At Rome.

The Pope's Jubilee was celebrated at Rome last Sunday with intense enthusiasm. At 4 o'clock in the morning the people began to gather before the gates of St. Peter's, five hours before the time set for Mass. Thirty thousand pilgrims and about an equal number of the citizens got admission. The great church was crowded to the steps. The mighty congregation broke out into exclamations of joy as the Pope, pale, but smiling and seemingly in very good health entered at 9.40. The Pontiff celebrated himself: his voice was "clear and penetrating."

In the evening St. Peter's, all the churches and religious houses, and a vast number of private residences were illuminated. Over 40,000 persons were unable to gain admission to the jubilee Mass. During the week the Holy Father had been overwhelmed with the congratulations and solid tokens of appreciation from the different nations. The French Ambassador presented a letter from President Carnot and a valuable present. A despatch dated February 22 says the jubilee presents amount to \$7,000,000 francs, [about \$1,100,000]. Of this \$30,-000 was from Mexico and \$50,000 from South America.

"At the request of the local authorities the Bon Secours Nuns, whose Motherhouse is in Paris, were entrusted with the care of the worst cholera patients in the district. Since September the good Sisters followed the dread epidemic everywhere, from house to house, from village to village, from Portel to S. Etienne, and to Etaples, gaining the hearts and affection of the suffering people, who looked upon them as so many guardian angels.

"More than three hundred infected patients were nursed and tendered by the Sisters, to whose care and attention fully two hundred owe their lives.

For three long months, without rest or change, the Sisters lived in a most pestilential atmosphere in immediate contact with the worst forms of the disease, sometimes finding shelter in a hotel, sometimes an improvised lodging in the public buildings, away from their quiet convent home, alone under God's protecting hand.

They have a special grace, it may be said, to fit them for such hardships or perhaps they are proof against disease; habit which accustoms them to everything may have prepared them for

"At Portel we spoke to one of the Sisters, and on referring to her courage she seemed surprised, and quietly answered us that there was nothing wonderful in what she was doing. 

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
