this is the chief concession that Canada has to make, while the agriculturists and lumberers of the North West are hostile to reciprocity with Canada, and not disposed to abandon what they think their own advantages in order to procure concessions for the fishermen of the North East. Our belief is that reciprocity will be found unattainable, but, if so, it is only the more important that our fishery rights should be ascertained.

OUR EXPORT GRAIN TRADE.

The continued stagnation of the grain trade at this port is the subject of general comment, and shippers are beginning to apprehend that the through traffic from the West for English and Continental account is about to leave the St. Lawrence altogether. From the opening of navigation to September 10 the total exports of wheat and corn were 3,995,929 bushels against 6,005,927 bushels for the corresponding period last year, showing a decrease of 2,009,998 bushels; and the aggregate of all kinds of grain for the same period was 4,862,216 bushels, against 6,998,792 bushels last year, being a decrease of 2,136,576 bushels, as will be seen by the following shipments from the

opening of navigation to September 10 1884, compared with the corresponding period lastiyear:—

The increase in our through grain traffic, which occurred immediately after the reduction of the Welland canal tolls, from 20c to 10c per 2,000 lbs, appears to have raised hopes that were too soon doomed to disappointment; and, in sooth, the free canals of the United States are not without ample cause for complaint in the same direction, their traffic having fallen off 225,000 tons during last month, as compared with the corresponding month in 1883. The following important admissions of the New York Commercial Bulletin, of September 12, are very significant: "The season has been an exceptionally unfavorable one on the State canals; and, notwithstanding the fact that tolls are no longer levied on merchandise passing either way, the business during the past month was even less than it was during the same month two years ago, when the toll system was in operation. This does not bear out the once popular theory that free canals would necessarily augment the volume of canal trade." The grain trade has of late undergone some extraordinary changes, and it does not appear that we have witnessed the last of them, as we notice that the shipments of wheat from Philadelphia, Baltimore, and New Orleans, since the first of September, have exceeded those from New York, Boston and Montreal, the combined exports from three Southern ports for week ending September 6 being 1,216,445 bus, and from the three northern ports 1,010,313 bus., showing 206,000 bus., in favor of the former. Another no less striking feature in the situation is that the canal traffic is being rapidly superseded by rail, and it seems that, it matters not how free the canals are, the railroads are bound to do the bulk of the carrying business. By the St. Lawrence route, however, very little grain is coming forward, either by rail or canal, and our steamship and transportation companies are sadly in want of freight. Who ever heard of ocean freights at this season of the year at 6d and 1s to Liverpool before, when the rates between now and the close of navigation usually ranged be-

tween 3s 6d and 5s per quarter, and have gone as high as 5s 6d and 6s? To demonstrate how badly this port is being left behind in regard to the through grain trade from the West we may mention that its shipments of wheat for the two weeks ending September 10th were only 270,341 bushels against 545,526 bushels during the corresponding fortnight of 1833, being a decrease of 275,185. If we take the five American ports on the Atlantic sea board for the same period, the exports of wheat will be found to have aggregated 4,722,332 bus. against 2,225,791 bus. last year, or an increase of 2,496,541 bus. In other words, whilst the exports from the Atlantic ports of the United States have increased over 100 per cent during the past two weeks, as compared with the same time last year, those from Canada have decreased more than one-half. This is an ugly showing, but it is true, and if any thing can be done to stimulate this important branch of our export trade it should be effected at once, as the close of navigation will be upon us in about two months.

THE WEST INDIA QUESTION.

If we may judge from the tone of the Ministerial press in Canada, and from the utterances of the representatives of the British West India Colonies, at their recent interview with the Earl of Derby, there is reason to feel serious alarm as to the outcome of the negotiations, which have been already opened with the High Commissioners in London, and which are to be carried on by Mr. Solomon of Jamaica with the Dominion Government. One inportant fact seems to be established beyond doubt, which is that the cultivation of the sugar cane can no longer be carried on except at a ruinous loss. It is at least open to doubt whether the West India planters have not exaggerated the effect of the bounty allowed by foreign Governments on the exportation of beet sugar. Theoretically the bounty system is not open to objection, and is in accordance with the practice of our Government and that of the United States. It is intended simply as a refund of duties levied in the form of an excise tax on the sugar extracted from the beet. It has been found by practical experience that the bounty obtained by an exporter is invariably much more than the original payment. It would of course be practicable, by the imposition of countervailing duties, a course adopted in Canada, to check the importation of the foreign beet sugars, but Great Britain will certainly not adopt such a policy,

A much more serious question for consideration is whether sugar can be produced as cheaply from the cane as from the beet, or, to put the case more plainly. will the total produce of the quantity of sugar canes that will yield a ton of sugar be equal in value to a crop of beets that will yield a similar quantity. Great improvements have been made by the aid of chemical science in the utilization of what we may term the offal of the beet, and we have even heard that so profitable is this offal, that it equals the value of the sugar. If from any cause it should be found impossible for the cultivators of the sugar cane to compete with those of the beet, it may well be doubted whether any of the remedies which have been proposed would be efficacious. It ought moreover to inspire great reluctance on the part of the Canadian people to unite their destinies with those of the producers of an article of commerce who are at present at all events, by their own admission, irretrievably ruined.

The favorite scheme of the West India planters is to obtain reciprocal trade arrangements with the United States, and Canadian Protectionists who were but a few days ago anxious to obtain reciprocity with Spain or the Spanish Colonies are now advocating reciprocity with the West Indies. This, however, is not what the sugar planters desire. They are well aware that while free admission to the markets of fifty millions of people would be a great boon, similar admission to the market of less than five millions would be of little practical utility. Any scheme of reciprocity would be surrounded with difficulties, both in the United States and Canada. Both countries have adopted a protective policy and even the tariff reformers in the United States would refuse to admit the sugar of foreign countries to compete with that of their own refiners. The Canadian tariff has been framed in regard to sugar expressly to encourage the refineries, as well as the cultivation of beet. Is it seriously proposed to abandon the policy which has been deliberately adopted? Under the caption of Canada and British Guiana, we find in a contemporary the views of Mr. Edwin McLeod, who states a number of facts, all which have been repeatedly cited in this journal years ago, when we had occasion to criticise the views of Mr. Dustan, who wrote on behalf of the refiners. Mr. McLeod gives it as his opinion that "our sugar duties at " present are decidedly inimical to the " trade of Demerara, and believes that the " first solution of the difficulty will be to "fix the tariff so that the sugars manu-

" factured in that colony will have an "equal, if not better, chance, with the " black grades of sugar in Canadian con-"sumption, and sees no reason why a " distinction should be made by our tariff' " that is absolutely in favor of the poorest " qualities." Mr. McLeod has simply expressed in 1884 what was told to the Canadian Commissioners who visited the West Indies in 1866, with the object of extending trade between; the Dominion and those colonies. The planters pointed out that whereas the duties imposed by the West India Colonies were very moderate, and strictly for revenue purposes, those imposed on their exports in Canada were discriminative in favor of the lowest grades of sugar which were used by refiners.

The same remark would apply to the United States, the common object of the Legislatures in both countries being to. compel the consumers to use the product of the refineries, instead of the high grades of grocery sugar which are furnished by the planters, ready for the consumers. We hardly think that so complete a change of policy is likely to be adopted, and even if it were, it would not meet the case. The Canadian market is altogether too limited to absorb the West Indian supply, and this is probably the reason why some Jamaica iplanters thave sought annexation, in order to accomplish the object which they have in view to the exclusion of their fellow-colonists. We have yet to learn the result of the offers which doubtless will be, made in the first instance to the United States, but which are not likely to be accepted. Our firm conviction, is that no British Ministry will consent to the imposition , by the colonies of the Empire of discriminating duties against their Mother Country. Without such | discriminating ! duties, neither the United States nor! Canada would have any object to gain by entering into reciprocal trade arrangements. As regards our exports to the tropical colonies it is a matter of no importance whatever whether they are admitted at the present low rates of duty or free of all duty. We shall continue to send fish and lumber from Canada, and the flour of the South will still be shipped from Southern ports. The difficulty will be, as was pointed out by Mr. Lubbock to the Earl of Derby, with manufactures, and precisely the same difficulty would arise in the event of negotiations with Canada. We believe that these schemes of reciprocal trade arrangements with the British or Spanish West Indian colonies are altogether visionary; and as to federation with one or more of those colonies it is a scheme which would be fraught with ruin to all concerned in it. It is in some degree satisfactory to find that the Ministerial organ in this city is not prepared to go the length of federation, but we own that we are unable to comprehend how he reconciles reciprocity with the sugar colonies with protection to the refiners.

THE FLOUR TRADE.

The report of a sale of 10,000 bbls of flour in these times would throw the trade of Montreal into quite a fever of excitement, and every one would be asking who the wild and speculative purchaser was, although not many years ago such a transaction would have been regarded as only an ordinary occurrence; but things have wonderfully changed since then. Montreal was once the great flour centre of Canada, where all purchases were effected for Quebec, the Lower Provinces, Newfoundland, and the English market, whilst to-day it is comparatively a bye market, its principal business consisting in filling orders for local requirements. Formerly the Western millers knew of no market east of this city, whereas now they sell direct to all the chief centres between here and the seaboard. An important foreign element has also been introduced during the past twelve months, the trade here having been supplied by American flour to a very large extent, and such is the footholdit has obtained that it will be a difficult matter to expel the invader, notwithstanding the abundance of the Canadian wheat crop. During the past five or six weeks the price of flour has declined 90c to SI per bbl. on Superiors, and 75c to 80c on Extras, and yet at present exceptionally low prices, when the former brand can be bought at \$4.25 and the latter at \$4.15, there appears to be no inducement to anticipate future requirements, the speculative element being completely dead. Last week there was a larger export movement, the shipments being 40,000 bbls, but most of this was on through shipment, and a considerable portion of it American flour. The total exports of flour at this port from the opening of navigation to September 10th was 369,864 bbls against 350,748 bbls for the corresponding period last year, being an increase of 19,116 bbls. The stock of flour in this city is 39,475 bbls against 38,576 bbls a week ago, and 34,765 bbls a year ago.

CURRENT EVENTS.

What between the almost weekly bulletin of financial troubles from New York, New Jersey, Illinois and other States of the neighboring republic-and the record being made in Canada by men here and there of generally admitted ability, there is abundance of food for contemplation. Scarcely had the troubles of managing president Craig of the Exchange Bank and of his brother of the Montreal Loan & Mortgage Co. ceased to form the subject of discussion than a still greater surprise burst upon us in the affairs of the Federal Bank, a bank managed by a man whose confidence in himself was second not even to that of his directors in the same party. So pronounced was this confidence that it was shared by nearly everybody outside of some leading banks, except the JOURNAL OF COMMERCE, whose article on the methods of the Federal early in October, 1876, gave rise to the bitter attacks made upon the editor from time to time in Toronto and Montreal dailies, in which the word "blackmail" was frequently used. This eventuated, scarcely two years ago, in an action at law against the editor of this journal, claiming on the part of the local manager damages of \$20,000. The action hung fire, but did not choke off comment, and was only withdrawn after the visit of president Nordheimer to Montreal on his urgent expedition, scarcely three months since.

A few mornings ago a new sensation awaited the public, when it became known that the general manager of a day, Mr. Ingram-who has had control of the Montreal branch and its up-town savings branch since its opening, scarcely two years ago-had departed for New York. This of itself might have caused only a. passing notice had it not been followed by a seizure before judgment upon his effects at Pointe Claire, a suburban village up the river where the banker has been living since the sale of his magnificent household goods from his former town residence, a year or two since. Mr. Ingram, whose ability is at least equal to his discretion, is not likely to have become involved in any affair that could not bear another side of the story, and is said to be determined to return to Montreal to fight it out. His departure will probably lead to some entanglement with one of the customers of the bank, which may result in disclosing a feature of banking not very common in Canada. James Wright & Co. contracted a few years ago to build an addition to Mr. Ingram's then residence on Dorchester street, the amount to be \$3,000. The extra work raised it to some \$3,500. The firm were allowed to open an account with the bank. Paper to the amount of six thousand dollars was discounted by means of a party who was ready to lend his name on condition of being allowed a moiety of the "commission" charged to the customer. When the note became due it was renewed for another month. We are not informed whether a commission was charged this time-after the manner of legal gentlemen who negotiate short loans for the Ontario farmers. Another transaction involving a note for \$4,000, given, loug before that already referred to, was also a This note was retired by placing

one half the amount of the' face value to the credit of the account-this sum having been paid in when due by the proprietor of an elegant mansion for whom Wright & Co. were finishing a contract—and marking Wright & Co's. check for \$2000, based upon a new note for this latter amount. This note, which was renewed four times, appears to have remained uncared for during several months past, and is now held against the maker by the bank, Mr. Wright claims that Mr. Ingram showed him his [Ingram's] cheque for this amount on the Molsons Bank, dated the 29th May, and he supposed that the note had been retired by this cheque, as he had heard nothing of it during the several months referred to. Wright & Co. now claim that Mr. Ingram owes them \$3640, while the Federal bank claims some \$3,400 from Wright & Co. There are two capiases awaiting Mr Ingram's appearance on this side of the line Mr. Wright wants a certain \$1,000 cheque and his note. There may be another version of the affair forthcoming, the which we shall be glad to publish. An evening paper states that Mr. Ingram denies being indebted to Wright & Co. Mr. Ingram certainly owes it to himself to give some explanation of the affair.

The late general manager, H. S. Strathy, who has been employed as a sort of field officer of late, is now in conrect of the branch of the bank in Montreal. Mr. strathy, who, according to president Nordheimer, had "lost his head,"as he perhaps might say of any banker who lent from 11 to 11 millions, or nearly the whole of the bank's capital-to a speculator in Michigan lumber-is evidently recovering his lost prestige, and may yet redeem his right to the title which his quondam admirers in Toronto once bestowed upon him. The result of the "stocktaking" in the Montreal branch since the arrival of Mr. Strathy gives assets of \$70,000 in past due bills. Neither this branch nor the St. Catherine street savings branch has evidently contributed much towards earning a dividend for the shareholders.

The Federal Bank with its train of misfortunes is still the subject of discussion. when news arrives from Pictou, N.S., of a large defalcation. Those who know anything of Mr. Thomas Watson, eashier of the Pictou Bank for upwards of ten years past, with scarcely credit anything of the kind concerning him. That there is a heavy sum wanting is not denied, and the guarantee companies, who are jointly interested to the extent of \$20,000, have sent inspectors to investigate. The relations of a large local tanner to the bank are said to involve liabilities of \$160,000. Mr. Watson is again residing at Renfrew, Ont., where he had formerly been agent of a branch of the Bank of British North America.

The Bank of St. Hyacinthe is somewhat exercised over some irregularities charged against L. P., Hebert, the late accountant. It appears that there was no suspicion that anything was, wrong until recently when one of the directors was informed by a subordinate in the institution that an investigation would prove that irregularities had taken place in the management. A private conversation between this director and his colleagues was followed by an examination, which proved that unare-

thorized discounts had been granted to the extent of some \$25,000 to \$30,000 on uncertain securities, while overdrafts by certain customers largely increased this amount. The accountant was confronted with these facts, and endeavored at first to justify them, but finally confessed to having dealt with his trust in several cases without authority, but gave assurances that the bank would not be the loser as, though the cases referred to were not authorized, the money was secure. Investigation was proceeding, during which Mr. Hebert precipitately fled to the States, and it is thus far found that about \$50,000 will probably be the amount of his shortage. Some of this as alleged by Mr. Hebert is secure, but there seems very little hope that this is more than a trifle in the sum total. Mr. Hebert has, it is alleged, been dealing in stocks in New York and was badly "salted" during the recent collapses. There are some ugly references to the character of certain cheques involved. Another case of default is reported against Bernard J. Gray, a clerk in the Quebec post office, who is charged with having made too free with the registered letters passing through his hands. He is guaranteed for \$200.

THE LEGEND OF THE RECOLLETS.

The late A. T. Stewart would have nothing to do with what he called an "unlucky man." In these latter years of the century, when unbelief and agnosticism proclaim themselves as it were in the streets and from the housetops, elbowing the faith in one form or another, which gives its name to the era, and roundly marks the flight of its years, it is worthy of note that a belief in luck is allowed to pass unchallenged, considering the frequent use of the term—in such expressions as "good luck", "bad luck," "here's luck," and so on.

There is a building in Montreal, erected on the site of a church which once echoed to the orisons and chants of the Recollet Fathers, who were among the figurants of our early history. These holy men, it appears, were not at all reconciled to the manner in which they became dispossessed, and their property-their " clergy reserves "-secularised and converted to the profane purposes of trade and commerce. In the fervour of his zeal, one of them-so the legend runs-pronounced a curse upon any enterprise that should be established on that particular spot of ground-the corner which had belonged to the old church. Be this as it may, in the course of time a fine warehouse was erected thereon; but, singular to relate, saith the chronicler, none of the ventures undertaken therein have thriven.

The Federal Bank branch was the late-t occupant, and it was hoped that the late manager had taken some steps to appease the wrath of the holy men and escape the penalty—but the manner in which the usual latter-day stillness of the place was broken in upon one Sunday morning in June last—when a younger scion of the house of Strathy so nobly "held the fort"—led those acquainted with the legend to doubt that the curse had been raised. Their helief in the text—"the curse causeless shall

not come,"-was rudely shaken. As there may be those who believe that the entire troubles of the Federal Bank are due to its attempt upon the historical corner, the chronicler of a future reactionary period of belief will probably point to it as an occurrence of course, for it is scarcely possible that in a time when Michigan shall be as bare of forests as its southern neighbor is at present, any record will be fortherming of how the historical institution put nearly all its eggs into one basket-or one or two pots-and batched out so respectable a progeny of ducks and drakes. At all events we give the legend as it is recorded, and merely wish to remark that it is doubtless as credible as the majority of those so cleverly versified by the late Thomas Ingoldsby.

As the Federal Bank is contemplating the discontinuance of the Montreal branch, and will probably withdraw before very long, the malison must cease to have any effect upon it—a hint which, under the circumstances, is given for the benefit of the bulls and bears of the Stock Exchange.

THE SUGAR QUESTION.

The signs of improvement which appeared in the English and Continental sugar markets about two weeks ago were of brief duration, the advance then established in prices having been lost, owing to the more favorable prospects of the beet root sugar crop, the official estimate of Mr. Licht placing it at 2,500,000 tons, or 200,000 tons in excess of that of last year. This accounts for London cables received in this city within the past few days being of such a weak nature, beet sugar polarizing 88 degrees having sold down to 12s for prompt and October-December delivery, showing a further decline of 6d per cwt since last week. Cane sugar has also been adversely affected, and values have receded 3d to 6d per cwt since our last report, fair refining muscovado selling in London at 12s 6d. The crisis in the Austrian sugar trade, previously discussed in the columns of the Journal, does not appear to be over, as quite a number of manufacturers who contracted with growers last spring have intimated their inability to take delivery of beet at the price then agreed upon, which action it is feared will run a number of small growers. Last year beet root in Austria was selling at 1 to 1; marks, whilst the price this autumn will, it is said, be fixed at 60 pfennigs per centure, outside of contracts. In-this market the property of the contracts of the contract of the contracts of the contract of ket the supply of refined sugar is large, the product of no less than six refineries being offered. Samples of the New Halifax refinery were received here on Tuesday last, which show good quality. Notwithstanding the continued low prices of grandated, regular rates, it appears, are being shaded, whenever an opportunity of the continued of t tunity occurs of placing a round lot, and it is reported that the agent of an outside refinery has sold granulated at 61c delivered at Hamilton and other Western points. Yellow refined is selling at the lowest figures, yet reached. The raw cane product is in large supply, but re-finers persistently hold of, and business, in consequence, is extremely dull. The preponderating influence which beet root sugar exerts uerating influence which beet root sugar exerts upon the markets of the world has recently been demonstrated in a marked degree. For instance, as soon as it became, know about three weeks ago, that there was a probability of the beet crop falling below previous estimates, the market at once responded by an advance

of 90. to 1s, per cwt. in Germany and England and 1e to 1e per 1b. in New York. No scouer, however, were statistics fortheoming from an official source, indicating that fears of damage from drought were groundless, than the markets on both sides of the Atlantic relapsed into their former weakness and prices fell back to the old basis. The hopes, therefore, which were entertained very generally by the trade about two weeks ago that a turning point for the better had arrived have proved signally disappointing, and it seems that nothing short of further news of a less encouraging nature concerning the beet crop will work an improvement in the general situation.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

In our notice of Mr. Cunningham Stewart's interesting paper on the Canadian Saving Bank system in our last issue we omitted to refer to a very important feature in the original system, now abandoned, but which it appears to us might be advantageously resumed. system was first established, the depositors were enabled to transfer their ordinary 4 per cent deposits to a special 5 per cent account in sums of not less than \$100, and repnyable only on three months' notice. On this system Mr. Stewart remarks in his paper that it was smooth n its operation, intelligible to the depositors, and that the interest was easily calculated. As however such investments were deemed of a more permanent character it was deemed expedient to transfer them to the finance department and a special issue of 5 percent stock was substituted. It was found by experience that the new plan was not well understood by the class of small depositors who use the postoffice Savings Banks, and who were unable to office Savings Banks, and who were unable to understand why, after paying their money to the post office, they were turned over to a new department, and obliged to receive their inter-est in a less convenient way. Owing to the fall in the value of money the Finance department has censed to issue the 5 per cent stock and the Savings Bank is paying the old rate of 4 per cent uniformly to all depositors. It strikes us that it would be sound policy to adopt the old system, under which the post-office depart-ment would pay I per cent more for money deposited at three months' notice, reducing the rate on call deposits to 3 per cent, which is that allowed by the banks and the City and District Savings Bank, and paying 4 per cent on de-posits of \$100 or more and repayable on three Such a change in the system months' notice. seems to us desirable, inasmuch as there ought to be a difference between the rate of interest allowed on money repayable at call and that on notice, and, moreover, 4 per cent is too high a rate to pay on call under existing circum-Stances.

EXHIBITION NOTES.

Reference to the following exhibitors was unavoidably crowded out last week.—Messrs. Robin Sailler's exhibit of leather belting was the subject of general remark; the large driving belt in the machinery hall was also supplied by this firm. They were awarded first prize, silver medals and diploma.—The Dominion Organ and Piano Co., of Bowmanville, represented in this city by Mr. L. B. N. Pratte, had a fine exhibit of their instruments, and bore away a first prize.—The Waterons Engine Co., of Brantford, were represented by their usual fine collection of engines and agricultural machinery.

One of the most interesting exhibits was the series of embroidery patterns furnished by Messrs. Beuthner Bros., of this city: In these delicate fabrics are to be seen designs of

Canadian summer and winter sports, including lacrosse, tabogganing, snowshocing, cirling, etc., with appropriate backgrounds, all forming the most exquisite series of patterns ever presented to the Canadian public. A noticeable design is the "Monarch of the Glen" from Landscer's great picture. These illustrated patterns have all been designed by Mr. E. W. Beuthner himself. This firm are the first to attempt figures of animals and birds by machinery, such patterns having hitherto been consined to scroll-work, and deemed impossible except by manual labor. The secret-lies is dropping out a certain number of nedles which, by an ingenious contrivance, can be replaced when required. The enclosure in which these goods were displayed was continually thronged with people going in and out to examine the patterns, and none went away disappointed. The designs have been copy righted by the firm, as attempts had already been made to secure them by other parties. Nothing can be more attractive to the fair shoppers than these new and beautiful designs on embroidery. The gem of the ladies' lady department was a moss rose in accessen and plush on a myrtle-colored background by Mrs. E. W. Beuthner. This exquisite piece of work obtained the highest award given in that department. A water color painting by Mr. Beuthner was also much admired, and received a second prize.

The Smith Middlings Purifier, of Stratford, Ont., in connection with Prinz's dust collector, were among the noticeable exhibits in the machinery hall. In the agricultural hall, Messrs. Frost & Wood of Smith's Falls, and the Noxen Bros. Manufacturing Co., of Ingersoll, Ont., made creditable exhibits. J. Wright & Co., of this city, received first prize, Silver Medals and diploma for ornamental wood and tiles for floors and mantels, parquet flooring, chairs, &c.—Hency & Lacroix were awarded a prize for their exhibit of carriage wheels, rims, Kiloes, springs, etc.—Mr. S. T. Willet had a fine display of flannel goods from his factory at Chambly, Que., The Cornwall Manufacturing Co. made a creditable exhibit of blankets of all colors. The Magog Print works made their first display at any exhibition; the order of excellence to which they have already attained should encourage investors in the stock.—Messrs. Mongenais & Boivin made an excellent exhibit of French cordials, liqueurs, wines, etc., and some remarkably large specimens of plate glass.—

Wm. Clark, of this city, received various medals for largest and best display of canned goods, all manufactured by himself. His soups in tins, meats, plum-puddings, etc., were their own recommendation, and received silver medals, bronze medals, etc.—Messrs. Dixon, Sons & Co., this city, received honorable mention for the best sample of mustard .-C. H. Catelli of this city received a medal and diploma for his assortment of macaroni and vermicelli.—Johnson's favorite Fluid Beef was awarded a silver medal.—J. S. Anthes, of Berlin, Ont., received a bronze medal for best assortment of chairs.—Tees & Co., desk makers, received a bronze medal for display of jewel and bond cases .-- Mr. C. C. Edos.—Large quantities of eggs are held in this city, a considerable portion of which has been damaged by the late hot weather, and consignors must not be supprised if in many instances they lose 7 or 8 dozen per case, to cover allowances for bad eggs. The demand holds off, and supplies accumulate, owing to the American markets offering no inducement to ship at present prices. The exports of eggs from Canada for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1883, were 13,451,410 dozen, valued at \$2,256,586, most of which found a market in the United States. This is a very favorable showing, but it is feared that during the coming winter Canadian eggs will encounter sharper competition in the American markets than hitherto experienced, owing to the increased imports expected from German and Denmark. Last March a large quantity of German eggs were received in this city from New York after our supply was exhausted, and gave satisfaction.

LUMBER—The lumber trade of the Dominion has been in quite a stagnant condition for some time past, the shipments which have been made to Eugland having turned out very unsatisfactorily, resulting in some heavy losses from the very commencement of the season, notwith-standing the exceptionally low freights that have ruled from this side. In fact, it was the cheap freights which induced our exporters to take greater risks, and ship more heavily than they otherwise would have done. Not only are

the Canadian and English deal markets expressed, but that of the United States 3 completely demoralized for boards, scantlings, &c., and if the market does not improve before the close of the season logging operations during the winter will be confined to very limited dimensions. It is hoped, however, that present low prices will create an increased consumption in the foreign markets, and thus pave the way for an improvement in the trade of an important branch of our exports.

Daugs.—The quinine market has not rid itself of the unsettled feeling noticed for several weeks past. Howard's in bottles is quoted at \$1.35 to \$1.40, and German in bulk at \$1.15 to \$1.20. In New York, German in bulk is down to 90c and 924c, and 974c to \$1.00 for American. Morphin is quiet at \$2.10 to \$2.25, and opium at \$4.25.

EGGS.—Owing to the poor quality of accumulations here, along with a slow demand, the market is decidedly weak, at 15c to 16c, some lots having been pushed off at 143c.

Pault.—Receipts are more liberal but there is a fair demand for good fall kinds at \$2 to \$2.50, sales of 400 to 500 bbls, being reported in lots. The "Alexandra" arrived with about 1,300 bbls, from the West. Poor lots are quoted at \$1 to \$1.75. Shipments are still going forward to the English market. Pears are selling at \$7 to \$10 for Bartlettys, as to quality, and Flemish Beauty at \$6 to \$7 per. bbl. Lemons \$3.50 to \$4.50 per box. The first consignments of Janaica, oranges have been received and sold at \$8 to \$10 per bl. About 600 bundles of Bamanas have been received, and have sold at \$1.50 to \$2 for yellow and red. Malaga grapes are expected in next week.

Grain and Flour.—The enquiry for wheat on English account is very small, but for the Continent a better demand has set in, resulting in a sale of 16,000 bushels red winter, with enquiries for more,—the price was not mentioned, although it is understood to be on the basis of about 17½ francs c.i.f. Antwerp, or equal to 30s. 6d. per quarter, which is very low. A few sales of new Canada red winter, have transpired at 85c to 87c for milling purposes, but scarcely any business is reported in cargoes. Advices from different sections in Ontario state that furmers are delivering their red winter at 75c. Last year at this time they obtained from \$1.10 to \$1.12, which shows a decline of 35c to 37c per-bushel. Corn is quiet at 62c to 63c, pease at 80c, oats 35c, and barley at 50c to 60c. The flour market does not deviate from the dull course which has characterized it for some time past, and prices continue to favor buyers. Lumber.—The local market is exceptionally dull, business at the yards being the most disappointing that has been experienced for years at this senson. There is very little lumber arriving, and that is not wanted. Laths are firm, but there is scarcely any trading in them, the demand being as small as the supply. A few isolated sales have been made at the yards at \$2. A further movement is reported in deals for export, two outside steamers having been chartered for Liverpool at 40s. Regular lines, however, are getting 50s. Sailing vessels are being loaded with lumber at \$13.50 for Buenos Ayres.

NAVAL STORES.—A moderately steady business is passing in spirits of turpentine, sales to importers being quoted at 47c to 48c in large quantities, but in smaller quantities wholesale dealers are getting 50c. Rosins are quiet, and can be bought at low prices.

Oils.—A moderate enquiry is noted for cod oil, with a sale of 100 bbls. at 56c, but for ordinary lots 571c to 60c is still quoted. Steam-refined seal has likewise been asked for, and a lot of 100 bbls. was sold at 59c. Linsced oil remains quiet and steady, at 511c to 53c. In other kinds there is little change.

Petroleum.—Refined petroleum is meeting with more enquiry at the advance quoted last week, and sales of our lots in store have taken place at 16 gc, broken lots at 16 gc to 16 gc, and single barrels at 17c to 17 gc. Refined oil at Petrolea is steady at 13 gc f.o.b.

Phosphate—The market here retains the quiet features characterizing it for some time past. The bulk of the season's shipments have now gone forward, amounting to about 16,000 tons against about 17,500 tons at the corresponding date last year. The latest cable offer reported was 11d per unit for 75 per cent Liverpool, and prices here are quoted at \$10.75 to \$14 per ton, as to quality, a round lot of low grade phosphate being offered to a city firm at \$10.75. Freight engagements by steam have been made at 5s and 6s.

Provisions.—A fair aggregate of business in Western pork is reported, although in small parcels, which have changed liands at \$20 to \$20.50. For round quantities \$19.50 would probably be accepted. There is very little Canada short cut in the market, which is held at \$22. Western lard has sold at 11c in pails, and Canadian at 10tc to 10tc for best brands. Smoked hams are steady at 14tc to 15tc as to quality, and bacon at 1tc to 15tc. Refined tallow is quiet, a lot of 7 bbls. selling at 7c.

Tonacco, Erc.—There is a steady demand for Canadian manufactured in England, and a number of orders are being filled for that market. One house in this city is working overtime in its export department, and is putting in 9 days work per week in order to meet the

urgency of its orders. Bright tobaccos in 25 to 50 package lots are quoted at 22c to 40c, as to quality. Solaces at 201c to 24c, and Black at 17c to 22c. The cigar trade is steady, with a fair business doing in both imported and home brands.

Wines and Spinits.—A very fair enquiry exists for spirits, but it is chiefly on tavern account, quite a number of jobbing orders having been taken for brandies, gins and rum, at stendy rates. Sales of brandy in wood have occurred at \$3.50 for Sazerac and \$5 00 to \$5.50 for finest Cognac. There is no speculative demand, trade being confined to immediate wants. Prices are quoted steady, as follows: Brandies in cases at \$10.75 to \$11 for leading marks, and in wood at \$3.59 for common up to \$5 for finest. Januaica rum, 16 o. p., \$2 50 to \$6, as to quality.

Wood.—A few small parcels of Cape and Australian have been taken by manufacturers, the former at from 10fc to 17fc, and the latter from 19fc to 22c. Finest Australian is held as high as 29c to 30c. Canada wools are quoted as follows: A Supers 27c to 28c, and B Supers at 23c to 24c, unassorted 20c to 22c, and flucce 19c to 21c.

TORONTO WHOLESALE MARKETS.

(Revised by Telegraph.)

TORONTO, Sept. 18, 1884.

There was expected to be some advantage to trade this week, owing to low fares and the attractions of the industrial exhibition. Some of the wholesale houses report a number of visitors in consequence, but what is done is no real gain, as the business would have been transacted sooner or later, and trade is not much improved in any branch. It is now apparent, what was conjectured, that there will not be an active trade this year. Although it is not late for a general movement of grain, there are growing evidences that only where farmers are forced to sell will there be much wheat brought to market. It may be that prices will not mend much even by next May, but if there is a chance of them mending any, the farmers who are able to hold their wheat will not sell it at present prices. This will have an effect on trade, and wholesale men of the first reputation are not looking for developments beyond what they have calculated. It is even felt that payments will have to be compulsory to some extent in many cases. The situation is without parallel that the country should be full of produce which it is felt cannot be converted, for the reason given, into cash. The strain from delayed payments is growing heavier. A diminished trade would be borne as involving only a reduced income, but obligations must be only a reduced income, but obligations must be dischinged. The position of commercial men still one of difficulty. Financial matters are quite unchanged. Bank discounts are quiet rates are still 6½ to 7½ per cent on comercial paper, and it is not likely that there will be any advance. Call loans are quiet; rates on bonds and debentures and first-class security are 6 per cent. ity are 5 per cent; on loan shares 51 to 6; on bank shares 6 to 61 per cent. Boots and Shors.—The same quiet that is felt in many other branches of trade is experienced in this business. The country trade is still very quiet. Orders are small, but there is a growing slight improvement. Winter goods are certain to be wanted, but country dealers seem to be inclined to give their orders more frequently and for small lots. The trade has not been satisfactory for a year past. Profits are cut down by close competition, and heavy expenses.

COAL OIL.—There is a good demand, and prices are very firm. Common refined is quoted at 16½c to 17c, according to bulk of purchase. Carbon safety selling at 19½c. Crude oil in Petrolia is still very dull, quoted at 80c to 85c per barrel. American oil is unchanged, with trade not so brisk. Prime is quoted at 23½c and water white at 27c per gallon.

CATTLE TRADE—Trade has been rather quieter for export cattle during the past week. The general condition of the cattle has been scarcely up to what it was during the summer months, owing to scarcity of grass. God shipping cattle have sold at \$5 to \$5.25 per 100 lbs., live weight. The local market has been well supplied with a fair quality of brasts. Prices have been steady. Fair to good beasts bring \$4 to \$1.25 per 100 lbs, and light cattle and cows from \$25 to \$30 per head. Export sheep bring 4c, and ordinary sheep \$4 to \$5 per head. Lambs plentiful at \$2.50 to \$3.30 per head. Rogs scarce at \$6 per 100 lbs., live weight.

Day Goods.—Trade is not active, but there have been a larger number of visitors in during the week. It is observed that orders are generally of a mere sorting-up description. A fair trade is expected, but orders will be distributed over the months to come at short intervals. The cost of keeping travellers on the road is becoming a question to be discussed for some mouths to come.

Daugs.-Business is reported to be satisfactory in some lines, and altogether about as good as is looked for at this season, some observations are made, however, about payments rather feeling behind. Prices are generally steady, with only slight changes where such have occurred. quotations. No. 2 Spring is quoted at 85c and No. 2 Fall at 80c to 81c; No. 3 at 78c, and goose wheat at 68c. The opinion among grain merchants is that prices will be lower. Barley is still quiet. Prices almost nominal, at 62c to 63c for No. 2, and 57c and 58c for 3 extra. The movement of barley is expected with some certainty by the end of the month. Prices are not considered to bar the movement. Oats in light demand, and prices are weak; sales of new outs are made at 36c on the track. Rye is quoted nominal at 65c, stocks of grain are 65,410 bushels, of which 53,000 bushels is wheat.

GROCKRIES.—Business is moderate, that is, reported not so good as is small at this season ordinarily. As it is in every other branch of trade, orders are small, though frequent. There is a prospect of better demand for heavy lines but in no case is an active trade looked for. There are two or three houses that report the year's business as quite equal to that of 1883, but the majority report that sales have been below the average, and in some lines the decline in prices has caused a loss. The remaining portion of the year is not promising to make up the deficiencies arising from these causes. Prices are steady at recent quotations. Tens are steady, moderate demand, prices firm.

Hardwark.—The volume of trade is not large but there is a steady in-coming of small orders which reaches to moderate business. Anything beyond that is not expected this season, but the opinion is that it will be a fair average trade. Prices are still considered low shur remain steady. Quotations are: Ares, \$7.75 to \$10.50 per box; wire fencing Ic to Ide: Canada plates \$3.00 to \$3.10; Cut nails \$2.85, \$3.10, \$3.35 \$3.85; Am. patterns \$2.60, \$4.35. Copper, ingot 17c to 19c, sheet 25c to 26c, bar 30c to 33c. Gaivanized iron 5c to 7c as per No. Bar iron \$1.90 to \$2.60 for Nova Sectia; \$1.85 to \$1.90 for ordinary; \$2.50 to \$2.60 for hoops and bands. Pig iron quoted at \$18.00 to \$10.00 for Glengarnock, and \$19.00 to \$20.00 for other brands. Lead, pig 3½c to 4c, bar 5c to 5½c.

sheet 4bc to 5c, shot 6c. Rope, manilla 10½c to 11c, Russia 14c to 16c, Sisal 7c. White lead \$1.50 to \$1.80. Tin, bar 26c to 27c, solder 17c to 18c, ingot 22½c to 24c. Steel, cast 12½c to 13c, roller plate 3½c to 4c, sleigh shoe 2½c. Window glass \$2.00, \$2.10, \$2.40, \$3.60, as per size. Tin plates anchanged. Zine, sheet 4½c to 5½c.

Hides, Skins, Leather, etc.—It is reported that supplies of hides are being augmented by importation from the Western States. The prices are weaker since last reported. Green hides are quoted at 7½c for cows No. 1, and 8½c for steers, No. 1. Cured hides are selling to tanners at 8½c to 8¾c with outside figures weak. Cul/skins are in small offering and prices entirely unchanged, buying green at 13c for No. 1, and 11c for No. 2; selling cured at 15c for No. 1. Sheep and lamb skins are in large supply, and are taken at 60c. Leather is in somewhat better demand from country buyers, on small orders. Prices are steady and unchanged from last week's quotations. Tallow is in quiet demand; rough buying at 3½c; rendered selling at 6½c.

Provisions, &c.—Wholesale trade is quiet. The local market is well supplied. Prices are steady, and generally without change. *Meats* are in light demand, and stocks also are light.
