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

The The Mother] Superior, Sister St. Jean Baptiste, states that the insurance will not cover a tenth of the loss and it is given as about \$100,000.

How Queen Victoria Looks.



DIVORCE IN FRANCE.

After twelve years experience of a law of divorce, France abolished it in the year 1816; but in 1884 it was re-established. Since that date the number of divorce cases has increased from year to year. During the space of five years the Courts have decreed close on thirty thousand dissolutions of marriage. 




