--Messrs. Price, of Quebec, whose sawmill at St Etienne, Saguenay, was recently destroyed by fire, are building another large mill at Riviero aux Renards.

-The Macdonald manual training schools for Ottawa were formally opened on Saturday afternoon by their Excellencies the Governor-General and the Countess of Minto.

-Indger Dionne, coal dealer, Montreal, has assigned on demand of W. Herbert Evans, of the firm of Evans Brothers. His principal creditors are: J. Beaudone, \$2,014; Miss C. Tessier, \$312; Paul Lord, \$325, and Evans Brothers, \$291.

-There was a decrease of over \$113,-000 in collections last month at the Montreal customs as compared with the corresponding month last year. The amounts collected for the months of October, 1899-1900 are as follows: Oct. 31, 1899, \$803,854.17; Oct. 31, 1900, \$690,-342.46.

-Late advices from Victoria, B.C., state that during the season now closed thirty-four scaling schooners took 16,-000 skins in Behring Sca, which is 8,000 less than were taken by twenty-five schooners last season. The spring schooners took 16,517 skins on the coast, bringing the total catch for the year up to 32,517. Only fifty-five branded seals were killed in Behring Sea.

--Mr F. W. Broughall, accountant of the Montreal branch of the Dominion Bank, is being transferred to Toronto to fill a similar post in the head office. He is succeeded here by Mr. A. R. Sampson of the local staff.

—In order to facilitate the return of empty freight cars new gutes have been issued by the General Superintendent of the Great Northern and Wilmar & Sioux Falls railways, providing that a charge will be made for all cars detained by shippers or consignees more than twenty-four hours when loading or unloading, of \$2 p.r car per day, except that forty-eight hours will be allowed for loading foreign cars with potatoes. The company's agents are required to give all possible assistance to expedite the loading and unloading of cars and explain to shippers and consignees that the company charges demurrage only to secure a more prompt carronice.

-The French vintage of 1900 is, says a London dispatch, according to the report of leading wine merchants, the biggest and best for many years. The abundance of wine is seen in the universal reduction in the value of grapes. There has been an extraordinary advance in the price of casks everywhere. There has been a revival of the primitive customs of sending two casks to the vineyards, one to be filled with grape juice in return for the other, and of allowing the populace to enter the press house of the vineyard and in a prescribed time drink all the wine possible for a sou. The increased production is due to the improved condition of the vines and not to an increase in the area cultivated.

-While the output of ore and manufacured iron and steel from the Sydney, C.B., mines is expected to be large, backed as the enterprises are by almost unlimited wealth, it is of much interest to the whole Dominion the efforts being put forth to properly develop the great resources of North Ontario in the matter of iron ore, and bring about its easy access to the principal markets of the world. Advices from Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., state that the last iron ore of the season to go from the new mines of the Michipicoten district, the latest of the Lake Superior ranges, is to be shipped this week. The mines have sent out this season nearly 50,000 A year ago last August the country was an undeveloped wilderness, without mines, railways, docks, harbors or any facilities. Next spring the Algoma Commercial Co., operating the mines, etc., will bring over from England four 3,000-ton steamships and as much capacity in barges These, with the 4 steamships now operated, will give a capacity in another year for handling nearly 1,000,000 tons. The mine and road will be operated all winter to prepare for the expeeted business of 1901. It is the four steamers of this Algonia Commercial Company that have been chartered by the Carnegie Steal Company for the delivery in Liverpool next month of ten thousand tons of steel sold there. is stated that the Carnegie Company saves about \$3.a ton on this shipment over the present rate via New York, Freights via New York are now about \$7.50 from Pittsburg to Liverpeol. The distance is about thirty-five hundred miles, while via the lakes and the Canadian canal system the total route is but thirty-two hundred miles. The route taken is from Pittsburg to Lake Eric over the Pittsburg, Bessemer & Lake Eric road, a Carnegic property, and then by water direct. The ships are of a size to pass the Welland and the new Caadian canals of St. Lawrence River, and were brought to the lakes that way last July. Before the close of the present lake season several other cargoes of steel and other materials will be taken direct to Europe via these canals, which were completed during the past summer.

-Chicago post office clerks to the number of 1,400 have formed a union and have affiliated themselves with the American Federation of Labor.

—Our Bedford, Que., correspondent writes under date Oct. 30:—There were sold here to-day to Montreal buyers 400 boxes creamery butter at 21 to 21 1/4c; 40 packages dairy, 19c to 20c; 200 boxes cheese, at 10c. Eggs, in few lots, 17c. Two carloads hogs were shipped, price 51/4c to 51/4c lb. live weight.

The S.S. Parisian of the Allan Line, arrived in port on the 27th ult., after making the best run of the season from Liverpool. In order to facilitate the handling of baggage the Allan officials brought two sheds into use, one for first class passengers, the other for second cabin passengers. In one hour the sheds were cleared and all the passengers had left for their destination.

—A leading bondholder of the Great Northern Railway reports that a decision has been reached regarding the building of the Joliette branch, and that the double track bridge at Bout de l'Ha will be begun this winter, this being the heaviest part of the proposed improvement. It had not, however, been decided that the branch into Montreal should join the main line at Joliette, although it was quite likely the connection would be made somewhere near the last named town. Regular trains will be running between Quebec and Hawkesbury, and it is said that the first cargo of grain on this route will be shipped from Quebec in about ten days. It is understood that Messrs. Ross, Barry and Mellae will build the Joliette branch, as the company expressed itself pleased with the work on the line between St. Boniface and Hawkesbury.

-It seems like an unfortunate termination to a business career, for one who had successfully conducted a city retail grocery for almost a quarter century to be afterwards compelled to assign through outside speculation. Mr. Joseph Bruchesi succeeded to the retail grocery business of his father in 1877 and by the same honorable course combined with business judgment which characterized his predecessor, won a continuance of profitable trade. Through time he acquired properties adjacent to his store and when Notre Dame street was subsequently widened, received substantial recompense, In April last, Mr. Bruchesi sold out his store to Tardiff & Frere. Some real estate difficulties cropped up a few months later, and in August some properties were sold. The present assignment, understood to be the result of an outside deal that did not terminate as expected, was made at the request of Mr. Charles Bruchesi, advocate, a creditor for \$905. The libalities amount to about \$70,000, and include mortgages on Montreal properties of the assignor as follows: Quebeo Bank, \$11,172.35; Masson Estate, \$14,400; Mde. H. Villeneuve, L'Assomption, \$4,500; Credit Foncier Franco-Canadien, \$4,500; Estate J. P. Bruyere, \$3,000; Mrs. W. P. Blair, St. Eustache, \$300. other large creditors are St. Bridget's Asylum, Montreal; \$12,931.25; Ville Marie Bank, \$5,859.39; the Quebec Bank, \$2,-361; and the Canadian Bank of Commerce, \$1,902.52. The assets include book debts, store fixtures and a deposit of \$2,-724.16 in the Ville Marie Bank. The real estate assets include four lots in St. Antoine Ward South and two lots in Lachine.

-The western grain standards board met at Winnipeg, Man., the 26th ult., There were present S. Spink, Toronto, chairman; G. G. Castle, elevator commissioner; C. Johnson, Baldur; Peter Ferguson, Kenles, Assa.; W. B. Underhill, Melita; Alex. McFce, Montreal; R. J. Phin, Moosomin; E. C. P. Watts, Toronto; Jas. Riddell, Rosebank; M. M. McLaughlin, Toronto; George M. Campbell, K. Campbell, Brandon; John McGce, Carrievale, Assa.; W. A. Matheson, C. A. Young, F. W. Thompson, Winnipeg; F. E. Gibbs, grain inspector, Fort William; David Horn, chief grain inspector, Winnipeg, and C. N. Bell, secretary. Samples of this year's crop from all parts of the province and territories were on hand. following resolutions were passed and subsequently endorsed at an informal joint meeting of the board and the Grain Exchange: "That, it is the opinion of this board that the methods of handling Manitoba wheat would be best served by making the following changes in the schedule of grades, viz., that the grades of No. 2 hard and No. 1 northern be consolidated under the name of No. 1 northern, and having the present qualifications of No. 1 northern with no less than 60 per cent. of hard wheat." "That name of No. 2 northern be changed to that of No. 1 Manitoba spring; the grade having not less than 45 per cent. of hard wheat, and weighing not less than 58 pounds per bushel; and that any wheat not good enough to grade No. 1 Manitoba wheat be graded as No. 2 Manitoba spring, in the discretion of the inspectors." In connection with grading dried wheat, the following resolution was passed: "That, in cases where tough wheat has been dried, the inspector be instructed to inspect out of terminal elevators wheat so dried on a clean certificate when he considers it equal to the standard of such This is to apply to commercial grades only. changes, says a dispatch, if carried out, will make Mauitoba grading almost equal to that of Duluth. The handling of the wheat from there and for export to the East, it is believed would be greatly benefited by the change, though Ontario millers were at first opposed to the change. It is understood that in fixing a grade of No. 2 Manitoba spring wheat they are better satisfied by what was at first contemplated in having a grade of No. 2 northern.



Jaures and Vaillant responded, and the meeting adopted a resolution in favor of strengthening the fraternal union of the workingmen of the two countries and of submitting to arbitration any difficulties that might arise.

-Bay of Quinte Notes.-The new cement dam across the Napance River, above the falls is about finished. It is 130 feet in length, and absolutely watertight.-The negotiations for the purchase of the Napanee waterworks by the town were brought to a close on Monday night. \$45,000 is the price.—The Tweed News says that Mr. Mitchell, a mining engineer of Toronto, has recently been working on a copper mine, located in the property of Mr. John A. Carscallen, near Flinton. Mr. Mitchell is backed by Gooderham & Worts, Toronto, and it is understood that he has made a very favorable report to them and that they have made a very liberal offer to Mr. Carscallen. The shaft is down about 18 feet and is about eight feet square. A building has been erected over it and a steam drill put in. The property promises to be one of the best paying in this section.—The Picton Gazette has found business so good that the size of the paper has been increased from a six to a seven-column.



-Not for twenty years past have lumbering operations been undertaken upon such an extensive scale on the Penobscot river, as this fall, says a Bangor, Maine, dispatch, and never in the history of the industry have men for work in the woods been so hard to get, even at advanced wages. It is estimated that 20,000,000 feet of logs will be cut on Penobscot waters this winter, about equally divided between pulp logs, and saw logs, and that fully 6,000 men will be needed to supply all the camps. About 4,000 already have been sent into the woods, while the employment agents and operators are scouring the State, the British provinces and even the large cities for the 2,000 men still wanted.

-According to the annual report of the Ontario Bureau of Industries, just issued, 9,113,964 pounds of butter were made during the year, which sold at an average of over 19c a pound. The cheese output was 123,323,923 pounds for which \$12,120,887 was received. Market prices were higher in everything except wheat, corn and potatoes: Farm lands in Ontario were valued at \$563,271,777, as against \$556,246,569 a year ago. Buildings increased by three millions, implements by two millions, and live stock over ten millions to \$115,806,445.



-The Boers are said to have 15,000 men still in the field, divided into bands of 300; and are employing their time in destruction and opposition to progress.

0

—The liability of the railway companies for goods in their yards at the time of the great Ottawa fire, is, it is reported, to be tested by the Rev. James O'Hara, a retired minister, formerly of Ottawa, and now residing in Toronto. He has caused a writ to be issued against the C.P.R., for unstated damages for the loss of his library and furniture. The goods had been accepted by the company for shipment to Toronto and were destroyed when the fire reached the railway yards.

-The Doukhobors who have settled in the Northwest are proving pretty good fellows after all. A resident of Madoc, Ont., recently back from an extended stay in Assiniboia Territory, says: The Doukhobors will be the making of those parts of the west in which they have settled. They are a thrifty, industrious people, and are taking advantage of every chance to better their condition. In the Thunder Hill reservation there are thirteen villages, each of which has a population of about 150. Farming is the main occupation of the men, and the women give them much assistance. They are a farming people and look forward to the time when they will have thousands of acres of fertile land under cultivation. To this end they are steadily tending. will stop at nothing which will help carn honest money for the purchase of implements, stock, etc. For this reason many of them work on railways which are being built through Assinboia by Mackenzie & Mann. Contractors and sub-contractors are glad to get them, as they work hard and give no trouble. At first, before they understood the conditions, they were willing to work for small wages, but when their knowledge was increased they demanded and received the ordinary wages for railway laborers. While, the men work on the railways the women and boys look after the farms. All are bent on making a competence as quickly as possible, and every means is employed which will add a few dollars to the family income.

-Treating of the recent consignment of Canadian fruit to England, the Manchester Guardian says: "The steamer Manchester recently 1,000 cases of Canadian pears (Bartlett, Flemish Beauty, Duchess, Howell, Clargeau, and Anjou), 25 cases of peaches, and 125 cases of dessert apples. This is a special consignment, shipped under the auspices of the Minister of Agriculture for Canada. Hitherto Canadian fruit has suffered a little in transit. It is now thought, however, that a perfect system of packing and refrigeration has been devised, and the condition in which the present consignment reached Manchester bears this out. The fruit was grown and packed at Grimsby, in the Province of Ontario. From Grimsby it was sent to Montreal, in refrigerator cars, and it has crossed the sea in the mechanically refrigerated chamber of the Manchester Commerce. Mechanical refrigeration on steamers running from Canada to British ports was introduced during the season of 1897. system was not perfect at first, but experience has shown what are the best methods of grading and packing, and the temperature at which the different classes of fruit should The resulf, as we have said, is that the most delicate Canadian fruits can be delivered in this country in perfect condition." Canadian growers and exporters will be pleased not only with the facts here given, but with the Great Britain, where next season such shipments will not be considered in the light of experiments.

—Our Port Elgin, Ont., correspondent writes: E. II. Powell, fruit and confectionery, has assigned to John Hutton, of this place. Powell is scarcely out of his teens, started about a year ago, came off the farm, no experience. Stock and fixtures valued at about \$530. Liabilities about or nearly the same.

—The Great Northwestern Telegraph Company have been advised by the Anglo-American Telegraph Company, that special arrangements have been made for cablegrams to and from Holland, and that hereafter the service will be equal to that with London, England.

EXPORT OFFICE, 61 St. Mary Axe. London, E.C., Eng.

—A total of \$20,166,687 worth of gold dust and bullion has been received at the Scattle U.S., Assay Office during the present year, says a dispatch from that city. Following are official figures showing the amount of gold dust and bullion received between January 1 and October 4, 1900: Number of deposits, 6,028; ounces of gold and bullion, 1,243,163; from Cape Nome, \$2,710,427; other Alaskan points, \$462,893 Total from Alaska, \$3,173,320. From British Columbia (Atlin), \$493,116; Yukon district, (Klondike), \$16,374,488; Washington, Oregon, Idaho, and foreign gold coin, \$125,762. Since October 24, the office has received an additional \$150,000 from Nome and \$50,000 from other points. The probabilities are that before the season closes Nome will have furnished \$5,000,000.

—The receipts at the Toronto Customs House for October will show a big increase over the corresponding period last year. The total figures up to October 26th are \$377,327, as against \$347,074 last year.

-Reports from Portland, Ore., state that North Yakima and Puyallup hop sales for past week were over 7,000 bales at from 14 to 15 cents. Oregon hops usually bring from 15 to 16 cents. Growers, nevertheless, are not anxious.



-California takes about one-third of its supply of coal from British Columbia.

-Toronto's new palace hotel, descriptive cuts of which are now out, will be completed in May, 1902. The building will be seven storeys high, the five upper containing 300 rooms. The hotel will be conducted on both the European and American plan.

-The sunken battleship Maine is to be removed from its submerged resting place in Havana harbour, not on account of the memories which its presence may recall, but because it is likely to interrupt commerce and prevent the big American dollar from rolling smoothly along.

-Providence often favors the poor. The exceedingly mild weather of the past weeks has done away with the necessity for the consumption of hard coal, the high price of which has been a serious consideration to many. In cities where the cost has been largely raised, prices will likely be somewhat lowered, now that the strike is over. The secretary of the Wholesale Coal Dealers' Protective Association, says a New York dispatch, states that it will be impossible for any of the companies to start up all their mines for two reasons. In the first place many of the miners, who are mostly Welshmen, Italians and Hungarians, have returned to: Europe, and in the next place the protracted drought in the anthracite region has caused a shortage of water. As the mine owners are paying 10 per cent, increase in wages, coal will remain all winter long at least 50 to 75 cents a ton higher than before the strike, no matter how much is mined.

THE GROCERY TRADE.

--The Retail Grocers' Association, of St. Louis, Mo., recently endeavored to force dealers to charge a uniform price for flour, and exact a profit of at least 40 cents a barrel, but millers through the State were warmed that any one who signed the proposed agreement would be guilty of a violation of the Anti-Trust laws of Missouri.

-A private London circular, of the 19th ult., treating of the dairy situation, says: Butter-The summer still lingers with us and "chill" October has not yet put in an appearance. The dry conditions of the climate mentioned in last Report have undergone no change. The milk supply continues to diminsh and the import of butter to fall away. There has been more demand this week for Australian butter, but prices have not advanced. "Choicest" quality is making 110s to 112s per ewt., with occasionally a shilling or "Finest" is making 100s to two more for a fancy brand, 104s, and "Finest" 94s to 98s. The arrivals this week from Australasia consist of 9,017 boxes from Australia in the Ortona, and 537 boxes from New Zealand in the Papanui, Canadian arrivals are slightly larger, numbering 13,198 boxes for the week, and "Choicest" is selling at 100s to 104s. Copenhagen Official Quotation was raised again this week, but by three kroner instead of two as last week, and now stands at 102 kroner against 106 kroner for the correspond-The markets in the North of Enging week of last year. land show more briskness, and "Choicest" Danish is quoted at 118s to 120s per cwt., "Finest" 114s to 116s. Cheese.—The market is this week dull and buyers are indifferent. There is no change to note in prices. Quotations for choicest Canadian are 54s to 55s; for same week in 1899, 57s to 58s.

-The continued mild weather, while not appreciated in trade circles, is of exceptional benefit to contractors and others engaged in construction work, which, in turn must redound to the advantage of business later on when frost and snow take their innings. The Orford Mountain Railway, is being rapidly extended eastward from Kingston. The main line, which is in good condition to Kingsbury, is being extended in the direction of Richmond and Windsor Mills. As it starts at Eastman, on the Canadian Pacific, it will thus connect that system with the Grand Trunk. Several hundred men are at work and it is thought the work train locomptive will cross the Salmon river this week, and that next week the rails will have been pushed to a point within eight mi'es from Windsor. While the objective point eastward has not yet been decided upon, President Foster said that the main thing to be considered was the development of that part of the country. It is understood that a branch of the Orford Mountain Railway is also being extended into the lake region north of the mountain. The branch starts from the main line between Eastman and Laurenceville and passes the base of the mountain at the north side of the head of Manilla Lake. It is also understood that the railway purposes seeming a connection with the Central Verment at Waterloo.

Speaking of the conditions of cattle trade throughout Great Britain, President Mills, of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, recently back from an extended European tour, said that the most discouraging feature in Irish agriculture was the smallness of the holdings, varying from five to fifty acres, with a very large proportion of them under twenty-five acres. He expressed himself as much pleased with the general appearance and fertility of the country. He was surprised to find such a large number of shorthorn grade cattle all over the northern part of the island instead of the smaller special dairy cattle which he expected to see. Large numbers of shorthorn crosses are bred in the country and kept until they are from half to two years of age, when they are sold to Scottish and English farmers, to be fed for the great markets of the United Kingdom. In Scotland he found entirely different conditions. Instead of small holdings, there were farmers renting from 300 to 2,000 acres each, conducting business on a large scale, feeding cabile bought in Ireland and sheep gathered from the Highlands of Scotland, most of them well-to-do and many living like One thing especially in this connection was the very high prices which farmers got for their stock compared with what is received by Canadians.

CANADA'S CONDITION.

Industrial development combined with good prices for all farm products, have been enjoyed by the entire Dominion for some years, irrespective of party politics. Thousands who might otherwise have left the farm and drifted toward the cities, or across the border, have remained at home encouraged by the profits they saw accruing from the labor which in former years brought but a bare living. Whatever could be raised brought a good price. Even old from plows, harrows, and other disearded metals were eagerly sought for and prices offered that showed value much beyond what was expected. With scarce an exception everything saleable was enhanced in value. Similar conditions have prevailed in the cities, where higher wages have been paid capable workers, from the railway president down to the skilled worker in the match factory.

The best of all this is that it is keeping up. Similar periods of activity have been here before, but advantage was taken of their presence which ensured for them but a tran-However, experience and wise councils have sient abode. prevailed of late years, the public being guided thereby to an extent which has prevented the flooding of goods on a limited market, or their over-production in face of foreign competition. Consequently the large mills are now running extra time in the endeavor to keep pace with orders for immediate needs. Skilled mechanics are wanted at many points, and the unskilled hand, the daily laborer, the man who is in the great majority, who buys the most goods and pays for them the readiest, is to-day being sought from far and near with the result that he is conjecturing whether it would be tetter to go down to the Maine woods at an extra wage,go up to the Algoma district where other advantages are offered, or hold the steady job he has near home. Complaints are sometimes heard of the advances in food supplies and even clothing, but while men, whether skilled mechanics or day laborers, are being offered a choice of work, the cost of living can be readily adjusted. Public improvements now under way, or contemp'ated, will sustain the latter conditions, while the higher price of all farm products will not only serve to keep more men on the farms and away from the city factories, but will materially assist the development of new Ontario and the Northwest, where cheap lands await the industrious tiller of the soil.

DISCRIMINATION AGAINST ST. LAWRENCE ROUTE.

The following petition is the result of a suggestion first made in the Journal of Commerce in one of a series of articles relating to the shipping interests of this port. There was for some time a disposition on the part of many to play the ostrich trick, by practically ignoring the evidences of serious injury being done to Montreal by high The idea was entertained by marine insurance rates. some, that public protests against the discrimination made against the St. Lawrence route by marine underwriters was unwise as, it was alleged, this only exposed a weak spot which should be covered from general obser-Such a policy of supposed concealment we regarded as foolish in the extreme. only too thoroughly familiar to need informing what conditions existed in regard to the marine insurance of steamers on the St. Lawrence route. The urgency was extreme for some energetic steps being taken to remove this discrimination, and, as this is the national port of Canada, as stated by the Premier and other members of the Government, and as acknowledged generally by the country, we deemed it the duty of the Government to use its influence in protecting the national port from the adverse influences at work to injure its prestige in the interest of American rivals. The annexed petition brings this matter to a head, and we trust it will cause the Government to do what is so forcibly urged by the Board of Trade:

To His Excellency the Right Honorable the Earl of Minto, G.C.M.G., Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada, in Council:—

The petition of the Council of the Montreal Board of Trade humbly sheweth:—

That because the rates of marine insurance on cargoes and hulls using the St. Lawrence route are seriously discriminative against that route, the shipping trade thereof has, during the past two years, been largely diverted to United States ports, and thus the port of Montreal, and the St. Lawrence route generally, have suffered serious loss, evidence of same being in possession of your petitioners in the shape of tables of insurance rates and letters from shipowners withdrawing their ships from that route;

That said discrimination against the St. Lawrence route is most severe, the insurance rates on cargo from the opening of navigation to the end of August ranging from double to treble the rates charged for cargo on vessels at Atlantic ports, while from September 15th to the close of navigation the discrimination is still more accentuated, the St. Lawrence rates then being from five to seven times greater than to ports on the Atlantic coast;

That this system of heavy advances during the fall months, which originated in the days of sailing vessels, is, now that the trade is performed entirely by steamers, a most unwarrantable feature of the insurance companies' tariffs;

That the rates on hulls also discriminate in favor of Atlantic ports, and that although such discrimination is less than on cargoes, it is perhaps even more responsible for the diverting of ships from the St. Lawrence route;

these high rates of insurance to and from the St. Lawrence on both hulls and cargo, will, if continued, be fatal to the marine commerce of the great Canadian waterway;

That although many improvements have been made in the aids to navigation of the St. Lawrence, such as channel deepening and widening, additional lights, buoys, etc., no reduction of the insurance rates has thereby been secured, but, on the contrary, such rates have, within the past two years, been enormously increased.

Wherefore, your petitioners humbly pray that in view of the vital commercial interests at stake, Your Excellency in Council may be pleased to appoint a royal commission for the purpose of investigating the question of the marine insurance rates charged on hulls and cargoes using the St. Lawrence route, with a view to procuring more equitable rates, so that our national waterway may be enabled to regain and retain its share of the shipping trade of this contient.

He passed on in the same line of thought to deprecate the provincialism prevalent in Canada, saying: "Whether in Ontario, Quebec, the Maritime Provinces, the Prairie Province, or in that groat Western country which was once called a sea of mountains, and which they now knew to be a rich sea of mountains, ought they not to feel that in all their legislation they desired to come together in everything that was good for the Dominion at large?"

One of the manifestations of this narrow provincial spirit was pointed out to be there being different examinations in the provinces for candidates seeking to enter the medical profession. There was no general certificate for the whole Dominion. Not only were members of the medical profession hampered and injured by a variety of provincial regulations, but they were prevented exercising their profession in the United Kingdom and the other Colonies. In this connection Lord Stratheona made am important statement, he said: "It would have been possible to introduce the graduates of Canadian medical schools to lucrative positions in the British military service, except for the fact that there was no Domin-Would it not be possible for his honorable ion service. friend Mr. Ross, who had dome so much for legislation in Ontario, to get rid of this by having a general council of education, composed of members from the different provinces? The present condition of things was humiliating. At the head of the British military department Canadians were told: 'We don't doubt at all your men are quite equal to ours. We would be glad to have them, but you do not allow us." It would certainly tend to raise the standard of the medical profession were the sphere in which physicians and surgeons could exercise their calling so far extended as to open to them opportunities for a career in Great Britain. It is also certain that a uniform, universal and national spirit will never pervade the people of Canada, as it does those of England, Scotland, Treland, or France, so long as barriers exist which prevent Canadians from freely exercising their calling in every Province of the Dominion.

His Lordship weed more general and careful inspection of all products going out of Canada. He had heard grave complaints in regard to Canadian goods, which would have been obviated had they been properly inspected. Only within the last week he had had a remonstrance from the great Corn Exchange at Liverpool. "The belief is that this inspection is far from being as

perfect as it should be, and if there is no remedy it will be very much against the commercial interests of Canada." Such weighty words ought to rouse the Boards of Trade to such action as would protect "the commercial interests of Canada," which are menaced by defective inspection of our exported products.

His Lordship then spoke of one of the social aspects of the Empire: "A few years ago people from Canada and the colonies were regarded in England as merely those it was well to be civil to-very worthy backwoods people, but hardly worth while crossing the sea to recognize. We know that our neighbours of the United States were thought highly of, and seen everywhere in society, but was it so of ourselves from Canada and the other colonies, as we had a right to expect? How is it to-day? To be a Canadian or a citizen of any other colony was to have the warmest good wishes of all the best people of the Mother Country. The feeling that has gone forth toward the colonies is not, I feel assured, an evanescent While we are the first among the nations within the Empire, we are glad to know that there is another true-born nation which which is to take its place alongside of Canada in a very few weeks. The grandson of her gracious Majesty the Queen goes there to assist in opening the new Parliament, and I trust that the occasion will not be lost of having that same member of the Royal family, as representing her Majesty, come also amongst us on his return. The feeling is now that we should be regarded as one people, one great Empire of Englishmen, no matter what our mother tongue may be." He expressed confidence that in 1902 there would be cable communication direct from Canada to Australia.

After giving an interesting statement of the valuable work done in the High Commissioner's office, London, Lord Stratheona aroused the cheers of his hosts by allusions to the war. Of the commander of the Strathcom Herse and the officers and men, he said: "I believe there is no braver and more gallant man to be found than the commander of that body, and that he was supported well by his officers and equally well by every member of that We must recollect that if they have done their duty well, and if he who was instrumental to some extent in placing them in the position of doing their duty to their Queen and country-if they together have done well --we know that the whole of the soldiers of Canada have done their part not less nobly. We know and feel that, so long as the soldiers of Canada, and other outlying parts of the Empire, and of the Mother Country, determine that right shall be maintained, so long is the whole Empire safe, and so long shall we be able to say with heart and soul, 'God Save the Queen.' At the close of this most successful banquet, Lord Strathcona moved a wote of thanks to Mr. Kemp, the chairman, whom he said, he was "proud to regard as a friend." He had had the pleasure of meeting him in London last spring, when he so ably represented the Toronto Board of Trade at the Congress of Chambers of Commerce, and assured his hearers that Mr. Kemp exerted a very great influence in that assemblage.

The Toronto Board of Trade distinguished itself by the Strathcona Banquet.

THE VALLEYFIELD STRIKE.

With the strike of the employees of the cotton mill at Valleyfield, as a mere "strike" of workpeople for more

wages we have no concern, such disputes are best left to be adjusted by the parties at variance, or some arbitrator acting as "amicus curiae." But, when those who are idle because they cannot obtain all the wages demanded, begin to interfere with the liberty of other workpeople, or otherwise to obstruct the work of the mills, or break, or endanger the peace, there are conditions created of public interest. On the 25th October owing to the riotous conduct of some employees of the mills, or of men engaged in work connected with the buildings, the Mayor of Valleyfield and two of his colleagues wrote to Lt.-Col. Roy, of this city, setting forth that, owing to the local constables being unable to maintain the peace, they request two companies of Victoria Rifles to be brought to Valleyfield, and commanded to maintain peace and order and arrest any and all persons who have committed any breach of the peace. This formal appeal by the Mayor and his colleagues was declared to be made, "under authority of the Militia Act of Canada." The existence of a riot; the impotency of the local peace officers to maintain order and protect property; the formal demand by the authorities for military protection, are thus facts be-Whoever has seen a town dominated by yond dispute. rioters, and the military called out to restrain them knows how impossible it is to obtain a cool statement of what happens in such an excited locality. The first duty of the Mayor on the arrival of the military was to read the Riot Act, which calls on all citizens to disperse and keep order on pain of severe compulsion being resorted to. For some reason this ceremony was not performed, and the rioters took advantage of the confusion to attack the soldiers with dangerous missiles, by which some were injured seriously. Lt.-Col. Ibbotson kept his head, as did his men, or there would have been such retaliation as, though richly deserved, would have had deplorable re-The mob seems not to have realised that its utter criminality and folly must be put down and punished. The very mild treatment of them by the soldiers, which, at the most was a few pricks of a bayonet, misled the rioters, who needed a stern lesson as to the danger of setting law and order at defiance. Had such scenes arose in France or Germany there would have been a rifle fusilade that would have killed a score or two of the mob. In Valleyfield, those injured were the soldiers, yet there have been violent attacks upon them by some local papers. because they cleared the streets by a very gentle display of what a bayonet feels like—a sensation which will probably check any future impulse to earn another of the kind.

There is too much reason to believe that this unfortunate outbreak of mob violence was instigated by professional agitators to whom a labour dispute is an opportunity for showing their zeal for workpeople on whose contributions they subsist. The proprietors of the Valleyfield mills are capitalists to whom Canada is under deep obligations for their enterprise in establishing and maintaining a great national industry. Their munificence as philanthropists, and as contributors to public institutions which are of the greatest service to the educational and social welfare of the country, have also won them a large measure of public respect. It will be a sorry day for Canada when those who venture their fortunes in manufacturing enterprises can be intimidated and their property and their business interests jeopardized by rioters without the miscreants receiving the due reward of their crime against law and order. The non-service of war-

rants issued against the ringleaders shows lamentable weakness somewhere. Is it possible that there is a district in this law-abiding Colony where the Queen's writ does not run? Have we force to spare to compel respect to the authority of the Crown in South Africa, but are unable to bring malefactors to justice at home? Canada has a right and will demand that law and order be not only maintained at Valleyfield, but that the ringleaders in rioting be brought to justice.

EXPORT TRADE IN HATS

The London Hatters' Gazette, for September, contains a classified statement of the export of hats from and imports into Great Britain during 1899.

The aggregate value of all hats manufactured in and exported from Great Britain was £1,106,647, an increase over 1898 of £46,908.

The exports of hats of all kinds to the United States amounted to 8,705 dozens, of a total value of £17,010, a decrease from 1898 of 1,379 dozens and an increase in valuation of £747, an average value of \$10.65 a dozen, against \$7.33 per dozen im 1898, and \$4.13 per dozen in 1896, \$5.25 per dozen in 1895, \$5.90 per dozen in 1894, and \$7.31 per dozen in 1893.

The following table shows the exports of felt hats from England into the United States during the past eleven

The figures for 1899 give a considerable increase in quantity and value over 1898, and an increase in the average value per dozen, showing that the hats imported in 1899 were of finer grades.

These figures show an increase in the importation of English-made felt hats of 1,372 dozens and £2,106. decrease occurred from the previous year of 3,947 dozens of straw hats and an increase of 196 dozen in silk and miscellaneous hats. The total increase in value of imports of hats of all kinds is £747, or \$3,735.

The heavy imports of materials for the manufacture of hats in Canada indicates that this is a large industry in this country. The small exports of hats prove that the vast bulk of those made here are for domestic consumption, or use.

THE NORTH AMERICAN LIFE IN NEW YORK.

The North American Life Assurance Co., of Toronto, has taken the bold initiative of entering the State of New

York. For some years this step has been contemplated by the leading life companies of Canada, but the red-tape and other obstructions were such as prevent the step being taken. The requirements of the New York insurance Department are so strict that it is a valuable tribute to the financial standing of the North American Life to have passed the stringent ordeal with flying colours. Mr. J. D. Wells has been appointed chief agent in the States whose office will be on Broadway in New York City. Mr. William McCabe, F.I.A., managing director is being widely congratulated on this move which adds to the prestige of the company he has built up into such strength and promise.

THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOUR AND THE LABOUR GAZETTE.

The Government has established a "Department of Labour," which is a questionable addition to the administrative machinery of the country. A "Department" implies a Minister of the Crown in charge of it. The establishment of the Department of Labour at Ottawa has led to another addition to the Cabinet by a "Minister of Labour" being appointed. Already there are "more cats than catch mice" in the Cabinet. The occupant of one ministerial position repeatedly denounced the increase of such offices as the one he himself, "in a moment of weakness," we presume, thought it well to accept.

A Department of Labour in Canada is no more needed than a Department of Dry Goods, or Department of Butcher's Meat, or Department of Vegetables, or Department of Domestic Service. Labour is a marketable commodity, it is the stock-in-trade, as it were, of the greater mass of the people of this country. Canadians, as a rule, are labourers, the hardest workers, those who labour most assiduously, during the longest hours, and at the most exhausting work, are not those whose interests are supposed to be watched over with grandmotherly care by the Department of Labour. If the artisan classes, who are to be under the wing of the Government-like fresalyhatched chickens, under the old hen's-had a full sense of manly independence they would despise a government for interfering with their affairs. Have they not their own Trades Unions, their associations for mutual protection and help, and their press organs, under the management of their own order and of their own direct choice? The Department of Labour has stepped in to watch over the wage-earners as though they were as sheep having no shepherd, as a disorganized mob, as men without ability enough to organize themselves in their own interests, and as a class, without capacity to run a "Department of Labour," apart from government officials and government

Another new departure, which also is highly objectionable on various grounds, is the entrance of the Government into the business of publishing a magazine or journal called The Labour Gazette, which is specially devoted to the interests of one class in the community. One feature of this is a statement in each number of the trades unions formed since the last issue of the Labour Gazette, with reports of the proceedings of unions, so that this Government paper is actually a Trades Union organ. How far the public revenue, which is derived from the taxes paid by all classes, can be justly applied to the payment of trades union officials, and the dissemination of trades

union literature, we need not discuss, its utter impropriety is too glaring for argument. The October number of this extraordinary publication is chiefly devoted to an elaborate, detailed report of the Congress held recently of trades union delegates. In this report a Cabinet Minister, not named, but who is styled "The Minister of Labour," is stated to have addressed this Trades Union Congress. We should like to know when the sanction of Parliament was given to the appointment of a "Minister of Labour," and what is his salary, and who is the official holding this new portfolio?

Common report speaks of the Postmaster-General as being the Minister of Labour. Surely this cannot be so, as a Postmaster-General cannot have sufficient time in that office to take charge of a second Department? If he has, then his salary is much too large, and, in justice to the country, he ought to have urged the Privy Council to abolish one of the other semi-sinecure departments and amalgamate it with that of the Postmaster-General. We are compelled to regard the creation of the new Department of Labour and its publication of a class paper, which is devoted chiefly to the interests of trade unions, as a most unwise policy.

It is not without significance that the worst strikes that have occurred in Canada for years have been started since the Government took the trades unions under its wing. Such men as have instigated the riots at Valleyfield are just the class to have their minds unbalanced by finding the Government taking special interest in the cause of labour, which, in their ignorance, they regard as the natural antagonist of the interests of capital, and therefore of those who employ labour. The whole business associated with this new movement is deplotable and has in it the germs of widespread mischief.

THE BREAKFAST FOODS CRAZE.

The variety of so-called "breakfast foods" now in the market is so great as to be embarrassing to housekeepers who desire to furnish their tables with up-to-date proven-The profit on this class of goods is so enormous as to have brought competitors into the field whose loud announcements remind us of the old-time theatre-booth Those enterprises were famous for the proat a fair. digious noise made on the outside by a huge drum, cymbals, and the stentorian voice of the proprietor. The performance inside was scanty in length and in quality So with most American breakfast unspeakably bad. food packages. The show outside is loud, glaring, almost hysterical, and conspicuous by the vulgarity or absurdity of its art, which usually conveys a falsehood. The breakfast food package itself is usually a fraud, as it appears to hold much more than is ever found inside. The buyer of such packages purchases a very gaudy set of flaring lithographs, a useless box of cardboard, and a quantity of some prepared edible, for all of which he pays usually about four to five times the cost, and almost as much as he could get three or four times the quantity of an equally-good and pleasant food.

There is at present a rage for buying gaudy paper boxes which are destroyed by opening, for each of which the buyer pays as much as the vendor does for at least a dozen such packages. To give a new breakfast food a trial we recently bought a packet which is advertised to contain one pound. The price was exactly five times what, substantially, the same article is sold for in every

grocery when put up in white paper. But, the contents were found to weigh only three-quarters of a pound, so the cost of this packet in excess of ordinary retail price of much the same article, was six times. That is, the contents of the gaudy cardboard packet, three-quarters of a pound, cost as much as 4½ pounds of a similar article could have been bought for. The excess of cost was nothing more or less than a payment for a trumpery packet, on a most extravagant scale.

Housekeepers indeed are buying flashy lithos pasted on breakfast food boxes at a price equal to what they could get several pounds of the same class of food, equally as nutritious and fully as palatable, if they were satisfied to have it served in plain paper tied with twine. Two American papers, The Roller Mill, and The Northwestern Miller, denounce the claims made by millers of breakfast foods as "extravagant and wicked." The milling journals are called upon by The Roller Mill to "purge the milling trade of this abuse." In regard to one article our Buffalo contemporary says: "The trade-winning power of neat packages for cercal preparations is well shown in the case of pearl barley in Canada. The Canadian pearl barley is equal or superior to any other, but it is so untidily packed as to suffer seriously in comparison with the United States article." While the extravagance of modern housekeepers as shown by their wasting so much money over pasteboard boxes and their contents, is deplorable, and in cases of those of limited income is positively "wicked," as The Roller Mill says, there is no reason why Americans should monopolize the trade which this modern fad creates.

LEGAL ETHICS.

A general impression prevails in this country that the standard of honour in the legal profession in the United States is lower than it is in Canada. The American bar suffers in estimation through the disparagement of its members who become candidates for a judgeship in the gift of the people. The amiable custom in the States of one set of partisans pouring contempt and obliquy upon the candidate who is favoured by another set of partisans, brings a large number of lawyers to the pillory every year to be assaulted and defiled by the missiles of their opponents. When one who has gone through this abominable experience, which is regarded in the States as one of the proofs of its liberty, is elevated by the votes of a section of the populace to a seat on the judicial bench, it is impossible for his person and office to command due respect from the community in general. Some of the mud thrown at him will stick, and even his friends cannot but have had their respect for him weakened by the sorry sight he has been made to exhibit when in the candidate's This is one of the serious drawbacks of the American system, which is so regarded by all the cultured, and most honourable citizens of the United States. Yet the members of the legal profession in the States, arc, as a class, fully up to the standard of the Old Country or Canada, and American jurists in the front rank, the judges of Supreme Courts, are held in the highest honour in judicial circles in England and the Dominion. illustration of the jealous care taken to guard the honour of the American Bar has been the suspension from practice for two years of ex-Judge William Look, of Detroit, for irregular conduct as a trustee of his clients. The culprit was tried for misconduct by three judges.

sentence was declared to be very light, owing to the Court mercifully taking his wife and family into consideration. The offences proved were of various kinds, but practically were alike, as they each consisted of misappropriation of funds received by the ex-judge in trust for clients. He appears to have made use of clients' money for private purposes, and, in some cases, he concealed the embezzlement by paying interest to the person defrauded, on the sum stolen. In passing the sentence of suspension for two years the presiding Judge said:

"It is to the interest of society that the integrity of the legal profession be maintained at a high standard. long as government rests upon law, the legal profession When, as his client's alone must furnish the judges. representative, an attorney assists the judges in correctly deciding a controversy, he aids in setting up a monument which forever marks the rights and duties of everyone in Attorneys should act with the care and conscience becoming this great responsibility. motives accompanying a just sense of this responsibility will insure higher attainments, nobler character and greater fidelity than any law can require. Society can and does do more than the courts to maintain a high standard of ability, character and fidelity. It can and does punish delinquencies which the law does not notice. is so sure to withdraw its favor from a lawyer suspected of dishonesty that the fear of professional failure alone furnishes a powerful incentive for integrity. Unfortunately cases do arise where neither these higher nor lower motives have prevented a lawyer from falling below the standard o integrity which the law requires. For these cases the law which has been violated affords a remedy which is placed in the hands of judges."

AMERICAN AND BRITISH COAL.

We recently discussed the question of the future coal supplies of this continent and Europe. Our Lordon contemporary, the Economist, deals with the topic in a recent issue as quoted below:

Great efforts are at present being made to supplant British by American coal in foreign, and especially European, markets, and in support of these the Consular offcers of the United States were recently called upon to repert as to the demand in their districts for imported coal, and the opportunities which these markets presented for an increase in the export from the States. The reports received have now been published in a volume issued by the Bureau of Foreign Commerce, and, broadly speaking, they concur in representing that the difficulties which the American coal producers will have to overcome if they are to effectively compete with those of this country are the quality of the coal and the high cost of ocean As to quality, the complaint is that the American coal as delivered contains too large a quantity of dust. This objection is well put by the Consul at Marseilles, who writes: "The American coal delivered in Marseilles is criticised as being too small...... I am informed that with American coal an ordinary practice is te shoot entire cartloads into vessels.....and as the coal itself is probably more friable than the English, the result is disastrons to the appearance of the merchandise." This, however, is a defect which it is thought may be overcome by the exercise of greater care. Of much more importance is the question of freights. The existing passenger lines are, for various reasons, declared to be un-

suitable for the coal traffic, and the Consul at Bordeaux adds that as regards France the tariff arrangements constitute a further bar to American competition. writes:-"The great passenger lines all converge at a few points upon the British Channel, or so near it as to be practically identical so far as continental freight distribution is concerned. Liverpool, Southampton, London, Hamburg, and Havré are the points at which they land American freights. From these ports goods must be reshipped by rail or steamer to all points in France. these ports, except Havre, are outside of French territory, and no passenger steamships, except the French ones, sail from our ports direct to France without stopping at a port of some other European Power. This stoppage has a 'surtax' of 3 francs 60 centimes per 100 kilos, to the tariff or most goods introduced into France from the United Thus, goods shipped from the United States to France by any passenger line pay more than \$6 a ton higher duty than if they came direct from an American to a French port." The only way to remove this obstacle is, in the opinion of many of the consuls, to build a special class of steamer for the carriage of coal between the States and Europe. One of them puts the matter thus: "The effective blow to strike would seem to be to create and operate fleets of steamers such as we have on the great lakes for our ore and grain trade, owned, if possible, by the coal or land transportation companies, whose owners would have no middlemen's commissions to pay, and who might be willing to carry coal at cost, or thereabouts, reimbursing themselves from the profits on their merchandisc." And, very much in the same strain, the Consul-General at Berlin writes:—"It is for the marine Customs of the United States to devise a collier for the Atlantic ceal traffic.....a vessel of large carrying capacity, low cost of construction, with sufficient engine power to steam 7 or 8 knots an hour and give steerage way in all weathers, equipped with the best machinery for handling cargo, and with minimum requirements as to size of crew and consequent operating expenses—a vessel, in short, built specially for the export trade." Whether the time is ripe for such development remains to be seen, but, in any case, it is well that we should know the character of the advice which is being tendered to our competitors.

WHAT IS MEANT BY 16 TO 1?

The free coinage silver question in our judgment is It has, however, sufficient inpractically a dead issue. terest as a historical question to be discussed in an academic fashion. A correspondent invites from us a definition of the famous phrase, "16 to 1," on which the presidential election of 1896 turned. Stated briefly 16 to 1 refers to the relative value of silver to gold. It might be expanded into the statement, that 16 ounces of silver is worth, or ought to be legally recognized as worth, one ounce of gold. At present silver is quoted in the market at about 30 pence per ounce. Gold stands at the English Mint at 933 pence per ounce, the present ratio of the market value of silver to gold is therefore 31 to 1. That is, in the market to-day one ounce of gold will purchase 31 ounces of silver. If, therefore, a law were passed making coins of silver weighing 16 ounces to be a legal tender of the same legal value as coin weighing one ounce of gold, the law would compel creditors to accept money in discharge of a debt valued at about one-half the amount of such debt. Instead of 31 ounces of silver, the





In the first half of the 16th century one ounce of gold was exchangeable for 114 ounces of silver; a century later, 124 ounces of silver bought an ounce of gold; a century later still it took 15 1-10 ounces of silver to procure an ounce of gold, early this century the price of an ounce of gold was over 15½ ounces of silver, and, to-day an ounce of gold will buy 30 ounces of That is, the value of silver in proportion to the value of gold, has gone down 50 per cent, since early in the last century, and to exactly the same extent it has declined in value since 1870, when silver was quoted at 60 9-16 pence per ounce, against 30 pence, the latest quo-Having acceded to our correspondent's request we must leave him and others to consider what would be the result of the legislature of any country making coins a legal tender for purchases and for the liquidation of debts when such coins were only worth one-half their nominal value. To help them in their cogitations we mention that, in New York to-day, the dollars of Mexico are quoted as only worth 495 cents. Mr. Bryan's scheme is to open the United States mints to public use for coining silver for currency at the ratio of 16 to 1. scheme would practically give every debtor the legal right to pay his debts and get a full discharge by handing over to his creditor 50 cents worth of silver, by which, according to law, he would clear off a dollar of debt. Bryan's plan might be truthfully designated, 'A scheme to render it lawful for debtors to swindle their creditors out of 50 cents of each dollar of indebtedness." This

has been the result, as history shows, of legalising a depreciated coinage.

THE PRICE OF PAPERS, SENATORSHIPS AND PEERAGES.

A city politician, who is in a position to peep behind the scenes, informs us that the price paid to buy over La Presse for the Government was \$60,000. If this were the case the buyers must be in a dire extremity for press Such a figure also indicates that La Patrie is not regarded as of much value as a party organ. Clarke Wallace, ex-Comptroller of Customs, stated a few days ago, that \$10,000 was a very low price for a Senatorship, as \$25,000 and over had been paid for the office. He ought to know. At the same time the honour has been generally granted for political services and in some few cases, those of Senator Gowan's and the late Senator Macdonald's, to wit, in order to enrich the Senate by legal talent, business ability, and high character. vested for a seat in the Senate for life is a poor speculation, apart from the satisfaction and incidental advantages of the honour. It is often alleged by those who disparage the Senate of Canada as a branch of the legislature, by affirming that it is occupied by men who have bought their seats, that there are peers in the House of Lords who also purchased their position. To make such a charge is easy, to prove it is impossible. men have been made peers, no doubt, who, but for their wealth, would not have been so socially elevated. does not prove that they were made peers because of their wealth, it only shows, that it is not regarded as advisable to confer a peerage on one who is financially unable to maintain the dignity, which involves heavy expenditure to meet the demands of society and the public. The peers of small income who have been conobled have won the honour, like Lord Macaulay, Lord Tennyson, and others by distinguished literary merit, or like the law lords by judicial eminence, or those who won their way by military renown, or by political services in the House of Commons, or, like Lord Strathcona, by services to the TELEGRAMS :- 'CEMENT, DUNDEE."

Empire, No English peer could be named who purchased his seat in the House of Lords apart from some form of distinguished merit, worthy of the honour of the Crown, and the honour of his fellow-countrymen. One of the distinctions of the House of Lords is that though continually under the fierce light of democratic criticism as an institution, "its honour is stainless," so far as personal charges against its members are concerned. The Senatorsof Canada have been remarkably free from scandals, or even imputations of dishonour.

EXAMINATIONS AND PROMOTIONS OF BANK OFFICERS.

At the Bankers' Convention recently held at Richmond, Va., Mr. W. C. Cornwall, the eminent Buffalo banker, made an interesting statement in regard to the examination and promotion system of bank clerks. The Seaboard National Bank of New York instituted a yearly course of examination over a year ago. The Cashier, or as we say, General Manager of that bank, spoke of the system in the following terms:

"Some time ago, with the idea of bringing out their latent ability, with the ultimate result of increasing the efficiency of our service, the officers of the bank posted upon the bulletin board the following notice:

"The officers have decided that hereafter promotions in this bank will be based upon fitness for the position rather than upon length of service. In making promotions the officers will earnestly endeavor to be entirely fair and impartial in their choice. In deciding the qualifications of candidates the following points will be considered:

- "I. The general ability which the candidate has shown during his term in the bank, determined as follows:
- "(a) The manner in which he has done the work directly assigned to him, the matter of accuracy, speed, faithfulness and good judgment being considered.
- "(b) His general knowledge of everyday affairs and happenings will be taken into consideration, as indicating not only habits of observation but of interest in those things which directly a radirectly affect business.
- "(e) His ability to broaden out intellectually, shown not only by the steady improvement in his working methods but also by the increasing fund of information regarding general affairs which he displays, as well as the increasing scope of his judgment and general powers.
 - "IT. Personal habits and characteristics will be con-

sidered. Moral character, common sense, self-reliance, incisiveness, politeness, are all aids to success.

Over a year ago the bank was obliged to increase the number of the departments, and the question was who of the younger clerks to promote to be managers and assistant managers of these departments. In this age of civil service examinations it was a natural suggestion to submit all candidates for premotion a set of simple questions on banking and finance. After consideration the officers requested the assistant crehier to prepare a series of suitable questions.

"Of course, the qualities outlined in the above bulletin, as well as the ability to pass the written examination, were considered in making promotions, but on the whole the written examination proved to be a valuable index of what the young men were capable of, and the effect of the system upon the young men themselves was remarkable. They had some incentive to study. We have, therefore, decided to make it a frequent competition. The questions will vary, and it is possible that hereafter they will be divided into two sets, one for the more experienced and one for junior clerks."

There is little novelty in the above statement. "Fitness for the position" has ever been the usual basis of promotion in banks. In old country banks old men who have been a life-time in the office are found serving under managers young enough to be children of their superiors on the staff. "General ability," also is a very ancient reason for promotion, so also are good work, knowledge of affairs, and interest shown in the business good grounds for advancement. "Moral character, common sense, self-reliance, politoness," as aids to success have been recognised for centuries. In all those points the Scaboard Bank is simply doing what has been done ever since commerce began.

Examinations are a novelty. They may be "a valuable index of a young man's capabilities." But the question is, of what "capabilities" are the examinations a fest? The effort to find out by a written examination whether a clerk will prove shrewd in lending money, and in handling customers and their affairs is an absurd task. Plenty of young men would take honours in an examination who would prove lamentably deficient in the qualities necessary for a successful career as a bank manager. An English private banker, who established a banking business early in this century, which is flourishing to-day, had no education beyond a moderate knowledge of "the three R's." The leading pank in a neigh-



bouring town fell under the management of a brilliant young man who was an honour graduate of Cambridge. In the panic of 1866 that bank failed most disastrously to all interested; yet he would have passed with triumph any such examinations as have been established to test the capabilities of a bank officer. While, then, we regard it as exceedingly useful to young bank clerks to acquire a thorough knowledge of the history, the principles, the practice, the laws of banking, such knowledge without special, natural qualifications for the business will not ensure success in the sphere of management.

MR. HAYS RETIRES FROM GRAND TRUNK.

Mr. C. M. Hays, after five years' service as General Manager of the Grand Trunk Railway, will retire on 1st January next, to take a similar position with the Southern Pacific Railway, in succession to the late Mr. Huntingden. His official title will be "President," it being a general custom in the States in banks, railways and other large institutions for the acting General Manager to be the President of the Company. Mr. Hays' tenure of office with the Grand Trunk has been marked by a thorough overhauling of its entire service, and by numerous changes in the staff and methods of working the line. A widespread impression has prevailed that he was bent upon placing the Grand Trunk as far as possible in the hands of American officials, with scant respect to the

claims of long and efficient service, or the arrangements of his predecessors. Such an impression, whether justified or not, was very disturbing to the staff some of whom have been long kept on the tenter hooks of fear lest they be sacrificed to make room for an American. In his new position Mr. Hays will have a free hand, and not be the object of this widespread suspicion, which appears to have been somewhat exaggerated. He introduced on the Grand Trunk the rules adopted by the American Railroad Association for the running of trains. By these rules uniformity of signals, &c., are established over the entire system of railways im the States, which is of very great advantage there and has worked well on this side. He has done excellent work in bringing about the incorporation of the Central Vermont with the Grand Trunk system. The traffic arrangements, he made with the Canadian Pacific on the line from Toronto to Hamilton, was also an excellent move. Travellers and shippers of freight have reason to recognise how greatly the traffic management has improved under Mr. Hays, and those directly interested in the financial condition and earnings of the Grand Trunk Railway are well satisfied with . the improvements effected in their property by Mr. Hays.



In 1873 the total sales were 811,700 tons, and in 1878 they were only 693,511, in that period there was not merely no development but an actual falling off in sales to extent of 118,189 tons. In 1880 the era of development set in with sales of 954,659 tons, and since then the increase has risen to over 100 per cent., and the sales are now over three times what they sank down to in 1878 and 1879. As a fiscal policy was adopted in 1879 which was avowedly designed to bring about the result which has taken place, it seems to be a fair conclusion, that the policy was successful, and is therefore entitled to the credit of the development which followed its adoption.

THE LATE SIMS REEVES.

The death of the great vocalist, Sims Reeves, although he was well stricken in years, has caused unfeigned sorrow, not in musical circles only, but amongst the millions who have been thrilled and fascinated by his marvellous voice, the like of which there is no record or memory. Braham and Incledon, had all the sweetness and much of the dramatic expression of Sims Reeves, but there was in their voices a lack of the intensely sympathetic tones which aroused audiences cometimes to the verge of hysteria. When the deceased gave out the recitative phrase "Total celipse" in the Oratorio of "Samson," we have seen the main portion of a vast audience suddenly thrown into tears. Then, when bidding defiance to his termenter in the Oratorio, his trumpet-like tones roused his auditors to a tumult of applause which was difficult to quell. The same marvellous contrast of powers was shown in the Messiah. His rendition of "Comfort ye," was the perfection of manly tenderness and the ficry burst of passion in "He shall dash them to pieces like a potter's vessel," was volcanic in its vivid rush of splendid Sims Reeves established an Oratorio style, which tones. every tenor of his day imitated, and every future tenor will show judgment by taking as a model for rendering the sacred music of Handel, Mendelssohn, Bach, and other great He was the "bright particular star" of many Birmingham Festivals. He was always averse to encores. He was really fatigued after singing a difficult solo, and naturally feared to injure his magnificent voice by weariness. One evening at a Birmingham Festival he had sung a duet with Nillson, which elicited a storm of "encore" cries. She was willing to respond, but Reeves moved to the steps leading from the platform. Seeing his obstinacy the fair Swede seized Reeves by his cont collar and literally compelled him to return. A shout of laughter

greeted them in which they joined, and it was some minutes before those great artists gained sufficient composure to repeat the duet. Jenny Lind's enthusiastic applause on this occasion was much enjoyed by those in sight of the "Swedish nightingale." Being engaged to sing at Wolverhampton he went to see the room in which the concert was to be Standing on the platform his eye caught sight of several skylights in the ceilings. Knitting his dark brows he let out some ejaculatory, sulphurous denunciations of those skylights which were almost hot enough to melt the He swore he would not sing in such "a hole," as he termed it, but was at last persuaded to do so, vowing that his voice would never again be heard there. The usual fee paid Sims Reeves for an ordinary concert was sixty guineas. He was quite anxious to sacrifice that sum rather than sing in a hall whose acoustic properties were so faulty. vocal organ, strange to say, was very tender. It was capable, however, of emitting a marvellous volume of sound. We have often heard him throw out "A" above the staff as bright and clear as a bell, which rang with such force through a vast auditorium that the effect on the audience was akin to an electric shock. We once saw this king of vocalists break down, but he did so in noble company. The President of a Birmingham Festival, Earl Beauchamp, had written a trio for the occasion. In their over-confidence Madame Clara Novello and Messrs. Reeves and Weiss undertook to execute this trifle without rehearsal. Signor Randegger was at the piano. They had not gone far before signs were apparent of "wobbling," which finally resulted in an utter breakdown. "Try again," said the pianist and the second effort was a success. The incident should teach amateurs, and some professionals, to be less preumptuous in neglecting to study compositions they propose to render. The poverty of Sims Reeves in his better days has been a mystery to those who knew what fortunes he carned, We believe his misfortunes arose from becoming involved in a bank that failed, in which his savings were invested. Though sombre in aspect and generally thought to be bad tempered, owing to his determined refusal to respond to encores, Sims Reeves was really bright, genial, whole souled, and tender hearted. His voice was hardly so honied as Mario's, nor as robust as Tamberlik's but in oratorio he walked and shone on the highest artistic plane, where he had no rival, but an imitator in every English tenor, even to this day. In Bakewell churchyard, Derhyshire, there are lines on a singer's tomb, bidding him rest in peace until,

"Angels wake thee with a note like thine."
There will be millions in England ready to echo this pious culogy over the grave of their most beloved musician.

HORSE RACE FRAUDS.

English sporting papers have been recently denouncing the American jockeys, touts and hangers-on who have appeared on British race tracks. The jockeys from the States have introduced a new style of riding on racehorses. They sit almost on the neck of a racer and are described as looking like monkeys. QUEBEC'S FIRE PROTECTION.

A deputation of fire insurance underwriters recently interviewed the Mayor and Council of Quebec respecting the defective fire protection of that city. The deputation was received with anything but welcome. As the facts were disclosed the Mayor became less hostile and an agreement was arrived at that the situation should be investigated by an engineer, who will report upon the water supply of the city, its availability in case of fire, and the equipment and efficiency of the fire brigade. If this leads to the fire protection of Quebec being improved the insurance rates will be modified proportionately.

-The stock, plant, etc., of J. A. Dube, shoe manufacturer, Montreal, will be sold by auction to-day.

—The Untario Gazette announces the incorporation of the Niagara and Georgian Bay Mining and Developing Co., Ltd. The capital is \$1,000,000 in \$1 shares.

—Hasley Brothers, Montreal, wso have been doing a small hat and cap manufacturing business, have assigned to Mr. John Fulton. A meeting of creditors was held on 1st inst.

—The Electrical Construction Company, Limited, London, Ont., are advertising for tenders for the erection of a new factory. The building will be three-storey, 40 by 100 feet. This will be another addition to the manufacturing interests of the city, as the increase in their business will, doubtless, demand more help.

—Miss M. Rousseau, shoe dealer, St. Cunegonde, Montreal, has assigned. Among the creditors are: A. Leblanc, \$309; Seguin Laline & Co., St. Hyacinthe, \$320 on note. Another craim is for \$168 for wages, while the remainder of the liabilities, amounting in all to about \$500, is made up of small amounts ranging from \$5 to \$40.

—It is rumoured at Quebec that a syndicate of New Yorkers has purchased a mine of iron pyrite at Garthby, on the line of the Quebec Central Railway, 55 to 60 per cent. of which is said to be sulphur. -The Russian grain crop is reported to be a failure. The provinces richest in cereals are actually suffering on account of poor harvests. Grain is forwarded ahead of other merchandise, and grain railway rates have been reduced.

—A Washington, U.S., dispatch states that Vice-Consul General Hammer, at Frankfort, Germany, informs the State Department that, according to the St. Petersburg Gazette, the Russian Government has decided to adopt the metric standard of weights and measures. The Ministry of Finance, it is stated, is now engaged in considering the time and manner of introducing this reform.

—The agent of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, stationed at Bristol, says an Ottawa dispatch, states in a report to the Department that much produce being delivered there is imperfectly or insufficiently marked, which causes and extra amount of handling, and a little more breakage of packages and delay of goods. It will be of benefit if all shippers of Canadian products to Great Britain would have the shipping marks put on distinctly and so placed on each package that they may be readily and clearly seen.


"Speaking about the money question," said a New York politician, "I believe Bryan is right when he argues that silver is better than gold. If you take a five-dollar gold pile e and put it in your pocket it is only \$5 when you take it out. But if you take a five-dollar silver certificate and fold it in your pocket you double it—don't you? And when you take it out you'll find it in creases."

—A meeting of the shareholders of the Bank of Commerce will be held on Dec. 4th to ratify the agreement already made for the incorporation of the Bank of British Columbia in the Bank of Commerce. The preliminary agreement with the Bank of British Columbia was confirmed by the shareholders at the meeting held on the 20th of August. This agreement contemplated the examination of the assets of the Bank of British Columbia by the Bank of Commerce officers, which is now mearing completion. To comply with the formal requirements of the bank act a second meeting of the shareholders of this bank is necessary in order that the actual deed of purchase may be confirmed.

The eminent firm of tea dealers who are granting annuities to purchasers of their tea, have already been referred to in these columns. Ten shillings a week is of course, a very nice income if it can be got by simply buying some-body's tea; and if the tea dealers can keep it up, well and good. But we are afraid there will be a sad awakening one of these days, when the widows, having learnt to depend upon the pension, and to consider it a certainty, find that the firm has got tired of the plan. Of course there is no legal obligation in the matter and, therefore, there is no legal or moral wrong. But the whole thing looks uncommonly like a gamble for all that. So says the Review, we should say, it looks uncommonly like a fraud.

The Japan Times has favoured us with a copy of the Marquis of Ito's manifesto, which covers a proposal for a new political association. The proposal says: "Desirous, as we are in Japan, to secure the harmonious working of the administrative machinery and to preserve the equity and justice of its action, we propose to use scrupulous vigilance in the appointment of officials; to avoid useless formalities in the transaction of official business; to clearly define, and rigidly exact the performance of the duties and responsibilities attaching to the various official positions; to maintain strict discipline among public functionaries; and to seeme such despatch and precision in the conduct of business as are required by the country." The Japanese are evidently aiming at a state of things we have not yet established in Canada.

notice that their plants would be closed pending a settlement of the labor troubles that have been cropping up from time to time, and which were the direct cause of the present state of affairs. The employers, in their statement, say that matters have reached such a pass that they cannot now control their own factories, owing to the continual interference of outside unions. Consequently, the manufacturers have now made up their minds only to reopen when a stop has been put to those unions interfering in the management of their business. The closing down means a loss in wages of about \$20,000 weekly, a serious consideration at this season of the year.

FINANCIAL.

Montreal, Thursday, Nov. 10, 1900.

From now until the 8th, the elections here and across the line will be the absorbing topic. Business is being to a large extent neglected as so many are up to the eyes in the stream of political excitement. There is an uneasy feeling in London over the situation in South Africa, as it is evident there will be a troublous time there for months. The Bank of England is still losing gold and expectations are general of a rise in the rate this week or next. The inflow of gold into the States from abroad and from the Klondyke are easing the money market in New York, the interest rates having lowered to 3 to 3½, with a tendency downwards.

Groceries are in good shape with importers busy and talking cheerfully of the outlook. In dairy produce cheese is dull and lower, while butter is firm and in good demand. Fair, mild weather prevails, with no apparent signs of winter.

Finest creamery is dealt in at 201% to 21c, and second quality at 19c to 20c. Dairy is in larger supply, the market being fairly well stocked but prices continue unchanged. Finest Eastern Townships is quoted at 20c to 201%, with Western, 16c to 181% as to grade. Some cheese manufacturers are now turning their attention to butter which will have some effect on local supplies.

CEMENTS, ETC.—Trade is good, assisted by fine clear weather. Car lots are going out freely. One lot of 600 brls. Belgian was sold this week on Western account. Arrivals for week ending Oct. 30, were 1,820 brls. English coment and 121,750 fire bricks. Prices undingred changed.

CHESSE—The market is heavy with prices lower. There has been little or no business passing for some days. Finest colored is quoted at 10% to 10%, with finest white 10t to 10%. 





GREEN FRUITS, ETC.—There is a good movement in late fall and winter apples, Prices are steady at \$1.25 for local account and \$1.75 to \$3.00 for good and hand-picked, as to kind. Oranges are dearer. Bananas have recovered from the low price of previous weeks and are considerably higher. Pears are about through, and command good prices in barrels for choice stock. Quotations are: — Oranges, Jamaicas,

\$5.50 to \$6.00 per barrel; do. boxes,\$2.75 to \$3; lemons, 300s, \$4.50 to \$5; 360s, \$1.50 to \$1.75; bananas, 8-hand, \$1 to \$1.75; No. 1, \$1.50 to \$1.75 bunch; pineapples, 25c to 30c cach; California peaches, \$1.25 to \$1.50 box; do. pears, \$4 to \$5 box; Canada pears, 30c basket; do. brls., \$3 to \$6.00; California green Tokay grapes, \$3.25 to \$3.50 per 4-basket crate; Niagara and blue grapes, 20c basket; crab apples, Montreal beauties, 30c per basket; Spanishonions, crates, 85c; sweet potatoes, \$2,50 to \$3 per barrel; Malaga grapes, \$4.75 to \$6 keg; Cape Cod cranberries, \$7.25 to \$8 per 100-qt. barrel; quince, 20c to 30c basket; new figs, 10c to 16c per lb.

GREEN HIDES.—Owing to competition prices of beef hides have taken an advance of 1c all round. Prices are now 9c, 8c and 7c, for Nos. 1, 2, and 3 respectively. Prices, across the lines have been known to be much firmer for weeks past, tanners being cager purchasers whenever quotations were allowed to govern. Both New York and Chicago markets were firm at last dispatches, extra receipts of foreign not interfering with the strength of the market and buyers were free at quotations. In this market lambskins have also advanced to 80c.

GROCERIES.—After many changes during the heavy consuming months sugars appear to have settled for the season. A fair trade is being done but transactions are pretty much confined to small lots for immediate use or reshipment. The U.S. markets display

similar features. The tendency there is to a lower basis, following the elections, if not before. Raws are inclined to dullness and receipts would indicate a near-decline in the refined article. Louisiana reports weather too fine to aid in ripening the sugar cane, and from that point results are expected to be disappointing, compared with earlier predictions. In currants the very high price appears to have frightened trade away and for the time there is a weakness. This must be but temporary, however, for directly the heavy consuming centres begin to get stock from second hands such a thing as dealing in currants will be impossible. Meantime Montreal prices are 12c for lowest. It is reported that the Valencia raisin market in Denia has declined somewhat from the higest point reached, but according to late mail advices, less than 20 per cent. of the crop remains in Spain, all stocks having left producers' hands and are now held by speculators, who demand very high figures. The English market has declined about five shillings from the highest point reached. Quantity shipped to England is larger than in recent years, but will probably all be wanted owing to the scarcity of currants and sultana raisins. Montreal prices are set on 1/2c, as to quality. New California prunes are arriving, quotations are 40-50, 11c; 50-60, 9c; 60-70, 71/2c; 70-80, 61/2c; 80-90, 61/4c; and 90-100, 6c lb. New French prunes will also be here in a few days and are quoted at 4c to 5c lb. in 2s and 50-lb. cases. New figs are to hand. Comadre in mats are worth 31/2c; Smyrna, in 10-lb. boxes, Sc to 13c; in small boxes (14-oz.), Sc box, and, in full lb. boxes (fancy), 13c. Canned goods are steady. Lobsters, in 1-lb. cans, \$2,75 to \$3.25 per doz.; 1/2-lbs., \$1.75 to \$2 per doz.; and 1/4-lb; cans, \$1 per doz. Coffees are inclined to firmness.

HARDWARE & METALS.—Following the tendency of iron and steel there have

been some further slight reductions on some lines of hardware. within the week. Block tin has been reduced from 35c to 34c. Bar iron, is down 5c, being now \$1.60 base. Tire steel was \$2.10; is now \$1.95 base, and sleigh shoe steel has been lowered 15c to \$1.85 base. Sisal rope has dropped 1c lb. for 7-16 and up, while smaller sizes have been likewise reduced. Best Manilla rope has dropped about 2c lb. all round. Figures are given on another page. Lath yarn is also 1c lb. lower, being now 7½c. Wholesale houses report trade brisk, dealers being anxious to receive stock before close of navigation. The metal markets are subject to the influence of the elections, and as a consequence there is but scant interest shown. Spot tin declined 1s 10d in London on the 30th, but the U.S. markets are absorbed and little will be done for another week or ten days.

LEATHER & SHOES.—Trade is comparatively light, affected by the pending elections. The movement in sole continues good and some lines of jobbing leather are scarce. The labor troubles at Quebre are unsettled, both sides seemingly determined. Montreal shoe manufacturers are preparing for spring work and travellers are making good returns. Quality is sought more by prominent retailers and the trade appear to be constantly getting in better shape

Paints, Oils & Glass.—Mixed paints are likely to be affected in price by the heavy rise in oils and turpentine. Putty is also liable to go higher. Following the heavy advance in the U.S. and England linseed oils have been raised 2c per gallon here, quotations now being 81c to 82c for raw and 84c to 85c for boiled. Turpentine has advanced 2c and is now 62c to 63c as to quantity. Oils are expected to go much higher, some dealers prospects being not less than \$1. Glass is very firm. Many U.S. makers of oiledoth

have been caught on the heavy rise in linseed oil there. The former will likely follow the increased cost.

Provisions.—Bacon continues in light supply and sales are being made at outside quotations. Hams are more plentiful but are assisted in movement by the scarcity of the former. Prices are unchanged except on lower grades bucon, which are dearer. Fresh killed hogs are steady in price at \$\forall \forall c\$ to \$\forall c\$

Wool.—The situation here shows little change from preceding weeks. The sale of 400 bales Cape on the 26th ult. was well attended. The lot sold at 10½e to 12½e per lb. net cash. This distribution will, of course, quieten the market to some extent for the present. The London sales are progressing and prices are firmer than at the opening. They close on the 3rd inst, for the year. Considerable high grade wool is held in Montreal and sample lots are daily going out. Holders are not seeking sales outside nor pushing goods beyond the regular. A London cable of 31st

-The Elizabethport Banking Company, says a New York dispatch, from which young William Schreiber stole a little over \$100,000 in two years, has made a settlement with Mrs. Annie Hart, upon whom much of the money was spent. By the terms of this settlement, Mrs. Hart has made a general assignment to the bank of all the propcrty of which she was possessed, except the household furniture, her wearing apparel, and so much of her jewellery as she can prove was not given to her by Schreiber. The property turned over included three horses and the earriages and paraphernalia going with them, jewels valued at about \$15,000, and a few securities which the bank officers believe to be of some value. All the property is valued at about \$24,000,

-A Philadelphia, U.S., letter states that the anthracite coal trade is everywhere preparing for the resumption of mining this week, and a brisk season at full working is anticipated at the mines. It will take several days to get everything in good moving order, but once b.gun a prosperous winter is evidently in store for the anthracite The market is quite bare of coal, and there is a rush of orders to be filled, so that enormous quantities wid be sent to market at the earliest opportunity, every available car being now sought to send to the breakers. Prices are expected to be fully maintained, and while a few operators may still stand out it is probable that adjustments will soon be made with them so that their collieries will also start and full working will be universal throughout the anthracite fields.

-Following is the report of the arbitrators between the Dominion and Provincial Governments regarding claims put forward by New Brunswick in respect to the Eastern Extension Railway:- "We find that the contention made on the part of the Dominion that the \$150,000 voted in 1884 was in full of all claims by the province, in connection with this road, is not sustained by the evidence, but that the facts and circumstances are altogether the Having duly considered other way. all the matter upon equitable principles, we award that it would be a just disposition of the claim that the Dominion should pay the province of New Brunswick the various semi-annual payments of \$3,750, to which it would be entitled if this \$150,000 had been carried to the credit of the province in 1860, instead of 1884, as we think it equitably should have been, together with interest at five per cent, on the several semi-annual payments from the time they would have been payable up to the 1st of July, 1884, when the \$150,-000 was credited. This sum we find to amount to \$145,218.75 and we also award and state as our opinion that on this sum the province is entitled to be paid by the Dominion Government




-A deputation consisting of Messrs. James Sharpe, R. Lamb, H. Knight, and J. D. Reid, of Burk's Falls; Dr. Freeburn, and E. W. Jenkins, of Magnetawan; W. Robertson of Dunchurch, and Mr. Wainwright, assistant general manager of the G.T.R., says an Ottawa letter, waited on the acting Minister of Railways, Hon. James Sutherland, at Ottawa recently and asked for a grant of \$15,000 to aid in building the Magnetawan River Railway from the main line of the G.T.R., at Burk's Falls, to the head of navigation on the Magnetawan River, The Ontario Government has already granted \$7,500 towards its construction which connects the extensive waterways of the Magnetawan River valley with the main line of the T'.R. at Burk's Falls and places on the market of the world the larger portions of the valuable forests of some ten townships besides stimulating the development and cultivation of vast tracts of first-class agricultural lands in the locality. Mr. Wainwright of the G.T.R., introduced the deputation, and the President of the Magnetawan River Railway Company, Mr. James Sharpe, and Directors Dr. Freeburn, J. D. Reid, and others sought to convince the acting Minister of Railways

of the justice of their claims for Dominion Government aid. The estimated cost of the line is placed at \$40,000. Mr. Sutherland promised that the matter would be considered by the Government.



-A greater naval increase programme than has ever been contemplated on this side of the Atlantic is now under consideration by the Rear Admirals' Board of Construction, says a Washington, U.S., letter, and if approved of by the President, it is to be urged upon Congress at the coming session. The project involves the construction of not less than forty warships, ranging in formidability and size from armored ernisers and battleships of about 15,-000 tons displacement, to gunboats of one-thirtieth that size, and including various special types not hitherto built. The programme will include no less than six ships "of the heaviest armor and most destructive ordnance, with the highest practical speed and the greatest attainable radius of action upon a displacement of about 15,000 tons," combining the most desirable features of line of battleships and cruisers. These vessels must be equal in offensive and defensive qualities to any proposed or designed abroad, and be

able to keep at sea for a longer period than any warship now affoat. At least twenty gunboats are proposed of several types, all of light draught, with large rapid-fire batteries and accommodations to give comfort to officers and crew stationed in the tropics. All of these will be able to get out to Manilla, and thence if necessary to Chinese interior ports under their own steam. Provision is made for an increase in the torpedo flotilla by ten new vessels, including a new type of torpedo cruiseron the lines of existing torpedo boat destroyers, but of greater displacement, speed and armament, with a notable development of long-distance cruising powers, in order that they may accompany a fleet of battleships across the ocean. Several of the other new vessels are to be submarine, if success attends the improved Holland boats, now under contract, and to be finished next summer The new submarines will have greater coal capacity, giving them a much wider offensive radius. The programme will also include three armed colliers, larger than any vessels of the same class ever built for a Government, and specially designed for service from a fuel base, although in times of peace they will be constantly employed in earrying coal from the Atlantic coast to the island possessions in the Pacific. They are to have enormous capacity, enabling each of them to deliver 10,000 tons of coal to Manilla, Guam, or Pango Pango in less time than is now possible to make the voyage with half that amount, 5,000 tons being the capacity of the largest colliers purchased for the war with Spain. Another large ship, unarmed, which is recommended, is a floating machine shop of about 6,-000 tons displacement, to cost about \$1,000,000, for duty in repairing naval vessels at great distances from Government yards, especially the Philippines, where she would cruise to the various ports where gunboats and other vessels required her services.
