We are sure that the Hou. ainister of Finance will say 'yea' to this latter axion white holding firmly to his own riews as to the course to be adopled in veaching the desired result. The requfrements of Revenue are large and it is difient to see how trade absolutely tee or neighbourly reciprocity totally nurestrieted could produce the sum of a 2 , 000.000 whelh Mr. Fostel says has to be mised, outside of savings, for current serviees. That he is sincere in his endearours to mate the collection of this needed tevenue bear as lightily upon the consumer as possible is showir in the fact that by reducjog the taxation on sugur alone in \(1891-92\) he relieved him of a burden of itve-and-one-third millions of dollars. In like manner he snows that the tavifi can be rendered nexple and willing to adust itself to new, conditions as they inise, as he polnts out that the per capita of Cusfoms burdens has been reduced since \(1880-90\) from \(\$ 5.01\) to \(\$ 4.25\), a reductlou of 76 cents in this burden alone. We wish the Hon. Minister well in lifs contimuninco of what he says is the policy: of the Government as a whole,

No., to materially renuce the aggregate of taxation each year.
The total receipts from Customs, Excise and Miscelhaneous sourees during 1891-92 has been \(\$ 36,921,571\) or a loss of \(\$ 1,657,430\) compared with 1890-91. Tle year's expenditure has been 830 ,76is, 804 , or un increase over the previou: year of \(\$ 422,327\). It is estimated that the balance of the year may show expenditure at a slighty lacreased ratio when contrasted with the list mall of the former year, the causes for which are stated to be additional interes: on louns, expenses for quarantine stations, expenditure upón the Sault Ste. Marie and other camals. Nevertheless the seasou is early for a forecast, and wo must not hold the Hon. Mnister too closely to his inticipations that the current income of the present year will pay the expenditures from the consolidated fund and leave a good balalee to apply to capital account. DEAR YELSLS CHEAP LABOUR.
The misiug of wages however merely as at shore cut to identifying the interesta of employer amb employed has been proved inadequate-n measure cifieient as a stop-gap, it yet produces no lastiut sutisfaction to elther party. NotWithstanding Oren Tuit ln the North American leview to the contrary wo fail to see that labor is "noti a commodity". Just as dependenti upon laws of supply amb demand as any other. Capital gives of itself consintered both as money and the highest product of human powers, thought to labor and vict versu. It is capital which affords andor any possibility of value. Jo em-
phasize as Mr. Taft dows anfágonism between labor and clapital is to lose sight of tho facit that bone interests are identical. Labor is the rudiments of capital. Capital is lobor at its culminating point. Mr. I complains of the "lack of friction whith whifeh capltal attaius its legitimale ends." The grievance is surely unremsonable when we reflect that capital, which is the blossom adil flower of labor, provides the meaus and machinery mot only for the attainment of its own enids, but also for those of that very class assumed to be antagonistic to it. In retirn for labor intelligent or otheawise, capltal furnishes wages, chomglat, and besidee the means ior the pratical workiug of the common-wealthend assumes the responsibillty of jts canagemert.
The fifth of the propesithons wherein Mr. 'Taft sums up his conclusions reads thus: "A law ongeit to be made which would recognize the facts. The facts are that a laborer is a capital. ist. His capital is hla 180 waper son -himself."

The last four words arearr. Tart's. Is it not less derogratory to the dignity of the workingman to regareluislabor as a commodity? Labor or cupital, ether are only of value is flery represent utility to the community - The emaclated tramp who proposial a barter of hisoown person as a parel of rags and boues, lost sight of the fatet as Mr. Thit seems to do. that his alpital was worthless since it was so teded up as to be unavailable as a comindity.
More in accorfance with lhe spirit of freedom Mr. Field in the 'North American Review' says "the lisiring oif labor is in its essence a contract or salc. The employer buys the labor anal the lab. orer sells it."

And to prevent the evils: of despotism on the one hand or of eammunism on the other, Mr. Field shews it is imperative that the State by all means in its power induce the capithlist and the workman to actit in harmony. He then proceens to unfold a plain which certainly merits the careful counslderation of all concerned.

In Mr. Ficlids words
"Suppose a factory to bu chartered with a capital of a million of dollars divided fato two lundred thousand shares of five dollars eade thee-fifths of these to be payible in cash or property as at present, and trofifths in prospective lnbor: the former to be inrested in latid, the latter to bo reserved for such worlmen às may bo taken into the concern; the skilled wronkmen to be allowed wages sily for flustration int tho highest rates of the ouarket \(\$ 4.00\)
a day or more, and the unskilled \(\$ 2.00\) a day, und each one to be registered for four hundred shares. If the earnings were six per cenit on the capital each okilled worknian would be credited in 12 months, that is to say for 300 days' work with \(\$ 1,200\) for wages and \(\$ 120\) for profit. Deducting \(\$ 500\) for hls supplies, includiog fool, clothing, and lodging, there would be leit to lis credit at the end of the year \(\$ 820\) which would pay for a hundred and sixty-four shares of the stock. He would then have had his living and become the owner of 164 shares of the company. In the next year he would acquire 164 additioual shares and in less than three years would have more than paid for all the four hundred. The rate of wages, the supplies furnished, and the admission and dismigsal of share workers and the discipline of the eatablishment should be vested in all the shareholders, actual or expectant, while the financial department, and the purchases and sales should be in the hands of the cash or property sharènolders. Capital aud labor would thus be brought into. closer communion and made to lean on each other. To this and the requiremenl of a cash or property capital would be in part dispensed with and instead of it an obljgation to labor accopted. The share workmen must have the means of living while he is earning the price of his shares, He must be enabled to live as cheaply as possible by having his supplies furnished at the lowest price; he must reedive the highest wage while food producers must get the lowest; he must have fair wages anil within reasonable maintenance and the prospect of bettering his condition by becoming a particlpant in the profits of the combined labor and etpital. But all concerned should have the power of superintending the conduct of the workmen choosing between applicante and dismissing the jule or incompctent, recompensing them, of course, for what they have already earned and saved."

\section*{AMENLTTES ON INSTHECION.}

Fire insurance companics have much to contend with. Not only are they condemned as extortionists in the matter of rates, but when they venture to point outi or suggest how the properts owner can secure a reduction, they are scoffed at for elther proposing alterations; which are imposiblele, on the score of expense, or totally unnecessary In the opinion of the insurer, who of course is far more capable of judging of the hazard of his own particular risk,
that a mere Inspector, who oxamines three or four of such risks daliy on an average through the year. An fospecetor recently related to us some of his experiences, in the course of his surveye, which were amusiug as well as instructive, ill illustrating some of the diffecultes he had to meet and endenvor to overcome.
There were a few he ackuomledged, whe from possessing a fafr amount of understanding, or laving been.taught a lesson by a scorching; were wiling to admlt that a woolled mill was made safer by haring the picker in a separate bullding, a pianing mull by having the boiler house entilely cut onf, or a tanners when the bark mill was outside, and that the companies were both wise and justinfed in making reductions on riskes so construeted. On the uther hand there were those-and a large class too \(-W\) ho consjuered their risks, however inferior, is perfectly safe, and complained bitteriy of the rates demanded. " My risk is as safo as I can make it" exclaimed one man, a manufacturer of furniture, "I should say my boller heiuse is fireproof.",
The Inspector smiled and tapped the wooden door leading to the safd boller house, observing also that the brick dividing wall only extended up to and not through the roof, whereupon the language of the manufacturer became remarkably plain, and he stated-going the whole length of the expression that he was not going to be dictated to by any --- -- insurance man, yaming the Author of our existence and a powerful past participle. On another occision the Inspector who hatd smelt tameries before, and did not therefore imitate a former predecessor by plunging into one of the vats, followed the owner to his. batls minl, which was very convenfently placed close to the boller and Whirling away for ull it was worth, the tanery boiler and mill being a happy and united family. "I camot see any danger in a bark mill" sald the tanner. The inspector ventured to remarle that they had caused the destruction of many tazneries. "Well I never know it, and I have been in the business a good many years" was the reply, uttered in the most authoritative tone. A thind, the owner of a sash and door fictory: pointing to the river which flowed beside his mill, said he did not see how he could bum na, although the had not even a pall with whiel to util-; fae the water.

\section*{The catime mibargo.}

There is, however, a inight as well as a dark side to every picture and past conditions might be altered, in some respects, to the greater adrantage of the producer and the trade at large. The absurdity of shipping lean stock and feed along with then, from this side, must be patent to every ous, except the needy furmer, the freight broker and the scotels grazier.
If is," however, difficult to finduce the farmer and eertatin old fashioned traders to break away from the established wider of hings and these conservative interests, johed to those who were inturalisi imignant that Cauadian catile should be unjustly scheduled have not failed to press thelr clums for redress. The country

There is a comfortable assurance aflont that no contagious diseases exist, butt this is not conclusive and dous not meet the mresent case. The pubile naturally argue that the facts are all on one side. dmong the large number of eatitle sent forward it would be strange fudeed if a, few instances of suspicious deaths, not tarsily accounted for, did not occur. The discase about whieh the dread existe is, however, highly infectious, and if. it had heen abroad it would not have. stopped at one or two enses, as one case would speedily have led to a dozen: or more.
Withont diseussing the subject of pleuro-pacumona further, lot us faces the situation as it is to day, and as it is ikely to reman for some time, owhig to the slow method of procedure \(1 \mathrm{n}^{-}\). sucl cases: Our market for fat cattie : is milimited and this trade will have to be pursued to the bent advantage:

Canada has produced a great deal of low priced and damaged graln, of late, but- it seems to be an undoubted fact that the Americans on account of their lirge com crop can feed and fatten stock much more cheaply than we can. They have atso the advantage of a shorter winter season. For these and olher reaisons many have changed their views mad advocate the placing of corm ofl the free liat for fecding purposes. Last year there was a further dechine the value of the trade bejng between \(\$ 21,000\) and \(\$ 2:\), vo0. A larger border busintess would doubliess le doue but for the tariff, but the bulk of the surplus, as in the United shates, matumaly jooks to Britain for a market.

\section*{THE FRENCH JREATY.}

The new Fimato Canadian trealy, by which exports from Canitala will be phaced on the minimum sehedule of the Prencil tarifi, opens up an outhet for Camainan enterprise which is decidediy welcome at the present time, and should to something to relieve any feeling of dsomation caused by the attion of our neighturs to the south.
In a former issue some shatislits were given showing the volume of our trade With france and they were so insignifleant as to amost call up a feeling of doubt as to their corrediness, espectally when we consider that Canada is the New Franee of former times. Our commerce with Germany and Belgium has been miost advantageously promofed in recent yenrs, chiefly through the ngency of dicet steamship communieation; and with the present improved treaty. coupled with the proposed stemmship service, there is no reason Why France should not Hake rank as a much larger customer than she has as yet done. The situation, as regard
lumber, is thius spoken of by a merchant engaged in the trade:-"The hetry import duties imposed by France on all woods have seriously interfered with our trade with that comntry. Those duties are of two classes, designated as with favored and nnfavored nations, and while Great Britain, the Finted States and the north of Jurope are classed as favored, Canada is placed under the unfavored clause, and our trade is consequently almost prohibsteat. The effect of this diserimination nguinst us do shown in the fact that while oul shipments to French ports last jear were carried in 38 vessels nggregating as, 040 tons, those of this yenr required only 17 vessels aggregating 10,775 tons." The large trade of 1.sel was exceptional, but there is no doubt: that the practical discrimination agrinst Cimadiain lumber was decidedly miarious to that interest.

It is not in our province to enquire whether the negiect of Cunada was catuse! by british indifference or aetive American intergerence, but the fact remaine that Camala is now entitied to all the privileges of the most favored mation and matily through the efforts oi the Camalian High Commissioner. The imperfal government when pressed into atetion gave the Dominion the beneit in liaris oi the dipiomatic service under Locid Dufferin. In this instance, Coinala has had a free hand in the negutiolion oi a commerefal treaty, and whtithed the binefit, without expense, of the imperfal consular service and ant the mitelinery of mational diplomatey. In the past, Now Brunswick has furhiehed two-fiths of vur totad exports to Fitune This was phatically all lumber. Nearly anl the rest of the Canadion exports went from Nova Scotia and consisted of the produce of the maherles, chlefly camed lobsters. With better means of communication there is no reison why Ontario and Quebe should not come more to the frontle These hive yet to be found. In the absence of a direct steamship line to the St. Lawrence the lower provinees will be left to cultivate the trade which will be largely done by sailiug vessels.

\section*{SPECIAL CI'l'Y ASSESSMENTS.}

So much has been said and weften about the cost of the expropriations for widening certaln streets in the city, that we have been at some pains to ascertain \(n\) few facts concerning one of them which may be of somic value in guldiug those who are luterested in forming a more exact oplolon in the
matter. Our citizens, and with every show of Justice, object to being taxed. for imorovements in thele juelghborhooc which serve and benefit the whole city ae much as those who are made to pay the ensti ject us take for example the exproppiation in the case of the widening of Cathedral Street. The followiag are the names of the proprictors, giviug in the first their claim, In the second column the city valuation, aud in the thind column the amount awarded:-

The discrepancy is not so great ats might have been expected, but probably for the reason that people act on the olu saying that "If you srasp at too much you maty lose all." Now the total cost of tho Catinedral Street expropriation is shown to have been \(\$ 12 c^{2}, 797.57\). The expenses were \(\$ 9\),458.89 , rather a higl rate it musti be : ontessed, but when it is seen how the expanses have been mide up the surprise Will be still greater. The thee commissioners, Messiss. Masteriman, Coghlin, and Prefontaine, obtained for their services \(\$ 1,16.1\), of which Mr. Mastermat: received \(\$ 47 \%\), Mr. Coghlin \(\$ 216\), and Mr. Preiontaine \$t \(\$ \%\). The remaining \(\$: 304.50\) is made up as follows: Wituesses for the city \(\$ 1,008\), witnesse; for the proprietors \(\$ 2,483\), legal expenses \(\$ 2,301.15\), stenographers \$610.30, advertising \(\$ 385\), plans \(\$ 200\), and cleritul work \(\$ 212.64\).

It will be phinin to the most casual observer that the latter list of expenses is somewhat extreme, and to a liurge extent unnecessary, and it is high time that something should be done to repeal the clause of the Act by which witnesses may be summoned and pald such high rates for simply waiting to sive eridence in matters of which they wfuly know very little. The proprictors, of course, can lave little objecthon to such expenses, for although the cosi vears somowhat upon themselve日, it mainly falls upon properties sin the neighbounhood or upon the clty, ais the cuse maÿ be.

It appears to us also that a littie more discrimination might be exercised In choosing for commissioners men who have some notion of the value of time, ance men to whom \$4 a day is not suffleient remuneration. There are many people in the city to whom such a daly wage is quite welcome as not senfously interfering with thesp other duties, and Who consequently may be less disposed to economise in the time necessary for ancharging the services. But it is notorlous in this case, as in many others, that what is everybody's business is nobody's business, and the citizens will probably continue paying through the nose for such serviees until some one man with the energetic character of the wid londoner who spent some years in a law-suit to recover an indifferent umherlit which he lost at the time of the great Loudon expusition, shall take the. matter in hand, The trouble is that ou: business men are all so fully engaged in the pursuit of their own avocations that they suffer themselves to be overcharged and overtaxed rather thath waste the time necessary for setthag matters right, thus begetting an indifference which many people are but too ready to avail themselves of of the expropriation for the widening of Cathedral Street the elty pays \(\$ 10,000\), the proprietors of the property expropriated pay \(\$ 19,851.3:\), and the other side of the street pays \(87,965.55\), learhig a balanee of \(\$ 80,430\) to be levied upon properties within a certain radius.
Lit is clamed, and with justice, that an intet like Cathedral street, leading to a publie square or park in the centre of the eity is not of any more benefit to the owners of properties in the mmediate neighbourliood than it is to the city at large, and with this view liugely signed petitions have been forwarded to the powers that be with a view of making this equitable change In the assessments for that exproperation. It would be but a very light tax upor the city at jarge; on the immed; ate property owners it is excessive.

\section*{A WOLD ON COTTON AND ITS BYPRODUCIS.}

The remarkable fall in the price of raw cotton during the last yenr, coupled with the late advances in the price of hog products, have given an impetus to the ingenuity of our practical neighbors to the south of the internatiounl line. It is well known that the southern product of cotiton aeed oil is au essential ingredient of modern lard, and consequently the price of the oil has gone up with that of the genuine article. The oil mills are consequently having a briak demand for their
products, and southern farmers, who have kept a bupply of cotton seed are bolievers again in the old saying that" "It is an ill wind that blows nobody good."
One of the largest manufacturing companies in the South has lately been sending circular offers to farmers in Georgia and South Carolina offering to exchange high grade fertilizers for the seed. . The ofier is substantially to accept 20 bushels of cotton seed delivered at railway dopots throughout these States in exchange for every 500 pounds of standard guano, the guaranteed analysis of which will be 21-2 per cent. ammouia, 8 ner cent. phosphoric acid, and 2 per cent. potash, or as an alternative 20 bushels of seed in exchange. for 750 lbs . of superphosphates. It has been found latterly that colton hulls are a highly valuable food for cattile. This product was formerly burnt, but now one large compnay is shipping as much as 300 tons per week. Thus a new field of profit is opened up to the gouthern cotton planter or farmer at a time when he was on the verge of despair because of tho low. prices for the last gathered crop.
Southern newspapers are making much ado over the henvy falling off of cotton recejpts in the several markets compared with those of the corresponding period of last year. This they claim is au indication of a coming short erop and gocs to confirm the latest estimate of \(\mathbf{6 1 - 4}\) million bales as the total of the crop for 1802-8. This estimate includes 150,000 bales of labt' year's crop. With such a falling off, and in light of the enormous crop of recent years, there seems, says the New and Courier of Charleston, to be no plausible reason why Middling should not be selling at 10 C in that market. It opened the mouth at about \(91-2 \mathrm{c}\). The increased consumption estimated for Europe of 182,000 bales, added to \(100,-\) 000 bales for increased consumption in the United States and Canada, would seem to warrant the total amount of American cotton required by spinners for this season being set down as it is by Mr. Ellison, a reliable authority, at \(8,418,000\) bales. This would seem to indicate "a slortage of \(2,168,000\) bales in the production for the year, which at the and of the season would not leave a bale of Anerican cotton in stock, either in Furope or in Amcrica."
In Savaunah, one of the leading cotton depots and shipping ports of United States the shortage in receipts thus far has been 180,000 bales below those of last year, and other ports announce proportionate losses. The News and Courier concludes the article, to which we are indebted for a portion of the above statis. tics, as follows:-" All things considered, "it is very evident that at the present time "cotton is cheap It is an opportune time "for the planter to hold his cotton. An "analysis of the situation would certain" ly warrant such a course. At least thia "is the opinion held by some factors. In "view of the very samall receipta there "was a very firm feoling provading the " market, and some operators liave been " more active during tho last two däys, "while the sales in this marliet have been "larger proportionately than for some "week." Nowtithistandinge nll 'this the price hea been slowly sagging since the first of the month. Midding is quoted -1-4c.

A STRONG TEAMARKET.
In recent issues, voference has been madeto the improved prospects in this market and to \(n\) demand from Chicago which has absorbed severnl lots. in Toronto and this city. Most of the business has been in Japans. Cable news recently tends to confirm the strong position. For instacice, recent advices from Japan state that the settlements for the season show a decrease of 25,000 piculs, or \(3,000,000\) pounds nud the fact has led to considerable speculation on the New Fork market, a lot of tens which had been held in Montreal on' New Fork accounts being ordered to that. centre, the owners having procured a. better figure than the agent could procure in Mentreal. This lot comprised 0 ,000 packages, and furtier reduces the stocis: of iten held in first hands in Montrenl; : so that holders now manifest extremely: independent views as to the value of their: property. In fact, the stock of low grades: is small as compared with former years. A letter from an English correspondent to a city firin reads :-Everything points to a lardening market. We have expected it, and are now looking back to old bought standards. Those who know any: thing of the subject must feel surprised at ten ever being allowed to go at such priees. It is only a short time since that userul Pekoe Souchongs were going begging here in London ad 534 a per lb. ; and the cry was, "We don't want common tea," but it is curious that at the advanced prices the same toa does not look nearly so common. The position regard-. ing low priced ten is strouger in the ense of Ceylon than others, as the quantity to loe dealt in at the present time is ridiculously inadequate to the wants of the trade.

WHEN ARE WE TO GET OUR MONEY: The following is a mild resume of \(a^{\prime \prime}\) communication sent us lately:
"It is now some ten mouths since the Guardian Fire swallowed up the late lawented Citizens Ins. Co., and there is yot no appentrnce of any disgorging. Abliareholder would like to know when that mecting of the owners of the Citizens Company is going to be held. The indifference of people to what is being done with their property is enough to beget negligence also in the minds of those who are in the position of guardians. The Cilizens Ins. Co. was disquieting enough for some time before the last change of directors, owing to alleged persistent attacks from agents of other companics on its position in respect of its limited paid-up capitallargely a Toronto excuse, wo have heard. This is now all past and gone; so are the dividends of those days; but the shareholders are still faced with some littlo anxiety us to their capital-what the Guardian is to going to return-and when they are going to return it. We cannot believe what is noised about-that tho Guardian is waiting to earn in Canada sufficient to pay over to the Citizens sharoholders that \(\$ 8\) or \(\$ 10\) per share-somewhere about the amount of the last call upon the unfortunate and long patient slareholders. It' is moie probinble that delay in releasing the goverument deposit is the cause It is fortumate that gliare-
hollörr of such companies are so engrosed by their regular avocations，else there would tbe a more frequent＇raking up of grievances．老

BAR IRON．
A committee has been appointed by the Tcronto board of trade to deal with a resolution asking the government to mo－ cify the duties on bar，shett and hoop iroy Several hearings have been arranged tor：btt it is the purpose of the com－ mitter to arrive at a conclusion in time to submit it to the Finance Minister be－ fory the Budget is brought down．The re－ solution ls no declaration against the principle of protection．On the con－ thary it is in accord with the professed otiects of protection．Nor does it pro－ poefta Fädral treform of the whola iron taift．＂It ineety＂furished a starting－ point－for anquiry，and the committee is expected to develop a case and prescribe a remedy，fundamental or expedient，as tho circumstances may warrant．There can be no question，says the Mail，that the duties ought to be lowered．Why ＊bouth the tariff on bar iron be higher ugy than it was during the first nine yebse of the National Policy？Throayh－ ourethat period it was 17 1－2 per cent． of the price paid at the works．Since 18eg it has been from 50 to 60 per cent． of that value．This ：s a most oppressive tagzon manufacturers who use bar irou as fat material．It this toll on the bolleta，engines，machinery，tools，eic．， praviced in this country were applied to the development of our irou milles and the building up of derivative industries that might be an argument in its favous； but it is absorbed as protection by the manuiaoturers of bar iron from imported scrap．The increage in the duty irom 17 1－2 per cent．to \(\$ 13\) a ton \(w .28\) not mate on their account，but for the pur－ powi of fostering an iron industry based noon the consumption of our own ore． Sinice that purpose has not been effected the reduction of the duty from about 55 to \(171-2\) per cent．appears to be cailed for．The recall of the difference in protection cannot logically be com－ plained of by the rollers of ecrap，for it was not the necessity of their ：uterests the led to the addition of this difference． Fuly two－thirde of the present duty was impoged for a purpose that it has not ef fected and it is time that it should be withitraimn．

\section*{RECENT FUR SALES．}

Th．prarage advance on Northwest Coast seala at London in January was between fous and five per cent；；the quality of the jekins in general was good．The best stringes were lots 291 to 346，both in－ clastwey and the prices obtained for these lots were about：Small， 80 ；large pupe， 90；middling pupa，average，89；small pung 7 Tha enillinge．The other strings were partly faulty and ran heavily to gray puptiand small sizes，and when figur od Hithe，totals bring down the average pricer allhome who purchased the skins recuted god taine throughoat．At the Huden Ray company＇s sale beaver ad vangify \(121-2\) per cant．and musk rats 5
per cent．At C．M．Lampson \＆Co＇s sale mink advanced 40 per cent．；marten 30 per cent．；Russian sable and muskrats， other than firsts，unchanged；muskrats， firsts，advanced 35 ，black； 45 per cent．； Japanese foxe\％，5；Australian opossum， 15 ；wallaby，20；and bears 10 per cent． liaccoon，firsts，unchanged；seconds ad－ vanced 15 and others 35 per cent．Skunk， black，advanced 10 ；striped 35 per cent．； American opossum 20 ，and gray foxes 15 per cent．Northwest coast seals advanced \(71-2\) and Lobos Island 35 to 40 per cent．The Fur Trade Review pre－ dicts that the prices realized at the Lon－ don sales will result in increased ship－ ments and a consequent decline in prices in March．Fine dark mink will be in lead－ ing faror this year，and the consumption is largely increased．

\section*{CONDENSED MILK．}

The statement has been made in a parlia－ mentary paper that there is only one factory in Canada for the manufacture of condensed milk，but this，it appears，is a mistake．The Forrest Canning Co．es－ tablished a factory at Kingston in the Annapolis valley in 1891，not only for the purpose of condensing milk and coffee but also for canning fruit and vegetables， of which they have turned out large quan： tities for the past two years．Last season the company produced 420,000 pounds of condensed milk and coffee，using the milk of 500 cows．The＂Jersey Brand＂of con－ densed mitk and coffee is well known to the＇trade in St．John，according to the Sun．The output of 400,000 pounds shows that the Kingston business has as－ sumed considerable proportions for a new industry But there is still，so far as we know，no considerable quantity of con－ densed milk prepared in Canada for the foreign market．As was shown the other day Great Britain alone imported 63，－ 000,000 pounds of this milk，which on the basis of the figures given by the Forrest Company，would require the milk of 66，－ 000 cows．Now it is possible that cheese or butter making is more profitable than the manuiacture of condinged milk for export to England．But the demand for this latter article shows that the possi－ bilities of dairying will not be exhausted even when the British market is supplied to the fullest extent with Canadian but－ ter and cheese．

\section*{a street railway problem．}

The road department is likely to have something to say to the City Paszengert Railway Co．because of the removal of the snow from the road bed．The depth to which the frost penetrates and the damage it may cause to water－pipes have for almost the first time been brought seriously home to our citizens，owing to the unprecedentedly light snow－fall dur－ ing this winter．Hydrants and supply pipes have given much trouble，and there is every reason to believe that in the removal of their natural protection，the city will have a new problem to face． The insurance companies may also feel some interest in the matter．

Action has been orought in the Court oi Appeals by the Manufacturers＇Life to have the policy for \(\$ 5,000\) on the life of the late Dr．J．B．Gordon，Ottawa，in favor of the defendant cancelled，on the ground that the note given in payment of one of the premiums was not paid at maturity and it is held the policy became void．The defendant claims that the Company sued on the note and obtained judgment．The lower comet oudederd the payment of the nolicy．less the amount of the note．The action raises a point of general import－ ance．

Should the Upper House in Quebec suc－ ceed in effecting the reform they propose respecting the Mayoralty elections in Mont－ real they will go far towards proving their right to exist as such．Montreal elect her Mayor afier an exceptional man－ ner ：and there are but few eligible citi－ zens now who will veuture upon such a distasteful contest．The Bill introduced in the House provides that the Mayor shall be elected by the Council from among tienselves，or irom diny qualified citizen．

\section*{THE CRANBERRY CROP．}

Cranberries commence to arrive about Seutember 1st，and by the lant of Decem－ ber the crop is nearly all harvested，al－ though a limited quautity arrives until the first of May，and even later in in－ stances．The yield last season was light in al：the producing sections，the crop at Cape Cod being estimaced at only three－ ouarters of a crop，and the yield in Jer－ se．r was also one－quarter short．The ar－ rivals here，however，have been quite large， which is due in a measure to more frait having been shipped to this market than oreviously．The receipts here as compared with last and previous beasons have been as tollowe：

There is still some fruit to come for－ ward and the figures for this season are only，up to date．An unusually good de－ mand has prevailed during the past sea－ sun．the weather having been favorable an．the short crop of apples and other fruits has helped widen the outlet．Sup－ phes are comparatively light andohold－ ers are positive they will be able to force the price up in the neighborhood of \(\$ 3.25\) to \(\$ 3.50\) before the close of the season，as ther claim the demand will certainly be large enough to exhaust the visible sup－ wly and should the balance of the sea－ son be cold with a late epring it would b：particularly favorable for holders，as demand keeps up until rhubarb，early ap－ nles and other fruits take their place． Tha future is awaited with interest by those who cleaned up their stock，while holuers are selling sparingly and watching for the predicted advance．－N．Y．Bulletin．
