Involts of dry goods for the month of Junc show a heayy decrenso，and the late statement confirms the opinion previously expressed that importers havo been operating on a ro－ duced and more cautious ecale．Thio value of the importh of cottons，fancy goods，hats，silk and wollens for the six months ending June 30 was $\$ 4,373,814$ ，ngainst $\$ 5,182,636$ for the game timo last year．
Aulan O．Baken，goneral storekeejer，of Woodlands，Ont．，has been compelled to nesign．His habilities are about $\$ 3,500$ and the assets some $\$ 2,000$ ．He lays his failure to the fact that the short line of tho O．P．R． has diverted truffic from the frontier towns and possibly this has had somothing to do with it，allhough hard tinies and loug credits have probably had moro．

Tue craze for conversion has struck Ottawa， and the mayor hans formulatod a soheme to convert Ottawa 6 per conts．into 4 per cents． He states that besider giving Ottawa a high oredit here the scheme will afford the corpora tion about $\$ 400,000$ available funds．The aunual charge，fucluding the sinking fund， for oxtinguisuing the total debt in forty yenrs will bo $\$ 23,000$ less chan at present．

Kniam and Yance，the alleged comitor－ felters arrested in Toronto some time ago； will turn Quecu＇s evidonce and testify against the suspects in London and in Snruia，W， 0 ． Parsons，who was arrested at Thedford，is al－ leged，to bo an accomplice Ho was at one time a town conincilor of that place，and thero was found in his house nad on his person
about six handred dollars in bills and Ameri－ can silver．
Tre sheriff of the county of Oarleton has been appointed reeciver of the surplus money remaining after sale of the stock of Peter Valiquette，Ottawa，in the hands of the chattel mortgagee，Joseph Horsfall，of Montreal．The money will be distributed under the provistons of the Creditore＇Relief Act．The heavy wind atorm of last weok did much damage to property and crops in the vicinity of Ottawa．
Tres Cuban budget for 1888－89，which was enforced on the lst instant，contains a clause， according to which a duty of $\$ 1$ will be hereafter levied on cach thousand kilograms of goods landed at or shipped from all the ports of the ［sland，as a contribution in belalf of the local Boards of the ports．：As far as sugar，molasses， tobacco and other Cuban products are con－ cerned，this measure may be considered as the re－establishment of export duties．
IT is reported by the committee appointed by the Newfoundland Governinent to onquire into the condition of tho fisheries that there 18 an alarming decline in the shore cod fish－ cries：that the great bays which wore onco teeming with cod nie now comparatively de－ pleted，and that the seal，salmon and herring fishories show a corresponding decline．The remedies proposed are strict supervision of the fishing grounds and the propagation of fish by artificial means．
If recent advices are correct，thers are good： reasons for the strong position of Barbadoes molasses，nutside of any presumed corncring tretics．$U_{j}$ to the middle of June only $28,000^{\circ}$ puncheons had been shipped from the Islands， and if it is true that almost the entire produc－ tion has beon shipped，wo must be prepared for a serious shortage．The usual export is from $-35,000$ to 40,000 punclicons，Which would indicate n deficiency in the crop of from 7000 to 12,000 puncheons for this year．

THE PROVINCIAL DEBT.
It is the fate of all financial questiong; capable of being discussed from a political standpoint, to meet with unsparing denunciation or unmorited praise, according to the partisau feeling of the papor disciossing its merits. To a political editor every departure baving the least: savor of politics is judged by the rigorous standard of party expediency. The opinions of the men best qualiffed to judge of the matter are either not solicited, or are so garbled: to meet the exigencies of partisan requirements: as to be really misleading, and, consequently, the general public, whose only information is derived from this source, receive only a distorted version of the measure, in which the real import is manipulated eithor in its favor or prejudice according to the political bias of the paper thiey affect:
The scheme for the conversion of the Quebec Provincial debt is no exception to this general rule The Liberal papers asertithieir admiration of Mr. Shekyn's marvelloue ability as a financier; and com-
pare the author of the resolntions to convert the present liabilities of the Province into a four per cent loan to the successful converter of the British consols. The Conservative journals, on their hand, denounce the measure as a practical act of repudiation; speak in woeful terms of Quebec's dishonor, and call upon the:Dominion Parliament to disallow the bill in the interests of Canadian credit. As usual, the trath lies, somewhere between the two, and the duty of the non-political press is to point out where it existr.

The argument of the opponents of the measure is based entirely upon the theory that forced conversion will ibe insiated upon. They state that an enforced surrender of the bonds at par will be the policy pursued, notwithstanding that much of the existing five per cents have been purchased at a considerable premium. Such a despotic procesding would undoubtedly be most arbitrary and unjust. It would, in fact, be a measure of partial repudiation, since it would compel the bondholder not only to accept a lower rate of interest than the one he covenanted for, or to receive the capital of a bond not: yet due; but would also inflict upon him the loss of the premium he had paid under the distinct understanding that the bond. he purchased should bear a certain fixed interest. That any such course as this is even contemplated, we cannot believe. It is understood that a written undertaking has been given in the Legislative Council that no forced conversion, will bo attempted, and, although too mach reliance should not be placed onispolitical pledges, it seems to us that clause 8 , which provides-
"That it shall be lawful for the Lieuten-ant-Governor in Council to effect conversion of thie present public debt by exchange of new obligations for those already in existence, and to eflect such exchange at such a rate of premium as may be agreed upon with the holder thereof, and; if necessary, to grant a discount on new debentures equal to that at which they might be sold for cash;",
certainly alludes to negotiation with the bondholder as to the price at which he shall agree to receive the new four per cent stock, and, consequently, forbids any resort to enforced conversion.
If this clause holds, and we do not see why it should not, it is open to both parties to make their own bargain, and the conversion becomes merely a matter of agreement betiveen the Government and the present holders. As in the case of the British consols, a certain degree of coercion is necessary iu ordor to prevent bondholders from refusing to negotiate at all, and thue hopelessly blocking the scheme; but this measure of coercion does notin any senseamount to enforced conversion, and hence cannot be considered a dishonorable act.

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urally feel independent, and are uñwilling to accept any declino. : On the other hand buyers aro not inclinod to make efforts in the direction of big deals, as any such move would speedily sand prices 'above their reach, and they do not wish to soar too high above English prices. There' is "steady buying going on, and it is not a quiet market by any moans, excopt in comparison with recent events. A dealer lately returned says that the further west a travellor goes the worse the country looks from the effects of the drought, and this Province is quite a contrast in this particular. Some parts of the Ingersoll district have, however, done remarkably well. The shrinkage is making itself apparent in the relative amillness of the shipmenta from Montroal and Now York, and there are other facts which tend tosupport the mar. ket. It is stated on reliable authority that there is no cheese in store west of 'Toronto, whorens last year the supply was 40,000 boxes. The American markets, which lave been more largely influenced than ever by our own, have ruled strong this wook, and the drought has been more pronounced than on this side. The prospects certainly favor paying prices for the balance of the season.
"The discouraging words "butter is a dead article". was the reply of an exporter to an enquiry about butter and the eflorts of recent yoars to revive the export trade in that articlo seems to have fniled of its object. It would be wearisome to agnin recount the causes which have led to this. Most of those interviowed sunmed up the position about as follows:-"Cheese pays better and the English people got cheap, fresh, sweet butter from neir by points, principally from Ireland and the continent." The notable fact, however, remains that Canadian buttor was once largely exported.: Canadians have really been driven out of the market by European competition and it remains to be seen whether they cannot regain lost ground by closer attontion to improved methods of production and transporiation. So indifferent are larmers to butter making that many of thom send all thoir milk to the cheose factory and buy butter for their. own households. From difforent sources reports come of the dilliculty of buying butter in the conntry even at tho highest city prices. The latost nows to this effect comes from Gammonue which ought to bo a good butter district. Creamory buttor, of course, is an oxception but not much of that has beon shippod. Recently, purchases have been made in the city at $109 \mathrm{c} @ 20 \mathrm{c}$, but the rango is from 10 c upwards. Some local business has boen done in Townships butter at 18c@10c and in wostorn at 10colic. Thore is litulo. Morrisburg here and it ispominally worth

17c@18c. "Brockville butter"" wás once clebrated and was one of the slandard quotations, but 3rockville is no longer a butter country, it is a cheese district and Brockville butter is practically extinct. Last market day Brockville boarded 15,000 boxes of cheese and it is scarcely necessary to add that little milk was left for butter making. Thë local trado has taken a large quantity of butter at fair prices, a city of 200,000 being no small consumer as a large dealer well romarked. So far as the export trade is concerned there is little prospect of improvement as an unusual quantity of rain has fallen both in the British Isles and on the Continent, and the make has consequently been above the average. The Continental makers seem to be gradually driving Irish butter out of the English market. A full acquaintance with Europenn methods and government aid and supervision similar to that given by Ontario' to the cheese interest would very probably raise the butter industry of Canada to its former position and importance.

## THE REBATE EVIL,

The practice of life assurance agènts granting a rebate to the insured of partiof the first year's premium has fortunately not yet reached the proportions in this country that it has with our neighbours across the line; but at the same time to asigert that it does not exist would be only to hug ourselves in false security. The practice doese exist ; and like all demoralizing practices it has a distinct téndency to grow, and, therefore, it would be well if Canadian companies kept a careful watch upon their agents and discouraged by overy means in their power $n$ practice which, in the long run, will inflict severe damage upon the very interests it is supposed to for ward.

It must be remembered that in most cases the ordinary insurance canvasser depends upon the commission on the first year's premium for his sole compensation for his labor Renewals are of no ndvantage to him pecuniarily. Conseguently, the larger proportion of new business he can bring in the botter it is for his own interests. In times like this he finds it difficult, to secure new business, and therefore, in order to tempt possible insurers to give bim the preference, he cuts iprices, like any, other salesman, by allowing the person he solicits to share a portion of his, commission in the form of a robate upon the frst year's premium. He argues, and with someshow of justice, that this commission his own, and that he congequently can do what he likes with it. He points out that the company (theoreti-: cally at lenst) loses nothing by this practice and holds that it is none of their
business how he disposes of the money he has fairly earned.

In all this there is a good deal of truth; but at the same time we cannot overlook the great damage done to the cause of insurance by the demoralizing effect it pro-: duces upon the insiring public. The public argue that if the canvasser can afford to give up a proportion of his earninge the' profts of insurance must be onorinous; and that they are consequently paying too high for their safeguard. They think that if the first year's premium is put at a certain figure there is no reason why this rate should not rule indefinitely, and the: impression is left upon their minds that the company has in some mysterious way "got ahead" of them." The real truth is, that no policy can be said to be even selfsupporting until it has been in force for at least three years, and that the commission allowed on the first years premium, and: all dividends paid prior to the expiry of the tiree years' term, are simply paid out on the expectation of future profits from the continuance of the policy which only too often never materialize, But the public does not consider this. More; in many cases they do not even believe that the: igent loses the rebate thimself, but think that the company recoup him nesome manner such as by making him anextra allowance for expenses-an impression which, we are sorry to may; is not always. incorrect,
Again, many men, arguing from butininess and traffic methods, believe that a man who takes a largo amount of insurance Bhould receive some concession from the rates paid by the man who only carries one thousand. When buying in wholesale lots they derive a distinct advantage over. the small purchaser, and wen giipping in car lots they obtain lower rates than. the package shipper; why then, they 1 think sbould not 4 similar condition of affairs prevail in insurance? Thé reply is simply because the premium charged is. based upon $\$ 1,000$ of insurance, and muiti: plying the amount simply miltiplies the risk in exactly commensurateratio, But both these popular fallacies tehd to make the public discontented apdat suspicious, and consequently the frist iilver-tongued canvaser whocomes along has little difhculty in rendering them dissatisfed with the company they are in, and in inducing them to drop their policies in favor of the one he represents.
The practice of robates is then a distinct evil, and therefore one for which a remedy should at once be sought. In the United. States combinations or associations of ggents have been formed for its suppression, but as yet their efforts have been? crowned with obly a very meagre measure of succese In this country fithe present stagnation in trade, and the consequent
reluctance to part with ready money, or to assume any additional obligation on the part of the public, have naturally increased the severity of competition among life insirance canvassers. Under these ciroumstances, practices like the one in question natarally flourish, and are often winked at, if not directly encouraged - at all events, by some of the companies. Until more prosperous times come for the canvassers we must expect to see rebates continue, but at the same time it would be well tor the companies to discourage as far as possible a practice whose results will simply recoil upon their own heads.

## FASHION NOTES.

We are glad to note the revival of fashionable interest in linen dress goods No cooler or more pleasant wearithan linen can be possibly imaginedfor-hot weather, and now that it has received the stamp of fashion we shall see it generally worn. Linen goods are durable and launder well, recovering their original fresbness better than cottons. They are thus better adapted for hot weather wear as their wearing qualities permit of more frequent visits to the washtub without injury.
The nevest goodis in linen have a sliglt admixture of cotton. Thus the new liñon damasses, woven like gingham but following the prints in their designs, have the colored threads of cotton because this textile dyos far better, bringing out the colors brighter and more easily. Stripes, checles, and plaids prevail, but fancy figures are also shown, as well as color combinations: Linon ginghames are also worn, principaly for moraing wear where a cool durable material is required. For children's wear (especially for little boy's blouses and waists) all-linen woven goods are far pre ferable to percales or linen cambrics. They are the most durable of their kind and are well fitted to stand the wear and tear they are sure to be subjected to.
In tho linen lawns we notice a strong feeling for blue Blue flowers on white are most called for, and some of our local merchants were early sold out of these Ines. Someabyers prefer Irish lavns because they aredzavier than the French, but on the otherthand the patterns on the latter are far more brililiant in coloring and more dainty in conception. White linen Jawn dresses ate al ways with us, and can be purchased of every degree of fineness: They are sheer and cool looking and when simply made up are very becoming.

A favorite model for making up these dresses is to havo three deep flounces coyering a plain skirti The bodice may bo eithera short close fitting basque, or a surplice vaist worn with a wide sash. $A$ full back drapery, cut square, and draped by tapes on the under side, is usally pre: ferred, as these dresses are oxceptionally
convonient for the washerwoman. In fact: in all fashionable costumes simplicity isi the order of the day although we cannot perceive any difference in the price charged for making them, Dresses are made plain, with yery little trimmings and that put on fat Very little drapery is now worn either with silk or fancy woolen material Stripes are chiefly used for skirts, also for long-waisted jacket bodies, but never for the round-waisted corsage, which requires a plain material with very soft tisaues, such as veiling crepon or surah. The skirt is put on in gathers and trimmed with limp puftingeand very light draperieg:
It is very diffecult at present to get any direct opinion from the leading dressmakersas to the future of the tournure. Most of them prefer to say nothing until they return from Paris in the fall. No doult Mrs. Cleveland's action will have an accelerating effect upon its departure, but it must be renombered that it has been growing smaller for some time past. In house dressesit has already gone out; but for walking didresses it still has many friends, and the probabilities are that it will die hard. It is useful to make adress set well; it takes the weight of a heavy dress of the hip, sand it gives greater freedom in walking., These are three points in its favor that may secure its retention in a much reduced formpot on the other hand substitutes are already being brought in. Sets of reeds of graduated sizes are now sold to be sewed into the back of the skirt. Whether, as stated in the sald history - with its disreputable attack upon a whole people tho ancestors of the distin guished visitor paid at one time a goodly sum to the deputed off. cors of the Hohenzollerns- under their tyrannical mandate- $m$ order to securo something better than the usuall vile nicknames forced upon others, or that he inherited it from the lion of the tribe - is not rocorded, at allevents? the son although of royal propertions in only one respect, has, while in Montreal, conducted himself with the grace or a Prince 0 tho, and disponsed hie hospitality as freely as though the luxurios neyor gaw the ingide of a bonded warehouse, Ere long he knew ovory customer of the hotel by gight, and addrossed people familiarly by namel who supposed thes

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had met him some where before, The olyject Qf his frequent visits from New Yorl wasoccassionally the sulject of romark, Nobody ever saw him do any business; but his knowledge of cigars bespoke noro than the experience of a nere consumer, Some tro or three years ago, a dispute or two wilh the customs authorities drew spocial attention to the importation of a cheap class of Havnna cigars going on for some time before. An example or tivo was deemed nocessary, and goods of a like grade - or worse, if possible - continued to arrive and pay the duty The appraisers had grown so accustomed to the outry of this Low class of goods that all suspicion of a change in quality was luiled, and had the importation of about a week ago beon entered at the old rate, it is probable that there would be no seizure to chronicle. As soon as at tention was directed to the great apparont difference in quality, a more critical examination was dcemed ndrisablo, ahd it, was estimated, after due allowance for reshipment, etc, that the market value of tho cigars was from 60 to 80 per cent. over the price at which they had been entercd. of the total seizure-somewhat under $40,000-$ vo loarn that one-sixth of the invoice if properly entored, would almost cover the whole entry as actually, made The ontry was en blocto borrow a term from the iliquidators- and was made in the usual way ty the consignees, a frm of manufacturere of st Paul Streel Whom those behind the scenes are siurprised to find in such a role. Whatever affidavits may be forthcoming in the matter, it is thot improbable that the seizure will bo maintained in ottawn; and the taking of such ${ }^{\circ}$ step precludes furihar interferenco by the oftcefe of the port The presumption that the cigars are from old oxhausted. or flavorless; tock in New York can be readily tested -by an examination of the ship and date of shipment from Havana to New Yerk, to be found, as is well known, wencath the ubual outside stamp or label which with a little care can bo romoved; we regret to say that buch a tese is not likely to add to the character of the venture.
The "educated taste" of lato years and the luxurious habits of our wealthy citizens havo led to the demand for rore expensive importations In this line, and it was doubtless in his endeavor to cater for this chnnge of tasto or purse with a more tha due regard to the principles of Political Economy-which fs re cently defined as "enlightened selfintorest" - that the lion fell into the toils in which he and his consignees now find thomselves entangled, The latter are reported to repudiate any bhare in the transaction.

## THE OROPS IN ONTARIO:

Nothing can possibly be more diversified than the present condition of; the crops, in Ontario. We learn from the London Fred Prese that the continual variation of tho tom. poritura and the froable ralins in that dis.
trict, have accelerated a normal plant growth. The whent crop there is now fully developed, and on high dry lands it is in the "yellow." There is no appearance of nuy injurious insects and $_{\text {and }}$ to all appearances the fall wheat here will be a fair average crop, and in other places a large crop. Haying has commenced, and soveral fields of clover are now cut. The lato rains have worked marvels, and if anything some of the oats and barley are too heavy. Tho straw is immonse. The peas. are the greategt crop ever seen in the neighborhood. With regard to roots the acreage is large, and as to potatocs the crop will be phenomenal. Stook are in excellent condition from the luxuriant pasture. The solling crops are good, and full provision has been made for better stable feeding. The machine men say they have had a good season, and furmors are sanguine of a largo and prosperous harvest. For the important district round London then the crops are, if anything, exceptionalIy good; but the condition of affairs elsowhere is by no means so promising. Talking next the Meaford Monitor wo find a very different condtion of affurs provailing in the county of Groy. ${ }^{\mid}$The Alonitor bays:-

It is useless further to disguise the fact that the country is now suffering from one of the severest droughts that has ever taken placo in Ontrivio. In many high-lying places the erops will almost be a comploto failure, as now, even if rain should come, "the corn in thio car" is so badly stunted that nothing like oven an average crop can be expected. It miny be true that in somo localities crops look well, as frequent showers have fallon during the past month. No doubt this may be truo in some places which happened to catch a fow local thundor storms, but wo do not believe it is the case to any great extent, ne tho facts to be gleaned from our exchanges íidicate geneorally just about the bamu degree of drought, if not greater, than is experienced in this section. Numerous fields of hay are now eut and housed in St. Vincent, which will not average half a ton to the nere, and we havo scen flelds of spring wheat in tho northern section, the ears of which will not average more than înch long-in fact will not yiold more lhath the seed sown. in the spring. The root crops will also be very much a failure. Tlurnips in particular require moisture to -ctart them, and as that has not been forthcoming, their fallure is suro.
This mournful intolligence is amply corroborated by travellers in the county, who state that practical business mon recommend the farmers of the district to sell off thoir cattle as fast as thoy prudently can; to cut as low as possible both of grass and grain, and mako free use of the cutting-box in feeding their stock; to avoid, if possible, running bills, at the store; and to practise economy.
A bimilar condition of affatrs prevails in Nastorn Ontario. In a letter from a prominont farmer of Frontonao county to the Nail he bays:-

I have been farming hore for twonty-two years, nad can conscientiously say this is the worst season I havo over experienced. The drouglit is worse with us thind it was last year, and it was bad enough then. If you will look at the Klagston papers you will seo an account of farmers going from hero into.
the city to look for labourers jobs. "Their crops are gone, and they must live somehosp. The wells and creeke are nearly dry and tho pastures are in a worse condition than I have ever before known them to be in.-. The hay crop his been a failure, and as the ground is completoly baked, roots 'will not amount to anything. I am willing to sell mino to day for the price of the seed.

Theso oxtracts show tho rarying climatio conditions that have preyailed in the various counties of Ontario, and"consequantly the difficulty of making nay reliable estimate of the total crop. Unfortunately no general report from every county is obtnined, but so far as we can at present judge the crop of the Whole province will be an average one; the oxceptional yield of some sections being counterbalanced by the failure of the crops in others.

## ANOTHER CUSTOMS OASE.

Our Olifton correspondent sends in the following account of-a Customs soizure at that point:-Shortly after the late change in the Customs regulation respecting the importation of paper, a merchant at the port of Clifton imported a small quantity of wall paper, and not being familiar with the Oustoms regulations applicable to his case, ho reked the Customs officials of the port to classify the different qualities of the paper and lot him know what duty he should pay, and he would pay it. The officers undertook and accomplished the elassification; and tho Customs broker perfected the entry of the goods, and the morchant paid the sum de:manded and took the paper to his store. Not long after this the merchant concluded some of his paper had been classified too high, and spoke to the Collector about it. Tho upshot was, tho Customs anthorities of the port sont samples of the papers imported to Ottawa, and upon investigation there it was decided that some of tho paper had been graded too high and some too low. Theresult was, the whole consignment was seized, and the store would have been locked up if the mercliant had not put up the amount demanded-somo \$60. Upon balancing the amount overpaid agniust the shortago, there appeared to be due the Government only, a few conts; yet, although the mistake was the mistake of the Customs officers themselves, the merchant could not be permitted to pay the difference, but had to submit to the annoyance of a scizure, and, so far, to the loss of his deposit. This appears to be a repotition of the "Ayer", case on a small scalo. Such arbitrary injustice wonld not bo tolerated in any business affirs betveen individuals.

## UNION BANK OF OANADA.

The report read at the twenty-third annual goneral meoting of the shareholders of tho Union Bank of Canada discloses an amount of progress during the past year that cannot fail to be gratifying to tho bureholders. Tho carnings of the banls omounted to 10 per cent. upon the paid-up capital in spite of tho
very unfavorable conditions prevailing and out of this, after paying the usual dividend of six per cont., tho directors have boen onabled to add $\$ 50,000$ to tho lest and to carry forward $\$ 20,343$ to the new year. The action of the bank in oponing agencies in Ontario in order to secure a share of the -business of that energetic province has been fully justified by the result, and there can be no doult that the now brańch at Toronto will "bs a powerfíl assistance in this direction. The management of the bank seems to have been all that could havo been desired, and the fact that such good results are shown under very unfavorable circumstances entitles the offcials to the thanks of the shareholders.

Ir now appears that the whole credit of the capture of the defanlter Pitcher is due to the promptitude and onergy displayed by Mr. Tdward Rawlings, Manager of the Guarantee Company of North America. It seems Pitcher was within an ace of getting off, and would doubtless have had a good time in Europe, if Mr. Rawlings had not happened to see his name in a telegraphic despatch from Providence in the papers to the effect that he had absconded from the Union Bank of that city with a considerable amount. ' He then remembered that his name was on the books, and at once had the matter lcoked up, and found that the Company had issaci a fidelity bond for $\$ 2,500$ on his bohalf He immediately put the matter into the hands of his special detective, who was at once sent out to scour the city for him. The detective who made the capture made a tour of the banks and brokers' offices, as he knew that if he was in town ho would try to. change money. He went to Messrs. Brais \& Terroux's, where he found that a person answering to Pitcher's description had purchased a draft on Paris. through the Hochelaga Bank. Immediately upon learning this, Mr. Rawlings hurricd over to the bank, and was only just in time, as they wera about to take off the wrappers of the original bills stolen from the bank. He cried, "Hold the money !" and gave them his cheque for the amount. If those bills bad been distributed it would have been impossible to identify them, and Pitcher reckoned upon that. Tho bills were then counted, Bealed and handed to the police: Mr. Rawlings identified the hand-writing of the defaulter, as it appeared in the application for the guarante in the Company's office with the eignature. "James A. Roberts" with which ho registered at the Hall. Without this they could not have arrested him, as thoy had no positive means. of identifying him. It was on these bills that the committal has taken place. This offence is punishable with from 10 to 14 . years penitentiary, and it is tho intention of the Guarantee Co as well as the bank to give Mr. Pitcher the fullest benefit of Onadian. justice in this respect, and thus it is hoped to read a lésBon to any other gentlemen on
the other side of the line who may be contemplating a journey over here with their employers' property It may also point a moral to banks and corporations generally in the United States as to the advisability of having some part of the security on thair emplojees, placed in the Guarantee Company of North Americh not only because their protection will be thereby ensured to the extant of the comparatively 6 mall bond that they may require, but because the full force of the Company's organization will be placed at their service for the recovery of whatever plunder they may be despoiled of:

Mr. Justicencracuon has delivered his judg. ment in the cases of the Canada Pormanent Loan and Savings Company v. Royal Canadian Insiurance Company and the Canadian Permanent Lọan and Savings Oompany v. North British \& Mercantile Insurance 'Co'y. The two cases were argued together before his Lordship at the spring Ohancery sittings on the points of law raised, it having been agreed by counsel that sliould be firat disposed of, as their settlement would probably do away with the necessity of going into the questions of fact. The plaintiffs in both cases Were the mortgagees of proporty upon which. the defendants accepted risks, and sought to recover the full amount of policies made pay-able to them, while the defendants admitted the insurance and the destruction of the proporty, but contended that by the terms of the agreement between them and the insured. they were only liable for a ratable proportion of the amount of their policies Fivo other companies were also indirectly interested as haviog taken rikks upon the sámo property, but were not parties to either action. Mr. Justice Ferguson held that the insurance companies trere only liable for a ratable portion of thoir policies, and could not bo compelled to pay the full amount. . His Lordghip made no direction as to the costs of the action, which it is presumed will be awarded to the defendants. As counsel at the trial had agreed to accept the holding of the judgo as to the point in dispute, and to settle the amounc to which the plaintiffe are entitled botween themselves, no direction was made as to the specific sum to which the plaintiffs are entitled.

In a thoroughly practical letter upon the oxport cattle trade, Mr. Frankland points out the error committed by shippers in neglecting to first fatten the beasts they send over to the English market, and in sending them away light in flest, small in body, and long in leg. No doubt it ig a great mistake for our farmers. to part with their lean cattle, even when of the best description, both in breed, color and shape for the Scotch farmers to finish, and bring into market in opposition to the Canadiang, When they would realize a far better roturn had thoy been properly fattened before shipment. No farmer within 600 miles of
this port aliould removo one single animal from his farm for export until it is fat, then it will have returned to the lands all and more than it lias cost the farmer to feed it, by, by enriching the well-prepared manure heap, without which no kind of agrioultura can prosper Our shippers have one adÿantage over most of their competitors: The clean bill of health that Canada possesses gives her the privilege of solling her cattle in every market in Britain, and if proper care was exarcised, with a little more pluck and determination, the shipments leaving Montreal would leave a fair profitable balance at the end of the year. With this in theirfavor, and proper attention given to the condition of the cattle -shipped; thore is no reason why Oanadian exporters should not' be able to make a good living. It has been the neglect of these conditions that has rendered cattle shipping anremunerative, and now that they have been clearly pointed out by a practical man, it is to be lioped an improvement in this direction will take place.

Asanother catch question upon the hen-and-a-half principle is now on ito way through the press we give the query and its solution in order that our readers may be fore-warned and fore-armed. A subscriber writes to the Penman'e Journal as follows:-
"A friend asks me to multiply $\$ 5$ by $\$ 5$. I do so and announce the result as \$25. All right. Now multiply 500 cents by 500 cents, giving the anawer in cents pure and aimple, not as fractional parts of a dollar. I do so and am surprised to seo the figures climb up to 250,000 cents, which is $\$ 2500$. As $\$ 5$ and 500 cents are equivalent, the result is puzzling, It cannot be urged that decimal marks shouid be used. A cent, as such, is as distinct a unit as a dollar, and, as the result is to be announced in cents, the decimals cannot be pleaded in extenuation of the rather suprising resnlt: But there is clearly something srong. What is it.",
The answer is that it is impossible to multiply $\$ 5$ by $\$ 5$; and that the question is simply a " catch." The proper question is "multiply $\$ 5$ by $\$ 5$ and give the result." In this case the reduction of dollars to cents applies only to the $\$ 5$ thit are multiplied, and not to the multiple as well; so that the question really is "multiply 500 cents by 5 : what is the answer ?" It is 2500 cents, of course, or $\$ 25$. It would take a second Oocker to tell how much is $\$ 5$ times $\$ 5$.

Thenz are very few bummer temperance drunks that hold the popular favor for long, outside of the standard lines. Every year a number of new beverages appear and now and then one climbs to the head of the list and then suddenly drops out of sight. The latest acquisitions to the temperance bar are milk. Bhakes and phosa, Milk bhakes are of western extraction, and consist simply of milk and some fruit syrup, which are so thoroughly and rapidy shaken in tho mechanical shakers, made for the purpose, that the compound is very cold, and as the liquid is seratod, it is
palatable, It resembles a milk punch, which is ul ways a popular summer drink. Phosa is the nowest thing in prepared drinks, and has at least one adyantage, that it can be taken home or to a pionic. It is made of fruit or ginger syrup, charged like all light drinks, but it is in höry bottles which allow a very high pressure It follows on the heels of champagne cider, grape milk and lactart champagne but unless it is more fortuuate than its predecessors of the same sort, whll soon fall into oblivion.

OUR Deseronto, Ont, correspondent sends us the following notes:-It is estimated that a thousand tons of haj will have to be imported into Prince Edward county this year.There is said to bo a good quantity of barley. in the vicinity of Bath notwithstanding drought-Hay is now eighteon dollars a ton. -The farmers of this district, owing to the failure of the hay crop, are selling large num-- bers of cows and other cattle for the United States market, A good cow can be purchased from 15 to 18 dollars.-The strawberry season is over.: The supply never equalled the demand in Deseronto this year. Raspborries are scarce and the quality very poor on account of tha dey weather. -The town is rapidly filling up with summer visitors. With good opportunitics for reaching all-points on the Bay, Doseronto is found an exceedingly pleasant place in which to spend tho summer vacation-Tho grain carrying trade is almost at a stand-still on the St. Lavrence; the trade preferring the Buffalo and Now York routo which affurds cheaper rates of transportation. It Beems that there is no return cargo for vessels going swwest to Uanadian ports, while the American sveseels aro always sure of return froights. The latter can thus carry at reduced rates.-A gentleman, well posted on such matters; asserts that milk would be at least eight"cents a quart next winter.

Ir is reported the Harvey Hill copper mine in Megantio county is about to be sold to the Excelsior Copper Co, of London Eng., with a capital of $\$ 450,000$. The property comprises. 4,000 acres of land upon which twolve shafts: have been sunk Almost 3,000 acres are in fee simple, and there are 1,301 'acré of mining rightse The mines are about eight miles from Broughton station of the Q.O. R. R. to. which there is a hard bed road. The ore has assayed 80 per cent. of pure copper, the highest grade in America. Altogether the mineis considered a most valuable one, and has attracted the attention of Americon capitalists who, however, havo been distanced in the race for tes ownorship by their Britibh cousing, Wo trust that the new' company will be successful, Tho high valuo of copperis certainly in their favor and the labor given by bo largo an enterprise would matérially's benefit tho locallty.

The Cuban sugar crop situation is reviewed by the Havana Weekly Report as follows: "During the week just elapsed the wentier has been, generally sueaking, favorable to the growing crops, though the frequency and abundance of the rain showors bave forcibly interfered with the fied labor in several localities. At all the places where planters have been able to properly attend to the cultivation of the fields, the cane oxhibits a good appearance, and unlens somounexpected event should como and mar the brilliant prospects entertained regarding tho coming crop, this is likely to be quite profitable, ar far as the yield is concerned. Much netivity is boing displayed by planters on the Southern const, and it is expected that between Cienfurgos nad Guantamano several new estates will be started next yenr; whilst the productive power of those already existing will bo considerably increased."

A Napange dealer who finds fault with our sugar quotation hab not discriminated carefully between the refiner's price and the wholesilo prico. Of late, sugar has advaneed at the refinaries on several occasions fo and the wholesulers had added to to the wholesalo list on tho succeeding Saturday. Our correspondent concludes from our remarks that the wholesalers would sell at fe advance on factory prices, and it is surprising that a man In the trade should not see that fo advance on tho grocers' price list was menat. 'Tho refiner's price on the 13th inst. wns 7 ge as stated in these columns. Our correspondent had only to hurn to the tables of prices current to set the regular wholesalo price on that date, via.: $78 \sqrt{6}$ zf. We challenge our corremondent to maku good his chargo. We hope his customers will find him better able to buy to advantage.

The eivic printing seems to be always more or less of a bono of contention. Our readers will remember the Lovell-Perrault controversy, when Mr. Louis Perrault successfully ratained tho contract in spite of the attompts of Mr. John Lovell to prove that his own teuder was the lowest. Now wo lind Mr Perrault in his curn altacking Mr. Sonceal, tho present holder, in a neatly printed pamphiet, in which he asserts that in many items his own tonder was 34 per cont. lower, and that on some 88 items 80 por cent. more than the tonder prices was paid to Mr. Sonecal. Mr. Lovoll can'now watch his old antagonist, like himeelf, engaged in a hopeless contost with a more powerful rival, and can comfort himsolf with tho reflection that the whirligig of time has brought about an approprinte toveugo,
"A ruv of unknown genealogy" is what the 'Travollers' Insurance Company terms the British lion in a recent number of their: Hecord, jus circulated in the United States and Canalia. The Travollers' Company has a largo businiss in Canadn and is seoking for
more. This seems to us a strange method for them to adopt whereby to engage the sympathy and gather in the dollars of our Canadian friends. It is noticeable in the cartoon in the sheet referred to that they liken themselves to $a$ very inferior looking bloodhound, while some of their confreres in businees they designate as wolves, hoge and wild cats! This is what Scotchmen would call very conrse wut, but the Travellars' Company call it an "exquisite gem."

Hostintires have apparently recommenced between the rival tolephone companies. Some men in the employ of the Federal 'I'ulephone Company spread some wires between those of the Bell Tolepione Company, at tho corner of Conway and St. Etienne streets, which interfored with the operation of the latter company's wires. The chief of the construction department of the Bell company accordingly gave orders that these wires should be cut down, and the man putting them up was arrested. The Bell Telephone company has offered a reward of $\$ 500$ for information which will lead to the arrest of some person who has been tampering with their wires, especinlly at the cornor of St. Poter, Recollet and Wellington streets.

His many friends are sorry to learn that Mr. A. T. McCord, manager in Canada for the London Guarantee and Accident Co.; has been seriously indisposed for some time past, so much so as to incapacitate, him for business. - "When the cat is away, the mice will play," and we regret to hear that during the manager's absence from his office, matters have not been going on as satisfactory as one could wish-especially in an estabfishment devoted to the insuring of faithful service. The rocent temporary rupture with the Montreal branch-attributed to the officiousness of a clerk in the Toronto office-resulted in the transfor of the business of tho Jacques Cartier Bank to a compiǹ̀y across. the border.

Thens are over 225 actions now pending agninst this city, among the most important being those of Messrs. Lemoine and Allan, olaiming compensation for property of the mountain. About $\$ 400,000$ is involved in these two claims nlone. There are also the Albattoir casen for not carrying out the slaughteriug aud market by-laws, involving somelhing between $\$ 40,000$ and 50,000 . If the city should happen to lose theso cases there would be a considerable loss of nanual revenue in addition to tho cost of the suits. About $\$ 200,000$ is being adjudicated upon for oxproprintions for streets and the claime in connection with St. Gabriel leveo; amounting to $\$ 125,000$ are also being considered.

Anotier grievance arising from the Customs interpretation of the tarifis put forward. Mave sugar8, as thoy are landed at the refinery,
contain only 90 per cent. of pure sugar. The other 10 per cent. is half water, half impuritier. The impurities are bits of stick, dirt and so forth, that get into the sugar in its making. The custom house inspectors weigh the sugar, hogakead and all Tliey deduct the tare of the hogshead, but make no allowance for that 5 per cent. of dirt that is a total losis, since the residue is absolutely worthless even for a fertilizer. Now this dead loss has to be put on the cost of refining sugar, and it amounts to quite an item in the cost.

Tee Departmont of Inland Revenue has issued new regulations respecting the manufacture of vivegar in bond. The object is to do away with tlie manufacture in bond of everything in which alcohol is used, with the exception of vinegar and crude fulminates. The standard of vinegar has been changed from twenty-eight to twenty-five gallons of spirits to 100 gallons of vinegar. The new regulations will fortify the department and prevent such frauds as have already come under the observation of officers. Some of the manufacturers have used other ingredients in the manufactue of vinegar and saved the spirits, which they bave on their hands, free of duty.

Accordrict to the English papers which arrived this week, the root crops and fruit trees there are suffering severely from tho attacks of insecta. The carrion bectle is ravaging the mangolds and beets, the turnip fly the turnip crops, while catorpillars are threatoning the fruit crops in many districts. The Times of June 25th says: "In the valley of Evesham scores, of acres hold sad-looking trees, leafless, and without hope of fruit,". while "Scarce a week passes but other orchards are visited by the dovouring hordes." O 10 grower had the promise of nearly 4,000 bushels of the famed Pershore plums. The insect came, and he will not haye a dollar's worth.

One life insurance compray has bit upon a movel plan to extend its businese in this city. An advertisement was inserted in the daily papers offering loans on salaries without: publicity. Applicants for loans were informed that they could not bo granted unless they took out policies for large sums in the specified insurance company. One accountant who applied for a loan of $\$ 250$ was informed as a prelininary that he must tako out a policy for $\$ 5,000$ in this company. As the gentleman in question was over 40 years of nge, he felt the premium would make too large a hole in the loan and so dellined the offer.

Canving machines, each of them capable of doing the work of eight to ten men have been introduced into tho Pullman carishops in Illinois as a consequence of the recent strike, and it is claimed, with success. The machinos work from a pattern, proviously made by hand, which is placed in the centio.

A "needle" is made to follow all the curves; eto., of the patterij; and chisels on the end of arms at each side make duplicates of the pattern. These machines, the superintendent Eays, will largely supersede handwork and at the cume time indure uniformity.

C Bratrisn trade with every one of the colonies, Oaneda excepted, increased during the first quarter of $1888{ }^{\circ}$. In the first three monthe of 1887 the imports from the colonies were valued at $£_{19,750,968 ;}$ in the first three months of 1888 they were placed at $£ 23,742$, 057 , an increase of $£ 3,991,089 . \cdots$ In 1887, during the same period, the exports to the colonies were $£ 19,242,915$, and in 1888, $£ 20,787,070$, an increase of $\mathbf{£ 1}, 544,155$, The total increase in the trade was $\mathbf{X} 5,535 ; 244$. The imports from Ganada decrcased by $£ 8,266$, and the exports to Oanada by $£ 307,983$.

There was no little excitement at the lumber mills at the Chaudiore, Ottawa, ón Friday last. The cmployees of J. R. Booth vero on strike, demanding $\$ 1.25$ per day wages in the stead of $\$ 6.50$ pai week as heretofore. The city police were called in and some arrests made, and after a great deal of diffeulty quiet was restored and the men returned to work. It is probable that an amicable arrangement will be made without any renewal of hostility. A general strike at the Chaudiore would be a very serious affair at this time of the year.

Dealens in honey predict a scarcity this year in Ontario owing to the long drought. A moro favorable view is taken, however, by bee-keepers in the Ottawa Valley, who, while they estimate that honey will be a short crop, refuse to believe that it can be as bad as 1882 . Meanwhile prices are firm, espècially for comb honey. Like the bay crop, probably, the prospects vary in different parts of tho country, and it is not easy to say what the aggregate result will be.

The Onicago Board of Trade statoment shows that the east-bound shipments by railroad last week were 31,966 tons, against 35,900 tons in the previous week, and 42,000 . tons in the same week last year. Deducting 8,733 tons for articles not reported last ycar, and the comparison properly stands 23,133 tons last week, against 42,000 tons last yenr, a decrease of 18,867 tons. of 6,072 tons dressed beef the Grand Trunk got 2,194 and Chicago \& Atlantic 1,004: The weak roads still lead in point of tonnage carried.

A Siangial correspondent writes to London that the Chinese authorities do not take very greatly to heart the exclusion of Monogolian emigrants from British colonies, and indeed it has always been their policy to keep their people at home. At the samo timeitappears that they are inclined to make use of the contro: versy to obtain other concessions upon which thoy set a higher value Chinese diploma tists are by no means void of shrewdness and ingenuity.

Ten business cf meat prodaction on the rich and valuable Iands of the central West is passing through a season of embarrassment and discouragement: Many prairio farms aro this year not more than half stocked, and tens. of thousands of acres of the finest pasture, much of it the best blue grass, will go to waste to avoid the risk of fattening cattle at present prices.

Cropg in Prinor Edinard County.-Our Picton, Ont., correspondent writes, under date 10th July:-The drouth of which I informed you early in the season, and which $I_{f}$ feared would greatly injure this county (Prince Edward), has stayed with us, no rain having fallen here (except some very light showers) since early spring. The hay crop is almost a total failure, certainly it will not average more than a quarter crop. The barley and oats are mostly very light, in many cases a failuro, insomuch that farmers are in several parts of the county tarning their stock into their fields of barley and oats for pasture. The carly pens are very light, in many cases a failure. Late peas will do pretty well if rain comes soon. The crops of barley and oats on first-clase deep soil are holding out pretty woll yet. On the whole the outlook throughout the county is gloomy enough. Hay which in good seasons could be bought hore readily for $\$ 8$ per ton and aven less, is selling, or las been sold here lately for $\$ 17$; and farmers in some' parts of the county are disposing of their live stock as rapidiy as possible. No failures have occurred here hately among tho merchantg; but the probability is that the fall will see a number of them assign unless a great improvement takes place in the outlook?

Montreal Thursday Evg．，July 19， 1888.
The business done in all lines has again been only very moderate，buyers operating cantiously and not going beyond immediate requirements，With few exceptions，values continue to show a shrinkage，and the num－ erous changes necessary this weok in our prices current，are generally in the downward direction．It is more than usually difficult to quote prices close to the markets，as travellers go forth armed with almost unlimited powers to cut prices．In fact they seem to grado their prices according to the solvency and standing of their customers；and wo hear of goods being sold at two or three different pricos in the one town．Onder these circum． stances，our quotations，in some instancee， may appear to a wealthy or perfectly solvent storeleepor as too high，while to a weak man， with fidifferent or poor credit，they would seem to be too low．There $1 s$ more than usual competition for Northwest and Lower Province trade，owing to the excellent crop reporterfom those localities ；but some hesi： tation＇lis manifested in booking large orders for those parts of Ontario now suffering from
drought：Remittances continue very poor． Dven partial renewals are the exceptlon，and renewals in full have beon the order of the day．

Asesi．－Receipts have been fair and with a Light demand prices have receded to $\$ 3.90$ od $\$ 4.00$ for First Pots，$\$ 3.50$ for Seconds Pearls are coming in more freely，and $\$ 7$ would be an outside price for Firists．Receipts since ist January， 2178 brle pots， 383 brls． pearls；deliveries， 2085 brls pots， 306 brls． pearls；stock in store at 6 p．m．on 18th July， 608 bris．pots， 83 bris．pearls．
Caned Goods．－It is stated that lots of strawberries have been packed，also consider－ able peas and some tomatoes．There are qhe usual reports about the pack being likely to short for certain lines of fraits owing to the caterpillars；the heat，want of more rain，otc． New tomatoes have sold at $\$ 1,10$ ，new btraw－ berries at $\$ 2.25$ and new pens at $\$ 1.25$ ．Sover－ al western canners have sold thoir entire pack of peas．tomatocs，peaches and strawberries． The catch of lobsters is short and the English market has tasen the bulk of the pack．The government extension of the fishing season only applies to a portion of the coast．
Day Goods．－Trade in the city may be said to be dead．Most of the purchasing com－ munity are apay，and thoso whom necessity retains，in town are only purchasing actual requirements．At the same timo the subur－ ban trade keeps up well，and many housees say it is better this year than at the same time last year．Outside of this Provinco a fair amount of orders are coming in from tras vellers，but it is evident that caution is being exarcied in buying，and the orders are very limited，compared with those of previous sea－ sons．Buyers will not move until some surety as to the out－turn of the crops in On－ tario is arrived at，and it is to bo feared that we cannot expect more than a bare average crop throughout that province；if indeed so much．In another column we give particu－ lais from the different districts，which seem to：show that the good crops on clay lands will barely offiset the losses on sandy and gravelly sections，and that on the whole the crop in Ontario this year will barely equal that of last．With this in view we cannot expect remittances to be anything but irregu－ lar．In sfaplo lines payments are fair，but in fancy lines we find renewals in full the order of the dny，and in every branch renewals，in part or in the whole，are complained of．Pay－ ments certainly are not good，and unfortu－ nately there is little prospect of their im－ provement．We are now in a period of comparative ：stagnation，and can only wait until ciroumstances revive the general trade of the country．

Inon and Handwame－The markot for iron nud hardware remaius quiet with yery little doing．Prices now are low onough to be safo and there is a firm undercurront owing to the beliof that botth these staples will bo bettor property［mbiwo or three month＇s time than thoy aro now In fact there are not wanting some who athicipato a lar fron famine in the winter，as there are literally no importatious of consequence and tho Camadian articlo is too irreguliar in its quality to moot tho requiro－ monts of muny users．It is ovident that the
increase in the rates of freight from England must stiffon both pig and bar，and therefore －although．we reduce quotations this week all round we anticipate a steady necessity 10 in－ crease them once more．The opinion of the trade is that the recent paragraph in a small trado contemporary asserting that the reason that a lcading house was selling No． 1 Sum－ merlee so cheap，was that it was mixed with No． 3 is utterly incorrect．The makers of No． 1 Summerlec are incapable of such action，as it would simply ruin the reputation of their brand，and the insinuation that the mixture was made in second hands is diseredited．The house who made the sale are well known as ＂slashers＂and it is believed simply made the cut in order to secure trade．Besides they bought very carly in tho season when pig was considerably cheaper．At tho same time，any consumers who feel timid have only to order， direct from the maker＇s agents．They would then be perfectly secure of recoiving straight No．1．It will be noticed that we lower our prices of pig iron cousiderably．The pressure to do business has now obliternted the dis－ tinction between the large and the emall buy－ er．The man who buys 20 tons and the man who buys 100 tons get practically the same flyures and hence we reduce our quotations to lowest sale prices．In reference to tho quota－ tion for Eglinton wo may say that no sales have been made above $\$ 17$ ；although agents hold this brand at our figures．Advances in England have led to a eorresponding rise in the value of block tin．We now quote 22 to $24 c$ ；although these prices have beon shaded to large buyers，Zinc too，is higher in sym－ pathy with England，where the cables have advanced $£ 1$ per ton．We reduce quotatlons for cut nails an average fof． 20 cents．Cut nails may bo said to be salling at cost；in fact some travellers say oven below it；and certanly at present it looks like it．Most of the travellers now in，report very poor busi－ ness aud，owing to the trought and conse－ quent bad crops in many sections of Ontario， look for very little improvement this year： The only firms ready to buy freely are those whose prospects of paying tor the goods may be considered doubtful．Solvent firms are purchasing as little as possible and in＇overy way ondeavoring to reduce their liabilities， Fortunately the hardware trade are not de－ pendont solely upon the crojs．The lumber trade is doing well，and this important indus－ try forms $a$ second string to tho bow of the hardware trade．At tho samo time we must acknowledge that dating ahead is on the in－ crease，The usual four months on metals and six monthe on hardwario are boing olongated two or oven thre monthe，and it is said that moro latitude in regard to prices is given to the traveller than over before．The volume of trade is genorally conecded to be fair but with regard to payments thero are the usual discournging accounts．

Jeromo and other nothern districts in this Province,-tho-oountry has also soffered from the drougat. This will likely affect the price of beef and dairy produce.
Leather and Shoss.-There is some little movement in leather, but only in a jobbing way. Factorymen do not take up any lots in anticipation however cheap they may look. Considerable orders are being taken by travellers, for the shoe houses, which are not to be dated until the fall trade commences. This practice of soliciting orders early and dating them at a Jater date, beems to have grown into a regular custom. This year, however, the factories do not intend to manufacture until close to the date of the orders, as they are unusually anxious about the crops. The unfortanate drought in the west is tending to make manufacturers fll Manitoba and Lower ports orders first, and shipmonts to the west will be lato. The price of buff leather has again been cut in Quebec, and we hear of considerable sales there at 100 . The western leather man, Pepler, who recently failed, offered some cheap lines lately in this marliet. He owes some $\$ 20,000$, with assets of about $\$ 7,000$. The creditore aro principally western tanners, the largest beiag interested in the sum of $\$ 2,700$.
Porarose - There are fow old potatoes left and as they are wanted they are firm at: $\$ 1$ per bag. Now crop have attained a large size in eome sections and fine sorts bave sold at $\$ 3,50$ per brl or $\$ 1.75$ per bag. Ordinary are offered at $\$ 3$ per brl or $\$ 1: 50$ a bag.
Woov:-The supply of domestic has been well taken up. Just now the mill people are out with their sample and are not wanting a great deal of wool. Dealers in foreign raport a fair busineés but gay hat prices here bave not responded to the Engligh mariket. This is similar to the position in 1886 when a long
time elapsed before Canadians reaped any benefit from the European improvement. The ivarious lots of foreign turned over of late; foot up a fair total for the season. A certain quantity of Cape has been offering at $13 \frac{1}{2} c_{1}$ but this is an exception and no criterion to go by. A recent London cable eays:-At the wool sales a firm competitive spirit was exlibited. Pric $s$ were at par and vere the best of the series. Buyers operated keenly at tbe advance. The amount offered was 9,958 -bales. The amount avallable is $36 ; 000$ bales.
