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

The Hon. Mr. Secretary George acquainted the House that he had a Message from His Message fom Gov. The Lieutenant-Governor being prevented, by a severe indisposition, from opening the present Session, in Person, this day, it is His Excellency's pleasure that this House do adjourn itself to Monday next.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod.

Mr. Speaker,

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor commands this Honorable House to attend His ingattendance of Excellency immediately in the Council Chamber, Accordingly, House on Gov.

Mr. Speaker reported that the House had attended His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor in the Council Chamber, where His Excellency had been pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of the Provincial Parliament, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, for greater accuracy, obtained a copy, which he read to the House as followeth:

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

THE Loyalty for which Nova-Scotia has always been conspicuous, was never more cor-Governor's Speech dially expressed than in your joint Address congratulating Her Majesty on Her Accession to the Throne; nor more pleasingly exhibited than in the rejoicings which took place in all parts of the Province on the occasion of Her Coronation. Such being the general feeling towards our beloved Sovereign, I could not open the present Session in a more acceptable manner than by acquainting you "that Her Majesty received, with gratitude and satisfac-"tion, the assurances of your devoted attachment to Her Person and Government; and "that, in promoting the interests of Her faithful Subjects in this Colony, the Queen will "discharge one of the most grateful duties of the station to which it has pleased Divine "Providence to call her."

I am happy to be able to congratulate you on the continued prosperity of the Province. At the present moment we have ample cause to be thankful to the Almighty for an abundant Harvest—a successful Fishery—an improving Commerce and Revenue, and for uninterrupted tranquillity.

In the full enjoyment of this last and great blessing, we cannot but deeply lament that our loyal Brethren in the Canadas are not equally favored; and I am assured that, while admiring the noble stand which they have successfully made against the late nefarious attempts to sever their connexion with the Parent Kingdom, you will sincerely feel for the sufferings of the Families of those brave Men who have fallen while defending the authority of their Sovereign and their own dearest rights.

You cannot have failed to observe, with high satisfaction, that every act of Her Majesty's Government relating to these Colonies, has clearly indicated Her firm resolve to withstand all attempts to destroy or weaken Her supremacy over them.

It affords me gratification to state that it is contemplated to substitute Steam Packets for the sailing Vessels now employed in the conveyance of the Mails between Great Britain and Halifax.

To secure the attainment of all the advantages anticipated from this arrangement, the cooperation of the Legislatures of the several Colonies to be benefitted by it is essential; and I obey Her Majesty's commands in submitting the matter to your consideration, and inviting you to assist in improving the Mail Routes, and to afford such other facilities as may depend on you, with a view to increased expedition in the communication between this place, New Brunswick and Quebec.

Her Majesty trusts that this measure, involving as it does considerable additional expenditure by the Mother Country, will prove beneficial to the Public, and give satisfaction to the Colonies.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I have ordered the Accounts for last year, and the Estimates for the present year, to be laid before you, and I have the fullest reliance on your readiness to make due provision for the several branches of the public service.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

Your Address, complaining of the habitual violation by American Citizens of the Treaty subsisting

subsisting between Great Britain and the United States, on the subject of the Fisheries, has engaged the serious attention of Her Majesty's Government; and you will be happy to learn, that it has been determined, for the future, to station an armed force on the Coasts of Nova-Scotia, to enforce a more strict observance of the provisions of the Treaty by the Americans; and that Her Majesty's Minister at Washington has been instructed to invite the friendly co-operation of the Government of the United States for that purpose.

The most attentive consideration has also been given to your several other Addresses in the last Session, and it will be my duty to lay before you the replies which Her Majesty has

been graciously pleased to return to them.

As many of the Members who come from a distance must be inconvenienced by being detained long in Halifax, I rely on your continued assiduity in the discharge of your respective duties; and you may be assured of my ready concurrence in all measures which may appear conducive to the real advantage and welfare of this happy Province.

THE HUMBLE ADDRESS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES IN GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

May it please your Excellency-

WE, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Representatives of Her Majesty's loyal People of Nova-Scotia, thank your Excellency for the Speech with which you were Address pleased to open the present Session. It affords us much pleasure to learn that our beloved Sovereign "has received with gratitude and satisfaction the assurances of devoted attachment to Her Person and Government, felt by the People of Nova-Scotia," and conveyed by their Representatives to the foot of the Throne; and we rejoice in the expressed determination of Her Majesty to promote the interests of Her faithful Subjects in the Colony.

Of the continued prosperity of the Province, as evidenced in its Harvests, Fisheries and improving Commerce, we have been well reminded by your Excellency, and that peace and tranquillity have accompanied these Blessings, calls for our warmest gratitude to the

Giver of all Good.

The predatory incursions made upon our Sister Colonies, from the Territories of a kindred Nation, at peace with the Parent State, have been witnessed by the People of Nova-Scotia with pain and indignation. While they admire the bravery with which the invaders have been repelled, and feel for the Families of those brave Men who have fallen in defence of their dearest rights, they rejoice in the policy clearly indicated by Her Majesty's Government to maintain the integrity of the Empire. This Assembly feel convinced that no single measure will more surely contribute to the success of that policy than the substitution of Steam Packets for the Sailing Vessels now employed in the carrying of the Mails between Great Britain and Halifax; and your Excellency may be assured that, to that important subject, and to the improvement of the Mail Routes from hence to Quebec, our best attention will be devoted, with every disposition to second the views of Her Majesty's Government.

We thank your Excellency for directing the Public Accounts to be laid before us, and

will vote with cheerfulness all necessary supplies.

The serious consideration afforded by Her Majesty's Government to the Address complaining of the habitual violation by American Citizens of the Treaty subsisting between Great Britain and the United States, affords us extreme satisfaction: we are happy that an armed force is to be stationed on the Coasts of Nova-Scotia to enforce a more strict observance of that Treaty, and hope that the invitation to be given by Her Majesty's Minister at Washington will be followed by the co-operation of the Government of the United States.

We feel grateful to Her Majesty for the attentive consideration given to the several other Addresses transmitted through your Excellency during the last Session; and your Excellency may be assured of our disposition to dispatch the Public Business with as much promptitude as may be compatible with the interests of the Province, and the faithful dis-

charge of the duties entrusted to our care.

The Lieutenant Governor transmits to the House of Assembly the Copy of a Des- No. 179, 27th Sept. patch from the Right Honorable Lord Glenelg, conveying Her Majesty's reply to their Ad- 1838 dress relating to the composition of the Legislative and Executive Councils, the Civil List, and other subjects.

The Queen withdraws, for the present, Her offer to surrender to the Legislature the Revenues under Her control in this Province; but at the same time, declares that whenever the Legislature shall pass a Bill granting to Her Majesty the sum of £4,700 Sterling per annum, during the continuance of Her Majesty's reign, or for a period not less than ten years, applicable to the Salaries of the Principal Officers of the Government, Her Majesty will be ready, in exchange for that sum, to surrender to the Legislature, the Revenue at present at Her Majesty's disposal, subject only to some inconsiderable temporary deductions. It must be clearly understood, however, that, in the event of the passing of such a Bill, the Revenues now at Her Majesty's disposal will revert to the Crown at the expiration of that Bill.

The Assembly are further informed that this sum of £4,700 will not enable Her Majesty to continue to pay to the Surveyors-General of Nova-Scotia proper, and Cape-Breton-the Clerk of the Crown and Harbour Master at Sydney, the Salaries which they have hitherto received from the Crown Revenues; and the Lieutenant-Governor therefore recommends (supposing the Bill to pass) that the House of Assembly will grant to those Officers their accustomed remuneration, for which it will then rest with the House of Assembly to make

annual provision.

The accompanying Despatch from Lord Glenelg will explain to the House of Assembly No. 182, 1st Octr. that the net proceeds only of the Sales of Crown Lands will be made over to the disposal of 1838

the Legislature.

The Chief Justice and Judges of the Supreme Court having consented to accept Her Majesty's offer (which the Lieutenant-Governor was recently authorized to renew to them) of increased Salaries in lieu of Fees; and Her Majesty, in that case, having directed that the new arrangement for their remuneration should commence with the year; the Lieutenant-Governor acquaints the House, that he deemed expedient, by the advice of the Executive Council, to give previous directions for discontinuing the collection of those Fees on the 1st of the present Month, in order that the Suitors in the Supreme Court (which was to meet on that day at Halifax) might have the immediate benefit of the measure.



Mr. Bell, pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill for the appointment of a President of Bill presented to re- the Court of Sessions for the County of Halifax, and for the better regulation of the Police of the Town of Halifax, and for other purposes, in relation to the Municipal affairs of said County and Town, and the same was read a first time, and ordered to be read a second time.

The House resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

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Mr. Kavanagh took the Chair of the Committee,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee, that they had considered the business referred to them, and had come to nine Resolutions thereupon, which they had directed him to report to the House, and he delivered the same in at the Clerk's Table, where they were read, and are as follow:-

1. Resolved, That the Despatches of the Right Honorable the Secretary of the Colonies, dated the 20th April, 28th June, 6th July, and 31st October, 1837, were hailed by the House of Assembly of Nova-Scotia with the liveliest satisfaction, as recognizing and enforcing, by the authority authority of the Home Government, most of the great principles which the House had asserted in their Address of 1837, and still adhere to.

- 2. Resolved, That the House were more especially gratified, by the cordial and frank admission of the claim of the Assembly, to control and appropriate the whole of the Public Revenue arising in the Province, including the Casual and Territorial Revenue, the Fees of Office, the Proceeds of Land, the Royalty paid upon the Produce of Mines, and the amount of the old Crown Duties.
- 3. Resolved, That the House have always recognized the propriety and the necessity, on constitutional grounds, of assigning an adequate and permanent provision for the Chief Executive and Judicial Officers of the Province; and the House received, as a gratifying proof of Her Majesty's confidence in the Assembly, the directions given to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, to arrange the precise amount and terms of the proposed Civil List with the House, and the express declaration, that the House were at liberty to exercise a sound judgment upon the amount of the Salaries, and that the sums specified in the Despatch of 31st October, 1337, were not to be insisted on, if smaller Salaries were, in their opinion, sufficient for the proper maintenance of such Officers.
- 4. Resolved, That the House having accordingly proceeded in the last Session to consider the amount of Salaries, which, in their judgment, ought to be granted, for the support of these Officers, according to their station in Society, and the circumstances of the Colony; and having communicated the result of their deliberations in their Address to Her Majesty, have received, with astonishment and concern, the Despatch of the 27th September last, in which the Colonial Secretary has assumed an entirely new position; and withdrawing the consideration of the Salaries from the House of Assembly, to whom it most properly belongs, has directed the Lieutenant-Governor, to insist on the sum of £4,700 Sterling, which, added to the sum of £3,440 Sterling, already secured by permanent Acts of this Legislature, exceeds the largest amount demanded last year, and would enable the Government to allow to these Officers a Scale of Salaries disproportioned to the means of the country, and to the duties to be performed,—and which the people of this Province, and their Representatives, would condemn as an extravagant waste of the Public Funds, contrary to their declared wishes, and to the real interest of the Government, as well as of the People.
- 5. Resolved, That the House have also remarked with astonishment and regret, the terms of the same Despatch, dismissing their complaints of the composition of the two Councils. In requesting a reconstruction of the Upper Branch of the Legislature, and of the Executive Council, the House sought not merely a change of men, but of principles,—they were anxious that the patronage and favor of the Government should be equally diffused among all classes—that the Representatives of the People should not be thwarted by the opposition of the Upper Branch, in their endeavours to introduce rational reforms, and to enforce a wise economy, and that the temper and spirit of the local Administration should be in accordance with the opinions and wishes of the great majority of the People.
- 6. Resolved, That this Committee are dissatisfied with the composition of the two Councils, for the reasons set forth in the Address of last year, and which the subsequent changes in these bodies, and the experience of their practical operation, as now constituted, have strengthened; and this Committee, as respects the Legislative Council, and the spirit by which it is animated, as compared with the Representatives of the People, needs only to refer to the Resolutions and Address on the subject of the Civil List, which were adopted by the Council in the last Session, and entered on their Journals.
- 7. Resolved, That a change in the composition of both Councils is, in the judgment of this Committee, indispensable to the public weal—and that many individuals are to be found in this Province, whose independent principles and station in society well qualify them for occupying a seat at either Board.
- 8. Resolved, That this Committee deeply regret that Her Majesty has been advised to direct the disallowance of certain Acts of the Assembly, which they had passed after the fullest consideration and enquiry into all the circumstances of the case. The act for regulating the Internal Postage would have saved to the Province upwards of £1,000 a year, and left to

the Government the unrestrained and necessary control over that important branch of the public service. The Act for limiting the jurisdiction of the Admiralty Court was regarded by the Commercial and Shipping interests as a beneficial change in the Law—and having been in use for nearly two years, and found to operate without injury to Seamen, the Committee would deeply regret were its main object defeated by a representation in which they cannot concur, -while the Acts for Incorporating Insurance Companies, and for allowing certain Bounties, though they may be in some respects opposed to the policy which the Government act on in the Mother Country, appear to this Committee well adapted to the local circumstances of the Province, and to the advancement of its Trade and Manufactures.

9. Resolved, That this Committee have the fullest confidence in the sincere and generous disposition of Her Majesty, to satisfy the reasonable expectations of Her Faithful and Loyal Commons in this Province; and they attribute the disappointment they have experienced this Session, not to any abandonment of the wise and constitutional principles announced in the Despatches of 1837, but to a want of correct information, derived from the proper sources, on the part of Her Majesty's Ministers.

The first Resolution being read a second time, was agreed to by the House.

Resolved, That the Salaries which are assigned by permanent Acts, or by the accustomed annual votes to the Public Officers, paid from the Provincial Funds, are adequate for the independant and respectable maintenance of such Officers; and as the House of Assembly would not be disposed to increase the same, this Committee conceive it unjust and improper that other Officers of corresponding rank, and discharging duties not more laborious, or of higher responsibility, should be remunerated by larger Salaries—thus creating an invidious and unwise distinction between the Public Officers, paid by the Crown, and by the Provincial Legislature.

5. Resolved, That this Committee entertains the same opinion of the amount and permanency of the Salaries of the Principal Officers of the Government, as was expressed in tha Bill passed last year, to settle the Civil List of Nova-Scotia, and to commute the Casu-

al and Territorial Revenue.

- 6. Resolved, That the Salaries enjoyed by the principal Officers of the Customs at Halifax are extravagantly high, and that, in the opinion of the House, the expense of the Custom House Establishment in this Province might, and ought to be, reduced, by an equitable and speedy arrangement to a scale suited to the circumstances of the Colony, and even below what was contemplated by the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council for Trade in 1834.
- 7 Resolved, That the Imperial, Colonial, and Light-House Duties, might be effectually and easily collected by one set of Officers at Halifax, and in the outports, with great convenience and facility to the Merchants, and without imposing any unreasonable or onerous Duties on such Officers.
- 8 Resolved, That the sum of £7,144 18s. 9 assigned by the Legislature in 1829, for the support of the Custom-House Establishment, is amply sufficient, if judiciously and fairly distributed, for the maintenance of all the Officers, who would be required for many years, for the protection of the Trade, and the collection of all the Revenues in this Province.

9. Resolved, That the Committee having observed the rise in the value of Property, and the beneficial

beneficial effects on the industry, habits, and condition of the people, which have been produced in the Free Ports of this Province, adhere to the opinions expressed in the Address of the House of Assembly, to the Throne, in 1838, and earnestly hope, that Her. Majesty's Government will permit every port where a Custom-House Officer is, or hereafter may be stationed, to enjoy the privileges of a Free Port.

10. Resolved, That in the selection of Officers to fill up vacancies in the Department of the Customs, the Committee earnestly hope that the prayer of the Address to His late Majes-

ty, from the House of Assembly, in 1836, will not be overlooked by Her Majesty.

11. Resolved, That the evils complained of in the Addresses to the Throne, adopted by the Provincial Legislature, in 1837 and 1838, against the oppressive and illegal encroachments of American Citizens upon our Fisheries, remain in full force, and during the last season, were rather aggravated than diminished—that no adequate protection will be afforded by the presence of one small Vessel, on the coast of Nova-Scotia, and another at Prince Edward Island; and the Committee are perfectly satisfied, that such encroachments can only be checked by several Armed Vessels, of moderate size, cruising on the coasts of these Colonies, or otherwise by the aid of two or more small Steam-Boats, to be employed in that service, and for which the Legislature would cheerfully provide, adequate depots of fuel, at the Provincial expense.

12. Resolved, That the system on which the disposal of the Crown Lands, has been conducted of late years, is most injurious in its effects, on the growth and population of the Country, and is much more objectionable than the old system of Grants, on the payment of moderate Fees: But the Committee are satisfied, that a plan far preferable to either the old or the new system, may be easily devised, and earnestly hope, that Her Majesty's Government will sanction the passing of such a Bill as was adopted by the House of Assembly,

during the last Session of the Assembly.

13. Resolved, That this Committee are exceedingly desirous that the invidious and useless distinction between the form of the State Oaths required from Protestants and Roman Catholics in this Province, should be abolished; and that Her Majesty's Government, by an Imperial Act, or by the allowance of a Provincial Act, would sanction the abolition of such Oaths, and the substitution in their room of the Oath of Allegiance only, or otherwise of the Oath that was set out in the Bill, which the Legislative Council and House of Assembly concurred in during the last Session; that part of the Oath which is now required, and is offensive to Protestants in this Province, being not enjoined by the Imperial Statute, 6, Geo. 3, chap. 53, referred to in the Despatch of 19th June, 1833.

14. Resolved, That this Committee are anxious that the Act (No. 1800) for limiting the jurisdiction of the Admiralty Court, as to the recovery of Seamen's wages, should be confirmed by Her Majesty in Council, and that similar provisions should be extended to the Seamen of Vessels not registered in, or belonging to this Province, but coming within the same.

15. Resolved, That the Bill submitted to the Provincial Legislature in 1834, for the management and regulation of the Post-Office, was found to be too intricate and complex in its details, and in many particulars unsuited to our local condition—that the Assembly did not design or attempt by the Act of last Session, to obtain the control and management of the Post Communications with the interior or the power of interdicting the same; and as no general plan for regulating the Post-Office in these Provinces, has been suggested or put into operation, the Committee earnestly trust that Her Majesty will either confirm the Act of last Session or authorize the Legislature to pass another Act in perpetuity, or for a term of years, founded on the same principle, with such modifications only, if any, as will not materially affect the same.

1. Resolved unanimously, That one third of the Militia Force of the Province, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five, be drafted by direction of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, and Officered for active service, to the extent of Eight Thousand Men.

2. Resolved unanimously, That His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor be authorized to require every Regiment or Battalion to select Two Hundred Volunteers for every Six Hundred Men, rank and file, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five, or in the like proportion for a greater or less number.

3. Resolved unanimously, If a sufficient number of men in each Regiment or Battalion do not volunteer, that His Excellency be authorized to fill up the number from the draft of

such Regiment or Battalion, agreeably to Law.

4. Resolved unanimously, That such lists of Men who shall have volunteered, or been drafted as aforesaid, when returned and approved by His Excellency the Commander in Chief, or such person as he shall appoint for that purpose, shall be considered the lists of Men liable to be first called on for actual service.

5. Resolved unanimously, That the Lieutenant-Governor be authorized to appoint Officers to command such drafts or bodies of Volunteers from the Regiment or Battalion to which such drafts or Volunteers may belong, or make such other arrangement as may secure effi-

cient Officers to command such drafts or Volunteers.

6. Resolved unanimously, That His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor be authorized to call into actual service, so many and such of the said drafts or bodies of Volunteers as he may deem proper, and to make the necessary regulations for consolidating any number of such drafts or bodies into a Regiment or Regiments, as may be requisite and necessary, and to appoint Field Officers, Adjutants, and Staff, to each such Regiment, in order to render the same efficient for actual service.

7. Resolved unanimously, That His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor be authorized to order any such Drafts or Volunteers, when required for actual service, into Barracks, and to march them from one part of the Province to another, as the exigency of the service may

require, and beyond the frontier of this Province, when necessary.

8. Resolved unanimously, That His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor be authorized to accept the service of any Volunteer Companies now formed, or which may be formed in this Province, and to consolidate them into Regiments or Battalions, and to appoint Officers for the same, and to take such measures generally as may be requisite to render such Regiments, Battalions.

Mr Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

It is impossible for me to convey to you in language sufficiently energetic, the sentiments of admiration and satisfaction with which I receive the spirited and loyal Resolutions of the House of Assembly. They will show our fellow subjects in New-Brunswick that the people of this Province are determined, and ready, to join them heart and hand, in repelling any outrage or aggression that may be attempted by any Foreign State upon our soil, or to occupy any part of that Territory which has, since the Peace of 1783, been acknowledged as under the jurisdiction of Her Majesty.

It is hardly possible that the General Government of the United States can be a party to, or uphold or justify the Governor and Legislature of Maine in the outrageous proceedings they have resorted to, in invading a State with which they were at peace; but, should they unhappily do so, they will find that the inhabitants of British North America are, one and all, prepared and ready to repe! from their soil any armed force which may attempt to occupy it. And they may rely upon it, that should it be found necessary, the whole strength of the British Empire will be brought forward, to guard, or to avenge, the faithful subjects of Her Majesty in North America.

For my part, Gentlemen, you may rest assured that my best exertions shall be used in giving full effect to your unanimous Resolutions, by putting the Militia in this Province in an efficient state; and the confidence with which you have placed at my command so large a sum for that purpose, is most gratifying and acceptable, and every proper precaution and economy shall be used in its application.

Mr. Young reported from the Select Committee appointed to prepare an Address to Her Majesty, embodying the Resolutions passed by this House on the 30th January last, and the 6th February last, on the subject of the Despatches, &c.; and thereupon, presented to the House the draft of an Address, which he read in his place; and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is a followeth, viz:

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

THE HUMBLE ADDRESS OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY OF THE PROVINCE OF NOVA - SCOTIA.

May it please Your Majesty-

Address

WE, Your Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects, the Representatives of the People of Nova-Scotia, humbly approach Your Majesty with the assurance of our unabated and cordial attachment to Your Majesty's Person and Government, valuing highly the privileges and blessings we enjoy as Members of the British Empire, and firmly determined to adhere to it at any hazard and at whatever sacrifice. We seek also to introduce into this Colony the same wholesome grounds and checks, the same control over the public Expenditure, and as near an approach as may be to the same Institutions which have secured the well-being and happiness of the Mother Country. A more economical and wise application of the public Revenue would enable us to devote to the internal improvement of the Country and the education c. the people, large sums which are at present wasted in the payment of exorbitant Salaries, disproportioned to the duties to be performed, and to the station which the Public Officers, in a young and comparatively a poor Colony, should occupy. In offering a Civil List to Your Majesty in exchange for the Casual and Territorial Revenue, the Assembly had a just regard to the enlightened views of Your Majesty's Colonial Secretary, as expressed in the Despatches of 1837, and to the circumstances and habits of the People whom they represent, and in no instance have they urged any retrenchment or change in the local Government which would impair its efficiency for every useful and constitutional purpose, or have a tendency to destroy its free and independent action. The Assembly are most anxious that the abuses in the local Administration should be redressed—that it should conform to the spirit of the Constitution, and that the Legislative and Executive Councils should be made more acceptable to people than they now are.

The Assembly, finding that some of the Acts of this Legislature, and the views contained in their former Addresses to Your Majesty have been misunderstood, have proceeded, during the present Session, to review the enormous expense of maintaining the Custom-House and Excise Departments—the management of the Post-Office, and other Branches, disclosing on general principles, as well as in detail, the true state of our public affairs; and have adopted, after full inquiry, the various Resolutions which accompany this Address, most of these were carried by very large majorities, and some of them without a dissenting voice:

They

They embody the opinions and wishes of the people of this Province; and the Assembly humbly, but earnestly, entreat that Your Majesty will listen to them with a gracious ear. With the view also of affording the fullest information on the numerous topics comprehended in these Resolutions, the Assembly have deputed two of their Body, possessing their entire confidence to lay this their dutiful Address at the foot of the Throne, and to negotiate on the settlement of the Civil List, and the other important matters in which the people of this Province are so deeply interested—this House being firmly convinced that when the views they entertain are laid open and thoroughly apprehended, they cannot fail to recommend themselves to Your Majesty's approval, and to receive the Royal sanction.

B. to the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and this House being of opinion that the withdrawal of the protection afforded by those Duties to the Agricultural, Commercial, Manufacturing, and other classes of Her Majesty's Subjects, would be highly injurious to the best interests of the British Provinces, and is not called for by any reasons of state or policy, and is sought for by the Chamber of Commerce of the neighbouring Province for the advantage of but a small class, which ought not to have the weight to be attached to the opinion of the Representatives of the People at large, duly considering the interests of the whole; And whereas, it is proper that Her Majesty's Government should be made acquainted with the wishes and views of this Assembly, in regard to the said Imperial Duties. And whereas, the Right Honorable Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, in Council's Resolutihis Despatch of the 27th September, 1838, refers to the structure of the Executive and Le-ons on general state gislative Council. And whereas, the House of Assembly has, during the present Session, adopted Resolutions affecting the character, proceedings, and composition of this House-

Resolved, That while this House continues to be framed upon the principles of the British Constitution, the selection and appointment of its Members belong exclusively to the Crownthat without desiring to restrain the legitimate privileges of the Representatives of the People, this House will ever maintain that the right and the power to express an independent opinion upon all measures submitted to it, whether by the Representative of the Sovereign, or by the House of Assembly, are essential to its dignity, efficiency and existence.

Resolved, That this House fully appreciates the difficulties experienced by His Excellency in endeavouring to carry out the principles submitted by Lord Glenelg, as those by which the Lieutenant-Governor should be regulated in the two Councils:—difficulties, of which a striking practical illustration has been afforded in the present Session, by the absence, during the whole of it, of most of the Members of this Assembly, selected from the interior of the Province.

And whereas, Her Majesty has directed the attention of the Imperial Parliament to the S 2 state

state of the Canadas, and the Right Honorable the Earl of Durham, late Her Majesty's Lord High Commissioner to the British North American Colonies, did, last Summer, submit a plan for their future government, which, together with a letter addressed to him on the subject of it, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor communicated to this House by Message, dated 23d February last.

And whereas, The said Lord High Commissioner has made a Report to Her Majesty's Ministers upon the subject of his mission, which is now under their consideration, and it is probable that propositions for their future government will immediately become a subject of discussion in the Imperial Parliament; and whereas, this House would fail to perform its duty to this Province if it refrained from conveying to Her Majesty's Government and the Imperial Parliament, its opinions upon a subject of such deep moment to the well being of all classes of its inhabitants.

Resolved, That "Her Majesty's loyal Subjects in this Province, happy, peaceable, contented, and rapidly advancing in wealth and prosperity, beneath the benign and powerful protection of the British Crown, cherish an ardent affection for the land of their Fathers, an enthusiastic admiration of its Institutions, and reverence for those forms, usages and customs, by which British liberty is protected and secured," and well and truly did their Representatives, on a recent occasion, express their unanimous determination to vindicate, at all hazards, the integrity of the Empire.

Resolved, That the Members of this House repeat that, "in becoming Members thereof they obeyed their Sovereign's Command, and if Her Majesty shall signify Her gracious pleasure that they shall retire from it, they will cheerfully obey," but whoever may fill the stations to which they have been called, it is due to the House itself, as an independent and co-ordinate branch of that form of Government under which the people of this Colony have lived and prospered more than three-fourths of a century, solemnly to declare that no change which involves abolition of their Colonial constitution can or ought to be effected without the express assent of the Colonial Legislature, and this House most respectfully, yet earnestly, submits for consideration the propriety and even necessity of adopting measures to restore to this branch of the Legislature that public confidence which the Earl of Durham's proposition has in some measure impaired, and without which it cannot beneficially cooperate in the work of Legislation.

Resolved, That a federal union of the British North American Colonies would, in the opinion of this House, prove an extremely difficult, if not an impracticable measure—that the experiment, if practicable, would be eminently dangerous to the interests of the Mother Country as well as of the Colonies—that its tendency would be to separate the Colonies from the Parent State, by imbuing the rising generation with a fondness for elective institutions to an extent inconsistent with the principles of the British constitution—that it would involve the Lower Colonies which are now contented, loyal and peaceable, in the political dissentions of Lower Canada, and add greatly to their general and local expenditures, without producing any adequate benefit to them, to the Canadas, or to the Empire at

Resolved, That it would be the imperative duty of this House, to authorize two Members thereof to visit England without delay, for the purpose of submitting to Her Majesty's Ministers its sentiments, in regard to the important questions relating to the Constitution of the Colony, which have been recently agitated, and the several other interests committed to its charge; but at a moment when war has broken out in the East, and from the hostile attitude recently assumed by the United States of America, War in this quarter of the Globe also is

not only a possible but a probable event, this House is unwilling to embarrass Her Majesty's Government with subjects, which, relatively to the momentous considerations that must now demand their anxious and undivided attention, are of minor importance; confidently trusting that no proceeding will be adopted by which our Constitutional Rights and Privileges may be affected, without an opportunity being afforded to this House of submitting its views thereon to Her Majesty's Government: It therefore defers resorting to a Delegation at present; but, nevertheless, if the present difficulties with the United States of America should be happily adjusted, or Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies should require such information as this branch of the Legislature can afford before this House again assembles, the Legislative Council does hereby authorize and request His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor to select two Members thereof to proceed to England for this purpose, and this House will adopt the necessary Constitutional measures to ensure to them reimbursement of the expenses of their mission."

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

The business of the Session being now finished, I have great pleasure in releasing you

from your Legislative duties.

You have shown, by your munificent grant of £100,000, for the service and equipment of the Militia, that you consider the support of Her Majesty's Authority and Government, and the defence and prosperity of Her North American Dominions, as inseparably connected, nor can anything in your power be more conducive to either, than your perseverance in making this the great leading principle of your conduct.

THURSDAY, 4th APRIL, 1839.

To the Bills now enacted, and especially to that which provides for the better regulation of the Militia, I have with pleasure assented, under a full conviction that your zeal, alike loyal and patriotic, has, in this instance, omitted nothing within the extent of your ability; and it will be my ambition, on any emergency that may arrive, to give the fullest effect to the means of defence which you have provided.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

The very extensive appropriation for Roads and Bridges cannot fail to be of general benefit to the Province, but demands a more exact attention in the expenditure; and unless my endeavours to obtain a faithful application of these means are seconded by you, in your respective Counties and Towns, I cannot hope for success. I regret, however, to observe, that you have omitted to make an adequate provision for altering and improving the Main Post Communication with New Brunswick and Canada, as recommended to you.

I have to convey to you my best thanks for the liberal Supplies which you have granted to Her Majesty, and for the confidence which you continue to repose in me, by placing considerable sums of Money at my disposal, and you may rely upon my continued endeavours to promote regularity and a system of economy in every branch of the Public Service.

Sir,

I have received your Despatch of the 21st April last, No. 21, enclosing Addresses to the Queen from the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Nova-Scotia, with some explanatory Documents on the subject of the late re-construction of the Councils of the Province, and the terms on which Her Majesty had offered to cede to the control of the Legislature the Revenues at present at their disposal. I have had the honor to lay these Addresses at the Foot of the Throne, and Her Majesty was pleased to receive them very graciously, and to express Her satisfaction at the sentiments of loyalty and attachment to Her Person and Government which they evince.

1.—The first point alluded to in the Address from the Assembly, is the composition of the Legislative and Executive Councils, which is declared to have been conducted on principles inconsistent with the Instructions of Her Majesty's Government, and ill calculated to give confidence to the Inhabitants of the Province-considering how recently these Councils have been instituted, and how little opportunity has yet been afforded of forming an opinion as to their mode of discharging their functions, Her Majesty's Government cannot, at present, advise the Queen to take any further steps in the matter. I am convinced that in the arduous and delicate task of selecting the Gentlemen to be appointed to those Beards, you acted with the single view of promoting the public interests, and carrying out the principles and views of Her Majesty's Government. I can easily suppose that difficulties, not entirely unforeseen, at the date of my Despatch, No. 101, may have prevented you from appointing a full proportion of Members belonging to the various religious Communities, and representing each of the more important interests in the Province. I must indeed regret that your selection has not entirely met the views of the Assembly; yet it is gratifying to me to perceive that the assistance, which that Body has at all times received from you in the prosecution of measures intended for the general good, is distinctly recognised in the present Address. recommending Gentlemen to fill up future vacancies as they occur, you will, of course, have reference to the principles already explained in my various Communications to you on this subject.

2nd.—The Assembly next proceed to the consideration of the Civil List, and to an explanation of their views in respect to the Bill for granting Salaries to the Lieutenant-Governor and Judges of the Province, which passed their House during the last Session, but was rejected by the Legislative Council: To this subject also, the Address from the Legisla-

tive Council and the Resolutions inclosed in it principally refer-

Her Majesty has learnt with regret, the refusal of the Assembly to comply with the proposals regarding the grant of a Civil List. After carefully re-considering the subject, the Queen's Servants cannot advise Her Majesty either to reduce the Salaries assigned in my Despatch of 31st October, 1837, to the Officers placed on the Civil List, or to consent that the Salaries of all those Officers, except the Lieutenant-Governor, the Chief-Justice, and the Assistant Judges, should be subject to annual revision. The Queen therefore withdraws, for the present, Her offer to surrender to the Legislature of Nova-Scotia the Revenues under her control, in that Province. Her Majesty will continue, as heretofore, to apply those Revenues to the payment of the principal Officers of the Local Government, or to such other objects as may be deemed conducive to the benefit of the Province; but Her Majesty directs me, at the same time, to declare that, whenever the Legislature of Nova-Scotia shall pass a Bill granting to Her Majesty the sum of £4,700 Sterling, per annum, during the continuance of Her Majesty's reign, applicable to the Salaries of the principal Officers of the Government, Her Majesty will be ready, in exchange for that sum, to surrender to the control of the Legislature the Revenues at present at Her disposal, subject only to some inconsiderable temporary

porary deductions, necessary in order to retain at their present amount the emoluments of the existing Provincial Secretary, and of the Chief-Justice, during their respective tenures of office. It is very desirable that the Civil List should be granted for the term of Her Majesty's reign; but, as this was not originally proposed to the Assembly, the Queen will not reject the Bill, if the grant is made for not less than ten years. In the meantime, however, it is Her Majesty's command that there be laid, every year, before the Assembly, within fifteen days from the opening of the Session, an account of the Revenue and expenditure of the Fund

Lastly.—The Assembly allude to the expense incurred in the collection of the Revenue of Nova-Scotia, and propose a prospective reduction of the Customs Department; and they express their opinion that the privileges of a Free Port should be granted to every Port in Nova-Scotia, at which Customs Officers are established. I have, by Her Majesty's commands, referred this portion of their Address, together with your Despatch of the 12th of May, No. 33, on the same subject, to the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury. They have intimated to me, that on the receipt of the information for which you were apprised in my Despatch, No. 101, they had called, and of such remarks thereon, as the Board of Customs may find it their duty to submit, their Lordships will not omit to give to the propositions of the House of Assembly that prompt and careful attention, which both their importance, as regards the financial interests of the Province, and the consideration due to the Body from which they emanate, demand.

SIR-

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch of the 1st and 4th May, Nos. 29 and 31, inclosing applications from the Commissioners of Crown Lands and Surveyors General of Nova-Scotia and Cape-Breton, praying that in the arrangement of the terms of the Civil List Bill their emoluments may not be left dependant on the annual vote of the Assembly of Nova-Scotia.

These Officers appear in some measure to have misunderstood the terms of my Despatch of the 31st October last.—I there stated that considering the smallness of the Revenue of the Province arising from the Crown Lands in Nova-Scotia, I did not feel justified in including the Salaries of these Officers in a Civil List, intended to be permanent, or for a term of years. This remark was in answer to the proposition in the Schedule No. 3 to your Despatch, that fixed Salaries should be granted to the Commissioners of Crown Lands in Nova-Scotia and Cape-Breton.—By that decision I am compelled to abide, so far as the fixed Salaries of these Officers are concerned, but it was not my intention, nor do I now design to interfere in any way with the per centage on Sales, which, under their warrants of appointment, they are entitled to retain.—That per centage forms a part of the expense of collecting the Crown Revenue, and must, according to the universal rule, be deducted from the gross Revenue before any portion of it is paid over to the Provincial Treasury.

If, however, the Legislature of Nova-Scotia should hereafter desire to commute this per centage for fixed Salaries, Her Majesty's Government would be prepared to consider any Bill which might be passed for that purpose, with a due regard to the equitable claims of in-

dividuals, no less than to the interests of the public service.

I have received, and have laid at the foot of the Throne, the Addresses from the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Nova-Scotia, which accompanied your Despatch of the 22d April last, No. 23, praying that Her Majesty would be pleased to authorize you to assent to a Bill for establishing the form of Oath thereafter to be taken by Her Majesty's Subjects in that Province.—Her Majesty was pleased to receive these Addresses very graciously, and to direct that they should be referred for the consideration of Her Law Officers.

Those Officers having accordingly considered the subject, have reported to me that, by the 6th, George 3d, Cap. 54, Sec. 2, the form of the Oath of Abjuration was fixed, not only for Great Britain and Ireland, but for the rest of the British Dominions.—The form has since been altered so far as relates to Roman Catholics but not Protestants; and, therefore, however reasonable may be the views of the Provincial Legislature, it is not in the power of Her Majesty, consistently with the Act above referred to, to assent to any proposal (not sanctioned by the Imperial Parliament) for altering the form of the Oath.

Sir,

I inclose for your information, the copy of a Correspondence which has taken place between this Department and the General Post Office, on the subject of an Act of the Legislature of Nova-Scotia, passed on the 17th of April last, for regulating the internal Postage of the Province. From the Letter of the Secretary to the Post-Master-General, you will perceive that very serious objections are entertained by the Earl of Lichfield, to the confirmation of this Act in question, by Her Majesty in Council. I do not think it necessary on the present occasion, to enter upon any minute examination of those objections, (altho' they would appear entitled to very serious attention,) because there is still another difficulty to which I am disposed to attach conclusive weight.

Among the advantages which Her Majesty's Government hope to derive from the Earl of Durham's Mission to British North America, one of the most considerable is, that of devising some plan, by which provision may be made for the regulation in future, of questions which, like that of Post Office Communications, are the subject of common interest to the Provinces collectively. The confirmation of this Act by the Queen in Council, might present a serious obstacle to any such arrangement, as it would establish a system regarding the Post Office, which could not but be distasteful to the other Provinces, and in the establishment of which Her Majesty might be supposed to have been wanting in a due re-

gard to their interests.

Although it is not without the greatest reluctance, that on this or any other occasion, the Queen declines to accede to the advice of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Nova-Scotia, upon any question relating to the internal affairs of that Province; yet, under the circumstances to which I have referred, Her Majesty will, for the present at least, decline to adopt any decision respecting this Act, and as it contains a suspending clause, it, of course, will not, in the mean time, have the effect of law.

I am commanded by my Lord the Post-Master-General, to transmit for the consideration of Mr. Secretary Rice, the draft of a Bill, "for the management and regulation of "the Post Office in Upper Canada," which has been preferred under the direction of the

late Secretary of the Colonies, and His Grace the late Post-Master-General, for the purpose of being laid before the House of Assembly of that Province, one of similar provisions being at the same time submitted to the Legislative Bodies of the other Provinces in British North America.

This Bill has been drawn in consequence of the Act of the 4th of His present Majesty, Cap. 7, which repeals so much of the Act 5, Geo. 3, Cap. 25, " as authorizes the taking of certain rates of Inland Postage within His Majesty's Dominions in North America," after His Majesty's consent shall be signified to Acts of the Legislatures of the Provinces of North America, authorizing certain rates of Postage to be taken therein, and "for making such " regulations for the management of the Post Office within such Colonies and Provinces, "by His Majesty's Post-Master-General or his Deputies, as shall be therein directed."— The Bill has been framed after much consideration from Mr. Stanley, and the Duke of Richmond, aided by the Officers here, and the Deputy-Post-Master-General of British North America, who was sent for with the view of consulting him on the matter.

The Preeis will shew the material clauses of the Bill, which goes, in fact, to remodel and consolidate all the existing Laws and regulations of the Post Office, applicable to the Pro-

vinces in question.

There are, however, two material points which will require the special consideration and

decision of His Majesty's Government.

The first is in folio 123, of the Bill which authorizes the Governor or Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, on being satisfied by the Post-Master-General or his Deputy, of the necessity thereof, to grant him a warrant for any sum not exceeding an amount to be decided upon, out of the general funds of the Province, to be accounted for in the annual account to be laid before the House of Assembly, to enable the Post-Master-General to pro-

vide for the necessary expenses of carrying on the service of this Department.

The object of this very important clause is to guard against any deficiency of Funds, for carrying on the service, which it is apprehended may arise in the first years of the arrangement at least, as all British Postage collected within the Provinces is to be remitted home, and the interior Postage only being applicable to the expenses of the Post Office in all its branches; and it is very essential, that this point should be decided upon by His Majesty's Government, in case there should be any objection to the source from whence funds are to be derived, to meet the necessary expenses of the Department.

The other subject to which I am to request you will be pleased to draw Mr Spring Rice's attention, is that of "Criminal Punishments," folios 150, 152, 153, 154, and 155, in all which cases, the offence is pronounced to be a Felony, and by the Laws in force in this Country, the punishment is death; but upon this serious question, as well as the nature and quantum of punishment of the other offences against the Post Office, the Post-Master-Gene-

ral presumes His Majesty's Government will decide.

In conclusion, I am to suggest, that when this Bill is considered and completed, copies of it be transmitted to the Legislatures of Upper and Lower Canada, New-Brunswick, Nova-Scotia, and Prince Edward Island respectively, for their consideration and approval.

Having laid before the Post-Master-General, your letter of the 17th ultimo, transmitting the copy of an Act, passed by the Legislature of the Province of Nova-Scotia, in the month of April last, for regulating the internal Postage of the Province, I am directed by his Lordship to state, for Lord Glenelg's information, that the Act in question is quite at variance with the principle upon which the Act of the Imperial Parliament, 4, Guil. 4, Cap. 7, was framed. In that Act it was provided, that as soon as the Legislature of the North American Provinces, should pass Bills for levying such rates, and for making such regulations for the management of the Post Office within these Colonies, by the Post-Master-General or his Deputies, or should be deemed expedient, then, that the net produce of the Inland rates of Postage collected in those Colonies should be distributed in proportion to the gross amount of Postage raised and collected within each Province.

My Lord, the Postmaster-General, directs me to add, that the Bill was passed in this Country, with the view of attaining one uniform code of Laws, for the regulation of the Post Office service throughout the whole of British North America, and by reserving to the Post-Master-General of Great-Britain the power to determine what Posts were necessary or not, to secure the object most essential to the common benefit of all the Provinces, in the maintenance, by an impartial and independent authority, of the main and connecting lines of the communication throughout the whole, which, if expensive, might be objected to by any one Colony exercising a separate control, when its own immediate interests had been provided

for.

In order to follow up this Act of the Imperial Parliament, and to secure to the Provinces the proposed advantages, Bills, as Lord Glenelg is aware, were prepared with great care, and sent out to the different Colonies for their acceptance, but having hitherto refused to adopt them, they have thus rendered inoperative the benefit intended to be conferred upon them by the Mother Country; under these circumstances, the Postmaster-General feels it his duty, decidedly to object to any partial cause of Legislation, as it appears to his Lordship, that the policy which dictated the measures adopted in this Country was just: His Lordship consequently is not prepared to recommend a departure from it, the more especially in the present case, as by leaving the whole expenditure of the various Posts throughout Nova-Scotia, the key to British North America, under the control of the General Assembly of that Province; that body will, in point of fact, obtain the entire management and power over the whole Post Communications with the interior, as they then might object not only to defray the expense, but to interdict such Communications, as they might not approve of, or deem necessary. My Lord, the Postmaster-General, directs me to state, that in addition to these objections, there are other difficulties connected with the Revenue of this Department, upon which it would be necessary, if the Bill now passed in Nova-Scotia were to be confirmed by Her Majesty, to consult the Lords of the Treasury, but into which he does not think it necessary to enter, as he is of opinion, that the grounds already stated are amply sufficient to warrant his objections to the Colonial Act in question.

His Lordship, at the same time, directs me to enclose for Lord Glenelg's information, copy of a Communication from this Department to the Colonial Office, transmitting Copies of the Bills submitted in 1834, to the Provincial Legislatures, to which I have already al-

luded.

ting a joint Address to the Queen, from the Legistative Council and House of Assembly of Nova-Scotia, complaining of the habitual violation by American Citizens of the treaty subsisting between Great-Britain and the United States, on the subject of the Fisheries, and

praying for additional Naval protection to British interests.

In obedience to Her Majesty's commands, this subject has engaged the serious attention of Her Majesty's Government, and it has been determined for the future, to station, during the Fishing Season, an armed Force on the Coast of Nova-Scotia, to enforce a more strict observance of the provisions of the Treaty by American Citizens; and Her Majesty's Minister at Washington has been instructed to invite the friendly co-operation of the American

Government for that purpose.

The necessary directions having been conveyed to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, their Lordships have issued orders to the Naval Commander in Chief on the West Indian and North American Station, to detach, so soon as the Fishing season shall commence, a small Vessel to the Coast of Nova-Scotia, and another to Prince Edward Island, to protect the Fisheries. The Commander of these Vessels will be cautioned to take care that, while supporting the rights of British Subjects, they do not themselves overstep the bounds of the Treaty. You will of course afford them every information and assistance which they may require for the correct execution of this duty. I trust that these measures will prove satisfactory to the Legislature of Nova-Scotia.

SIR-

Among the series of Acts passed by the Legislature of Nova-Scotia during the last Session, there remain seven on which the decision of Her Majesty's Government has not yet been communicated to you.—This delay has chiefly arisen from a desire on my part not to embarrass the Provincial Government by the disallowance of several of those Acts which are deemed to be objectionable; and which, although passed for a short period, Her Majesty in Council cannot be advised to sanction.—I will, however, no longer delay communicating to you my opinion on these Acts, in the hope that, should it be proposed to revive any of them, you may be enabled to suggest such improvements in them as will justify me in advising their confirmation.

The Act 1748, by the operation of the 3d Clause, exempts from Colonial Impost Duties all Foreign Goods purchased with the proceeds of Fish and Fish Oil, the produce of the Colony.—This provision is so objectionable in principle, and so open to imposition, that I shall be under the necessity of advising Her Majesty, in Council, to disallow any Acts which

shall be passed containing a similar Clause.

The Act, No. 1753, for granting a Bounty on Chocolate, is the third of this kind which has been passed by the Legislature, all of which have been considered objectionable in principle.—Parliament has long since repudiated the principle of bounties, and although the present Act is an improvement on the two former Acts, inasmuch as it does not discriminate in favor of Chocolate prepared from Foreign Cocoa, but grants a bounty indifferently on all Chocolate whether manufactured from Foreign or from British Cocoa—yet nevertheless Her Majesty cannot be advised to sanction any Act which involves the principle of bounties.

The Act, No. 1764; amends a former Act for incorporating a Marine Assurance Company in Halifax.—So far as it extends the liability of the Shareholders to the additional amount of their Stock, it is an improvement on the original Act, No. 1607; but this is too slight an amendment to meet the exigencies of the case, for the Capital thus constituted would be no

more than might be raised by a few individuals without corporate privileges, and totally unequal to bear losses on an extensive scale, such as Companies of this description are necessarily exposed to.—In again recommending the Legislature to amend the Acts on this subject, you will call their attention to the Act, No. 1659, passed as a supplement to the Act, No. 1607, and containing a Clause authorizing the Company to take Mortgages on Real Estate-you will inform them that Her Majesty's Government cannot sanction a provision which might involve the Company in speculations foreign to its professed object, and most injurious to the public interests.

The Act, No. 1796, for incorporating the Halifax Whaling Company is open to most of the objections which can be raised to Acts of this description.—The responsibility of the Shareholders is limited—there is no declaration in it as to the Capital or the management of the Company—it contains a power for holding land to a large amount which there is nothing in the object of the Company to warrant.—You will submit these observations to the consi-

deration of the House of Assembly.

The Act, No. 1800, amending an Act (No. 1698) relating to the Merchant Seamen of the Province, contains a Clause, number 5, which interferes with the jurisdiction of the Vice Admiralty Court, in the manner pointed out in the Letter from the Judge of that Court inclosed in your Despatch; you will, therefore, for the reasons threin stated, recommend the repeal of that Clause.

The Act, No. 1810, continues an Act (No. 1575) which is in the same spirit as the Act, No. 1753.—It gives a bounty on the preparation of an article (Tobacco) in the Colony.— The Act, however, being rather of a modified nature, and lasting only for one year, has been

allowed to expire; but you will not admit of its being revived in its present shape.

The Act, No. 1821, amends a former Act (No. 1112) for incorporating the Shubenacadie Canal Company.—The only objection which I have to this Act applies to that Clause which repeals the power in the former Act, whereby the Company were not allowed to hold Real Estate of higher value than £50,000.—This restriction I consider to be so desirable, for the purpose of preventing speculation in land, that I must call upon you to recommend the Legislature to repeal that Clause.

May it please Your Excellency,

Mr. Secretary George, by his Letter of the 14th instant, having acquainted me, by your Excellency's desire, "that as the Act passed in the last Session of the General Assembly. relating to Merchant Seamen, (ch. 56,) affects the jurisdiction of the Court of Vice Admiralty, your Excellency in transmitting this Act for Her Majesty's assent, would forward at the same time any observations which I might wish to be taken into consideration in connexion with it,"-I have the honor to submit the following remarks upon that enactment.

Ever since the Resolution of 1632, with respect to the subjects of Admiralty Jurisdiction, Suits for the Recovery of Wages due to Seamen have been considered unquestionably with-They appear necessarily and advantageously so; both on account of the service being purely Maritime; and because the facilities afforded by its mode of procedure, enable a number of Seamen to join in the same suit; and give them therein the benefit of their threefold remedy, against the Master, the Ship, and the Freight, without the delays incidental to Tribunals, which do not proceed in rem, and with superior means of investigating the facts of the case. In any other Court, the lien of the Seaman on the Ship and Freight, for his remuneration, can hardly be made available. To deprive him of this security under any circumstances appears a matter of questionable policy; and to refuse him, because his claim may be small, access for its recovery to a Court known, and by ancient usage, familiar to that class of men, as peculiarly their own, does not seem to have been hitherto intended by Parlia-

In the British Statute of 1835, (5 & 6, Wm. 4, ch. 19,) for consolidating the Laws relating to Merchant Seamen, the 15th Section provides a summary remedy for the recovery of

Wages due to Seamen, not exceeding £20, before one Justice of the Peace in any part of His Majesty's dominions.—But, by this Act, the jurisdiction of the Admiralty is not taken a-The provision made (16th Section,) for restraining Suits in the Admiralty is merely that, if the party might have as effectual a remedy for his Wages, by complaint to a Justice of the Peace under the previous clause, the Judge shall certify to that effect, and no costs of Suit shall be awarded to the Plaintiff. This Act being restricted by the proviso, (Sec. 54,) from applying "to any Ship registered in, or belonging to, any British Colony, having a Legislative Assembly, or to her Crew, while within the precints of the Colony." The General Assembly here, in 1836, passed an Act (6 W. 4, ch. 48,) containing Enactments similar to those of the Imperial Statute; the Sections 17 & 18 of the former, for the recovery of Wages being in the same words as the 15th & 16th of the latter:—consequently, by the operation of the two Statutes, while the jurisdiction of the Admiralty remained untouched, a penalty in the shape of a forfeiture of all his costs attached to the Seaman who unnecessarily resorted to that Court for his Wages. To me it appears that this penalty was quite sufficient to deter suitors from the Admiralty.—Practically, it would prevent them, unless in peculiar circumstances, because its Rules impose on the Proctor in every Suit the liability of satisfying the fees incurred in its progress; and these would, in most cases, prove a personal loss to the Proctor, his Client being generally a pauper. This risk, therefore, he would not encounter, unless the case were in fact proper for the determination of the Court.—But in the Statute to which these observations refer, the local Legislature, in addition to amending and regulating the mode of proceeding before a Justice of the Peace, for the recovery of Wages, has enacted, in the 5th Clause, "That after the passing of this Act, no Suit for the recovery of the Wages of any Seaman, for his services on board of any Ship belonging to, or registered in, this Province, unless the same exceed £20, shall be brought into the Court of Vice Admiralty, or in any of the Inferior Courts of Common Pleas in this Province."—By this provision the jurisdiction of the Vice Admiralty is wholly taken away, with regard to suits for wages under £20, earned in Provincial vessels, while that of the Supreme Court, equally objectionable on the ground of expense, far more so on that of delay, is left untouched.—This enactment of a Colonial Legislature respecting a Court such as the Vice Admiralty at Halifax, is, I apprehend, an interference with it to which the Legislature was incompetent.—The Court derives its jurisdiction and authority from the Admiralty of England; administers, as one of his Courts, the Admiral's judicial power in matters not arising within the limits of the Colony, but on the sea, and tho' established at a place within the Province, has no necessary connexion with, or dependence on, it.—The Judges of the Colonial Courts hold their offices by Patents under the Great Seal of Nova-Scotia; the Patent for this Court is under that of the Admiralty, and confers on the Judge, in the ancient form and words, similar powers and jurisdiction to those exercised by the High Court of Admiralty; nor is the Court of recent establishment, on the contrary it appears to have existed anterior to the formal constitution of the Colony, (14th July 1749,) for on referring to its records I have found that on the 5th October of the same year, a suit for Seaman's wages was pending before the Judge, Edward Howe, Esq., and subsequently in 1758, at the first Session of the Colonial Assembly, when the House required from the Registrar of the Vice Admiralty a return of the Fees payable therein, which the Judge refused to make, the Governor informed the Assembly that the Fees were the same as taken in the Old Plantations, and had been exacted here from the first settlement of the Country, adding that the General Assembly could not undertake to interfere with them, the constitution of this Court being unlike every other.-From that time to the passing of the Act now to be transmitted, I am not aware that the Court has ever been the subject of local restrictive legislation; and I would submit it as worthy of consideration whether it ought now to be made so.

It further appears to me that the enactment in question stands in direct opposition to that of the Statute of the Imperial Parliament of 1832, (2, Wm. IV, ch. 51,) made for regulating the practice, &c. of the Vice Admiralty Courts abroad, and to obviate doubts as to their jurisdiction, for in the 6th Section of this Act, after reciting "that in certain cases doubts may arise as to the jurisdiction of the Vice Admiralty Courts in His Majesty's Dominions abroad, with respect to Seaman's wages, Pilotage," &c., it is enacted "That in all cases where a Ship or Vessel, or the master thereof, shall come within the local limits of any

"Vice Admiralty Court, it shall be lawful for any person to commence proceedings in any

" of the suits hereinbefore mentioned, in any such Vice Admiralty Court, nothwithstanding "the cause of action may have arisen out of the local limits of such Court," &c. If this authority to sue in the cases enumerated existed not before, but was first conferred by this Statute, then it would seem subject to limitation only by the same power which gave it :-- if it pre-existed in those Courts, can an inferior Legislature diminish or modify what the superior has conferred? On the point of the nullity of Colonial Laws repugnant to Acts of Parliament the 56th Section of the Act 3 and 4, Wm. IV. chap. 59, for regulating the Trade of This Section was originally copied the British Possessions abroad, appears conclusive. from 7 and 8, Wm. III. chap. 22, s. 89, and provides "That all Colonial Laws repugnant " to any Act of Parliament, so far as such Act shall relate to and mention such possession, "shall be null and void;" and according to the late eminent Judge of this Court, Sir Alexander Croke, in the case of the Bermuda, (Stewart's Rep. 457) in giving his decision with regard to shares of prize money attached in the hands of the Prize Agents by process from the Supreme Court, under the Colonial Statute for the recovery of Debts from the effects of absconding Debtors, held: That so far as that Act contravened the Prize Act, it was rendered invalid by such repugnancy; and he enforced payment by the Agents; the attachment and a decision by the Judges of the Supreme Court sustaining it, notwithstanding:-This authority might perhaps justify the Court in disregarding the prohibition recently enacted—but it is submitted that a contest on the point of jurisdiction should not be allowed to occur.—In the preamble to the Act now under consideration, there is an assertion, on which I feel it necessary to remark that it has been introduced, as it appears to me, without sufficient caution:—It is recited "that the remedies provided by the Act which it purports to " amend, have been found inconvenient and injurious, and have exposed the Masters and "Owners of Ships registered in, and belonging to, the Province, to heavy and unnecessary "expenses for proceedings in the Court of Vice Admiralty, though as effectual a remedy might have been had against them by complaint to a Justice of the Peace"-This recital, is in all respects incorrect. The Act gave only, what the Imperial Act provided for all other Ships, a summary remedy for wages before a Justice, which could not possibly lead to expensive proceedings in the Admiralty; and, in point of fact, no such unnecessary proceedings were taken before it, with regard to any Vessel registered in, or belonging to, the Province. I have procured, and now beg to submit, with these remarks, a return of all Suits in the Vice Admiralty instituted from my appointment to the present date, exhibiting the nature of tho suit, and the full amount of the Fees, Costs and Charges, in each;—Not one item of which Costs has been the subject of objection before me, but have been paid by the parties. In this return, the Action, No. 11, is the only suit for wages against a Vessel of Nova-Sco-There the Defendant's Counsel desired to object that the suit might have been brought before a Justice; but refusing to appear, he could not, consistently with the rules of the Court, be heard; and without appearing, the demand was paid; yet, in this case, the circumstances he stated were far from constituting, had the cause proceeded, a clear right to the certificate.—Such a case, it is submitted, falls far short of the comprehensive terms of the Preamble: These observations, will not, I trust, be viewed as resulting from any reference to the effect which the restrictions, attempted by the Assembly, might be supposed to produce on the fees of the Officers of the Court:—These are wholly below consideration, where the interest of so important a class as Seamen are involved. On the contrary, no measure is more desirable than one which, without diminishing their ancient liens and remedies, would give them a speedy, cheap, and effectual remedy for their wages. But I am not prepared to admit that they possess it under the jurisdiction as to wages, recently given to Justices of the Peace in these Colonies.—Speaking generally of the persons necessarily entrusted with this office in the maritime parts of Nova-Scotia and its vicinity. I must express my fears that there are but few of them to whom such a jurisdiction (far more extensive than the local Laws have ever given in matters of debt) can be safely committed; or whom the legal questions, frequently involved in a small demand for wages, would not seriously embarrass.—Yet, as to these claims, of which the great majority fall far short of £20, their decisions are without appeal—a resort by our own Legislature carefully secured in all other cases of Debt above Twenty Shillings. An extensive acquaintance at the Bar with cases to which Seamen were parties, enables me to affirm that, though often guilty of most annoying and vexatious conduct towards their employers, they are as often made the subejects

or till by the describe on the

jects of treatment against which they ought to be protected; and therefore that, both for their punishment and protection, the power of applying remedies certain, cheap, speedy and effectual, has become most essential. This power, I am induced to believe, could be beneficially exercised by the Vice Admiralty Courts as now constituted, were their Judges empowered by Parliament so to modify their present form of proceeding, as to reduce the expense of it, and render it as summary as before a Justice of the Peace, and also authorised to hear the parties and witnesses viva voce, and determine their cases to the extent of £20, without the formalities now enjoyed; and limiting the charges to a sum not exceeding 20 per cent. on the debt adjudged, by a rateable reduction on each Officer's fees. A summary course of proceeding for Debts under £20, and with very reduced Court fees, has been long in use in the Supreme Court of this Colony, and furnishes a precedent for what has been suggested; which instead of deterring the Sailor from his accustomed Tribunal, would secure to him as well as his employer, for the decision of suits for wages, the knowledge of the Judge, as well as the known power and process of the Court, free from the objections entertained by many to the increase of judicial powers to Justices of the Peace, in the present circumstances of our population. Submitting the foregoing remarks with great deference,

THE Committee on Navigation Securities report on the subject of the Yarmouth Light House,—That they have examined persons conversant with the Harbour of Yarmouth and the adjacent coast; and are of opinion, that the most eligible site is on the east Cape—that the tower of the Light-House should be at least fifty feet high, and thus constructed, it will be useful for directing Vessels entering or leaving the Bay of Fundy, and possess the advantage of leading Vessels into Port, which neither of the three nearest Lights on Seal and Brier Islands, and the Gannet afford. The Committee have also enquired as to the probable expense, and are of opinion that the Building may be erected by judicious management for £1000, although the Estimates exhibited exceed that sum, and being sensible of the importance of the intended structure, recommend that the House should grant the additional sum of £250 for its erection.

4. That in the opinion of the House the Salaries which are assigned by permanent Acts, or by the accustomed annual votes to the Public Officers, paid from the Provincial Funds, are adequate for the independent and respectable maintenance of such Officers; and as the House would not be disposed to increase the same, they conceive it unjust and improper that other Officers of corresponding rank, and discharging duties not more laborious, or of higher responsibility, should be remunerated by larger Salaries—thus creating an invidious and unwise distinction between the Public Officers, paid by the Crown, and by the Provincial Legislature.

- 5. That the Salaries enjoyed by the principal Officers of the Customs at Halifax are extravagantly high, and that, in the opinion of the House, the expense of the Custom House Establishment in this Province might, and ought to be, reduced, by an equitable and speedy arrangement to a scale suited to the circumstances of the Colony, and even below what was contemplated by the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade in 1834.
- 6. That, in the opinion of the House, the Imperial, Colonial, and Light-House Duties, might be effectually and easily collected by one set of Officers at Halifax, and in the Outports, with very great convenience and facility to the Merchants, and without imposing any unreasonable or onerous duties on such Officers.
- 7. That the sum of £7,144 18s. 9, assigned by the Legislature in 1829, for the support of the Custom House Establishment, is amply sufficient, if judiciously and fairly distributed, for the maintenance of all the Officers, who would be required for many years, for the protection of the Trade, and the collection of all the Revenues in this Province.
- 8. That the House having observed the rise in the value of Property, and the beneficial effects on the industry, habits, and condition of the people, which have been produced in the Free Ports of this Province, adhere to the opinion expressed in their Address to the Throne, in 1838, and earnestly hope, that Her Majesty's Government will permit every port where a Custom-House Officer is, or hereafter may be stationed, to enjoy the privileges of a Free Port.
- 9. That in the selection of Officers to fill up vacancies in the Department of the Customs, the House earnestly hope that the prayer of the Address to His late Majesty, from the House of Assembly, in 1836, will not be overlooked by Her Majesty.
- 10. That the evils complained of in the Addresses to the Throne, adopted by the Provincial Legislature, in 1837 and 1838, against the oppressive and illegal encroachments of American Citizens upon our Fisheries, remain in full force, and, during the last season, were rather aggravated than diminished—that no adequate protection will be afforded by the presence of one small Vessel, on the coast of Nova-Scotia, and another at Prince Edward Island; and the House are perfectly satisfied, that such encroachments can only be checked by several Armed Vessels, of moderate size, cruising on the coasts of these Colonies, or otherwise by the aid of two or more small Steam-Boats, to be employed in that service, and for which the Legislature would cheerfully provide adequate depots of fuel, at the Provincial expense.
- 11. That the system on which the disposal of the Crown Lands has been conducted of late years, is most injurious in its effects, on the growth and population of the Country, and is much more objectionable than the old system of Grants, on the payment of moderate Fees: But the House are satisfied, that a plan far preferable to either the old or the new system, may be easily devised, and earnestly hope, that Her Majesty's Government will sanction the passing of such a Bill as was adopted by the House during the last Session of the Assembly.
- 12. That the House are exceedingly desirous that the invidious and useless distinction between the form of the State Oaths required from Protestants and Roman Catholics in this Province, should be abolished; and that Her Majesty's Government, by an Imperial Act, or by the allowance of a Provincial Act, would sanction the abolition of such Oaths, and the substitution in their room of the Oath of Allegiance only, or otherwise of the Oath that was set out in the Bill, which the Legislative Council and House of Assembly concurred in during the last Session; that part of the Oath which is now required, and is offensive to Protestants in this Province, being not enjoined by the Imperial Statute, 6, Geo. 3, chap. 53, referred to in the Despatch of 19th June, 1833.
- 13. That the House are anxious that the Act (No. 1800) for limiting the jurisdiction of the Admiralty Court, as to the recovery of Seamen's wages, should be confirmed by Her Majesty in Council, and that similar provisions should be extended to the Seamen of Vessels not registered in, or belonging to this Province, but coming within the same.
- 14. That the Bill submitted to the Provincial Legislature in 1834, for the management and regulation of the Post-Office, was found to be too intricate and complex in its details,

and in many particulars unsuited to our local condition—that the Assembly did not design or attempt by the Act of last Session, to obtain the control and management of the Post Communications with the interior or the power of interdicting the same; and as no general plan for regulating the Post-Office in these Provinces has been suggested or put into operation, the House earnestly trust that Her Majesty will either confirm the Act of last Session or authorize the Legislature to pass another Act in perpetuity, or for a term of years, founded on the same principle, with such modifications only, if any, as will not materially affect the same.

Government-House, Fredericton, July 21st, 1838.

Major-General Sir John Harvey presents his compliments to His Excellency Major General Sir Colin Campbell, and has the honor to inclose copy of a Petition which has been placed in his hands by the President and Secretary of an Association, denominated "The Chamber of Commerce of the City of Saint John," in this Province, urging an early Survey and Exploration, by perfectly qualified persons, with a view to determine the best point at which to construct a Ship Canal, for the object (of such great importance to the Commercial Interests of these Provinces, as well as in a Military point of view,) of connecting the waters of the Bay of Fundy with those of the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

Sir J. Harvey begs to invite the support, assistance, and co-operation, of His Excellency Major General Sir Colin Campbell, as well with the Legislature of Nova-Scotia, as with His Excellency the Governor General, to whom Sir John Harvey has transmitted the Petition with a Letter, of which a copy is inclosed.

Government-House, Fredericton, July 19th, 1838.

My Lord.

In transmitting for your Excellency's favourable consideration, a Petition which has been presented to me, by an Association, called "the Chamber of Commerce of the City of Saint John," one which, though self-constituted, possessing no Chartered or Corporate character, includes in its numbers many of the Principal Individuals engaged in Commercial pursuits in that rapidly rising City, it is impossible for me to refrain from expressing to your Excellency my conviction, that the proposition, embodied in this Petition, is secondary in importance to no other scheme for the advancement of the Commercial Interests of British America, -it is one, the execution of which, has long been ardently desired by the Lower Provinces, but which, in its effects, could not fail in conferring at least, equal advantages upon the Canadas, more especially now that they have begun to raise so large a quantity of Grain, and to Manufacture so much Flour and Bread Stuffs for exportation. In a Military, and therefore, in a National point of view, the advantages of the proposed work are equally apparent in the increased facilities of intercourse betwixt the Upper and Lower Provinces, which would be afforded by connecting the waters of the Bay of Fundy with those of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, at a point where it is asserted, and I believe correctly, that the communication with Quebec would be open for the passage of Troops a full month earlier in the Spring, than at present. For these reasons, it appears to me, to be my duty, earnestly to recommend to your Excellency's favorable attention, the proposition for an early scientific Survey and Exploration, by highly qualified persons, with a view to determine the best point at which to construct a work, which would, in itself, constitute your Excellency the greatest benefactor to their Commercial Interests, which these Provinces have ever seen, and the expense of which would, I am convinced, be met by the Local Legislatures of the several Provinces, with an alacrity proportionate to the great and obvious benefits which each and all must derive from it.

To His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. H. & C. B. Lieutenant-Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New-Brunswick.

The Petition of the Chamber of Commerce of Saint John, respectfully sheweth :-

That, on thus approaching your Excellency on the subject of a Canal, for the purpose of connecting the waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence with those of the Bay of Fundy, your Petitioners do so with great confidence, resulting from the prompt manner in which their former request to your Excellency, regarding the so much required Survey of the shores of this Bay was attended to, and forwarded with your recommendation to the British Government.

That a Canal to connect the waters bordering the extensive and valuable possessions of Great Britain in North America, has long been an object of consideration, not only with numerous private individuals, but also with the Legislature of the Province, who have had Surveys and Estimates made, and have been prevented from commencing the undertaking, in consequence of the large sum required for its completion, and also, we apprehend, from want of confidence in the Surveys.

That no examination of the ground was ever made by those who have been employed by the British Government, in such an undertaking, nor, to the best of our knowledge, by any person who had ever been engaged in a Survey, the completion of which had resulted favourably; and that your Petitioners have ever viewed the information, yet obtained, with great doubt, as being insuffi-

cient whereon to base the commencement of such a Canal.

That the work, according to a Survey made by Mr. Hall, the particulars of which he forwarded to the late celebrated Sir Thomas Telford, was, by that Gentleman, on Mr. Hall's data, estimated to cost £155,898 Sterling, but this calculation does not seem to your Petitioners an exception to the observation made above; had Sir Thomas Telford himself effected a Survey, no doubt would rest on our minds that such Documents were, in all respects, to be depended upon; but this not being the case, we much question, had that Gentleman been on the spot, if he would have relied on the uncertain and periodical high tide mark as the most proper level for the range of a Canal, which was to connect the waters of places, to and from which the intercourse must necessarily be so great and so constant.

To detail to your Excellency the great advantages which would result to this Province from the existence of such a Canal, were needless. They are self apparent, and have been deeply considered by your Excellency; but should a stranger observe, that one part of your command is completely cut off from all water intercourse with another most extensive and important part of the Province, save by a voyage of Eight Hundred Miles, while a Canal of Fifteen or Seventeen Miles thro' a peculiarly level Country, would completely connect and bind them together, he would be aston-

ished that no attempt had yet been made to cut such Canal.

That on the 16th March, 1836, the Legislature of this Province passed an Act, (at the suggestion of several persons, who probably despaired of a Canal being cut,) for the purpose of Incorporating the "Shediac and Saint John Rail Road Company," or, in other words, an Act to authorize the parties named, and their associates, to make a Railway from the Harbour of Shediac, to the most convenient spot for a landing Harbour, on the head waters of the Bay of Fundy; said Railway to be completed in six years, or the Charter to expire. And on the same day, a like Law was enacted, to Incorporate the "Bay of Verte Canal Company," with a capital of only £90,000 Sterling, which Charter is to expire and end, if the object is not completed within 10 years from its date. The Legislature of the Province of Nova-Scotia, during the last Session, passed an Act, authorizing the Lieutenant-Governor of that Province, for the time being, to Incorporate any persons who shall, within ten years, make such progress in cutting a Canal from the Bay of Verte to Cumberland Basin, as may satisfy the then Commander in Chief that the Canal will be completed within some reasonably dis-

That your Petitioners think it necessary to call those circumstances to the attention of your Excellency, in proof of the anxiety of all parties on the Atlantic Sea-board of these two Provinces, for some speedy and safe mode of communicating with their fellow Colonists on the Shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence; but your Petitioners most respectfully beg leave to state their opinion, that until some qualified person, possessing such experience and talent as must secure the confidence of all parties, is sent from Great-Britain, to make a full and particular Survey of the various Routes and Harbours

Harbours, and estimates of the expense, little probability exists that any thing will be done; but that we will be still subjected to a repetition of our long expressed and vain regrets, that so important

an undertaking is neglected.

That the Inhabitants of this City are indifferent as to the particular site of the intended Canal, and are only anxious for its completion, as British Subjects, and as members of the community; consequently, they have no feeling in respect to where it should commence or terminate. It is but justice however to state, that conflicting interests exist on this subject—some persons being of opinion, that the Canal should range between Shediac Harbour and the bend of the Peticodiac River; some between Shediac and the Memramcook River, and others from the Bay of Verte to Cumberland Basin; all those views make it the more necessary that some person should be sent by the British Government to examine and report on the different routes, who can be subject to no interested or personal motives, and who, like your Petitioners, shall be anxious that the very best location in all respects should be adopted, be that where it may.

That not only is New-Brunswick in an especial degree interested in this undertaking, but that the extensive and growing trade between this Port and Quebec, makes it certain that the Canadas would join warmly in promoting what would so much advantage their Commerce. That various products of the Eastern part of Nova-Scotia would find a ready and advantageous market at this Port : that fleets of small Vessels would be fitted out in this Province, for general trade on the shores of the Saint Lawrence, and also for the Gulf Fisheries, if such Canal were completed. Another object of vast importance to the British Government, as well as to the Trade of the North American Colonies and the West Indies, seems likely to be obtained by the completion of this work,-We refer to the opening of a safe and easy passage to Quebec, several weeks earlier in the Spring, than can be reckoned upon by the present route, and wholly avoiding the great danger of encountering the Ice between Cape-Breton and Newfoundland, or in the Gut of Canso. We believe it is well known, that a clear passage along the Northern Shore of New Brunswick, and thence by Gaspe up to Quebec, is generally open in the Month of April, and frequently in the first week. That Prince Edward Island would be greatly benefited by such a Canal, and that the Trade of the whole Colonies would thereby be increased in times of peace, and their energies become closely united in times of war.

Your Petitioners therefore humbly pray your Excellency to communicate with Earl Durham, and the Lieutenant-Governors of the various Colonies, requesting them to unite in urging the Ministers of Her most Gracious Majesty, to consider the manifold advantages which must necessarily flow to all the North American Provinces, and consequently to the trade and power of the Mother Country, from the completion of such a Canal; and that those Right Honorable Gentlemen, who are so anxious to promote the interests of the Colonies, would select and forward such an Engineer as is above noted, to make the necessary Surveys, and report to them, as to the utility, practicability and

expense: and, as in duty bound, your Petitioners will, with gratitude, ever pray.

Report respecting the Bay Verte Canal.

Having perused the very full and distinct instructions given by Sir Howard Douglas, to the Engineer, Mr. Francis Hall, and having, for several years previous to his leaving Britain, employed Mr. Hall, very extensively, I have a perfect confidence that Sir Howard's instructions have been faithfully attended to, and that a judicious selection of the line has been made, survey-

ed, and reported upon.

Under those circumstances, I have examined the sections and other documents which have been submitted to me, and have now to state, that there is no occasion for me to enter upon a description of the very singularly favourable situation in which the proposed Canal is to be placed, because, by Bouchett's Map of Lower Canada, it is quite evident that a direct navigable communication between the Bay of Fundy and the Gulf of St. Lawrence, would be an important acquisition, whether viewed as a public or private object; but as the entering into any details respecting this part of the subject does not seem to fall within the province of a Civil Engineer, I shall therefore confine my observations to what relates to practicability, dimensions, and expense of the proposed Canal.

From the Engineer's description of the ground which the Canal will pass over between the two tideways, there seems no serious obstacle to be encountered, and the whole approaches so near to a level, that I advise to adopt the highest spring tide in Cumberland Basin, as the topwater of the Canal, and continue it upon that level to Lock No. 3, in Mr. Hall's section; by so doing, one whole Lock, and the half of another will be saved. The omission of these would greatly facilitate the navigation, and afford a greater opportunity of acquiring the use of the waters of the adjacent districts.

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APPENDIX Nos. 17, 18.

This will occasion extra cutting in some parts of the line, but this additional expense will be balanced in the saving of Locks, more especially as a great proportion of the track appears to be upon

low ground.

In regard to the dimensions of this artificial Canal, it is desirable to have a depth of water to admit trading vessels, drawing thirteen feet, to pass freely; and this requires fourteen feet in the Canal. The use of Steam Boats being generally introduced in America, if this Canal was completed, ready access would thereby be opened, not only with Quebec and Montreal, but also with the upper Lakes, to a boundless extent. To accommodate Steam Boat Navigation, Locks of great length and breadth will be required; in the present instance, I advise they be made One Hundred and fifty feet in length, and forty in breadth; but this size being only required for Steam Boats, I have, in order to save water and time in working them for sailing vessels, divided each Lock into two parts, by means of a third pair of Gates in the middle of its length.

This arrangement should also be extended to the Canal, making it in low flat ground, which is much the greater portion of the distance, sufficiently wide to admit of two Steamers passing each other. This requires that the Canal be made forty-five feet at the bottom, and ninety-five feet at the topwater level. In the portion of the Canal which is in deep cutting, it may be made thirty feet at the bottom, and seventy-two feet at the water surface. This will only admit of one Steam boat passing at a time, but will be wide enough for most trading vessels to pass each other.

Under these circumstances, I have measured and calculated the necessary excavation, and likewise the four Locks with their working machinery, &c. and find that the expense of those and o-

ther works, will be as follows :-

In making the calculations, I have already stated, that the top water line is taken at the level of the highest spring tides in Cumberland Basin, thereby saving six feet of Lockage at each end of

the present summits, and preserving one level along the whole Canal.

It is proper to add, that by lowering Mr. Hall's summit only three feet, and adding three feet to the height of the Locks at each extremity, much cutting may be avoided. But this depends upon the nature of the surface of the adjacent country; for by so doing, three feet of fall would be lost, as regards the command of water—it is therefore a point which can only be determined after a careful re-survey; and although by adopting this last mentioned mode, a considerable saving of expense might be effected, I still prefer keeping the top water of the Canal on a level with the spring tides in Cumberland Bay, as thereby any deficiency of water in it may be supplied every high spring tide, and twelve feet Lockage will be saved.

THE Committee appointed to report upon the Accounts of the Keeper of the Bridewell in Halifax, have seen and examined Mr. Gruber, the Keeper, and find that his Accounts have been regularly audited and passed in the Court of Sessions; the Committee perceive that he has become largely in advance in keeping up the Establishment, and report, that there appears due to him the sum of One Hundred and Ninety-four Pounds Five Shillings up to the fourth day of May One Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirty-eight.

From the statements made to the Committee, it appears also, that owing to the withholding, by the Assembly, at the last Session, of the usual Annual Provincial Grant, and, by the Grand Jury of Halifax, of any Vote for the Establishment, there are not adequate Funds either for the discharge of that balance, or for the support of the persons in confinement in

the Bridewell; the Accounts indeed shew that a considerable income is derived from the labour of the Prisoners, but not to an amount adequate, under present circumstances, to the maintenance of the Establishment; and unless some immediate means of support are provided, the Committee know of no alternative to prevent the starvation of the Persons now in confinement, but their discharge.

This state of things appears to offer no option, and the Committee are of opinion that, while it continues, no more persons should be received into confinement in the Bridewell; and that until the Prisoners now there can be disposed of, it will be requisite that they should be supported, and the existing balance paid by His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor out of the Provincial Funds; and the Committee cannot doubt that the amount will be replaced hereafter from some appropriate source, when the subject is taken up in the proper quarter.

The Committee further state that the present emergency, in relation to this Establishment, has arisen from the difference of opinion existing on the subject between the House of Assembly and the Municipal Authorities in Halifax—the latter thinking the Bridewell ought to be a Provincial Establishment—and the former not being willing to recognise it in

that character.

On this part of the case, it has been represented to the Committee, that the Persons now in confinement in Bridewell amount to Thirty, of whom Nineteen have been sent from the Country, under convictions for crimes committed there, and that many others of them are individuals who, having been originally sent to the Bridewell as Criminals from the Country, have been, since their discharge, from time to time taken up in Halifax and recommitted as vagrants.

The Committee, independent of such comparisons, are of opinion that it is essential for maintaining, efficiently, the Administration of Criminal Justice throughout the Province—that a Bridewell or Penitentiary Establishment should be formed and kept up on a more enlarged system than is within the means of, or would be just to charge upon, the Metropolis alone; and they believe such an Establishment might be made, not only a means of punish-

ment, but instrumental in many cases also to the reformation of Culprits.

The Committee lastly state, that, under the unfortunate circumstances in which the Bridewell is now placed, it is evidently necessary to diminish, as much as possible, the present expenses of the Establishment, and to prevent the Town of Halifax being burdened with the

support of Vagrants and Offenders from other parts of the Province.

With this object, the Committee beg to suggest that the Secretary of the Province should write Letters to the Judges of the Supreme Court, before they set out on their ensuing Circuits, and to the First Justices of Sessions, informing them, that i nonsequence of the discontinuance, by the House of Assembly, of the usual Provincial Grant for the Bridewell, and by the Grand Jury of Halifax, of a County assessment for the present year, no Persons can be received there in future; and that the Judges and First Justices be recommended in their charges to the several Grand Juries on their Circuits, and in Halifax, to communicate these circumstances, in order that they may make provision at the expense of the several Counties for the future safe keeping and maintaining, within each County, of the Offenders and Vagrants therein, until some Provincial Establishment is formed.

I am directed by the Lords Commissioners of Privy Council for Trade, to transmit to you the enclosed copy of a Petition from the Chamber of Commerce in New-Brunswick, relative to the Duties on Salted Provisions and Wheat Flour in that Colony, and I am to request that in drawing the attention of Lord Glenelg to this Petition, you will also place under his notice the new regulations of the Act of April, 1831, (Chap. 24,) which was passed for the purpose of preparing for the re-admission of the Ships of the United States to trade with our Colonies.

In the second Section of the Act referred to, Salted Provisions and Wheat Flour, as well as Wood and Lumber, are rendered free of duty in the two Canadas; but in the 3d Sec. Wood and Lumber only are declared to be free in New-Brunswick, Nova-Scotia and Prince

Edward's Island.

The desire of the Lords of the Committee was to have extended to the three last named Colonies the exemption granted to the Canadas, but they refrained from doing so because it was stated by the Secretary of State that the finances of those three Colonies required the continuance of the Duties on Flour and Provisions.

The Lords of this Committee are aware of no Commercial grounds upon which they should avoid to place their Five Northern Colonies upon the same footing; and, therefore, I am to request that you will move Lord Glenelg to take this subject into his consideration, and to acquaint their Lordships with his present opinion thereon.

THE PETITION OF THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OF THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN, PROVINCE OF NEW-BRUNSWICK.

Humbly Sheweth:

That, by the 3d & 4th Wm. 4th, Cap. 59, Salted Provisions Imported into this Province, are subject to a Duty of twelve shillings per cwt. while, in the neighbouring Colony, Canada, no such charge is exacted under the same Law. In consequence, Pork here, from the North of Europe, &c. is in the habit of being lodged in our Custom-House Warehouses, till an opportunity is found or made for Quebec, to which it is then Shipped, and immedidiately returned Duty free, being so allowed as coming from a Colony; but such process subjecting the Merchant to trouble, much loss of time, and to a double Freight, Insurance,&c.

That by the above quoted Act, Wheat Flour Imported into the Province from the North of Europe, or the United States of America, is subject to a Duty of five shillings per Barrel, which operates severely on the Inhabitants of a climate, where the growing of Wheat is always matter of much uncertainty, and often of severe loss.—It is true, Foreign Flour may be Imported from the Public Warehouses in England Duty free; but such is its quality, that few are anxious to promote a Trade, furnishing one of the principal necessaries of

Your Petitioners therefore humbly pray your Lordships, during the approaching Session of Parliament, to have such alteration made in the Law as will obviate those evils; and they do so with confidence, not only from the justice of the measure, but from having been led to expect such change in consequence of a Letter from Lord Glenelg, to the late Lieutenant-Governor of this Province, dated 25th May, 1835, wherein those Duties are stated as

being to determine on the 1st January, 1836, copy of which is enclosed.

The Salaries of our Custom-House Officers being now provided for by the Legislature, without reference to Duties collected under Acts of the Imperial Parliament, no anxiety on that point can remain, besides the whole amount raised from Flour imported from duty, paying quarters, during the year ending 5th January last, amounted only to £1,224.

We pray your Lordships to take the matter under your consideration, and feel confident you will give it the usual attention bestowed by you on all subjects affecting the interests of

New-Brunswick.

I have laid before Lord Glenelg your Letter of the 11th January, enclosing a copy of a representation from the Chamber of Commerce of St. John's, New-Brunswick, to the Lords of the Treasury, on the subject of the Duties levied on Salted Provisions and Wheat Flour imported into that Province, and enquiring whether Lord Glenelg entertains any objection to the repeal of those Duties in New-Brunswick as well as in Nova-Scotia and Prince Edward Island

I am directed, in reply, to remind you, that so far back as the 6th April, 1835, the Secreretary of State intimated to the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade his acquiescence in their Lordship's proposal to repeal these Duties.—When, however, the local authorities became acquainted with the intentions of H. M. Government, the Lieutenant-Governor of Nova-Scotia pointed out two important objections to the measure, which were communicated to the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade on the 12th of August, 1835—the one was that the extinction of these Taxes would be almost destructive to the Farming interest in that Province, in whose favor they operate as a Bounty—and the other, that it would deprive the Colonial Government of the Fund from which the ring de la compania heavy

heavy expense of the Customs Department was defrayed.—It would, consequently, have become necessary to resort to the Provincial Legislature for other means of meeting that charge, and would have exposed the Executive Government of the Province to a very embarrassing discussion with the House of Assembly, with whom the expense of the Customs Establishment was, and still is, a subject of frequent complaint and remonstrance.

No objection has been made by the Governor of New-Brunswick and Prince Edward Island to the repeal of these Duties, and Lord Glenelg, therefore, sees no reason to prevent its execution in the case of those Colonies; but his Lordship is of opinion that it would be proper to except Nova-Scotia from the arrangement, until the Provincial Legislature shall

have provided the requisite Funds for the support of the Customs Establishment.

Lord Glenelg has accordingly referred the subject to Sir Colin Campbell, with instructions to make the necessary application to the Legislature, if, in his opinion, he can do so with a reasonable prospect of success.

In reference to the Despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, bearing date 5th March, 1838, on the subject of repealing the Duties levied by an Act of the Imperial Parliament, upon Salted Provisions and Wheat Flour, imported into

Nova-Scotia—the Committee Report:

That, when the subject of Colonial Duties was recently under discussion in the House of Assembly, the propriety of applying to the British Government for the repeal of the Duties herein referred to, was proposed and negatived, under an impression that the Agricultural interests were protected by the continuance of such Duties,-And as such articles are admitted duty free for the use of the Fisheries, that branch of industry would not be injured by the collection of the Duties when the articles were applied to other objects.—These principles may be sound in theory but they are not carried out in practice.—The articles are either entered for the use of the Fisheries, and find their way into the general market for consumption, or are received from the Warehouses of the neighbouring Provinces, and thus escape the Duty.—Greater facilities will now be afforded for this course of trade by withdrawing the Duties from these articles in New-Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and the trade of this Province will be merely subjected to the burden of a more circuitous voyage, without protecting our Agricultural interests, or except, in a very small degree, benefiting our Revenue.—The most obvious course of policy would appear to be, to have the Imperial Duties to apply to all the Colonies or to none, and leave to the Colonial Legislature the care of protecting their interests respectively, by imposing Duties for the protection of the Agricultural interests, when necessary, and remitting such Duties in favour of persons engaged in the Fisheries.—This course, the Committee would have had no hesitation in recommending, had not the subject been so recently considered in the Assembly, as the receipts of the Customs would have been affected but in a very slight degree.—It can only be necessary to state how unavailable the present Duties are, either for the protection of the Agricultural interests or the increase of the Customs, by the fact that this Duty, for the year 1837, amounted only to the sum of £257 5 7 on Salted Provisions and Wheat Flour.

It may also be proper to observe that under the operation of the Duty upon Foreign Flour, another interest of considerable magnitude and importance has started into existence, and which may require the continuance of such protection.—A large capital has been invested in Mills, Machinery, &c. for the Manufacture of Foreign Wheat into Flour, and large importations of Wheat have been made from the Warehouses of England, &c. for this object.—The Manufactory gives employment also to Coopers and Labourers to a great extent.—This branch of industry requires the protection of a Duty upon Foreign Flour to secure its continuance, and the persons engaged in it from serious loss if not total ruin.—The Committee therefore suggest that, should the Imperial Duty upon Foreign Flour be repealed, it should not take effect until after the first of May, 1839, to give time to the Colonial Legislature

I have received your Despatch, No. 25, of the 23d April, on the subject of the proposed Repeal of the Duties levied on Salted Provisions and Wheat Flour, Imported into Nova-Scotia, New-Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island.

Having referred your Despatch for the consideration of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, their Lordships have informed me that, in consequence of the objections felt by you and by the Lieutenant-Governor of New-Brunswick, to the immediate repeal of the Duty on Wheat Flour, and of the unimportant amount of the Importation of Salt Provisions, it did not appear to their Lordships advisable to take any steps for affecting the Repeal of those Duties, until they were apprised of the result of the reference proposed by you, and by Sir John Harvey, to be made to the Legislatures of Nova-Scotia and New-Brunswick, on the subject.

I have therefore to desire that you will, early in the next Session, bring the subject under the consideration of the Legislature of Nova-Scotia, and acquaint me, for the information of the Lords of the Treasury, with the opinion of the Council and Assembly.

I observe that His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, by the direction of Her Majesty's Government, has called the attention of the Legislature to the line of Communication between Nova-Scotia, New-Brunswick, and Lower Canada, with the view to the more speedy transmission of Her Majesty's Mails: I beg to acquaint you, for the information of His Excellency, that, having received the commands of my Lord the Post Master General to make every possible arrangement for facilitating the conveyance of the Mail between Halifax

Halifax and Fredericton, I travelled, in November last, the Great Post Road from hence to St. John, and from thence, by the Nerepis, to Fredericton, but I found many parts of the route from Halifax to the adjoining Province in a bad state; and that the Gumberland Mountain, presented the greatest obstacles to rapid travelling. I came, however, to the determination of transmitting the Mails through this Province, and part of New-Brunswick, at the rate of five miles an hour, including stoppages, but such was the excellent condition of the road from St. John to Fredericton, that I caused the Mails to be forwarded between those places at the rate of 8 miles an hour; and I firmly believe, if the Cumberland mountains could be avoided, and the other parts of the route put, and continually kept, in good order, that the Mails could be forwarded with nearly equal speed through this Province.

For the state of the Road between Halifax and Truro, I beg to refer you to the accompanying Communication from Mr. Ross, Mail Contractor; through Onslow and Londonderry, and from Westchester to Amherst, no very expensive repairs would be required.

Being well aware of the anxiety of Her Majesty's Government for the speedy transmission of the Mails between Canada, New-Brunswick and Halifax, and aware also of the exertions you have recently made for effecting, as far as you possibly could, that object; and as I observe by the Public Papers, the Legislature now in Session is to be called upon to afford Provincial aid towards the improvement of the Great Eastern Road, and there being a probability that reference will be made to you as to the state of the road between Halifax and Truro, I beg leave to state that the Mails meet much interruption on the road between Dartmouth and Fletcher's Bridge, a distance of thirteen miles, in consequence of the very narrow state of the road rendering it impossible to pass any team that may be met, especially long spars and other lumber, and which is the principal traffic on that road; from Fletcher's Bridge to Keys', a further distance of fifteen miles, the line of road is comparatively level and the width sufficient, but the soil is very soft, and consequently the road very deep in the spring and fall; from Keys' to Stewiacke, a further distance of sixteen miles, the whole route is a continuation of very steep and dangerous hills, so much so, that in the opinion of every practical road maker, it would be much easier and less expensive to abandon the present line and seek a better level, rather than attempt to put the present line in anything like what a Post Road should be. If however, repairing the present road be the intention, the Stewiacke ought to command the first attention—a high embankment is necessary at the south end, and as the water frequently overflows the road to the height of five and six feet; from Stewiacke to Truro, a distance of sixteen miles, with the exception of four miles, the whole line of road is excellent, but the material of which the road is formed is very soft, although there is excellent material all along this section, and which might be made available at a very moderate expense, no part on which the gravel would require to be carried more than one half mile. "Before closing this Report, we would beg leave most respectfully to suggest that your Excellency should state for the consideration of the Lieutenant-Governor of Nova-Scotia.

the necessity of having a distinguishing Light on Apple River Head."

"The accompanying Plan (copy of which and also of the Documents No. 1, 6, will be sent to the Nova-Scotia Commissioners,) will shew that a 4-8 or 5-8 Light would answer; 6-8 will do at Cape Enrage, as full 1-4 of the circle points to the Land, and a Light so directed cannot be seen from any part of the Bay of Fundy, and consequently that the expenditure of Oil would be small; while the Sea Light on Cape Enrage must advantage Coasters when running for Apple River during gales of wind, they still require a small Harbour Light on Hitty Point, especially as a Cove equal in extent of entrance to Apple River adjoins Pudsey Point, which, in the night and in thick weather and snow storms, is often taken for the other, and has by such mistake caused the loss of property and several lives."

We have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Letter of the 1st instant, inclosing the Copy of a Despatch from His Excellency Sir John Harvey, relative to the erection of a Light-House on "Apple River Head." We have also received from the Commissioners of Light-Houses in New-Brunswick, their report on the same subject. is no doubt but a Light-House at the entrance of Apple River would be of service to the Navigation of that part of the Bay of Fundy; but as the Light-House on Cape Enrage will be only about ten miles from the proposed site at Apple River Head, we do not think the Legislature of this Province would be disposed to erect a Light-House at that place, more especially as it is in comtemplation to build a Light-House next year at the entrance of Yarmouth Harbour, which will very much benefit the Navigation of the Bay of Fundy.

Letter which had been addressed to His Excellency some time about the month of May last, by me, in consequence of a Bill having passed the House of Assembly, during the last Ses-

sion, for regulating the future disposal of the Crown Lands in this Province.

I regret exceedingly that it is not in my power to comply with that command. But in stating respectfully to Her Majesty's Government, as I did in that communication, the just claim I conceived I had to be placed permanently upon the Civil List of this Province, and in pointing out the practical effect of this Bill, which, if it had passed into a Law, would have deprived me of the principal source from whence my emoluments are derived, by preventing the sale of Lands, and that without any equivalent having been offered, I am not aware of having been guilty of any breach of decorum, or of having, in the slightest degree, infringed upon that respectful deference and consideration to which the House of Assembly of this Province is justly entitled from all classes of Her Majesty's subjects.

I did not therefore think it necessary to keep a copy of that communication, and I now sincerely regret it, as I am fearful that inferences may be drawn from this fact, which could in no sense be borne out by the Letter. I have the satisfaction, however, of knowing that any doubt as to the nature of the communication, may soon be removed by reference to the

Colonial Office, where the original will be found.

In the absence and illness of the Attorney-General, I have the honor to send to you my opinion on the question of Drawbacks, on which the opinions of the Attorney and Solicitor General were required at the instance of the Board of Revenue, as signified by His Excellency's command in your Letter of the 18th June.

In fulfilling the duty required of the Attorney and Solicitor General in the Resolution of the House of Assembly, which requests His Excellency to direct the Crown Officers to investigate (among other subjects) certain claims for exemption from Duties on Foreign Goods.

I have carefully considered the papers which the Board of Revenue on this subject has, through the Secretary of the Province, submitted for the opinion of the Attorney and Soli-

citor-General.

These papers are confined to three statements and affidavits made on behalf of Messrs. Fairbanks and Allison, in support of claims for Drawbacks.—No case has been submitted, nor enquiry directed to any particular points; and, therefore, the only course to be pursued was to examine the papers at large, and state the several considerations which presented themselves as entitled to notice; and I have now the honor to report that, in two distinct particulars, I am of opinion the claims for Drawback just referred to are (to a certain extent) not warranted by Law.

FIRST.—In looking over Messrs. Fairbanks and Allison's claims, one question which arises

is. whether Duties which have been paid at the Customs on certain articles in each of the three statements can be drawn back under the Provincial Act 7, Wm. 4, Chap. 4, as being "Colonial Impost Duties thereon imposed in addition to and over and above the Imperial Duty thereon."—These articles are Gin, imported from Hamburg in 1837; High Wines, from the Mediterranean in 1837; and Gin, from Antwerp in 1838; the Duties on which, sought to be drawn back, at 1s. 4d. sterling per gallon, amount to £201 8 0 sterling.

The Imperial Act 3 and 4, Wm. 4, places on these articles, when imported into any of the British Possessions in America, a fixed and unconditional Duty of 1s. sterling, "and further, and conditionally the amount of any Duty payable for the time being on Spirits, the

Manufacture of the United Kingdom."

Whenever, therefore, the Provincial Legislature should impose a Duty on Spirits, the Manufacture of the United Kingdom, it, of necessity, would ipso facto call into operation, to the same extent, this previously contingent and conditional enactment of the Imperial Statute

just recited.

When the articles in question, on which Messrs. Fairbanks and Allison claim Drawback were imported, British Spirits were subject to a Colonial Duty of 1s. 4d. sterling under the Provincial Act 6th, Wm. 4, C. 32, and before the Drawback can be allowed, it must appear, either, that notwithstanding this circumstance, the conditional imposition of Duty under the Imperial Act was not in exercise, or that the Duty resulting from it was not an Imperial but a Colonial Duty.

But it is too clear to require argument that the British Parliament intended that Foreign Spirits imported into the Colonies should pay, in addition to a fixed and certain Duty of 1s. sterling, also the amount of any Colonial Duty on British Spirits; it is likewise obvious that this additional Duty is an Imperial enactment, from the consideration that it would attach independently of any Colonial Law imposing it, and although the Colonial Legislature should be entirely silent in relation to the Foreign article, or should be hostile to imposition of additional Duty on it.

It is true this Imperial enactment is not in operation until called into exercise by the Colonial imposition of Duty on the British article, but in this case the Provincial Act operates by creating the state, or in other words, raising the condition upon which the Imperial Act was to take effect, and not by creating the principle or authority which produces the result.

The Provincial Act 6th, Wm. 4th, C. 32, has however not only imposed a Duty of 1s. 4d. on British Spirits, but also imposed a similar Duty on Foreign Spirits, and it is from this circumstance, I suppose, that the question has been raised.—Had the enactment been unexplained, it might have afforded some ground for charging Foreign Spirits with a third Duty; it could not in itself alter the nature of a Duty imposed and existing independently of Perhaps a different view of the subject may have been drawn from a hasty consideration of the 11th Section of the Imperial Act (3 and 4, Wm. 4, C. 59,) but I think, without any just foundation; for that Clause is plainly only intended to guard against an accumulation of Duties beyond the design of the Imperial Legislature, and not in any manner to affect the principle on which the Act proceeds, or to defeat its objects or diminish the Duties it imposes, as appears to me to be alike apparent from the whole Section itself as from the general tenor of the Act throughout.

Indeed nothing can be more obvious than that the policy of the Imperial Parliament was to preserve, in certain cases, a distinctive Duty which should be beyond the power of Colonial interference; the mode adopted for enforcing that policy is clear and effective in itself, and is fortified by the general enactment of the 56th Section, which declares to be null and void any existing or future Law in any of the British Possessions in America, in any wise repugnant to that Act; and it follows that in a matter like this, touching the General and Commercial relations of the Empire, and thus carefully regulated, no power constitutionally exists in a Colonial Legislature either to repeal or indirectly to defeat the enact-

ments of the Imperial Parliament.

If the claim under consideration was well founded, the effect would be frustrate, to a certain extent, the policy of the General Government, by admitting Foreign Spirits in certain cases, upon payment, in effect of a Duty of 1s. sterling only, while British Spirits, brought into the Market at the same time might be subject to a Duty of 1s. 4d. sterling.

Butn

But in fact the claims under consideration are as little supported by the Colonial Act as they are consonant with the policy and enactments of the Imperial Parliament.

The Provincial Act 6, Wm. 4, C. 32, which has been under consideration, has the follow-

ing recital and enactment, (Section 20.)

"And whereas, in and by the said Act of the Imperial Parliament, for regulating the Trade of the British Possessions abroad, in addition to the Rates and Duties thereby imposed on the said articles respectively, it is directed that there shall be charged, levied, and collected, upon Brandy, Gin, Cordials, Rum and Spirits, Sugar and Coffee, not being of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of any of the British Possessions, but being of Foreign Growth, Produce or Manufacture, the amount of any Duty charged, imposed or payable, upon the said several articles respectively, being of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of some of the British Possessions, by or under any Colonial Act."

"Be it therefore enacted, That the several Colonial Impost Duties, in and by the second column of the said Table of Duties hereunto annexed, imposed, or charged, upon or against any Brandy, Gin, Cordial, Rum, Spirits, Sugars or Coffee, not being the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of some of the British Possessions, shall not apply or be charged or chargeable against the said several articles respectively, save and except, only in such cases, when, under the said Act of the Imperial Parliament, the said articles shall be exempt or free from the payment of the said Imperial Duties by the said Act imposed, or from the payment of the Colonial Impost Duties by this Act imposed, upon the same articles, being of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of any of the British Possessions."

Thus, the Colonial Legislature precludes, in words, every question as to the nature and operation of the Duties; and it is difficult to understand how the Duties claimed to be drawn back in the present case, or in the case of Sugars and other articles similarly circumstanced, could be supposed to be "Colonial Duties, over and above the Imperial Duties," under the words of the 6th, Wm. 4, C. 36, by force of which, the Drawback is claimed, when, by our own Legislature, they are described to be payable under the Imperial Act, and it is enacted, that they shall not be charged as Colonial, so long as they shall so continue to be

payable as Imperial Duties.

SECONDLY.—Another objection which appears to be part of the claims made for Drawbacks of Duties by Messrs. Fairbanks and Allison, arises from the fact, that the articles on which the Duty is charged, have, in some cases, been purchased, not immediately with the proceeds of Fish and Oil of the Province, but with the proceeds of articles bought after a

circuity of Voyages, with the proceeds of Fish and Oil.

These cases do not come within the words of the Law, which authorizes the Board of Revenue to exempt from Colonial Duty, "all such Foreign Goods, as shall appear to have been purchased with the proceeds of Fish and Oil, caught, &c. and these articles have not been in fact, so purchased, nor can I bring myself to think they are within the meaning of the Act, or that it was the intention of the Legislature, that after any unrestricted number of Voyages, (for if the principle be admitted, there is no limit,) property augmented by the profits of many transmutations in different parts of the world, should form the subject of the Drawback.

This objection applies to all the Duties claimed to be drawn back, contained in the first and third statements, amounting to \mathcal{L} including Duties on Foreign Spirits,

to the amount of £ liable to the objection first stated.

I have the honor, therefore, to report, that for the reasons assigned, it is my opinion, that as far as I can judge from the Papers submitted to me, no part of the claims under consideration are supported by Law, except those composed in the 2d statement, and from them must be deducted £9 6s. 5d. the Duty on high Wines, which is not entitled to Drawback, under the objection first above stated.—In these views, the whole amount of Drawback in this case, will be £379 9s. 8d. Sterling.—I return the several Papers received.

Humbly Sheweth:

That in the execution of the trust committed to them, the Trustees of the Yarmouth Academy are required to report, annually, to your Honorable House, the general state of the Institution, shewing its Income and Expenditure—which Report they respectfully beg leave to submit as follows, viz:—

- 13 Are taught Greek, Latin, Mathematics, Arithmetic, History, Geography, and use of the Globes—Tuition, 17s. 6d. per quarter.
- 12 Are taught Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, English Grammar, History, Composition, Geography, and use of the Globes—Tuition, 15s. per quarter.
- 6 Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, and English Grammar,—Tuition, 12s. 6d. per quarter.
- 31 Of which four are free.

The Trustees' agreement with the Teacher having expired on the 14th of June, a new engagement was concluded with him, commencing on the 21st August last, by which arrangement the amount of Tuition Fees for the year, cannot be made up before the 21st August, current.

The Income of the Institution, arising from that source, is therefore presented in the following Statement, made up to the 17th instant.

During the last Summer, it was found necessary to repair and new paint the outside of the Building, a considerable part of the interior which remained unfinished, has also been completed, the whole amounting as above, to £66 14s. 6d. and it is estimated that a sum not exceeding £12 would put the premises in such ample order, that in future, the rents will be sufficient to defray the expense of all ordinary repairs.

The Trustees therefore have much pleasure in being able to state, that the Building now almost finished, is creditable to the liberality of your Honorable House, and to the exertions of the people of Yarmouth, to which place it is an ornament, and in every respect suitable to the purpose for which it was erected; and the Trustees venture to affirm, that in no instance has the Public Bounty been expended with more scrupulous attention to economy; the work has been chiefly performed by contract, and no charge for services of any kind, either in the shape of Commission or otherwise, has ever been made by the present. Trustees or their predecessors, on the contrary, they have cheerfully devoted much valuable time, besides contributing liberally, in a pecuniary point of view, in order to promote the establishment of so desirable an Institution.

APPENDIX Nos. 26, 27.

In thus accounting to your Honorable House, for the manner in which your bounty has been applied, and the benefits it has produced, the Trustees of the Academy date, from its commencement, the first effort to improve the Education of this place; by its means, several young men have already received such instruction, as otherwise would have been beyond their reach, while the number now studying the higher branches, forcibly shew the estimation in which Education is held.

The Trustees however, deeply regret to inform your Honorable House, that in consequence of circumstances beyond their control, they do not consider the Institution so firmly established as they could wish: the greatest obstacle they have had to contend with in the discharge of their duty, and indeed the only impediment to the complete success of the Institution, has been the insurmountable difficulty of procuring an experienced Teacher.

The several Grants of your Honorable House for its support, although liberal, have been considered of too uncertain continuance, to warrant the Trustees in holding out encouragement for more than one year; consequently, the reply to all their applications and enquiries after a suitable person, has invariably been, that an engagement for so limited a period

could not be accepted.

The only candidates, qualified in any respect, that would take the situation on the terms that could be offered, have been young men, exclusively educated for a particular profession, which, being with them, the primary object in view, it need be no matter of surprise, if an Institution, depending so much on the experience and industry of the Teachers, has not attained that eminence which, under more favorable circumstances, might reasonably have been expected.

Believing that every similar Institution throughout the Province has experienced, in a certain degree, the same difficulty, the Trustees humbly submit to the wisdom of your Honorable House, the advantage of extending the usual Grant for their support, to three or four years; competent Teachers might then be employed, under whose management, by the time specified, it is presumed they would be permanently established, and able to support

themselves without Legislative aid.

By the returns of the Commissioners of Schools for the County of Yarmouth, there appears to have been sixty common Schools under their direction during the last year, in which 1875 children were taught; taking these in connexion with the whole Province, the number must be great, and the result important, particularly when it is considered how very defective the great proportion of the common Schools are, and the acknowledged necessity of introducing a better class of Teachers amongst them.

The Academies, it is fondly expected, will ultimately be the means of supplying this great deficiency, which, apart from all other considerations, is sufficient to recommend these

Institutions to the continued support and protection of your Honorable House.

The Committee have much satisfaction in bearing testimony to the correctness and punctuality of the Collector of Impost and Excise for the Port of Halifax, as well as of some of these Officers in the Out-Ports; the Committee would, however, be wanting in their duty were they not also to state that several of the Collectors of Impost and Excise are considerably in arrears for the Balance of Bonds in their hands to 31st December, 1837, and have made no remittance for Duties paid or secured for 1838, as will be seen by the general Abstract of their Accounts herewith submitted. The Committee would therefore recommend that the Commissioners of the Revenue be requested to take prompt measures for the recovery of those arrears, as it would be unjust towards the Securities should they hereafter be called upon to make good deficiencies, which would probably not have arisen if due vigilance had been used in the collection of these Duties. The Committee would also recommend that the Treasurer be instructed to require greater punctuality in the Quarterly Returns which the Collectors of Impost are required by Law to make to that Officer; and that a List of the Bonds unpaid at the expiration of the year, with their respective dates, amounts, &c. should accompany the Accounts Current of those Collectors for the information of the Legislature.

The Committee have also to state that a number of the Collectors of Light Duty for the Out-Ports are considerably in arrears for sums collected to 31st December last, and recommend that the Commissioners of Revenue should take the necessary measures to enforce the recovery of these arrears. The returns of several of these Officers are not attested, as

the Law requires.

The Committee are unable to furnish a statement of the Imports of Foreign Goods, and the Duties collected thereon during the past year—the Returns from the Custom House, comprising only the two first Quarters of the year, and being made out in such form as would require much labor to complete a condensed abstract of the quantity of each Article of Impost, the Committee are of opinion that such Abstract is necessary for the information of the Legislature, and would enable the Committee to report much more satisfactorily if such an Abstract could be furnished, in future, at an early day after the meeting of the Legislature.

The Balance in the Provincial Treasurer's hands being larger than usual, amounting to £18367, including the Balances of the Sable Island and Passengers' Act Accounts, the Committee are of opinion that a part of this sum would be most advantageously applied in

paying off a portion of the Funded Debt.

The subject of the opening of the College having been brought before the Board, it is Resolved, that the College be opened for public instruction on the first day of October next. Resolved, That until the Funds and circumstances of the Institution may admit of more extended operations, it is the intention of the Board the following Classes or Professorships shall be conducted therein, viz:

1st. The Classical Languages.

2d. The Mathematics and Natural Philosophy.

3d. Moral Philosophy, Logic and Rhetoric.

Resolved, That the Third Class be conducted by the Reverend Doctor M'Culloch, who,

for the present, is appointed President.

Resolved, That public notice be forthwith given, for Gentlemen competent to fill the two other Professorships above named, to send in their names to the Secretary of the Board on or before the fifteenth day of September next, as Candidates for such Offices, to be submitted to the consideration of the Board.

Resolved, That the Salary of the President be, and it is hereby established, at Four Hundred Pounds per Annum, over and above the Fees of the Classes, and be payable from the

first day of October next, half-yearly.

Resolved, That an application be respectfully made to the Honorable S. S. Blowers, who is now the sole Trustee of the Funds of the Institution in England, requesting him to execute all such Documents as may be necessary for transferring those Funds into the names of the Governors for the time being, or their appointees, and for receiving the Dividends and Interests that have already accrued thereupon, or that may be due, and owing in respect thereof.

The Meeting was then adjourned.

At a Meeting of the Governors of Dalhousie College, at Governwent-House, on Saturday, 15th day of September, 1838.

The Secretary reads the last Minutes, and states that the Honorable Sampson Salter Blowers, the late Chief Justice, had agreed to transfer the Funds in England to the Board, and had executed the necessary powers of Attorney for that purpose, which are transmitted to the Board.

The Secretary reads a Letter addressed to Messrs. Ransom and Co. Bankers, London, to accompany the powers, directing them to receive and re-invest the monies of the Institution with the least possible delay, in the three per cent. Consolidated Annuities, in the name of the Governors of Dalhousie College, at Halifax, in the Province of Nova-Scotia, which is approved of by the Board.

Resolved, That the Salaries to be given for the present to the two Professors of Classics and Mathematics, and Natural Philosophy, owing to the limited means of the Board, are fixed at One Hundred and Fifty Pounds Currency each, in addition to the Fees of their Classes.

Applications from the following Gentlemen:—The Rev. Edmund A. Crawley, Mr. James Patterson, the Rev. James M'Intosh, the Rev. Dugald M'Kichan, the Rev. Thomas Twining, D. D. Alexander F. Sawers, M. D. and the Rev. Alexander Romans, are then read by the Secretary, for the Classical, and the Mathematical, and Natural Philosophy Professorships—whereupon, the Board resolve that for the present the Rev. Alexander Romans be appointed Professor of the Classical Languages, and the Rev. James M'Intosh be appointed Professor of Mathematics and Natural Philosophy in the College; and the Governors request that the President and Professors do meet and draw up a code of regulations for the Government of the College, according to the directions of the Act.

Resolved, That the Speaker and the Treasurer, with the Secretary, be a Committee to make internal arrangements for the accommodation of Professors and Classes, and for the disposal of such parts of the Buildings at rent, by Public Auction or otherwise, as may be

proper.

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Board, that J. W. Nutting, Esquire, be, from the 1st October, Treasurer and Secretary, at a Salary of Thirty-five Pounds per annum; and that at the next meeting, he submit an Account of Expenses incurred by him in all previous matters connected with the College.

Resolved, That the request of the Mechanics' Institute to clean and paint the rooms oc-

cupied by them, be agreed to.

The Meeting was then adjourned.

SIR-

I have the honor to enclose the Boat Journal for the last Season, and to report, in obedience to the Lieutenant-Governor's commands, on the subject of that service, that agreeably to the proposal sanctioned by His Excellency, one portion of the grant has been appropriated to the protection of the Revenue and Fisheries in the Bay of Saint Mary, and the residue to the Annapolis River.—The seizure of four American Fishing Vessels is now before the Court of Vice Admiralty—a number of Packages of Goods have been detained for payment of the Impost Duties, and there are other Goods waiting for prosecution in the Courts—the cargo of one Illicit Foreign Trader seized has been of great service in checking a species of Trade which has been pursued for several years to a frightful extent, and which, if not suppressed, will eventually annihilate the Revenue in the Bay of Fundy—I allude to the Trade arising from free export and import regulations.

The Light dues (inclusive of some securities held) are upwards of £80, an amount, I believe, exceeding that of any previous year, notwithstanding the reduction caused by the Act of last Session, by which assuming the average of the last three years as the amount of Foreign Tonnage employed here annually, a permanent duty reduction to at least £80 is made in these duties at this Port—there is also an arrear of £100 left by my predecessor in

the Office, which is likely to become subject of litigation.

In the Impost Duties I anticipate an increase—the Customs Returns for the three quarters exhibited an amount of Imports within £700 of the entire year 1837, it is therefore fair

presumption this increase is considerable.

I beg leave most respectfully to submit to the Lieutenant-Governor, that as the extent of Revenue to be derived from these Duties is entirely dependent on the efficiency of the Water Guard, the propriety of His Excellency's recommending a continuance of at least a portion of this grant for the Season 1839—unless a Boat is employed at Digby, the Revenue cannot be collected, and to this service is entirely owing the great increase in the year 1836, in which year the amount was increased from £209 to £687.

GENTLEMEN-

In the last Session of the Legislature, two plans explanatory of Petitions, suggesting an alteration of the Great Eastern Road between Keys' and Polly's, having been under the consideration of the House of Assembly; the Lieutenant-Governor was requested " to appoint fit and competent persons to examine the old Road from Keys' Inn to the end of the new Brookfield Road; and also, the several new lines of Road proposed between those points, and to report whether, in their opinion, the old line should be abandoned, and if so, which of the proposed lines should be adopted."

On the 29th May last, you were selected by the Lieutenant-Governor and Her Majesty's Council, for the execution of this service, but, owing to your having been hitherto otherwise employed by His Excellency, it yet remains to be performed. His Excellency trusts, however, that the Season will not be too far advanced on the return of Mr. McKenzie from Cape-Breton, to admit of your carefully examining, together, as well the proposed routes, as the present Road between those points, in order that the required Reports and Estimates

may be submitted to the House in the early part of the approaching Session.

The plans to which I have alluded, were not prepared by the direction of the Lieutenant-Governor, nor have they ever been seen by him; and, as they are not to be found among the Records of the Assembly, you will not have the advantage of a reference to them. But I have been so fortunate as to obtain, through the kindness of a Gentleman much interested in the discovery of the best line of Road, the plan I now enclose, on which the proposed new routes are delineated. This may serve in the absence of the original plans, as a tolerably good guide for you, especially as regards Faulkner's line, of whose own sketch, I am given to understand, that which I send is a copy; but with respect to the alteration proposed by Messrs. Archibald and Urquhart, the Attorney-General has assured me, that it will be impossible to discover it without their personal assistance. If you anticipate any such difficulty, you may consider yourselves at liberty to request either of these persons, or both, should you deem it absolutely necessary, to accompany you as guides, to shew the line discovered by them, taking care, however, not to add, needlessly, to the expense of the Sur-

In addition to the particulars usually inserted in the Road Estimates, His Excellency would wish you to ascertain and specify the probable amount of compensation that would be expected or awarded to the owners of the Lands through which the line which you may recommend for adoption may be carried.

SIR-

In compliance with His Excellency's commands, communicated to me by your Letter of date 20th November last, I proceeded to examine the present Road from Polly's to Keys', and is a succession of very bad hills, all attempts at improving it, would be a mere waste of money, therefore, I think the present Road will have to be abandoned; then I very minutely examined the proposed lines by Messrs. Wightman, Archibald and Tremain, which are over such rising ground, that I consider them impracticable, with the exception of a few miles of Mr. Archibald's line; then I proceeded and explored the Country between Polly's and Keys' in all directions, and followed a valley from the new Road at Polly's to the Shubenacadie River, which is level enough for a Rail Road, a distance of ten miles; I then crossed the Shubenacadie River, at Nelson's, and examined the line of Road already opened, from Nelson's to Keys', a distance of eight miles, four furlongs and thirty-six rods, which is very level, with the exception of two short hills, which I have explored, and can be easily avoided; this line from from Polley's to Keys', is eighteen miles, four furlongs and thirty-six rods, and I consider, if adopted, will be one of the greatest improvements ever made in the Province—very level, and will shorten the distance two miles, the Road will be easily made, as the surface is very even, and the timber light, and no excavations or embankments of any consequence.

The sites for the Bridges over the Shubenacadie and Stewiacke Rivers, I consider will be very safe, as the current is not so rapid as further up the streams, by crossing the Shubenacadie two Bridges will be avoided, one over the St. Andrew's and one over Gay's

River.

The line by the Black Rock to Keys', parts with the line that crosses the Shubenacadie River, at Turner's, which the green line on the accompanying plan points out, and passes over a valley to the Black Rock Road, a distance of seven miles, and six furlongs—this Section is very level, but the surface of the soil very uneven or rugged, which will make the Road very expensive—considerable excavations and embankments will be necessary.

From the Black Rock to Keys', two miles—this Section is tolerably level, but the ground over which it passes is broken, and will be difficult to make; the whole distance from the new Road near Polley's, including the Black Rock Road, and until it meets the line that crosses the Shubenacadie, near Keys', is twenty miles, two furlongs, and one mile and three

quarters longer than the level that crosses the Shubenacadie.

Specification of the proposed Lines.

1st. The line should be opened and regularly curved, twenty-six feet wide, that is to say: twenty-one feet for the Road, and two and a half feet for each side drain, then the short hills to be cut down and brought to the hollows, so as to give the Road a gradual slope—on the level, the surface soil to be thrown outside of the aforesaid twenty-six feet, until it comes to the hard earth, by this the Road will have a good foundation, and six inches of materials will be of more service over it, than one foot over a Road made of the surface soil; I have known this by experience in repairing Roads.

2d. The side drains to be made two and a half feet wide, and one foot three inches deep, the cross drains to be sufficiently large to vent the water at all seasons, they should not be

more than thirty rods apart in dry soil, and fifteen rods in wet soil.

3d. The Road to be gravelled where it is convenient, and where not, to be covered with hard earth, the Road to have a declention of nine inches from the centre to the sides—the trees to be cut down each side of the Roads two rods wide, for to admit the air.

Estimate of the proposed lines, as above specified.

1st Section, from Polley's to Tay's, five miles and two furlongs—this Section is nearly level, with the exception of one hundred and twenty rods, which rises one foot in forty feet.

Probable expence of making five miles and two furlongs, at £250 per

The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Peter Furlong, praying a return of Duties on a quantity of Malt-beg to report, that Petitioner, in the year 1837, imported Malt from Hamburgh into this Port, on which no Duty was demanded. That in the Autumn of the same year, Petitioner agreed before leaving for England with individuals here, to deliver them Malt in the Spring of 1838, at a certain price. That upon entering the Malt at the Custom House, no Duty was demanded, but subsequently, he was called on by the Officers of Customs, who informed him, they thought Malt was liable to Duty, and required him to give a conditional Bond, until the question could be referred to the Board of Customs at Home, and they having decided that Maltiwas liable to Duty, the Petitioner had to pay, as appears by the receipt of the Officers of Customs, £22 10s. Sterling, being 15 per cent. advalorem, on 320 Bags of Malt-which sum Petitioner states to be £29 18s. 6d. Currency, but which cannot be more than £27.5. The Committee think this sum ought to be refunded to Petitioner.

The Committee to whom was referred the Petition from the Inhabitants of the County of Digby, in reference to the Court-House built at Annapolis, having enquired into the facts,

beg leave to report:

That the presentation of Money to be assessed within the County of Annapolis was made by the Grand Jury at a Term of the Supreme Court in said County, under the 3d Section of the Act 40, Geo. III, Chapter 5, until the year 1834, when the said Section was repealed. That the Grand Jurors residing in the Western District were not summoned to attend the General Sessions of the Peace held in the Eastern District; and in the April and November Terms in the year 1837, when the sum of £2,400 was assessed for the new Court House, it does not appear that any Grand Jurors from the Western District were present. Mr. Cutler, the Sheriff of the County, whom the Committee have examined, cannot say that there were, nor is it at all likely that any should be present, serving at Courts which they were legally excused from attending.—Mr. Cutler also states that after the old Court House was burnt down, a meeting of the Magistrates from all parts of the County, including several from the Western District, was held at Annapolis, when the size and nature of the new building were unanimously agreed to, though the cost was at that time unknown. It further appears that the old Court-House at Digby, which was built about thirty years ago, (as was also the Court-House that was burnt down,) by an assessment on the whole County, is still a serviceable building, though of course very far inferior to the new Stone Court House at Annapolis. The Inhabitants of Digby are admitted to have paid almost Eight Hundred Pounds towards the building of the new Court-House, part of which was levied after the Act for dividing the County had passed, and the County of Digby had ceased in fact to have any interest therein.—Under these circumstances, the Committee think it but an act of justice to the County of Digby, that a part of the sum so assessed and paid by them, should be refunded by the County of Annapolis, and recommend that leave should be given to bring in a Bill to that effect, leaving the sum that ought to be refunded, and may be directed by the Bill, if any, to the discretion of the House.

I beg leave to state to you, for His Excellency's information, that I have carefully examined the Dartmouth Road from Bell's to Fletcher's Bridge, a distance of twelve miles. In the first place, this Road was opened, and merely made for the winter, and about seven miles remain in that state, with the exception of some repairs, and scarcely average a width of thirteen feet, which is inconveniently and dangerously narrow for vehicles, when cumberously loaded, to pass. The embankment at the south end of Beaver Dam Bridge, about one mile from Bell's, where it joins the Bridge, is about seven feet high and thirteen feet wide—this renders it exceedingly dangerous, and it becomes necessary to increase the width to twenty-three feet; and the whole of this Road should be widened to twenty-one feet, exclusive of the side drains.

The materials along this line are every where good, but being rough and rocky, and banks

to cut down, which make it difficult to widen.

Estimate of the probable expense of increasing the width of the Dartmouth Road to

twenty-one feet, exclusive of the side drains.

The Committee appointed to take into consideration the best means of improving the Agricultural interest of the Province, have agreed to report as follows:—that, in the opinion of the Committee, the first and greatest object of importance at present, is the continuance of the Bounties to encourage the erection of Oat Mills and Kilns.

They therefore recommend that the sum of £20 be granted to each County for that purpose; and if there are more than one applicant in any one County, that the sum of £30 shall be drawn and divided amongst the several applicants, under the same rules and regulations that such Bounties were formerly granted.

They therefore recommend that 3d. per Bushel be given to every person who shall apply any quantity of burnt Lime to the soil, but not to exceed £20 in and for any one County.

They also recommend that the sum of pounds be granted for the purchase of Rams,

Sampson Breed.

They further recommend that the Law should be altered for the Weighing of Beef, compelling the weigher to be sworn into Office, and not allowed to make any other deduction from the weight than for the bruised Beef, and that in future all Cattle sold by the Pound shall be understood to include Beef, Hide and Tallow, and all weighed accordingly.

The undersigned holding the Offices of Master of the Rolls in Chancery for the Province of Nova-Scotia, and of Judge of the Court of Vice Admiralty at Halifax, has the

honor to represent to your Lordship,

That, for the transaction of the business of these Courts, and holding the Public Sittings thereof, he found it indispensable, immediately on receiving those appointments, to direct that each of them should be held publicly in the apartment in the Province Building, appropriated for the Sessions of the Supreme Court of the Province, and on the first and third Monday of every Month, and also on such intervening days as should be found necessary for hearing and disposing of all Suits or questions pending, excepting only unless in urgent cases, the days in which the Supreme Court sat, and the three weeks of the Spring as well as of the Autumn Circuits, when the several Members of the Bar were usually out of town.

That for the purpose of the frequent sittings thus rendered necessary, the services of an Officer to prepare the Court and Robing Rooms for the Court and Bar, to arrange the fires necessary in the severe part of the year, and to discharge the duties of Crier and Messenger, became indispensable, and a competent person was accordingly appointed from the

commencement for that Office, and with the sanction of the Lieutenant-Governor.

That the expense of defraying the charge for his attendance, and for the requisite Fuel were estimated annually, at about from twenty to twenty-five Pounds, and as similar charges for the Supreme Court had, from an early date, been provided by the Grand Jury among

other County Charges, a representation of such a provision for the Chancery and Admiralty Court was made on two different occasions, to that Body; but they considered these Tribunals to be of a public and general character, and on that ground declined adopting this as an

item of charge upon the County.

That, for a few months, the Salary of the Crier was paid by the undersigned, but subsequently he represented the subject to the Lieutenant-Governor, in order that a provision might be made for this service, either by the Assembly, or from the Casual Revenue. When His Excellency, unwilling at that time, for particular reasons, to adopt either method, directed the sum of Ninety Pounds to be paid for those purposes, into the hands of the undersigned, out of the balance of a fine which had been paid into the Treasury, and remained unappropriated; with this sum the amount of the Crier's Fees and expenses of Fuel, with other trifling charges, were fully satisfied, until the end of the year 1837. But on renewing the application to meet the charge for the current year, it was found that the fund arising from fines at his dispssal was exhausted.

That as the small sum of £20 Sterling is the full extent required for a service which is wholly indispensable to holding those Courts in the face of the public, the undersigned having already mentioned to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor the apparent reasonableness of including this among other similar charges which have been placed on the Casual Revenue, and are now paid therefrom—begs leave most respectfully to solicit your Lordship's notice of this subject, and direction as to the mode in which this requisite ser-

vice may be compensated.

No. 1849. An Act to continue and amend the Act to encourage the Manufacture of To-bacco in this Province, by granting a Bounty thereon.

No. 1850. An Act to continue the Act for granting a Bounty on Chocolate manufactured in this Province.

No. 1853. An Act respecting the exportation of Grindstones from this Province.

No. 1854. An Act to amend the Act for the support and regulation of Light-Houses.

And Whereas, the said Acts have been referred to the Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, appointed for the consideration of all matters relating to Trade and Foreign Plantations; and the said Committee have reported as their opinion to Her Majesty, that the said Acts should be left to their operation; Her Majesty was thereupon this day pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve the said Report—whereof, the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being, of Her Majesty's Province of Nova-Scotia, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Extract of a Letter from the Right Honorable Lord Glenelg, dated Downing-Street, 3d January, 1839, to Lieutenant-General Sir C. Campbell, K. C. B. &c. &c.

"In my Despatch of this day's date, I have transmitted to you an Order of Her Majesty, in Council, leaving to their operation various Acts, passed by the Legislature of Nova-Scotia in the Month of March last, among which are several which, although they have received Her Majesty's confirmation, demand from me a few observations:—Nos. 1846, 1849 & 50, revive three Acts, passed by the Legislature in their previous Session, containing Clauses respecting Barter, and granting Drawbacks and Bounties on various articles of home production.

"I have more than once stated to you the objections entertained by Her Majesty's Government to the principle of Bounties; and my Despatch of the 20th April last instructed you to refuse your assent to the revival of either of the above mentioned Acts, if they contained Clauses of a similar nature.

"I am aware, however, that the present Acts had received your assent prior to the date of my Despatch, but I beg you distinctly to understand that you are not to give your assent to any Act which may in future be presented for your acceptance, if it should contain either of these objectionable provisions.

"The Acts having only a short time to continue in operation, Her Majesty's Government have refrained from taking any step which might embarrass the Colonial Finances, and have therefore advised Her Majesty to permit them to expire.

"The Act No. 1852 for Incorporating the Nova-Scotia Whaling Company is defective in several important particulars—neither the Capital, nor the number of the Shares, nor any of the regulations by which the business of the Company is to be carried on, are stated in it.

"Further, the object of the Company is so imperfectly set forth, that no security is given to the public against the misapplication of the corporate privilegos by their being used to carry on any other Mercantile speculation, as long as the same is independent of Insurance, and that security is specially excepted.

"Under these circumstances this Act will not be submitted to Her Majesty, in Council, un-

til it shall have been amended in these particulars."

The Committee on Trade and Manufactures having considered the various Petitions referred to them, report as follows:

First.—As to the Petition of John Carten, the Committee are of opinion that the amount of duty paid by him on Liquor, supposed to be Brandy, should be granted to him by the House.

Second.—As to the Petition of James Dawson, the Committee recommend that the amount of duty paid by him on Agricultural Implements imported, for the first time into Pictou, as models, should be granted him by the House.

Third.—As to the Petition of Maurice Nash, for a bounty upon Improved Machinery, said to have been invented by him for Saw Mills, the Committee, presuming that an improvement has, in point of fact, been effected by the Petitioner, cannot, however, recommend a sum of money being granted to him, as an inconvenient precedent might be established by such a grant; and the Committee do not admit the propriety of remunerating the authors of inventions, though confessedly useful, out of the public funds. The Law provides them the means of securing an exclusive right to the fruits of their ingenuity.

Fourth.—As to the Petition of Rusus J. Sanders, the Committee recommend a grant, as the sum, though trisling, ought not to have been charged, and the facts have been authen-

ticated.

Fifth.—As to the Petition of George P. Lawson and Henry Lawson, the Committee report that the sum of £129 18s. 9d. Sterling, was paid by them at the Custom-House in Dollars at 4s. 4d. on the importation of Mill Machinery from the United States, and the propriety of granting the whole or part of the said sum to the Petitioners is submitted by the Committee to the House.

Sixth.—As to the Petition of the Directors of the Anti-dry Rot Company, the Committee, in the hope that the Public may be benefitted by the introduction of the invention referred to in the Petition, into this Province, and that the Directors may be induced to incur the necessary expense, recommend that the exclusive right thereto should be secured to them by an Act of the Assembly for twelve years, from the 11th instant, pursuant to the prayer of their Petition.

Seventh.—As to the Petition of William Cunnabell, the Committee recommend that the Duty paid by him on a Printing Press of a new construction should be granted him, on the

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facts being properly authenticated.

THE Committee on Law, beg leave to report-

First.—As to the Petition of James D. Blair and John Henderson, that the Petitioners seem to the Committee to be entitled, by the general and well established principle, to a way from the main road (there being no other access) across Daniel Cook's lot to their own, for the removing of Marsh mud and all other lawful purposes, at convenient times and seasons. The Committee, therefore, as nothing but a case of grave necessity could justify the Legislature in an interference with private rights, do not recommend the House proceeding further in this matter.

Second.—As to the Petition of Stephen Harrington—the Road complained of by the Petitioner seems, by his own statement, to have been used as a public highway for fourteen years, since he became a resident at Five Islands, and no account is given of the origin of the right thus acquired as against the Proprietor; the circumstance of no return of such Road existing, cannot destroy its character as a highway dedicated to the public, which a user of less time than fourteen years is sufficient to raise in this Province as it is in England.

Third.—As to the Petition of Daniel Dickson, Esquire, the Committee, although they believe the Guide to Town Officers is an useful manual, regret that they cannot recommend any grant in respect thereof.

The Committee of Public Expenditure to whom were referred the Petitions of the Overseers of the Poor for the Townships of Pictou, Horton, Annapolis and Barrington, craving to be reimbursed sums expended by them respectively in the maintenance of Transient paupers—having maturely considered those subjects, beg leave to recommend that the accounts accompanying those Petitions be paid the applicants therein mentioned, excepting that of Pictou, which they have thought it right to reduce from £48 7s. to £36 10s. 11d. The Committee have also had under their consideration, the Petition of William Adamson, a private individual of the Town of Pictou, praying the payment of an account incurred in the support of two Men, said to be Transient Paupers, which, under the circumstances of the case, the Committee also recommend should be paid. But this Committee feel it to be their duty to state to the House, that the present diversified system adopted by individuals in applying to the House of Assembly to be refunded sums expended in the maintenance of Transient Paupers, and which appears to pervade the whole Province, is fraught with irregularity and doubt, and they therefore recommend that in future a better and more satisfactory method be devised; and that, when it may be necessary to apply to the Assembly in such cases, the clearest, most full and satisfactory statements shall accompany such appeals.

The Committee have also had under their notice the Petition of J. C. Betts and others, of the County of Digby, complaining of an encroachment on Bear River Bridge, and the Committee are of opinion that the subject of that Petition is one which may be better considered and settled in a Court of Common Law—they therefore recommend that with it the

House do not further interfere.

The accounts for repairing Government House and the Province Building, have been submitted to this Committee, which repairs appear to have been necessary, and the prices for materials and labour therein contained, as far as the Committee are able to judge, correspond with the current charges of the Town, they therefore recommend to the House the payment of them.

And that all Petitions for aid to Ferries, shall be accompanied by an account under oath of the receipts of said Ferry, for the preceding year.

THE Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Alexander Fraser, of New Glas-

gow, and others, beg leave to report:

That the Committee have heard the evidence adduced by Mr. Fraser, in support of the statements made in that Petition, and explanations given by Mr. Brown, the Agent of the Association, and Mr. Smith, the resident Manager of the Albion Mines. That a Seam of Coal runs through Mr. Fraser's Land—that he made an application to the Agents of the Association, and subsequently to the Lieutenant-Governor, for permission to raise and sell Coals, which was refused, is not disputed; nor is it denied that the price of Coals has been raised from the pit's mouth, from 13s. 6d. to 17s. per Chaldron, within a few years.

That it would have been sound policy in the Government, in the original Settlement of the Province, to limit reservations to the precious Metals, leaving other Ores and Fossils to be wrought at the will of Proprietors of the soil; this Committee have no doubt, neither can they hesitate to recommend, that this House should at all times sustain such a construction of the terms of the lease under which the Mines are held by the Association, as will give to the inhabitants of Nova-Scotia the largest possible amount of the advantages, of which they have, to a considerable extent, been deprived by those reservations. Without, however, compromising the opinion which they hold upon this subject, or approving of the Act by which the Mineral resources of this Province—Public Property, vested in the Crown for the good of the People, were alienated, this Committee, for the reasons hereafter set forth, do not think that, in this instance, such a case has been made out as calls for the direct interference of the Legislature.

It was stated in evidence by Mr. Fraser and his friends, that Adam Carr, the former Lessee of the Pictou Mines, sold Coals at 13s. 6d. per Chaldron, and at the same rate for smaller quantities, and that he reaped a fair profit, and accumulated Capital by his operations. Carr, in 1822 and 1823, sold Coals at the wharves, in Pictou, for 20s. 9d. per Chaldron.—Encouraged by these facts, and confident that, from the Seam which crops out from his Land, he can raise a quantity of Coals, and sell them for less than the price charged by the Association. Fraser is willing to give 3s. per Chaldron for permission to raise Coals, and thinks

he

he can sell them for 12s. to the Inhabitants of the neighbourhood, but distinctly states his inability to compete, either in the Halifax or Foreign Markets, with the Association. This narrows the question to its operation upon the people of New Glasgow and its adjacencies.

There is no doubt, that if Mr. Fraser, and all others upon whose Lands the extensive Coal Fields of Pictou break through the surface, would be benefitted to the extent of their own consumption, and a limited sale, if no restriction existed; and Mr. Brown admits, that perhaps Mr. Fraser might raise and sell at a cheap rate whatever Coals lie above the water level on his farm, he does not deny that Carr, whose operations only extended to depth of fifty four feet from the surface, did so, but he states that the Seams worked by Carr were exhausted to the water level before he left them; and that the situation where any quantity of Coals can be raised without the aid of Steam Machinery, are very few—that there are none such between the Albion Mines and the West River, and but one r two, including Fraser's, to the Eastward.

Mr. Brown admits that the price of Coals has been raised, as stated by Mr. Fraser, from 13s. 6d. to 15s. and then to 17s. The former price, he states, cannot be maintained in this Country, after the stores above the water level are exhausted—that the Association sold at that rate for some time, though at a loss, with a view to the introduction of Pictou Coals into Foreign Markets, but that, even at the present prices, the Company have been unable to reap any profit from their vast outlay.

From the accompanying Section marked (A.) it will appear that while Carr's Pit was but fifty-four feet deep, about the level of the natural drainage; the first shaft sunk by the Association was one hundred and eighty feet deep, and the second four hundred and fifty-three; the cost of raising Coals from these shafts, and shipping them, is exhibited in the paper marked (B.)

Duty Interest on Capital Wear and Tear

By which it appears that exclusive of Duty, Interest on Capital, and Wear and Tear, the expenses incurred is 12s. 13d. per Chaldron, a trifle above the price at which Mr. Fraser proposes to sell his Coals, if permitted to work his Mine. Mr. Brown and others, who appeared before the Committee, expressed a decided opinion, that the Association supplied from their deep Pits a superior article to that furnished by Carr, whose Coals were more liable, from the imperfection of his works, to injury, from admixture with other substances. This was denied on the other side, and the Committee on this point do not think it necessary to give any opinion; but they would remark, that, as it appears in evidence, that Slack Coals are sold at the Pit's mouth, and delivered to the people of New Glasgow, at a depot opposite the Town, for 6s. per Chaldron, while the Screened Coals can be had for 17s.; a person purchasing a Chaldron of each obtains good Fuel at 11s. 6d. per Chaldron, 2s. less than Carr's price, and 6d. below what Fraser contemplates selling at, if permitted to work his Mine.

With every disposition therefore, to assert the principle to which they have already referred, and to afford relief in all cases of actual hardship, the Committee do not see in the evidence they have obtained sufficient to call for the interference of the Legislature.

Mr. Fraser resides at New Glasgow, his wish is to compete with the Association in the supply of that Town and its neighbourhood, by whose inhabitants his Petition is chiefly signed. By the annexed return marked (C.) it appears that the whole quantity of Coals supplied to New Glasgow within the last three years, was 664 Chaldrons of large and 247 of Slack, which, together, average a fraction above 14s. 2d. a Chaldron.

Now, admitting that there is no error in Mr. Fraser's calculation—that his Mine had been opened in 1836, 1837 & 1838, and that he had supplied New Glasgow with unscreened Coal to the extent of its whole consumption, at 12s. the Committee do not conceive that the profit to himself could have been very great, while the saving to the Community would only have been £17 14s. per annum. Coals are delivered at Pictou Town, at 18s., Carr charged 20s. 9d. The Association have in this Town a Depot, from which Coals are sold at 21s.

all through the year.

As it is admitted that the price in any but the New Glasgow Market could not be affected, even if the Petitioners obtained what they seek, as it is clear from the returns that the saving to them would be insignificant, scarcely amounting to 6d. per annum for each, and that this must cease the moment Fraser's Mine is worked to the water's level; the Committee do not think that, still saving and reserving the general principle already referred to, the hardships borne by the people of New Glasgow, or the advantages likely to arise from opening another Mine, are very great. Indeed, in the case of nearly, if not all the Petitioners, the restrictions imposed by the Association's monopoly, would seem to be much more than compensated by the rise in the value of Property—the demand for labour—and the consumption of every description of Produce, consequent upon the liberal expenditure of Capital, and the activity of a Foreign Trade in Coals, created by their enterprise, and now fully established. The following statement will show the amount invested by the Association in the District of Pictou.

By the annexed Returns, it will appear that the whole quantity of Coals raised by the former Lessees of the Mines, in the ten years ending in 1827, was 23,325 Chaldrons, averaging 2332 Chaldrons per annum, while, in the eleven years ending in 1838, the Association have raised 190,747 Chaldrons, averaging 17,340 Chaldrons per annum, the average for the last three years, being 33,871 Chaldrons.

MEMO:

On the 1st January, 1818, two Coal Mines, one on the east side and the other on the west side of the East River of Pictou, were leased to the late Edward Mortimer, Esq. for twenty-one years, the annual rent being fixed at £370 Currency, and a Royalty of 3s. per Chaldron being payable on every Chaldron over 1400 Chaldrons raised and sold within the year.

On the decease of Mr. Mortimer in 1819, these Mines were leased on the same terms to Messrs. Smith & Liddell, by whom they were worked till 1st January, 1828, when the surrender of their Lease having been accepted by His Majesty's Government, these Mines fell into the possession of the General Mining Association.

The General Mining Association have a Capital of £250,000 invested in Nova-Scotia and Cape-Breton. On this investment, there are £67,000 of interest unpaid, 100,000 Chaldrons must be sold at all the mines annually, to enable the Shareholders to divide Six per Cent.

In view of these facts, the Committee conceive that the operations of the Mining Association, so far as they have traced them in the County of Pictou, have not only been highly lv advantageous to the Province, by the introduction into it of much science and skillthe erection of eleven Steam Engines—the establishment of a Foundry on an extensive scale, where Steam Machinery may be repaired or manufactured—the creation of a Foreign Trade in Coals, which, during the last year, employed tons of Shipping, and may be indefinitely extended—and the annual expenditure in the midst of a population employed in Agriculture of upwards of £50,000; and to the Town of New Glasgow, which appears to have trebled in size, during the last ten years, and to the persons who have signed this Petition generally, the operations of this Company would appear to have been a blessing and a benefit, even admitting the charge which it contains of a rise in the price of Fuel. This strong opinion, the Committee are bound to express, for while they conceive it the duty of the Legislature to jealously watch over the rights of individuals, it ought in a new Country to favour and encourage the introduction and employment of Capital, and the protection of those who are largely extending the Trade and developing the resources of the Province from unnecessary interruption or annoyance. To compel the Association to open Mr. Fraser's Mine, would be to put them to needless expense, as their depot of Coals is nearer than it could be to New Glasgow—that any great relief would be afforded if he were allowed to open it himself, to persons who can purchase large Coal at 17s. and small at 6s. per Chaldron, this Committee can scarcely believe, and therefore, without in any way interfering with Mr. Fraser's right to try in the Courts the legal question which has arisen upon the Constitution given by the Association to their lease, they can see no necessity at present for the interference of this House.

The Committee on Trade and Manufactures, to whom the Petition of Mr. John Ferguson was referred, beg to report thereon as follows:

That the Petitioner has carried on the manufacture of Chocolate in Halifax for upwards of thirty years; and last year manufactured about 100,000 lbs. weight, yielding upwards of £2000. A large proportion of this quantity was exported by the Petitioner to Canada, New-Brunswick, Newfoundland, and the West Indies; and the cheaper of the two sorts manufactured by him, which he can afford to sell at 7d. a lb. is used extensively by the Fishermen of our own Province. Foreign Chocolate is imported solely from the United States, and sold in Warehouse, of the coarser quality, at an average of $5\frac{1}{2}$ d. to 6d. per lb. It is subject to an ad-valorem duty of 15 per cent. under the Imperial, and 10 per cent. under the Provincial Act. The price to the consumer, were the Article fairly invoiced, would be about But Mr. Ferguson stated to the Committee, that he has attempted in vain to check a practice that is revived from time to time, of entering the article for duty at a false value, in some cases not exceeding one half of the actual cost. American Chocolate, therefore, comes into the Market at 7d. to 71d. a lb., and in the neighbouring Colonies, where it is subject only to the Imperial Duty, it is sold at somewhat less. Until the passing of the Imperial Acts, Foreign manufactured Chocolate was altogether prohibited, and Cocoa, which is the principal raw material used in the Manufacture, was admitted to importation through the Warehouses in Great Britain, free of duty. These Acts, which at the same time, permitted the importation of Foreign Chocolate at a duty of 15 per cent., and imposed a duty of 5s. Sterling on every Cwt. of Foreign Cocoa, operated with a twofold effect against the Petitioner's Manufacture, and almost destroyed it. Their effect has been aggravated since the passing of the Acts, by the diminution in the price of Chocolate and Cocoa, which is now about the half of what it was: so that while the duty on Chocolate remains at 15 per cent. being an ad-valorem duty, the specific duty on Cocoa amounts now to about 20 per cent. ad-valorem, instead of ten per cent. With a view to these facts, this Legislature passed the Act of 1834, granting the manufacture of Chocolate, and a drawback of 4s. 6d. Stg. per cent. on all Foreign Cocoa imported and used by him. This Act continued in operation for two years, when it was disapproved of by the Home Government, as being at variance with the policy of the Imperial Acts. The Legislature then passed the Act of 1837, granting a bounty of 3s. 6d. on every net hundred pounds weight of Chocolate manufactured in this Province, and it is the renewal of this Act in the last Session which has been also objected to by the Colonial Secretary. Were the allowance in the Act really and simply what it purports to be, a Bounty on a long established and familiar Trade, the Committee would readily acquiesce in the soundness of that principle of political economy, which would induce this Legislature to reject it in toto, as it has led the Imperial Parliament to repudiate all bounties on a similar footing. But this Bounty is in fact a drawback of the duty on the raw material, 3s. 6d. per 100 lbs. of Chocolate being about equal to 5s. Stg. per cwt. of Foreign Cocoa. The Cocoa of the British West Indies is a superior article, 50 per Cent. more valuable than the Foreign, and too expensive for common use. Chocolate that enters into competition with Mr. Ferguson's, is altogether Foreign, little or

none being imported from the United Kingdom, or manufactured by any one besides himself, in these Provinces. These facts were stated by him to the Committee, and the respectability of his character forbids them from entertaining any doubt of their accuracy. If he is obliged to pay the duty of 5s. Sterling on Cocoa, besides the Imperial Duties on Lard and Flour, which are largely used in his manufacture, and cannot be protected either by a drawback or bounty, he is exposed to a most unequal competition with the American Manufacturer, who gets all the Raw Materials he uses, free of duty; and the consequence will be the surrender of the Newfoundland, West India, New Brunswick and Canada Market, to the Foreign supplier, and the destruction of our own Manufacture and Export. We will then equally lose the duty on Foreign Cocoa, which will cease to be imported, except to a limited extent, for use, and will not even have the satisfaction of carrying out the views of the Home Government, whose object it was, by the Imperial Duties, to secure a preference to their own, not to the Foreign Manufacturer. Were the facts submitted in this light to the noble Secretary for the Colonies, the Committee cannot but hope that he would relax the rule he has laid down in his Despatch, and permit us to save a Manufacture worthy of our protection, from utter ruin. In the meanwhile, the Committee recommend a grant to be incorporated in the Appropriation Act, of 3s. for every 100 lbs. of Chocolate manufactured in this Province, and exported therefrom during the ensuing year. They do not recommend a grant for Chocolate manufactured and consumed in our own Province, as the Provincial Duty of 10 per cent. operates as a protection, and the principle prohibiting bounties seems to them to militate against such a grant.

The Committee understand that the Commissioners of the Revenue will pay, under a late despatch, the Bounty for the last quarter of the year, ending the 31st instant, and therefore

do not recommend a grant thereof, as they would otherwise have done.

The Committee would suggest lastly, the necessity of substituting a specific Provincial Duty of one half penny a lb., for the present ad-valorem duty of 10 per cent. on Foreign Chocolate. These duties, in fact, are nearly the same, but a specific duty would be more surely and equally enforced, and the importer no fonger tempted to invoice the article beneath its real value.

THE Committee on Inland and River Fisheries begleave to report, that they have had under their consideration the Petition of David and Walter Murray, Nos. 33 and 34; also, counter Petition, Affidavits and Evidence, of David Murray and Messrs. MacKenzie, and while they would freely grant the relief sought for in this particular case, yet, conceiving that any alteration of the present Law governing such cases, would tend to injure the River Fisheries of the Province, they are reluctantly obliged to leave the parties to their several rights to be established before the proper tribunals of the Country.

The Committee further report that they conceive the object hitherto contemplated by the Legislature in granting sums of Money for clearing out obstructions in Rivers, &c. was such as to facilitate the Internal Navigation of the Province, and to render very essential service. The Committee are nevertheless of opinion that the absolute necessity of providing for other objects of paramount importance renders it inexpedient that the Committee should, this

THE Committee to whom were referred the Petitions of Richard James and others, of Bridgetown, for amendment of the Law relating to Hawkers and Pedlars, and of Christopher Benson, having considered the subject matter referred to them, report as follows:

1st. As respects the Petition of Richard James and others, the Committee have examined the Law relating to Hawkers, Pedlars, and Petty Chapmen, and are clearly of opinion that persons pursuing this line of life are bound to take out a license half yearly, and at each time of taking the License, the Law distinctly compels him to pay £3 if travelling on Foot, if with one Horse, £6, and for every other Horse, an additional sum of £2, and that in default of such persons taking such License half yearly, the forfeitures and penalties imposed by the said Law can be enforced.

2nd. On the Petition of Christopher Benson, the Committee are fully satisfied of the meritorious service performed by Mr. Benson, as set forth in his Petition, but they cannot feel themselves satisfied in establishing a precedent, by recommending the prayer of his Petition to the favorable consideration of the House, whereby large sums might in future be drawn

from the Treasury.

The Bridge at Sackville has sustained so much damage from the late Freshet, that it must soon undergo a thorough repair, or be replaced by a new structure; and the Lieutenant-Go-

vernor is pleased to desire, that you proceed to the spot for the purpose of ascertaining and reporting, for His Excellency's information, which would be, in your opinion, the better plan to adopt. In 1833, preparations were made for the erection of a new Bridge a little higher up Stream, (as shewn in the accompanying Sketch,) it being then thought that the present Bridge could not be rendered serviceable for more than a year or two; but six years nearly having since elapsed, it is more than probable that an entirely new work is now indispensable. Should this appear to you to be the case, you will submit a Plan and Estimate for a durable Wooden Bridge, with Stone Abutments, at the site proposed in 1833, and for completing the approaches to it on both sides of the River; and should you deem some other site preferable, you will also give in a similar Plan and Estimate for the work at the site which you would recommend, with such full observations on the subject as may enable His Excellency to decide upon the comparative merits of the two plans of proceeding.

On the other hand, if you consider the present Bridge capable of being throroughly repaired at a less expense than would be incurred in building a new one, and with equal

convenience to the public, you will submit an Estimate in that respect also.

You will further examine the Bridge at the Nine Mile River, which was nearly destroyed by the same Freshet, and report whether, to render it safe, it requires any further repairs than those it has just received. It was supposed that a new Bridge would also be wanted here; but Mr. Goff, who conducted those repairs, has assured me that the Bridge is now nearly as good as ever, and will stand for five or six years at least, unless an extraordinary high Fresh et should again happen.

SIR—

In obedience to His Excellency's command, conveyed to me by your Letter of the 16th inst, I have examined the Sackville and Nine Mile River Bridges, and have made such Surveys as to enable me to lay before you, for His Excellency's information, the following Report and accompanying Plans.

The Nine Mile River Bridge has recently undergone such repairs as will probably make it serviceable for a number of years, and all that is now required to make it safe is to have

the railing on the upper side re-placed.

The Sackville Bridge has received such temporary repairs as will make it safe for the present. It is, however, doubtful whether it will remain in a state of safety after the frost, which now materially assists in binding the Stone and Wood work, commences to thaw, as the projecting angle of the Western abutment is of an old construction, and was materially injured by the late freshet.

The injury this abutment received is supposed to have been caused, in some measure, by the New Road or Wall, which is partly made above the Bridge. The Wall on the side next the River runs in a straight line, a hundred yards above the abutment. It will be perceived by reference to plan No. 1, that when the River was raised high enough to bring the water to the wall, the floodwood and ice must necessarily have been brought to, and carried down, by its side, acting with great force against the abutment, which must in some manner be exposed to injury by every Freshet, unless either its direction or that of the wall be changed.

The last time the Bridge was covered, the decayed timber was not removed—the new covering having been laid upon it. This old timber is now so much decayed, that it will soon dislodge, and in falling may endanger the Bridge and abutments. It ought to be removed as soon as it can conveniently be done, for the dry rot with which it is affected will

soon communicate to the sound timber.

The new Road partly made, or Wall already alluded to, which leads to the site contemplated for a Bridge in 1833, marked No. 1 on the Plans, commences upon the level of the present Bridge, and must of course be raised proportionally with the scent of the stream to

said site No. 1, which will require a quantity of materials, equal, at least, to what has already been employed in the construction of the portion now standing, but it is conceived that a Bridge over this scite would be more liable to have its sluices or span obstructed, than a Bridge lower down upon the stream, where floodwood would pass end wise, and Ice and Blocks of solid Snow would be broken by the Falls between the site contemplated above and the scite proposed below.

After the most minute examination, I feel no hesitation on my mind, either on the score of safety or economy, in recommending the present bridging place, site No. 3 or 4, in prefer-

ence to site No. 1, intended to have been built upon in 1833.

Should it be deemed advisable to retain the present Bridging place, if framed pillars were placed on each side of the abutments of the large Span, to support the string pieces, they would prevent any accidents which might occur from the defects already alluded to in the abutments, and whenever a new covering should be necessary, the western abutment should be re-built in a better form, and the expense of this arrangement might be less than that of building a new Bridge, as a great portion of the Eastern end, from A. to B. on the plan, is solid and durable, but whether the advantages of a New Bridge would not justify the larger expenditure, is a question respectfully submitted. Were it proposed to erect a Bridge upon the scite of the present, it would be necessary to consider whether the erection of a temporary Bridge, or the loss the public would otherwise sustain while the other was building, would not amount to a considerable part of the cost of a new one. If a new Bridge is to be built, I should prefer scite No. 3 to any other.

The scite No. 4 is a safe Bridging place, but more expensive than No. 3.

The plan proposed for erecting a New Bridge, may be seen by reference to No. 3, it would answer equally well for No. 1 or 4, an explanation of which is subjoined as follows: that there should be strong Pillars of Masonry erected on each side of the span, of sufficient strength to support the String Pieces and the embankments, and that the remaining space between these Pillars, and the top of the Bank should be filled up, by simply throwing in loose Stones without order, and allowing them to roll to the right and left, so as to form a sloping Bank to the Road. These Banks are not exposed to fall like upwright Walls, and though they absorb more materials, yet, when Stones are plenty, as in this case, they prove cheaper, because no Masonry is required, and the space could be properly filled by Contract. The Wooden covering of the Bridge could also be done by Contract, but it would be advisable that the Pillars of Masonry should be constructed by day's Work, under the direction of the builder.

THE Committee on the Currency of the Province, appointed on the 22d of Jany. having bestowed their best attention on the important and complicated inquiry committed to them, beg leave to report as follows:

That they have endeavoured to simplify, as much as possible, and so as to be readily apprehended by the House, a subject involving so many interests, and perplexed by numerous details, which it is not easy to master and render intelligible. They have been greatly assisted. however, by an inquiry recently conducted by the Committee of Trade and Manufactures at Halifax, the result of which may be regarded as an indication of the views and wishes of the Mercantile Community. In these, the Committee of this House, for the reasons presently to be assigned, and with some modifications, concur; and they invite the earnest attention of the House to the principles which are now well understood, as regulating the Currency and Exchange, and which the Imperial Government, as it is believed, is about to apply to these North American Provinces. It seems to be the interest and duty of the Assembly to record its opinions, so as to operate, as well on the contemplated change of our monetary system, as to rid ourselves of the evils which the present confused and distracted state of the Currency imposes on individual enterprise and the action of the Local Government. It benefits only the traders in Exchange and Bullion, who, at every turn, make a profit out of the industrious classes, and swell their own gains at the expense of the body of the people, whom this Legislature are bound to protect. The anomalies in the present system act also against the Revenue. The Imperial Duties are received at the Custom House in Doubloons at 66s. Sterling, and in Dollars at 4s. 4d. Sterling, their real value, at which they are paid out of the Treasury, being considerably less, and the difference a clear loss to the Revenue. This single fact is enough to awaken the attention of the House, and should engage all parties in an united and cordial effort to introduce a sound, uniform, and legal Currency.

The Committee abstain from enlarging on the necessity of a fixed standard of value and Money of Account, in which tenders may be made and Contracts entered into, because they presume it will not be questioned by any intelligent mind. The want of it has frequently produced embarrassment in this Province, and it is plain that the transactions of ordinary life, as well as the more extended operations of Commerce, can never be conducted with certainty and ease, till all parties understand the real value of the Coins or Money they

are to give and to receive.

The Committee abstain also from illustrating in this report the reasons, which, in their view, recommend British Sterling as the only Money of Account or standard of value, which it is at once safe and practicable to establish in these Colonies. The last Assembly seems to have arrived at the same conclusion, which rest on sound principles, and a host of considerations that leave but little doubt of its propriety. The British Sovereign, of known weight and fineness, less liable than other coins to be counterfeited, and issued from the Imperial Mint at its actual value in the market of the world, is worth Twenty Shillings Sterling, under any circumstances, wherever it is found, and is therefore the best and truest standard we could adopt. On principle, the Committee would have recommended the Sovereign alone, as the standard and measure of value in this Province; and they are persuaded that after a little experience we will come to it. But in the meanwhile they cannot withhold their assent from the arguments which enforce the recognition of the Doubloon and Dollar along with the Sovereign; and the Committee have prosecuted an enquiry into the weight and fineness that ought to be required in these coins respectively, as Coins of a legalized and fixed value. By the Act of 1834, the American Government reduced the intrinsic value of the Gold Coins, issued from their Mint, about 81 per cent—an experiment, the wisdom of which is extremely questionable, and has been arraigned both in their own and the Mother Country. It has had a corresponding effect on the exchangeable value of the Sovereign, Doubloon and Dollar, and on the rates of exchange, which the Committee have not lost sight of in framing this Report.

The real value of all Coins depends on the amount of pure Metal they contain. British Sovereign weighs 123 grains, of which 113 grains are pure Gold of 22 carats fine-The Columbian Doubloon and Spanish Doubloon of 1801, weighs 417 grains, of which 360 grains are pure Gold of the fineness of 20 carats and 3 grains. The American Eagle, coined before July 31, 1834, weighs 270 grains, of which 247 grains are pure Gold of 22 carats fineness. The American Eagle coined under the new law weighs 258 grains.

of which 232 are pure Gold of the fineness of 21 carats, 2 grains.

These few examples will show the necessity, which applies to Foreign Coins and not to

the Sovereign, of declaring the exact weight and fineness at which the Doubloon, if declared to be a legal tender, ought to be received. Its value seems to be conclusively and wisely fixed by the British Government in the late order applicable to the West Indies, at 64s. Sterling, agreeing very happily with its value in our Currency, being 80s. since 1819.

The same necessity of ascertaining the proper weight and fineness as the foundation of any enactment, applies equally to the Dollar. The Dollar of the United States weighs 416 grains of which 371½ grains are pure Silver. The best Columbian Dollars weigh 417 grains of which 379 are pure Silver. The Central American Bollar of 1829 weighs 415 grains, of which 368 are pure Silver. And the American Act of 1834 declares that the Dollars of Mexico, Peru, Chili, and Central America, shall pass current, being of not less weight than 415 grains—of not less fineness than ten ounces fifteen penny weights of pure Silver, in the troy pound of twelve ounces of Standard Silver—that is, of the 415 grains, as the Committee have computed it, there must be 372 grains of pure Silver.

The Silver Coinage of the Mother Country, again, is avowedly of less intrinsic value, by $6\frac{1}{2}$, if not 10 per cent. than its nominal value, and could not on any principle be adopted as a standard of value, or be declared a legal tender beyond 40s. as in England, and which

the Committee would rather reduce to half that amount.

With a view to these facts, and to many other considerations that may be suggested, the Committee recommend that the House should pass Resolutions for the information and guidance of the Home Government, declaring their assent to the following regulations:

First.—That the Money of Account in this Province, contemporaneously with the other British North American Colonies, should cease to be the old Halifax Currency, and that

British Sterling should be substituted in its stead.

Second.—That the Sovereign should be established as a legal tender, at its full value of

20s. Sterling.

Third.—That Doubloons of not less weight than 416 grains each, containing not less than 360 grains of pure Gold, of the fineness of 20 carats and 3 grains, should be established as a legal tender, at 64s. Sterling.

Fourth.—That Dollars of not less weight than 415 grains each, containing not less than 372 grains of pure Silver, should be established as a legal tender, at 4s. 2d. Sterling each, being the value set on them by the Treasury Minute promulgated in the West Indies.

Fifth.—That our Treasury Notes should be received in payment of Duties, and be paid

out as heretofore, at 16s. Sterling.

Sixth.—That all subsisting Contracts, Debts, Salaries, &c. should be reduced to, and paid

in Sterling by deducting one fifth from their present amount in Currency.

Seventh.—That British Silver should be declared a legal tender to the sum of Twenty Shillings only.

tion of the Act of 1838, be formed by the Magistrates residing East of Pet Piswick, to be convened for that purpose at Middle Musquedoboit, on the first day of June in each year.

The Committee have annexed to this Report, a form of Return, to be made annually by the Commissioners, who shall provide themselves with Printed Copies, the cost of which to be charged upon the Monies disbursed by them. Such Returns, together with an Abstract of the information they contain, to be laid upon the Table of the House within the first ten days of every Session.

The Committee recommend that such an alteration of the existing Law as will not make it imperative upon Teachers of Combined Common and Grammar Schools to teach the Classics; but think that the due execution of the Law in reference to all the other Branches required to be taught in such Schools, should be verified by the Oath of the Trustees.

The Committee think that a discretionary power should be lodged with the Commissioners to apply to the support of Common Schools the amount given to any County for Combined Schools, if in their judgment such Schools should not be required, or of concentrating upon one School the sums which by the present Law may be drawn for the support of two, if there be any thing in the peculiar circumstances of the County to warrant such a departure from the general spirit of the Act.

The Yarmouth and Sydney Academies appear to be in an efficient state; but the Committee decline to recommend compliance with the request of the Trustees of the former Institution for an endowment for a term of years, as the present system gives to the Legisla-

ture a very useful supervision and controul.

The Committee report unfavourably upon the Petitions from the Trustees of the Annapolis Grammar School and Academy—they recommend that the trust of the latter Institution be changed, so as to give it a less exclusive character, and advise that, for the present, such a sum be granted in aid of the Institution kept by Mr. Andrew Henderson, at Annapolis, as with the Grammar School allowance will amount to £100.

The trust of the Lunenburg Academy the Committee think should be opened, so as to remove complaints which exist in that County, and, on that being done, recommend that, in order to place it in on an efficient footing, such a sum be added to its allowance as will make up £100.

George Christie appears to have a just claim to the amount withheld from him by the Commissioners of Schools for the District of Pictou; and the Committee recommend that the

sum claimed be paid by them out of the School Monies given to that County.

The prayer of Petitioner asking aid to build a School House for Colored Children at Salmon River in the County of Yarmouth, and to rebuild one burnt at M'Kenzie's Cove in Granville, is opposed to the practice pursued by the Legislature for many years; and the School for aid to which the Abbè Segoigne and others have petitioned, the Committee conceive should be supported out of the Monies apportioned to the County of Digby.

The Petition of D. J. Ditmars, of Clements, with reference to the proceeds of School Lands in that Township, the Committee recommend should be referred to the Members for

the County of Annapolis, to report by Bill, or otherwise.

The Committee recommend that £50 be given to support an Academy at Saint Andrew's, in the County of Sydney, pursuant to the prayer of the Petition of C. M'Kinnon and others.

The Committee have great satisfaction in recommending the claims of the Sydney Mechanics' Institute and Colchester Literary Society, for a small grant of Money in aid of their Funds; and they think that wherever public Lectures or Literary and Scientific subjects are given gratuitously, during the Winter Months, in any part of the Province, small grants to aid in the purchase of Books and Apparatus, would be exceedingly well bestowed.

The Halifax Schools are doing much good, and the Committee recommend that the usual grants be continued. They also recommend to the favorable consideration of the House the prayer of a Petition from Hugh Bell, and a number of other persons, asking aid to a School in connexion with the Methodist Church, and chiefly supported by contributions from Members of that Body.

The Committee subjoin such information as they conceive necessary to shew to the

House the actual condition of the Metropolitan Seminaries.

The Committee on all matters relating to the Post-Office, beg leave to report:

That they have carefully and thoroughly examined the Accounts rendered by the Deputy Post Master General, and have communicated with that Officer, on such items as seemed to require explanation. The general result is exhibited in the annexed Abstract prepared on the same principle as the Abstracts which were attached to the report made by a Committee in the last Session. The Accounts of this Department and of the British and Internal Postage, are so complicated and mixed up, that it is possible the conclusions come to by the Committees of former years, and by this Committee, may, to some extent, be affected by errors, which they have been unable, after the most diligent inquiry, to detect. But this Committee are perfectly well satisfied, that a large proportion of the amount voted every year for the Post-Office Communication, is not at all required for that service, and is, in fact, paid into the Military Chest. Although a new line from Halifax to Dorchester, was established last year, at an expense of £500, of which £437 10, is included in the present Accounts, and although other new lines have been opened with the sanction of the Assembly, or by the Deputy Post Master General, at the instance of Members interested therein, and the expense of which is defrayed out of the Post-Office Fund, yet the entire amount of the Internal and American Postage, without the aid of the Provincial grant, was sufficient, as appears by the annexed Abstract, to pay the whole charge for Riding Work and Incidental Expenses, except only a trifling balance of £11. The consequence is, that of the amount drawn from our Treasury, being £1386 Currency, equal in Dollars at 4s. 4d. to £1200 Stg. (the accounts this year having been rendered in that way, instead of the old Halifax Currency,) no less a sum than £950 Sterling, was, in fact, a contribution from our Provincial Funds to the Imperial Government.

The Committee earnestly hope therefore that Her Majesty's Ministers will advise Her Majesty to sanction the Act of last Session, and allow to this Legislature a control over our internal Postage, which would at once enable us to save a large amount, and to extend the lines to many populous and rising Settlements, that are now deprived of the privileges and blessings of a regular Post Communication. We have not the means, as this service is now regulated, to meet the pressing wants of the Country; and this Committee therefore in considering the various Petitions referred to them, have felt themselves obliged to decline recommending to the House the following applications, most, if not all of which, they would

have reported on favorably under other circumstances.

1st. An application for £25 additional for a Mail Carriage, and increased facilities between Antigonish and Guysborough.

2d. An application for a line between Upper Stewiacke and Pictou.

3d. An application for a line between the West River of Pictou and New Glasgow, (Mr. Dickson dissenting.)

4th. An application for a line from the Straits of Barra to East Bay, in the County of Cape-Breton.

5th. An application for a line, in the Summer Season, between Parrsboro' and Amherst.

6th. An application for a line to Fin Harbour, in the County of Cumberland.

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The Committee recommend only that the following sums, under the peculiar circumstances applicable to each, should be granted in the present Session.

£15 To John and Charles Pernette, one half to each for carrying the Mail across La

Have River.

10 In addition to the present sum to enable the Mail to be carried once a week instead of once a fortnight, between Antigonishe and St. Mary's.

15 For a line between Guysboro' and Country Harbor, which contains a large popula-

tion, and has never had a Post Communication.

6 To enable the Courier from Mabou to Whycocomagh to pass through Sky River River Settlement.

5 Additional to the Courier between Antigonish and Cape George.

Extract of a Memorial addressed to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, by the Undersigned, Members of the Board of School Commissioners for the County of Sydney.

HUMBLY SHEWETH:

That your Memorialists have, by last Post, obtained from Alexander M'Dougall and Richard J. Forrestall, Esquires, Representatives of this County in the General Assembly of the Province, a certified Copy of a Petition, purporting to be from certain persons in the County of Sydney, whose names are not given to us, which Petition has been presented to the Assembly, prefering a number of unjust charges against your Memorialists for misconduct in the discharge of their duties; and that your Memorialists holding their Commission from, and being at all times accountable to your Excellency, for the faithful performance of the Duties of their Office, think it necessary to transmit to your Excellency the aforesaid Copy of the said Petition, together with the explanations which are hereto subjoined.

1st. That although your Memorialits have, ever since their appointment as Commissioners of Schools, been ready to hear any complaint and to rectify any mistake which they might inadvertently commit—they have never, until now, received a hint, that their proceed-

ings in general, or any part of them in particular, did not give satisfaction.

2d. Your Memorialists verily believe on good information, that the aforesaid Petition does not express the general sentiments of the Roman Catholic population of the County, but only of a part of them, and that part by no means either the most numerous or most respectable—many of the latter having assured your Memorialists that they had refused to sign the Petition, and disapproved of it. Your Memorialists have also been informed by respectable individuals who have the opportunity of knowing it, that a large proportion of the names affixed to the Petition, was not signed by the people themselves, but by others, who pretend to have obtained their consent to have it done, and that many of them have neither read it nor heard it read, nor are properly aware of its nature and tendency.

3d. That your Memorialists would have been at all times happy to have obtained the valuable assistance of the Right Reverend Bishop Fraser, whose name is at the head of the Commission, and they have repeatedly and earnestly solicited his attendance, but without success; and aware that the absence of a Roman Catholic from the Board might be used as a handle by evil minded persons to awaken the jealousy of the less informed of the Catholic

population.

population, and produce dissatisfaction to your Excellency's Administration in the composition of the Board, your Petitioners considered it their duty repeatedly, but respectfully, to solicit the appointment of a Roman Catholic, who would attend in place of Bishop Fraser—which application it has not been thought expedient to comply with.

4th. The Board do not exclude the public from their Meetings as is alleged in the Peti-

tion, and numbers do occasionally attend, though not very often.

5th. That your Memorialists do hereby jointly and severally disclaim all exercise of, or submission to, such influence as the Petitioners have alleged, and all undue influence of any kind or degree whatsoever. They have preserved accurate accounts of their proceedings since their appointment in May 1832, and their accounts will prove that the Rev. Thomas White, formerly, and the Reverend Thomas C. Leaver, latterly, have been regular Attendants at the Meetings of the Board—that the Reverend Thomas Trotter has also been a regular Attendant, and that the quorum has sometimes been made up by Doctor McDonald, and at other times by Hugh McDonald, Esq. and at times by both, and that the greatest harmony has in general prevailed at their Meetings; and that when any difference of opinion arose it has, in every instance that your Memorialists can recollect, been removed by an amicable discussion of the points at issue.

6th. Though there have always been and now are a number of Schools in the County, chiefly supported by Members of Mr. Trotter's Congregation, they have been more frequently under the care of Roman Catholic than Presbyterian Teachers, and your Memorialists can prove that in no instance has a preference been given to one School more than

another.

7th. If the Teacher of the combined School in the Town of Antigonish, who is at present the only one in the County connected with Mr. Trotter's Congregation, receive the highest sum allowed by Law for such Schools, it is because that the number of his Grammar Scholars and the amount of his income from the School entitled him to it, and if he receives his proportion of the grant in support of Common Schools, it is because he is also entitled to it by Law, and nothing more is done for him in this respect than has been done and is yet done for the other combined Schools in the County, which are taught and attended chiefly, if not wholly, by Roman Catholics.—This the Returns of the Schools will prove, and, were

it necessary, your Memorialists can produce the Receipts of the Teachers.

Sth. If, previously to the last year, the Law was silent on the subject of Female Schools, it did not forbid them, and the establishment of such Schools is expressly authorized in proper places by the Printed Instructions sent to your Memorialists along with their Commission, and that the Town of Antigonish is regarded by all the Commissioners as a proper place for such School, is evident from this, that the most serious difference of opinion that has ever arisen in the Board since its formation, originated in the proposal for the establishment of a second Female School, under the care of Mrs. Duffus, and if your Memorialists were unanimous in opposing this, they did so on no party account, but because it did not appear to them to be required, as Mrs. Duffus never succeeded in collecting more than seven or eight Children who might have been accommodated at the other Schools, part of them being boys and part girls; and that under these circumstances it would have been unfair to the other Schools throughout the County to have appropriated a greater share of the Legislative grant to the Schools in the Town than they had already received.

9th. That your Memorialists tried for a year or two after their appointment to apportion the Legislative grant among the Schools, on the principle of paying to each School in proportion to the number of poor Scholars; but they soon found that this was not only liable, but actually led to such abuses and impositions as would have effectually defeated the main intentions of the School Act; for the most wealthy and populous Settlements in the County were, as usually happens, able to collect the greatest number of poor Scholars, and to make out such claims in the public grant as would have left little or nothing for these Settlements where public assistance is, from the thinness of, and general circumstances of the population, most required. Your Memorialists therefore were forced to abandon this principle and adopt the plan of dividing the Money as equally as possible among the different Schools in the County, established according to Law, making a small advance in favour of the most competent Teachers, as an inducement to diligence and attention on their part, and taking care always that the Schools be open to the Children of the Poor in every School District; and

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your Memorialists can assure your Excellency, that this method which they have now followed for a number of years has been attended by the very best effects, by continuing Schools in almost all the Settlements in which they formerly existed, and establishing many new Schools in Districts where they could not have been supported.—In proof of all this your Memorialists can refer to the Returns which they have lately and formerly made, and

which are now in the Secretary's Office.

10th. The Combined School in the Town of Antigonish is represented by the Petitioners as not having any poor Scholars attending it at present, this your memorialists allow to have been the fact at the time of last returns, but it had become so only very lately, and continued for a very short time, for it has for some time past contained a fair proportion of Upwards of a year ago, Mr. John Forrestall commenced teaching a School in the Town, and the greater part of the poor Children (chiefly Irish Roman Catholics,) were immediately taken from the Combined School, to which they had always been freely admitted, and sent to him; but there is yet a proportion of Roman Catholics, amounting to about one fifth of the whole School, attending the Combined School, which your Memorialists regard as a proof that those who have been withdrawn, have not been withdrawn on the score of Religion, for which your Memorialists would be disposed to make allowance, and a number of the Grammar Scholars who lately attended it, have been removed to the Combined School at St. Andrews, in this County, for the purpose of making up their legal number of Grammar Scholars there; and moreover, as the Combined School in the Town, is the only one in this and the neighbouring County of Guysborough, wherein the Greek and Latin Classics, and all the other branches required in such Schools, are taught, your Memorialists are of opinion, that it should not be deprived of any of the assistance allowed to it by Law, while such assistance is given to the other Combined Schools in the County, which are inferior to it in the number of branches taught, and have scarcely equal claims with regard to poor Scholars.

11th. That the place recommended by the Petitioners does not personally concern your Memorialists, but they beg leave to say, on public grounds, that it is liable to many weighty objections. The time which your Memorialists have found necessary to devote to the management of the Schools, is a great deal more than the general Sessions of the County could allow, and it would therefore be partially and improperly attended to; your Memorialists have found it necessary every half year, since their appointment, to hold two meetings, when dividing the money, in order to avoid the serious consequences that would arise to members of Schools from mistakes made in regard to the Returns, and which require to be rectified before they are passed, besides several other errors which result from ignorance, and which they have hitherto found it impossible to prevent. Meetings also require to be held at other times, in order to meet the exigencies of the Country, and it would be therefore necessary to put the Sessions on a new and different footing, in order to secure the interests of all concerned; moreover, your Memorialists are of opinion, that where disputes arise in any School District, (which occasionally happens,) they would be more easily and satisfactorily removed by a central board, composed of disinterested persons, than by one immediately connected with the District, which might be under the necessity of acting as Judges in their own cause; and finally, a board could not be formed in this County without the assistance of the Clergy, competent to try the qualifications of Candidates for Combined Schools; and your Memorialists apprehend that this County is not singular in that re-

spect.

To these explanations, your Memorialists beg leave most humbly and respectfully to solicit the early attention of your Excellency; and also, that your Excellency would be pleased to lay before the other branches of the Legislature such portions of the same, as your Excellency may deem fit and proper, and your Petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.

The undersigned in affixing his signature, begs respectfully to state, that although there are some particulars in the preceding explanations not within his knowledge, yet to the following he can testify: that in acting with the Commissioners, whose meetings he has punctually attended—he has never seen or known any injustice done to Roman Catholics, but on the contrary they have always received a fair and due proportion of the Legislative aid, and of encouragement from the board. That although the Roman Catholic Bishop does not attend, he has been invited to do so, and declined. That the Commissioners have been punctual and attentive in the discharge of their duties, carefully examining the School Returns, and dividing the Legislative aid to the best of their judgment. The undersigned concurs with the Commissioners in the opinion, that the transfer of the care of Schools to the Magistrates in Session, as prayed for by the Petition, would not be desirable nor productive of benefit; and also, begs respectfully to add, that, as the only Churchman at the board, he cannot but think, and he trusts in all good feeling to his fellow Commissioners, that an extension of the Commission is a matter to be desired.

Extract of a Letter from the Reverend Thomas Trotter to the Provincial Secretary, dated

ANTIGONISH, 1st MARCH, 1839.

"I have herewith inclosed a Memorial to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, signed by myself and two others of the School Commissioners for this County, together with a certified Copy of the Petition to which it refers, and by which it was occasioned, both of which I beg leave to request of you to lay before His Excellency as soon as possible. Mr. Leaver is from home, and we have not had an opportunity of consulting him on the subject; but this is the less to be regretted, as the Petition does not reflect on him, and as he has only been a Member of the Board for a comparatively short time. If, however, he shall return before the Memorial is despatched, it shall be submitted to him."

" As the Petition is more particularly directed against me, it appears to me that some separate and additional explanation on my part is requisite, and I therefore, beg leave to state to you, for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, that ever since my settlement here in 1818, I have considered it in every respect my wisest course to avoid as much as possible giving any cause of offence to my neighbours of the Roman Catholic persuasion; and that I have not entirely failed in this object, I conclude from the fact that they have always treated me, and do still treat me, with the highest degree of attention and And that I have never shewn towards them that hostility which the Petition imputes to me is evident from this, though there are five Schools in the County, chiefly or exclusively supported by Members of my Congregation-two of them are now, and a third was lately taught by Roman Catholics—that one only (namely, the Combined School in the Town which the Petitioners have pretendedly taken as an example of what is done in other cases,) is under the care of a person of my own Communion, and that I recommended on a very late occasion, that even he, had it been necessary, should have been succeeded by a Roman Catholic; and it is but fair to the Roman Catholics to say, that they do not hesitate, so far as I know, to employ Teachers of other Denominations besides their own."

Report upon the expediency of introducing Steam Boats from Halifax to Yarmouth, submitted to the Committee of Trade and Manufactures, and approved of by them, at their meeting held for the purpose, March 14th, 1839.

In submitting their Report upon the expediency of introducing a line of Steam Communication between the Capital and the Western Ports of the Province, the Committee deem it unnecessary to write any eulogium upon the effects and benefits of Steam. Its advantages when applied to navigation in increasing intercourse, hastening the development of the internal resources of a Country, increasing its domestic and foreign trade, and giving a new impetus to the general prosperity, and above all to that vigorous action of the public mind upon which prosperity in every Country so much depends, are now universally admitted, and therefore require no illustration.

Before entering upon the details of this subject, the Committee think it right, however, to point out the highly favorable position which Halifax presents as a central point, from which these lines of communication should emanate, and the peculiar and adventitious resources

enjoyed by this Province for the introduction of Steam.

Nova-Scotia occupies a prominent point on the Continent of British North America, and juts out into the Atlantic Ocean as if nature intended it to be a great commercial depot for those fine Provinces of the Continent which lie in the rear. The Harbour of Halifax is open and accessible at all seasons. It is separated by a narrow belt of land from the shores of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, which is closed for nearly six months in the year. A narrow strip divides it from the Basin of Mines and Bay of Fundy, and these two, although not actually closed in Winter by ice, from the rapid action of their tides, present so perilous a navigation that few vessels enter them after the coming of the winter months. Now if it be a project seriously entertained, to connect the St. Lawrence by a Rail Road to St. Andrews, a distance of 280 miles, Rail Roads from Halifax to connect the waters of this great Gulf and Basin with the Atlantic, do not seem more speculative or less practicable. The Government now contemplate the carriage of the Mails from England to Halifax; thence by land to some near port in the Gulf, and thence by Steam to Quebec. A Despatch to this effect, from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, has been laid this Session before the House of Assembly, as introductory to a line of Steam Packets from England. The time may yet come when this mode of transit may be adopted for even commercial purposes. However distant the time may be, it cannot but be gratifying to reflect, that if these enterprises be ever accomplished, Halifax will become, from its local position and the excellence of its Harbour, the great depot and focus of the Colonial and inter-Colonial trade between the old and our new rising British Empire. Halifax may yet become in Peace, what it was in the year of 1812 to 1815, during the American War.

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Passing from these views of the future, which the Committee admit are too uncertain and distant to be calculated upon now, they suggest some striking facts which are applicable to the present time. It has been estimated by Engineers, that the voyage from Liverpool or Bristol to Halifax, may be accomplished by Steam in 10 days, while that to New York does occupy from 14½ to 16 days. The comparative shortness of this voyage would allow a greater expenditure of Coals upon the same Engine, and of course in the same space of time a greater production of steam or "locomotive power." Now, if any means could be devised of establishing a rapid internal transit through the British Provinces, the Committee are of opinion that a large proportion, if not all, of the passengers who go now to Canada and New Brunswick by New York, would adopt this route in preference—a rapid mail to Wallace and a Steam Boat thence to Quebec would land them as cheaply and speedily in Canada, if not more speedily, than the present route. A regular Steam Boat from St. John to Windsor would afford a more rapid conveyance from England to our sister Province.— These lines of transit might attract the carriage of light goods in the Spring and Fall; and the Committee trust that before long these general schemes of improvement, in which all these Provinces have a common interest, may engage the attention of the Parent Government, or some other general Colonial power competent to carry them into action. To run a Rail Road from Halifax to Quebec was one of the magnificent plans of internal Colonial improvement designed by Lord Durham.

The Committee hope they are feasible even now, but they do not pronounce any positive opinion until the statistics relating to this enterprise are more fully collated. If however promising in Peace they would be more extensively beneficial in War, by giving a safe intercolonial communication for seven months of the year, free from the danger of any hostile power. A war with the United States of America might recommend the more extended

scheme first above suggested.

They remark next upon the abundance of Coal, and the superior properties possessed by the Coal of this Province, to afford locomotive power, and discharge the duties of an Engine, which can be obtained here in any quantity; and it cannot but be gratifying to the Province to learn that the Pictou Coal, after experiment in the Great Western, has been declared to

be the best ever yet discovered in the world for the use of the Steam Engine.

The Committee do not touch further here upon the projected introduction of Steam Packets between this and the Mother Country. They hope to see these introduced under the sanction of the Government in the course of the ensuing Summer, and trust that some of the English Companies may be induced to run one or two of their Packets occasionally, and at stated periods between Halifax and the ports of London and Liverpool. They have been already employed in the carriage of Goods as well as Passengers from England to New-York; the same system might be tried here, and as one of the features of their system the Committee earnestly solicit the attention of the community to the erection of a commodious and comfortable Hotel. However high the reputation of Halifax may stand for private hospitality, it cannot be expected that Gentlemen of fortune, or travellers for pleasure, or even men of business, who study comfort, will come here till there be a Hotel fitted for their accommodation, and especially for that of ladies. Our public accommodations contrasted with the comfort and even elegance of our private houses are a sad reflection upon the absence of public spirit and unanimity. All admit the want of a Hotel; there are enough of persons. ready to subscribe the funds required, and yet the spirit, and energy, and reputation of the Town continue to be insulted by this important enterprise being delayed.

They come now to the subject which they were especially directed to investigate, and trust the facts and views they are prepared to submit will lead to speculation, and remove that stain and reflection upon the spirit and enterprise of the Town, which they acknowledge with deep regret rests upon it justly. Steam Boats are now in action in the United States and the Sister Colonies, in positions less calculated for profitable employment than can be embraced along our Western Shores; and they proceed to bring under the notice of the General Committee the Statistical information upon which their conclusions are founded.

There have been three questions which embarrassed them in coming to a sound conclusion. Some recommend two Boats to run between Halifax and Boston, touching at the Western Ports; others suggest Boats along the Western Coast, and from Yarmouth to St. John and Digby,

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Digby, and thence to Halifax—and a third, two Boats fitted for a Coasting Voyage between this and Yarmouth, only touching in their routes at the intermediate Ports.

The Committee have determined to recommend the last and most moderate scheme in the first instance, because they are of opinion that this will be safe and certain, while the others are yet speculative and doubtful. The Public enterprises of the past—the Province Building, the immense Steam Boat between this and Quebec, the Iron Company at Annapolis, and other public enterprizes, are all admitted to be speculations far beyond the present means and progress of the Country, and are standing memorials of how much Capital may be wasted, and public energy misapplied, and public expectation disappointed, by acting upon false estimates, and without sound enquiry and calculations.

The Boats for the purpose would be built either at St. John, or perhaps at Pictou, (for Mr. Davis, at the Albion Mines, is admitted to be a highly competent Engineer,) at a cost not beyond the capital which would easily be commanded for the purpose, and the machinery could be kept in thorough repair at Mr. John's Foundry, in Halifax. Boats running to Boston and St. John, would be larger and more costly, and require too great an outlay of capital. Besides there is a prospect of a line being introduced between this Port and Boston, by the Government; after the line of trade between this and Shelburne has been established and tried, successfully as they believe the result will be, the communication may be extended, and more expensive Boats introduced.

Boats of a second class as to speed, might be bought at a moderate price in England or Scotland. They disapprove, besides, of the speculation being first introduced by a public Company. The Liverpool Packets, the Steam Boat Company from Halifax to Dartmouth, the Steam Boat to Quebec, all tends to show that this is a species of property best entrusted to private management; and from the facts they have collected, they are inclined to hope, that one or two of our Capitalists in Halifax, and three or four of those on our Western Coast, may be

induced to enter speedily upon the speculation.

In the following table they exhibit the present Statistics of the Trade and Communication between Halifax and the Western Ports, and as the Committee intend to persevere in their enquiry until the object is accomplished, they solicit information upon the heads embraced in the Table, from any quarter. They ask, with like anxiety, for corrections as well as additions.

Between Halifax and Lunenburg, there are two regular Packets, which, on the average, run three times in the month, or six voyages. The freight for each trip is calculated at £8 per trip—£24 per month for each Packet—£288 per year, and the annual amount of freight for both Packets £576. Five Passengers in each and every voyage, ten per trip, at 7s. 6d. £3 15s. per trip—£11 5s. per month—£135 per year—or £270 for both annually, independent of Freight and Passengers from Malagash by Coasters, and Packet from Chester.

LIVERPOOL—there are three Packets regularly employed, each accomplishing 30 voyages to and from Halifax annually; value of the freights per trip estimated at £10, equal to £300 annually for each, or £900 freight in all. Eight Passengers for each trip, at 10s. per head—£4 per trip—£120 passage money, annually, for each Packet—£360 in all per year. A large part of the carrying trade is conducted, and passengers conveyed by the vessels making Foreign Voyages, which sail to and from Liverpool and Halifax.

SHELBURNE—there are two regular Packets running between this Port and Halifax. They are employed about 9 months in the year, they make, during that time, about fifteen trips each, and the amount of Freight and Passage Money per trip is £20, equal to £300 per

annum for each Packet, or for both, £600 per year.

BARRINGTON—There are four regular Coasting Vessels employed between this Port and Halifax, from 1st April to 1st December, the Passage Money is 10s. each, passengers finding provisions. The value of the Freights earned by these and the vessels going occasionally, is estimated at £1500 to £2000 per annum. The Imports from Halifax include all the Domestic and Foreign Produce required for consumption, and the freights to Halifax, are Fish, Oil, Oars, Staves, Lumber, Butter, Eggs, &c.

YARMOUTH—There are four Vessels employed as Packets between this Port and Halifax, one of them makes annually 18 to 20 voyages, another 8. There are four other Vessels which run occasionally. Freights are large. The best Packet has been known to have 18 passen-

gers at one time, the passage money from 12s. 6d. to 20s. Freights are carried besides by other Vessels at all seasons of the year. One House in Halifax made last year 26 different shipments to this Port. The annual Freight paid to Packets is estimated at £1000 to £1200, the Passage money £600 to £700. On the 1st January, 1839, the Shipping belonging to Yarmouth, independent of Argyle, was

120 Vessels-10,301 tons.

Six of these above 200 tons, and 39 from 100 to 200 tons.

ARCYLE—No Packets between this Port and Halifax.

Independent of these Tables, there is a large amount of intercourse conducted in Vessels going and coming from Foreign Voyages, in Fishing Vessels sailing from the Western Harbors, who come to Halifax for outfits, and return here, bringing their Cargoes; and the Coasting Vessels coming from the smaller Harbors and Coves along the Coast, belonging to the producers themselves.

From a list kept at the Custom-House last year, it appears that the large number of 4000

Cargoes were brought into Halifax in Coasters, in 1838.

Annual Receipt of the present trade, exclusive of the expected increase £6655 0 0 If the return of the present trade could be combined, and the carriage of the Mails be secured, the Committee are of opinion, that two Boats, which would cost about £20,000, would pay; but they trust that the House of Assembly, in the exercise of that liberal spirit which they apply to the aid of public measures of this useful and promising character, will be inclined to aid it in the three or four first years of its introduction, by a fixed annual grant for either of these periods.

It is the settled conviction of your Committee, that the trade of our Western Ports has already reached a sufficient progress for the above purpose, which renders them thus earnest in pressing their present recommendation; but when they turn to the Statistics of other Countries, and examine the rapid increase both of trade and intercourse of Goods and Passengers, which has taken place from the introduction of Steam Packets along practicable and promising lines, they feel persuaded, that in supporting this scheme, they are pressing a measure which is eminently calculated to follow out the professions and establish the reputation of the Committee, of prosecuting, with equal anxiety, the prosperity of the Capital and Outports, so as to combine the Commercial energies and spirit of the Province into one effective focus.

They proceed now to exhibit some of the Statistics above referred to, and to point out the advantages which they anticipate will follow from the introduction of these Boats.

In 1814, the first Steam-Boat was built in Great-Britain upon the Clyde. It was of 74 tons burthen, and passed that year from Glasgow to Liverpool, being the first which ever entered the latter mighty port. In 1836, there were employed in the Coasting Trade of Great-Britain, 600 Steam Vessels, their united Tonnage was 67,959 tons. In the same year, the number of Vessels which entered in the Coasting Trade of Great-Britain, was

Inwards—12,988 Ships, 2,528,216 tons. Outwards—12,634 " 2,488,327 "

Foreign Voyages—exclusive of France and Holland: Inwards—1,122 Ships, 195,722 tons. Outwards—1,255 202,499 " Holland—Inwards—50 10,948 " 14,249 Outwards—67

In the British Plantations, in 1836, there were 69 Steam Boats—9,700 tons.

These Boats run now daily from Liverpool to Dublin twice a day, and to Glasgow once. On this last line there are two Companies, and the Boats sail alternately from Glasgow and Liverpool -a Boat leaving each place daily. They embrace the carrying trade and passengers. From Glasgow, Bristol and Liverpool, they sail to Belfast, Londonderry and Cork; from London to Dundee and Edinburgh, to Cork, Dublin, Bristol, Hull, and all parts of the Continent, Ostend, Hamburg, the Rhine, Lisbon, Gibraltar, Malta, and other ports of the Mediterranean. One may cross now from Liverpool to Dublin, thence to Marseilles, and thence to Naples or Rome. They perambulate the Coasts of Ireland and the North of Scotland, in all times of Summer. Tourists for pleasure have multiplied by thousands. Again in the port of Liverpool, the increase is beyond calculation. The Boats cross to Cheshire at six different places every fifteen minutes. St. George's Pier there seems almost alive with Steam-Boats. Such are the number of Steam-Boats now upon the Clyde, that it is said a Boat leaves the Bromielaw, touching at Greenock, and a Boat passes the Pier at Greenock, bound to Glasgow, every ten minutes during the Summer months, from 8 in the morning till 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The deck passage under an awning for 24 miles, is only 1s. 3d.

The following are the particulars as regards the number of Steam Boats for short Ferries

which pass across the Mersey, at Liverpool, each day.

Egremont, Woodside, Birkenhead, Seacombe, Rock Ferry, Royal Rock Ferry,

Steamboats pass from theseplaces to and from Liverpool during the Summer, every 15. minutes, from 6 A. M. to 9 P. M.

New Brighton—Six passages made each day.

Two voyages performed each day. The Weston Point distance from Liverpool is 22 miles, and) the charge of passage only 1s. Rimcorn,

These are Boats for the conveyance of Passengers; but there are also a great number of Steam-Boats employed in the tugging trade.

Again, in the United States, the increase has been equally rapid. In 1830, there were 5

Steam-Boats on the Ohio; last year the number is estimated at 370.

To come to particulars, and to show the increase upon certain lines, the Committee extract the following from returns submitted to Parliament.

It would be easy to add to this evidence, by quoting from the returns of other lines; but the Committee refrain from pressing this argument, lest it should be said that the analogies between an old and new Country do not prevail; and that although these results have been uniform in the Mother Country and Europe, it does not follow that they would be felt in this Province. They admit the force of this argument. The results which have occurred in an old Country cannot be expected in a new; but, strange as it may seem, the experience of the United States justifies the conclusion, that the rate of increase upon any given trade, in a certain period of years, has been greater there than in Europe. They apply this argument to the Statistics of the Western Trade above presented, and proceed to give a brief explanation of the benefits which the establishment of this line of intercourse would proably confer

In the first place it is clear that if these Boats were established, the ease and speed of, and of course the inducements to, travelling, would be increased. How many persons are there on the Western Coasts who have never seen the Capital, and how many are there in Halifax who have never visited our Western Shores; who, if safe Steam-Boats were introduced, would be glad to avail themselves of this new means of conveyance. Men of business, stationed at the outports, in place of paying an annual visit to Halifax, would come once a month, or oftener, according to the exigencies of business. Our Merchants would then return a visit to their customers; and many, in the pursuit of pleasure and of health, would be glad in the Summer to visit the beautiful and rising towns, which are situate on our Western Shores, and see the romantic beauties of the Bay of Chester, and our Giant's causeway at Brier Island. Intimacies and family unions would increase, Commercial and Social connexions would multiply, and the trade and prosperity of the Towns and Western Harbours would improve. Such have been the effects in other Countries, and to a certain extent they would follow here.

- 2. The same spirit of speculation which animates our Merchants in the Capital, would extend to those who reside to the Westward. A Steam Boat running with certainty from Liverpool to Halifax, for example, would make it not a distant connexion, but a maritime suburb of the town. The Merchants there would take part in our speculations—we would take part in theirs; the same connexions and sympathies would extend to Yarmouth—one of the most thriving and prosperous ports of the Province, and the trade, which from Barrington westward to Annapolis, is conducted at St. John's, might be attracted to its own legitimate channels, and be brought back to Halifax, where it formerly centered. If such an intimacy and connexions were established, our and their speculations would extend to the stock of goods and produce both in the Capital and Outports. In Liverpool and London, (England) the introduction of the Rail Road has made the speculations upon their two Exchanges nearly the same in price, for the distance of two hundred and ten miles is now reduced to ten hours.
- 3. These Boats will afford a new and better market to all the Agricultural produce and supplies raised on the Western Shores. Vegetables, Eggs, Butter and Poultry, and Fish and Salmon would come to Halifax from our most distant ports, and while this would benefit the Farmer and Fisherman, it would also benefit the Town. The introduction of Steam across the Irish Channel, has had a wonderful effect in extending the sources of supply in England, for these and other articles. For example, the Salmon sold in the London and Liverpool Markets, are brought by Steam from the South of Ireland and the North of Scotland. A large part of the fresh Beef, Mutton and Pork, Eggs, Milk and Butter, sold in Liverpool and Manchester, and now in the Birmingham Markets, since the late completion of the Rail Road, are brought daily from Ireland in Steam Boats. The London Markets are daily

daily supplied with the finer Vegetables of France from Bologne; and it is known, that in New York, Peaches pulled in Pensylvania on the evening, or on the Hudson, 150 miles distant, may be bought there the following morning. In the present scarcity and rise in price of all articles of food, which are so generally complained of by house keepers, any means which would increase the supplies of these articles from Liverpool, LaHave and Argyle, would be hailed as a public benefit. On the Agricultural improvement of the Western Shore it would have decided action, by extending the facilities of transport and a market, and thus holding out the best inducements to industry.

[4. If each of these Boats were attended by a Revenue Officer, they might benefit the Revenue, and thus amply return the grant afforded by the Legislature, by guarding against Smugglers, and preventing the American Fishermen from violating the provisions of the treaty

which affects so sensibly the Coasting Trade and the extent of our exports.

5. The last and most important result which would follow in this pursuit of a common measure and in this increase of Social and Commercial relations would be to inspire a happier tone of confidence and kindly feeling between Halifax and the Outports, upon which the trade and prosperity of both so much depends. No Country, and especially a young Province like this, can advance to any high and enviable career of prosperity and influence without the aid of a metropolis, to which men of talent, enterprise and fortune, naturally resort. It is the combined influence of mind and money, of industry and capital, which leads to public improvement and prosperity; but your Committee are aware, that Halifax never can be permanently prosperous, unless it affords a kindly and judicious aid to every District and Town, upon which its trade depends; and the Committee therefore recommend the common improvement of Town and Country—of Halifax and the Outports—as the most effective and indeed the only sure means of elevating both.

The Committee of public expenditure having had various accounts submitted to them since their last report to the House, all of which have received their attention and mature

consideration, beg leave to report finally, and as follows:—

On Messrs. John Howe & Son's account for the year 1838, for Printing, &c, the aggregate of which is £664 12s. That amount contains charges for Publishing the Laws of the Province, in the Royal Gazette, £117 5s. Printing Journals belonging to the House of Assembly, £265; Printing Laws, £65.—£447 5s. The Committee on referring to the Appendix of the Journal, of 1835, page 65, observe an agreement recognized by a Committee of this House, and apparently assented to by Messrs. Howe & Son, to Print 200 copies of the Journals, with Appendix, but without Index, and 450 copies of the Laws enacted during each Session, besides inserting the latter in the Gazette, for £350 per annum, which sum has been paid them for the year 1838; and as it does not appear to the Committee, that any subsequent agreement has been entered into, to warrant the charge of the difference between the larger sum of £447 5s. set forth in their account, and the sum of £350 granted and paid to them; the Committee therefore cannot recommend to the House the payment of the difference, which is £97 5. With respect to the extra Printing and Binding, amounting to £97 7s. no evidence appears before your Committee of the work having been done, except the charges as exhibited by the account, and the Committee submit to the House, whether vouchers and certificates ought not, in future, to accompany such account; they however recommend the payment of the latter sum, for the extra service of last year; also, the sum of £120 for the Journals supplied the Legislative Council.

The Committee, from their individual knowledge of the Queen's Printers, know, that nothing intentionally wrong could appear in their accounts with the public, yet they cannot discharge their duty as a Committee of public expenditure, without having before them all the information which would be required from one less known to them, and which would enable them to make their report with that accuracy and confidence which is expected from them. And in order that their accounts may in some manner explain themselves, your Committee would recommend that hereafter, when a grant of money is made by the House to the Queen's Printers, for a specific time and service, and it should be necessary for them to advert to that sum in their accounts with the public, the time such grant was made, the conditions required, the services to be rendered or to be performed, should, by way of revival, be clearly and intelligibly specified. Such a course would render the queries and research, which must otherwise take place on those subjects, quite unnecessary, and would beside save much time to the Committee before whom such accounts may hereafter come.

On the account and vouchers submitted, embracing the expenses incurred by the Humane Establishment, on the Island of Scatarie, the expenditure appears to be within the meaning of the Act relating to that Establishment, and the Committee therefore recommend the payment of £173.

The accounts of Alexander Millar and Gaius Lewis, the former amounting to £20 4s. the latter to £9, for Surveying the line between the Counties of Cumberland and Colchester, the Committee recommend to be paid, the duty having been performed.

On the account of Scott Tremain, Registrar and Clerk of the Court of Vice Admiralty, for

expenses incurred in the Trial of John Longmire for Murder on the High Seas:

Your Committee recommend the payment of the Fees of the Registrar of that Court £14 17 4—of the Marshall £1 1—of the Crier £1—of the Sheriff £3 13—all of which sums are to be paid in Currency; but they do not feel justified in recommending to the House the payment of the Fees of the Solicitor-General charged in the said account.

The Committee appointed by a Resolution of this Honorable House, to enquire into the evils resulting from the Sale of Ardent Spirits within this Province, and to report upon the best method of suppressing those evils, submit, that, in prosecution of the duties assigned to them, they addressed Circulars to Clergymen, Medical Practitioners, and persons of respectability, residing in different parts of the Province, with a view to obtain the most extensive information possible on the subject; that the Circulars have been answered from every County in the Province; and although your Committee cannot arrive at a just knowledge of the number of Shops and Taverns opened for the Sale of Liquors throughout the Province, yet their information warrants them to assert, that that number is exceedingly great, far exceeding, in their opinion, what would be necessary, even if no evil was to result from such Sale.—They also report that they are informed, that Spirituous Liquors are sold in small quantities within the Province, not only by Licensed dealers, but in several places, by those who are not Licensed, and the universal testimony they have received is, that evils of the greatest magnitude accrue to families and Individuals, by the easy way in which Liquors can be obtained by such persons: They are warranted to assert, that, from the Sale of Ardent Spirits, families have been brought to ruin and disgrace—Parents and Children have become its victims, and those who have been once in comfortable circumstances, have thereby been reduced to want, and instances have been reported to them upon respectable authority, where Houses have been Mortgaged, and others sold to pay the Rum Seller for his Liquors: neither have Education, Talent, and professional knowledge, resisted their baneful influence; for those haunts of vice have entrapped some, who once moved in the best circles of Society, and whose death has been in the Poor House of the Town in which we are now assembled; your Committee are also authorised to report, that every mode by which Ardent Spirits can be obtained, leads to a much more extended range of evil than that immediately caused by their use, upon the system, inasmuch that as profanity of the Sabbath, Thests, Murders, Assaults, and Debaucherses of every description, in both Males and Females, have resulted. From all which your Committee report, the evils that result from the use of Ardent Spirits, caused by the easy, ready way in which they can be obtained, to be immense, and such as call loudly upon the wisdom of this Honorable House, as the guardians of the public good, to prevent. With respect to the best method of suppressing the evils, many suggestions have been presented to your Committee, such as not allowing the Sale of Liquors in smaller quantities than twenty Gallons, except by Druggists or other proper persons, for Medicinal use,—The prohibiting of their Importation and Sale altogether; a confining of the number of Licenses to a small number throughout the Province, in proportion to a definite number of Inhabitants; the raising of the Duties on the Imported article, and the License Monies to a heavy amount; and the Constitutionality of Legislative Enactments in the cause of Temperance, has also been before your Committee, and received their consideration, and which they have considered, and now mention as a foundation upon which they build what they are now about to report, and upon which they hope to see a superstructure hereafter raised,—It is said by some, to be unconstitutional to restrain or break down a particular branch of Commerce, or of Manufactures: This question, as your Committee believe, originated in the United States—there the Legislative Bodies act in virtue of limited powers conferred on them by the people, under written Constitutions; whatever power the people have not expressly delegated, they reserve to themselves, and questions are frequent in the American Courts, where the State Acts and Acts of Congress are subjected to comparison with the Constitution, and either affirmed or rejected, as being unconstitutional; under the British Law, the principle of Government your Committee believes to be directly the reverse,—Our Parliaments have always exercised the fullest powers of Legislation, limited only by the immutable rules of justice. The only reserved right of the people in the British Constitution, is that of re-electing their Representatives in Parframent at stated periods. The Legislative power under the British system, has no limits but the public good—your Committee therefore have considered that a British people, having a Colonial Legislature, where a Law is proposed for adoption, would naturally in-

quire first into the Justice of the Act, next with regard to its expediency, and lastly, whether it militated against any regulation or principle enjoined by the Imperial Parliament, for the general interests of the empire, your Committee are of opinion that no other kind of constitutionality can be sought in our system of Law.-The words "Constitutional" and "Unconstitutional," are often used vaguely, but the meaning generally attached to them has reference to the justice or injustice of a Law, and not to its conformity to any written charter or standard.—Justice is a wide and protecting principle, and under her broad shield freedom, honor and virtue, may always find shelter.—Your Committee therefore report that there can be little doubt of the justice of any coercive regulation to restrain the traffic in Ardent Spirits, yet they cannot think it would be expedient, in the present state of Society, to go to any decided and prohibitary Penal Laws on this head-men can never be driven contrary to their inclinations without great difficulty—if the minds of persons are convinced and persuaded of the utility and justice of a regulation, the general feeling is in its favor—if then passed into a Law, it will no longer be looked upon as compulsory, but will be obeyed with readiness.—But viewing this Honorable House as the guardians of the public good and public morals, and as the Grand Inquest of the Province, to suppress all evils, they recommend that the cause of Temperance should receive the most unqualified sanction of this Honorable House, and for the purpose of gaining the voice of public opinion in its favour, with a view hereafter to adopt such wise regulations for the suppression of those evils as may seem meet—that a correspondence should be held with the Legislatures of New-Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, inviting their attention to the subject.

The Committee to whom was referred the subject of the Crown Lands in Nova-Scotia, have had the same under consideration, and submit to this Honorable House the conclusions to which they have arrived, accompanied with some suggestions as to the changes which might be adopted with advantage to the Colony:

The Committee are unanimous in pronouncing the existing system to be opposed to the peace and prosperity of Nova-Scotia—it prevents the settlement of the young and industrious Natives—it discourages Emigration, and it is attended with an expence far beyond what would be required for carrying out a plan much better adapted to our situation and circumstances.

In those opinions the Committee are strengthened not merely by their own investigations, but by the expressed voice of the Representative Branch of the Legislature in former discussions, and that of Her Majesty's Executive Council, when the same subject was considered by them some years since.

In the opinion of the Committee this subject ought to be considered with a view to the peculiar situation of Nova-Scotia, as contrasted with the Colonies of Upper and Lower Canada and New Brunswick, which abound with immense Tracts of valuable Lands lying together in bodies, valuable as well for Agricultural as for Lumbering purposes, whilst this Province, tho' it still contains considerable quantities of unlocated Land of the same description, possesses it in such detached parcels as holds out no encouragement to Land Companies, and consequently none of the facilities for settlement, which their capital and enterprize are calculated to produce.

In the opinion of the Committee the arrangement for disposal of the Lands should have reference to the two qualities above mentioned—those adapted for Agricultural purposes to be granted gratuitously to Natives and Emigrants, desirous of immediate settlement, in Lots not exceeding Two Hundred Acres, upon condition that they pay all expenses of Survey and of the Letters Patent—and those Lands fit only for Lumbering, to be sold under, and subject to such regulations as should be established by the Lieutenant-Governor and Her Majesty's Executive Council, who have the means of acquiring information as to their sitution and value.

The Committee further report, that in recommending the gratuitous grants, they are influenced by the knowledge they possess of the general impossibility which exists of commanding money in those parts of the Province where settlements are formed—these are usually in the immediate proximity of those Tracts in the interior, which were formerly gratuitously bestowed upon the Inhabitants, and whose Children, growing up around them, naturally desire a residence in the same neighbourhood. In these Settlements, labor is seldom rewarded with money, it is oftener given by the Inhabitants in exchange with each other, and the produce of their Farms also is usually disposed of in the way of barter, thus leaving to the young and industrious but little opportunity of realizing the means of complying with the terms of a money payment, now imposed by the Government. Besides this, the new Settler has to encounter the obstacles and difficulties incident to a climate like ours, in the commencement and progress of reclaiming from the Forest a sufficient spot to give support to himself and Family. The time occupied, and expense incurred in cutting down the Wood and clearing the Land, and erecting the necessary Buildings, are considerations which must have their weight, and indeed lead to the conclusion, that they are sufficient to be borne without the addition of the original purchase money.

These difficulties added to the price, have deterred hundreds of young men from attempting to take up Lands under the present system, some of whom have abandoned altogether their native Province, whilst others are waiting in expectation of more favorable terms from

Her Majesty's Government.

The Sales of Lands which have taken place, afford no argument against these views,—Whilst it is undeniable, that but a portion of those anxious to settle have become purchasers; it will also be found that a considerable portion of the Lands sold have been valuable Tracts of Land, fit for Lumbering purposes—much of which is now passing out of the hands of Government, at a rate far below their actual value, and in a manner injurious to the future interests of this Province.

But in addition to the unwise as well as injurious practice of selling this description of Land, your Committee must observe, that the entire system is defective; the practice of selling detached parcels of Land scattered all over a County, without reference to any general survey, or to the lines of Road which must be provided and supported by the Legislature, throws upon its funds a burthen and expense that ought as far as possible to be avoided, and promises hereafter a confusion with respect to lines and bounds, which would not arise if the Lands were surveyed and laid out into Blocks, with corresponding Roads accommodated to the Settlers, and where the lines were distinctly traced, and not likely to be altered.

Your Committee must also condemn the practice of making Sales of Lands by Auction, and at stated times—frequently as the Committee is informed, have Emigrants arrived in this Province, with the means of making purchases, and with a desire to remain, but unacquainted with the Country, without the aid or advice of any Board competent to give them the necessary information, and unable to support the delay consequent upon a search after a suitable tract of Land, and the time requisite for giving the notice of Sale imposed by the instructions, they have passed on and become Aliens, in a foreign land, furnishing an additional proof that the system is in all its details, opposed to the best interests of the Province.

To obviate these defects, to put the Executive in possession of all necessary information respecting the quantity, quality, and situation of the Lands of Nova-Scotia—to facilitate the immediate settlement of hundreds of our native youth—to give encouragement to Emigration—to preserve and render available to the public use those valuable tracts of Timber Land still undisposed of, and to quiet the minds and murmurs of a loyal and industrious population, were the objects of the Bill introduced and unanimously passed by this House at their last Sitting, and which your Committee are still of opinion would be a great improvement upon the system now in operation.

ment upon the system now in operation.

But whilst your Committee entertain the strongest hopes of the surrender of these Lands to the people of Nova-Scotia, upon terms and conditions with which they can reasonably comply, and with power to the Legislature to regulate the mode and manner as well as the expence of disposing of them—they cannot overlook the possibility that their wishes may not be realized in their full extent—and therefore they feel it to be their duty to suggest, that if the practice of selling the Lands be still adhered to, notwithstanding the expressed opinions

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opinions of the Legislature as to its injurious tendency, it would afford some relief to the Poor Settlers if payment of the purchase money might in whole or part be received in labour, by requiring their assistance to run out and survey the Lands, and where practicable, to set them off into Lots, and in laying out and making of Roads, by which means the value of the Lands would be increased—the difficulty of payment in cash would be avoided or lessened—and the confusion referred to effectually prevented.

And they would lastly suggest, that a credit might be given upon the purchasers furnish-

ing sufficient security to pay by instalments.

THE Committee appointed to examine and report to this House upon the subject of the Petition of Peter Morriscy and others, have examined the Street referred to in said Petition, (called Albemarle Street) and have examined several Persons interested therein, and find that the Street, prior to 1831, had been neglected. Since that time, Mr. Curry, the Overseer, states that it has received a fair proportion of attention from the Commissioners of Streets, and this last year has had expended upon it £233 7s.; but the Committee observe that the Gutters are unpaved, and that no Sewer leads through it to enable the Inhabitants to drain their Cellars, and believe the Street to be much injured by ashes being thrown into the Gutters.

The Committee conceive that, under the existing Law, the proper quarter to have applied to for redress would have been the Executive—this they beg leave to state without the least intention of inferring that the Commissioners of Streets have neglected their duty. The duty of Commissioners of Streets being intrusted to but few individuals, the Committee would therefore offer as a suggestion to this Honorable House, the propriety of havings the Law so amended as to give them power to appoint a Superintendent to each Street. This Committee, consisting only of two, have thought it advisable to report the facts, that this House may adopt such action thereon as to them may deem advisable.

The Committee will not undertake to decide on the reasons or on the wisto the Public. dom of the policy of the Imperial Government, in directing Dollars to be received at the advanced rate of 4s. 4d. Sterling, whether to assimilate to the rate at which they were paid to the Troops, or otherwise—but here a benefit evidently accrues to the importer, in reducing the amount of the Imperial Duties, to the extent of the over-valuation of the Dollar, and the benefit extends indiscriminately to every Importer, and to every part of the Province; and although the Revenue is thereby decreased, the Public are thereby relieved to the extent of that decrease, in the payment of Duties. This reasoning cannot apply, or, at least, to a very limited and partial extent, to the payment of Coins out of the Provincial Treasury, at less than their current value, thus, to a still further extent, diminishing the Revenue. The idea of fixing the value by the standard of the old Halifax Currency, is, in the judgment of the Committee, altogether a fiction; the base on which it stood is gone, the Dollar at 4s. 6d. Sterling, is not in existence, and no enactment, and no authority can retain it at a valuation which, for many years, has been abandoned by the whole trading world. Every Dollar therefore that is paid out of the Treasury at less than its market value, is an unnecessary and negligent waste of the Funds of the Province, without any counteracting advantage; the few who derive the benefit, being so small a portion of the community, as to make it very limited and partial, and therefore improper and unjust. The Committee are of opinion that the Law should be revised and amended, so as to authorise and direct the Treasurer to pay all Dollars out of the Treasury at their current market value, to be ascertained and determined by him. The option of receiving either Province Paper, or Dollars at that rate, to be with the person to whom payment is made.—All which is respectfully submitted.

SIR-

I have to request that you will, at your early convenience, furnish me with a report on the state of any of the aboriginal Inhabitants who may still exist in the Province under your Government, shewing their numbers and present condition, increase or decrease, which has, during the last few years, occurred among them—their moral state, and any efforts which have been made for their civilization,—the proportion settled on the land and cultivating it, and the numbers who still adhere to the habits of savage life,—the amount if any, of property belonging to them, and the effect of any local Statutes which may have been passed for their Government. I would request you to add to this Report any other information which you may consider important, and more especially to favor me with any suggestions as to the measures which would be best calculated to ameliorate the condition of these people.

THE Committee appointed to examine and enquire into the present state of the Bridewell in Halifax, and of the Prisoners confined therein; and also, touching various other subiects connected therewith, beg to report that they have visited and examined that Establishment, and find the same in a very delapidated and insecure state, and quite insufficient to contain any Prisoners disposed to make their escape. That there are confined within its walls 22 Culprits, viz: 7 men, 14 women, and 1 infant. Two of the men and one woman having been committed prior to 1838, and the term of their confinement not being yet expired. That one of the men last mentioned was sent from Windsor—the remaining individuals being vagrants and persons committed during the present year by the Authorities of Halifax. Your Committee find that the expense of the Establishment exceeds the amount arising from the labour of its inmates; and that although the Establishment was originally intended, and may now be considered as almost exclusively, for the accommodation of the Town of Halifax, yet they, with surprise, learn that the Grand Jury and Court of General Sessions for the County of Halifax have contributed nothing from the County Funds towards its support since 1835. That no Criminals were sent to this Establishment from the several Counties of the Province previous to 1816, and such as have since that period been sent thereto have, either from the insufficiency of the Establishment or other causes, rarely remained therein their full term of confinement. That while your Committee are unanimously of opinion that this delapidated and inefficient Establishment ought not hereafter to receive any further Legislative aid, they recommend that the sum of £371 16s. 10d. be granted and placed at the disposal of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, to re-imburse him in the amount drawn by his authority from the Provincial Treasury, leaving any balance claimed, and all further expenses or debts that may have been, or may hereafter be, contracted for the support of the Establishment to be assessed upon, and paid by, the Inhabitants of the County of Halifax; and your Committee are of opinion that no further sum of Money should be granted by this House under any pretence whatever for the support of this Establishment, more especially as the several Counties in the Province have been instructed to provide for their own Criminals, until some efficient Provincial Establishment shall be erected.
