Gentlemen of the Legislative Council; and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I have it in command from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, to inform you that he will defer declaring the causes of calling this General Assembly, until the House of Assembly have elected a Speaker-It is therefore the pleasure of His Excellency that the Gentlemen of the House of Assembly repair to the place where they usually sit, and there elect a Speaker, and present him for His Excellency's approbation.

The House of Assembly then retired, and, after a short time, having returned, the Hon. S. G. W. Archibald, Member for the County of Colchester, addressed His Excellency as follows:

May it please Your Lordship ;

The House of Assembly, agreeably to your Lordship's command, have proceeded to the choice of a Speaker, and have elected the Honorable Joseph Howe, Member for the County of Halifax, to that Office, and, by their direction, I beg leave to present him for your Lordship's approbation.

After which, His Excellency was pleased to say, "I approve of the Speaker which the House of Assembly have chosen."

Then the Speaker of Assembly said,

May it please your Excellency;

Your Excellency's ready approval of the choice which the House of Assembly have made of myself to be their Speaker, emboldens me to hope that in all their future acts they may have the good fortune to secure your Excellency's approbation. It now becomes my duty, in the name of the Representatives of the People, most respectfully to demand all their accustomed rights and privileges, that they may have freedom of speech in their debates-that they and their servants may be free from arrest, during their attendance upon Parliament-that I, as their Speaker, may have free access to your Excellency-and that if, in the discharge of my duties, any errors are committed, they may be attributed by your Excellency to my youth and inexperience, and not to the Body over which I have the honor to preside.

To which His Excellency replied,

Mr. Speaker,

I most cheerfully grant your requests, conformably to ancient usage, the Laws of the Land, and the Royal Instructions.

Then His Excellency was pleased to open the Session by a Speech to both Houses.

The House of Assembly having withdrawn, His Excellency was pleased to retire soon after. The Honorable the President informed the House that he was in possession of a copy of His Excellency's Speech, which he read, and is as follows :

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I HAVE called you together at the earliest opportunity after the close of the General Election, being desirous of placing myself on the first favorable occasion in direct communication with the Legislature of the Province, the Government of which I have been appointed to administer, because I feel that in my endeavours to discharge faithfully the arduous duties entailed on me by the confidence of my Sovereign, your co-operation and support will be of the utmost importance, and productive of the best results.

I believe it to be indispensable to the prosperity of Nova-Scotia, that a sufficient degree of reciprocal confidence should exist between the three Branches of the Legislature, to insure from each a fair and candid construction of the acts of the other constituent powers, as well as to induce, on the part of those to whom, by the constitution, the exercise of the purely Legislative functions of the Government is specially confided, a disposition to aid the Representative of the Crown in his efforts to give effect to the beneficent intentions of the Queen: to establish and preserve such a feeling of mutual reliance, is therefore

therefore the object of my extreme solicitude, nor have I any other than a sanguine expectation that the course I shall pulsue, of maintaining inviolate the Royal Prerogative, the beneficial influence of which on the interests of the subject time has demonstrated, while I conscientiously exert it, whenever my duty to Her Majesty admits of my so doing, in accordance with the wishes of the Community in general: making the authority with which I am invested conducive to the furtherance of measures adapted to draw forth the resources and meet the wants of the Country, my labors to that end being shared by those enjoying the public confidence and best qualified to judge of the public interests, will produce general harmony, and secure to me, from the British Subjects of this Province, that sympathy and assistance which I deem necessary to enable me to do my duty to the Throne, by promoting their welfare, and thereby strengthening those bonds of loyalty and affection to our Sovereign end attachment to the Parent State, by which it is my happiness to feel assured that all Nova-Scotians are now united.

Since your last Meeting it has pleased Divine Providence to bless with Offspring the union of our Gracious Monarch and her august Consort: you will, I am confident, participate in those sentiments of exultation and gratitude, felt by your fellow subjects at Home, at the birth of a Princess Royal, as at an event calculated to add to the stability of the Throne, and contribute to the domestic felicity of our beloved Royal Mistress.

I rejoice to have it in my power to congratulate you on the flourishing state of the Province in general.—It will be found, on reference to Returns which I have directed to be submitted to you, that Trade has progressively increased, and that a proportionate augmentation has taken place in the Revenue, while the thriving condition of the mercantile interest has had an advantageous effect on the Agricultural Districts of the Country.

I have thought it expedient to retain in activity, to the latest period authorized by your Acts, the vessels manned, and fitted out, for the protection of the Fisheries : it will at all times be one of the most interesting and imperative of my duties to unite with you in fostering this important branch of industry, regarding it not only as a source of commercial wealth, but as affording the means of subsistence, and I trust c. comfort to a brave, loyal and valuable class of our fellow subjects.

We have to be grateful for a harvest which, if not superabundant, has been at least an average one, and I have the satisfaction to learn from all quarters that the grain, grown, is of very superior quality. I perceive, on referring to the Journals, that you have entered on an enquiry as to the best mode of affording encouragement to the Agriculturist: I shall have much pleasure in contributing to the successful action of any measure you may decide on, as calculated to stimulate the enterprize of the Farmer, lead to a more scientific system of cultivation, and a reward equivalent to his meritorious exertions.

I have to acquaint you that all matters commended to the attention of the Executive, by the Legislature, at the close of the last Session, have been duly cared for, and all correspondence relating thereto will be communicated to both Houses without delay.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

The Accounts to the 31st December are ready for your inspection. I trust you will find that the money voted by you has been honestly appropriated and judiciously applied to the purposes for which it was granted. The Estimates for the current year will be laid before you; they have been prepared with every attention to economy consistent with a proper regard for the exigencies of the public service.

It is a ground for the indulgence of encouraging anticipations as regards the future, that you enter on your Parliamentary duties with no greater amount of Debt than existed four years ago, while the increase of the Revenue places at your disposal means far more ample than your predecessors enjoyed, both of diminishing this burthen, and of effecting necessary public improvements; of these one of the most essential which we can contemplate is the amelioration of the great Lines of Communication between this port and the eastern and western extremities of the Province. I am convinced you, will judge it of the first consequence that these highways should be kept in a proper condition, not only because they are, by the accommodation they afford, a prime source of the welfare of the Agricul-

tual

tural Classes, and of the internal prosperity of Nova-Scotia, but because it has latterly become a matter of great national interest that the supervision exercised over their management should be an efficient and an active one.

The British Government, ever anxious to facilitate the intercourse between the Mother Country and her trans-atlantic Offspring, after having expended a very large sum in establishing a line of Steam Ships from Liverpool to our Provincial Capital, "in the confi-"dent expectation that the Colonies, on their part, would not be unwilling to improve the lo-"cal communication," has proposed a plan for the more expeditious conveyance of Mails and Passengers between Halifax and Quebec, as well as between Halifax and New Brunswick; I have been instructed to ask your aid in furtherance of this object, and, after the Resolution passed by the House in the last Session, pledging itself with regard to the expenses of the Post Office, and the liberality of the Imperial Parliament, I feel certain the appeal will not be made in vain, but that, as anticipated by the Secretary of State, copies of whose letters will be placed on your table, " the exertions made by Great-Britain for the purpose of " keeping up a regular and rapid intercourse between the Countries, will be met by a cor-" responding feeling on the part of the Colony."

I am enabled, by the assistance of my Council, to offer you a measure conceived with the design of meeting the wishes of the Home Administration, nor do 1 doubt the readiness with which you will give a favorable reception to this Bill, while I feel certain that you will make such pecuniary provision for keeping the Roads in repair as the public funds will admit of, and as is commensurate with the utility and importance of the end in view.

Mr. President, and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council; Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

Among the various subjects which have been brought under my notice, since my arrival in this Colony, the means of more generally diffusing instruction among the people has engaged my most serious attention.

It is deeply to be lamented that, in a country, the population of which is inferior to no other race in physical attributes, and where the necessaries of life are so easily obtained, that a moderate degree of industry raises a man above want, while, by the constitution of society, any one endowed with knowledge and diligence may arrive at the highest social distinction, education should be so difficult of attainment, that the majority of the inhabitants are in consequence deprived of the advantages otherwise open to them by the nature of the institutions under which they live-society itself is retarded in its progress-man's individual happiness marred, and his usefulness in his relations with his fellow creatures impaired by the want of that inestimable blessing. My examination into the working of the system at present established here, has convinced me that this inconvenience is universally felt and generally complained of. While however the extent of the evil is acknowledged by all, a diversity of opinion everywhere prevails as to the mode in which it is to be remedied, each class apprehending having to suffer from the imposition of an undue share of the sacrifice necessary to be made for its removal; the difficulties by which the question is surrounded in consequence of this conflict of opinions, as well as from the local peculiarities of certain Districts, and the variety of religious tenets prevailing in Nova-Scotia, are such as to prevent my being able to propose to you, in the hope of its determination, any measure worthy of adoption.

Your knowledge of the necessities of your several constituencies, and of the different interests of the classes into which they are divided, eminently qualifies you to deliberate on the means of mitigating the privation under which they now suffer, with regard to moral culture, and of bringing about, in this respect, a vast improvement in the condition of the great body of the people in the manner least likely to bear oppressively on any portion of the community.—In recommending to your regard a subject of such momentous interest, I consider it my duty not to withhold the expression of my belief, that any Legislative Act in reference to it, to be satisfactory in its operation, must be based on the principle of general assessment, while I beg to assure you of my very zealous concurrence in any attempt you may make to ameliorate a state of things which I sincerely deplore.

A Committee of Her Majesty's Council being now engaged in revising the Criminal Law, I trust, on the receipt of the report of that Committee, to have it in my power to offer you a Bill embodying all the necessary improvements.

A matter of great public concern, and which has already been much canvassed, will probably again furnish ground for debate, during the present Session-I allude to the Judicatory of the Province-a declaration by the Legislature of the necessity of a change in this department, and an assertion of the principle on which that change should be founded, would be met on the part of the Executive by a sincere desire to act in concert with the wishes of Parliament.

In addition to the measure relating to the Highways, of which I have already spoken, a Bill for the re-construction of the Court of Marriage and Divorce, and another for the Incorporation of the Town of Halifax, will be submitted for your approbation.

In the preparation of these Acts, every anxiety has been felt, both by myself and by those who have assisted me to frame them, that the provisions therein contained should correspond to the exigencies of Society, as established among us. It will be for you to say whether this purpose has been accomplished, and to determine whether they shall become Law. Although the tranquility and happiness of this Country, to promote which, my best energies will hereafter be devoted, and to which I think these, or some similar enactments, would contribute, are too near my heart for me to disguise my earnest hope that they may be deemed in the main well suited to effect the ends contemplated by those who devised them, I both expect and desire that they should be subjected to the most ample discussion and searching investigation, alike as to their principles and details.

May it please your Excellency,

WE, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council of Nova-Scotia, thank Your Excellency for the Speech with which you have been pleased to open the present Session of the General Assembly.

The evidence it affords of Your Excellency's early investigation into subjects of leading importance to the well-being of the Country; of the principles of Government by which Your Excellency, is regulated, and of the co-operation you are ready to give in advancing the prosperity of the country, encourage the anticipation that the Government of the Province, in the hands of a Nobleman of Your Excellency's distinguished family, selected by Her Majesty for the important trust, will not be less marked by honour and impartiality, than by zeal, ability and usefulness.

Believing with Your Excellency, that the best interests of the Country will be promoted by reciprocal confidence among the three branches of the Legislature, we receive with great satisfaction the expression of Your Excellency's extreme solicitude to establish and promote such a feeling of mutual reliance.

On the part of the Legislative Council, it will be our aim, by that candid construction recommended by Your Excellency, of the acts of the other constituent bodies, to promote an object so important, and in every manner to aid the Representative of the Crown in his efforts to give effect to the beneficent intentions of the Queen.

We encourage the confidence that Your Excellency, maintaining inviolate the Royal Prerogative, (the beneficial influence of which, on the interests of the subject, experience has proved,) while yet exerting it, wherever the duty to Her Majesty admits, in accordance with the wishes of the community in general, and making your authority conducive to means adapted to draw forth the resources, and meet the wants of the country, will ensure for Your Excellency's labours the cordial assistance of those enjoying the public confidence, and best qualified to judge of the public interests; and that your Excellency's efforts, thus at once to fulfil the duty owing to the Throne, and to promote the welfare of the people, will produce general harmony, and secure to Your Excellency the sympathy and assistance of Her Majesty's subjects of this Province ; thereby strengthening those bonds of loyalty and affection to our Sovereign, and attachment to the Parent State, by which, we are happy to feel assured, Nova Scotians are united.

The Legislative Council of Nova Scotia participates in the sentiments of exultation and gratitude, felt by our fellow subjects at Home, at the Birth of the Princess Royal, as an event calculated to add to the stability of the Throne, and contribute to the domestic felicity of our beloved Royal Mistress.

We are happy to receive Your Excellency's congratulations on the flourishing state of the Province in general, and to be informed that trade has progressively increased, with a proportionate augmentation in the Revenue, and an advantageous effect on the agricultural districts of the country.

We thank Your Excellency for having retained in activity, to the latest period, the vessels fitted out for the protection of the fisheries, and for the assurance of Your Excellency's disposition to unite in fostering this important branch of industry, which we concur in regarding as a source of commercial wealth, affording means of subsistence and comfort to a brave loyal, and valuable class of our fellow subjects.

We unite in Your Excellency's expression of gratitude for the harvest of the late season, and thank Your Excellency for your desire to contribute to the success of means calculated to stimulate the enterprise of the farmer, lead to a more scientific system of cultivation, and a reward equivalent to his meritorious exertions; and the Legislative Council will feel those labours well directed, which have in view the elevation of the science and practice of agriculture to the honorable and useful station it merits in this Country.

Your Excellency's assurance of the attention paid to all matters commended to the care of the Executive, by the Legislature, at the close of last Session, is entitled to our best acknowl Igment.

We should be wanting in our duty to Your Excellency, to the country, and ourselves, were we to fail to express our gratitude to Your Excellency for the deep interest you have expressed on the subject of Education. We agree with Your Excellency in believing that, while Nova Scotia, as well from the attributes of the people, the circumstances of the country, and the constitution of society, is calculated to derive great and peculiar benefits from the diffusion of Education, it labours under the most serious and extensive privations, from the want of a system at once effective in the instruction afforded, and taking within its operation the whole population.

We agree also with Your Excellency in believing, that no effectual means of obtaining these inestimable blessings will be found, until a system, based on the principle of general assessment, can be established and carried out.

We offer Your Excellency the assurance that (whenever the subject comes before us) we will be prepared to deliberate with the most anxious solicitude on the means best adapted, under all circumstances of the country, for mitigating the privation under which the people suffer, with regard to moral culture, for elevating and extending Education in Nova Scotia, and for bringing about, in this essential particular, the most extensive improvement in the condition of the great body of the people, in the manner least likely to bear oppressively on any portion of the community. And we shall be encouraged, in all our labours, by Your Excellency's promise of zealous concurrence in any attempt the Legislature may make, to ameliorate a state of things which we, in concurrence with Your Excellency, deplore.

The Legislative Council, at a former Session, having given its attention to the amelioration of the criminal law of this Country, by the appointment of a Committee to prepare bills for assimilating this branch of our law with that of England, we shall be happy to give effect to its labours by passing into law the bills proper for embodying the necessary improvements.

Under the conviction that nothing can tend more to the elevation and well being of society than the just and able administration of the laws, we shall also be happy again to take up the cousideration of the Judicatory of the Province, and shall do so with an earnest desire to bring our judicial institutions to as high a state of perfection as may be consistent with our condition and circumstances.

The Bill relating to the Highways, the Bill for the re-construction of the Court of Marriage and Divorce, and that for the Incorporation of the Town of Halifax, when submitted to the Legislative Council, shall receive our best attention, and that consideration so justly due to Your Excellency's recommendation. We offer Your Excellency our grateful acknowledgments for the desire you have been pleased to express to promote the tranquillity and happiness of the country, by the preparation of measures deemed suited to effect salutary improvements in the institutions of the Province; and Your Excellency may be assured, that it will ever be the sincere desire of the Legislative Council to assist Your Excellency's efforts towards the attainment of these objects, by every means in its power and to render your administration alike gratifying to Your Excellency, and beneficial to the people confided to your care.

The Legislative Council do not deem it necessary to enlarge upon the paramount importance of that Road to every other Route to Canada, in a national point of view. How shall the primary object of the Despatch, viz-the transmission of the Mails to Canada, be best effected ? and 2d. In what way can it be made most advantageous to the Public in union with that object? That, on the first enquiry, the Committee would not venture to give a decided opinion; it would require a more intimate acquaintance with the localities of the Country than they possessed.

If it be determined to continue the transmission of the Mails to Canada as heretofore, through the Eastern part of the Country, which, for eight months in the year, will unquestionably be the case, then it would be most desirable, in the opinion of the Committee, that the Communication should be made as commodious and expeditious as possible. That every facility should be given, by connecting all the advantages and conveniences practicable in the Land Conveyance with the Steam Packets now established. That among these advantages, it seemed of importance to the Committee that the Proprietors and Managers of the Coach Establishment on the Main Line should also provide for, and keep good, the connecting links to the extremity of the Province, for which a suitable remuneration from the Provincial Funds, so far as any deficiency in the general accounts of the Post Office Department, arising from that service, might render necessary; and also, for making good any deficiency that might arise in supporting the Establishment on the Main Line.

That, in this view of the subject, should the present route through Cumberland be continued, the Committee begged leave to suggest the propriety of the Contractors for the conveyance of the Mails taking that part of the Line also under their management. That uniting the interest of the Land and Steam Communication, and putting all under one general supervision, would, in the opinion of the Committee, produce more effective management, and give to the Public greater advantages.

May it please Your Excellency:

The House of Assembly, at its last Session, passed an Address to Her Majesty, requesting Her Majesty to adopt certain rules and regulations for the protection of the Fisheries, the object of one of which is to extend the jurisdiction of the Court of Vice Admiralty over all matters arising out of, or in any way relating to the Fisheries, and the effect of it, if adopted, will be to give to that Court cognizance of almost all Causes connected with the Commerce of the Province.

That the expenses attendant upon Suits brought in the Court of Vice Admiralty render it very burthensome to Suitors, and the Legislative Council are of opinion, that if the regulation referred to should go into operation, it would be attended with results highly prejudicial to the interests of the Mercantile part of the Community; and they respectfully beg Your Excellency to communicate to Her Majesty their views on this subject, and to pray Her Majesty not to give Her sanction to the regulation in question, especially as a Bill is now before the Legislature, and other measures sought to be adopted, to remedy some of the evils complained of.

Mr. Ratchford, in the absence of Mr. Morton, the Chairman of the Committee appointed Com. on daily comto take into consideration the necessity and practicability of a daily communication between St. John, Report Halifax and Saint John, New Brunswick, reported that the Committee had attended to that duty—that they had addressed Circulars to such persons in this and the neighbouring Province, as the Committee considered well qualified to impart the most correct information.

That the distance in a direct line between the two places appeared to be 126 miles—that from Communications received from upwards of fifty persons, nearly all agreed that a Daily Communication was both desirable and practicable, but as might naturally be expected, from the various localities of their residence and other causes, they differed as to which was the most suitable line of route.

That the greater number of Communications, in answer to the Circulars, had recommended that the Route should be by land to the south shore of the Bay of Fundy, through King's County, and thence by Steam Boat to St. John, the distance in this way being the shortest, viz: about 150 miles-that it was supposed that the erection of a secure Low Water Harbor would cost about from £2000 to £5000, and to complete the road in a manner fit for a Stage Coach from £200 to £300—that by this route the distance was nearly equal by land and water; and if a safe Harbor could be completed, it was believed that the Mail might be taken the whole distance in eighteen or twenty hours.

That, as there was at present no Low Water Harbor on the South Shore of the Bay of Fundy, East of Digby, it would also prove of the greatest advantage to Mariners.

That the objections to this Line were the expence of forming a Harbor, and the drift ice in winter; yet it was confidently stated that the ice would obstruct the Navigation but for a few days in the year, and only in one year in seven on an average.

That the next shortest distance was via Windsor, distance 157 miles; the objections to this Route were the absence of a Low Water Harbor, the ice in the winter, and the rapid current through the Strait by Cape Split.

That the next shortest Route was by land to the Mouth of the Halfway River, and Horton Bluff, thence by Steamer, that the whole distance was about 160 miles, that a Wharf or Pier would be required at either of those places, at a supposed cost of £200 to £500, and from £100 to £200 for the road—that the objections to this line were, the probable expence, and the ice, as at Windsor.

That the next shortest line was by way of Dalhousie Settlement, Annapolis and Digbythat the whole distance, as reported by an experienced Surveyor, was 173 miles, or if, by water, from Annapolis to Digby, during Summer, somewhat shorter—that the objections to this line were the great distance over land—the barrenness of the soil through which the road would pass, and its expense, which was estimated from £8000 to £30,000—sums varying between these amounts according to the different judgments of Persons to whom Circulars were addressed.

That another Route, recommended by several Gentlemen resident in Lunenburg, was, by water, by Steam Boat to Lunenburg, thence across the Country to Annapolis and Victoria, thence by water to St. John, varying but little in distance from the Dalhousie route—the probable expense of opening this road was computed at about £10,000.

That the next shortest line recommended, was by the present route to Bridgetown, thence to Indian Beach on the Granville shore, and by Steamer to St. John—that the distance was estimated at 180 miles, and through the most populous and fertile Districts.

And lastly, the route by Dorchester, was stated at 266 miles by land; or if, by way of Parrsborough, crossing the Basin of Minas, about 17 miles less.

That the Committee had thus embodied the various opinions and information submitted; and being satisfied that very many important benefits would be the result of a daily communication between this and the Sister Province, and feeling a strong desire to unite with them in any measure which might prove of mutual advantage, and strengthen the ties of sympathy and affection, as well as forward the views of the British Government, as regarded the dispatch of the Mails; and having come to the unanimous opinion that the object was of paramount importance, would propose that a Committee should be named to wait upon His Excellency, and respectfully to request that he would be pleased, during the recess, to direct competent persons to examine into the practicability of forming a safe Low Water Harbor at such convenient place on the South Shore of the Bay of Fundy and Bason of Minas, as might be made available to the proposed object; and to obtain competent reports upon such other of the Routes referred to, as His Excellency might deem proper and desirable.

In the House of Assembly, 25th March, 1841.

Resolved, That a Conference be desired, by Committee, with a Committee of the Council, on the subject of the amendments proposed by the Council to the Bill, entitled, An Act for making Lands and Tenements liable for the payment of Debts, and to repeal the Acts now in force.

Resolved, That the Committee, on such Conference, be instructed to state, that the Bill, as it is now concurred in, with the exception of one very material Clause, has swept away all the unnecessary, perplexing, and cumbersome forms, which embarrass the proceedings for making Lands and Tenements liable to the payment of Debts, and which are mixed up with so many technical requirements and legal niceties, as to render it almost impossible to make a perfect title under the Statutes now in force. That although many hundreds, if not thousands, of properties in Land are held by this species of title throughout the Province, and the possessors hold the same by purchase at Sheriff's Sale, without fraud or collusion, still the title by which they hold is, in nineteen cases perhaps out of twenty, so defective, by reason of some one or more of the numerous requisitions in the Statutes having been not strictly complied with, that it would be impossible for them to defend their possessions as against the original owner or persons claiming under him in a Court of Law. The thirteenth Clause in the Bill, as it was passed by the House, is intended to remedy the evil,. and was guarded by a Proviso that it should only apply when the purchaser at a Sheriff's Sale should have actually paid the purchase money. The House, in an amendment by them proposed to the amendment of the Council to this Clause, have guarded it still further, by a Proviso, that it shall apply only to a party in actual possession for one year at least, and they have made this amendment because they conceive the advantages of such Clause in quieting bona fide possessors and confirming titles to Land, to be infinitely greater than the evils it may perhaps in some few cases occasion. It seems to the House inequitable to leave such possessions exposed to the danger of being disturbed, for want of some one or more of the technical niceties and forms which the Legislative Council and Assembly have concurred, by this Bill, in condemning, having substituted therefor an improved and simple mode of proceeding in such cases, which the House are anxious to carry into effect by the thirteenth Clause, as amended, being agreed to, and the Bill thereupon receiving the assent of both Houses.

The Legislative Council humbly offer to Her Majesty, and respectfully beg Your Excellency to convey to the Throne, their grateful sense of the consideration shewn by Her Majesty to the prayer of Her Loyal Subjects, the Legislative Council of Nova-Scotia, in directing that the investigation to be made into this subject should be as extensive and searching as possible, consistently with a reasonable period of duration for the commission.

The Members of the Legislative Council at the last Session unanimously agreed in the opinion, (notwithstanding differences on the merits of the question itself,) that the facts of the case required an examination and developement, such as has not yet taken place, and without which, any attempt at a final decision satisfactory to the country, would be hopeless.

The Legislative Council desire to convey to Your Excellency an unchanged expression of the same opinion. They believe that, as on the one hand a limited, superficial, or partial investigation, would but aggravate the evils to which the present unsettled state of the subject is exposed, so on the other hand a full, prompt, and impartial enquiry, is the only means of reaching an ultimate decision, which shall be just in itself, and calculated to command the acquiescence of the people in general.

While the object of the Legislative Council is thus directed to an investigation of all the circumstances and facts, it is felt that the measure challenges the approval and assistance of the advocates on both sides, as affording the means of ascertaining the truth and accuracy of their respective views.

The Legislative Council therefore believe that Her Majesty's gracious desire in this matter, as expressed in the Despatch above mentioned, coincides with the means best adapted to promote the harmony of the people committed to Your Excellency's Government, as well as to effect a just arrangement of the matter in controversy; and they respectfully pray that Your Excellency will be pleased, as soon as may be found convenient, to institute such an enquiry as may carry into effect Her Majesty's gracious acquiescence in the desire of the Legislative Council, expressed at the last Session, and in particular as may bring to view all the facts connected with the grant and allotment of Lands for the use of Schools and objects of Education in this Province-their early history, occupation and improvement-their continued management and control-with an account of their rents and benefits, and the appropriation of the same from the commencement to the present time, and any other feature in the case calculated to render more clear its true character.

The Legislative Council beg to offer to Your Excellency their confident hope, that the satisfactory adjustment of this exciting question, by means of such an enquiry, at once energetic, comprehensive and impartial, to be directed by Your Excellency, will add to the benefits which shall render Your Excellency's Administration the occasion of gratitude and respect to the people of this Province.

Mr. Starr, the Chairman of the Committee appointed to prepare an Address to Her Majesty, praying Her Majesty to give Her assent to a Bill, entitled, An Act for facilitating the recovery of Seamens' Wages—reported the draft of an Address to Her Majesty, and also an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, which he read in his place, and afterwards delivered them to the Clerk, who read the same as follows:

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

THE HUMBLE ADDRESS OF THE LECISLATIVE COUNCIL OF NOVA-SCOTIA.

May it please Your Majesty.

The Legislative Council and House of Assembly have concurred, in the present Session in passing a Bill with a suspending Clause, for affording a cheap and Summary remedy to Seamen in the recovery of their wages.

Its principal object is to take Suits for Seamen's Wages below Twenty Pounds out of the jurisdiction of the Court of Vice Admiralty, whose authority and power in such cases have been found highly injurious and oppressive to the Ship Owner. The table of fees, even at the reduced rate, authorised by the Imperial Act of 1832, far exceeds the costs of a trial under the Provincial Statutes and practice of the Courts of Common Law, so that the expense of a suit in the Admiralty is often more than ten times as much as the demand; and in the most favourable cases is matter of just irritation, from the contrast it presents with the comparatively small expense of prosecuting or defending a claim in the Supreme Court. The consequence is, that the Admiralty Court has become a terror to Owners and Masters of Vessels, who are in the habit of submitting to unjust demands, rather than incur the risk of defending themselves in so expensive a Tribunal against the Seaman who has generally nothing to lose. But if the Court were beneficial, its operation is confined almost wholly to the Metropolis of Nova-Scotia. For these reasons the jurisdiction of the Court is taken away in this Bill, as far as it affects such suits against the Owners and Masters of Nova-Scotia Vessels.

If Your Majesty's advisers should be of opinion that there is any constitutional or technical difficulty, in assenting to this Bill, so anxious is the Mercantile community in this Province to be relieved from the present oppression, that the Legislative Council humbly beseech Your Majesty to direct the proper steps to be taken for granting to this Province the benefits sought for in this Bill.

The provisions in our own Statute, 16, W. 4, chap. 48, borrowed from the 16th Section of the Imperial Act, (5 & 6, W. 4, chap. 19), have been found wholly inoperative to restrain Seamen and their Proctors from carrying petty demands into the Vice Admiralty Court—a Tribunal never intended for such trivial suits, as its costly machinery and want of Summary Jurisdiction plainly shew. 99

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Your Majesty will find, however, that in framing this Bill, the Legislature have guarded the interest of the Seaman with the most jealous care. They have given him a remedy against the Ship by a Writ of Attachment, in the first instance, which will amply supply the place of the Admiralty process. They have provided for a Summary Trial, and made his wages payable within twenty-four hours, being a shorter time than is enacted either in the Imperial Statute or in our own. They have given him an appeal to the Supreme Court without security, which they have denied to the Owner or Master, lest it should be employed by the wealthier defendant, for the purpose of delay or oppression. And by this Bill they have afforded Seamen all over the Province, by application to two Justices of the Peace, in whom they may confide, and who are to be found in almost all the Outports, a speedier and easier remedy than they now have for the recovery of their wages.

The Bill is an improvement, in some essential particulars, on the Act passed by the Legislature of Nova Scotia in 1837, which was disallowed by Your Majesty, after it had been in successful operation for nearly two years, without complaint, either by the Seamen or Ship-owners of the Province.

The Legislative Council are convinced that this Act would be received as a boon equally by both classes; and trust therefore that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to give it effect, either by the Royal sanction, or by directing its several provisions to be incorporated into an Act of Parliament, and extended to Vessels entering the Ports of this Province.

And be it enacted, That on the trial of any such action, the said Trustees shall not recover any Lands improved by the defendant, or by those he may claim under, unless they shall have given in evidence such order of the Court of Sessions as aforesaid, and the neglect or refusal of the defendant or those he may claim under to conform thereto; and the said Trustees shall therein be taken and held, to have concentrated and vested in them the title, right and interest in and to the Land, sought to be recovered of the several original Grantees, their Heirs and Assigns-and the Defendant shall and may set up such defence by possession for twenty years as aforesaid, or any other defence which would be an available legal defence against such title, right and interest as aforesaid, and in case any of the Land sought to be recovered shall be improved, the Jury on such trial shall also enquire of the value of the improvements thereon, and also the value of the land in an unimproved state at the time of trial, and in case the defendant shall fail to establish an available legal defence to such action, then the Jury in addition to finding for the Plaintiffs on the title, shall also find both such values as aforesaid, and it shall be in the option of the Plaintiffs to pay the defendant the value of such improvements, or to demand from him the value of the Land in an unimproved state.

And be it enacted, If after the option of the Trustees shall be declared the defendant shall refuse or neglect to accept a conveyance in fee simple from the said Trustees, and which it is hereby declared they shall have power and authority to make of the said improved land, and to pay the value thereof, in an unimproved state, as found as aforesaid, or shall neglect or refuse to accept the said value of the improvements thereon, and to deliver

And that the Committee further reported the accompanying Draft of an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, should the House adopt the 5th and 6th Resolutions therewith also reported.

THE ADDRESS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The Legislative Council had hoped, that the first session of the Legislature, during your Excellency's administration, would have exhibited, in the intercourse between the Council Address and Assembly, that reciprocal respect due from each to the other, as independent bodies, necessary for the public good, and essential to the success of the Executive in its efforts to advance the general prosperity.

In this spirit, the Legislative Council has come to the consideration of the many important questions for which this session has been distinguished; and the result is manifest in the passage of an unusual number of Bills, of extensive practical influence, most of which had been for years the subject of ineffective Legislative discussion.

Under these circumstances, it is the occasion of the deeper regret to the Legislative Council, that the House of Assembly should have seen it fit to adopt a procedure most injurious to the privileges of this House, and tending, not only to destroy the independence and effectiveness of the Legislative Council, but to disturb the constitutional relations of the three branches of the Legislature.

The business of the Legislative Council is performed by two Clerks. The duty of the Principal Clerk is to keep the journals, engross amendments and Bills, communicate messages to the other House, read Bills and other papers under consideration, and transact the daily business of the session. This office is filled by a professional gentleman, whose practice and acquirements well qualify him for its duties, and who performs them with ability, punctuality and accuracy.

The duty of the second or Law Clerk, is to compare the Bills which come before the Council with the existing Law and report the alterations that the enactments would effectto assist the Principal Clerk in his daily duties—to attend Committees—to prepare Bills when required, either in recess or during the Session, and at the close of each Session to copy for printing any Bill passed into Law, and affix marginal notes—compare the proofs and correct the press. These duties are performed by a gentleman, whose professional attainments and ability, in every respect, fit him for the office. The Legislative Council had fixed the salary of the first Clerk, on the organization of this House, and of the Law Clerk, on the establishment of that office, in the subsequent year, when the extent of their duties was not ascertained, at £150 Currency, for the Principal Clerk, and £100 Currency, for the Law Clerk.

Feeling that the remuneration was inadequate, the House, in the present Session, added $\pounds 50$ to each; and, according to established usage, communicated to the Assembly, by means of a Conference on the state of the Province, the contingencies of the Council, in which these Officers salaries were stated in the increased amount.

The House of Assembly, also pursuing the established usuage, sent up for the concurrence of this House, a Resolution for granting a sum of money for the contingencies of the Council, but less in amount, by $\pounds 100$, than the statement communicated to them; and that this House might not mistake the nature and extent of the interference thus interposed, the Resolution distinguished the several sums, and stated the salaries of the Clerks at $\pounds 150$ and $\pounds 100$ respectively, instead of $\pounds 200$ and $\pounds 150$, as required by the Council.

As the Legislative Council was of necessity best acquainted with the services of their own officers, they could not fail to view, as highly injurious, an act which assumed that they were deficient either in the judgement or the integrity requisite for adjusting the remuneration proper for these services; nor could they be insensible, either to their constitutional right in a matter of this nature; or to the consequences that would legitimately result, if this assumption of the Assembly were submitted to.

The Legislative Council therefore returned the Resolution disagreed to.

Means of vindicating the just rights of the Council were not wanting: The Resolutions for the contingencies of the Assembly were still before the Council, and the Appropriation Bill had not passed.

But the Legislative Council deemed they should best consult their own respectability by agreeing (as they have always done, as a matter of course,) to the grants for the Assembly's contingencies; and best promote the public interest, and the dignity of their own body, by neither disagreeing to, nor retarding, the Appropriation Bill.

The Assembly have failed to appreciate the moderate and conciliatory conduct of the Legislative Council; but had they allowed the matter to rest here, this House would not have troubled Your Excellency on the subject, content to wait until the return of another Session had restored the means of effectually vindicating their own privileges, and the rights of their servants—which, under a sense of duty, they have this session forborne to use.

The House of Assembly has ventured a step further, and adopted the unconstitutional expedient of passing a vote of credit for the Contingencies of the Council, for the same sums and amount as comprised in the Resolution rejected by the Legislative Council, with the professed intention that it should be acted upon by the Executive in the recess, notwithstanding the constitutionally expressed dissent of the Council. The immediate consequence of this measure will be to shift from the Assembly to the Executive the contest which they have wantonly provoked with the Council; but consequences of a more serious and lasting nature would irrevocably follow from the recognition of such a practice.

The Legislative functions and necessary independence of the Legislative Council would be prostrated, and in every difference of opinion between that body and the Assembly, the Executive would be driven to adopt one side in the controversy, by either rejecting the views of the Assembly, or advancing Money on its mere vote, not only without the sanction, but against the express desire of the Legislative Council.

The Legislative Council have been happy, during this Session, to be able to concur in every government measure which has come before it, and to agree in the measures of the Assembly, with very little exception; and when, at the close of a Session, marked by harmonious co-operation among the several branches of the Legislature, and distinguished by

measures of vital interest, and extensive improvements, in almost every department, the House of Assembly deemed it proper, for the most insignificant consideration, to violate the respect due to this House; the Legislative Council, while it resented the unwarrantable interference, preferred submitting to present inconvenience, rather than adopt a more active course of resistance, which would have endangered the interests of the public. Yet, as the Legislative Council cannot acknowledge the principle that either the House of Assembly or the Executive should regulate and prescribe the extent of the remuneration due to their officers, or the nature or amount of assistance or accommodation required for carrying on their duties, they humbly trust that your Excellency will not act upon the vote of credit passed by the House of Assembly, in relation to the contingencies of this House, nor sanction, in any other manner, the measure adopted by the Assembly on the subject.

Whereupon, it was moved, that the said Resolutions and Address be received and adopt. Resolution & Aded : which, being seconded, and the question being put, there appeared, for the motion, Adopted nine; against the motion, one.

SPEECH:

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council: Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

The public business having been brought to a close, I am enabled to release you from Speech your Legislative labors.

I cannot dismiss you to your several Counties, without offering you my congratulations on the results of a Session characterized by great activity, and during which a variety of important measures have been perfected.

Questions of paramount interest, and on which public opinion had long been divided, have been determined in such a manner as will, I trust, redound to the advantage of the community in general. A material, and I believe, beneficial change has been effected in the Judicatory of the Province. An Act called the Lands and Tenements Bill, by which a Creditor is secured in his just rights, while the Debtor is protected from extortion or oppression, and which had been under discussion for a period of nearly seven years, has been at length so framed as to meet all objections, and will at once come into operation. The Court of Marriage and Divorce has been remodelled, and essentially improved; and our Criminal Code consolidated and simplified, and assimilated to that of England.

While these alterations have been accomplished in the jurisprudence of the Colony, other matters of equal consequence have not been unattended to by you. It is with much pleasure that I assent, in the name of the Queen, to the Bill on the subject of Education, which, although it does not affirm the principle of direct assessment, in my opinion the mode that must eventually be resorted to, of meeting the difficulties by which this question is surrounded, yet does enough to render the redemption of the pledge I gave you at our meeting " to concur very zealously in any attempt you might make to ameliorate the existing state of things," both gratifying and easy of performance.

I earnestly hope that the course you have adopted with a view to the encouragement of Agriculture, and in the design of protecting the Fisheries, may be attended by the advantages you anticipate from it.

In addition to the measures I have enumerated, in themselves of sufficiently extensive practical influence, together with many other enactments suited to the wants of the Country, an Act incorporating the City of Halifax has been passed, and the principle of self-government in local affairs has been introduced among Her Majesty's Subjects in Nova-Scotia, where I trust it will hereafter be generally and successfully developed.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

I thank you for the Supplies granted for the current year, and assure you that the autho-

rity of the Executive Government shall be exerted to prevent any ill-considered expenditure of the Public Money, and that no negligence in the execution of the services for which it has been voted, will in any degree be tolerated.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council: Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

It is most satisfactory to me to be able to state that not one Bill has been presented by the Executive to Parliament but which has, after searching examination, been found worthy of adoption; while I am able, consistently with my duty to the Queen, to agree to every Act that has emanated from either branch of the Legislature. I cannot but regard this fact as a decided indication that my administration is approved of by the public, and that those by whom I am fortunate enough to be ably and efficiently assisted in the conduct of the Government, and to whom I am deeply indebted for the readiness and zeal with which their aid is at all times afforded, enjoy (in the degree in which for the successful carrying on of the business of the Colony, it is necessary that they should enjoy it,) the confidence of the People.

I thank you very sincerely for the support you have given me, in my efforts to do my duty by my Sovereign and the Province, as well as for the candid consideration you have bestowed on all measures submitted to you by my direction, with the sole object of advancing the public interest; and, for the present, I cordially bid you farewell.

After which, the President of the Council, by His Excellency's command, said-

GENTLEMEN,

It is His Lordship, the Lieutenant-Governor's pleasure, that this General Assembly be prorogued to Thursday, the 15th day of July next. And this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued to Thursday, the 15th day of July next, to be then here held.

The House of Assembly then withdrew, and His Excellency was pleased to retire soon after.

SIR,

In my Predecessor's Despatch, No. 34, of August last, you were informed that His Lordship had put the Delegates from Nova-Scotia in communication with the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, on the subjects of the several Acts of the Provincial Legislature, relating to Insurance Companies, and the granting of Bounties on certain articles of Provincial Manufacture.

The first of these Acts, No. 1764, further amended the Act, No. 1607, "for incorporating a Marine Insurance Company in Halifax." Although the amendments are far from being so extensive as Her Majesty's Government could have wished them to have been, still under the circumstances of the Province, which present such difficulties in the way of the investment of Capital, conformably to the Rules laid down in cases of the same description, they will not object to these Acts continuing in operation, although they cannot advise Her Majesty to issue an order for their formal confirmation.

The Act, No. 1846, "for continuing and amending the Act, (No. 1572,) concerning Goods exported, and for granting Drawbacks," did not, by the modification of the 2nd Section of the original Acts, remove the objections entertained to it, inasmuch as it merely substituted a Drawback for a Bounty on Goods, purchased with the produce of the Fisheries. But amongst the Acts of last Session, which I have recently received, is one renewing for one year the original Act, with the exception of the 2d and 31st Sections.

The objections being thus removed, the present Act will receive Her Majesty's Confirmation; you will not, however, assent to the renewal of it in its original form, or unaccompanied by similar exceptions.

The Act, No. 1850, for continuing the Act for granting a Bounty on Chocolate, received Her Majesty's assent on the 12th December, 1838, on the understanding, that it would expire on the 31st of March following, it was not to be renewed in its present shape.

It has not since been renewed at all; but the Delegates having stated, that the Assembly wish to give a Drawback on the export of Chocolate, equal to the Import Duty levied on Foreign Cocoa, on proof being given that such Chocolate is made of Foreign and not West India Cocoa, which is duty free, Her Majesty's Government will not object to a Law to that effect, provided it be clearly understood, that at the end of two or three years, it is not to be renewed, because such a Drawback is considered to be open to fraud.

No. 1972. An Act in addition to, and in amendment of, the Acts concerning Treasury Notes.

No. 1980. An Act to amend the Act relating to Passengers from Great Britain and Ireland arriving in this Province.

No. 2027. An Act to continue the Act concerning Goods exported, and for granting Drawbacks.

And whereas, the said Acts have been referred to the Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, appointed for the consideration of all matters relating to Trade and Foreign Plantations, and the said Committee have reported as their opinion to Her Majesty, that the said Acts should be left to their operation. I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, No. 27, of the 14th April Nos. 2042 last, transmitting five Acts, passed by the Legislature of Nova Scotia in the month of March,

together

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together with a joint Address from both Houses to Her Majesty, praying the Royal assent to the Act, No. 2045, for granting a drawback on Foreign Wheat Flour, in certain cases, and also an Address from the Executive Committee of the Nova-Scotia Baptist Education Society, praying Her Majesty's assent to the Act, No. 2042, for incorporating the Trustees of Queen's College at Horton.

I have laid these Addresses before Her Majesty.

I annex a list of the titles of these Acts, transmitted in your Despatch, with the numbers attached to them, which they bear in the Registry of Nova-Scotia Acts in this Office.

You have already been made acquainted, by the Marquis of Normanby's Despatch, No. 6, of the 22d March, 1839, with the objections entertained to the title of "Queen's College," by which the Baptist College at Horton is designated.

I entertain the same objections to that title which my Predecessor did, but as the details of the Act are unexceptionable, I am unwilling to advise its disallowance on that account.

You will therefore ascertain whether the Council and Assembly would be disposed to amend the Act in this respect, on the understanding that the Act would receive Her Majesty's confirmation.

The Act, No. 2043, is passed to repeal the 10th Clause of an Act, passed on the 30th March, 1839, to settle Titles in a Tract of Land in Cape-Breton. It is evident, however, that it is the ninth, and not the tenth Clause which it is really intended to repeal. This is, most probably, a clerical error, but it is necessary that it should be corrected before the present Act can receive Her Majesty's assent.

The Act, No. 2044, received Her Majesty's special confirmation on the 15th instant. I enclose the Order of Her Majesty, in Council, to that effect.

The Act, No. 2045, cannot be considered until I shall have received the Act alluded to in the first Clause, imposing a duty on Foreign Wheat Flour.

The Act, No. 2046, for appointing a new Board of Governors for Dalhousie College is objectionable, on account of the manner in which the Governors are to be appointed.

It is not desirable in the choice of the Rulers of a Collegiate Institution, that the Assembly should exercise any control, for it can scarcely fail in the result to happen, that the party feelings, by which the two Houses of Legislature are so continually animated, should be infused into the College. Moreover, it is the exercise of functions, which neither correctly nor advantageously belong to the Assembly to assume. You will therefore call upon them to amend or repeal this clause.

I have received your Despatch, No. 10, of the 27th of March, enclosing an Address to the Queen from the Legislature of Nova Scotia, representing the injurious effect which would be produced on the Trade of the Province, by the operation of the clause in the Imperial Statute, 2 & 3, Victoria, c. 44, which prohibits the carriage of Deck Loads by Timber Vessels.

I have had the honor to lay that Address before the Queen; and Her Majesty was pleased to command me to refer it to the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade. Their Lordships, having taken the subject into consideration, have reported their opinion that the prohibition of carrying Deck Loads should be confined to voyages across the Atlantic, to Ports of the United Kingdom; and that, in the case of such voyages, the prohibition should extend to Deck Loads of any description of wood. A Bill is about to be introduced into Parliament to renew the Act in question, which has been framed in conformity with this opinion.

You will have the goodness to communicate this Despatch to both Houses of the Provincial Legislature.

Referring to my Letter of the 27th July last, on the subject of the measures adopted for carrying on the Mails, now forwarded from Liverpool under the new arrangement, between Halifax and Pictou, I have the honor to inclose copies of Reports from the Deputy Post Master General at Halifax, N. S., dated the 1st July and 3d inst., from which,

it appears that he had been compelled on the emergency to accept the Tender of Messrs. Arnison and Trennaman for conveying the Mails in question between Halifax and Pictou, during the four months, from 12th July to 12th November, in the present year, for the sum of £550 Currency.

He now transmits a Tender which he has received from Mr. Cunard, for the establishment of Mail Coaches, to convey the ordinary Mails between Halifax and Pictou three times a week in summer, and twice a week during the remainder of the year; and also, for the conveyance, by express, of the English and Canada Mails to and from Pictou, during that portion of the year in which the Communication is by that route.

The present expense for the special conveyance of the English Mails between Halifax and Pictou is about $\pounds700$; and, according to the last account, for the year ended 5th January, 1840, the net produce of the Halifax Post Office, after deducting the expenditure from the gross receipts, was only $\pounds212$ 16s. 11d. not including a grant from the Colonial Legislature in aid of Rides, to the amount of $\pounds1390$, estimating the receipt and expenditure for the current year at the same amount as the last, exclusive of the cost of the special conveyance of the English Mails, and assuming that the Colonial Legislature may not be disposed to renew their grant, and, adding to the expenditure the costs of the special service for the English Mails between Halifax and Pictou, the result will be a deficiency of $\pounds477$ 3s. 1d. on the Post Office Revenue of Nova Scotia for the year.

Under these circumstances, I must leave it entirely for your Lordship's to decide whether it is expedient to accept Mr. Cunard's offer at an expense of £1550 per annum, which would increase the deficiency in the Account of the Post Office at Halifax from £477 3s. 1d. to £993 16s. 5d. in the event of the Colonial Legislature failing to give a grant to cover it, when, of course, the service must either be discontinued, or defrayed out of the Revenue of the Mother Country.

May it please Your Lordships—

Your Lordships having referred to us the annexed Letter of Mr. Stephen, transmitting, by desire of Lord John Russell, the Copy of a Despatch from the Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick, enclosing a Report of the Provincial Treasurer on certain regulations proposed by this Board to be adopted for the government of the Coasting Trade between the Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova-Scotia. We Report—

That the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade were pleased, by Mr. Hume's Letter of the 22d February, 1838, to acquaint us that application had been made to their Lordships by the Agent for the Province of New Brunswick, requesting that the Trade between that Colony and Nova-Scotia might be placed under Coasting regulations; and their Lordships therefore requested that we would consider and report whether it would not be expedient to propose, in the next Custom's Amendment Bill, an enactment, giving power to this Board to declare the Trade between neighbouring Colonies, similarly circumstanced in respect of Duties, to be a Coasting Trade.

That, in our Report of 17th March following, we expressed our concurrence in the suggestion of their Lordships; and the requisite enactment was introduced into the Act of the 1st and 2d Victoria, Chap. 113, by the 25th Section of which, power was given to this Board to establish the Coasting Trade between neighbouring Ports of different Colonies in the British Possessions abroad, similarly circumstanced as to Duties.

That, upon the passing of the Act of the 1st and 2d Victoria, Chap. 113, above referred to, we caused regulations to be framed for placing the Trade generally between the Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova-Scotia, upon the footing of a Coasting Trade: but prior to carrying the same into effect, we transmitted Copies of the proposed regulations to the Collectors of this Revenue in Nova-Scotia and New Brunswick, with directions to report as to the best means of carrying the same into effect, and to communicate the same to the Merchants and others interested at their respective Ports.

That we have only recently received the replies of our Officers, and having very attentively considered the additional information thereby afforded, we are of opinion that the Coasting Trade between the Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova-Scotia, under the proposed regulations, should be limited to Articles of the growth and manufacture of the two Provinces, and the produce of the British Fisheries, as proposed in the annexed Report of the Provincial Treasurer of New Brunswick; but, to effect this object, it will be necessary that amendments should be made in certain Provincial Acts for dispensing with the Reports of Masters of Coasting Vessels, and for equalizing the Duties chargeable in the two Provinces upon Leather and Beer.

And we have directed the Collectors of this Revenue at New Brunswick and Nova-Scotia to apprize the parties interested, that so soon as the requisite amendments shall have been made in the Provincial Acts, we shall be prepared to issue the necessary directions for allowing Articles, the produce and manufacture of the two Provinces, and the produce of the British Fisheries, to be conveyed between New Brunswick and Nova-Scotia under the Coasting regulations.

No. 2084. "An Act to Incorporate the Bay of Fundy Steam Navigation Company."

No. 2086. "An Act enable the Nova-Scotia and Halifax Marine Insurance Companies to compensate their Directors and Auditors."

No. 2087. "An Act to amend the Act to preserve and regulate the Navigation of the Harbor of Pictou."

No. 2088. " An Act in addition to An Act, entitled, An Act additional to, and in further amendment of, the Act concerning Cemeteries or Burial Grounds in the Town of Halifax. And whereas, the said Acts have been referred to the Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, appointed for the consideration of all matters reating to Trade and Foreign Plantations; and the said Committee have reported as their opinion to Her Majesty, that the said Acts should be left to their operation ; Her Majesty was thereupon this day pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve the said report; whereof the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander in Chief for the time being, of Her Majesty's Province of Nova-Scotia, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

With reference to my Circular Despatch of the 24th of August last, in which I called your attention to the great importance of improving the Main Routes of Communication within your Government, in consequence of the new Line of Steam Packets between this Country and Halifax having come into operation, I now transmit to you the inclosed Copy of a Letter from the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury on the same subject. I cannot too strongly urge this subject on your attention. You will take the earliest opportunity of bringing it under the consideration of the Legislature of the Province of Nova-Scotia. I am directed by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, herewith to transmit, for the information of Lord John Russell, a Copy of a Letter from the Postmaster General of the 26th ultimo, inclosing a Report from the Deputy-Postmaster General of Canada, relative to the improvement in the Communication between Quebec and Halifax, and with reference to the Letter, from this Board, of the 19th of August to the Colonial Department, I am to request you will represent to Lord John Russell the great importance of the necessary steps being taken, with as little delay as practicable, for the improvement of the Main Lines of Roads in the North American Colonies, more especially that between Halifax and Quebec, and by these means completing the system of rapid Communication with the Mother Country, towards which so much has already been accomplished by the establishment of the Halifax Line of Steam Packets.

In promoting the establishment of these Packets, and in sanctioning the very heavy expenditure, without which the Communication could not be maintained, my Lords acted in the confident expectation that the Colonies, on their part, would not be unwilling to improve the Local Communication; and they trust, that after so great a sacrifice has been made by the Home Government, no further time will be lost by either of the Colonial Legislatures in providing for the necessary and comparatively small expenditure which they are called upon to make.

My Lords have reason to think that the apparent unwillingness to incur this expenditure arises from the impression that the North American Post Office is a source of Revenue to the Home Government, and that for this reason, the cost of constructing Roads for the conveyance of the Mails should be defrayed out of the proceeds of the Post Office. Their Lordships therefore direct that it may be stated to you, for the information of Lord John Russell, that even before the recent large reduction in the internal Colonial Postage of Letters to and from Europe, the whole Revenue of the North American Post Office derived from the internal rates, excepting that part which was contributed by the Military Departments, was absorbed in the cost of management. STR-I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Letter of the 26th August, respecting the improvement of the Roads of Post Communication between Quebec and Halifax, accompanied by a Letter from Mr. Gordon of the Treasury, to the Postmaster General on the subject, dated the 19th of the same Month. I took an early opportunity, being near the Governor General, of speaking to His Lordship on the subject, and have since officially laid your Letter and its enclosures before him. I am not yet prepared to make so full a report as the subject calls for. I think it my duty, however, to inform you, for the information of His Lordship the Post Master General, that very satisfactory progress has been made this year in the improvement of the Temiscouta Route, across the Grand Portage, a distance of about thirty-eight miles; this has heretofore been the worst portion of the whole route, but with the £5000 place at my disposal, as Commissioner for improving it, I have the satisfaction of saying that almost as good a Road, as the nature of the Country will permit, has been made. I have recently returned from inspecting this piece of Road, and am so much pleased with the result of our exertions that I am the more anxious to attack the remainder of the difficulties which stand in the way of a perfect communication with New Brunswick and Nova-Scotia; and, in furtherance of this object, so strongly recommended in your Letter, and that from Mr. Gordon, I have, with the authority of the Governor-General, sent on a competent person to survey the other portions of the route to Fredericton which require amelioration, and I shall shortly have the honor of submitting to you a detailed report on the subject.

It may not be improper for me here to mention that the Province of New Brunswick has, at different times, given about £3000 for the improvement of this route, (that is for the part which I am now causing to be surveyed), and that I have reason to think that they are disinclined to give any more money for the same purpose. I should suppose that a sum of from £10,000 to £12,000 would be required to put it in proper condition.

His Lordship, the Governor General, who is intent upon carrying out the views of Government upon this very important subject, will doubtless devise suitable means for attaining the end.

When making my further report upon the Temiscouta route, I shall not fail to treat of the other channel, that of Metis. I have, &c. T. A. STAYNER.

Additional Instructions to our Right Trusty and Well-beloved Councillor, CHARLES-BARON SYNDENHAM, our Governor and Commander in Chief, in and over our Province of Nova-Scotia, or in his absence, to our Lieutenant-Governor, or the L.S. Officer Administering the Government of the said Province for the time being. Given at our Court at Buckingham Palace, this Ninth day of December, 1840,

in the Fourth Year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS, by certain additional Instructions, bearing date the Ninth day of March, 1838, addressed to John George, then Earl of Durham, but since deceased, our Governor and Commander in Chief, in and over our said Province; we did constitute and appoint certain persons therein named, to be the first or original Members of the Legislative Council of our said Province, and did direct and appoint, that the Members of the said Council should take rank and precedence therein, according to the order in which their names were placed in the said additional Instructions. And we did thereby declare our pleasure to be, that in all other cases the Members of the said Council should take rank and precedence therein, according to the date and seniority of their respective appointments.

And whereas, by our Commission under the Great Seal of our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date, at Westminster, the Sixth day of September, 1839, in the third year of our Reign, constituting and appointing you the said Charles Baron Sydenham, to be our Governor and Commander in Chief, in and over our said Province; we did appoint and declare, that the Legislative Council of our said Province should consist of such, and so many Members as had theretofore been, or should thereafter be, from time to time, for that purpose, nominated and appointed under our Sign Manual and Signet, or of such persons as should be provisionally appointed by you, until our further pleasure should be signified; and we did further direct that the Members of the said Council should hold their places therein during our Pleasure, and that the Senior Member, for the time being of the said Council, should preside at the deliberations thereof; and that the Seniority of the Members of the said Council, between themselves, should be determined by such Rules and Regulations as should for that purpose be provided by our Instructions, under our Sign Manual and Signet therein referred to.

And whereas, by our Instructions under our Sign Manual and Signet, bearing date the Seventh day of September, 1839, being the Instructions so referred to as last aforesaid, in our said Commission, we did command you, that, until our pleasure should be further signified, you should execute our said Commission, according to the Instructions under our Sign Manual and Signet, bearing date the Tenth day February, 1838, and according to the before recited additional Instructions, bearing date the 9th day of March, 1838.

And whereas, we have thought fit to revoke so much of our said additional Instructions of the 9th day of March, 1838, as relates to the rank and precedure of the Members of the said Council among themselves : Now

Now therefore, by these our Instructions, under our Sign Manual and Signet, we do revoke, annul and make void, so much, and so much only of our said additional Instructions of the 9th day of March, 1838, as relates to the Rank and Precedence of the Members of the said Council for the time being among themselves.

And we do hereby declare our pleasure to be, that any Member of the said Council who shall from time to time be appointed by us, by Warrant under our Sign Manual and Signet. to take Rank and Precedence over the other Members of the said Council for the time being, or who, in the absence of any such appointment by us, shall be appointed by you provisionally in our name, and on our behalf, to take such Rank and Precedence, shall, so long as such appointment shall continue in force, and no longer, be, to all intents and purposes, the Senior Member for the time being of our said Council.

And we do further declare our pleasure to be, that the other Members of the said Council for the time being, shall take Rank and Precedence therein, according to the order in which their names were placed in the said additional Instructions of the Ninth day of March. 1838, or in the case of Members subsequently appointed according to the date and seniority of their respective appointments.

Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, March Term, 1841.

W HEREAS, the Grand Inquest of the County, on the eleventh instant, exhibited their Presentment relative to a Bill now before the Assembly, for the Incorporation of the Town of Halifax, a copy whereof is hereunto annexed, which Presentment, after due consideration, the Court adopted by the following Resolution :--

"The Court having considered the Presentment of the Grand Jury, relative to a Bill for Incorporating the Town of Halifax, which is now before the House of Assembly, are unanimously of opinion that many important alterations of the said Bill might beneficially be adopted. The Court, however, having had no opportunity of ascertaining the general sentiments of the Community on a subject so important, have resolved to lay the said Presentment before the House, without any further remark than respectfully to solicit its attention And whereas, the said Presentment and Resolution were, agreeably to the purthereto." port thereof, on the 12th instant, transmitted to the Honorable the Speaker of the said Assembly by the Clerk of the Peace, in the following terms :-- " I am directed by the Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, for the County of Halifax, to transmit to you the accompanying Presentment and Resolution, and respectfully to request that you will submit them to the consideration of the Honorable the House of Assembly." In answer to which, on the thirteenth instant, the following was received :--- "I beg leave to return the Papers sent to me yesterday-I cannot lay them before the Assembly without violating those rules which it is my duty to preserve." And whereas, the said answer was immediately, on receipt thereof, read to the said Inquest, who, after retiring for a short time, returned into Court with another Presentment, as follows :-- " The Grand Jury beg to present, that the Worshipful Court will take immediate measures, in such manner as seems best to the Worshipful Court, as will cause the Presentment made by the Grand Jury on the subject of the Act for Incorporating the Town of Halifax, to be brought to the notice of both Houses of the Legislature." Whereupon, it was unanimously resolved, that His Honor the Custos be requested to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, and respectfully solicit His Lordship to transmit the said Proceedings to the Honorable the House of Assembly, and to the Honorable Her Majesty's Legislative Council, in such manner as His Excellency may deem most likely to insure the considerate attention of the Legislature to the suggestions set forth in the papers above recited, and to the justice of affording others interested, who may not, as yet, know the details of the Bill, an opportunity of expressing their sentiments on a subject of such vital importance.

The foregoing is a true Copy extracted from the Minutes of Sessions.

The Grand Jurors present to the Worshipful Court, that they have learned with concern that a Bill, Incorporating the Town of Halifax, has been introduced, and is now pending before the Honorable House of Assembly.

The Jury cannot refrain from expressing its regret that a measure, so important in its consequences to their fellow Townsmen, should have been instituted, and forwarded, without any wish expressed by the Inhabitants, either by petition or in any other public manner, and more particularly when it is a fact well known, that a very large number of the Taxpayers, most interested, are strongly opposed to an Act of Incorporation.

As it appears, however, probable that the Bill in question will become a Law, the Grand Jury beg that the Worshipful Court will be pleased to solicit, in such mode as will seem most advisable, sundry modifications and amendments which they humbly conceive will tend to improve the same, and make it more acceptable to their fellow Townsmen.

They therefore suggest the following alterations and additions :---

That the City shall be divided into eight Wards, being six for the Town proper, and one each for the North and South Suburbs, returning each the same number of Officers as is detailed in the Bill.

That

That the City of Halifax shall return two fit and proper persons, resident therein, to represent the City in General Assembly, such Members to be returned by persons holding Freeholds within the precincts of the City; that part of the Township which will then be without representation to return one Member.

That the Recorder shall be the responsible adviser of the Mayor, and assist at all Courts at which the Mayor or an Alderman presides, charge Juries, examine and certify all Accounts, and shall be paid a sum not less than $\pounds 300$ per annum, and not be allowed to practise. No auditors required.

That the Offices of City Treasurer and Clerk of License be held by the same person, with a Salary of £400 per annum, in lieu of all fees, commissions or further allowance.

That the City Council shall have power to make Regulations, and affix Rates and Tolls to be paid on Country Produce, for the use of the accommodation afforded by the occupation of City Wharves, Markets, &c.; subject to the approval of the Lieutenant-Governor and Council.

That all persons qualified to vote at the Election of City Officers should be duly registered—this Clause not to apply to first Election.

That Members of Executive Council and the Legislature, and former Members of Executive and Legislative Council, shall, if elected to any Office in the Corporation, be subject to the same fine as any other person.

Powers of Poor Commissioners to be transferred to City Council, or Mayor and Aldermen.

In compliance with your Letter of 19th instant, requiring me to report, for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, on the Regulations proposed by the Board of Customs, to be adopted for the government of the Coasting Trade between this Province and Nova-Scotia, I have the honor to present the following remarks, to shew how far the Provincial Revenue will be affected thereby.

To carry the 1st Section of the proposed system fully into effect, so as to relieve the Coasters from the onus of making Reports of their Cargoes at the Treasury, as well as at the Custom House, it will be necessary that the Act 6th, Wm. IV. Cap. 4, " to provide for the collection of the Revenue," be altered; for at present the 3d Section requires that the Masters of all Vessels shall make due report, in writing, and under oath, within twenty-four hours, and before breaking bulk, under penalty of One Hundred Pounds; and the 4th Section requires that the Owners or Consignees of the Goods in such Vessel, shall make Entry and obtain Permit, before Landing, under a like penalty.

The 2d Section of the proposed Regulations appear to me to be adverse to the security of the Provincial Revenue, as the Duties are at present imposed; for although the Duties on British Manufactures and Foreign Articles may be equalized in the two Provinces, yet, so long as their Revenues are separate, a desire will exist in each Province to obtain the Duties on the quantities consumed within it; a particular account must therefore necessarily be kept by the several Revenue Officers of both Provinces, and consequently the Entry and Report of the Masters of the several Vessels conveying such Articles, (as well as of the Importers) must, in every case, be required at the Provincial Offices. If Vessels trading between the Province and Nova-Scotia were allowed to go and come without Entry and Report at the Customs, this Province would be put to a great additional expense for out-door Revenue Officers, unless the Legislature adopted a like system, and gave up that source of Revenue.

The Provincial Duties collected on Foreign and West India Produce imported from Nova-Scotia into St. John, amount to about Five Thousand Pounds in one year; and at Miramichi, the second Port in the Province, about half the amount collected is on importations through Nova-Scotia.

If the 2d Section of the transire system should be adopted, not only would the above be lost to the Province, but such a wide door be opened for introducing, clandestinely, by means of the Coasting Craft through the small Out-bays of Nova-Scotia, every description of Dutiable Articles, that the regular Trade would be completely broken up, and the present sources of Revenue, until now on the increase, be speedily lost.

A transire system between the Provinces, under proper restriction, would benefit the Coasting, and consequently the General Trade; but I would suggest that it be limited to Articles of the growth and manufacture of these Provinces, and the produce of our Fisheries; and that the Masters of every Coasting Vessel be required to keep Cargo Books, as described in the 2d and 3d Sections of the proposed Regulations.

Regulations for the Coasting Trade between the Province of Nova-Scotia and New Brunswick.

22

W HEREAS, by an Act passed in the 3rd and 4th years of the Reign of His late Majesty King Willi..m the Fourth, entitled, "An Act to regulate the Trade of the British Possessions Abroad"—it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Commissioners of H. M. Customs, to make and appoint such regulations for the carrying Coastwise of any Goods, or for the removing of any Goods for shipment, as to them should appear expedient; and that all Goods laden, water-borne, or unladen contrary to any Regulations so made and appointed should be forfeited.

And whereas, by an Act, passed in the 1st and 2d years of the Reign of Her present Majesty, entitled, "An Act to amend the Laws relating to the Customs," it is amongst other things enacted, "that whenever it shall appear to the Commissioners of H. M. Customs, expedient to establish a Coasting Trade for the removal of Goods, generally, or for the removal of any particular Goods between neighbouring Ports of different Coloniessimilarly circumstanced in respect of Duties in any of the British Possessions Abroad, it should be lawful for the said Commissioners to issue directions for that purpose; and from and after the publication thereof in the Gazette, or other public paper, printed in the said Colonies, to which such Coasting Trade had been extended—the same should be subject to the like Rules, Regulations, Penalties and Forfeitures, as the said Commissioners are authorized to make for the carrying, Coastwise, of any Goods, under the provisions of the said Act, for regulating the Trade of the British Possessions Abroad."

We, the undersigned, Commissioners of H. M. Customs, pursuant to, and in execution of, the power vested in us by the said Act, do hereby order that the Trade between the Province of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, shall, from and after the promulgation of these Regulations, be taken, and deemed to be, a Coasting Trade for the removal of Goods, similarly circumstanced, in respect of Duties, in the said two Provinces, under the following Regulations.

First.—All British Vessels or Boats owned and navigated according to Law, may carry from any port of Nova-Scotia to any part of New Brunswick, all Goods the produce of either Nova-Scotia or New Brunswick, or of the British Fisheries, similarly circumstanced in respect of Duties in the two Provinces, without Entry or Clearance.

Secondly.—All such Vessels or Boats may carry as aforesaid, all other Goods without Entry or Clearance—provided the Master shall keep a Cargo Book, in which shall be entered an account of all Goods taken on Board his Vessel or Boat—noting the respective days on which the same had been laden; also, the marks and numbers of the several Packages—the qualities and description of the Goods therein—and the qualities and descriptions of any Goods stowed loose; also, the names of the respective Shippers and Consignees, so far as such particulars shall be known to the said Master, who shall also note in such Cargo Book, the respective days upon which any such Goods shall be delivered out of such Vessel or Boat during each respective Voyage; and the Master of such Vessel shall produce his Cargo Book to any Officer of Customs, whenever the same shall be demanded, who shall be at liberty to make any remark thereon, which he may deem proper; and if, any time, any Goods, not the produce of the Province, nor of the British Fisheries, shall be found on Board any Vessel or Boat employed as aforesaid, which shall not be inserted in the Cargo Book, the same shall be forfeited.

Thirdly.—And if the Cargo Book herein before required to be kept by the Master of every Vessel carrying Goods as aforesaid, shall not be duly kept on board the same; or if the same should not be produced to any Officer of the Customs as herein before required, in either of such cases, the whole of the Goods found on board such Vessel or Boat shall be forfeited, No. 2.

HONORABLE SIRS,-

Praying reference to your commands, No. 58, relative to certain Regulations proposed to be established by your Honorable Board, between the Province of Nova-Scotia and New Brunswick, under the provisions of the 25th Section of the Act, 1st and 2d of Her present Majesty, chap. 113.

I have the honor to inform you, that in obedience to your orders, I communicated your views to the Trade of the Province, by forwarding a copy of the same to the Committee of Trade and Manufactures held at Halifax. The Chamber of Commerce, at present, not exercising its wonted usefulness, I have now the honor to forward the inclosed reply, in original, from the Honorable M. Tobin, the Chairman and the Sub-Committee. The tenor of the laconic reply on a case of so much moment, must satisfy your Honorable Board, that, on the part of Nova-Scotia, the intended boon is not desirable-and I am satisfied will tend to great and vexatious regulations on the part of the Provincial Legislatures of both Provinces, and which, in the end, will be defeated by the Traders of both Provinces, and act as a cloak to the already great and successful cupidity of the immediate neighbouring Ports in the United States. It does not appear, by your letter, that there is to be any restriction as to the Ports of Nova-Scotia and New-Brunswick, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence -if not, I most respectfully submit that there can be but few objections to the general transire between Canada, the Island of Newfoundland, and Prince Edward Island, as it may be considered a great relief to the Trade and your Servant, but an evident loss of all Commercial and Statistical information, points worthy of most serious consideration, as at present the whole of these accounts are blended under the head of Coastway, from the whole Province.

These few remarks are submitted with the greatest diffidence.

The Sub-Committee, to whom was referred a Letter from the Honorable the Collector of H. M. Customs, enclosing regulations proposed to be introduced by the Commissioners of the Customs in the Coasting Trade from Nova-Scotia to New-Brunswick, beg leave to report—that, after examining the same, they are of opinion that as they have been applied for by the Mercantile interest of the neighbouring Province, this Committee ought to con-

Cur

cur in recommending their introduction. The necessity of Clearance and Entry at the Customs are grounds erected for the protection of the Revenue and Fair Trade, which your Committee would still recommend in regulating the Coasting Trade from New-Brunswick to this Province; but they see no objection to their being abandoned in the Coasting Trade from this Province to New-Brunswick, when applied for by those interested in upholding them.

The Committee beg leave to state further, that, in their opinion, the introductory paragraphs to the regulations admit of some ambiguity of construction, and that when the regulations are published it ought to be stated, in the clearest language, that they are to apply only to the Coasting Trade from Nova-Scotia to New-Brunswick, and not to such Trade from New-Brunswick to Nova-Scotia.

The Commercial relations of the two Provinces stand under different circumstances; and although these regulations may be judicious in the case applied for, the Committee deem the preservation of the present system essential to the protection of this Province, in all importations from New-Brunswick.

SIR-

Your Excellency's Letter of the 25th ultimo, with its enclosures, having reached me after the close of the Legislative Session of this Province, all that I can now do, in furtherance of Your Excellency's wishes and those of the Legislative Council of Nova-Scotia, is to cause the early and judicious expenditure of the sums which had been granted for the improvement of the Great Road from the Nova-Scotia line to that of Canada, by the Shores of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. These grants amount to £5000; and as the Road in question has already been brought into a very passable state by the improvements made upon it during the last few years, I trust no reasonable cause of complaint will be found to exist as respects this line of Post Route, as far as it passes through New Brunswick, viz: from Sackville, or rather from the Province line, to Campbell Town. With regard to the Portage Road from the Restigouche across to the St. Lawrence, by the Metis and Lake Metopediac, as that is situated in the District of Gaspè, its improvement must, I apprehend, depend altogether upon the liberality of Canada. The Deputy Post Master General 'General, (Mr. Stayner,) has, however, I have reason to believe, had considerable sums placed at his disposal for the improvement of that line, in aid of which, (although I cannot; nor will the Legislature or People of New Brunswick, I apprehend, concur as to its being "paramount in importance to every other Route."^a the Legislature of this Province would, I have no doubt, with their usual liberality, have contributed jointly with the Sister Provinces of Canada and Nova-Scotia, if the invitation now received had reached me in time to have been brought under their notice.
