THE IRISH ENVOYS.

Sir John Macdonald and Sir John Thompson on Their Position if they Visit Canada.

A representative of United Canada has had an interview with the Premier and the Minister of Justice as to the possibility of the arrest of Messrs. O'Brien and Dillon should they visit Canada. Sir John Macdonald said:

"You see, Mr. Grass, the Dominion Government has really got no power in this matter. Mr. Dillon and Mr. O'Brien are both British subjects and members of the British Parliament and have every right to speak in this country. In fact, if they were citizens of any other country at peace with England, they would have the same right."

"You are doubtless aware that the friends of Ireland, and particularly the Irish people in this country would be anxious to know your opinions as to the safety of Sir John Macdonald and Sir John Thompson should they visit this country?"

Sir John—"I have really no opinion to give, but I think, it is in the highest degree improbable that any effort will be made by the Home Government to molest these gentlemen should they come to this country."

"Has the Dominion Government received any intimation from the Imperial Government regarding the re-arrest of Messrs. Dillon and O'Brien, should they visit this country?"

Sir John—"No, we have received no information whatever as to what the Imperial Government proposes doing in the matter." The Attorney General of the province will have everything to do if any movement is made by the Home Government.

Sir John said he read all about their departure for France.

WHAT SIR JOHN THOMPSON SAYS.

Sir John Thompson, Canadian Minister of Justice, was seen by United Canada also, and in answer to the question, said he had not examined the statutes with regard to Mr. Dillon's and Mr. O'Brien's case at all, and he had, therefore, no opinion to express. He said that he did not think that he would give his opinion even if he had examined the law. He thought others could interpret the law for themselves in such cases.

THE MCKINLEY BILL.

A View of Its Effects as Recorded in a Liberal Journal.

It is our opinion that, taking one thing with another, the effect of the McKinley bill in Canada could be entirely counteracted by a proper display of surprise on the part of our people. We are certain it would not be hard to convince farmers from their own experience that where farms are largely cropped with barley, nothing else in the line of cereals will grow. No farmer need be reminded that land soon refused to grow wheat after the rage for growing barley struck Canada, and yet it is unbelievable that wheat will not grow on the fertile soil of South Ontario under fair conditions. How is it that no stock farm is ever overrun with wild mustard and fish, and will always grow wheat? The fertile fields of South Ontario have simply been bartered to death and the soil is bleached and fit only with weeds and thistles. Barley did it all. The only scheme tenanted in this vicinity have tried, to enable them to pay rent, has been this land-killing expedient of growing barley, and their manures have ruined their lands.

The price of horses will probably go down for a time under the McKinley bill, but it will be made up for ten times over by the in-

crease in the prices of cows, sheep, swine and poultry. In fact this is the case already. At auction sales in this locality these latter animals are selling from 40 to 50 per cent. ahead of any former year; and well they may, for as long as barley was grown the value of these things was not appreciated. Very few thought it worth while to make butter, an industry which promises to be the greatest in Canada in a few years. So much is this profitable idea neglected that a woman who is a recognized butter-maker felt safe in demanding 25¢ per lb. for her butter on the streets of Whitby last Saturday. It is an undisputed fact, and a very natural fact, that the better one understands butter-making the more can be produced from a given quantity of milk, while a farmer who could not do better than to sell his milk could not have more butter to sell than her neighbors, and at the same time command from 5 to 75 per cent. an advance on their prices. A resident of the town of Gravelly heard stating to a town grocer on Friday last that out of "the few" who he wintered last year his family had eaten eggs and chickens until the pin feathers were beginning to bud on them, and it had all sold a surplus of \$21. As to swine we have already published the experience of several farmers near here, each showing large returns.—[Whitby Chronicle.]

LONDON, November 6.—Mr. Jackson, of the Treasury department, has returned to London after arranging with Irish contractors for the construction of railways in the west of Ireland. Work is to be begun immediately.

Gladstone Prophecy.

LONDON, November 6.—Speaking at Carlsruhe to-day Mr. Gladstone said that if the clause contained in the Licensing bill submitted to the House of Commons last spring by the Government had become law it would have cost the country \$200,000,000 to purchase forfeited licenses from publicans. Parliament, he said, is now wearing out its life. The Government is avoiding dissolution as a man with a bad tooth avoided dentistry. The recent bye-laws for members of the House of Commons had set the seal of doom upon a long-endured iniquity, and pointed to the beginning of an era of peace.

Trade With the West Indies.

Senator Boyd, of St. John, N.B., writing to Mr. George Johnson, communicates the gratifying information that Mr. Black, of Pictou and Black, Halifax, goes to the West Indies this month with Captain Cauldwell, who has been in the West Indies trade for thirty years. They will interview the merchants and others to see what kind of steamers will be best for passengers and freight and draught of water, etc. From St. Thomas they proceed to England to contract for the right kind of steamers, and Senator Boyd says these men are up to their work, and have capital as well as experience and brains.

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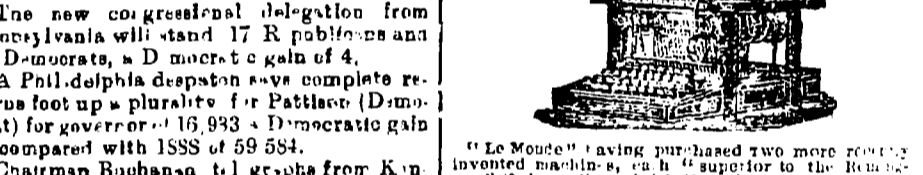

THE U. S. CENSUS.

A Great Falling Off in the Ratio.

An Exhibit of the States in Groups—The Relative Position of States and Territories—The Natives Disappointed.

WASHINGTON, November 5.—The latest census bulletin gives the population of the United States on June 1, 1890, as shown by the count of persons and families, exclusive of white persons in Indian territory, Indians on reservations and Alaska as 64,450,540.

In 1850 the population was 23,191,876. The absolute increase of the population in 40 years was, therefore, 23,258,664, and the percentage of increase 24.7. In 1870 the population was 38,558,371. According to these figures the absolute increase in the decade between 1870 and 1880 was 11,597,412, and the percentage of increase was 30.1. These figures show that the population was increased between 1880 and 1890 only 727,225 more than between 1870 and 1880, while the rate of increase has apparently diminished from 30.1 to 24.7 per cent.

These figures are, however, explained by the fact that the census of 1870 was grossly deficient in the Southern States, so much so as not only give an exaggerated rate of increase of the population between 1870 and 1880 in these States, but to affect very materially the rate of increase in the country at large.
