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## Commercial Summamy.

-Mressrs. Price, of Quebec, whose sawmill at St Ptienne, Saguenay, was recently destroyed by fire, are building amother large mill at Riviers aux Renurils.
-The Macdonald manual training schools for Ottawa were formally opened on Satmiday afternoon by their Excellencies the Governor-General and the Comutess of Minto.
-Tadger Diome, conl dealer, Montreal, has assigned on demand of $W$. Terbert Tevans, of the firm of Evans Jrothers. Eis principal creditors are: T. Beaulone, $\$ 2,014$; Miss C. Tessier, \$12: Paul Lord, \$225, and Evans Brothers, \$201.
-There was a decrease of over $\$ 113$,000 in collections last month at the Montrenl customs as compared with the corresponding month last year. The amounts collected for the months of Octolyer, 1899-1900 are as follows: Oct. 31, $1899, \$ 803,854.17$; Oct. $31,1900, \$ 600,-$ 342.46.
-Late alvices from Victoria, B.C., state that during the season now closed thirty-fouf sealing schooners took 16,'000 skins in Behring Sca, which is 8,000 less than were taken by twenty-five schooners last season. The spring schooners took 16,517 skins on the coast, bringing the total catch for the year up to 32,517. Only fifty-five brauded seals were killed in Bellring Sea.

The mines have sent out this season nearly 50,000 tons. A year ago last August the comotry was an undereloper wilderness, without mines, railways, doeks, harbors ar aly racilities. Next spring the Algomit Commercial Co., operating the mines, etc., will bring over from Englaud four :,000-ton steamships and as much capacity in barges These, with the 4 steamships now operated, will give a equacity in another year for handing nearly $1,000,000$ tons. The mine and road will be opanded all winter to prepare for the expected husiness of 1901 . It is the four steamers of this Agoma Commercial Company that have been ehartered by the Carnegie Stesil Company for the delivery in Tiverpool mext month of ten thousand tons of steel sold there. It is stated that the Carnegic Company saves albout $\$ 3 . a$ ton on this shipment over the present rate via New York, Freights via New Yorls are now about $\$ 7.50$ from Pittsburg to Liverp:ol. The distance is ibout thirtyrfive liundred miles, while via the lakes and the Camadian camal system the total route is but thirty-two hundred miles. The route taken is from Pitishurg to Take toric over the Ditushorg, Bussemer \& Take Brie road, a Carnegie property, and then by water direct. IThe ships are of a size to pass the Welland and the new Caadian camals of St lianvence River, and were brought to the bakes that way last July. Wefore the close of the present. lake season several other eatgoes of steel and ofiter maherials will be taken direct to Earope via blacse canals, which were completed during the past summer.

[^1]-The western grain standards board met at Winnipeg, Man., the 26th ult., There were present S. Spink, Toronto, chairman; G. G. Castle, elevator commissioner; C. Johnson, Haldur; Peter Ferguson, Kenles, Assa.; W. B. Underhill, Melita; Alex. MeFce, Montreal; R. J. Phin, Moosomin; E. C. P Watts, Jloronto; Jas. Riddell, Rosebank; M. M. MeLatughlin, 'Toronto; George M. Campbell, K. Campbell, Brandon; Joln NeGce, Carrievale, Assa.; W. A. Matheson, C. A. Young, F. W. Thompson, Winnipeg; F. E. "Phat name of No. 2 northern be changed to that of No. 1 Manitoba spring; the grade having not less than 45 per eent. of hard wheat, and weighing not less than 58 pounds per bushel; and that any wheat not good enongh to grade No. 1 Manitoba wheat be graded as No. 2 Manitoba spring, in the discretion of the inspiectors." In connection with grading dried wheat, the following resolution was passed: "That, in enses where tongh whent has been dried, the inspector be instructed to inspect: out of terminal clevators wheat so dried on a clean certifieate when he considers it equal to the standard of such grades. 'llhis is to apply to commercial grades only. The changes, says a dispatch, if carricd out, will make Mauitoba grading almost equal to that of Duluth. The handling of the whent from there and for export to the East, it is believed would be greatly benefited by the change, though Ontario millers were at first opposed to the change. It is umderstood that in lixing a grade of No. 2 Manitoba spring wheat they are better satisfied by what was at first contemplated in having a grade of No. 2 northern.

-Not for twenty years past have jumbering operations been undertiken upon such an extensive scale on the jerobscot rivex, as this fall, says a Bangor, Maine, dispatch, and never in the history of the intustry have men for work in the woods been so hard to geat, even at advanced wages. It is estimated that $20,000,000$ feet of logs will be cut on Penobseot waters this winter, about egually divided between pulp logs, and saw logs, and that fully 6,000 men will be needed to supply all the camps. About 4,000 already have been sent into the woods, while the employment agents and operators are scouring the State, the British provinces and even the farge eities for the 2,000 men still wanted.
-According to the annual reporit of the Ontario Bureau of Industries, just issucd, $9,113,904$ pounds of butter were mate during the year, which sold at an aperage of over 10 c a pound. The cheese output was $123,323,923$ pounds for which $\$ 12,120,887$ was received. Market prices were higher in everything exeept: wheat, com and potatoes: Farm lands in Ontario were valued at $\$ 563,271,777$, us aguinst $\$ 550,246,569$ a year ago. Buildings increased by three millions, implements by two millions, and live stock over ten millions to $\$ 115,806,445$.


-The lioers are said to have 15,000 men still in the field, divided into bands of suo; and are employing their time jn destruction and opposition to progress.
-The liability of the railway companies for goods in their yards at the time of the great Ottawa fire, is, it is reported, to be tested by the Rev. Jumes O'Hara, a retired minister, formerly of Ottawa, and now residing in 'loronto. He has caused a writ to be issued against the C.P.R., for unstated damages for the loss of his libray and furniture. The grools had been accepted by the company for shipment to Itoronto and were destroyed when the fire reached the railway yards.
-'The Doukhobors who have settled in the Northwest are proving pretty goorl fellows after all. A resident of Madoc, Ont., recently back from an extended stay ini Assiniboia Jerritory, says: The Doukhobors will be the making of those parts of the west in which they have settled. They are a thrifty, industrious people, and are talking advantage of every chance to heffer their condition. Th the 'Thunder Hill reservation there are thitteen villages ene of which has a poputation of about 150 . Farming is the main oecupation of the men, and the women give them mow assistance. Thy are a farming pople and look forward to the time When they will have thonsmats of acres of fertite land under cultivation. Jo this end they ane steadily tending. They will stop at nothing which will help carn honest money for the prrehase of implements, stodk, ete. For this reason many of them work on milways which ate being built Hyough Assinhoia by Mackenzic \& Mam. Contractors and sub-contractors are griad to get them, as they work harit and give no trouble. At first, before they understond the conditions, they were willing to work for small wages, but when their knowledge was increased they demamied and recenved the ordinary wages for milwhy laborers. While the men work on the railwas the women and boys look allare the fans. All are bent on making a compekence as quickly as possible, and every means is employed which will add : fin dollars to the family income.
--Treating of the recent, consignment of Canadian fruit to Ingland, the Manchester Guardian says: "The steamer Manchester recently 1,000 cases of Canadian pears (Bartlett, Flemish Beauty, Duchess, Howell, Clargean, and Anjou), 25 cases of peaches, and 125 cases of dessert apples. This is a special consigument, shipped under the auspices of the Minister of Agriculture for Canada. Itherto Canadian fruit hats suffered a little in transit. It is now thought, however, that a perfect system of packing and refrigeration has been devised, and the condition in which the present consignment reached Manchester bears this out. The fruit was grown and packed at Grimsby, in the lrovince of Ontario. From Grimsby it was sent to Montreal, in refrigerator cars, and it has crossed the sea in the mechanically refrigerated chamber of the Manchester Commerce. Mechanical refrigeration on steamers rumning from Cauada to Dritish ports was introduced during the season of 1897 . The system was not perfect at first, but experience has shown what are the best methods of grading ant packing, and the temperature at which the dillerent classes of fruit should be carried. 'lhe resulf, as we have said, is that the most delicate Canadian Iruits can be delivered in this country in perfect condition." Cauadian growers aud exporters will be plensed not only with the facts here given, but with thet liberal advertising accorded our fruit in the markets of Great britain, where next season such shipments will not be considered in the light of experiments.

-The continued mild weather, while not appreciated in trade cincles, is of exceptimal benefit to contractors and others engaged in constroction work, which, in furn must redound to the advantage of business later on when frost and snow taks their imings. The Orfori Montan Railway, is being rapidy extended bastwat irom Kingston, The main line, which is in good condition to kingsbury, is being extended in the direction of Richmond and Windsor Mills. As it starts at Eastman, on the Camadian Pacitic, it, will thus connet, that system with the Grand Trumk. Several humbed men are at work and it is thought the work train locometive will cross the Salmon river this week, and that next week the raiks will have bien pushed to a point within aight mide from Windsor. White the objective point easiward has not yed been deeided upon, President Foster swid that the main thing to be coinsilered was the development of that part, of the country. If is molerstood that a bunch of the Orford Moumain Railuay is also being extended into the lake rogton north of the momatain. The baneh starts from the main lime between Bastman and tanrenceville and passes the base of that mountain at the north side of the hemd of Manilla Lake. It is also malerstoon that the mitway purposes securing a eonnection with the Central Vermont at Waterloo.
-Speaking of the conditions of cattle trade throughout Cireal. Britain, President Mills, of the Ontario Agreentamal College, Guelph, recently back from an :xtented European tone, suid that the most discoumatige leatme in Trish agrienture was the smalluess of the holdings, varying from five to filty aeres, with a vere hage; proportion of them, witer twaty-five acres. The expressed himsolf as much pleasel with the genemal appeazance and ferlitity of the country. He was surprised to find such a latge mumber of shorthorin grate catile all over the nordiern part of the ifland instead of the smaller special dainy catile which he expected to ser. Targe mambers of shorthorn erosses are bred in the country and kept mutil they are from hatf to wo years of ago, when fhey are sold to Scottish and Euglish farmers, to be fed for the great markets of the United Kingrom. In Scotland he lewnd entirely different conditions. Instead of small holdings, there were farmers renting from 300 to 2,000 acres each, conducting business on a large seate, feading enttle bought in Treland and sheep gathered from the Highlands of Scotland, most of them we!l-to-do and many living like princes. One thing especially in this connction was the very high prices which farmers got for their stock compared with what is received by Canadians.

## CANADAS CONDITTON.

Inilustrial derelopment combined with good prices for all farm products, have been enjoyed by the entire Dominion for some years, irrespective of party polities. Thonsands who might otherwise have left the farm and drified toward the eities, or across the border, have remained at home enenoraged by the profits they saw aceruing from the hab which in former yeas brought but a hare livins. Whatever could be raised brought a grod price. Eyen old iromplows, har rows, and other disearded motals were magerly songht for and prices offered that showed value much beyond what was expected. With searee an exception everyining saleable was enhanced in ralue. Similan conditions have frevailed in the cities, where highen wages have bean paticl capable workers, from the railway president down to the skilled worker ins the mateh factory.
The hest of all this is that it is keeping up. Similar periods of activity have been here before, but alvantage was taken of their presence which ensured for them hat a thansient abode. However, experience and wise counejis have prevailed of late years, the publie leing guidad thereby to an extent which has prevented the flooding of goods on a limitad marked, or their over-production in face of forcign competition. Consequently the large mills are now ronning extra time in the endeavor to keep pace with orders for immediate needs. Skilled meehanies ane wated at many points, and the unskilled hand, the daily haborer, the man who is in the groat majority, who luys the most grods and pays for them the rewdiest, is to-day heing sought from far and near with the result that he is conjecturing whether it woutd be letter to go down to the Maine woods at an extra wage, go up to the Algoma district where of her advantages are oftered, or hold the steady job he has near home. Complainte are sometimes heard of the alvances in food supplies and even - lothing, but while men, whether skilled mechanies or day laborers, are being offreet in choie of work, the cost of living cin be-radily adjusted. Publie improvements now under way, or contempated, will sustan the latter conditions, while the higher price of all farm products will not only serve to keep more men on the farms and away from the city factories, hut will materially assist the development: ol new Ontario ame the Northwest, where cheap lands await the industrious filler of the soi!.

only too thoroughly familiar to nced informing what conditions existed ini regard to the marine insurance of steamers on the St. Lawrence route. The urgency was extreme for some energetic steps being taken to remove this discrimination, and, as this is the national port of Canada, as stated by the Premier and other members of the Government, and as acknowledged generally by the country, we deemed it the duty of the Government to use its influence in protecting the national port from the adverse influences at work to injure its prestige in the interest of Ameriean rivals. The annexed petition brings this matter to a head, and we trust it will cause the Gorernment to do what is so forcibly urged by the Bonrd of Trade:
To Fis Excellency the Right Fonorable the Earl of Minto, G.C.M.G., fovernor-General of the Dominion of Canada, in Council :-
The petition of the Council of the Montreal Board of Trade humbly sheweth:-
That because the rates of marine insurance on cargoes and hulls using the St. Lawrence ronte are seriously discriminative against that route, the shipping trade thereof has, during the past two years, been largely diverted to Trited States ports, and thus the port of Montreal, and the St. Lawrence route generally, have suffered serious loss, evidence of same being in possession of your petitioners in the shape of tables of insurance rates and letters from shipowners withdrawing their ships from that route;
That said discrimination against the St. Tintrence route is most severe, the insurance rates on enrgo from the opening of navigation to the end of Angust ranging from double to treble the rates charged for cargo on vessels at Atlantic ports, while from Septemher 15th to the close of navigation the discrimination is still more accentuated, the St. Tawrence rates then being from five to seven times greater than to ports on the Atlantic coast;

That this system of heavy advances during the fall months, which originated in the days of sailing vessels, is, now that the trade is performed entirely by steamers, a most unwarrantable feature of the insurance companies' tariffs;

That the rates on hulls also discriminate in favor of: Atlantic ports, and that although such discrimination is less than on cargoes, it is perhaps even more responsible tor the diverting of ships from the St. Wawrence ronte;

## LORD SITRATHCONA AT TORONTO.

The Toronto Board of Trade gave a banguet on the 2ath ult., in honour of Lord Strathcona. 'Toronito has prid the same compliment to distinguished guests on sevcral previous oceasions, hut it is ackoowledged, that no heartier nor more universal welcome was ever accorded than Lord Strathecinia received, nor was cever a large public banquet more admirably managed: The long winded
after dinner speaker, who is such an intolerahle nuismec, was absent, or uniler control, so the company was not wearied out with phatitudes, while the guest of the evening had due prominence and attention given to his specel. The ehairman was Mr. A. E. Kempt, President of the Board of 'Trade, who will represent a division of Thounto in the next Parliament. Mis speech was a well aramged eulogy mil Lord Stratheom, whose career he graphically skefched amiol a continuous outburst of cheers.

On rising tor respond his Lordship was greeted by the Whole assembly standing and checring. Aifter very feetingly acknowledring the reception he recalled his visit to Toromber, when the cits, as suteh, could be hardly said to exist. In banking the Board of Trate he theer out the suggestion that a Deminion Board of Trade be established composed of the leating members of local Boards int altthe Provineses. The company receiver this suggestion with marked approval, so that it is highly probnble steps will he taken to orgamize a Dominion Board of Trade. TTe passet on in the same line of thought to depreate the provincialism prevalent in Camada, saying: "Whether in Ontario, Queliec, the Maritime Provinces, the Pravic Provinee, or in that grent Western country which whs snee called a sea of mountains, and which they now knew to be a riech sea of mombinins, ouglit they not to feel that in all their legislation they desived to enme together in ercrything that was good for the Dominion at large?"

One of the manifestations of this ntarow provincial spirit was pointed out to be there being different examimations in the provinces fin cendidates secking to enter the medical profession. There was no general cerlificate for the whole Dominion. Not only were members of the medieal profession hampered and injured by a varicty of provincial regulations, but they were prevented exereising their profession in the United Kingdon and the other Colonies. In this comnection Tord Stratheona made ani important statenent, he ssid: "Tt would have heen possible to introduce the graduatos of Camadian medical schools to luenative positions in the British military serviec, except for the lact that there was no Dominfon service. Would it not be possible for his honomble Prienil Mre hoss, who hat dome so much for legishation in Ontario, to get rial, of this by having a genemal council of education, compused of members from the different provinees? 'Ihe present condition of things was hamitiating. At the hend of the British military department Canadians were told: 'We den't doubt at all your men are guite equal to ours. We would be glad to have them, bul you do not allow us.'" Tit would certaindy tend to raise the standard of the medical profession were the sphere in which plysicians and surgeons eould cerercise Heir ealling so far extended as to open to them opporLumities for a career in Great; Britain. It is also certain, Hat an uniform, miversal and matiomal spirit will never pervade the people of Canada, as it docs those of Enghand, Scotland, Trelamet, or France, so long as harriers exist which prevent Chmadians from freely exercising their calling in every Province of the Dominion.
Mis Lordship urged more genemal and careful inspection of all products going out of Camada. He had heard grave complaints in regard to Canadian goods, which would have heen olviated had they been properly inspected. Only within: the hast week he had had a remonstrance from the great Corn Exchange at Xiverpool. "Illae beliel is that this inspeetion is far from being as
porlect as it should be, and if there is no remedy it will be very much against the commercial interests of Canadia." Such weighty, words ought to mouse the Boards of Trade to such action as would protiect "the commercial interests of Canala," which are menaed by defective inspection of our exported products.

Ilis Lordship then spoke of one of the social aspects of the Empire: "A few years ago people from Camadta nud the colonios were regarted in Pangland as mercly those it was well to be civil to-bery worthy backwoods people, but hardly worth while crossing the sea to recoguize. We know that our neighlours of the Thited States were thought: highly of, and seen everywhere in society, but was it so of ourselves from Camada and the other colcmies, as we had a right to expect? How is it to day? To be a Camadian of a citizen of any other colony was to have the warmest good wishes of all the hest people of the Moither Country. The feeling that has gone forth toward the colonies is mot, $I$ feel assured, an cranescent onc. While we are the first among the nations with in the Empire, we are glad to know that there is another true-born nation which which is to take its place alongside of Camada in a very fow weeks. Thie grtmdson of her gracious Majesty the Quean goes there to assist in opening the new Parlianent, and I trust that the oceasion will not be lost of having that same member of the Bocyall family, as representing her Ainicsty, come also Amongst us on his return. The feeling is mow that we should be regarded as one people, one great Timpire of Englishmen, no matter what our mother tongue may be." He expressed confidence that in 1902 there would be cable commnaication direct from Canada to Australia.

After giving on interesting statement of the valunble work done in the Figh Commissionar's offiee, Tomoton, Lant Strathicona aroused the checrs of his hosts ly allusime to the war. Of the commander wi the Stratheona Therse and the oflicers and men, he said: "I helieve there is no braver and more gallant man to be found than the commmander of that hody, and that he was supported well by his officers and equatlly well by every member of that corps. We must recollect that if the; have done their duty well, and if he who was instrumental to some extent in placing them in the position af doing their duty to their Quean and country-if they tagether have done well --we know that the whole of the soldius of Canada have done their part not less nobly. We knaw and leel that, so long as the soldiers of Camada, and other outlying parts of the Empire, and of the Mother Country, determine that right shanl he maintained, so loug is the whole Empire salde, mud so long shall we the nble to sty with heart and soul, 'Cood Save the Queen.' At the close of this mast sucecsslul hanguet, horil Straheman moved a vole of thanks to Mr. Kenp, the clarman, whom he said, he was "proud to regerd as a friend." He had hat the pleasure of meeting lim in Tondon lest spring, when he so ably represented the Iloronto Boart of Trade at the Congress of Chambers of Commeres, and assured his hearers that ari: Kemp eserted a very groat influence in that assemblage.

## THE VALTEYTETD STRIKE

With the strike of the employecs of the ootton mill at Valleyfield, as a miere "strike" of workpeople for more
wages we have no concern, such disputes are best left to be adjusted by the parties at variance, or some arbitiontor acting as "amicus curiae." But, when those who are idle because they camot obtaini all the wages demanded, begin to interfore with the liberty of other workpeople, or otherwise to obstruct the work of the mills, or break, or endanger the peace, there are conditions crented of public intorest. On the 25 th October owing to the riot: ous conduct of some employees of the mills, or of men ergaged in worls connected with the buildings, the Mayor of Valleyfield and two of his colleagues wrote to Lt.-Col. Roy, of this city, setting forth that, owing to the local constables being unable to maintain the peace, they request two companies of Vietoria Rifles to be brought to Valleylield, and commanded to maintain peace and ordn! and airrest any and all persons who have committed any breach of the peace. This formal appeal by the Mayor and his colleagues wis declared to be made, "under authority of the Militia Act of Canada." The existence of a riot; the impotency of the local peace oflicers to maintail order and protect property; the formal demand by the authorities for military protection, are thus facts beyond dispute. Whoever has seen a town dominated by sioters, and the military called out to restrain them knows how impossible it is to obtain a cool statement of what happens in such an excited locality. The first duty of the Mayor on the arrival of the military was to read the Riot Act, which calls on all citizens to disperse and keep order on pain of severe compulsion being resorted to. For some reason this ceremony was not performed, and the rioters took advantage of the confusion to attack the soldicrs with dangerous missiles, by which some were injured soriously. Lt.-Col. Ilbbotson kept his head, as did his men, or there would have been such retaliation as, though richly deserved, would have had deplorable results. The mob seems not to have realised that its utter criminality and folly must be put down and punished. 'Whe very mild treatmeat of them by the soldiers; which, at the most was a low pricks of a bayponet; misled the rioters, who needed a stern lesson as to the danger of setting law and order at defiance. Had such scenes arose in Framee or Germany there would have been a rifle fusilade that would have killed a score or two of the mols. In. Valleyfield, those•injured were the soldiers, yet there have been violent attacks upon them by some local papers, becanse they cleared the streets by a very gentle display of what a. bayonel feels like-a sensation which will probably check any future impulse to earn another of the kind.

There is too much reason to believe that this unfortunate outbreak of mob violence was instignted by professional agitators to whom andabour dispute is an opportonity for showing their zeal for workpeople on whose contributions they subsist. The proprietors of the Valleyfield mills are capitalists to whom Canada is under deep obli'gations for their onterprise in establishing and maintaining a great national industry. Their munificence as philanthropists, and as contributors to public institutions which are of the greatest service to the educational and social welfare of the country, have also won them a large measure of public respect. It will be a sorry day for Canada when those who venture their fortunes in manufacturing enterprises can be intimidated and their property and their business interests jeopardized by rioters withont the miscreants receiving the due reward of their crime ngainst law and order. The non-service of war-
rants issued against the ringleaders shows lameutable weakness somewhere. Is it possible that there is a distriet in this law-ibiding Colony where the Queen's writ does not rum? Have we force to spare to compel respect to the authority of the Crown in South Africa, but are mable to bring malcfactors to juslice at home? All Camada has a right and will demand that lave aud order be not ouly muintained at Valleyfield, lout that the ringJeaders in rioting be brought to justice.

## DXPORI IRADE IN HA'IS.

The London Hatters' Gazette, for September, contains a classified statement of the export of hats from and imports into Great Britain during 1899.

The aggregate value of all hats manufactured in and exported from Great Brituiu was : $\mathrm{El}, 10 \mathrm{G}, 6 \mathrm{dF}_{\mathrm{r}}$ an increase over 1898 of $£ 46,908$.
The exports of hats of all kinds to the United States amounted to $8, \% 05$ dozens, of a total value of $\$ 17,010$, in decrease from 1898 of 1,370 dozens and an incrense in valuation of $t 747$, an average value of $\$ 10.65$ a dozent ngainst $\$ 7.33$ per dozen in 1898, and $\$ 1.13$ per dozen in 1896, $\$ 5.25$ per dozon in 1895 , $\$ 5.90$ per dozen in 1894, and $\$ 7.31$ per dozen in 1893.

A decrease occurred from the prevjous year of $3,9 \pm 7$ dozens of straw hats and an increase of 100 dozein in silk and miscellaneous hats. The total increase in valne of imports of hats of all kinds is $E$ ri4:7, or $\$ 3,73$.

A comparison of Tngland's principal cexports of felt and straw hats to other countries in 1898 and 1899 follows:

l'he figures given of exports of hats into the Euited States from bingland represent practically the entire amombt of hat importations, those shipped direet from other countries being very suall in amount.
The following were the imports of hats, and hat materials into Canada in the yenrs 1897,1898 , and 1809 :


The henvy imports of materials for the manufacture of hats in Camada indicates that his is a large industry in this country. The small exports of hats prove that the wast: bulk of those made hare are for domestic consumption, or use.

## dele north amprican life in neg york.

The North American Life Assurance Co., of Toronto, has taken the bold initiative of entoring the State of New

York. For some years this step has been contemplated by the lealing life companies of Canada, but the red-tape and other ubstructions were such as prevent the step being taken. The reguirements of the New York insirance Department are so strict that it is a valuable tribute to the financial stimeding of the North American life to have passed the stringent ordeal with flying colours. Mr. I. D. Wells has beem amponted chich agent in the States whose ollice will he ca Mroadway in New York City. Mr. William Mce cabe, F.I.A., managing director is being wideIy congratulated on this move which adds in the prestige of the company he has buit up into such strength and promise.

## THE DPPARHMEN OF DABOUR AND IME JABOUR GAZETYIE.

The Government has .established a "Department of Labonur," which is a questionable addition to the adminisirative machinery of the country. A "Department" implics a Minister of the Crown in charge of it. The (stal) lishment of the Department of Labour at Ottawa has led to another addition to the Cabinet by a "Minister of Labour" being appointed. Already there are "more cats than catch mice" in the Cabinet. 'The occupant of one ministerial position repeatedly denounced the increase of such oflices as the one he himself, "in a moment of weakness," we presume, thought it well to accept.
A Department of Labour in Canada is no more needed than a Department of Dry Goods, or Department of Butcher's Meat, or Departwent of Vegetables, or Department of Domestic Service. Labour is a marketable commodity, it is the stock-in-trade, as it were, of the greater mass of the people of this country. Cauadians, as a rule, are labourers, the hardest workers, those who labour most assiduously, during the longest hours, and at the most exhausting work; are not those whose interests are supposed to be watehed over with graudmotherly care by the Department of Labour. If the artisan classes, who are to be under the wing of the Govermment-like firesulyhatched chickens, uder the old hen's-had a full sense of manly independence they would despise a government for interlering with their afiaiss. Have they not their own Trades Unions, their assuciations for mutual protection and help, and their press organs, under the management of their own order and of their own direct choice? The Department of Labour has stepped in to watelt over the wage-carners as though they were as sheep haying no shepherd, as a disorganized mob, as men without ability enough to organize themselves in their own interests, and as a class, without capacity to rum a "Department of Labour," apart from government ollicials and government direction.

Another new departure, which-also is highly objectionable on various grounds, is the entrance of the Government into the business of publishing a magazine or jourrial called The Lalbour Gazette, which is specially devoted to the interests of one clnss in the community. One feature of this is a statement in eacli number of the trades umions formed sinee the last issue of the Labour Gazette, with reports of the proceedings of unions, so that this Government paper is actually a Irades Union organ. How far the public revenue, which is derivod from the taxes paid by all classes, cau be justly applied to the payment of trades union officials, and the dissemination of trades
union literature, we need not discuss, its utter impropriety is too glaring for argument. The Oclober number of this extrandinary pulliention is chielly devoted to an claborate, detailed report of the Congress held recently of trades union detegates. In this report a Cabinet Minister, not numed, but who is styled "The Minister of Tabour," is stated to hive addressed this Trades Union Congress. We should like to know when the sanction of barliament was given to the appointment of a "Minister of Labour," and what is his salary, and who is the ollicial holling this new portfolio?

Common report sjeaks of the Postmaster-General as being the Minister of Labour. Surely this cannot be so, as a Postmaster-Gencral cannot have sufficient time in that office to take charge of a second Department? If he has, then his saliry is much too large, and, in justice to the curntry, he ought to have urged the Privy Council to abolish one of the other semi-sinecure clepurtments and amalgamate it with that of the Postmaster-General. We are compelled to regard the creation of the new Departuent of labour and its publication of a class paper, which is devoted chiefly to the interests of trade unions, as a most unwise policy.

It is not without significance that the worst strikes that have occurred in Canada for years have been started since the Govemment took the trades unious under its wing. Such men as have instigated the riots at Valleyfield are just the class to have their minds unbalanced by finding the Govermment taking special interest in the cause of labour, which, in their ignorance, they regard as the naturnl antagonist of the interests of capitad, and therefore of those who employ labour. The whole business associated with this new movement is deploiable and nas in it the germs of widespread mischief.

## THE BREALFAS'I FOODS CRAZE.

The valicty of so-culled "breakiast foods" now in the hauket is so great as to be embarrassing to housekeepers who desire to furnish their tables with up-to-date provend.r. 'l.he profit on this class of goods is so enormous as to have brought competitors into the field whose loud amouncements remind us of the old-time theatre-booth at a fair. Ihose enterprises were famous for the prodigious noise inade on the outside by a huge drum, cymbuls, and the stentorian voice of the proprietor. The performance inside was scanty in length and in quality unspeakably bad. So with most American breakiast Lood packages. The show outside is loud, glaring, almost hysterical, and conspicuous by the vulgarity or absurdity of its art, which usually conveys a falsehood. The hreaklast food package itself is usually a fraud, as it appears to hold much more than is ever found inside. The buyer of such packages purchases a very gaudy set of flaring lithographs, a useless box of cardboard, and a quantity of some prepared edible, for all of which he pays usually about four to five times the cost, and almost as much as he conld get thiree or four times the quantity of an equally grood and pleasint food.

There is at present a rage for buying gaudy paper baxes which are destroyed by opening, for each of which the buyer pays as much as the vendor does for at least a dozen such packages. I'o give a new breakfast food a trial we recently bought a packet which is advertised to contain one pound. The price was exactly five times what, substantially, the same article is sold for in every
arocery when put up in white paper. But, the contents were found to weigh only three-quarters of a pound, so the cost of this paeket in excess of ordinary retail price of much the sume article, was six times. That is, the contents of the gandy cardboard paeket, three-quarters of a peiud, cost as much as 4 pounds of a similar article could have been bought for. The exeess of cost was nothing more or less thatu a payment for a trumpery packet, on a most extravagant scale.

Housekeepers indeed are buying thashy lithos pasted on breakfast food boses at a price equal to what they could get several pounds of the same class of food, equally as nutritious and fully as palatable, il they were satisfied to have it served in plain paper tied with twine. 'I'wo American papers, the Roller Mill, and The Northwestern Hiller, denounce the claims made by millers of breaktast foods as "extravagant and wicked." The milling journals are called upon by The Roller Mill to "purge the milling trade of this abuse." In regard to one article our Bufialo contemporary says: "I'he trade-winning power of neat packages for cercal preparations is well shown in the case of pearl barley in Canada. Ihe Camadian pearl barley is equal or superior to any other, but it is so untidily packed as to suffer seriously in comparison with the United States article." While the extravagance of moderu housekeepers as shown by their wasting so much money over pasteboard boxes und their contents, is deplorable, and in cases of those of limited income is positively "wicked," as The Roller Nill says, there is no reason why Americans should monopolize the trade which this modcrin fad creates.

## LEGAL ETHIOS.

A general impression prevails in this country that the standard of honour in the legal profession in the United States is lower than it is in Canada. 'The American bar sulfers in estimation through the disparagement of its members who become caudidates for a judgeship in the gilt of the people. The amiable custom in the States of one set ol partisans pouring contempt and obliquy upon the candidate who is favoured by another set of partisams, brings a large number of lawyers to the pillory every year to be assaulted and defiled by the missiles of their opponents. When one who has gove through this abominable experience, which is regarded in the states as one of the proof's of its liberty, is elevated by the voles of a section of the populace to a seat on the judicial bench, it is impossible for his person and oltice to command due respect from the community in generai. Some.of the mud dinown at him will stich, and even his friends cannot but have had their respect for hin weakened by the sorry sight he has been made to exhibit when in the candidate's pillory. This is one of the serious drawbacks of the American system, which is so regarded by all the cultured, and most honourable citizens of the United States. Yet the members of the legal profession in the States, are, as a class, fully up to the standard of the Old Country or: Canadar and American jurists in the front rank, the judges of Supreme Courts, are held in the highest honour in judicial circles in England and the Dominion, $\Lambda n$ illustration of the jealous care taken to guard the honour ol' the American Bar has been the suspension from practice for two years of ex-Judge William Jook, of Detroit, for irregular conduct as a trustee of his clients. The culprit was tried for misconduct by three judges. The
sentence, was dechared to be very light, owing to the Court mercifully taking his wife and lamily into consicleration. 'Ihe oflences proved were of various kinds, but pratically were alike, ats they each consisted of misapfurpriation of funds received by the ex-julge in trust lor ctionts. He "ppears to have made use of elients' money Cor privatu purposes, amb, in some cases, he enncealed the rabezatement lay paying interest to the persen deltraded, on the sum stolen. In passing the santence ot suspension fore two gears the presiding olowles said:
"It is to the interest ut suciety that the integrity of" the legal prilession lo maintaimed it a high standard. As lomg as govermonemb rests umb law, the lega protession ahone must, fumish the juilges. When, as his dients representative, an attomey assists the julges in courectly
 Which lorever burks the rights and duties of everyone in the State. Dthancys shmuld aed with the care and conseience heroming this great responsibility. The high motive newmpanging a just sense of this responsibility will insure higher atainments, nobler chameter and greater fidelity than any haw can require. Sociely can and dous domere than the comets to maintain a high standiard ont :ability, charsacter and lidetity. It can and does punish delimpuencies which the haw does not notice. It is so sure to withdraw its favor from a lawyer suspected of dishomesty that the tear on prolessomal tailure alone furnishes a powerlul incentive for integrity. Unlortumately cases do arise where neither bese higher nor lower motives have prevented a lawyer from falling below the shambard o integrity which the haw repuires. For these (ases bue law which hats leen viohated aifords a vemedy whielh is phated in the hamis of jutges."

## AMERICAN AND BRTIPSBCOML

We recently diseussel the question of the future coal supplies of this continent and liurope. Our Landon contempamy; the leconomist, deals with the topic in a recenti, issue as quoted below:

Great efforts are at present leing made to supplant Iritish by Americine coal in Joreign, anted especially Duropean, markets, and in support of these the Consular oftieers of the United States were recently cerlled upon to repert as to the demand in their districts for imported coal, and the opportumities which these markets presented for ant increase in the export from the States. The reports 'yeecived have now been publisheil in in volume issued by the Bureau of Foreign Commerce, and, broadly speaking, they concur in representing that the difticulties which the Ameriend enal producers will have to overcome it Hey are to efrectively compete with those of this comtry we the ghality of the coal ind the high cost of ocem freight. As to quality, the complaint is that the Americon coal as delivered contains tho large a quantity of dust. This objection is well put by the Consul at Manseilles, who writes: "Illie Americinen ceal delivered in Marscilles is critieised as being too small.......I am informed that with Anerican coal an ordinary practice is to shoot entive cartloads into vessels......and as the coal itself is probally more friable than the English, the result is disastrons to the appearance of (he merchandise." I'his, however, is a defeet which it is thought may be (wercome by the exercise of greater care. Of much more impatance is the question of freights. The existing passenger lines are, for varions reasons, deelared to be mer-
suitable for the coal traflic, and the Consul at Bordeanx ailds that as regards Fiance the tarift arrangements conslitute a further bar to American competition. He writes:-"The great passenger lines all converge at a few points upan the British Chamel, or so near it as to be mactically identical so lare as continental feeight distribution is concerned. Liverpool, Southampton, Londom, Hamburg, and Thave are the points at which they hand American freights. From thee ports gants must be reshipped by rail or stemmer to all points in France. All These ports, except Havre, are oulside of French tervitory, and aro passenger steamships, except the French ones, sail from our ports direct to Frince without stopping at a port of some cther Ruropean Power. 'Ihis stoppage has a 'surtax of 3 francs 60 centimes per 100 kilos. to the tarifl: or most goods introduced into France lrom the thited Slates. Thus, goods shipped from the United States to Frames by any passenger line pay more than $\$ 6$ a ton highar duty than it they came direct from an Amergan to a Prench port." IThe maly way to remore this olstacke is, in the opinion of many of the consuls, to build a special chass of steamer for the carriage of coal between the Siates and Europe. Onve of them puts the mater thas: "The effective blow to strike would seem to be to create and operate fleets of steaners such as we have oa the great lakes tor cur ore and grain trade, owned, if possible, by the coal or land transportation companies, whose owners would have no middlemen's commissions to pay, and who might he willing to carry coal at cost, or thereabouts, reimbursing themselves from the prolite on their merchandiss." And, very much in the same strinin, the ConsulGeneral at Berlin writes:-"It is for the marine Castoms of the United States to devise a collier lor the Athatic conl tralfic......a vessel of large carrying capacity, low cost of construction, with sulficient engiue power to steim 7 or 8 linots an hour and give slecrage way in all weathers, equipped with the best machinery for handling cargo, and with minimam requirements as to size of crew and consequent operating expenses-a vessel, in short, built specially for the export trade." Whether the time is ripe for such development remains to be seen, but, in any case, it is well that we should know the character of the adviee Which is being tendered to our competitors.

## WHAT IS MEANT BY 16 TO 1?

The free coinage silver question in our judgment is practicallaj a dead issuce. It has, however, sufficient interest as a historical question to be discussed in an academic fashion. A correspondent invites from us a definition of the famous phrase, " 16 to 1, " ou which the presidential election of 1896 turned. Stated briefly 16 to 1 refers to the relative value of silver to gold. It might be expanded into the statement, that 10 ounces of silver is worth, or ought to be legally recognized as worth, one ounce of gold. At present silver is quoted in the market at about 30 pence per ounce. Gold stands at the English Mint at 983 pence per ounce, the present ratio of the market value of silver to gold is therefore 31 to 1. That is, in the market to-day one ounce of gold will purchase 31. ounces of silver. It, therefore, a law were passed making coins of silver weighing 10 ounces to be a legal tender of the same legal value as coin weighing one ounce of gold, the law would compel creditions to accept money in discharge of a debt valued at about one-half the amount of such deldt. Instend of 31 ounces of silver, the

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amount due to the creditor, being legally reguired to discharge a deht equal to an ounce of gold, the law would enable a legal discharge to be enfored when only 16 conces of silver was paicl. This calculation assumes, however, that silver keeps up its market price at 30 pence per ounce. But, the probability is, that were 16 to 1 cs tablished as the legal ratio of value between gold and silver, there would be such an output of silver from the mines as would bring down the price. The theorists of Mr. Bryan's school assume that silver has now; ever has had, and ever will have a definite, fixed proportionate value to gold, which, for some mysterious, unexplainable reason, they regard as 16 to 1 . This, we need hardly say, is utterly untrue. In the first half of the 16th century one ounce of gold was exchangealle for 1.1:? ounces of silver; a century later, $12!2$ numes of silver hought in nunce of gold; a century later slill it took 1.5 1-1.0 ouncess af silver to procure an nunce of gold, carty this century the price of an ounce of grold was over $15 \frac{1}{2}$ ounces of silver, and, to-day an ounce of gold will huy 30 omeses of silver. That is, the value of sitver in propertion to the value of gold, has gone down so per echt, since conly in the last century, and to exactly the same extent it has declined in ralue since 18\%0, when silver was quoted at of 2-16 pence jer ance, against 30 penee, the latest quotation. Faving acceded to our correspondent's request we must leave him and others in consider what would be the result of the legielature of any conntry making coins a legal tender for purchases and for the liguidation of delts when such coins were only worth one-half their nominal walue. To help them in their cogitations we mention that, in New York to-day, the dollars of Mexico are quoterl as only worth 495 cents. Mr. Brynn's scheme is to open the United States mints to public use for coming silver for currency at the ratio of 16 to 1 . The scheme would practienly y ve every dehtor the legn right th pay his debts and get a full discharge by handing over to his ereditor 50 cents worth of silver, by which, according to law, he would clear off a dollar of debt. Mr. Bryan's plan might be truthfully designated, 'A scheme to render it lawful for debtors to swindle their ereditors out of 50 cents of each dollar of indebtedness." This
has been the result, as history shows, of legalising a demrecinted coinage.

## 'IHE PRICE OF PAPERS, SHNATORSTTIPS AND

 PEERAGES.A city politician, who is in a position to peep behind the scenes, informs us that the price paid to buy over La Presse for the Government was $\$ 60,000$. It this were, the casc the buyers must be in a dire extremity for press support. Such in figure also indientes that la Patrie is not regarded as of much value as a party organ. Mr. Clarke Wallace, ex-Comptroller of Customs, stated a few days ago, that $\$ 10,000$ was a very low price for a Senatorship, as $\$ 25,000$ and over had been paid for the office. He ought to know. At the same time the honom has been generally granted for political services and in some few cises, those of Senator Gown's and the late Sematror Macdomald's, to wit, in orfer to enrich the Sonate by legal talent, husimess ahility, and high character. \$25,000 inrested for a seat in the Semate for life is a poor specula(tion, apart from the satisfaction and incidental advanlages of the honour. It is often alleged by those who disparage the Senate of Canarla as a branch of the legistature, by affirming that it is ocenpied by men who have bought their seats, that there are peers in the Fouse of T.ords who also prichased their position. Tho make such is charge is casy, to prove it is impossible. Wealthy men have been made peers, no doubt, who, but, for their wealth, would not have been so socially elevated. This does not prove that they were made peers becanse of their wealth, it only shows, that it is not regarded as adyisable to confer a peerago on one who is financially unable to maintain the dignity, which involves heary expenditure to meet the demands of society and the prblice.. The peers of small income who have been enmobled have won the honour; like Lord Macaulay, Lord Tennyson, and others by distinguisher literary merit, of like the law Incds by judicial eminence, or those who wom their way he military renown, or by political services in the Eionse of Commons, or, hike Lord Strathcona, by services to the

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Bmpire, Nas English peer conld be maned who purdiased his seat; in the House of laris apart from some farm of distinguished merit, wortly of the hombur of the ('rown, and the homour his fellow-combtrymen. One of the distametions of the Honse of therds is that thouth ramimatly under the fieres light of democratic criticisum
 sonat charges against its members are concernad. The Senamoon Camata heve beomatably fre from sembdials, of erem imputations of dishonour.

## BNAMINATONS AND PROMODIONS OF BANK OFELCLES.

At the Bankers' Convention recently held at Richmond, Via, Mr. W. C. Cornwall, the eminent Bullalo banker, nade an interesting statement in megard to the examinalion and promotion system of bank clerks. The Seabard National Bank of New York instituted a yenry course we examination over a year ago. The Cashier, or as we sny, (ienerat Manger of that bank, spoke of the systran in the following terms:
"shate time ago, with the iden of bringing out their halemi ahitity, with the ultimate result of inereasing the eftiremey of our service, the oflicers of the bank posted upon the bulletin board the following notiec:
"Illye ullieers have decided that hereafter promotions in this bank will be based upon fitness for the position rather then upon lengelh of scrvice. In making promotions the officers will emmestly endenvor to be entirely fiair and impurtial in their chaice. In deciding the qualifientions of candidates the fullowing points will be considered:
". 'The general ability which the candidate has shown during his term in the hank, fetermined as tollows:
"(i) The manner in which the his ilone the work direedly assigned to him, the matiter of acentracy, speed, lailhtulness and go:a julgment being considered.
"( 1 ) His general knowledge of everyday altairs and lanprenings will be them into eonsideration, as indicating moi only habits of ohservation hut of interest in those things which ilire elly a in directly alliect business.
" (c) His ability to hroaden out intellectually, shown not only hy the stealy improvemant in his working methods hut also by the inereasing fund of information regambeg general atreit's which he ilisplays, ne wedl as the ineresingr seope wf his judgment and general powers.
"IT. Persomal habits and chanacteristios will he con-
sidered. Moral character, common sense, self-reliance, incisiveness, politeness, are all aids to success.
"Oyer a year ago the bank was obliged to inacrease the number of the departments, and the guestion was who of the younger celerks to promote to be managers and assistant managere of those departments. In this age of civil service examinations it was a matural suggestion to submit all candidates for promotion a set ol simple questions on lanking and finanee. Atter consideration the officers reyuested the nssisimm ershier to prepare a series of suitable questions.
"Of course, the rualities outlined in the abover bulletin, as well as the ability to pass the written examination, were considered in making promotions, but on the whole the written exmmination proved to be a valuable index of what the young men wore capilble of, and the offect of the system upon the young men thenselves was remarkable. They had some incentive to study. TVe have, therefore, decided to make it a frepuent competition. The questions will vary, and it is possible that hereafter they will be divided into two sets, one tor the more experienced and one for junior clevks."

There is lititle novelly im the above statement. "Ifitness fer the position" has ever been the usual basis of promotion in banks. Tn old country banks old mon who have been a life-time in the office are found serving under manalgers young enough to be childien of their superiors cin the staff. "Goneral ability," also is a very ancient reason for promotion, so also are gooil work, knowledge of affiairs, and interest shan in the business good grounds for advancenent. "Moral character, common sense, selfreliance, politeness," as aids to success have been recognised for centuries. In all those points the Senboard Brank is simply doing what has leen dione ever sinee commerce began.

Examinations are a novelty. 'Ihey may be "a valuwhle index of a young man's capabilitics." Thut the question is, of what "capabilitics" are the cxaminations a fost? The effort to find ont ly a written examination Whether a clerk will prove sluewd in lending moneyr and in handing customers and their aflairs is an absurd task. Plenty of young men would take honours in an cxamination who would prove lamentably deficient in the qualities necessary for a suceessful carcer as a bank manager. An Euglish private banker, who established a banking business early in this century, which is flomishing to-day, had no education beyond a moderate knowledge of "the three R's." The leading naink in a neigh-

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bouring town fell under the management of a brilliant young man who was an honour graduate of Cambridge. In the panic of 1866 that bank failed most disastrously to all interested; yel he would have passed with trimuph any such examinations as have been established to test the capabilities of a bank officer. While, then, we regard it as exceedingly useful to young bank clerks to acquire a thorough knowleige of the historys the principles, the practice, the laws of banking, such knowhedge withont specinl, aatural qualifications for the business will not ensure success, in the sphere of management.

## MR. FAYS RETTRES FROM GRAND TRUNK.

Mr. C. M. Hays, after five years sarvice as General Mameger of the Grand Trumk Railway, will retire on 1st Jamary hext, to take a similar position with the Southern Pacific Railway, in sucecssion to the late Mr. Thutingden. PTis oflicial title will he "President," it being a general' custom in the States in loanks, railways and other large institutions for the acting General Manager to be the President of the Company. Mr. Hiys' tenure of office with the Grand Trunk has been marked by a thorough overhauling of its entire service, and by numerous changes in the staft and methods of woiking the line. A widespread impression has prevailed that he was bent upon placing the Grand Trunk as far as possible in the hands of American officials, with seant respect to the
clams of long and efficient service, or the arrangements of his predecessors. Such an impression, whether justified or not, was very disturbing to the slaff some of whom have been long kept on the tenter hooks of tear lest they be sacrificed to make room for an American. In his new pesition Mr. Hays will have a free hand, and not be the olyject of this widespread suspicion, which appears to have been somewhint exaggerated. Te introduced on the Grand Trunk the rules adopded by the American' Railroad Association for the ruming of trains. By these rules uniformity of signals, ice, are established over the entire system of ruilways in the States, which is of very great adrantage there and has worked well on this side. He has done excellent work in bringing about the incorporation of the Central Vermonit with the Grand Trunk system. Ilhe bratic arrangements, he made with the Canadian Pacific on the line from Thoronto to Hamilton, was also an execllent move. Travellers anx shippers of freight have reason to recognise how greatly the traffic management has jmproved under Mr. Fays, and those directly interested in the financial condition and carnings of the Grand Trunk Railway are well satisfied with the improvements effected in their property by Mr. Ways.

Tn $188^{\prime 3}$ the total sales were 811,700 tons, and in $18{ }^{3} 8$ Hey were only $6,93,571$, in that periud there was not merely no devolnpment but an actaal falling off in sales to extent of 118,189 tons. In 1880 the cra of development set in with sales of 954,659 tons, and since then the inerense has risen to over 100 per cent., and the sales are now over three times what they sank down to in $18 \% 8$ and 1879. As a fiscal policy was adopted in 1879 which was avowerly desigued to hring aloont the result which has taken phace, it seems to be a fair conclusion, that the policy was suceessful, and is therefore entitiod to the credit of the development which followed its andoption.

## THTE TATE STMS REETES.

The death of the great vocalist, Sims Reeres, although he wis woll strieken in years, has eaused unfeigned sorrow, not in musieal eireles only. but, amongst the millions who have been thrilled and fascinated hy his marvellons voice, the like of which theme is un record or memory. Bralnam and Ineledon, had all the swretness and much of the dramatic expression of Sims Recres. but there was in their roices a laek of the infensely sympathetic tones which arnused andieness somedimes in the verge of hysteria. When the deecased gave out the reciative phrase "Total eclipse" in the Orathrio of "Samson." wo have seen the main portion of a vast andience suddeuly thrown into tears. Then, when bidding defiance to his tormentor in the Oratorio, his trimpetrike tones roused his auditors to a tumult of applanse whicle was dificult in quell. The same marvellous contrast of powers was shnw in the Messiah. Tis rentition of "Comfort yo," was the perfection of manly tencerness and the ficy hurst of passion in "He shall dash them to pieces like a poiter's vessel," was voleanic in its vivid rush of splendid fomes. Sims Reewes estahlished an Omatorio style. Which cery temor of his day imitated, and every future tenor will show judgment by talsing as a model for rendering the sacred musie of Wandel, Mendelssolin. Bach, and other great enmposers. We was the "lright particular star" of many Dirmingham Festivals. Fe was always averse to enenres. Tie was really fatigued after singing a rlificult solo, and naturally feared to ingure his magnificent voice by weariness, One erening at. a. Pirmingham Eestiwal he had sung a duct with Nillson, which elicited a storm of "eneore" eries. She was willing to respond, but Reeves moved to. the steps leading from the phatform. Secing his olstinacy the fair Swede seized Reeves by his eoat eollar and literally compelled him to return. A shout of langhter
preeted them in which they joined, and it was some minutes br fore those great artists gained sufficient composure to repeat the duet. Jenny Tind's enthusiastic applause on this occasion was much enjoyed by those in sight of the "Swedish nightingale." Being engaged to sing at Wolverhampton he went to see the room in which the concert was to be held. Standing on the platform his eye caught sight of several skylights in the ceilings. Knitting his dark brows he let ont some ejaculatory, sulphurous denunciations of those skylights which were almost hot enough to melt the glass. Me swore he wnould uot sing in such "a hole," as he termed it, but was at list persuader to do so, vowing that his voice would never again be heard there. The usual fee piod Sims Reces for an ordinary coneert was sixty guineas. He was quite anxions to sacrifice that sum rather than sing in a hall whose acoustic properties were so fanlty. His voenl organ, strange to say, was very tender. It was capahle, howerer, of amitting a marvollous volume of sound. We linve often hearif him throw nut "A" above the staff as bright and clear as a bell, which rang with such force through a vast auditorium that the effect on the audience was akin to an electric shock. We once saw this ling of vocalists brealk down, but he did so in noble company. The President of a Birmingham Testival, Earl Benuchamp, had written a trio for the oceasion. In their over-confidence Madame Clara Novello and Messrs. Reeves and Weiss undertook to execute this trifle without, rehearsal. Signor Ranतegger was at the piano. They had not gone far before signs were apparent of "wobbling," which finally resulted in an utter Jrenkiown. "Try again," said the pianist and the second effort was a suecess. The incident should teach amaffure. and some professionals, to be less proumptuons in neglecting to stinty compositions they propose to render. The poverty of Sims Reeves in his better chass has been a mustery to hhose who knew what fortmes he earned. We holicre lis misfortumes arose from becoming involved in a hank that failer. in which his savings were invested. Though sombre in aspect and generally thought to be bad temperect, owing to his तeterminerl refissil to rospond to encores, Sims Reeves was really bright, geninl, whole souled, and tender hearted. Fis voien was hardly so honied as Mario's. nor as robust, as Tamberlik's hut, in oratorio he walked and shone on the highest artistic plane, where he had no tival, but an imitator in every English tenor, even to this day. In Balrewell churehyard, Derhyshire, there are lines on a singer's tomb, bidling him rest in peace until,
"Angels wake thee with a note like thine." There will be millions in Fingland ready to echo this pints enlogy arer the grave of their most beloved musician.

## TORSE RACE FRAUDS.

Theplish sporting papors have been recently fenouncing 1he American jockeys, touts and hangers-on who have appearerl on Thitish race tracks. The jockers from the States haw introiluced a new style of riding on racehorses. They sit: almost on the neck of a racer and are deseribed as looking like monkeys. This would he mobjectionable, as Finglish jockeys could follow suit. But American jockeys and

their associated crooks, says the Detroit News, on the anthority of English sporting papers, have introduced cocaine, electric batteries, and other agencies to allect the racehorses. Races have been thus "fixed," and their backers have been mercilessly fleed by these seoundrels from the States. Our contemporary says: "Americaus at home can sympathize heartily with this indignation. They realized some time ago that speculating on horse. races is, like legislation in Michigan, 'in robber's game.' The horses have become lay figures and mere subteriuges. The real game is phayed over a wire running between the bookmakers' stand and the stables. The exeitable and occasionally bewildered yrugs of sports who bet their money pay the purses and other expenses of raciug, besides giving the fellows on the inside a good profit." What has been called "the sport of kings," hus ever been under suspicion, it is now declared by the best sporting papers in England to be the sport of rogues, and mothing more than a couspiracy to rob those outside the ring of sharpers who organize and manage races. "Same here," can be truthfully said in Canada.

## QUEBEC'S TIRE PROTECIION.

A deputation of fire insurance underwriters recently interviewed the Mayor and Council of Quebec respecting the defective fire protection of that city. The deputation was received with anything but welcome. As the facts were disclosed the Mayor became luss hostile and an agreement was arrived at that the situation should be investigated by an engineer, who will report upon the water supply of the city, its avalability in case of fire, and the equipment and efliciency of the fire brigade. If this leads to the fire protection of Quebee being improved the insurance rates will be modilied proportionately.

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-A greater naval increase programme than has ever been contemplated on this side of the Atlantic is now under considumation by the Rear Adminalss hoard of Construction, says a Washington, U.S.. letter, and if approved of by the liresident, it is to be urged upon Congress at the coming session. The project involves the construction of not, less than forty warships, ranging in formidability and size from armored uruisers and brittleships of about 15, (0) tons displacement, to gunboats of me-thirtieth that size, and including various special types not hitherto built. The programme will include no less than six ships "of the henviest armor and most destructive ordnance, with 1he highest practical speed and the greatest-atainable madius of ation "uon a displacement of about 10,000 lons," combining the most desirable fentures of line of battleships and eruisers. 'Whese vessels must be equal in oftensive and defensive qualities to any proposed or designed abroad, and be
able to keep at sea for a longer period. than any warship now afoat. At least twenty gunboats are proposed of sevaral types, all of light draught, with large rapid-fite batteries and accommodations to give comfort to ollicers and erew stationed in the tropics. All of these will be able to get out to Manilla, and thence if necessary to Chinese interior ports under their own steam. Jrovision is made for an increase in the torpedo flotilla by ten new vessels, including a new type of torpedo cruiseron the lines of existing torpedo hoat destroyers, but of greater displacement, speed and armament, with a notable development of long-distanee eruising powers, in order that they may accompany a flect of battleships across the oceam. Several of the other new ressels are to be submarine, if success attends the improved Wolland hoats, now under contract, and to be filished next summer the new submarines will have greater coal capaeity, giving them $a$ much wider offen-
sive radius. The programme will also inelude three armed colliers, larger than any vessels of the same class ever built for a Govermment, and specially designed for service from a fuel base, although in times of peace they will be constantly employed in carrying coal from the Atlantic coast to the island possessions in the Pacific. They are to have enormons capacity, enabling each of them to deliver 10,000 tons of conl to Manilla, Guam, or Pango Pango in less time than is now possible to make the royage with half that amount, 5,000 tons being the capacity of the largest colliers purchased for the war with Spain. Another large ship, unarmed, which is recommended, is in floating machine shop of about $6,-$ $(100$ tons displacement, to cost about \$1,000,000, for duty in repairing maval wssels at great distances from Government yards, especially the lhilippines, where she would cruise to the various ports where gumboats and other vessels required her services.
