- Dhiry Commissioner Robertson has reecived areport from the Dominion dairy station in Now Brunswiek, whore lancy ereamery butter is being made. The quanlity of butter made during the month of July reached 7,260 pounds. Farmers in that neighborhood aro greatly satisficil with the operation of the station, whereby they are reliced fromithe work of making butter in home dairies. A pro-
duct of uniform excellence is also being made which will be suitable for either the lome trade of for export to forejgin markets.
-The Richelien and Ontario Navigation Company will innugurate anew plan of running the Toronto-Montrenl route uext season. They intend to run new lako stenmers with state-room necommodations from Toronto through to Prescott, ant there transfer passengers on observation steamers to shoot the rapids. The old line boats, "Corsican," "Spartan," "Algerian" and "Passport," will be rebuilt; all the state-rooms will be taken ont, so that they will have observation decks. It is intended to run these boats and the new "Columbian" next year from Prescolt to Montreal.
-The mines of the Canadian Anthracite Coal Compnay are developing fast at Cammore and Anthracite menr Banfi on the Canadian Pacific railway. On necount of the great discoveries now being made in the Kootemay country in British Columbin ademund for coko is arising. Whe common conl makes excellent coke for smelting and motal manufneluring purposes.

The conl is largely used on the Canadian Pacific railway both in the engines and for henting the passenger tronins. It is also likely to be used in the Canndian Pacific stenmers running from Vancouver, B. C., to Japan.-Coal Trade Jourmal.

The points which reguire elucidation are:
1st. To what extent are the capital outlays of this country for water-ways being utilised by the marine of a forcign nation?
2nd. What return for such outlays does this country obtain from such forcign vessels?
3rd. What reciprocal adrantages do we enfoy for providing canals for a forcign marlue?
4ith. What return does the country secure from its own vessels for the use of our camals?
5th. To what extent does the rebate on canal tolls draw ficight away from the lake ports of the States? Jpon a thorough aequaintance with the facts inati answer these questions hangs the whole present controversy between Canada and her neighbour.

As to what the Washington treaty says, or does not say, there is such a divergence of opinion that, it is practically no factor in the question, aud will not be until both parties agree as to what each are severally bound to by that instrument. Until that agreement is renched, it is a mere beating the air to discuss that mysterious document. - The official returns are as follows:

The total quantity of frcight passed through the whole length of the Welland canal during the season of 1891 , was 945,239 tous, of this quantity 283,552 tons were west bound and 661,687 tons east bound. Of this castbound freight, Canndian vessels carrica 262,547 tons and United States vessels carried 300,140 tons; and of the westbound Canadian ressels carried 30,009 tons, and United States vessels carried 247,543 tons.
This shows that of the total freight passed through the Welland last year Canadian vessels carried 298,556 tous, and U. S. Yessels carried 643,083 tons,
our share being only 31.60 per cent. of the whole. So far tinen as the Wellaud canal is concerned, which Canada built, more than two-thinds of the outlay was for the special advantage of American -trade. of this east-bound. frefght our vessels carricd about 40 per cent. and of swest-bound freight they carried 12.60 per cent. of the enst-bound freight $U . S$. vessels carried 60 per cent. and of west-bound 87.40 per cent. This extroordinary disparity between the respective proportions carried east and west by the two countries, arises from the refusal of the American goverament to allow Canadian vessels to trade between the American ports. The effect being that, while, going east, the respective proportions stood as 40 for Canada, to 60 per cent. U. S., on the return trip they stood as 21.60 ior Canada, to 87.40 per cent. U. S. Thus, an American law practically shut us out from the use of our own Welland canal for return freigits, a deprivation which seriously detracts from the profits of our Canadian marine. Yet, becauso Camada has endearoured to overcome this discrimination by giving a bounty in the way of a rebate to vessels procecding along our chamels to the sea, the American government has threatenca to "retaliate." "Retaliate" forsooth! If retaliation were a justlifiable course, it should be ours to adopt for such a monopoly of the Welland canal by a foreign marine.
These figures answer the first threc questions; we bave provided a canal at a cost of $\$ 23,000,000$ which is utilis. ed to the extent of two-thirds by the States; we are not allowed to use the southern U. S. Canals at all; and the northerly one not on the same terms as our neighbours, who, as we have shown, do not permit us to use them as freely as we allow them to use ours.

As to the return we get for our outlays on the Welland, it is clear that for west-bound frefight it is very trilling, and for east-bound is less than onethird of the capacity of the earning power of the canal.
As to the cficet of rebates in drawing freight along our water-ways to the sea, the statisties furnished by the Blue book are inconclusive, but ratien fayor the argument against any such effect being produced. In 1882 there were 180,69: tons of grain passed on to Muntreal, and giz,ssi tuns from U. S. ports to U. S. por'ts. So that while the grain tonnage increased in 1891 orer 1882 on the Montreal route by 63.50 per eent, the tonnage to $U . S$. ports increased over 200 , per cent. Whis does not look as though our rebates liad done the terrible dimage to the American route that is represented. Had the proportion continued which existed ten years ago this port of Montreal would have received 360,000 tons, instead of 295,000, and U. S. ports would have received 180,000 lons instead of 202,000. So that there has been a yery serions dimination in the amount of grain passing this port by water in the last ten years, and a corresponding increase in the shipments by U. S. ports in spite of the rebate system. Mre facts then are utterly fatal to the cry againsti rebates as a discrimination against American vessels; they rather furnish a strong argument against rebates because of their injury to Canadian marine interests, and seem to suggest that the ouly way to make revates do, what they are intended for, is to allow them on all grain that passes this port irrespective of place of transhipment. To that however, there are obvious obvious objections. The whole question indeed is a tangle, so much so that the meeting called in this city to consider it came to no other conclusion
than a dectsion to leave the matter in the hands of the Government.

There are however, other facts very seriously affecting this guestion, other Lhat those of eanal statisties. The fight for ifeight between canals and railways has for sume time turned in fayor of the detuer. The candels in the New York state have given up nearly zo per cent. of their business to ratways in the last ten yenrs. The Erie canal is at su low and ebl fur prolitable crate that ilss abandonment is nol unlikely. An Jngland, canal ater cianaliats hat to be clused, in some cases bicy have been utilised for milway roaddeds. 'lye increase of grain ircights to this port, on our two ralways, hats far excecded that of the cinals in recent yeatrs.
Alhough some prediel a fike fille to our canals, hacir opinion is not generally held, nor does it bind faror in Lhe states. At the Decip Waternay Convention, all Americall nald: "Within five yearts from the present lime al the present rate of, progress, and whe dil three years it the work is hatstened at litbe, hare will be ateare chamel for vessels diawing Jit leet of water Hhrough Gunalian territory, all the way to the sea," After disparaging the U. S. canals he went on to sily:
"I do nut sete how the Ameriean liamer cin hope to win in competition with men of the stme race, men just as intelligent, withat elimate no more risor. ous, with a soil at least as fertile and with hamsportation facilitios inmenc. surably superior. The great phatis of Gue Ginatian Nior (h-Wusto are whsedtled now, but when onee the eonditions of sivil and elinate which there exist are supplemented by fatilities for transportation not suppassed, il equalled by those of any obler region, I bellere the Canadian North-West will settle up wibla a race of hardy, intelligent anid prosperous people and will become the gramary of the world, Ife who carla most cheaply reach the mankets of the world can control the markets of the worlid."

Cantila js now more han liberal in granting her canals so freely, and her ports so onomly, to a foreign power which forbitis our madiners to trate between ger ports, and chreatens to close her northern canall to our vessels. Thme is on our side; justice approves our course; Camala can afford to be both patient, and madamimous. But Camadit cannot afford to play the coward, by changing her poliey under a theat.

## SA. JOHN'S PHRE.

Ihe Insurance Monitor is complimentary to British insurance companies. It Bins: "गhe recent luge lite in St. Johu's, Newfoundland, was in severe one to several langlish companies, and the
loss was so disproportioned to the annual receipts from the entire island that it will wipe out the income of twentyfive years. The event is a fair illustration of the uncertainty of the busine-ss as applied to a limited ternitory; but, after all, one cannot help admiring the pluck of the British companies in keeping right on in St. Joln's instead of hastily withdrawing thell agencies after the manner of some of oun own companies.".
The elearance of so large an area as is now covered by a mass of ashes and debris at St. John's, affords the insurance companies an exceptionally line opportunity for bringing their combined influence to betr upon the character of the new structines that will occupy the space, and upon the re-organization of the fire department of that city.
It is a matter of surprise that tile companies insuriug in St. John's were so willing to accept risks of so very risky a character, in so very risky a phace. Had the eity not been so largely built up of wooden houses, all massed: together, there would have been no such fire as arose from this combustible district becoming a vast furnace.
Had the fire department been in firstclass condition any fire would have been promptly put out. But years of immunity from fires had induced such laxity as ought, by its warning, to prove invaluable in the future.
The local press of St. John's is contrasting the apathy shown by the people of the States with the warm sympathy, and munificent liberality of the Canatian people. It seems that the Newfoundland disaster has evoked no gifts from the States, except from the residents who hat from that istand.
This is regarded as, "the more surprising becanse our trinte with the United States is larger than with Camadia; more of the midives of this colony live in the former than in the latter, and there has of late been a very marked tendency in one it least of our political pardies to favor the former at the expense of the latter. Our Government has been at wat with all things Canadhan, excludiug Canadian goodis from our markets and Canadian fishermen from our ports."
The question is now being seriously asked by Newfoundland; why they should not be part of the Dominion that has shown them "such splendid generosity ?" The fire is likely to have important poiltical issues.

Canade is not languishing for the entrance of the Island into Confederation; but we might tale it as a junior partuer if favorable terms could be arranged, and all chance of European poitital complications were removed.

## QUEBEG MUNICIPAL STATISTICE.

The municipal statistics of the Province of Quebec are required to be prepared and transmitted to the legislature under articles 168 and its sub. divisions of the Municipal Code. :
The last returns which have been published by the Legislature, are for the year 1890. The delay in the presentation and publication of these statistics calls for the attention of the Government, especially of the Hon. Mr. Pelletier, Secretary and Registrar of the Province. Possibly the political bouleversement of last yeur , may have prevented their carlier issue, but there is no excuse allowable for the returns being so impericet. It is stated that 73 Secretary-Ireasurers, to whom their reports were returned for corrections, "did not think proper" to make them. If these officers may or may not comply with the law, as their personal pleasure dictates, it is high time the Municipal Code were amended, so as to compul obedicnce to its provisions under pain of such penalties as would: ensure these statistics being furnished.
We are at a loss to understand why the cities of Montreal, Qucbec, and Three Rivers are allowed to withhold their figures for those municipalities. They contain onc-fourth of the total population of this Province, and in regard to values they should represent about hall, as in 1866 the value of taxable real estate was $\$ 115,323,133$ for the counties, and $\$ 56,029,105$ for these three cities, and in 1890 it was $\$ 180,197,001$ for the counties, and $\$ 33,-$ 014,995 for these same three cities.
The number of municipalities in the Province is 888, of these the official return reports that 300 have not sent in their statements. The total number of counties is 67 , the delinquent municipalities are spread over 59 counties, so tiat only $S$ out of 67 county returns are complete.
This indicates a looseness of administration, and a disregrard of pablic law that are equally discreditable to the Government and the municipal authorities.
The matural question suggested by these fuets is; Do those municipal officers who thus set the Mrunicipal Code at maughti in this respect, show their contempt for its provisious in other maters relating to their obligations and duties? It is a fair presumption that those who neglect the law in so important a respect, have no respect for the law, and that they have some reason for withholding their balance sheets when demanded by the Government.

It would not be surprising were it discovered on investigation that, the books of those delinquint municipalities are not in order. To fill up the Government form would not take over five to ten minutes time of a municipal treasurer, if his accounts are straight. Is it probable that 300 such officers in our country. districts are so busy that they cannot spare a few minutes once a year to fill up a form which the law requires them to complete?

The Government should have sent an expert in municipal accounts to afew of these places whence no returns had come, and issued a notice to all the other delinguints that, unless the law were promptly complied with he would also pay them a visit, and have their accounts investigated.
The statisties published furnish the following totals:

The excess by $\$ 870,000$ of payments over peceipts is not explained in the retura.
If then we take the official figures, and estimates, as correct as to the value of Quebec's taxable real estate at $\$ 201,960,000$, and add thereto, say one-fourth for the 300 places omitted, which is $\$ 50,400,000$ and then add the estimated proportion for Moutreal, Quebee, and Three Rivers, which is $\$ 126,225,000$, we get for at total $\$ 378$,675,000 , as the value of the whole taxable real estate in this Province.
Applying the same rule of proportion to the non-taxable properties, we find that $\$ 47,271,922$ worth of the real estate of this Province is exempt from taxation. This however is under the mark, as the proportion of such exempted properties held in these three cities is, we believe, more than half of what exists in country districts.
Regarded as a basis for raising such a revenue as this Province requires, to meet provincial expenditures, there is amply sufficient to supply all that is needed, without recourse to loans; and without placing oppressive tax burthens on the people.
We trust the next issue of these returns will be complete, including the statistics for the three cities named which could be procured on application to thelr thensurers. If the information were supplemented by returns of the existing municipal loans afloat, these
statistics would be of the highest financial value.

## EARLY INSURANCE.

No greater service can be done to young persons, of both sexes, than to initiate them early into a knowledge of the responsibilities of maturer life. There are thousands of youths now on the rond to ruin whose parents have started them on that course, and who from mistaken kinduess, or pride, are kecping them in that path
These young persons are being brought up without any lenowledge of the worth of a dollar; they have no conception of the cost of llving, or of clothing; hence they contract habits of spending wholly regardless of what their capacity for maintaining such expenditures will be when they grow up to man's or woman's estate.
A dry goods and clothing dealer one charged up against one of his sons, all the articles supplied to him in one year, he having a free run of the store. The account was made out at the close of the year as though the lad were a customer, and it was pointed out to him, as an object lesson, that any salary he would be likely to earn for some years after coming of age, would not be sufficient to keep him in that one class of necessities. The lesson led to an cra of "economy and retrenchment."
Now one of the primary duties of young men is to secure some insurance on their lives. The time when they begin to think of matrimony comes soon after being of age, and it is not merely advisable, it is a paranount duty for one contemplating that step to protect his future bride by securing a life policy.
No scheme of expenditure is complete without a provision for this prudential step. The carlier young persons become practically familiar with the payment of life insurance premiums, the eusier will be the habit at a later perfod, and the more readily will they learn to practice those economies out of which such payments may be made. Instead of parents allowing sons and daughters to lave a free run of the domestic treasury, it is incomparably wiser to give them practical lessons in regard to the cost of their own keep, and clothing. In the ease of a son earning a salary, it is well to let him know precisely how much he costs, how much he will cost when he is his own master, and to induce him to devote part of his carnings to the keeping up apolicy of insurance upon his life in Fiew of contingencies, The great thing is
to start the habit of coing this, as being much a part of his ordinary outlay as any other necessity.
'Of course there are exceptional cases where the parents life is nomadic, or where their sons are likely to be seattered far from home. But such cases are far from common, and young persons these days, must get into yery remote places indeed to be out of reach of the company in which they are insured.
The objections that companies would be imprudent to accept the lives of young people, because their parents would be too young to afford grood evidence of their being sound lives, so far as heredity is concorned, does not seem serious. The parents of a youth, say of sixteen, must be, on the average, forty years of age, an age advaneed enough to enable a medical expert to fudge of their constitutions and hatbits. At such an age too the grandparents would be usutlly alive, so that they could be seen, and evidence as to their lives, and the family record, be acquired Detter than at a later date.
As to the question of "insurable interest," this is casily answered when application is made for a policy. This step is never likely to be taken spontancously by a youth or young man. to whom such aproviling for the future is not natural, so that the existence of an insurable interest is almost necessarily involved in the insurance of young persons.
The great point to be secured is to create an interest in the young in their own policy. 'lley should be thoroughly informed upon the theory and practice of life insurance; its advantages should be dwelt upon; and the sense given to them that the policy covering their lives is their property, as once they are imbued with this conviction, it will be their pride, and a source to them of moral strenglit in resisting cemptations that are likely to endanger such a possession, and in acquiring habits of saving, and making provision for the future. As a lesson in, and motive for frugality, and as an initiation into the practical duties of life, carly insurance has a value which has not been fully recognized.

## THE CONDITHON OF U. S. AGRTCULTURISTS.

The common saying that there are two sides to every question has received a striking illustration in two reports presented to Congress from the committee on Agriculture. The report of the majority is significant in view of the contest now proceeding between
the staunch upholders of the present high tariff, and those who fiver its modification, upon which pivot will turn the presjantial election. Ti is contended by the opponents of the tariff thant, white other interests have been promoterl by it, "there has been a steaty decline in the price of farm produels under the several tariffs in forec since the war." The perion during which the low tariff of 1 Stic was in force is affirmed to have been a far more qurosperous time for agriculture than since a higher one was imposed, ande, that, the more restrictive and prohibitive the trate with other countries, the worse it hats been ior igrieulture. The prohibitive tariff has projudiced Eurojean nations against the Unitat States and in the retatiation which followed, agrienllure was dealt an irreparable injury. The American farmer is now comperlead to sell his produets in dived competition with he panper and shave lathor of Asia and Arica, labor which maniges to subsist on wages averaging less than three dollars per month. The report presents statisties showing the decrease in the whe of farm lants in the United states hetween 1870 and 1880 , and the elnerrase In the values of firm products from 1sTu lo lssu). Deating with the sub. dect of reciprocal trade retations, it states thati perhaps the flimsiest and boldest atiompt to decese the firmers is the seheme of reciproeity as meant (o) he put in fored with Central and Sonth Anurican combries. It argues Wat nearly all these countries being agrienllural, any reciprocal interchame whathen cannot be of adrantage to Ameriean farmers. li, says the report, it is monat to arvance the interests of agrienllure by reciprocal armagement, the test of sincerity would be to inclute Jomopean comblies in the arrangement, they being the natural consumers of agricullumal probucts. We are unable to follow the argument ats stated in this report. That, "the Ameribun firmer is now eompelfed to sell his products in competition with shave Dabor," is not it result of the high tamef, as the report implies, for the English lamer is suldeet to the same competition. The development of the proilucing powers of Asia and Africa will go on despite any fiscal policy adopted by the States: and the food buyers in Greati Britain will huy in the cheapesi market, in spite of any "reciprocal arrangements." So far as the largest market for U. S. agricultmod products Is concerach, there is no opening for any. form of reclplodty that would
benefit the American farmers. Great Britain keeps her ports open and free to the U. S. agriculturists, she has therefore nothing to conede, nothing inded to reciprocate with.
In presenting the minority report, Mrr. Funstan of Kansas, stated the opinion of the commitice to be that, whille 10 one disputes that the American ag: riculturist is having a hard time, nor that there had ever been any better ones, nor any half so good, excepting war times.
The uminorily say there is not one article on the list of Americen goods that is not cheaper to day under a protective tariff than it was under free trade in 1860. Speaking of the present, reciprocity law, the roport says, "it is a reciprocity which gets us something in return for throwing open our markuts free to those things which we camnot produce ourselves, or, in other worts, it gets us something for that for which we have heretofore received nothing."
The minority assert it is not their design to show that the farmer is getling all he ought to get for his productions nor to even show that he is doing well, lut only to show that the prices he is now getting are good and so satisfactory to him that in the opinion of the minority he would giadly continue chem indefintely. While the failure of the merchant, the banker and the speeulator is of dity oecurrence, the farmer is so scliom sold out to pay his creditors that there is scarcely a record to be found of it.

The minority asserts that the stiatement that fiums Inve shrunk in value is a matter of mere assertion, for which there is no data. Ithe minority has carefully consitered the condition of the famer cunder the tariif laws of 1883 and 1800, and finds that in no other country, and in no obler time in this counbry, has there been a law passed of an economic elaracter in whieh the interests of any class of persons were more carefully guturded man those of the farmer were in the tariff law of 1800.

We have then in these officials repolts, one body of experienced public men declaring that the American farmer is being subjected to the competition of pauper and slave libhor, and that the MeKinley tariff jus inflieted on $U$. S. agriculture an Hreparable injury; while another section of others, equally well informed, weelare that the farmers of the States are having a hard time, and indeed thatthey never had a good time sove during the war.

The former declare that the tariff has done serious injury, has brought down the values of farm lands and that the boasted reciprocity has been of no benefit to U. S. farmers. The latter, whife admitting that hard times are the lot of the farmers, and always have been, assert that the tariff has more carefully guarded their interests than any previous legislation.
The ouly possible conclusion to be drawn from these reports is, that, the agriculturists of America are not in so flourishing a coudition as to excite the envy of our own people, nor to render their immigration to the states lor the purpose of cultivating land, a prudent step.

## QUEDEC BOARD OF TRADE COMPLAINISS.

The Quebee Board of Trade at its meeting on the $1 \dot{\mathrm{~s}} \mathrm{th}$ inst., seems to have been in a reforming humour. It resolved to petition the city council to lower the assessments on real estate, which are declared to be double the selling value of properties. We doubt if that could be established whether taxes are collectable as no court would sanction so gross a stretch of municipal authority. If the Council of Quebec has authority to impose taxes on assessments regardess of the saleable value of real estate the citizens who own property are in a perilous condition, as the assessments might be pushed to the extent of absolute confiscation. Indeed they are running close up to that point when they reach double the selling value of real estate. Whe Board of Trade should take steps to secure an amendmenti of the law, if the grievance they protest against is not an illegal albuse of the powers of the Council.

Another complaint of the Board of Trade is that the overseer of fisheries, appointed by the Dominion Government, is a member of the Legislature of Newfoundland, and his salary so small that he can only afford to give sernps of his time to fishery interests. The anomaly of a Canadian official, charged with the oversight of our fish. eries, boing one of the legisiators of an indepenident colony, whose fishery interests at times conflict with those of which the is the official oversect, is flagrant. No man can serve two masters, especially two whose interests clasin. The inspector should bo asked to elect whom he will serve, Canada or Newfoundland.

Complaint is also made at the inadequacy of the preventive service to suppress smuggling. More especially is another steamer needed to patrol the

North shore of the Gulf where serious damage is being done to our fisherles by Newioundlanders who spread their nets across the moiths of rivers nud bays. Herc then is a matter in whilh the duty of the Fishories Iuspector must conflict with his position as a Newfoumdander, and a legislator of that island. The Board of Trade has reasou for asking that the officials of the Dominion be Canadians.
Their appeal to the Government to dispose of contruband whiskey ouly to distillers to be kept, as is their own make, for two years, has much to be said for it. The sacrifice of revenue between a sille to distillers, and a sale of this smugerled whiskey by anction, canuot be serions, and it is certainly not desirable for the Govermment to be, to auy extent, a party to the sale of an article which for lack of proper care and kecping, is extremely deleterious. The Govermment, technically, cannot break the law, but it is practically a breach of the daw for whiskey to be sold in open market before it has undergone the necessary process for rendering it fit for consumption.
By vigorous measures, well plamed, the smugring business. could be almost wholly suppressed long before winter.

## algoma to deie fore.

The inhabitunts of Algoma have issucl an appenl to the press to place the claims of that district before the conutry at large. Whoy complain that while Manitoba and the N. W. Perritorics have been lardyoly and expensively. " boomed "and advertisel, not a word has been salid abjout Algoma. Thero is truth in this, but our friends in that section should remember that they form part of Ontario, and any " booming," or "adrellising" needed to draw the attention of immigrants properly devolves upon the Government of that lrovince. It is stated that the great Distriet of Algoma, misculled a"District," in area and madeyeloped resources a "Province," contains millions of acres of the finest agricultural stook raising and fruit growing lands in the world. There is roon within its confines for the surplus population, not ouly of older Canadn, and of the older of the United States, but of Europe, and is the narest and most accessible field of Immigration and Colonization in the world to-day, lying as it does in the very centre of Canoula, and being within twonty-four hours journes by rail or stenmer from almost any part of older Ontario or Quebec. The attractions it offers to tenunt farmers, and others from older lands, who have a little means or capital, however small, and a practical knowledge of farming, are nbsence of drought, or summer frosts; plenty of good water ; abundance of timber ; splendid pastunge for sheep and oxell; good wheat lands; especially fuvorable conditions for growing roots, all kinds of vergetables and
small fruits; and a very healthy climate. The means of communieation with the outside world are good, the Sault branch of the Catailian Pacific rumning righta through the territory, and several steamers touching at the rarious ports. Land is cheap, good farms being obtainable at priees, ranging from $\$ 300$ to $\$ 1,000$. Although, as stated, the sehools are necessarily somewhat backward and ronds not of the lest, still both are far ahend of those provided for the early settlers in the older parts of Ontario. Few of the fesidents are more than three miles from a school. The wealth of Mgoma in mincrals is well known, and there is mbundance of work to bo had in the winter, in the lumber camps, and at the mines. Persons with $\$ 800$ to $\$ 3,000$ can buy partially cleared larms at a very low figure. The resillents in Algoma say that if those who are thinking of settling in the States were to see their distriet first, there would be no exodus.

## aduliteration of drugs.

The Pharmaceutical Journal of this city republishes our article on the adulterition of drugs, which it states "has been widely commented upon." One of the lead. ing drug journals in the States refers to it "as giving the impression that pure food and drugs are difficult to obtain in the Dominion." To this our contemporary replics: "As a matter of fact we aro better off in Cauada in the direction of the purity of foods than are our American neighbours; and as to the adulteration of drugs, spices, esseutial oils, soups, etc., our troubles are only a feeble copy of what exists throughont the United States, and in other older countries. That our people suiler from the almost criminal practices of certain dealers in same of the articles referred to, does not make the position satisfactory here. But it is amusing to read the lines of comment upon the article in question, written by men who know so woll, that, in the land of the "Stars and Stripes," no high standard of purity is unvaringly current, and that our sympathy oxtended to them would be more in lieeping with the weight of the evil." As conclusive evidence that the drug trade in the States camot throw stones at Canadians we point out that a committec on pilulteration appointed by the N. Y. State Pharmacentical Association has just jeported that the examination of over twenty artieles proved that they were all being sold in an adulterated form. Although the Pharmacentical endenvors to minimise the extent of the evil against which we wrote, it admits that " there is doubtless enough that is wrong to warrant the officers of the Inhad levenuc devoting more time to the analysis of drugs and medicines." Over that we will shake hands, as it expresses all wo contanded for.

## LEGAI DECISIONS RE PASS BOOKS.

The American Banker reports the following important decisions by the Courts: 1. Though lime siginature of a persou prosenting a pass book to a savings bank for payment of a deposit mude twelve years befors is difierent from the siguature of the depositor, written in the signature
book at the time he made the deposit, still, if on iuquiry the person says that he is the depositor, and correctly answers three oi the eight fest questions written in the signature book, giving the county in a foreign country where the depositor was borm, the name of the vessel on whieh he came to this country and his mothige's maiden manc, even though the teller did not ask him the other five questions, it is not error for the court to hold, as a matter of law, that the bunk used reasomble care in paying the dopositl Audrows, J., dissenting.-Wall v. Emigrant, Industrial Suv. Bank (Sup), 10 N. J. S. 104.
2. In an action by adepositor against a savings bank to recover the deposit, after the bank lans paid it out to tha wrong person, who had presentel the pass book and correctly answered the test questions written in the signature book at the time the deposit was made, where the eridence, though it might bo sufficionl to require the submission to the jury of the question of defendant's negligence, shows that the information which enabled the person to correctly answer the test questions was given by plaintiff in responso to a letter of inquiry from a stranger, it is proper for the court to direct a verdiet for defendant, since phaintiff's contributory negligence was the proximnte cause of the loss. Andrews, J., dissenting,-Wall จ. Emigrant Industrinl Saw. Bauk (Sup.), 19 N. Y. S. 194.

## la patrie on giteese.

In an articie on Canadian cheese La Patrio says: Lu saison a ete particulierement bonue celte annee pour les fabricants de fromage; la production a cte excellente et les ventes tellement actives que les fromagrevies sont presque depourvues de stock. Du 1 er mai au Ier aout les exportations selewaient ectice amee a 64,0,000 boites contre 524,000 boites l'an dernier, soit une augmentation de IIG,000 boites. Nous depassons considerablemeat, sous ce rapport le nort de NewYork dont les exportations n'ont ete, cette annce, que de 563,000 boites jendant la meme poriote de temps. Neammoins le mouvement dexportation de la metropole anmericaine acense egnlement une nugmentation de 86,000 boites on 1892, sur 1802. ## a doubtrul way of raising MONEY.

A grant of fivo million half dollars has been made by Congress towards the World's Fair. Thero is aproject on foot to "cor-
ner" these specjully struck silver hald dollars, and sell them as somvenirs of the exhibition. It is estimated that they will sell rendily at $\$ 1$ ench, and so net $\$ 2,500$, $\overline{000}$ gain to whatever body of sipeculators, The managers of the Fair, or others, handle these coins. The seheme is more ingenious thin honest, it would serionsly reflect upon the Americin Government, and poople, were hational coins phaced in circulation under such circumstances. If a medul were stuluek to commemorate the event, it might be placed for sale at a small price, say 25 eents, which woukd leave a large profit. Rut to exploit a apecially issucd mational coin at a premiam of 100 per eent, as is proposed, would almost cutainly defent itself, as it woukd lead to wholesnle imitalions, which wouk not be readily diseovered during the Thir time, as those who gave \$1 for a 50 cont piece would only do so in order to secure a souvenir. 'Thus the base half dollars wouk not get into general circulation, and remuin muletected in the purses of victions, the victims of aswindle direetly fostered by an over-reaching scheme of the Government. "Jubiles" coins are at a small premium in Eaghand, but noither the Mint, nor the Bank of Sugland, not any banks that issued them ever passel them at a preminm. The seheme should be nbandoned, a "fake" of that elass Bhould be left to professional simpers.

## THE MAXOR ANJ CIMY LOANS.

The finuse committee of this city recently borrowed one million dollars at alout 4.50 per cent. The Mayor affirms that the money cond have been obtained from the Bank of Montreal at 4 per cent. Ife has thereupon fallen out with the dimane commillee for not taking him into their confidence bufore making these loans. Ho has good grounds for complaint. As chief execulive officer of the city he is, ex, officio, $n$ 'momber of all commitiont, ambl his offico entitles him, anyway, to the compliment, if no more, of such imporiant negotiations being mamed to him. That creryborly knew of these lonns, and therefore he did, is irrelevant. The AFayor of acily onght mot to be left to piek up news about eity loans from street yrossipurs. ds atryor indeed he camol; learn such nows, which as Mayor, in his otificial capacity, le is farirly entilled to be informed of. We are not often in accord wilh our Chief Magistarace, but in asserting the dignity, and the rights of his high office, he has renson and daty on his side. It looks as though the finance commitite hal paid more than it need have done for that million lom. Surely if they declimed to consult the Mnyor, they ought to have sounded the Bunk of Montreal on the business.

## TORON'LO JBASEHOLJ PMOMERTY.

A recent decision has been mado by are bitrators appointed to fix the leasehold ground rent of properties in 'loronto on King St., on the opposite side to the Rossin llouse and castward a few hundred feet. Tho corner on King and lork is fixed for the next 21 years at $\$ 33$ per foot frontage, and along King St. $\$ 2 \overline{0}$ per foot. The old rentals were $\$ 8$ and $\$ 10$. Tho
property is part of the Baldwin estate. The lots nre we believe about so feet deep, so that one with 20 ft . frontago would contain 2,000 square fect. A grommi rent of $\$ 38$ per foot, on a lot that size, being $\$ \$ 25$ per annum, would be six per cent on a valuation of $\$ 13,750$, whieh is equal to $\$ 0.87$ per square foot, as land is sold in this city. The location corresponds, ns far as a comparison can be instituted between two cities difiering so widely as Monlreal and Toronto, to the south sile of our St. James St., east of MeGill, the land values there ranging from $\$ 16$ to $\$ 18$ per foot. On Notre Dame, nother central location for refail business, between the parish church aud MeGill, the land is estimated at about $\$ 10$ per foot. In valuing properly for long leases, of course the probabilities of increasing value have to be considerdil. Here, leased land is extremely mpopular, the prices above named are based upon what the frechold would fetch were the land vacant. Taking an arerage of land values in this city, they range from 50 to 1.00 per cent higher than in Toronto.

## THIL: PREAIIER ON LOTYERIES.

A deputation from St. Jean Baptisted Sociely, consisting of Ald. Hollnand, Ald. Hurtean, and Mr. L. O. David, waited on the l'rovincial Calinet a few days ago, to ascertain the intention of the Govermment in regard to the lotiery question. Premier do Boucherville spoke very strongly on the subject. He frankly informed the deputation that he was, and always hard bene, strangly opposed to lotteries of all kinds and in whatever shage they were presented to the public. Jie sympathized with the St. Jean Baptiste Society in its efforts to rase money for the completion of the Monument Natiomal, but even that sympathy would not permit him to give the deputation any hope that the Government would allow the lrovinee of Quebee lottery to exist. It would have to go, so would every other lottery in the Province. The Government had agreed on that. However, as the Socieis was placed in apceuliar position the lremier said be would for the present allow the lotery to be continued for a short time in order to give the Society a chance of finding some other better means by which to raise moncy to pay for the monument.

## THE MILLING INTEREST AND THE WORLD'S FAIR.

At the recent meeting of the Dominion Miller's Association an appeal was made to the trade to make as good an exhibit as possible at the Chicago Mair. Mr. J. S. Larke-who is working up the Canadian exhibit-pointed out that the Fair caunot be boycotted by Canada, that business wen from Americn, Lurope and Asia will be present, and that ji Cauadian millers fail to make a show the Americun millers will bo greatly pleased and benefited. A display of raw products alone will strengthen the falso iden entertained regarding Canada by outsidurs. Canadian mills and grain-growers are so numerous that export is needed. Which shall be exported, whent or flour? A good exhibit of flour will greally assist in finding a
foreign market. It is quality and not quantity, Mr. Larke reminded his hearers, that will tell there, and hegrve some hints as to how the exhibit could be made attractive in appearance.

## Mr. SEARGEANT ON RETALLATION.

The General Mannger of the Grand Trunk may well be unable to explain why his line should be aimed at by certain fireeating U. S. Senators, who have got "retaliation" on what they suppose to be their brains. On being interviened Mr . Seargeant expressed surprise at the action of somo United States Semators who were seeking retaliatory legishation which seemed to have no reason for it that he could see, and which, apparantly, was aimed at the Grand Trunk. There, for instance was Senator Chandler's action, introducing a bill of "whercases" and suggestions apainst the Granl Trunk, while the railway had most signally benefited the Stote of New Hampshire, which he represents. The same conld be said of Portland, Me. It was the G. T. R. first, nided by the C. P. R. more recently, that mado Portland an occan port. Senntor Chandler is a harmless sort of man as known to us; he klosest want to hurt the G. T. In., all de is anxions for is the creation of a littlo political capital to help his riends.

## NORIMI WEST CRODS.

11棁 The crop bulletin for August just issued by the Manitoba Govt. says :-The weather has been most farourable Auring July for ripening grain and groin is a weok ahead of last year. The weather resembles that of ten years ago, when frost was never hearl of. The estimated yield of wheat per acre is 22.07 bushels, five less than last yenr. The strow will not be so heavy, although the grain is good. Oats are well advanced; estimated yield per acre 43.16 bushels. Burley cutting is in full progress; estimated yield, 32.19 bushels. The unmamons report on potatoes is that they are $a$ splendid crop. For years past there has been no report so genernlly favouralble. No damage of any kind reported. Turnips and field roots are above tho average. There is a heary growth on pasture hands. Grazing is noted as "excellent;" "extra," "abore average," and in many cases much of tho upland grass will be cut for hay. Following brief summary shows the estimated yield in the proFince of the principal grain crops:-

slandering an insorance company.
An action was recently brought by tine Yorkshive Boiler Insurance Co. against a rival agent for slander. This agent tried to induce a person to transfer his insurance by casting doubts on the solvency of the Yorkshire. The Jury found a verdiet for plaintifi company. The Insurance Observer in reporting this caso remarks: "A company, although it may have neither a body to bo kicked nor a soul to be
saved, cannot be slandered with impunity any moro than a private individual. Agents must honceforth be caroulul. The praclice of deprecinting the position of a rival company is, we are afraid, a very common one, since most of those so slandered do not consider it worth their white to take action, and the others dare not, but agents will do well to understinnd that such couduct is actionable, and eonsequently fraught with danger to themselves."

CHEAl WHISKEY AND THE EXODlis.
The theory is broached that the movement of population out of this Proviuce to the States is owing to the extended operations of smugglers. The argument is that, cheap whiskey has denoralized the people to such an extent that to escape its ravages they have to flee away to a foreign lànd. 'lhat much mischief is enused by cheap and bad spirits is manifest enough, but as the exodus is chiefly made up from very young people, amongst whom spirit drinking is not practised, this theory will not stand the test of facts. If however all those who are enguged in smagyling whiskey, or in supplying smugelers with the requisite copital for their business, and those whe retail it, were to transport themselves across the border Camada would have reason to rejoice over their exodus. We hope Mr. Chaplean will make all sueh persons wish they were ont of his reach.

## GREAT VERSUS SMALL LITIGANAS.

Mr. Tustice Day in delivering judgment recently in an English Court spoke strongly againse "great companies trying importunt questions at the expense of small people." The ease was that of awidow who sucd for damages for the loss of her dinsband in a railway aecilent. The liunbility was not denied, but contention was paised that imasmued as the deceased's life was insured for $\$ 5,000$ the widow wat probably benefitted by the accillent, Lis Jordship shat down on this plea by saying: "She is so much worse off by the accident. If someboily gets up a subseription for her out of charity you aro not entitied to take accomet of that. Neither are you enticled to the results of this uan's prudence in having insured his hife." The Jury awarded the widow $\$ 15,000$ damages, deceased laving been proved to have enjoyed an income of $\$ 3,000$ per year.

## gIIE CANAL QUUSTION.

At a meeting of the Cabinet held in this city on the 13 th inst. it was decided to let the presenit arrangements as to camal dues and revates stand as they ore until the elose of this season. It is intended to hold a conference with the authorities at Waslington during the winter in order to arrive at sone amicable, and permanent understanding in regard to canals and railways.

## FIRE LOSSES IN FLOUR MILLS.

From a return published showing losses by fire in flour mills in Eugland we learn that from 1881 to 1888 the total was $\$ 0,600,000$. The number of fires in the
later year were 20 , and the losses, classified according to the mills, were, millstone sysfem $\$ 87,000$; mixed systen $\$ 70,-$ 000 ; roller system $\$ 500,000$. The improved machinery has not brought that immunity from fires which was expectexl, as it developed new forms of risk not foreseen.
-The launching of new joint atock enterprises goes oi apace, too fast a pace we fear for the future of some stockholders. The last Ontario Guzette annomecs that letters pateut incorporating tho followitg companies have been issued :-The External Journal Horso Pulley Company of Toronto (limited), with capital of \$50,000 ; the Surnia Salt Company (limited), with eapital of $\$ 20,000$; the Harman Homo \& Day School Company of Ottawa (himitell, with enjital of $\$ 25,000$, for the purpose of carrying on a school; the Pago Wire Fence Company of Ontario (limited), with enpital of $\$ 40,000$, the incorporators being all Americans, with the exception of Edward Chandler Walker of Walkerville; the Ontario Power \& Flats Company (limited), a Toronto Company, with capital of $\$ 70,000$, for the purpose of acquiring or erecting flats for manufucturiny or residential purposes, and to supply power, heat and light for flats and buildings; the William Dames Company (limitedl of Toronto, with capital of $\$ 250$,000 ; the Toronto Art Exhibit Company (limited), with a eapital of $\$ 10,000$; the Eagle Nest Gold Mining Company of Ontario (limited), capital $\$ 200,000$; the Goodwin Law Book ic Publishing Compeny of Toronto (limited), with a capital of $\$$ 000; the Arnprior Electrie Light \& Power Company (limited), with a capital of \$30,000 ; the Light, Heat \& Yower Company of Newmarket (limited), capital $\$ 40,000$; the Hastings Mining \& Reduction Company (limited), capital $\$ 100,000$; the Burlington Pressed Brick \& Lerra Cotta Company (limited), capital $\$ 30,000$.
-Simpson \& Cois Real Estate Mecorl reports that there were 145 real estate iransiers in the city wards and Cote St. Antoine, recorded in the registry offices during the month of July, amounting to \$727,880.22.

During the corresponding month of last yenr 107 transicrs were recorded, amounting to $8650,491.97$. The Record is calling out for some leader to inaugurate an era of reform in our city government. If the people were in carnest about this, a leader would soon appear. Public apathy is the cause of what evils exist.

According to the N. Y. Review, as quoted by the Observer, the United Fire Insurauce Company is about to follow the example of other British companies and make its Canadian branch, with head-quarters in Montreal, report direct to the head office
in Manchester. An associate manager to Mr. Percy Tr. Lane las been appointed in the person of Mr. J. II. Hudsou, formerly inspector for the Phoenix of London. The United may plant some local agencies, with power to issue direct policies, with the view of holding a portion of the City of London's valuable Canadiun busincess, which was recently taken over by the United's sister company, the Palatiule. Notivith standing this new departure of the United's, it will still continue its specialty of reinsurance in Canada. In the United States the company will, as heretolore, absolutely confine its business to rrinsurance. The new Candian arrangements have been carried through under the supervision of Mry. William Bell, the foreign superintendent of the United and Palatine companice. Montreal advies, states the Review, speak very promisingly of the future of the United in Canada.

The arrest of Hugh J. McCreaily, former: ly of Montreal, in Boston at the instance of his wifo, opens up a sad chapter of family history. McCready deserted his wife fome ten months ago and cloped to the States with the widow of his deceased brother James. When Mr. James MicGready died in October, 1800, he left his brother a legacy of $\$ 8,000$ per annum and his widow $\$ 2,000$ per ammun, upon the condition that she should not marry again. The erring widow, Margaret Breen MeCready, was for several years a familiar figure on tho streets of Montreal, as she drove along in her Victoria and was the daughter of the late Mr. Breen, for many years teller of the Molsons bank. It is recorded that when the late James NoCrendy had to sever business relutions with his brother on account of his dissipated habits he gave him $\$ 25,000$ in eash with which to start in business for himself. The widow McCrendy was also uddicted to drink. It would appear that too much money and a lack of useful occupation are nol condusive to real happiness and may be acurse instead of a blessing.
"Te Moude" has been bouglt in by Senceal, poitras \& Co., the registered owners of "La Minerve." It is understood that it will support the political interests of Caron and Ouimet, especially those of the latter.
