THRIFT．
The moralist who first gave currency to the aphorism that it is not what men eara that makes them rich，but what they sare，condensed into that short rentence one of the greatest secrets of commercial success．The colossal fortunes of the pre－ sent day－the Rothschilds，the Vander－ bilts，the Astors，and the Barngge－all date their first elevation into the rank of mil－ lionaires more to the persistent saving of the original founders of their fortunes than to any bold or brilliant Gnancial coups upon their part．The bold operators－the temporary kings of Wall street or of Lom－ bard street，and the monarche of Mincing Lane－soon sink into oblivion．It is the

close, penurious operator, of the Russel Sage type, that leaves the germ of financial pre-eminence to his heirs, not the daring speculator or the brilliant financier; "and it is simply because the habit of saving for saving's sake is ingrained in their disposition that they are enabled to reach this end. Thrift accomplishes what skill is unable to perform. It consolidates their prosperity as steadily as it is accumulated. It provides the firm foundation from which the nextstep in advance can be safely be taken. It secures the fruits of victory and mitigates the losses of defeat. It forms and consolidates that reserve which rendors their financial position impregnable to aspault.

So far the argument is irresistible. The only conclusion we can draw is that thrift and not skill is the true quality necessary to success; but no sooner have we reacheil this conclusion than it becomes necessary to enquire how, far its, exercise will be beneficial to our interests. Not only is the line where thrift ends and avarice begins a somewhat dubious one; but there are many conditions arising in commer.cial circles where a policy of thrift would be not only not beneficial but might possibly be attended with most disastrons results. 'To the clerk, the artisan, or the recipient of a certain fixed and regular stipead, the practice of thrift is a simple application of the principles of commen sense. Giyen a certain amount of income, it is easy to see that if the expenditure exceed that sum financial embarrassment is sure to follow; while, if the expenditure be confined within those limits, a certain increment will naturally be assured. But can we apply a similar hard-and-fast rule to the inercantile community? Can we insist upon its rigid employment in cases where the expenditure is comparatively fixed in amount while the income fluctuates with every impulse of the commercial world?

This is a point which moralists too often neglect. When a leading tank manager stated in this city that, in his opinion, but few of our wholesale dry goods houses stood as well financially today as they did at the corresponding period of the previous year, he gave an instance of the mutability of modern commerce that entirely precludes the application of the ordinarily accepted principles of thrift. Did we construe literally the axiom that the expenditure must not exceed the actual income, these merchants, although perfectly solvent, must have at once reduced their cost of living, and of doing business, within the parrow limits of their profits-a course which we can easily see would not only be ridiculous, but would be absolutely impracticable. And yet, if we are to believe the conceptions of thrift put forward by social moralists, this would be the only true road to success. If the generally accepted views of thrift were literally adhered to, the merchant who made a bad season, the retailer who made a poor month, or the broker whose busiyess fell off, mustat once reduce their expenditure in commensurate ratio. Would this be even possible; and, if it nere so, would it be advisable? The apswer can hardly be given in the affirmative.

The old proverb which says that, while it is bad enough to be poor, it is fatal to look it, may safely be considered a commercial axiom. How many mercantle houses have tided over crises, which would otherwise have inevitably resulted in disaster, simply through the reputation of solvency, is known only to their bankers; but that their number is larger than is popularly supposed is a fact that most commercial men will acknowledge. To such houses any sudden reduction of expenditure, wholesale discharge of employees, or catting down of the hourehold expenses of the partners, would simply result in alarming their creditors and thereby killing their prospocts oir recovers. To them a policy of thrift would bo simply suicidal ; : while were even perfectly solvent firms to conduct their affairs upon such principles the outcome would be a wide-spread distrust that would bring ahout the general curtailment of credit and would very possibly culmipate in a panic.
The moral we must then draw is that it is utterly imposible to lay down sny hara-and-fast rule for the guidance of commercial men. There are times in the history of every frm when the recognised rules of business must be cast aside; and Where a policy of expediency must be tol lowed, if the best results are to accrue. It is to the quickness of perception that recognises these situations, and to the promptitude and resolution with which the emergency is met, that the average
business man owes his success, just as much as to the habit of thift. A mere grasping policy is by no means an infallible road to success; and we must always bear in mind that it is quite as prssible to kill the goose that lays the golcen egg by misdirected economy as from motives of greed. Thrift, properly directed, is one of the greatest factors of success; but we must remember that it is only one-no matter how individually important it may be. Thrift, like true courage, is one of the rarest qualities that men possess, and is as distinct from meanness; avarice, or greed, as manly independence is from insolence. It does not consist in the mere act of saving; for we find that a really thrifty man is frequently a generous one. Butt it easily degenerates into mere narrowness and meanness, and, therefore, requires to be tempered with discretion. Its practice is really one of the many forms of self abnegation, and as such is certain to result in the eyentual success, morally as well as physically, of its foitune possessor; but, as we have already shown, it is not the sole condition of prosperity, and there are times when, paradoxical as it may seem, it is best kept in abeyance. On our young business men all over the countr: we would earnestly impress the value of thrift; but at the same time we would caution them that a "close" man is not necesearily a thrifty one, and that there are times when even economy may be misdirected.

## RAILROAD DIVIDENDS:

The announcement by cable from London that the English shareholders of both the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific railways were signing, in large numbers, a petition urging the directors of both companies to put a period to the present severe competition and to come to a friendly underatanding with each other, has naturally caused some comment in railroad circles. It indicates that the shareholders of the older line are becoming tired of waiting hopelessly for deferred dividends, and possibly that those or the younger one are apprehensive that, Eo soon as the guarantee on the common stork runs out, they will be in a similar position:

Thegist of the whole sulject lies in a nut-shell. We cannot furniah, with our present popalalion, sufficient pay ing traflic to render both lines largely remunerative. After the fusion of the G. T. R. and the the Great Western, and until the C. P. P. npened its line to Toronto, the Grand Trunk system earned sulficient to pay all its charges in full; to meet the dividends on all preference stocks, and even to hold out vague hopes that the common stock might possibly receive a dividend in the
near future. But so soon as the Canadian Pacille made itself folt, all these hopes were blighted. What was amply sufficient for one proved miserably inatequate for two ; and the Euglish shareholders now realize that tho public of Canala are reaping atl the advantages of free competition at the expense of their dividends. Naturally they seak to dovise some means whereby a competition as disastrons to their interests as it is benefleial to oure cait be sufely abrogated, and the present petition is ovidently a move in this direction.

Unfortanately for them-atid correspondingly happily for as - pooling is rigidly forbiden, and. any attempt to divida trafic between the two companies so as to maintain a monopoly under the gilise of competition has been provided digninst by legislation. Under these circumstances no possibility of such a "combine," as the petition now circilated clearly hints at, exists, and, therefore; there ia but little prospect of any im. mediate improvements in the direction of dividends. There is simply not suflicient traffic for the two lines; and, co isequently, although ostensibly no cutting of rales is indulged in, the competition for bothi froight and passenger traffic is keener than either of the General Managers would like to allow, and naturally the inducements oflered to secure remunerative business of either kind are daily growing larger.
From all this the Canadian commanity derives direct benefit. The growing rivslry of the two ronds means to us cheaper rates, better accomodation, greater civility upon the part of railroad onficials, and shorer transit. The railroad man is no, longer the master of the public, but its servint; and the pressure of circumstances has resulted in privileges and advantages to the travelling community which might otherwise have been longed for in vain. A progressive spirit lins taken the place of the old indolent letharyy, and there is no better indiration of the change that has bean brought abont in railrond policy during the past fow years, than a comparison of the present depos in Montreal with those that existed five years ago. Each were types of the poliuy pursued at the periods of their arection, aud each boar silent testimony to the efficacy of competition.

No doubt the Euglish shareholders, whose fath in the future of the Dominion led them to invest their money in order to produce this result, viow the situntion with very differentojes. Largedividends and competition are rarely coexistent. Besides this they argue that whon they parchased slinres they did so on the disthict assurance of Camadian public men ifsat their intereats would be carefully guarded gud that they were not to be
sacrificed for the, good of others. And it canoot be said that these assurances have not been honorably carried out. But no amount of assurances can resist the inexorable force of the laws. of supply and demand. Given a certain amount of traffic, and given two powerful lines, both equally able to biande the whole of it and yet each compelled to struggle to secure even a share-is it not certain, from these premises, that a vigorous competition must inevitably result? We bave no doubt, whatsoover, that every promise made to the English shareholders was made honestly and in good faith at the tiuc; but no general manager cau fight against circumstrnces. They have done their best and can do no more, and their constituents must perforce be satisfied with the results. The present railroad situation in Canada is simply the natural outcome of the economic situation and, as such, is beyond the influence of petitions, howerer numerously and influentially signed. In the meantime the Canadian: enjoys the advantages that naturally accrue from a free market Cor traneporiation and feels that although he would naturally jike both railroads to pay better dividends to the English shareholders, he is not yet prepared to submit to any increase on our existing sufficiently high freight rates for the purpose of improving the balance sheet. With the improvement of the country will come a corresponding increase in the earning powers of the railroads; butithis is a question of lime and not of petitione, and until this: period shall be brought about by the national ghowth of our resources, the English shareholder must possess his soul in patience.

## A NEW TAX.

The attention of both the wholesale and retail trade of this city has of late been forcibly directed towards the serious inroads made upon their profits under the guise of charity. Probably there is no more unjnatifiable or irritating tax upon their resources than that levied in this sacred name, and of late so peraistent (and andeed minatory) have these solicitors of gifts for charitable purposes become, that the practice may now be fairly considered as approaching the confines of black-mail.

When this insidious custom first made its appearance; it tock the form of unsolicited gifte, by the partnera, of articles in slock to benayolent or other organizations in which they had a personal interest. They were usually objects of small intrinsic value, given asoprizes at athletic, benevolent, or Sunday school meetings, or to be disposed of at church fairs. Gradually, however, the practice became exteaded. Customers of the firm at first requested, and finally demanded, presents towards
the funds of institutions in which they themselves were interested but with which the donors had no sy mathy. This was borne in silence; and as a result we find the usage still farther exteñded, and are confronted with charitable and religious bodies in distant portions of the country obtaining from their storekeepers the names of their suppliers in the large cities for the purpose of dunning them. for gifts towards enterprises, doubless of local merit, but in whose prosperity the bad'gered wholesaler can have no possible interest. This is carrying the custom of charitable solicitation a little too far.
No one knows better thian the trade of Montreal how far this system of begging for charitable purposes, under the threat of withdrawing custom in case of refusal has been carried. We could point out stores in this city where hardly a day parses that some church or other' organization does not apply for $a$ : gift. Wére these gifts of little intrinsic value : their - burden would be but little felt, but of Jate these solicitors have gone so far as to :indicate very distinctly the value of the present they are willing to accept, and to base their demands upon appretty accurate calculation of the douor's anxiety 10 retain their trade. In fact it is no longer the solicitation of gifts. It has developed into a direct tax, levied upon a fixed scale of assessments, and extorted by means of - statements as to the advantages of liberality, or the damage that would result from a refusal, that fall very little : bhort of threats.

It has now become time to call a halt; and to inform these presumably wellinitentioned applicants that the practice they so freely indulge in is really one on which all civilized society rightly fröwns. Thie beggar whosolicits alms for his personal emolument, and the lady who begs for the beneft of a charch or society, stand precisely on the same plane, and are each'enigaged in wheedling out of their victims a valuable article for which they are rendering no just equivalent. The tramp who exlorts money by menaces of personal violence, and the solicitor who obt ins a gift by threatening the unwilling donor with the loss of the custom of the church or society he or she represents, are equally culpable before the law. Each is obtaining valuables by means of intimidation, either hinted or expressed, and consequently each is equally to blame. This will probably be a new view of the case to many of our charitable people; but it is none the less a correct one. A practice founded at'its inception on one of the miost. noble of Christian virues, and cherished by the most generous impulses of the donors, is rapidly degenerating into an organized system of blackmail. Every day witnesses its extension into further fields
until the very name of charity has become repulsive, anditit is ouly ia question of time unthl "religion and menditancy" become: coupled together in the pubifemind. It is this degradation of sacred causes through theiviascrugalous means adopted by illiadvised enthusiasts to further their success, that is responsible for much ${ }^{2}$ of modern free-thought. Thie storekeeper who is mulcted uadar the guise of religion or charty is very liable to look askance upt. on, these subjects in the tuture, and thius the very end for which the enforited coll: lection is made is defeated at the start: 'Ther: custom is: an objectionable' one inevery way Its disadvantage are many and obvious and we question whether the pecunary results acnieved ${ }^{\prime \prime}$ by this process are in any way commensurate with the moral,evil iv indictes: Its'abolition'would be: a distinct'gain both to the societies aud the trade, and therelore, if the charitable organizationsare unwilling to abandon its use, it:should be put a peremptory stop to by: the mertantule comminity: At the same time, there are many commendable exceptions to the rule; and there is no more praiseworthy action than that of one who gives freely thimself both in money and a portion of his valuable time in procuring subscriptions :- froin wealthy friends for ${ }^{\prime}$ an olject ${ }^{\text {i }}$ whose demands are few and far betreen.:-

THE POSITIONOE SUGAR...
In a previous articlè it was stated that "the supply of cane sugar dưring the next three months will be considerably less than duıing the same period for some years past, and the opinion gains strength that the jncrease in the production of beet will be required to meet the growing con= sumption in Europe and thei States:": Since then prices have advanced la © 1s $3 d$ in Brazil and other pruduciug countries, and the position abroad isia atrongone. Sofar as the:Furipean beet crop is:concerned the highest estimates publighed have had to be reduced, owing to the unfavorable summer and early frostst The outlook then, is dedidedly in. favor of dearer sugar.

Brazil sugars have been largely purchased of late, by the Canadian refineries, at 12 N @ 12 s 6d, percort, c.and f. Halifax. Several cargoes are on the way which cost. less money. But sugar has been advanc: ingin! London, going up nearly is por cwt, within a week. Ithe advanco in Brazil sugars has not checked the operations of the Liverpool capitalists who, are still' buying, and. it looks as if the American Trust will again be caught in itè' own trap:: Last year, inslead of getting the Brazzilian. crop at their own figures, Engifir buyers stepped in and secured it, and NewiYork and Philadelphia firms had to purchase a large share of their raw product in Liver-
pools We learn from New Xork that the great sugar trust have contracted for 40,000 tons of beet, This is intended to keep them-going until the Cuban crop can be secured; the latter being delayed, possibly for a whole month; in coilequevice of the heavy rains and hurricanes which have prevailed in"Cuba this year.

Thid price of siagar in Canade continues to be slightly above New York prices, but with a larger population the difference should in'time be less than it is: $A^{\prime \prime}$ mere comparison of prices does not, however, tell the whole story. Canadian figures mean $2 \eta^{-1}$ per cont. of within $14^{\prime \prime}$ days, whilo American quotations are cash in 30 days." Oni several occasions of late years some grades of sugar have been cheaper in Montreal than anywhere else on the American continétit, but this was probably. due to lucky chances in buying the raw matcrial. If sügar can be sold as cheaply in Montreal as in New York' the development of this trade will have encouraged slipping and a foreign trade, and demonstràted that Cánadá does not requíré tó take lessons from the United States in manufactoring and commerce: The Canadián sugar intarest briogs forty to fify vessels to our ports in thé season, and it may be stated that one house in this city transacted business with twenty one ships from Braziland other countries last year. These vessels' after bringing sugar, hides, etci, here, are able to take back fish, flour, pork; lumber and other produce, and although some of' our readers may not look with a favorable' eye où thó sugar trade they will admit that the Cánadian product is as good and even better than the American product and that stigar producing countríes "may prove good'customers for our surplas:

## FASHION. NOTES.

The weather still continues distinctly unfavorable to the dry goods trade Damp, murky, chilly days, like those that ushered in the commencement of the week, are most unseasonable, and at a period like the present may do irreparable injury, We are now fast approaching the bolidays and yet many of both ladies and gentlemen are still, wearing their fall wraps and overcoats. Furs are rarely. visible, and until tho sudden cold snap set in yesterday to see a fur cap was the exception rather than the rule. Unless a marked change in the weather takes place wo shall hãve a green Christmas, and this always means a heavy loss to trade, as, if cuatomers do not purchase ney winter wraps before the turn of the year, they are very apt not to buy at all and to make their old garments last them for another. seagon.

The materials used this, year upon fall and winler wraps are especiglly handsome
and correspondingly expensive Outside the plain velvêts, plushés and arimés, we have pretty silk matelasses aid brucitelles. Veloutine; a heavy repped faile with a soft sillty finish, satini princesse, and satin de Lyou are also worn. The pretty but poor wearing:tricotrin: is also purchased by those who buy; argarment fur its looks instead of for its durability, and in purely clonking silks we have tho dull, solt fiuished, mascot silk and the still duller and havier peau de suede. A new aicilienue; called gros de Venise, is also in the market. Black fur is che trimnang usually employed, but too much braid cainot be usid, and the most expensive and stylish garments are covered with intricate patierus of staiding russia and silk cord Suattes display very litule revival. They are being steadily relegated to the commoner trade, anid tho litue spurt in the demand thiat took place a. short time ago hat cumpletely died. away.
Bonnets are growing larger and are flatter in shape THo uppearance of height is given entirely' by the trimming, Which is still piled up in front. Ladies. Lully recognize how much more becoming hign hendgear is to most faces than low, and consequently while ostensibly, folluwing the fushion, take care to so alter it as to suit thenselves, Great latitude is alowed in hats. They may be either very large or correspondingly small and. yet be equally in style. In small hate, türban shapes prevail; in the large ones a favorite blape has the the broad brim. turiied up at the back and tirned slightly. downwards in an arcti in front. Fur capse have not'appeared much upon the street as yet; but there are indications that the: eeal wedge will be the favorite, and that jockey and dog-stealer shapes will bo leftto the very common trade. The umbrellas. of the seäson are ornamented. With. quaintly carved heads mounted in silver.. The handles are of ordinary length, and: the exageratedly long sticks seen oron. parasols and umbrellas during the sume mer ceason appear to havo gone altogether. out of stylo.
As usual at this season of the year there. is a marked tendency among ladies to: wear the hair low down on the neck. The: very lalest btyle is to have the hair: twisted lound in a coil at the nape of the. neck with a few curled ende escaping or: faling carelessly, This is evidently:a step in the direction of the bygone style. of wearing one long curl down the back In front the fringe is massed togetherina thick look in the centre of the forehead. Anotherstyle is to plait the back lair in two wide plaits raised upon a comb and then allowed to fall upon the neck. In all: new atyles of hardresping the nape of the: neck is covered, alíough the hair doen
not descend lower than that unless curls be worn, so that it is ovident that the fashion of dragging everything up to the top of the head has at last received its quielus in favor of a style more suited to the colder weather of winter.

## ENGLAND'S PAPER CURIRENCY.

It is not alone in this country and the United States that the question of aome improvement in the present system of circulation is asitating the financial world. The miserable inadeguacy of England's paper currency to her commercial needs has long. been manifest, and for some timo past has been engesfing the attention of banking men; but, until the recent report of the Gold and Silver commission was made public, it had not been brought oflicially bofore tho Government and consequently before the representatives of the penple for discussion.
This report renders it evident that an issue of 11 notes will be sunctioned in the immediate future. Such an issue already oxists both in Ireland and Scothand, and wonld long since have oxisted in England also, but for the rigid consorvatism of the Innancial authorities. Its introduction there would be no iunovation, but simply the extension of an already tried scheme to the English public; consequently no serious objections would have been offered to its inanguration even by the most bigotad advocates of metallic currency, had the suggestion been based on the existing standard. But the Commission have gone one stop further than at present public opinion is willing to go, and have boldly advocated the issue of silver one ponnd notes, bused upon the principle of United States silver certifieates, and calling for twenty shillings instend of a gold pound, in place of such notes as are at presont current in the sister kingdoms Naturally they have aroused a atorm of opposition.

This deliberate endorsement of the donble standard is a very important step, and one that re-onens tho much-discussed question of bi-motallism as opposed to the usually recei ved theory of mono-metallism under covor of the plea that the market thus opened for silver might induce an oconomy in the use of gold. As a matter of course it has roused the vigorous opposition of the upholders. of the gold standard, and in fuce of the fact that the Commission was divided in its own viows upon tho subject, it is hardly likely that tho Guvermment will tako action upon thoir report. It must bo remombered that what Dugland requires is a paper currency that shall be a roudily receivable tender in any portion of the kingdom, and that it is only because no such currency exists that there is any noed of revising the
present system. Were one pound notes based upon the silver standard to be issued this need would be as far from fulfilment as ever; since these notes would not be received in Ireland or Scotland where the gold standard only is recognized. Their circulation then from the offiset would be confined within the lim ts of one kingdom, and the very fact that they werd not reccivable in the others would cause a feeling of distrust in their tangible value that it might take years to eradicate.
Il must be borne in mind that the proposed silver notes are not irredcemalile; since in England no such thing as an unconvertiblo currency is ever drearnt of. They would then be redeemable in silver bullion and consequently would vary in value at the banks with every fluctuationof the motal thoy represented. This is alone aserious objection; since a note that could not command its face value at the banks would bardly be lisely to circulate freely among the general public. No doubt now that the practice of giving cheques for small amounts is growing everyday, the $£ 5$ note has become almost useless for commercial purposes, and a demand for a paper currency of smaller valuo has legitimately sprung up. But the business men who advocated the issue of $\mathfrak{f l}$ notes did so on the distinct understanding that these notes were to be based upon the same standard as the ones they were to displace. In going beyond this, and advocating the issue of notes based on so unstible a metal as silver, the majority of the Commission have exceeded the views they were put forward to represent, and thus have aroused an opposition to any change in the existing system. of note issue that may dolay a much needed reform in the circulation at the very time when its want is most severely folt.

## BANK CIRCULATION.

The question of bank circulation is still eugaging the attention of fuavoial papers in the Uniled States. The Comptroller of the currency, In his report, submits for the considerntion of Congress the suggestion that the legal tender debt be funded into a two-and-a. half per cent, Government bond, to be issued only to Natimal banks, to mature only upon the diesolution of the bank to which it is iseued, and to be used as security for bank note circulation in place of the four and four-nad-a-half per cent. bonds now hed for this purpose. This suggestion, eays the Commercial Bulletin, will commend itself neither to popular approval nor to the support of finanoiers and economists. From the popular point of view, it has all the oljectionablo features of other plans that have been proposed. It involves the perpetuation of thein-terest-bearing delt of tho United States, and it provides for the maintenance of National bank
circulation at the expense of the people. Public sentiment is unmistakably and undisguisedly hostile to both propositions. Tested by the laws of banking and the considerations which have most weight with students of finance, the scheme is equally inacceptable. The Cumptroller, it goes on to say, has shown his appreciation of what is really the true solution of this problem, for he maintains that the National bank-note circulation of the future should combine the advantages of the old State bank issues with the safety and ample security of the present system; that it should be adapted to local needs and to everchanging requirements; and that it should not be based upon any form of bonds, but upon the negotiable paper held by the banks. He has clearly pointed out that such a system uader simple but effectual regulation, would afford the best possibio note circulation, the amplest and best security, and would bo in unllest accord with true principles of banking, currency and finauce, whether considered theoretically or as taught by universal experience. In other words he auggests tine adoption of the Canadian system modified to suit American requirements.

Tas following statement of the expenditure of the Fire Brigade, up to date this year, and the amounts remaining on hand, was submitted at the meeting of the Fire Committee:-


IT is now stated that the American trunk lives will make a vigorous offort at the coming session of Congress to take away from the Oanadian railway lines the advantage they now enjoy over their American competitors, as the result of the Interstate Commerce las. It is alleged that much of the demoralization of railroad business, consequent on the cuiting and slashing of rates, has buen due to the Canadian lines, who are largely engaged in transporting goods from one part of the United States to another through Canadian territory. The Canadian Pacific is said to have earned $\$ 12,000,000$ in this way from its American business this year, and the principal part of the Grand Trunk earnings is derived in a like manner from the American side of the line. It has been suggested that a bill compelliog the Canadian roads engaged in transportation on this side to make their through rates proportionate to the local rates to ceriain competitive points in Canada would have the desired effect. An opinion is also expressed that the Secretary of the Treasury has already the power to regulate the matter, but to remove all doubt and provide for some sort of regulation a law will be enacted. Under the Act of 1886, by which Canadian roads are permited to transport goods free of daty from one part of the United States to another, through Cadadian territory, it is provided that the business shall be done "under such conditions and regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe.".

An article in the Independent condenses the evil caused by the rebate system in insurance into a few short and pithy paragraphs. It says:-Oompanies get business through their agents : they pay their agents by a commisbion on premiums, or by salaries and allowances which liave to cume out of the premiums, These commissions and allowances were urignally the agent's livelinood; they should properly represent the necessary cost of getting good men to work for a company; but when a company intends to deliberately undercut its. rivals, it at once incresses the commissions or allowances to its agents over and above what is necessary to compensate them for lepitimate work, in order that the agents may throw off that additional allowance, and make a rebate on the first premium with it to a new. insurer; or else it allows their agents to throw off whatever is necessary in order to secure the application, and then allow them to charge up the sum, whatever it may be, as commission, in addition to their real com. mission.. So that the competitic $n$ among such companies, among men who look only or mainly at the first payment and not at the future, has come to be almost wholly. a question of who will throw off the largest commission or make the most of a rebate.

Tue latest advices from Melbourne indicate that, aithough the statistical returns indicate that the existing Australian surplus of
whent for export is still large, there is now, $a$ growing conviction that the figures overstate the position. Australian cables have told of heavy losses by rain and flood at hervest time, and that the earlier computations of the yield have not been realized. There is also a large proportion of damaged wheat unfit for shipment which tends to reduce the actual supply suitable for export. Under these con. ditions it is not surprising that diffleulty is found to supply engagements and to export whest from Australia. Late cable accounts from the northern Australian districts aro still discouraging as to crop prospects, the want of rain being felt, eepecially in the northeast. Several parties at Sun Francisco have received enquiry from Australia by cablo as to prices of cereals, and indications are that fears of a continuance of the drought have been realized. Already freight room for nearly tour thousand tons of cereals has been engaged and, in view of still larger shipments becoming necessary, freight rates have advanced.

The long expected reduction in fire insurance rates has at last been granted At a meeting of the Fire Underwriters' association an official copy of the resolution passed by the City council, granting the Fire committec an additional sum of $\$ 5,000$ to enable it to fully carry out the requitements of the underwriters was read, and the following resolution was adopted?

That the resolution of the board of February 22 nd inst, advancing the rates in the city of Montreal be,iand is bereby, rescinded.

It will be remembered that rates were then increased about 20 per cent; ordinary wholesale stocks in first class buildings being advanced to 75 cents and on retail stocks in similar buildings to $92 \frac{1}{2}$ cents. Theso rates have been reduced to 60 and 75 cents respectively, which, with the $2 \frac{1}{2}$ cents added for the Provincial tax, makes them up to $62 \frac{1}{2}$ cents and $77 \frac{1}{2}$ cents on these classes: That the underwriters are perfectly satisfied with what the city has done is of course not corrcct; but they feel that a step has been taken in the right direction, and that, therefore, they are justified in meeting the requirements of the mercantile comminity. Special risks are also reduced by 20 per cent

The Philadelphia coal companies have all shaded November quotations, and a general restriction, according to previous announce ment, bas set in, and will be continued until the demand justifies an increased outpus: Large sums of money are being expended in putting mines into better condition, and a very general repairing is now going on Eight or nine new collier es will be ready for the spring. Stocks are heavy at all points. The production of the mines;, will scarcely reach one hundred thousand tons for December, dally. The tone of the market is strongi and the same policy of extonding trade westward
and southward will be continued. Efforts aro being quietly made to locate new coal depos. its, and several small syurs and connecting lines are to be constructed to fucilitato mining and shipping operations. The wititer coal and coke distribution will, in all probability, except former winters, as there is a general activity promised in all the smaller industries.

Tue meeting of the Canadian Canned Goods Packers Association was beld at Hamilton on the 6th ulto. Most of the session was employed in discussing tho possibility of an arrangement whereby the present cutting in prices will be prevented and at the same time the quality of the goods packed witl be improved. In order to avoid disputes it was decided that in future the standard tins should be the same size as thosein use in the states, und they sbould be designated ls, $2 s, 2 d^{\prime} s, 3^{\prime} s, 6^{\prime} s$ and $8^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$, the latter taking the piace of gals; also that there should be 49 of Is to a case ; 24 of $2^{\prime} 8,22^{\prime} s$ and $3^{\prime}$, and 12 of 6 's and 8 s . It was reported that celtain unscrupulous packers were putting inferior goods on the market under a ficticious label, and it was decided to prosecute any wholesale or retail merchant found handling these gouds. The meeting was one of the most harmonious ever held by the association.

In view of the interest which has recently been attracted to the export of loge from Canadi to the United States, through the inclease of 50 per cent in export duty; a state. ment showing the quantities exported during the past year, would not be amiss at this particular moment. With the exception of 1.000 feet, all the pine $\log s(6,350,000$ fet $t)$ exported from Cunada to the United States, during 1887, were shipped from Ontario. Quebec shipped $17,468,000$ feet of spruce loge, Nuva Scotia 60,000 feet and New Brunbwick 8,000 feet to the United Stator. It is a well known fact; however, that a wholesale system
of evading the export duty his for yeurs been, castied on in New Bruaswick, owing to its close proximity to the Uuited States burder, with all the facilities a well wooded river as a boundary line could offer for smuggling.: The attention of parliament Inst session was called to this fuct.

Min. Molean and his friends who desire to introduce now blvod into the Eudson's Bay Compnoy's management, are determined to continue thair agitation. They have formed an associntion to promote a more advauced policy. "It is believed that seoing the larg
support given to the movement at the meeting, the board will apeedily effect some change in the methods of North-west trade.

A meetina of the Industrial Committee of the Ingersoll Council was held to consider the advisability of granting Messrs. J. R. Warnock and W. B. Nelles $\$ 5,000$ for the purpose of starting the old Ingersoll foundry. 'They decided to recominend to tho Council that these two gentlemen be loaned the above sum for 8 years at 5 per cent. interest.

Tha Bank of Commerce have secured the new loan of $\$ 1,000,000$ from the city of Torouto at $4 f$ per cout. A letter was received from Mr. Brough, local manager of the Bunk of Moutreal, declining to tender on the ground that the chuirman of the city executive committece und the City treasurer had waited on him and had nccepted an offer of $4 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Three uther tenders were received.

Tus reduction which has been made in the fees for the registration of land titles under the 'Torrens system in the North-West seems to have given general satisfaction. If the Ontario Guvernment could also seortheir way clear to reduce the fees the purchasers of land in that province would generally bring their titles under the Torrens system, which has numerous advantages over the old plan.

Tais year the Florida orange crop is estimated to be fully $3,000,000$ boxes, more than double that of any previous year. Each box holds from 200 to 400. Each freight car carries about 300 boxes. So to move the crop will require five trains of 20 cars each per day for 100 days, and the $900,000,000$ , oranges will allow nearly 15 each to every inhabitant in the United States.

Ths Port Hope Times says:-"The Peterborough 'Iown Council is considering the advisability of offering the manufacturing firm of MIcClary \& Co., of London, whose premises were recoutly destrojed by fire, inducements to locate in that town, and also to the Holly Manufacturing Co., of Hamilton, which suffered loss through fire destroying their building.

AT the annual meeting of the Bank of Ottawa, held on the $22 t b$ instant, the president and directors were reelected. The nut profits of the year amount to $\$ 150,912$. The Rest is now $\$ 360,000$ and after paying $\$ 12,000$ in dividends a baudsome sum was left at the credit of profit aud loss. 'The detailed report will appear in our next isbuo

We learn from Brussels, Ont, that the first of the monthly horse fairs was held there on tho oth inst. The attondance was large. Farmers and buyers were largely represented. Quite a number of horses changed hands, principally general purpose and heary draught Olydes, tha prices obtained being from $\$ 100$ to $\$ 200$ apiece.

Canada will draw a sigh of relief to know that the recent meeting of United States Consuls at Halifax was only to improve the consular work and make it upitorm. No. doubt something was done in the way of an increase of salaries.

Tar formation in England of a ring in the Staffordshire potterles following close upon the establishment of the Chesbire salt ring, shows the unfonncied nature of the pretence that rings and combines are the necessary accompaniments of a protective tariff.
'Tere second and final dividend sheet of the estate of Olmsted Bros. of Hamilton, has been prepared. It shows liabilitiea of $\$ 10,534$ and provides for a dividend at the rate of $16 \frac{7}{4}$ cents in the dollar, amounting in all to $\$ 1,765$.

Messrs. Charles Monton \& Co, wholebale dry-goods merelnants, of this city, have decided to go into liquidation. Their stock is offered for sale en blice at a rate on the dollar.

Money in London grows steadily dearer. The street rate to.day is cabled at $4 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent, and the preseut bonk rate of 5 per cont is likely to be still further advanced. Locally the situation is still practically unchanged; but so soon as the stringency in Londen affects the New York market the increased flow of Oanadian funds to the United States
will soon diminish the plethora now existing here. At present rates are the same as those quoted last week. Call loans are still done at $3 \frac{1}{2}$ to 4 per cent., with the latter figure predominaling, and commercial paper still rules at 6 per cent. with a fow favored firms getting their discount at 5 per cent. Remittances continue poor, and there is certainly no improvement yet visible in the trade outlook. The failure list is a large one and there is a feeling that it will continue so; but great hopes are placed in the holiday trade, and if these bright anticipations, are realized the situation will brighten very perceptibly. Sterling exchange shows very little alteration from last weeks prices. Sixties are quoted at 8 15-160 9 1-16 between banks and 9f(0) over the counter. New York funds are at 1-32 discoul: to par between banks and $\frac{1}{8}$ क. 4 premium over the counter.-Business upon the local stock exchange has been dull and uninteresting. The attention of the speculative fraternity seems to be centred on wheat options, so that local stocks are comparatively neglected. If the long expected boom in wheat values does not soon take place there will be some sore heads in Montreal, for nearly every one here who has touched "wheat at all is on the "bull" side and is eager to prove that higher prices are certain to come and that any prospect of a "slump" is out of the q iestion. In bank stocks a feature of the week was the sale of 25 shares Montreal at 228, payable on the 1st of next May. Commerce rallied briskly on the strength of having secured the city loan in Toronto and at the close sold up to 117 . The miscellaneous list has been only spariugly dealt in, and prices are practically unchanged. A small scalping business luas been done, purely between brokers, and only leavened by a few small orders for investment. Speculators are all intent upon wheat; and until their interest in this dies out they cannot be induced to turn their atteution to stocks again. " In the meantime values are fuirly maintained, simply because the business doing is trifling and there is no "bear" interest in the pit at present. Until the holidays are over thene is little chance of improvement, and the brokers are waiting, more or less paticntly, for the turn of the year :-

Montreal, Thureday Evg., Dec 13, 1888.
Outside of the ordinary holiday movement in the grocery trade and fancy linep, the wholesale business of the city is expected to be slack until after the turn of the year. Large importing houses und industrial establisimenta are busy stock taking and ensting up accounts for the past year. , The want of seasonable weather aud snow roads has been severely felt and the country trade is decidedly poor while remittances are backward. It is thought by many that trade has merely been delayed, and that a foot or so of rnow will make a great difference both in ordurs and collections.

Asees. - Receipts continue to be light. Sales trifling at \$4.00@\$405 for light tares; seconds $\$ 360$. Pearls dull and nominal. The stock is altogether too large for present week. Receipts since lit January: 3,452 brle pots; 661 brls pearls. Deliveries, 3,657 brls pots; $5 \pm 8$ brls pearls. Stock in store at 6 p.m., 12th December, 210 brls pots; 139 brls pearls.
Drugs asd carmoals.- In drugs we have to report a fair busionss, but payments are only morerate; A fiw changes will be found in our prices current. Oil of Saseafras has advanced very materially. Chemicals are dull and the houres are taking stock. Blue Vitriol keeps strong. An Euglirh letter contwins the following:-Oils-Quiet, Linkeedraw 19 s 3d, boiled 2 ds 3 d per cwt. f.o.b. DRy Goods. -Stock taking is now over with most houses, and the general belief is that though stocks are undoubtedly far too hava in fome departments, they are on the whule well'rssorted. Eaglish goods are responsible for a good deal of thif, as the finer qualities of heavy hosierg and underwear are lirgely imported and, owing to the mild and unseasonable weather, they have not moved out as fre ly as, they would otherwise have done. The city trade is slack. The weather has heen against them, and it will take two werke steady buying before they will need to oall on their sippliers. Remittances are nut good, and only small orders are coming in; but while the prospect is not paricularly elseering, there is no fecling of depression and merchants express themselves more or less hopernlly as to the future-in spito of the severity of competition.
Dainy Phoduce and Provisioss:-Except for fine table grades there is not much demand for butter, It is stated that there is not a. large supply of any kind forward, as in some former years. The make has no doubt been reduced in favor of cheese. Recent letters quote first Corks 113 ; ; seconds, $93 s$; thirds; 848 . Creamery. in Bristol 85 (108s. There has heen a very firm market fur cheese aghin, and slightly better prices have been paid. Stocks being well reduced the spasou should wind up eatiefactorily. In provisions, offerings of pork were large and ouly a small jubbing buinuess was done. Lard and neuts quiet and steady. Dressed hogs in moderate demund; small lots $\$ 7.25 \% 57.40$ and car lots $\$ 7$ fasi. 10 per 100 lbs. Eggs stendy at 20 c な 210 for ordmary fresh in cases; limed, $18 \mathrm{c} \Phi$ 19c.
