FIFTH SESSION OF THE FIFTEENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

TUESDAY, January 25, 1842.

THE House having, by several Proclamations, been prorogued until this day, then to meet for the dispatch of business:

And being met—

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by George Wright, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod.

Mr. Speaker;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber—and being returned—

Mr. Speaker reported, that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the Council Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of the Legislature, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy, which was read by the Clerk, and is as follows:

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

It is my peculiar province and happiness to open this session, by congratulating you upon the Birth of a Prince, Heir apparent to the Throne of the British Empire, and also upon the perfect restoration of Her Majesty to health; these are blessings which will call forth the expression of your profound thankfulness to the Almighty, and of your warmest loyalty towards our gracious and excellent Sovereign.

Amongst the subjects of public interest which will claim your consideration, I have especially to call your attention

to the Education Bill, which expires this session. It is as unnecessary for me to descant upon the important influence which instruction has upon society, as it is for me to point out how truly it becomes the duty of those who possess education to assist in its extension—deception, bigotry and crime diminish under its increase. I also recommend to your examination the system by which the Central Academy is governed, with the view of ascertaining whether, by alteration in that Institution, it might not gain a higher position in the public estimation.

The replies which have been received from Her Majesty to your several Addresses of the last Session will be laid before you; I shall also take occasion to submit other matters, as they may arise, by Message.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

The Public Accounts and Estimates for the current year will be placed before you; and I rely upon your voting the necessary supplies.

I must direct your attention to the danger to which the Records, and other Documents relating to this Colony, are exposed, for want of proper buildings wherein they can be lodged in safety—to construct which, it appears, an additional grant is necessary; this subject merits your earliest consideration.

The prosperity of this Colony being mainly dependent upon Agriculture, I would place that pursuit before your notice. I therefore recommend the consideration of measures tending to draw the chief efforts of the inhabitants towards the reclamation of the forest lands; and although I doubt the soundness of that policy which encourages one line of industry at the expense of others, yet I would suggest the advantage of offering encouragement to the importation, by private individuals, of improved breeds of farming stock, and seeds employed in husbandry, by admitting them free of duty.

I have to place again before you the subject of the proposed Asylum for "Insane persons and other objects of Charity." I trust this measure, so long contemplated, will be now completed; for I will not believe it possible that you will continue to withhold so necessary a shelter from this

afflicted class of our fellow creatures, towards which our Gracious Sovereign has so readily and largely contributed, upon the ground only that the 'curatorial powers' claimed by you over the projected Institution have not been acceded to; more especially, when this claim is declared by Her Majesty's Government to be an 'encroachment' upon the rules which should separate from each other the functions of the Executive Government and those of the Legislative bodies, and to which you have already been informed Her Majesty's Government cannot be parties.

Although, in the last Session, you considered the distressed condition of these sufferers, and granted a sum of money towards their support, yet, as you have no guarantee whatever for the proper application of this money, they have been doubtfully provided for.

By the Census just completed, I am informed that there are on this Island seventy-eight insane, thirty deaf and dumb, and twenty-nine blind persons—a statement that, I feel confident, will accelerate the consideration of this question.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

As my chief desire is the prosperity of this Island, so I gladly avail myself of this opportunity of earnestly assuring you, that I shall at all times be ready to concur with you in all measures appearing practically conducive to that end.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to revise the Journals of each day, after the adjournment.

Ordered, That Mr. Thomson, Mr. Palmer and Mr. Le Lacheur do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of Seven Members be appointed, to prepare and report, with all convenient speed, the draught of an Address, in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, delivered this day to both Houses of the Legislature.

Ordered, That Mr. Thomson, Mr. Palmer, Hon. J. S. Macdonald, Mr. Clark, Hon. Mr. Pope, Mr. Hudson and Mr. D. Macdonald do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed, to examine Bills to be engrossed, or that have been engrossed.

Ordered, That Mr. D. Macdonald, Mr. Longworth and Mr. Palmer do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of five Members be appointed, to keep up a good correspondence between the two Houses of the Legislature, and to report their proceedings from time to time—with power to send for persons, papers and records.

Ordered, That Mr. Palmer, Hon. Mr. Pope, Mr. Clark, Mr. Montgomery and Mr. Longworth do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of seven Members be appointed, to examine and report on the Public Accounts—with power to send for persons, papers and records.

Ordered, That Mr. Longworth, Mr. Thomson, Mr. Palmer, Mr. D. Macdonald, Mr. Gorman, Mr. Yeo and Mr. Fraser do compose the said Committee.

Ordered, That a copy of the Journal of this House be sent to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, each day, as soon as may be after the adjournment.

Resolved, That a Committee of five Members, of whom three shall be a Quorum, be appointed, to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, to report thereon.

Ordered, That Mr. D. Macdonald, Mr. Macintosh, Mr. Clark, Mr. Palmer and Mr. Maclean do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed, to examine what Laws have lately expired, or are near expiring, and to report thereon to the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Palmer, Hon. J. S. Macdonald and Hon. Mr. Pope do compose the said Committee.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at Eleven o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, January 26, 1842.

MR. THOMSON, from the Special Committee appointed to prepare and report the draught of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to both Houses, at the opening of the present Session, reported the draught of an Address, as prepared by the Committee—and he read the same in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as followeth:—

To His Excellency Sir HENRY VERE HUNTLEY, Knight, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories therunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral and Ordinary of the same, &c. &c. &c.

May it please your Excellency;

We Her Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Representatives of the people of Prince Edward Island, in Colonial Parliament assembled, most respectfully thank your Excellency for your Speech at the opening of the present Session.

With heartfelt sentiments of respect and devotion we join with your Excellency in your congratulations upon the Birth of a Prince, Heir apparent to the Throne of the British Empire, and also upon the perfect restoration of Her Majesty to health—blessings which demand our profound thankfulness to the Almighty, for his protecting care, which have filled all hearts, throughout every portion of these realms with confidence and joy, and call forth feelings of the warmest loyalty and attachment to Her Majesty.

Few subjects of public interest claim our attention more particularly than that of Education. We shall, therefore give our best consideration to the examination of the system by which the Central Academy is governed, with a view to its improvement, and in order that it may be rendered more useful to the Colony, and thereby attain a higher position in the public estimation. The House of Assembly will also give Education generally that consideration which the great importance of the subject demands, well knowing that the best interests of the Colony are chiefly dependent upon the intelligence of its Inhabitants, and that "deception, bigotry and crime diminish under its increase."

All communications which your Excellency may be pleased to make during the Session shall receive our best attention.

When the Public Accounts and Estimates are placed before us and audited, we will vote such supplies as the state of the Finances will admit of, and the public exigencies require.

It is matter of deep regret to the House of Assembly, that the numerous public works required in this Island have, up to this period, so far trenched upon its resources as to leave in abeyance a matter of such importance as the keeping of the Public Records in a place of safety. The House of Assembly will, at an early day, deliberate on the expediency of granting a further sum, to make the contemplated Building of such an extent as to meet the growing wants of the Colony.

We fully concur with your Excellency, that the prosperity of this Colony is mainly dependent upon its Agriculture, and we beg to assure your Excellency, that any measure calculated to promote its advancement will receive our cordial support.

We sincerely regret that the establishment of an Asylum for "Insane persons and other objects of Charity," has been so long delayed. This House can have no wish to encroach on the prerogative of the Executive, or to assume its functions, and will, therefore, with a view of meeting the objections entertained by Her Majesty's Government, give this subject that reconsideration which its great and increasing importance demands.

We rejoice to be informed that your Excellency's chief desire is, the prosperity of this Island—to which great end, we beg to assure your Excellency that no opportunity will be omitted on our part to co-operate with your Excellency in every practical measure conducive to its welfare and advancement.

Ordered, That the said draught Address be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Thomson took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again—which the House agreed to.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

Mr. Secretary Haviland, by command of His Excellency, delivered the following

Message:

H. V. HUNTLEY, Lt. Governor.

The Lieutenant Governor takes the earliest opportunity of submitting to the House of Assembly, in Her Majesty's name, a Bill to render valid certain proceedings of the Executive Government of this Island.

The Lieut. Governor also lays before the House a Copy of a Despatch from the Right Honorable Lord Stanley, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, explaining the necessity of such a measure.

Government House, 26th January, 1842.

Ordered, That the said Message, and the several papers accompanying the same, do lie on the Table.

Then the House adjourned for one hour:

Resolved, That this House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the further consideration of the draught Address in answer to His Excellency's Speech, at the opening of the present Session.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Thomson took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Thomson reported, that the Committee had gone through the Address, paragraph by paragraph, without making any amendment thereto.

Mr. D. Macdonald moved, in amendment to the Report, that the Sixth paragraph of the Address be left out, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:

"We fully concur with your Excellency, that the prosperity of this Colony mainly depends upon its Agriculture; and we beg to assure your Excellency, that it will be our first and chief object to give our attention to such measures as will give the inhabitants an interest in directing their efforts to reclaim the forest lands."

Resolved, That the said Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor by the whole House.

Ordered, That Mr. Thomson, Hon. J. S. Macdonald, and the Hon. Mr. Pope be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency to know his pleasure when he will be attended by the House with the Address.

Mr. Dalziel moved, that the House do come to a Resolution, as followeth:—

Resolved, That no Petition, praying aid for Roads and Bridges, or for any object of a local or private nature, be received after Monday, the 21st day of February next.

Mr. Clark moved, in amendment to the proposed Resolution, to leave out the words "Twenty-first," and insert the word "Fourteenth" in lieu thereof.

RESOLVED, That a Committee of eight Members be appointed, to consider the expediency of amending the Acts for establishing the Boundary Lines of Counties and Townships, and to report by Bill or otherwise—with power to send for persons, papers and records.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Pope, Mr. Clark, Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Gorman, Mr. Yeo, Mr. Palmer, Mr. Thomson, and Mr. Rae do compose the said Committee.

The Hon. Mr. Pope in his place presented to the House the Impost and Light Duty Accounts for the District of Bedeque, for the past year.

Ordered, That the said Accounts be referred to the Committee appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts.

Ordered, That Mr. Thomson have leave to introduce a Bill further to amend the Act for regulating the laying out and altering of Highways.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was read the first time, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Mr. Thomson, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to know his pleasure when he will be attended by the House with the Address, reported, that His Excellency had been pleased to appoint to-morrow, at One o'clock, to receive the House.

Mr. Palmer, from the Committee appointed to examine what Laws have lately expired, or are near expiring, presented to the House the Report of the Committee, which was again read at the Clerk's Table, and is as followeth:

Your Committee appointed to examine into and report upon such Laws as are about to expire, submit to your honorable House, that an Act passed in the Third year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act for the regulation of the Public Wharf of Charlottetown,' and continued for Two years by an Act passed in the Second year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled 'An Act to continue and amend the Act regulating the Public Wharf of Charlotte-

town,' will expire at the end of the present Session.

That an Act passed in the Fifty-ninth year of the Reign of King George the Third, intituled 'An Act for regulating Juries, and further declaring the qualifications of Jurors,' and continued by several subsequent Acts, the last of which being an Act passed in the Second year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, will also expire at the end of the present Session.

That an Act passed in the Second year of Her present Majesty's Reign, intituled 'An Act for granting a Bounty on Vessels engaged in the Fisheries of this Island,' and continued by an Act passed in the Fourth year of Her present Majesty's Reign, will expire at the end of the present Session.

And that an Act passed in the Seventh year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act for the increase of the Revenue of this Island,' and continued and amended by several subsequent Acts, the last being an Act passed in the Fourth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, will expire on the Fifth day of May next.

Ordered, That the above Report be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Palmer took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again—which the House agreed to.

A Message from the Legislative Council, by Mr. Charles Desbrisay, their Acting Clerk:

An engrossed Bill from the Council, intituled *An Act to confirm and render valid certain proceedings of the Executive Government of this Island*, was read the first time, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Resolved, That this House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the further consideration of the Report of the Special Committee appointed to examine what Laws have expired, or are near expiring.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Palmer took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again—which the House agreed to.

Resolved, That this House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the further consideration of the Report of the Special Committee appointed to exa-

mine what Laws have lately expired, or are near expiring.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Palmer took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. Palmer reported, that the Committee had come to three Resolutions, which they had directed him to report to the House; and he read the same in his place, and delivered them in at the Clerk's Table.

Mr. Palmer also acquainted the House, that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again—which the House agreed to.

The several Resolutions reported from the Committee were then read by the Clerk, and on the question being separately put thereon, agreed to by the House, and are as follow:

1. *RESOLVED*, That it is the opinion of this Committee, that it is expedient that an Act, intituled ‘An Act for the regulation of the ‘Public Wharf of Charlottetown,’ and continued for two years by an Act passed in the Second year of Her present Majesty's Reign, be further continued and amended.

2. *RESOLVED*, That the House be recommended to order a Bill to be brought in, to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to the qualifications of Jurors.

3. *RESOLVED*, That it is the opinion of this Committee, that it is inexpedient to continue the Bounty heretofore granted on Vessels engaged in the Fisheries of this Island.

Ordered, That Mr. Palmer, Mr. Longworth, and Mr. Maclean be a Committee to prepare and bring in a Bill, pursuant to the First of the above reported Resolutions.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Pope, Mr. Palmer, Mr. Thomson, Mr. Longworth, and the Hon. J. S. Macdonald be a Committee to prepare and bring in a Bill, pursuant to the Second of the above reported Resolutions.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at Eleven o'clock.

FRIDAY, January 28, 1842.

RESOLVED, That this House will, on Monday next, resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to consider the expediency of authorizing the issue of a Copper Currency in this Island.

Resolved, That a Message be sent to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, requesting that he will be pleased to acquaint this House whether any Contract has been entered into by Government for the erection of a Light House on Point Prim; and also, that he will be pleased to communicate any other information which he may possess relative thereto.

Ordered, That Mr. Maclean, Mr. Longworth, and Mr. Montgomery be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the said Message.

A Message from the Legislative Council, by Mr. Desbrisay :

A Message from the Legislative Council, by Mr. *Desbrisay* :

Mr. Speaker ;

The Legislative Council have passed the Bill intituled *An Act further to explain and amend an Act passed in the Third year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled ' An Act to consolidate, amend, and reduce into one Act, the several Acts of the General Assembly relating to Trespasses, and for other purposes therein mentioned,'* with an amendment—to which they desire the concurrence of the House of Assembly.

And then he withdrew.

The amendment made by the Legislative Council to the Bill intituled *An Act further to explain and amend an Act passed in the Third year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled ' An Act to consolidate, amend, and reduce into one Act, the*

several Acts of the General Assembly relating to Trespasses, and for other purposes therein mentioned,' was read the first time, and is as followeth :

Folio 1, line 11—Strike out from the word "Whereas," to the word "intent," in *folio 3, line 4*, and insert the following:—"Whereas, in and by the Thirteenth Section of the said Act, doubts have arisen as to the legal construction of offences done, either wilfully or maliciously, and it would seem an incongruity in law, to punish criminally a Civil offence—for remedy whereof, Be it enacted, by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Assembly, That if any person or persons shall, after the passing of this Act, wilfully do or commit any damage, injury or spoil, to or upon any Building, Wood, Gates, Fences, Underwood, Orchard, Garden, Nursery-Ground, Crops, Vegetables, Plants, Land, or other matter or thing, growing or being thereon, or to or upon real property, of any nature or kind whatsoever, and shall be thereof convicted within Six Calendar months, next after the committing of such injury, before any Justice of the Peace for the County where such offence shall have been committed, either by the confession of the party offending, or by the oath of one or more credible Witness or Witnesses, or of the party aggrieved in the premises, (which oath, such Justice is hereby empowered to administer,) every person so offending, and being thereof convicted as aforesaid, shall forfeit and pay to the person or persons aggrieved, such a sum of money as shall appear to such Justice to be a reasonable satisfaction or compensation for the injury, damage or spoil so committed, not exceeding, in any case, the sum of Five Pounds, over and above the Costs of recovering the same—which said sum of money and Costs shall be paid to the person or persons aggrieved ; but in case such conviction shall take place on the sole evidence of the party aggrieved, then, and in such cases, such satisfaction and compensation shall be paid into Her Majesty's Treasury, for and towards the support of Her Majesty's Government of this Island ; and in default of payment of the sum of money in which the offender or offenders shall have been so

“convicted as aforesaid, immediately, or
 “within such time as the Justice shall ap-
 “point at the time of conviction, together
 “with all costs, charges and expenses
 “attending the conviction, such Justice
 “shall and may issue, and he is hereby
 “authorized to issue a Warrant of Distress
 “and Sale, whereby to levy on and sell
 “the goods and chattels of the offender or
 “offenders that shall have been so con-
 “victed as aforesaid, for the amount of
 “such penalty, costs, charges and expen-
 “ses, as aforesaid; and in the event of
 “such offender or offenders not having
 “any goods or chattels whereon the same
 “may be levied as aforesaid, then, and in
 “such case, the said Justice shall and
 “may, and he is hereby empowered, to
 “commit the said offender or offenders
 “to the Common Jail, for any time not
 “exceeding three Calendar months, un-
 “less such penalty, costs and charges
 “shall be sooner paid and satisfied—any
 “thing in the said Thirteenth Section of
 “the said Act to the contrary notwith-
 “standing.”

Ordered, That the said amendment be read a second time to-morrow.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

May it please your Majesty;

We your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Island of Prince Edward, in Colonial Parliament assembled, beg to approach your Throne with the humble request, that you will cause to be taken into consideration the situation of this Island, in relation to its Agriculture.

Dependent, in common with our fellow subjects in this Colony, exclusively on the cultivation of the soil for our maintenance, without a sufficient market for our surplus produce, we can never hope to attain at any thing like prosperity; and we feel that whilst we import British manufactures to a large amount, that if the Ports of Great Britain were open to the importation of our Corn, unrestricted by any Duties, that our condition would be so much ameliorated, that the unemployed population of the Mother Country would find their way to this and the neighbouring Colonies, in numbers affording relief to the Agricultural and other districts of Great Britain, and of a value quite commensurate with any loss that, by possibility, might be sustained by the competition in the home market of Corn the produce of these Colonies; and thus a reciprocal advantage might be derived to both Great Britain and this Colony.

Relying on your Majesty's known solicitude for all parts of your Empire, we beg to lay this our prayer at the foot of your august Throne, on the granting of which our prosperity so much depends—and we shall, as in duty bound, ever pray.

To the Right Honorable the Lords Spiritual and Temporal of Great Britain and Ireland, in Parliament assembled.

The Memorial of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Her Majesty's Island of Prince Edward, in Colonial Parliament convened, sheweth—

That your Memorialists, and their fellow subjects in this Island, are entirely dependent for their prosperity on a Market for the sale of Agricultural Produce. Having no Coal or Minerals, or other raw material, their pursuits are necessarily confined to the cultivation of the soil, and that cultivation is much circumscribed by the length of the winter season in this climate, which prevents their keeping such a stock of horned cattle and sheep as their farms require—it is thus more particularly on the growth of Corn that their dependence rests.

Your Memorialists therefore pray, that the duties on the importation of Colonial Corn—namely, Wheat, Barley, Oats,

Rye, Pease and Beans, Wheat Meal and Flour, Oatmeal, Maize, Indian Corn, Buck Wheat, Beer or Bigg, and on all Salted Provisions, may cease.

Whilst exertions are making in England to get rid of her crowded Population, by means of Emigration, it appears to your Memorialists that the main engine to be employed, to render such a measure successful, must be, the finding profitable employment for those who may be thereby induced to leave their native country; and it is the deliberate opinion of your Memorialists, that to grant their prayer would have more permanent results, in inducing Emigration, than can be afforded by any, the most profuse, moneyed grant in aid of such a purpose.

Your Memorialists disclaim any desire to derive advantage from the difficulties of their Agricultural brethren in Great Britain, conceiving, as they do, that they are all members of the same family—nor have they anything to do with the question of the policy of opening the Ports of Great Britain to Foreign Corn; their desire is, to obtain an exception from duty in favour of Colonial Corn, on the ground of the extensive importation of British Manufactures into these Colonies, which importation, it is obvious, would be greatly increased, could the inhabitants of this Island be relieved from the necessity of remitting specie, which they are now under, because they do not find a market for their Agricultural Produce in Great Britain; and thus a process would begin, by which additional employment would be found for the British manufacturer. Nor should it be forgotten, that whilst the importation to England of Continental Corn is commonly paid for in specie, that for that which would be introduced by your Memorialists, her manufactures would be required in exchange. It should be considered, likewise, that Great Britain derives great benefit from the asylum that is here offered to that surplus population which would otherwise become an increasing charge on the expenses of British cultivation—a benefit which your Memorialists consider of such value, that they do not entertain the smallest doubt that if their prayer were granted; and hereafter, if a balance were struck between the amount of the moneyed value of the relief thus afforded to the British grower of Corn by increasing Colonization, and the amount of loss he could sustain by the admission of Colonial Grain into free competition with his own, that such balance would be extensively in his favour.

IV., Cap. 24.

By the foregoing statement, it appears, that the Expenditure for the past year has been £15,837 18s. 5d., and the Receipts at the Treasury, during the same period (exclusive of £2,189 3s. 6d., the Amount collected under the Land Assessment Act), have amounted to £11,509 19s. 8d., leaving an apparent balance against the Colony, for that time, of £4,327 7s. 6d.; yet the actual balance against the country for the past year should be taken at £2,937 5s. 11d., as £1,390 1s. 6d. of the amount received under the operation of the Land Assessment Act will go to reduce the floating debt of the Colony, there being that amount now in the Treasury, and collected under that Act, over and above the £5,000 appropriated by the same Act for the erection of a Colonial Building.

The above Abstract of the financial state of the Colony, in which all the Treasury Notes now in circulation (£11,500) are charged against the Island, exhibits a balance against the Colony of £12,604 8s. 7d.; but in this amount no credit is given for the £5,000 already alluded to—and, further, respecting this sum, locked up in the Treasury, your Committee would respectfully

suggest and recommend to the House to adopt such measures as will authorize the Government to call in that amount of Treasury Warrants, with security on the General Revenue of the Island for its return, when required, and thereby save to the Colony, for a time, at the rate of £300 a year, in the shape of interest, now payable on outstanding Warrants, as well as conferring a still greater advantage on the Colony, by throwing into immediate circulation Five thousand Pounds.

The falling off in the Revenue during the past year, on the Articles of Rum, Gin and Brandy, compared with the quantity imported the previous year, amounts to £2582 10s. 4d. (being 29,514½ Gallons less, at 1s. 9d. duty); but to show more particularly how the whole amount (£2,690 3s. 1d.) of the falling off of Revenue in the Excise Department has taken place, your Committee have prepared the following comparative statement, shewing an increase on some dutiable Articles and a decrease on others, entered at the several Impost Offices in the Colony, during the past and previous year:

Your Committee beg to remark, that the apparent balance against the Colony includes the sum of £1,141 5s. advanced under the Road Compensation Act, and which sum will be available when the Roads opened under the provisions of the said Act shall be completed.

Your Committee would recommend to the House of Assembly, to consider the expediency of establishing, by Law, fixed Salaries, to every Officer of the Government of this Colony, in lieu of fees—a practice that has been carried out to a considerable extent in Great Britain and in the neighbouring Colonies, and one which has been partially adopted here, with much advantage.

Your Committee further recommend that the vouchers hereunto annexed be printed as an Appendix to the Journals.

TWO Messages from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor :

Mr. Secretary Haviland, by command of His Excellency, delivered the following Messages :

First Message :

H. V. HUNTLEY, Lieut. Governor.

The Lieutenant Governor lays before the House of Assembly the Estimates for the Services of the current year. Accompanying them is a Memorial of the Assessors for the Pumps and Wells of Charlottetown, and for other purposes, praying for aid towards the purchase of an additional Fire Engine, and the erection of an Engine House, which the Lieutenant Governor submits for the consideration of the House.

The Lieutenant Governor also lays before the House Accounts of Expenditure which has been incurred in and about Government House and Premises, during the past year, beyond the sum granted for those purposes.

Government House, 22nd February, 1842.

Second Message :

H. V. HUNTLEY, Lieut. Governor.

The Lieutenant Governor lays before the House of Assembly the Returns of the Commissioners of Statute Labour for the past year, shewing, at the same time, the present state of the Roads and Bridges in their several Districts.

Also, the Account of the Road Correspondent of the application of the sums granted by the Legislature for the service of Roads and Bridges, for the past year.

In making suitable provision for this service for the current year, the Lieut. Governor leaves it to the local knowledge possessed by the House to appropriate such an amount as is compatible with necessary improvements, and the disposable resources of the Colony.

The Lieutenant Governor avails himself of this opportunity to submit to the House a Petition of John Roach Bourke, Esquire, Road Commissioner of the 9th District, praying, on account of the reasons therein assigned, for a Grant of Sixty Pounds, to enable him to discharge the balance due to the Contractor for building the Bridge over Vernon River. The facts of this case are comprised in the Petition and Papers annexed; but the Lieutenant Governor must observe, that when Petitioner applied to the House of Assembly, in the last Session, for an additional Grant of £60, to complete the contract for this Bridge, as stated in his Petition, it does not appear that he informed the House that the object of his application was, to make up the deficiency of individual subscriptions in aid of the said Bridge.

It was also the duty of Petitioner to have reported to the Government his inability to raise the required amount of subscription, before he took upon himself to enter into a contract for the erection of the Bridge.

Your Committee, to whom was referred the Petition of the Inhabitants of Belle Creek, and its vicinity, respectfully report, that having maturely considered the subject to them referred, and having obtained information from persons residing on the spot, are of opinion, that the case is one of peculiar hardship, and therefore recommend that an Address be presented to his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying him to be pleased to direct that such proceedings may be adopted as are necessary to open said Road through M'Pherson's farm, so as to be available to the petitioners, and the public at large.

Resolved, That the following Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor do now pass :

To His Excellency Sir HENRY VERE HUNTLEY, Knight, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral, and Ordinary of the same, &c. &c. &c.

May it please your Excellency ;

The House of Assembly having had under their consideration the Report of a Special Committee, appointed to ex-

amine the statements set forth in a Petition relating to a Road leading from the Main Road to Belle Creek, respectfully request, that your Excellency will be pleased to cause such proceedings to be taken as to your Excellency shall appear meet, for the opening of said Road through M'Pherson's farm, so as to be available to the petitioners, and the public at large.

In order that your Excellency may be enabled to form a correct idea on the subject, a copy of the Petition, and the Plan of the Road, are hereunto affixed.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Ordered, That the Committee who brought in the Report be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the same.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at Eleven o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, February 23, 1842.

MR. *RAE*, from the Special Committee appointed to report on the subject of the Collection of the Land Assessment, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee.

Ordered, That the said Report be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Hudson took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. *Hudson* reported, that the Committee had gone through the Report, paragraph by paragraph, had made amendments thereto, and then adopted the same; and the said Report, as amended, was again read at the Clerk's Table, and on the question put thereon, agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:

That the former Treasurer has stated, that he gave instructions to the Deputy Receiver to allow only 33 1-3 per centum advance on British coins, and that, from his explanation of his motives, the Committee can attach no blame to him for having so done.

That the present Treasurer never issued such regulations, nor intimated his desire to continue them, but invariably received from the public Notes and Coins at the rates at which he issued the same from the Treasury; and that he states, that none of the Deputy Receivers ever paid him, as Treasurer, British shillings at less than One shilling and sixpence.

That your Committee have reason to believe, that the Deputy Collector at Princetown has, in some instances, refused to receive British shillings at more than 1s. 3d. or 1s. 4d., and that some individuals paid the same to him at these reduced rates, and that he has thus retained the difference. The Committee deem it unnecessary for the House to take any procedure, in regard to that individual, but recommend that an Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, requesting His Excellency to cause the Treasurer of this Island to give such instructions to his Deputies as will prevent such irregularities in future.

That in reference to the charge made by the Deputy Re-

ceiver at Princetown, for writing out the Returns referred to in the 8th Section of the Act of 7 Will. 4, cap. 31, your Committee would observe, that the duty is not required to be performed by the Receiver; and, further, that no fees are allowed by the said Act for such service.

Resolved, That the following Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor do now pass:

The House of Assembly, having had under their consideration certain difficulties which have occurred, in regard to the rates at which Coins current in the Colony have occasionally been received in payment of the Land Assessment, have to request, that your Excellency will be pleased to direct the Treasurer to give such instructions to his Deputies as will prevent such irregularities in future.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Ordered, That the Committee who brought in the Report be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the said Address.

Mr. *D. Macdonald*, in his place, read a Petition of divers Inhabitants of St. Peter's Bay, and its vicinity—praying a grant, in aid of individual subscription, towards the construction of a Wharf at Sandy Point, and also to purchase a right of way thereto.

Mr. *D. Macdonald* also acquainted the House, that His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor had given his consent that the House may proceed thereon as they shall think fit.

A motion being made, that, under the peculiar circumstances of the case, the said Petition be received and read;

Ordered, That Mr. Thomson do carry back the said Bill to the Legislative Council, and acquaint them that this House hath agreed to their amendments.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Pope,

RESOLVED, That the Committee of this House, having charge of the Library, do cause arrangements to be made, for a classification of the papers and documents belonging to the House; and that the said Committee do submit, for the approval of the House, such Rules and Regulations as may be deemed requisite for the better preservation and management of the public Records for the future.

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

The Road on the South side of East Point to Souris is very hilly, which might be avoided, as the contemplated Road would open a communication with all parts of the Island. It would intersect nearly at right angles the Road through Township Forty-five—the Line Road between Townships Forty-three and Forty-four—the St. Peter's Road to Bay Fortune—and the Road from St. Peter's Bay to Cardigan River. To the inhabitants of the North side it would afford a Winter Road to Charlottetown and Georgetown, as the snow drifts and bare ground (which frequently interrupt travelling on the Capes and St. Peter's Barrens) would be avoided; and with regard to the Road in question being maintained as a main Winter Road for all the North of King's County, your Committee would recommend that the width should be extended to One hundred feet, and the bushes suffered to grow on both sides, which would preserve the snow of a regular depth for hauling; and as this Road would reach the Hillsborough ice at the Bridge, it would give facility to the carriage of produce to Charlottetown. This Road would also afford great advantages for settlement; for, as far as can be at present ascertained, where it intersects the Roads alluded to, the land is generally good, and fit for cultivation.

Your Committee, in the present state of the finances of the Colony, and particularly from the great demands on the Treasury for Roads now in progress, regret that they cannot recommend the present opening of the said contemplated Road; they would, however, respectfully submit, as the importance of such a Road cannot be questioned, that it should be undertaken when those now in the course of completion shall be finished.

Ordered, That the said Report do lie on the Table.

Mr. *Le Lacheur*, from the Committee to whom was referred the Petition of William Morrison, of Georgetown, Fish Inspector, praying for an alteration in the Act of last Session for the appointment of Fish Inspectors, and to continue and extend the provisions of the Act now in force regulating the size and quality of Fish Barrels and Tierces, and the weight of Fish made up therein, with power to report by Bill or otherwise, presented to the House a Bill for that purpose, as prepared by the Committee; and the same was read the first time, and ordered to be read a second time on Tuesday next.

Mr. *Forbes*, from the Committee appointed last Session, to whom was referred the Peti-

tion of divers Inhabitants of Rustico, and its vicinity, complaining of the very inefficient manner in which the Bridge lately erected over Tanner's Creek had been constructed, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee; which Report was again read at the Clerk's Table, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee, to whom was referred the Petition of the Inhabitants of Rustico, and its vicinity, complaining of the inefficient manner in which the Bridge over Tanner's Creek had been constructed, having examined the same, are of opinion, that the work is sufficiently, though roughly, done, except the railing, which is all broken down, and does not appear to your Committee to have been a good job. The Bridge is very high, and consequently very dangerous without a railing; but your Committee think that the Commissioner ought to have railed it immediately, and would therefore recommend that a small sum be appropriated for that purpose.

Ordered, That the said Report be referred to the Committee of the whole House, on the consideration of Roads, Bridges and Wharves.

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

Mr. *D. Macdonald*, from the Committee appointed to join a Committee of the Legislative Council, for the purpose of inquiring into and reporting on the state of the Central Academy, and upon general Education, reported, that the Joint Committee had agreed upon an Address to Her Majesty, relative to the disposal of the Moneys now in the Treasury arising from the sale of the School Lands; and the said draught Address, being again read at the Clerk's Table, was, on the question put thereon, agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

May it please your Majesty;

We, your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Legislative Council and Assembly of your Majesty's Island of Prince Edward, in Colonial Parliament convened, having had under our consideration a Despatch of the Lord Glenelg, your Majesty's late Secretary of State for the Colonies, dated Downing Street, 3d December, 1838, stating that your Majesty will be prepared to take into your favourable consideration any Joint Address which may be presented to your Majesty by both Houses of Legislature, specifying the manner and proportions in which the Moneys arising from the Sale of the School Lands under the Provincial Act of 5th Will. 4th, cap. 13, can be most advantageously appropriated, for the promotion of general Education throughout the Island, would most humbly submit, for your Majesty's approval, that the said Moneys, amounting to £ Halifax currency, may be invested with the Treasurer of

this Island, in the public funds of this Colony, and that the annual legal interest arising thereupon may be apportioned amongst the District Schools which now are established, or may hereafter be established, under the Laws of this Island, and that the said Moneys be applied for the sole purpose of affording gratuitous instruction to the children of the destitute poor.

We beg further to state to your Majesty, that there are at present One hundred and twenty-one District Schools, besides two Educational Establishments, in this Island, receiving an annual bounty from the public funds of the Colony, in which Schools provision is made by Law for the gratuitous instruction of upwards of 484 children; and that the grants of public money from the Treasury of this Island, in aid of such Schools and Establishments, for the past year, amount to a sum equal to full One-tenth part of the entire Revenue of this Island, which we trust your Majesty will receive as a pledge of our earnest desire to extend the blessings of Education amongst all classes of the community, and as the best guarantee that we can offer for the proper application of the said School Moneys.

May it therefore please your Majesty to direct that the said Moneys may be invested in the public Treasury of this Colony, and that the annual legal interest arising therefrom may be applied to the gratuitous instruction in the District Schools of this Island of the children of the destitute poor, under the direction of the Legislature of this Colony.

And, as in duty bound, we will ever pray.

Ordered, That the Committee of this House appointed to join a Committee of the Legislative Council, for the purpose of inquiring into and reporting on the state of the Central Academy, and upon general Education, have power to report Bills relative thereto.

And thereupon, Mr. *D. Macdonald*, Chairman of the said Committee, reported the following Bills, viz:—A Bill to alter and amend the Act for the establishment of an Academy in Charlottetown; A Bill to repeal a certain portion of the Nineteenth Section of the Act, 4th Vic., Cap. 6, relating to Schools, and for the encouragement of Education; and the said Bills were, on motion, respectively read for the first time.

Ordered, That the Bill to alter and amend the Act for the establishment of an Academy in Charlottetown, be read a second time on Monday next.

Ordered, That the Bill to repeal a certain portion of the Nineteenth Section of the Act, 4th Vic., Cap. 6, relating to Schools, and for the encouragement of Education, be read a second time on Tuesday next.

The Order of the Day, for the second reading of the Bill to amend the Act for levying an Assessment on Town Lots in Georgetown, being read;

Mr. *Palmer* moved, that the said Bill be now, according to order, read a second time.

Mr. *Thomson* moved, in amendment to the said motion, to leave out the word "now," and at the end of the question, insert the words "this day three months."

Ordered, That the said Bill be committed to a Committee of the whole House on Tuesday next.

Mr. *Palmer*, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Message of the 24th inst., praying that he will cause to be laid before the House the Contract entered into for the construction of a Wharf at Minchin's Point, opposite Charlottetown, reported the delivery thereof, and that His Excellency was pleased to say, he would cause the document prayed for to be laid before the House.

Then the House adjourned until Monday next, at Twelve o'clock.

MONDAY, February 28, 1842.

THE Hon. Mr. Pope, from the Committee appointed to prepare Reasons, to be offered to the Legislative Council, at a Conference, for disagreeing to their amendment to the Bill intituled *An Act further to explain and amend an Act passed in the Third year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act to consolidate, amend, and reduce into one Act, the several Acts of the General Assembly relating to Trespasses, and for other purposes therein mentioned'*—presented to the House the Report of the said Committee; which, being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

The House of Assembly disagree to the amendment made by the Legislative Council to the Bill intituled *An Act further to explain and amend an Act passed in the Third year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act to consolidate, amend, and reduce into one Act, the several Acts of the General Assembly relating to Trespasses, and for other purposes therein mentioned,'* for the following Reasons, viz:—*Because* they consider it highly expedient that provision should be made for the redress of petty Trespasses, by a more expeditious and less expensive process than is now afforded in the Superior Courts of Law, from the limited construction which those Courts have hitherto put upon the 13th Section of the Trespass Act, of the 3d Will. 4th, cap. 27; and in order to remove all doubt in future as to the nature of the injuries which that Section purports to remedy, as well as to render it as remedial as possible in its operation, they hold it necessary that the objects of the Amendment should expressly appear on the face of the Bill; and its Preamble, as passed by the House of Assembly, they still consider as best adapted for this purpose—the Preamble offered by the Legislative Council not pointing out the particular construction of the Section on which the doubts subsist, unless the bare inference which arises from the statement of its seeming “an incongruity at Law to punish criminally a civil offence,” which inference, unchecked by any other part of the Council's amendments, appears equally as much, if not more likely to create a supposition that the offences mentioned in the said 13th Section are considered at present all civil offences or injuries in their nature, and the punishment awarded for them in all respects calculated for offences criminal in their nature.

Because—By the amendment offered by the Council, no remedy is given for an injury to personal property.

Because—By such amendment, also, the party grieved by a civil injury would be deprived of the power of arresting the offender in the very act of trespass, and of taking him at once before a Justice, as he is now, and would still be, by the amendment of the House of Assembly, permitted to do by the salutary provision of the 15th Section of the principal Act.

Because—The House of Assembly further consider that two Sections of the Law so similar, both in their

language and in the mode of proceeding under them, but requiring such a cautious line of distinction in adjudicating on the different offences within their respective meaning, would be too likely to lead to confusion in the mind of the Magistrate; and a conviction under the one, for offences rendered by the Council's amendment exclusively within the meaning of the other, would be too frequently the result—particularly as the Magistrate, before he issued a Summons, would have no other guide than the *ex parte* statement of the complainant to enable him to decide whether he ought to proceed as against a civil or a criminal offender.

Resolved, That a Conference be desired with the Legislative Council, on the subject-matter of the amendment made to the said Bill; and that on the said Conference, the Committee of this House be instructed to communicate to the Committee of the Council, the Reasons of this House for disagreeing to the same.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Pope do go to the Council, and desire the said Conference.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Pope, Hon. J. S. Macdonald, Mr. Clark, Mr. Thomson, Mr. Longworth and Mr. Palmer be a Committee to manage the said Conference.

A Message from the Legislative Council, by Mr. Desbrisay:

that he will be pleased to forward the Joint Address to Her Majesty, praying that Corn, the growth of this Colony, may be admitted, duty free, into the United Kingdom—reported the delivery thereof, and that His Excellency was pleased to say, he would have much pleasure in transmitting the same.

The Order of the Day, for the House in Committee on the further consideration of all matters relating to Roads, Bridges and Wharves, being read;

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Longworth took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again.

Ordered, That the said Committee have leave to sit again to-morrow.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at Eleven o'clock.

The Legislative Council do not insist on their amendments made to the Bill intituled *An Act further to explain and amend an Act passed in the Third year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled ' An Act to consolidate, amend, and reduce ' into one Act, the several Acts of the General ' Assembly relating to Trespasses, and for other ' purposes therein mentioned.'*

And then he withdrew.

Mr. Thomson, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the Address, praying that His Excellency would be pleased to inform the House whether any appropriations of the Moneys arising from the Sales of Crown Lands have been made, other than those already made towards the erection of a Lunatic Asylum, and such sums as may have been laid out in opening the Roads in the Royalty of Georgetown ; and also requesting that His Excellency would be pleased to communicate to the House the net amount of the Moneys which have been derived from the Sales of Crown Lands, reported to the House that their Address had been presented to His Ex-

cellency, and that he was pleased to say, he would comply with the desire of the House.

Ordered, That the same Committee who managed the last Conference be a Committee to manage this Free Conference.

A Message from the Legislative Council, by Mr. Desbrisay :

Because they conceive that the amendments made by the Legislative Council are contrary to the spirit and intention of the Act of 26th Geo. 3d, cap. 15, which declares that the same person being continued in the Office of Provost Marshal might be prejudicial, lest, being a needy man, he might be "induced thereby to "practice extortion, and to become variously oppressive "to Her Majesty's subjects," and that therefore it was expedient to appoint Sheriffs, as being in office only for one year.

Because the above mentioned Act was for a further reason enacted "to bring this Government as near as "may be to resemble the envied and happy constitution "of our Mother Country ;" which constitution provides that none that hath been a Sheriff of any County a year, shall, within two years next, be chosen again, or put in the same office, if there be others sufficient. And further, that no Sheriff shall tarry or abide in this Office above one year, upon pain to forfeit £200 for every year.

Because the House of Assembly conceive, that the practice of continuing the same person, year after year, in the office of Sheriff has a direct tendency to expose the country to the same evil as stated in the first reason held likely to flow from the Office of Provost Marshal ; and further, may be used in a great measure to defeat the freedom of Elections.

Resolved, That the Legislative Council be furnished with copies of all the Documents, Maps and Plans on which the Bill to amend the Act for ascertaining and establishing the Boundary Lines of Counties and Townships was founded.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Pope do carry the said Papers to the Council.

The time for holding the Conference with the Legislative Council, on the subject matter of their amendments to the Bill intituled *An Act to further amend the several Acts therein mentioned, relating to the appointment of Sheriffs, and to regulate the Fees to be taken by them in certain cases*, having arrived ;

And the names of the Managers being called over, they went to the Conference.

And being returned—

Mr. D. Macdonald reported, that the Managers had been at the Conference; and had complied with the instructions given them by this House.

Mr. Longworth, from the Committee appointed to examine into and report on the efficiency of the vessel licensed to run as a Packet between Bedeque and Shediac, as well as on the probable expense of employing vessels as Mail Packets between this Island and Pictou, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee; which Report being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee have respectfully to report, that from the examination of witnesses, and from all the information your Committee can obtain respecting the state of the Shediac and Bedeque Packet, it appears that she is an old Vessel, and during the past summer was in a very leaky and unseaworthy state, and quite unfit for the service she was engaged in; your Committee would therefore recommend the House to address the Lieut. Governor, requesting that he would be pleased to cause the said vessel to be inspected, on the opening of the Navigation, and if not then found to be thoroughly and efficiently repaired, and properly equipped in Rigging and Sails, to cancel the Licence granted by this Government to Anthony Simpson, to run her as a Packet.

On the probable expense of running sailing Vessels between this Island and Pictou, as Mail Packets, your Committee are of opinion, from the best information they could procure on the subject, that two good vessels, of a sufficient burthen, to ply at least once a week between Charlottetown and Pictou, with the Mail, could be obtained for about £22 per month each; and your Committee would recommend the House to authorize the Government to engage two such vessels for this service, so long as they might be required.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the Report be a Committee to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in accordance with the First paragraph of the said Report.

Ordered, That the Second paragraph of the said Report be referred to the Committee of Supply.

A Message from the Legislative Council, by Mr. Desbrisay:

Mr. Speaker;

The Legislative Council desire a further Conference with the House of Assembly, on the amendments made to the Bill intituled *An Act to alter and amend the Act for the establishment of an Academy in Charlottetown*; and have appointed the same Committee who managed the former Conference a Committee to manage this further Conference—to meet in the Committee Room instanter.

The Lieutenant Governor brings under the notice of the House of Assembly, the great difficulty which exists in the due execution of the Laws, especially in Charlottetown, from the want of an efficient Constabulary force; and recommends to the House to pass a Bill for the establishment of such Constabulary force for Charlottetown, to act in Criminal cases only—recent events having convinced the Lieutenant Governor, as they must the House of Assembly, of the urgent necessity for such a measure.

Mr. *Thomson*, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Message of the 1st instant, praying for certain Documents relative to the sales of Crown Lands, reported the delivery thereof ; and that His Excellency was pleased to say, he would cause the Documents prayed for to be laid before the House.

Mr. *Palmer*, from the Committee to whom was referred so much of His Excellency’s Speech at the opening of the Session as relates to the contemplated Lunatic Asylum, and to report thereon, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee ; which Report was again read at the Clerk’s Table, and is as followeth :—

Your Committee appointed to report upon the probable yearly expense of the maintenance of a Lunatic Asylum, and other information connected therewith, have had the subject for some time under their consideration. The main expense, as depending upon the probable number of Lunatic inmates upon a yearly average, who might require admission, would first require to be esti-

mated; and, although, by the statistical Returns now before the House, there appears to be as many as seventy-eight of those unfortunate individuals throughout the Island, it is not to be supposed that any proportion near that number would require or apply for public support.

The number of persons not strictly within the above class, but more properly objects for an Infirmary or House of Industry, and towards whose support sums of money have been appropriated for the last three years, appear from the votes of the House of Assembly to be as follows, viz: For the year 1839, Forty-seven; for the year 1840, Sixty; and for the year 1841, Seventy-three, shewing an increase of about Thirteen yearly. Of these persons, it may be reasonably supposed that but a small number would seek to become permanently inmates of the Institution, owing to the test which its well ordained regulations would impose where doubts might exist as to the physical ability and voluntary disposition of any to provide for themselves, as well as from the incitement which would be created among the relatives of individuals proposed for admission to relieve their connections from the necessity of such means of support.

The yearly amount of public money which, during the last three years, has been bestowed on, and expended for the foregoing several classes of persons, your Committee find to be as follows, viz: for the year 1839, £309—for 1840, £355 19s. 10d.—for 1841, £530 17s.—the rapid increase of which appears at once to call for some system of management, by which individuals who are not from necessity alone objects of relief should be no longer burthensome to the country, and whereby some guarantee may be obtained or responsibility created to insure a just and proper application of the monies to those purposes intended by the bounty of the Legislature.

With a view therefore of ascertaining the probable expense of maintaining an Institution of limited extent, suitable not only for a Lunatic Asylum, but containing also such arrangements as would serve for an House of Industry, your Committee have examined persons acquainted with the management of such Institutions, and from the best information they can obtain, your Committee submit a calculation of the probable annual expense necessary for the keeping of Twenty patients, including the requisite number of superintendents and servants, viz:

While proposing the number of Patients to be at any one time no more than twenty, your Committee may observe, that such number, although limited, may yet embrace from time to time a larger number of individuals, it being established from the returns of similar Institutions in different countries, that nearly one half the number of Patients are discharged cured, and a considerable number relieved. Patients also, who have means to contribute towards their own support, might, according to the foregoing calculations, be admitted and furnished with attendance at the rate of Ten shillings per week, which would in fact be a saving to the Institution of Six shillings per week.

The advantages also which the Institution, as well as its inmates, would derive from the possession and culture of from ten to twenty acres of arable land, and if such land were situate in the immediate vicinity of the sea board, the salutary effects which the Patients would derive from pure air, sea bathing, and a tranquil situation, are considerations too important not to be urged by your Committee.

Your Committee, therefore, feeling sensible of the increasing necessity for such an Institution, and fearing lest the want of any establishment of that kind may be considered as a reproach to the Colony, respectfully submit the expediency of the House reconsidering the Act of Assembly, providing for the erection of the Asylum, as at present suspended, with a view of removing those objections to the Act which are considered by Her Majesty as encroachments on the prerogative of the Executive, or an assumption of its functions by the House of Assembly.

Your Committee therefore recommend that a Bill be brought in for such purpose, and thereby render available to the country the sum of £1500, which Her Majesty has so beneficently allowed to be appropriated out of the Crown Land Monies, for the erection of the Building.

“And be it further enacted, that the said Sheriff shall be entitled to similar fees for travel, and for levying, recovering and paying over any moneys under the said Warrant of Distress, as Sheriffs now are entitled unto for levying Executions issuing out of the Supreme Court of Judicature of this Island—the said fees to be by him levied for and recovered from the person or persons against whom the said Warrant shall be issued, as aforesaid.”

“And be it further enacted, that if any cause cannot be tried when called on in the said Sessions for default of Jurors, the said Justices shall have authority to command the Sheriff to summon so many other proper persons—not being liable more than once in a year—to attend forthwith, as will make up a full Jury for the trial of such cause.”

Ordered, That the Tenth Rule of this House be suspended, as far as regards the said amendments.

And then the said amendments were read a second time.

A motion being made, that the said amendments be now committed to a Committee of the whole House;

The Hon. Mr. *Pope* moved, in amendment,

to strike out the word "now," and at the end of the question, to insert the words "this day three months"—which being seconded and put, was carried in the affirmative.

The main motion, as amended, was then put and carried.

Ordered, That the said amendments be committed to a Committee of the whole House this day three months.

The Hon. Mr. *Pope*, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, presented to the House the following Returns, in compliance with the Message of this House to His Excellency of the 1st instant :

Acting Surveyor General's Account of Sales of Crown Lands, from the year 1834 to 1841, both inclusive.

Acting Surveyor General's Return of Crown Lands, sold during the years 1839, 1840 and 1841, shewing the amount due thereon.

Return of Lands remaining in the Crown, in Prince Edward Island.

An Account of Moneys paid into the Treasury, under Act of 10th Geo. 4, cap. 10.

Ordered, That the said Papers be referred to the Committee of the whole House, on the state of the Colony.

The Order of the Day, for the House in Committee, to inquire into and take into consideration the State of the Colony, being read ;

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Beck took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

Mr. *Beck* reported, that the Committee had come to Eighteen Resolutions—which Resolutions were again read at the Clerk's Table, and are as follow :—

1. **RESOLVED**, That it is the opinion of this Committee, that they see no reason to depart from any of the Resolutions, as to the State of the Colony, passed in the Sessions of 1839, 1840, 1841, nor from any of the representations contained in the Addresses forwarded to the Colonial Secretary and the House of Commons in those years.

2. Whereas Lord John Russell, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, in a Despatch to Sir Charles A. Fitz Roy, bearing date the 25th June, 1841, contains a conclusion to which Her Majesty's Government has come, in reference to the question of Escheat, viz: that the original terms of settlement were impracticable, and that any Escheat at the present day, on the ground of the failure to fulfil the conditions in the original Grants, would be unjust—which

said conclusion is in direct contradiction to the statements made by the House of Assembly in 1797—to the admission contained in Lord Hobart's Despatch in answer thereto, dated in 1802,—to the Act of the Legislature in 1803, passed as recommended by the said Despatch of 1802, the disallowance of which has never yet been satisfactorily accounted for—to the Resolutions of the House of Assembly in 1805—to the proceedings taken by Government against Townships 15 and 55, in 1816—to the Despatch of the Earl of Bathurst, with the Prince Regent's Proclamation of 1818, granting an Indulgence to the Grantees and Proprietors for Ten years from 1816, allowing the Lands to be settled by British subjects in the same proportion as originally intended with Foreign Protestants—to the actual state of the Population in several Townships at the expiration of the said Indulgence in 1827—to the opinions of the Crown Officers in 1832, taken by the then House of Assembly—to the Act of 1833, intituled *An Act to encourage the settlement and improvement of Lands in this Island, and to regulate the proceedings of a Court of Escheats therein*, which Act was disallowed, not because the terms of settlement were impracticable, but because the said Act might fetter His Majesty in the free exercise of His Royal Prerogative—to the reasons given for passing the several Acts for levying an Assessment on all Lands—to the Report of the Earl of Durham to the Imperial Parliament in 1839—to the admission in the Despatch of Lord Stanley, Lord Goderich, and Lord Glenelg, from 1831 to 1840,—and to the published admission of Governors Fanning, Smith, Ready, Young, Harvey and Fitz Roy—to the practice pursued in the old Colonies, and in the neighbouring, and also stated to be pursued in the Australian Colonies—to Lord John Russell's own opinion at one time, which he states to be, that the question at issue "was a public question, and as such must be treated"—and to evidence taken by and within the knowledge of this House : **Resolved**, therefore, that this House considers the said opinion, contained in Lord John Russell's Despatch, of the 25th June, to be singular, unsupported by evidence, and in direct opposition to the various statements and opinions above referred to.

3. Whereas it appears by a Despatch laid before this House, dated Downing-street, 25th June, 1841, that the Right Honorable Lord John Russell, Her Majesty's late Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, is of opinion, "that the original terms of settlement were impracticable, and that any Escheat at the present day, on the ground of the failure to fulfil such conditions, would be unjust." **Resolved**, That the House of Assembly have not desired an Escheat solely on the grounds of the failure to fulfil the original terms of settlement, but principally on account of the exorbitant Rents demanded by the Proprietors, which absorb the labour and capital invested by the Tenant in the improvement of the Land ; and it would be unjust to allow the Proprietors to claim such property through their failure to fulfil their conditions. The true value of the Grants to which the Proprietors have any right in equity can be estimated only when connected with the apparent expense and difficulty attending the performance of the original conditions for settlement ; and any delay of the Executive to enforce the forfeiture of the Grants, when such conditions were not performed, or to release the Grantees from said conditions, and authorize them to introduce British Subjects instead of Foreign Protestants, has given a new value and

construction to the Grants—the amount of such enhanced value being in proportion to the prices or terms the respective Grantees or Proprietors have let or disposed of the Land to Immigrants, which new value is abstracted from the Colony generally, but from British subjects individually; and as the land is let far above its value, the labour and capital in improving it becomes the property of the Proprietor, while, on the other hand, the non-settlement with Foreign Protestants held out a fair prospect to British subjects emigrating to the Colonies that the lands would be revested in the Crown, and that such Immigrants would be settled in the same manner as Government have settled them in the other Colonies.

4. **RESOLVED**, That the terms proposed by Mr. George R. Young were rejected unanimously by the House of Assembly, as unworthy of being recommended by the Government, or accepted by the People.

5. And whereas the said last Despatch recommends it as Her Majesty's desire, that the Assembly and Council should "turn their attention to the improvement of the resources, and the encouragement of the growing wealth of Prince Edward Island, and leave to the gradual operation of time the settlement of a question which affords no sound footing for direct Legislation?" *Resolved*, That where public wrongs disturb the minds of a people, and thus retard the prosperity of a Colony, it is the duty of the House of Assembly respectfully to represent it to Her Majesty, and seek redress; and the wrongs of this Colony may be briefly stated as follows: The Land of this Island was let in its wilderness state to British subjects, without any improvement, at a rent far above the interest of the fee-simple value of the Land, as stated in the 3d and 4th Resolutions of 1839, and those of the 24th April, 1841, and many of the Tenantry are greatly in arrears for rent, which they are unable to pay, much less to redeem their improvements at the Proprietors' terms by the purchase of the fee-simple. And the practice of adding the arrears of Rent to the fee-simple, and demanding interest as rent, or taking the Tenant's bond on interest for such arrears, is most discouraging to the Tenant, and renders it utterly hopeless for the Tenant to derive any benefit from his improvements. The Grantees have also exercised an ownership over the lands reserved in the Crown for the Fisheries, and have let the same on rent, together with the Township lands; and Immigrants, on their arrival, had to become Tenants, to procure a location where they could fish for their subsistence; and when the improvements (which is the growing wealth of Prince Edward Island) are assumed by the Proprietors under such practices, to leave to the gradual operation of time the settlement of a question of such vast importance to the happiness of the people and the prosperity of the Colony, would discourage industry, render property insecure, and bring the justice of Her Majesty's Government into disrepute.

6. **RESOLVED**, That the House of Assembly have not sought an advance of money from the Imperial Revenue, to purchase the Lands from the Proprietors, to enable the Crown to sell or regrant the same to the Tenants; but from a desire to settle the Tenantry and occupants of Land. The House of Assembly passed a Bill for that purpose in the Session of 1839, which was rejected by Ministers, on the ground that it embraced the principle of Escheat; and in the Sessions of 1840 and 1841, the House of Assembly passed another Bill, which went to revest the lands in the Crown,

and to settle the Tenants and occupants thereon, on their paying the full price of Wilderness land, for such quantity as they held under lease or occupation—which price, together with a Land Tax, was placed at the disposal of the Crown, to award to the respective Proprietors such portion of the said sum as Her Majesty might be advised to grant in equity as the value of the Grants, and for any expense or loss the Proprietors might sustain.

7. **RESOLVED**, That the Despatch laid before the House of Assembly in 1841, states, that the settlement of the Tenantry *must be treated as a public question*; and the Despatch laid before the House this present Session, in reference to the same question, concludes, that *it offers no sound footing for direct Legislation*, which vacillating Despatches are prejudicial to the Colony, and operate on the hopes and fears of a numerous class of persons, who have improved the lands of this Colony, and stand in jeopardy of being deprived of their improvements.

8. **RESOLVED**, That whatever *injustice* may attend an Escheat at the present day, on the ground of the failure to fulfil the conditions for settlement, proceeds from the vacillating Despatches received from time to time from the Secretaries of State for the Colonies. A Despatch from Lord Hobart, in the year 1802, recommended the Legislature of this Island to pass a Bill for the regulation of a Court of Escheat, which was passed accordingly, but afterwards suppressed, through some undue influence; and, in the year 1816, a Despatch from the Earl of Bathurst went to release the Grantees from the performance of the conditions of their Grants; and when the Right Honorable Lord John Russell, Her Majesty's late Secretary of State for the Colonies, discourages all such legislation in this Island as would settle the inhabitants, it becomes necessary to pray Her Majesty to lay the unsettled state of this Colony before the Imperial Legislature, and recommend to their consideration to pass an enactment to authorise the Crown to appoint Commissioners from the Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia—men whose experience in the practice of settling the lands in those Provinces would enable them to make an appraisalment; to find the original fee simple value of the land in its wilderness state; and also the value thereof in its improved state; and to settle the inhabitants in this Colony in such a manner, that while the Government may deem it just to award to the Proprietors the fee simple value of the land in its wilderness state, or the interest thereof as a rent, it appears equally just and reasonable that those who have cleared and improved the land, and erected the buildings thereon at their own cost and labour, should be secured in the value of their improvements.

9. **RESOLVED**, That while the Law for revesting forfeited Lands in the Crown is suspended in this Colony, and the Law for the recovery of Rents for such lands is carried into operation, giving the Proprietors of forfeited Grants an undue claim to recover Rent, and also the improvements made upon those lands by persons who were to have been settled, there is no expectation that such Proprietors will consent to relinquish such claims, or submit to an equitable arrangement, as recommended in the foregoing Resolutions, unless the Government is prepared (in the event of the Proprietors' refusal) to institute proceedings by a Court of Escheat, to revest the forfeited Lands in the Crown, and settle the inhabitants.

10. **RESOLVED**, That it is a subject of complaint in this

Colony, that the Grantees or Proprietors of the Township Lands have been suffered to exercise acts of ownership over the Lands for the Fisheries, including them in their Leases to the Tenants, or otherwise having disposed of the fee simple with the land in the rear thereof; and immigrants on their arrival to settle in this Colony, had either to purchase or to pay rent for such reservations, before they could obtain a location where they could fish for their subsistence—whereby the Grantees or Proprietors have obtained large sums of money, to the loss of the inhabitants and the Colony; whereas the late Lieutenant Governor, Sir Charles A. Fitz Roy, in the Session of 1839, by Message, laid before the House of Assembly certain Despatches relating to the Lands reserved for the Fisheries, setting forth that it was the determination of Her Majesty's Government to throw open the Reserves to all British subjects engaging in the Fisheries, and suggesting to the House of Assembly the propriety of passing such Laws as might be necessary "for preventing improvident and injurious practices in carrying them on," as recommended by Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies.

11. **RESOLVED**, That the House of Assembly have, in the Sessions of 1839, 1841, and 1842, passed Bills for the regulation of the Reserves, to afford every facility for carrying on the Fisheries; but as the persons located upon these Reservations had cleared and improved the same, and in most cases have erected their Dwelling Houses and other Buildings thereon, and have either purchased the fee simple thereof, or paid Rents for such Reservations to the Proprietors of the adjoining Townships, the House of Assembly provided in their Bills that the persons who cleared the land, or were entitled to the improvements, should be quieted in their possessions; but the Council virtually rejected the said Bills, by their amendments thereto—which amendments went to exclude the fishermen, not only from all Bays and Harbours, but also from parts of the Out-sea coast, and to give the fee simple to the Proprietors of the Townships in the rear of the Fishery Reserves.

12. **RESOLVED**, That every indulgence that has been given to the Proprietors, from time to time, has been at the expense of the Tenantry; that when the Imperial Government reduced the Quit Rents, at the desire of the Grantees, they were increasing the Rent upon the Tenantry; and when the Despatch from Earl Bathurst went to release the Grantees from the settlement of their Grants with Foreign Protestants, the Grantees, through such indulgence, imposed terms of settlement upon British subjects far less favourable than any settlement practised in the British Colonies; that when the late Secretary of State for the Colonies declined to authorise the appointment of a Court of Escheat, and declared that it would be unjust to divest the Proprietors of the Land, the Proprietors were and are thereby encouraged to distress and deprive the Tenants of their improvements; and every indulgence given to the Proprietors emboldens them still further to oppress the Tenants; that as the House of Assembly knew that the Fishery Reserves were the most desirable for the location of immigrants, for the convenience of fishing, and that such lands were the first brought into cultivation, and, together with the fishery, were the principal sources from which the Tenant could pay rent—which rent the Proprietors have received since the first colonization of this Island—therefore, there could be no injustice done to the Proprietors of the Township

Lands to pass a Law to quiet the Tenant in the possession of such portion of the Reserves as he has cleared and brought into cultivation at his own cost and labour—subject nevertheless to the original conditions of being open to the fisheries.

13. **RESOLVED**, That while the Proprietors are allowed to demand and recover Rent for the Lands reserved for the Fisheries, or to dispose of them in fee simple, it operates as a reward to the proprietors to defeat any Law being made for the regulation of the Fishery Reserves, or for the settlement of the inhabitants of this Colony; and that therefore it be respectfully submitted to the Government, that it is necessary that the Government should, without delay, institute proceedings for the recovery of such rents or purchase money from the Grantees, their Heirs and Assigns, as have been received by them, and to order such regulations as shall make such Reserves available in future for the purposes for which said lands were reserved.

14. **RESOLVED**, That the Land Assessment imposed by an Act passed in 1837, for ten years, has been of no service whatever, to induce the Proprietor to settle the present Tenantry and occupants, or to settle the Wilderness land, but this Tax has released the Proprietors from the payment of a Quit Rent, and often is an additional burden of Two Shillings, per hundred acres, upon the Tenant and occupant; and the Tax of Four Shillings, per hundred acres, upon the Proprietors, for Wild Lands, is but an advance of Eightpence, sterling, upon a Quit Rent of Two Shillings, sterling, per hundred acres, which the Proprietors are bound to pay—the Four Shillings, currency, being Two Shillings and eight pence sterling.

15. **RESOLVED**, That the rejection by the Legislative Council of the Bill passed by the House of Assembly, for the payment of One hundred Pounds, sterling, to the individual whom the Assembly should appoint as their Agent in Great Britain, for the purposes expressed in the preamble to the said Bill, is denying to the Representatives of the people of this Colony the power of appropriating, from the funds received from the people, a sum which, thus applied, was likely to be of the most material service to the people, and is barring them from the means of employing an efficient individual to act for them in Great Britain, at the time when the Petition of the House of Assembly is pending before the House of Commons, and when those of whose procedure the people of this Colony complain have an organized system and agency in Britain, actively engaged in counteracting the views and injuring the interests of the people of this Colony.

16. **RESOLVED**, That while the main interests and resources of this Island depend on the number, industry and wealth of its agricultural population, so long will its prosperity be retarded by any public measure calculated to render insecure the titles to landed estates; to discourage the ingress and settlement of agricultural capitalists, or which may prove to its numerous Tenantry an inducement to withhold the payment of their rents, until all arrears accumulate to a ruinous and irredeemable burthen—which public measures have been supported by the proprietors and their abettors.

17. **RESOLVED**, That the following Report of the Special Committee appointed to report on the value of Property enumerated in the Census Returns, be adopted:—

Your Committee have respectfully to submit, that at this late period of the Session, they have not been able to bestow that time which the nature of the subject would require, in order to state, in all particulars, exact amounts; that, after some days, part of the information which they required has not been furnished, owing probably to the pressure of other business in one of the public Offices, and that, in some of its bearings, the Committee could not ascertain, from any authentic record at their command, exact numbers or exact amounts. Under these circumstances, the only course left open to your Committee was to decline reporting, or so to guard their statements as that when exact information was unattainable, they should underrate any number or amount which bore against the statements and arguments of the proprietary claimants, and should, at the same time, overrate any number or amount which was in favour of these claimants. The documents as to arable, freehold and leased land, mills, farming stock and crop, Churches, Schools, and the number of the male population liable to statute labour, are all taken from the Census, so far as number, the values only having been affixed by the Committee.

The above prices are on the supposition, that the farming stock are at the prices they would be sold for in barter, and rather over the cash prices; and were any quantity thrown into the market here, and cash payments required, the price would fall very considerably. Shewing that the expenditure of the Colony, independent of Rents, amounts to about 14 per cent. on the capital accumulated, chiefly by labour on the land, for the last seventy years. And, in regard to this expenditure, your Committee have to remark, that though it may be thought the Colony could dispense with the greater part of some of the articles imported, yet, that it is equally clear, the Colony requires far more of some other articles than are imported, e. g., Iron and Salt, and all ship stores. Your Committee have also to remark, that the quantity of Wheat raised in the Colony affords three bushels for the consumption of every individual; and that your Committee believe the quantity of wheaten flour exported from the cut ports, to be at least equal to what is imported at Charlottetown. Whereas the average consumption of Wheat in England, appears by Macculloch, folio 416, to be from 4 to 8 bushels per head.

Your Committee also submit, as indicative of the state of the Colony, that the Spanish Dollar, current in the adjoining Provinces at 5s. and 5s. 3d. of their currency, passes here at 6s. of this Island currency; that their One Pound Notes pass here for Twenty-three Shillings; and that the British Shilling, which with them varies from 1s. 1d. to 1s. 3d., here passes for 1s. 6d.; and that the temporary employment of agricultural labourers, and the employment of mechanics, would be much circumscribed, were they, in all instances, to refuse to take from their employers the produce of the country, and to insist for money.

Your Committee submit, that the population of this Island appears to have been doubled since the year 1827; but that, though this is held by some as an argument of this Island offering advantages superior to the neighbouring Colonies, your Committee cannot agree to the deduction. The number of Immigrants within that period bears a large propor-

tion to the total population in 1827, for in that year it was 23,000, and last year 2,000 Immigrants arrived; and laying aside this item of account, it may be observed, that some portions of the British dominions, which receive no accession of numbers from abroad, but are every year sending out great numbers of their native population, and are, in spite of such drain, rapidly increasing in amount, are at the same time rather diminishing than increasing in wealth. The exact increase of population, from births among the people resident in this Island in 1827, appears from the Census to be 8,205, or 35 per cent. in fourteen years.

RENT.—Of the land occupied, 300,000 acres appear from the Census to be under rent. This, on several Townships, is 1s. 6d. and 2s. sterling, on leases of 42 years—the lessees entering not on houses and land cleared and fenced, but on wilderness wood-land. On some Townships the earlier settlers obtained leases at 6d. per acre, for 100 years. In general, the rent is one shilling, sterling, per acre, per annum, and the duration 100 years; and the yearly rent at this date may be calculated at £16,250, currency.

Previous to 1830, no law existed in the Colony compelling the claimants of Townships to contribute to the expense of making Roads through such Townships. Since that time, a law was passed compelling them to contribute to the formation (but not to the maintenance) of such Roads as should thereafter be run through the land claimed by them, in so far as a jury should find that such land was increased in value by said Road; but if deteriorated, then the Treasury had to pay the amount of such deterioration to the claimants of the land. Under this Law, which was put into operation in 1833, verdicts have been given against the claimants of land to the amount of £2,029
 And in their favour, as for damages, - 351
 Shewing the balance assessed on them to be—
 (See Return by Prothonotary.) £2,578
 Of which there has been paid, up to the 5th April, 1842, £388, as by search of Committee; stated by the Treasurer at £310.

Thus it appears that the total amount which the proprietary claimants, as such, have been assessed for Roads, since the Colony received a Legislature, is only one half of what was last year voted by the House of Assembly, in aid of Roads, Bridges and Wharves, and not more than one-fifteenth of what has, by vote of successive Houses of Assembly, been paid for similar purposes since 1824, and not equivalent to one year of the Statute Labour; and of this small Assessment, only £388 appear to have been paid—a sum not far exceeding the expense to which the country has been put in summoning and paying Juries and Witnesses, &c., to obtain the whole of the verdicts.

As to the sales of land by the claimants of Townships, to actual cultivators, by the Census it would appear that 239,000 acres are held in freehold; but this was not all sold by these claimants to the farmers, for two Townships, each of 20,000 acres, were escheated by Governor Smith, and the greater part of these has been granted, in tracts of from 500 to 100 acres; and much of what was thus granted is now held in freehold by farmers. Of 200,000 acres which the proprietary claimants offered in 1782-3 to surrender to Loyalists, a quantity, estimated at 25,000 acres, is held by Loyalists or their Assigns. One entire Township, No. 3, was made over by one claimant to his creditors, and by them sold in lots of 900 acres; and at different times individual

farmers have purchased small tracts of wilderness land at sales, for arrears of Quit Rent or Land Assessment, due by the Townships. About 7,500 acres of Glebe and School Lands were sold, in lots not exceeding 130 acres; and the moieties of Townships 45 and 52, for which moieties (according to the best information your Committee can acquire) no claimants ever appeared, as well as portions of other Townships, which were for many years unclaimed, have been taken up by individuals who, by undisputed possession, for a series of years, have acquired a legal right to the land, and thus may be reckoned amongst the freeholders—so that from the above 231,000 acres, marked in the Census as held in fee simple, a considerable proportion has not been sold by the claimants of Townships to the farmers thereof, and therefore “the gradual operation of time,” recommended by Lord John Russell, appears to your Committee likely to extend to some centuries. As to the value of the claim to the soil of the Island, maintained by the heirs and assigns of the Grantees, about 1,300,000 acres were granted. Of these, 239,000 are, as above mentioned, now held in fee simple, and this being deducted, leaves 1,061,000 acres claimed by these Grantees, part of which they have leased; but the greater part is unleased; and of both leased and unleased, the greater part, or at least nine-tenths, is not reclaimed from the state of nature.

Now, 5s. per acre, for wilderness land, may be taken as the outside value thereof, and rather exceeds the average value of sales of Government land in New Brunswick, and this gives the value of this seigneurial claim (if valid) at £265,250.

Taking another view of the matter, and referring to the account published in London, about 1807, by Captain John Stewart, and to other accounts, it would appear that the average market value of a claim to one of the Townships of this Colony, from 1769 to 1800, was about £600, which, for 67 Townships, would give £33,300
 Interest on that sum, 141,858

£175,158
 And your Committee, making every deduction, cannot estimate the amount of prices received by the proprietary claimants and their Agents, at less than 50,000
 And of Rents, at less than, - 160,000
 Total, £210,000

Nor the amount of Quit Rents, Land Assessment, and Road Compensation Assessment, and all other advances, at more than 25,000
 Leaving £185,000

It is submitted by your Committee, that if, in addition to the £185,000 which they or their Agents have received, the Imperial Government award them either the above £265,250, or the smaller amount of £175,158, it will award more than can in equity be claimed by those who have acted as have the Grantees, and those who succeeded to their territorial claims or demands; and it is also submitted that, from the tables and accounts herein referred to, it is beyond the means of the Colony to pay the Rents demanded by these individuals.

Your Committee, in reference to Mr. Cunard's answers before the House of Commons—questions 3,097, 3,098—have

required the Rev. L. C. Jenkins, Ecclesiastical Commissary for the Church of England, in this Colony, to state the amount of moneys paid by Mr. Cunard towards the erection or endowment of Churches, and find that he has paid nothing; and on requiring further information, as to the amount contributed by claimants of Townships, they find that the whole, to the best of the Commissary's knowledge, is £35 in money, and 75 acres of land. Your Committee have ascertained that £75 were contributed by the Countess of Westmorland, towards a Methodist Chapel; in regard to other contributors, your Committee cannot, for want of time to correspond with the Clergymen of different persuasions throughout the Island, ascertain the exact amount of the few other contributions of money, and the number of acres of land, given as sites for Churches by the Claimants of the Townships; but feel confident that the total value contributed by them, for the last seventy years, in any shape, towards the erection and endowment of places of worship of all denominations, and of schools every where throughout the Townships, is under £700.

18. **RESOLVED**, That it is the opinion of this Committee, that an humble Address be prepared to Her Majesty, praying that out of the unappropriated funds now or hereafter to be paid into the Treasury of this Island, arising from the sale of Crown Lands, Her Majesty will be graciously pleased to allow the sum of Five hundred Pounds to be applied, in addition to the sum at present granted by the Colonial Legislature, in the purchase of a piece of ground for the purposes of the contemplated Lunatic Asylum; and also the sum of One hundred and fifty pounds, to be applied in opening the Georgetown Royalty Roads; and also the sum of One hundred Pounds, to open new Roads throughout, and in the improvement of the communications in Princetown and Royalty.

And the First of the said Resolutions being again read;

The Hon. Mr. *Pope* moved, in amendment thereto, that the whole be expunged, and the following substituted:

"Whereas, since the year 1833, the population of this Island has increased nearly 15,000 in number, and during the same period the quantity of Land which has been sold, demised and occupied, in small tracts, is upwards of 222,000 Acres, as appears by the Statistical Returns of the year 1833, and of the past year; and whereas the Assessment of Four Shillings per hundred Acres, now levied on Wilderness Land, has been in operation but three years, during such period; and although to its effects may be attributable, in a great degree, the increased ratio of settlement and improvement of Lands over that of any similar period, yet, as a penal Assessment, it has not been found sufficient in amount effectually to prevent the owners of extensive tracts of wilderness Lands from retaining the same still in an unsettled state, with a view of their acquiring an increased value by the improvement made on the adjoining lands by the labour of the actual settler, as well as by the expenditure of large amounts of public Moneys for general purposes; and whereas the repeated and urgent representations of the House of Assembly of this Colony to Her Majesty's Government, since the year 1832, for a forfeiture of the Lands of this Island, on the grounds of the non-fulfilment of the conditions of settle-

ment, contained in the original Grants thereof, have been unattended with any success; and Her Majesty's Government by a Despatch from the Right Hon. Lord John Russell, dated Downing Street, 25th June, 1841, after having reviewed the whole progress of the discussion regarding the tenure of lands, having declared "that the further agitation of this question cannot be attended with any beneficial consequences to this Island, and that Her Majesty will not consent to the forfeiture of said lands; and further, that Her Majesty's Government have not at its disposal any funds out of which the Lands could be purchased by the Crown, to be afterwards sold or granted to the tenants." *Resolved, Therefore*, That this House, although desirous at all times of alleviating the condition of the Tenantry of this Island, and deeply regretting the inability of Her Majesty's Government to comply with the wishes of its Representatives, yet, seeing no reasonable prospect of obtaining the object desired in this particular, and believing that this House will best promote the true interests of the Inhabitants of this Colony by no longer persisting in a measure (however desirable in itself) which the repeated declarations of Her Majesty's Government has rendered unattainable, do now recommend that an appeal be made to the justice of Her Majesty's Government to sanction the imposition of such a penal Assessment on the wild lands held by the Grantees, or their assigns, as shall tend to enforce the settlement of the said lands without delay, and thereby lessen the burthens now borne by the resident Inhabitants—such Assessment to vary in amount according to the proportion of said wild lands held by the Proprietors thereof—the principle of such an Assessment having already been conceded by Her Majesty's Government, as being just and equitable."

Mr. *Rae* moved, in amendment to the said proposed amendment, that after the word "Therefore," all be struck out, and the following substituted:

"That the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, not having any right to expect that the same measure of Escheat which has been asked by and granted to the Province of Nova Scotia, ought to be asked by or granted to them, inasmuch as a small Colony ought to put up with a smaller measure of justice than a larger Colony, and the Representatives of the people ought to neglect their interest, in order to promote the exactions of the Proprietary Claimants, do from henceforth recommend, that the people shall submit to the continuance of whatever imposition and tyranny the Proprietary Claimants and their Agents may inflict."

MACDONALD, from the Committee appointed to join a Committee of the Legislative Council, to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the Address, praying that he will be pleased to forward the Joint Address of the Council and Assembly to Her Majesty, relative to the Moneys arising from the Sale of the School Lands, reported, that they had waited upon His Excellency with the same, who was

pleased to say, that he would forward the said Address, as desired.

Mr. Rae, from the Committee appointed to prepare a Petition to the Right Honorable and Honorable the Knights, Burgesses and Citizens of the Parliament of the United Kingdom, founded on the first seventeen of the Resolutions reported yesterday from the Committee on the State of the Colony, as amend-

ed and agreed to by the House; and also a Petition to Her Majesty on the same subject; reported the draught of two Petitions, as prepared by the Committee; and the said draught Petitions were again read at the Clerk's Table, and are as follow;—

To the Right Honorable and Honorable the Knights, Citizens and Burgesses, in Parliament assembled.

The Petition of the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, respectfully sheweth—

That in 1840 and 1841, your Petitioners applied to your Honorable Body, for the redress of heavy grievances, affecting the cultivators of Land in this Colony, in consequence of the whole soil having been granted, in lots of 20,000 acres, to individuals whose management has proved most prejudicial to the interests of the Colony, as an appendage of Britain, and most oppressive to the farmers. Printed copies of applications, made in past time to the Privy Council, and of sundry other documents, in proof of the statements of your Petitioners, were last year forwarded to Joseph Hume, Esq., and Resolutions, explanatory of the present state of the Colony, are herewith forwarded.

Your Petitioners are aware of the many important and difficult questions which, relating directly to your own constituents, have a preferable claim to your attention; but they earnestly entreat, that by means of a Committee, or in whatever way to your Honourable Body may seem meet, some steps may be taken this Session towards the redress of the heavy grievances which have long oppressed this Island.

Your Petitioners have further to submit, that the Land on the sea coast of this Island was not granted on the same terms as the rest, but was reserved, part in the Crown, and part "for a free Fishery for all British subjects;" that said land has, in many instances, been sold or leased by the Grantees; that Lord Glenelg, by Despatches, dated in 1833, signified Her Majesty's pleasure, that the same should be thrown open, as originally intended, and required the Lieutenant Governor to recommend to the Legislature to pass a Law for the regulation of these Reserves; that your Petitioners and the Legislative Council entertain views so different, as to the intent of the Reservation and the meaning of the Despatches, as to have been unable to agree on some principal Sections of the Bill which passed the House of Assembly, though repeated communications, by means of amendments, have been held betwixt the two Bodies, during the three previous Sessions; and that there seems no prospect of the Legislative Council ever agreeing to such a Bill as your Petitioners must pass, to do justice to their Constituents; and under these circumstances, your Petitioners are under the necessity of praying your Honourable House to take such measures, for their relief in this matter also, as, in your wisdom, you may deem meet.

And your Petitioners will ever pray.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

The Humble Petition of the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island,

Most respectfully sheweth—

That this Island was originally granted in large tracts, upon condition that the Grantees were to introduce and settle their Grants with Foreign Protestants—which condition

has not been performed, and the Lands are subject to forfeiture. But Your Majesty's Predecessors extended indulgence to the Grantees, to enable them to settle their Grants with British Subjects. Of this arrangement your Petitioners would not complain, had the Proprietors disposed of their Lands at a price which immigrants and others could pay, or the interest thereof as a rent. But the Grantees and their Assigns, taking advantage of such indulgence to raise the price of the Land that the inhabitants were endeavouring to purchase, they had to become Tenants, and covenant to pay a Rent which, notwithstanding their best exertions, they are unable to pay; and the Tenantry are greatly in arrears for Rent, for which many of them are liable to be ejected, and deprived of their improvements, made with much cost and labour.

The House of Assembly, to relieve them from much distress, pray your Majesty to recommend to the Imperial Parliament to pass an enactment for the appointment of Commissioners from the neighbouring Provinces, authorising them to fix the price of the Land in its original wilderness state, that the Tenantry may be enabled to pay such fixed price, or the interest thereof as a rent; and if the Proprietors refuse to submit to this equitable measure, we pray your Majesty, as an act of justice, to re-vest the forfeited Lands in the Crown.

The House of Assembly herewith forward a series of Resolutions, passed on the State of the Colony, in support of the above—to all of which they pray Your Majesty's favourable consideration—and your Petitioners will ever pray for your Majesty's sacred person.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

May it please your Majesty;

We, the Representatives of your Majesty's faithful and loyal people of Prince Edward Island, in Colonial Parliament assembled, humbly submit to your Majesty's Royal consideration, that in the Session of 1840, the House of Assembly addressed your Majesty—to which they beg reference, as well as to several Resolutions passed by this House, when on the State of the Colony, which are herewith submitted—with regard to the Fishery Reserves of this Island, under the impression that your Majesty would be pleased to cause the Executive to put in force a Despatch from Lord Glenelg, then Secretary of State for the Colonies, to His Excellency Sir Charles A. Fitz Roy, which is as follows:

(No. 66.) "Downing Street, 14th September, 1838.

"Sir;

"I have received your Despatch (No. 27) of the 26th July, recommending the adoption of the alternative suggested in my Despatch of the 10th May last (No. 43), of throwing open the Fishery Reserves on the Shores of Prince Edward Island to all British subjects engaging in the Fisheries. The House of Assembly, placing every confidence in your Majesty's justice towards your loyal subjects, the inhabitants of this Island, feel with unfeigned regret that there has been no answer to their humble Address, and that thereby a great portion of the inhabitants of this Island, engaging in the Fisheries, are subject to very heavy grievances. The House of Assembly would beg to submit, that, in addition to the Bills passed by this House in 1839 and 1840, for the regulation of the Fishery Reserves, the House of Assembly passed a Bill to the same effect in the present Session, which the Legislative Council rejected; and as the Proprietary Claimants of Townships in this Island are continually harassing with law proceedings Fishermen and others located on said Reservations, and raising a Revenue from that to which they never had any Title, to the great discouragement of Trade and loss of Property in this Colony, the House of Assembly beg that your Majesty would be pleased to order the Crown Officers of this Island to take legal proceedings against Proprietary Claimants, for recovering all Rents or sums of money which they have received in any way, as arising from said Reservations, and give such other directions to the Lieutenant Governor of this Island as will, in future, prohibit Proprietary Claimants from exacting any Rents, or arrears of Rent, for any quantity of Land contained in said Reservations. And further, the House of Assembly would humbly but most earnestly pray, that your Majesty would

be pleased to order the Lieutenant Governor of this Island to throw open said Reservations, in accordance with said Despatch, and that if any dispute should arise between parties availing themselves of the said privilege, that the Legislature shall apply such remedy thereto as the nature of the case may appear to require.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

The humble Address of the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island.

Most Gracious Sovereign ;

We your Majesty's faithful subjects, the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, humbly approach your Majesty's Throne, with sentiments of loyalty and attachment towards your Majesty's person and government.

Having taken into our consideration the Act passed in the Session of 1840, to authorize the erection of a Building near Charlottetown, as an Asylum for insane persons, and other objects of charity, agreeably to the Despatch of the Right Honorable Lord John Russell, your Majesty's late Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, dated the 13th October, 1840, have passed a supplementary Act, which, we trust with confidence, will sufficiently remove those objections to the said original Act, as pointed out in such Despatch, and thereby receive your Royal sanction to its becoming a Law, and proceedings towards the erection of the Building to be from any such objections no longer delayed in their operation.

We beg leave, however, further to state to your Majesty, that such a very great increase having lately arisen in the price of lands in the vicinity of Charlottetown, that the quantity with which it is so desirable and necessary to endow the Institution, for the immediate benefit of its inmates, and as authorized to be purchased by the aforesaid Act, cannot now be obtained, in any eligible situation, at a less price than nearly double the sum for which it could have been purchased when the said original Act passed—a circumstance which will now, unfortunately, delay the fixing of a site for the building until additional means can be obtained for the purpose, which we deeply regret the finances of the Colony in their present state will not admit of.

We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take such difficulty into your favourable consideration, and to authorize the appropriation of the sum of £500 towards such purpose, out of the sum of £1000, the balance of Moneys now unappropriated, arising from the proceeds of the sale of the Crown Lands of this Colony.

We further most respectfully submit to your Majesty, a subject also which, in a great measure, affects the public interest of your Majesty's loyal subjects, the Inhabitants of this Colony, owing to the want of public funds which the Colony is not yet in a state to afford ; being the unimproved condition of the public Streets and Communications in the Royalties of both Princetown and Georgetown, in this Island—particularly the latter. We would, therefore, most humbly appeal to your Majesty's favour, and request, that out of such funds, your Majesty would still beneficently allow for Princetown the appropriation of £100, and for Georgetown that of £150, for the aforesaid purposes.

1. Because the evil which the Act of 26th Geo. 3d, cap. 15, was passed to remedy, cannot, by any possibility, grow up to any extent, under the present practice in this Colony, of continuing the same person from year to year, as Sheriff. The office of Provost Marshal was a Patent office, held under the Crown, and if an officer became "extortionate or oppressive in his office," great difficulty might arise in procuring the removal of such officer: Whereas, under the present system, the appointment of Sheriffs, being virtually an annual appointment, in the event of any Sheriff becoming "extortionate or oppressive," it is in the power of the Executive to refrain from re-appointing him, or even to supersede him at any time during the year of his Shrievalty.

2. Because, until the local circumstances of this Colony shall more nearly assimilate to the circumstances of the Mother Country, the Rules prohibiting the appointment of the Sheriffs, for consecutive years, in force there, cannot be carried out beneficially for the public interests in this Colony; and the adoption of the practice in the neighbouring Colonies of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, in continuing the same Sheriffs in office during good behaviour for several years, seems well adapted to procure and retain the services of persons as Sheriffs, qualified from character, education, and practical experience, to fulfil the duties of their office.

3. Because the Legislative Council cannot conceive, that the practice of continuing the same person as Sheriff from year to year, has a direct or any tendency to expose the Colony to the same evils, as stated likely to flow from the office of Provost Marshal, for the reasons herein before first mentioned; neither can the Council conceive how such a practice can be

used in a great, or in any measure, to defeat the freedom of Elections, any more than if the Sheriff was annually changed, as it appears to the Council, that the Laws regulating Elections in force in this Colony are sufficiently stringent to guard against the possibility of any such undue or improper interference by any Sheriff at any Election; but if the Assembly should be of opinion that the Election Laws require amendment or alteration, with a view to this particular point, the Council will be willing to give due weight to any measure that may emanate from the Assembly, to prevent the possibility of any such occurrence.

And the names of the Managers being called over, they went to the Conference.

Mr. *D. Macdonald* reported, that the Managers had been at the Conference; and he stated the substance thereof to the House.

Mr. *Rae*, from the Committee appointed to report on the value of Property enumerated in the Census Returns, with leave to report from time to time, presented to the House the second Report of the said Committee; and he read the same in his place, and delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read.

Ordered, That Mr. *Clark* and Mr. *D. Macdonald* be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the said Address.

Mr. *Thomson* moved, that the House do come to a Resolution, as followeth:

RESOLVED, That the House of Assembly, in the exercise of a duty which, according to the constitution, exclusively devolves upon them, deeming it expedient, towards making due provision for the public service, passed a Bill, levying a Tax of only Eight-pence per gallon on Spirits distilled and sold in the Colony, and to meet the decrease of Impost Duty on imported Spirits—which decrease was in part caused by distillation and sale of Spirits manufactured in the Colony—which the Legislative Council in having rejected, has exercised a power never assumed nor exercised by the British House of Lords. The House of Assembly consider this interception of a Supply to Her Majesty as an impolitic and uncalled for interference on the

part of the Legislative Council, tending directly to embarrass the Government, and to affect in some measure the public credit of the Colony.

And the motion being seconded, and the question put thereon, it was agreed to by the House.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by George Wright, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod.

Mr. Speaker;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker, with the House, went up to attend His Excellency, when His Excellency was pleased, in Her Majesty's name, to assent to the several Bills following, viz:

An Act to consolidate, amend, and reduce into one Act, the several Acts, and parts of Acts, relating to the qualifications and mode of summoning Grand and Petit Jurors.

An Act further to explain and amend an Act passed in the Third year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act to consolidate, amend, and reduce into one Act, the several Acts of the General Assembly relating to Trespasses, and for other purposes therein mentioned.'

An Act to amend an Act passed in the Sixth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act to amend the Law relating to the admission of Barristers, Attorneys and Solicitors, and to regulate the admission of Advocates and Proctors in the Courts of Vice Admiralty and Court of Probate in this Island.'

An Act to continue an Act intituled 'An Act to regulate the floating of Logs, Scantling, Deals, and other kinds of Wood, down the Rivers and lesser Streams in this Island.'

An Act to amend an Act for the appointment of Fish Inspectors, and to continue and extend the provisions of the Act now in force, regulating the size and quality of Fish Barrels and Tierces, and the weight of Fish made up therein.

An Act to alter, and in addition to an Act made and passed in the Tenth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, relating to the laying out and altering of Highways, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

An Act to amend the Act now in force relating to Apprentices, and to repeal a certain Act therein mentioned.

An Act to explain certain parts of the Act to consolidate and amend the Election Laws.

An Act to amend an Act made and passed in the Third Year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled 'An Act to prohibit the exportation of Oysters from this Island, for a limited period.'

An Act to prevent the taking and carrying away of Bouts, Canoes or Flats, without the consent of the Owners thereof, and to repeal an Act formerly passed for that purpose.

An Act to authorize the appointment of Coal Meters, where deemed necessary.

An Act for the Incorporation of the Prince Edward Island Steam Navigation Company.

An Act to authorize the appointment of Commissioners to manage certain Shares and Property in the Prince Edward Island Steam Boat Company, on behalf of the Government of this Colony.

An Act to repeal and amend a certain portion of the Nineteenth Section of an Act relating to Schools, and for the encouragement of Education.

After which, Mr. Speaker spake as followeth:—

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY;

The House of Assembly have voted the supplies necessary for the public service, and for the erection of a Province Building, and have made provision for the maintenance of an Asylum for Insane persons, and other objects of charity, and have also granted a sum to enable this Colony to participate in the benefits of Steam Navigation. Those necessary grants will, no doubt, trench upon the disposable resources of the Colony, and the House of Assembly, to uphold public credit, granted a duty of 8d. per gallon upon spirits distilled in this Island; but I regret to inform your Excellency, this was intercepted by the Council. I beg to present to your Excellency the following Bills:—

An Act to amend the Acts now in force relating to a Fire Engine Company, and accidents by Fire within Charlottetown.

An Act to consolidate and amend the two several Acts now in force relative to Accidents by Fire, and the improvement of Property in Georgetown.

An Act to regulate the Letting of Stalls in Charlottetown Market House, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

An Act to authorize the issue of a Copper Coinage in this Colony, and to prohibit the circulation of base Coppers.

An Act to amend and continue for a limited period the Act intituled 'An Act for the regulation of the Public Wharf of Charlottetown.'

An Act to create a Fund for defraying the expense of providing Medical assistance for sick Emigrants, and of enabling indigent persons of that description to proceed to the place of their destination.

An Act to repeal part of an Act made and passed in the Third year of Her present Majesty's Reign, to authorize the erection of a Building near Charlottetown, as an Asylum for Insane persons, and other objects of Charity, and to provide for the future maintenance of the same, and to substitute other provisions in lieu thereof.

An Act to authorize the appointment of Commissioners to superintend the erection of a Colonial Building in Charlottetown, and to repeal certain parts of an Act therein mentioned.

An Act to authorize the Treasurer of this Island to pay off Treasury Warrants to the amount of Four thousand Pounds, out of the Land Assessment Moneys now in the Treasury.

An Act for the increase of the Revenue of this Island.

An Act for appropriating certain Moneys therein mentioned, for the service of the Year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and forty-two.

To each of which His Excellency was pleased, in the Queen's name, to give his assent.

And then His Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses:

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

The business of the Session having terminated, I take the earliest moment to relieve you from your attendance here; and I avail myself of this opportunity of expressing my best acknowledgments for the great consideration which you have given to my several suggestions, offered upon my first meeting you.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

In thanking you for the Supplies which you have voted for the purposes of Her Majesty's Government in this Colony, I must especially notice the liberality with which you have also voted large sums respectively for the erection of Public Offices, a Lunatic Asylum, and towards the permanent establishment of a Steam Boat, for the use of this Island. This display of your feeling will contribute to the stability of our relations generally, because, in the face of a decreased Revenue, your knowledge of the resources and confidence in the advancing prosperity of the Colony justifies your expenditure.

It was my sincere wish, and I will add expectation, to have concluded my observations upon the proceedings of the Session with expressions of thankfulness and approbation only; but by the Resolutions passed in your House on the 12th inst., and by the Addresses founded thereon, I am imperatively called upon to remark, that after the decided manner in which Her Majesty's Government have spoken upon the subject involved in those Resolutions, it is impossible to imagine that your adoption of them can be otherwise than injurious to this Colony. I feel, however, confident that the Population of this Island will not disregard their true interests, for the visionary propositions and disquietude contained in the question of Escheat.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

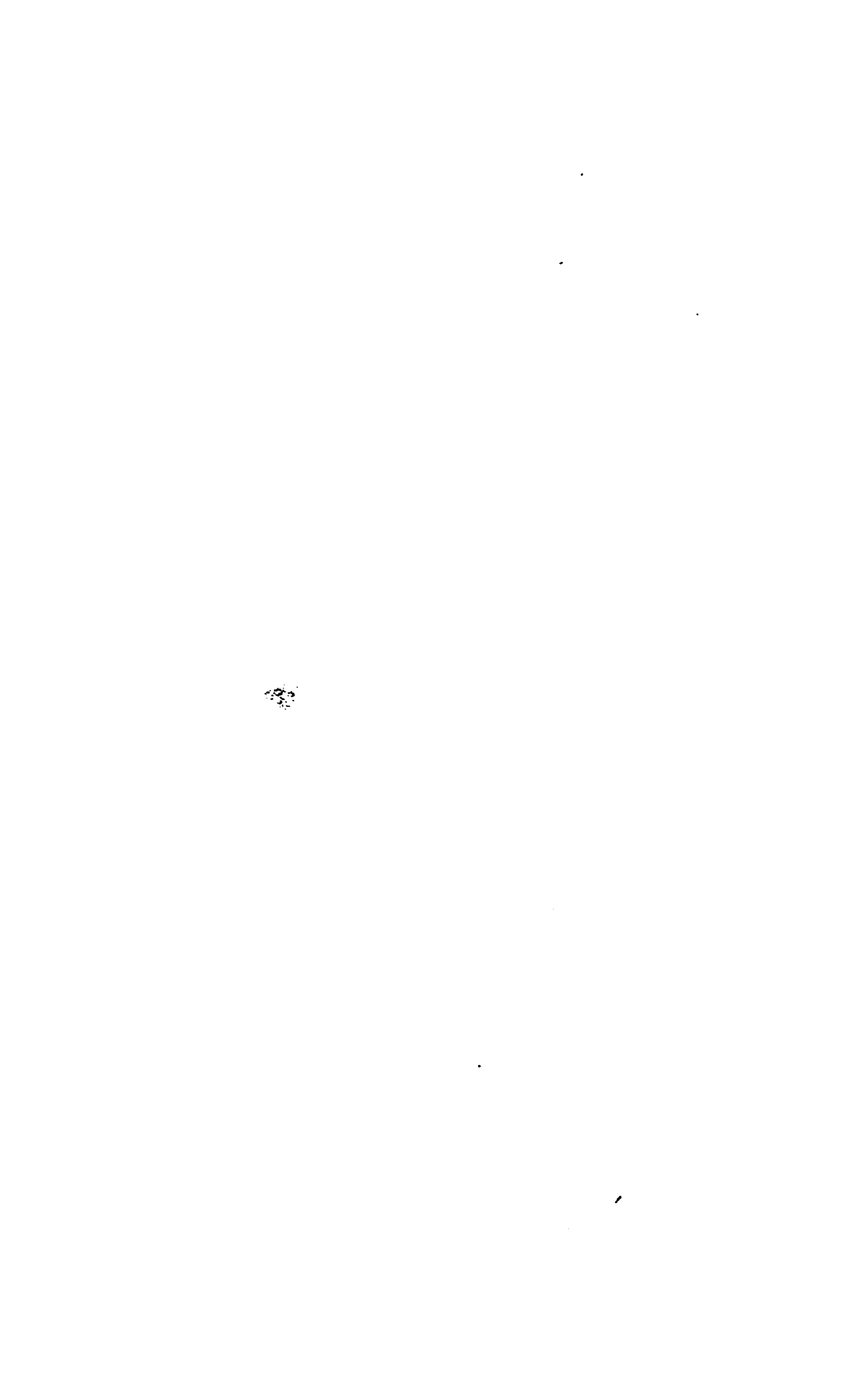

Sir;

I have to call your attention to an irregularity which has been committed in the assumption by Mr. Wright of the Government of Prince Edward Island, on the departure of Sir Charles Fitz Roy, and which, consequently, invalidates all acts done by him, or by his orders, as the Representative of Her Majesty in the Island.

By the terms of the Queen's Commission, the Government of the Colony, during the absence of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or other person specially appointed for the purpose, vests in the senior Military Officer for the time being on the spot. In consequence of the smallness of the Garrison, the Commandant is not a Field Officer, and therefore not of sufficient rank to be allowed to hold temporarily that high office. My predecessor, in deference to the advice of Sir Charles Fitz Roy, proposed to nominate the senior Member of Council, Mr. Wright, by a Warrant under the Sign Manual, as the Administrator of the Government until your arrival. The Warrant, although prepared, was not

sent to the Colony, because it was calculated that Sir Charles Fitz Roy would not quit the Island until relieved by you; and it was considered not worth while to disturb the established order of succession, merely to prevent a slight inconvenience, which it was supposed would not last above a few days. Contrary to that expectation, Sir Charles Fitz Roy did leave Prince Edward Island before your arrival, and having reason to believe that a Royal Warrant for the purpose was on its way to Mr. Wright, placed the Government in his hands. The result was, that Mr. Wright administered the Government for several weeks without any lawful authority.

Under these circumstances, I have to instruct you to submit, in Her Majesty's name, a Bill to the Council and Assembly, for rendering valid the acts of Mr. Wright, and of his subordinate Officers, which, through the irregularity in question, are null and void.

Sir,

I HAVE to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch of the 5th of May last.

I have to acquaint you, in answer, that Her Majesty's Government, having reviewed the whole progress of the discussion regarding the tenure of land, have arrived at the following conclusions:—

First.—That the original terms of settlement were impracticable; and that any escheat at the present day, on the ground of the failure to fulfil such conditions, would be unjust.

Secondly.—That Her Majesty's Government consider it right to state, that the Crown has not at its disposal any funds out of which the Lands could be purchased by the Crown, to be afterwards sold or granted to the tenants.

Thirdly.—That the terms proposed by Mr. G. R. Young,

or terms equivalent to those, seem to have been acceded to by the great majority of Proprietors.

Fourthly.—That under these circumstances, the best course which Her Majesty can recommend is, that the Assembly and Council should turn their attention to the improvement of the resources, and the encouragement of the growing wealth of Prince Edward Island, and leave to the gradual operation of time the settlement of a question which offers no sound footing for direct Legislation.

Lastly.—I have to state, that Her Majesty is not disposed to blame any party for the mode in which this discussion has been prosecuted; but Her Majesty's anxiety for the welfare of the Province makes her desirous to see the termination of a fruitless and irritating contest.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your two Despatches, Nos. 13 and 14, of the 3d and 4th of May, the former containing your report upon the proceedings of the last Session of the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, and the latter enclosing a series of Resolutions of the House of Assembly, relating to the State of the Colony, together with the counter Resolutions of the Legislative Council, and the Copy of a Petition from the House of Assembly to the House of Commons, the original of which has been entrusted to Mr. Hume, to present.

I have to convey to you the expression of my thanks for the copious explanations with which you have furnished me, in respect to the various subjects referred to in the Resolutions of the House of Assembly, and in regard to the Petition to the House of Commons. I do not, however, consider that it is incumbent on me to advert to the different topics comprised in these papers, having, on the principal question, relating to the Lands, sufficiently explained to you, in my Despatch, No. 57, of the 25th inst. what were the views of Her Majesty's Government. I confine myself, therefore, on this occasion, to the remark, that I have no further proposition to make, and that I regret to see such a fruitless prosecution by the Assembly of measures on which the opinion of Her Majesty's Government has been so frequently and decisively expressed.

Sir;

I have received your Despatch, No. 16, of the 4th May last, enclosing, with other documents, an Address to the Queen from the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, complaining of the high price set on Crown Land, and praying that you may be ordered "to use your discretion as to the price and disposal of Crown Land in the Colony to actual settlers."

You will have the goodness to inform the House, that I have had the honor to lay their Address before the

Queen, who was pleased to receive it very graciously, and to command that it should be referred for the consideration of the Commissioners for Colonial Lands and Emigration. Those Commissioners have since made their Report on the subject; and I have now to communicate to you, for the information of the House of Assembly, the conclusions which Her Majesty has been pleased to adopt and sanction.

The Commissioners are of opinion, that there is no sufficient reason for interfering with the discretionary power of regulating the price of Crown Land already vested in the Governor, and that you have acted judiciously in not reducing the price, so long as sales continued to be effected. Fully concurring in the caution conveyed in the Despatch of Lord Glenelg, of the 7th of April, 1836, the Commissioners express a hope that you may not, for the present, consider it desirable to lower the established prices of any description of land, notwithstanding the appearance of indisposition, on the part of the inhabitants, to purchase the waste lands, or to pay the price demanded for it.

Adverting to the very limited extent of the Crown Land, and especially to the growing desire of British capitalists to invest their money in the purchase of Colonial Lands, the Commissioners think that, in a Colony so advantageously situated as Prince Edward Island, prices proved by experience to be not unreasonable, cannot fail to be ultimately realized.

With regard to the terms on which unauthorised occupiers of Crown Land should be allowed to acquire titles to their farms, the Commissioners conceive that, as in other Colonies, this class of persons should, in Prince Edward Island, have a right, in preference to all other persons, of purchasing the lands occupied by them, and should be required to pay no more for them than what would otherwise have been the minimum price at which they would have been offered to public competition. This rule would offer no undue encouragement to a class of men who are serviceable in advancing the settlement of a Colony, while it would secure to them the enjoyment of the fruits of their industry and investment of capital.

Adopting the preceding conclusions of the Commissioners, Her Majesty is pleased to direct that they be made known to the House of Assembly, as comprising the answer which Her Majesty thinks it right to return to their Address.

Sir;

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 18th instant, requesting my opinion as to the most eligible site for placing a Light, so as to render it most efficient for the purpose of enabling Vessels to enter or leave this harbor with safety during the night.

In reply, I beg leave to acquaint your Excellency, that Sea Trout Point is, in my opinion, the most eligible site for erecting a harbour lighthouse. A Light on Sea Trout Point would become a leading mark for the narrows, after Governor's Island had been passed. It might be made a mark for clearing the Spit off Battery Point, by shading the Lights on the North side of the Lantern, and keeping them open to the westward of the shade, until a Vessel had passed the point—she would then have cleared the spit, and should steer for the wharf, where I recommend a red colored lamp being placed. Vessels leaving the harbour, to steer for the White Beacon, on Canso Point, until they opened the lights, when they would be to the westward of the black Buoy. Should a harbor light, not be intended exclusively for the use of Steam Vessels, I consider a Light on Point Prim would be of more general benefit to the trade of Charlottetown. The good anchorage in Hillsborough Bay would induce sailing vessels to anchor there in preference to entering the harbour at night.

In compliance with your Excellency's request, I beg herewith to forward my opinion, respecting the Harbour Light at Charlottetown.

The term "Harbour Light," as mentioned in the Resolution of the Assembly, clearly defines a Light House to point out the "Entrance of a Harbour," and if the literal meaning of their words be taken as applicable to the Harbour of Charlottetown, there can only be one situation where the Light House can be erected, viz: on "Block House Point." But having understood that the House of Assembly proposed that the Light House should be on Governor's Island, I presume its position is intended for any part of the Bay, where it can be of the utmost service to vessels trading to and from the Harbour of Charlottetown. Under this impression, I am decidedly of opinion, that if the Light House should be erected on Point Prim, it will be of more general use to navigation, and to the trade of the Port of Charlottetown and Hillsborough Bay, than if placed either on the Block House or Governor's Island.

In this position it will be an excellent guide to all vessels approaching Hillsborough Bay from the Westward and Eastward, and will be a leading mark to clear the Rifleman shoals. By it, Point Prim itself will always be clearly defined; and the shoal which extends from that Point will be safely rounded in the darkest night. The light so placed, combined with the use of the lead, will be of equal service in guiding vessels clear of the shoals which extend from the Island of St. Peter's, and likewise Governor's Island, as if the Light House was on the Block House Point. By its position on Point Prim, you can make certain of seeing and approaching the Light House before you approach any of the dangers which extend between Point Prim and the Harbour of Charlottetown; and will not only serve as a Light House for

that Harbour, but will be of general utility to all parts of Hillsborough Bay, and the adjacent Coast, and will likewise enable Vessels to take up a secure anchorage under Point Prim in case of bad weather. Whereas, if no Light was on that low and ill defined point, I am of opinion no person would venture to round it in a dark night; and if Vessels would not round it during the night, the Light on Block House Point would be of no use except to those Vessels which have rounded Point Prim before dark.

If the Light House was erected on Governor's Island, it must be obvious its sphere of utility would not be so extensive as if placed on Point Prim.

Sir;

According to your Excellency's wish, signified to me by the Honorable T. H. Haviland, that I should give my opinion as to the most eligible site for a Light House, for the Harbour of Charlottetown, I have the honor to inform your Excellency that I consider "Block House Point" as the preferable position, if the said Light House be intended solely as a harbour Light, to assist Vessels in entering or leaving the Port, and to point out its narrow entrance at night.—Vessels bound for the harbour could run by the lead along the edge of the shoals which extend from St. Peter's Island and from the Western and safest side of the channel, till they approached within the distance of two or three cables of a Light on "Block House Point," and thus be sure of making it, even in the

darkest, rainy, or foggy nights.—It is probable, for I cannot speak positively till we have surveyed the entrance, that the Light House might be so placed that, with the assistance of a Beacon on the next point to the Northward, it might form a mark by day for leading clear of the shoal off "Canso Point" into the harbour, an advantage which might be obtained at night by shading the light in the requisite direction.

If the benefit sought by the proposed Light be not exclusively confined to enabling vessels to enter or leave the harbour with safety at night, but be extended so as to contemplate the general benefit of navigation, I consider, in that case, that "Point Prim" would be the most eligible site: a Light House on that Point would not immediately assist Vessels in entering the harbour, but it would enable them to clear the dangers off the coast for several leagues, both to the Eastward and Westward, as well as the dangerous reef off Point Prim itself, and also to run with safety for the excellent anchorage in Hillsborough Bay, where they could wait for daylight to enter the harbour. But a Light House, to be of any use on Point Prim, must be of large size, with a Light of sufficient power to be clearly seen at the distance of 4 or 5 leagues from the deck of a Vessel.

Having heard that Governor's Island has been named as a site for the proposed Light House, I beg to inform your Excellency, that besides a deficiency of the advantages possessed by the sites which I have recommended, I consider the shoals around that Island to render it very unsuitable for a Light House, making it unsafe for Vessels to approach the Island in rainy or foggy nights, for the purpose of gaining sight of the Light.

Report of the Visitor of District Schools, for the Year ending February 8th, 1842.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

GENTLEMEN;

THE lapse of another year imposes upon me once more the duty of laying before your Board my Annual Report, on the state and advancement of Education in the Colony.

That there is no matter acknowledged to be of greater importance to the human family, than the Education of the young, is evident from the large share of public attention which the subject of elementary or common school education engages at the present moment in all parts of the civilized world. No subject has of late years excited a deeper interest than this, and it is gratifying to know that amid other questions of vital import to the prosperity of the country, the subject of education is not forgotten or neglected among ourselves, but, that on the contrary, much of the public attention is directed, and a considerable share of the public funds applied to this all-important purpose, and that the consideration of the Legislature itself is now bestowed upon its encouragement and extension as a primary object of paramount public importance. To all, and more especially those to whom the Law has committed the control and supervision of our Educational Institutions, the progress which moral and intellectual education, despite several adverse and discouraging influences, continues to make among our population, cannot fail of affording abundant gratification. That imperfect and inadequate views upon the subject of Education should prevail among a population brought together from distant and unconnected places, and with dissimilar habits and modes both of thought and action, however much to be regretted, can be no matter of surprise, and assuredly no ground of reproach. But that such erroneous and inadequate views can be proven to be steadily, if not rapidly giving way, before the advance of more enlightened opinions which bid fair eventually to dissipate the prejudices of by-gone times, that brighter prospects should be opening; the reflection that in short a still greater diffusion of intelligence may be anticipated from what has already been achieved, must be cheering to every one interested in the least degree in the welfare of his country.

It is almost unnecessary for me to say that the happy effects of this more general diffusion of information, are every where visible in the industry, and the enterprising character of the inhabitants, in the enlargement and improvement of their agricultural operations, in the extension of their commerce, and in the general prosperity of the community. Our fellow Colonists appear now to be more generally sensible that the employment of their industry, the reward of their enterprise, and the full development of the important natural advantages with which a bounteous Providence has endowed Prince Edward Island, *must ever be in proportion to the means afforded for the development of their intelligence.*

The best evidence of the growing desire of our population for instruction, and their appreciation of its value will be found in the increasing facilities and means of education. To advert to our District Schools, which are one of the first great means of improving the population, we shall find an increase in their number in a much higher ratio than the increase of population. According to the Returns of the Census taken during the summer of last year, the whole population of the Island will be found to have increased nearly 46 per cent. in eight years. The increase in the number of Schools in the same period is above

63 per cent. In 1833 the number of Schools was 74: at the present moment the total number is 121. But while the Schools have increased in this ratio, the number of children attending them has, in the same period, been more than doubled. In illustration of the preceding remarks, and also for the sake of convenient reference, I beg to subjoin the following table, which gives a view also of the proportion of children receiving daily School instruction to the whole inhabitants.

Of these 104 are Licensed, and five are female Schools.

The total number of children of both sexes then, receiving daily School instruction is 4356, giving an increase over the preceding year of 781. Notwithstanding this progression, about one half of the youth of the Island may still be considered as being left without education. The number of youth under the age of Sixteen on the Island, is 22,766; deducting from this amount those under Six and over Fourteen years of age, the proportion of which to the whole number may be fairly estimated at near a half, we shall have in round numbers 10,000 children within the juvenile educational age fit for attending Schools. Cutting off from this last sum, the number of children receiving private instruction, and who cannot exceed five hundred, there will still remain 9,500 children to supply with instruction, of whom more than one half, as is obvious from the preceding summation, will appear to be left in a condition of complete ignorance. It is however fair to remember that many of those within the educational age, although not at present in actual attendance, have been at School some part of their lives. In a great many instances parents can afford only to send their children to School alternate years or quarters. A degree of instruction, however, so limited, so meagre, is nearly equivalent to none whatever. The number of children who frequent Sunday-schools too is not taken into account in the above computation; for these schools, eminently useful as they are in imparting religious knowledge, cannot be ranked in the list of educational establishments, taking this phrase in its proper meaning; and it would be more incorrect still to comprise their pupils in the total number of children receiving instruction on the Island, seeing that the majority of these pupils are also attendants in daily schools, and would thus be twice enumerated in the same table.

Presuming that the foregoing information relative to our School Statistics will be deemed sufficient for the present, by your Board, I proceed to consider the system of public instruction under which these Schools are established, as well as the process of elementary education pursued in them.

The existing "Act for the encouragement of Education," is based on the principle of voluntary contribution, aided by partial assessment and Legislative Grants. The average amount paid by each School District towards the support of its Teacher, is, as nearly as I can ascertain, about £40 per annum, including Board and Lodging; add to this the Provincial allowance which will average £10 to each school; (the additional £5 to the higher class schools being counterbalanced by the reduced sum paid towards the support of the Acadian and inferior Schools in the poorer Settlements, and which are included in the above enumeration); it will appear that the proportion of the Teacher's salary defrayed by Government is a fifth, or that for every four pounds paid by the Inhabitants, one pound is paid from the public revenue.

The well known defects of our school system, which from time to time I have brought under your notice, still appear in too many parts of the Island, such as insufficient or incommodious school-houses, the deficiency of desks, benches, and other school apparatus, the want of suitable books, and occasionally of duly qualified school-masters, and the scanty remuneration of meritorious teachers.

In accordance with your understood wishes, I have in former Reports reiterated the fact of the existence of these defects, and the indispensable necessity of a reform; and I should be much more happy to

listen to the strictures, or benefit by the suggestions of other more experienced friends of education, than submit for the amendment of the system any project of my own. As it may be expected, however, that I should offer some further remarks upon this subject, as lying within my province, I proceed briefly to observe, in taking up the above defects *seriatim*, that no district should be allowed to participate in the public bounty where the school building is limited to the mere letter of the Act. Although several comfortable and commodious houses have been lately erected, too many are yet very insufficient, and with nothing to entitle them to come within the meaning of the Act, except their containing within four bare walls the prescribed area. It is indispensable to the usefulness of the Master, the improvement of his pupils, and to the health and comfort of both, that proper furniture be provided, convenient seats, desks, &c., and that a proper supply of light, fresh air, fuel, and warmth be attended to; these are all matters to which trustees should give constant and particular attention.

It would be much more beneficial were depots established in remote and destitute parts, for the distribution of those elementary books, for the purchase of which One hundred Pounds was granted to the Secretary of your Board in the Session of 1837. Such books to be approved of by your Board, and to be distributed under the directions of the School-trustees of those districts.

In considering the disadvantages connected with, and arising from the last named defects, I would beg to observe that I need not enlarge upon the importance of an Institution for the preparation of teachers, or the defect of that system by which a teacher must work out a plan of his own, and acquire experience at the cost of the pupils committed to his care. Let there be really one superior school in each county, from which the future teachers of the Island shall be drafted, and where before being licensed to teach, they must spend some time in supplying the deficiencies of their own education, and in familiarizing themselves with the practice of communicating knowledge in the most dexterous manner. Should a well endowed school in each County be considered by some, too extravagant an establishment, it is evident, that one Central Seminary ought at least to be sustained, if the country would rear its own improvers, and possess within itself a source for the constant supply of its own increasing wants. A regulation such as this, in my opinion, would do much to enforce the amendment of the system; it would in the first place improve the quality of general education, and we might then have reason to hope, that on the true mercantile principle, the increase in the value of the article would command a corresponding increase in price, and not the teacher merely, but the country would then reap the benefit.

The necessity there exists of holding out higher encouragement to teachers of character and ability, is so evident as to preclude the necessity of my enforcing it by a single word. The inadequate maintenance, and consequent poverty of teachers, is evidently incompatible with that moral influence which a schoolmaster ought to possess over his pupils, and with the high degree of respect with which he ought to be regarded by their parents.

The life of every system of education, is its provision for a constant supply of good teachers; and experience has proved, that this is the part most difficult to deal with, and upon which the greatest difference of opinion exists; to say more on this head would be superfluous; my views and suggestions on the subject are already before you.

In order to afford all possible encouragement to meritorious teachers, it would be advisable to fix a graduated scale in the emolument of the first class of English instructors, and a competition to take place for the best endowed School. Teachers would thus undergo a special examination for a particular school, and each would obtain a higher or lower School, according as his merits would be found to deserve. A regulation like this, holding out prospects of preferment and reward of merit, could not fail in having a favourable effect upon the efforts of teachers.

It would be premature to expect yet the full developement of a measure such as the present School Act, which has been in existence only since April last. I cannot therefore be prepared to draw any inferences from its brief operation, or report how far its provisions are likely to be attended with salutary effects. Time, however, will soon test its efficacy, its merits or demerits, and prove to what extent it is calculated to meet the increasing exigencies of the country. I may be allowed to state, however, that the operation of the provision relating to assessment to which I have directed particular attention, has not

in any instance which came within my knowledge, been attended with oppressive or injurious effects; on the contrary, I ascribe much of the increase in the schools, and the school attendance of the past year, over any of the preceding, to that regulation which empowers two thirds of the heads of-families in a given district, to assess the residue who might withhold their support. I did not find, however, that the teacher in any instance has reaped the benefit of this provision, by the augmentation of his salary. His salary has remained stationary, while the advantage has accrued to the inhabitants whose individual burdens have been diminished, in proportion to the amount realized to the common fund by the imposition of the assessment. The teacher thus derives from the Statute, no equivalent for the loss to which he has been subjected by the reduction of his small Legislative allowance. In some few instances, he may be compensated by the gratuitous liberality of his subscribers, or in a few cases where the interest of the inhabitants may prompt them to make up the deficiency in order to retain an approved school-master in their service.

In directing your attention also to the course of education or process of instruction, I have to remark, that although a high degree of improvement has been manifest in various of our District Schools, since the period of my last Report—yet I have found since then no such material alteration in their general state—nothing so new or striking in the prevailing mode of instruction pursued—no such marked extension in the range of elementary education in these Schools, as to furnish me with any information, particularly interesting or important to communicate on these heads. On this account, you will not, I venture to presume, consider it necessary for me to enter into further detail at this time, more especially when you will remember the last Report I made to your Board, of the Schools in their several degrees of merit—the minute description I then gave of the state of each School, and the general proficiency of the respective scholars, &c. To furnish you with similar details now, would only be travelling, in a great measure, over the ground explored then. This too, I deem the less necessary, as the Schools opened in the present year do not appear to be of a superior description, nor the attainments of the teachers, in the aggregate, of a higher order than those previously established. Indeed, if I may be allowed an opinion, I would say, that in general they are inferior this year. To this, however, there are some striking exceptions: among which I cannot but allude to the fact that of the six second or higher class Schools now open on the Island, three of their teachers have received licenses of qualification during the past year.*

As there may be something new, however, to communicate on the subject above alluded to, I hope again to report to you, at the expiration of my term of office in May next, on the state and degree of improvement of each particular school. But to return to the consideration of the system and course of education. It is evident that the great object of the law is the education, in the common branches of secular knowledge, of every child in the Island. It is certain, too, that our Schools are not viewed as a means of conveying useful knowledge only, but as powerful auxiliaries in the improvement of morals.

To this end it is wisely provided that none but persons of good moral character and conduct should be entrusted with the education of youth, or at least participate in the public grant. For obvious reasons, however, the law has not introduced any regularly organized system of instruction in the Christian Religion into the Schools, nor has it imposed any obligation on the Masters to teach the doctrines of particular sects. As a consequence, therefore, there has hitherto hardly existed a single school in which the Master has given a properly regulated religious education. Religious instruction in our Schools has gone no further than to impress upon the memory of the children and make them repeat the questions and answers in some Catechism.

Although this part of instruction is not exacted by law of the Schoolmaster, yet I am happy to add, that in several instances, Teachers have acted upon the principle, that moral and religious instruction is the most essential part—the great groundwork of education; and have made it a primary object and duty to impress religious principles upon the youthful and yet uncontaminated mind. This training I found to be more generally practised by those teachers who have immigrated from Britain of late years. Education is indeed of little value unless based upon the Scriptures. All persons, of whatever denomination,

however widely they may differ upon particular doctrinal points, can entertain but one desire to afford, and but one opinion of the necessity of early education, to be extended alike to the rich and the poor. It would therefore be a matter of deep regret should any religious differences arise to impede or frustrate so desirable and beneficial an object. All objections proceeding from a difference of creeds might be obviated or removed perhaps in mixed Schools, by providing that the great general truths of Christianity in which all sects agree, should at least be inculcated. And those great truths, without which all other knowledge would be vanity, should form as necessary a part of the routine of every District School as the Multiplication Table or the Alphabet itself.

With regard to the course and the amount of education afforded, I have to observe that the branches taught in all our Schools are of a simple elementary character. Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Book-keeping, English Grammar; in a few instances Geography and some branches of practical Mathematics, and the rudiments of classical learning in the Schools of Pinette and New London Point only. The progress made towards the establishment of a general uniform system of instruction for the government of our Schools, and the obstacles and embarrassments which have hitherto beset, and still stand opposed to the extension of this desideratum, will be found detailed at such length in my last Report, as to relieve me from the necessity of making further allusion to it here.

In the preceding table I have given the total of the youth of both sexes attending school. Although unable, from the absence of certain documents, at present, to show the relative number of the two receiving instruction; yet it is well known that the female proportion falls far short of the other sex in this respect. The range of female education is lamentably limited among us. Very erroneous and imperfect views on this subject prevail in many quarters. It is unnecessary for me to take up any portion of my limited space in insisting on the great importance of female education, in attempting to prove how powerfully the influence of woman operates on all the relations of life, or in saying that it has been acknowledged in all enlightened communities, in ancient as well as in modern times, that woman should be as prospectively educated with a view to the right discharge of all the duties of social life, as man is with a view to the proper discharge of the duties of operative or commercial life. The mother in the domestic circle has been compared to the schoolmaster in the school. If it be true that the education of most importance is that received in childhood, that education belongs incontestably to woman. How important is it then that woman should be well educated! The most civilized nations of antiquity, the Heathen Greeks and Romans, were more sensible of the high importance of female education than some Christian communities. Why, enquired a Persian Ambassador, "are women held in such high estimation in Lacedemon?" "Because," replied an accomplished queen of that country, "they alone are competent to form men." "What do we want in France," demanded Napoleon, "to insure to our children the best possible education?" "We want, Sire," was the reply, worthy of the celebrated Madame Campan, "we want educated mothers." It is to be hoped that more enlightened views on this subject will make more progress among our population—and also, that in every settlement, where practicable, the inhabitants will avail themselves of the advantage which the Statute holds out by making such provision as will be a sufficient inducement to females to qualify themselves for the important office of teacher.

Hitherto, the benefits of Education have been participated in, either more or less, by some of all classes and conditions of the population, excepting the benighted remnant of that once numerous, but now feeble race—the Aborigines of this Island, who continue to rove along the shores, once their own undisputed possession, in search of a scanty and precarious subsistence, unaided by the lights of Education, and uncheered by its rewards. A solitary exception to this people's neglect of Education is an instance of an Indian boy of 13 years of age, who has been receiving instruction during the last three years, in different settlements around Richmond Bay, according as the migratory habits of the family led them to the vicinity of a School. Notwithstanding this desultory attendance and frequent changing, the proficiency made by this boy—whose name is Martin Francis—proves, that he is not inferior to other children in quickness of apprehension and capacity to learn. He can read the English reader with fluency, is well versed in the principal Rules of Arithmetic, and a specimen of his writing I herewith enclose. There is a peculiar interest attached to this boy, from the circumstance of his devoting his leisure hours

to the instruction of the other children of his tribe. It is difficult to foretell the influence which this youth's precept and example may yet exert over the fortunes of his race. I do not know a more interesting object for the exercise of public generosity, and I trust the benevolent will aid and encourage him in the path of improvement.

To complete my survey of the field of Education, I may be allowed, in connection with the subject, to allude to the recent establishment and multiplication of literary and scientific institutions for the mental improvement of our adult as well as youthful population. Charlottetown has its Mechanics' Institute, Public Libraries and Debating Societies; Georgetown its Mechanics' Institute; Princetown, Cavendish, Darnley, Port Hill, Bedeque and Tryon, their Literary Associations, Subscription Libraries and mutual-instruction Societies or Debating clubs, respectively. The inhabitants of Murray Harbour, Lot 63, have also made some progress towards the establishment of a Public Library—all evidences of a growing taste for intellectual and refined pleasures. The Highland Society, too, anxious to promote this cause, has appropriated a portion of its funds for the education of orphan children, and for the purchase of prizes to be distributed among the most deserving pupils throughout the Schools of the Island.

But while so much has been accomplished, let us not forget how great a moral waste remains yet to be reclaimed—how much remains yet to be done for the improvement and extension of our educational system. Many of the Districts indeed are but poor and recently settled, and it would be in vain to expect in such situations all the institutions and advantages of older communities; but with our available means and opportunities, comparatively limited though they be, much more can be done than has hitherto been effected. Before this can be accomplished, every member of Society must deeply feel his own individual responsibility in the matter, and instead of trusting to the efforts or relying upon the assistance of others, consider himself imperatively bound to use his own exertions, and enlist his utmost influence in the cause. Much may, doubtless, be expected from the Legislature. The head of the Colonial Government has already given a proof of his solicitude to encourage Education, by officially declaring its extension to be a primary public duty. But the principal burden of Education must still be borne by parents. It would require the greater part of the Revenue to educate the whole. Let the words of that sagacious and talented statesman, Lord Brougham, be borne in mind, "that the efforts of the people are still wanting for the purpose of promoting Education, and Parliament will render no substantial assistance, until the people themselves take the matter in hand with energy and spirit, and the determination to do something."

On the other hand, it would be unwise in any Government to rely upon individual efforts. It should provide to its utmost means for the support of Education; because, unlike the desire for the other wants and necessities of life, a demand for Education presupposes a considerable degree of intelligence and knowledge, much higher than can be reasonably expected, except in instances where the parent himself has been well educated.

It is as unnecessary as it would be foreign to the nature of a mere Report, for me to expatiate upon the incalculable value of Education, but it may not perhaps be irrelevant to seize this opportunity of drawing attention to the fact, that we need not travel beyond our own bounds for illustration of the truth of this position. In the existing condition of the people—in the present situation and aspect of the country—we shall find abundant and striking proofs of it. Contrast for a moment the state of Prince Edward Island, at this day, with its condition a little more than a century ago, when the wild Indian only lingered on the banks of its beautiful streams, or glided with his light canoe over the blue waters of the surrounding gulph, which now bears upon its bosom to our shores the stately barque, freighted with the products of every clime, to add to our luxuries or to minister to our comforts.

Instead of the unproductive wilderness, where wild beasts then ranged at pleasure, may now be seen smiling fields, laden with their yearly golden harvests—the forest which the voice of religion now makes vocal with her song of praise, re-echoed then only the war-whoop of the savage. And such changes have been effected by a people superior only by education to the Aboriginal inhabitants.

It is to be trusted, then, the day is not far distant when ignorance shall be held by all to be a greater affliction far than poverty. When all shall appreciate the value of education, and seek it in earnest for their children, when our youthful population shall have a fair start in the race of life with the youth of the sister Provinces, when they shall all inherit that richest legacy, a good education, that wealth which, if they secure, will secure to them that happiness and prosperity at home, and that respect abroad, which will always be accorded to an intelligent and high principled people.

It is also ardently to be hoped, that those whose province it is to ameliorate and extend our educational institutions, will ever be sensible that by promoting this great cause, they will promote the highest interests of their country, and that while knowing our system of Public Instruction to have already produced salutary results—they will doubtless direct their attention to consider the prudent amelioration of which it is susceptible, and make still greater efforts for its extension and support.

THE Committee appointed by the House of Assembly, in April, 1841, to correspond with Joseph Hume, Esq. as Agent for the House of Assembly, submit—

That Mr. Hume presented the Petition forwarded last Spring from the House of Assembly; that he corresponded with the then Secretary for the Colonies, Lord John Russell (a copy of which correspondence is herewith produced); that Mr. Hume having lost his election for the new Parliament, requested Dr. Bowring, M. P., to advocate the prayer of the Petition, to which that gentleman assented, as appears from his letter, also herewith produced; that considerable delay occurred in the printing the Evidence ordered by the House of Assembly, but that the same was ultimately transmitted, in two separate parcels, by two different means of conveyance, and was received by Mr. Hume, as appears by his letter of 3d January, 1842; that the Committee have no doubt that by this time many of the liberal members of the Imperial Parliament are acquainted with the leading facts of the case, and that the Colony will reap that benefit which is to be expected from exposing the abuses by which the Agricultural interest here has so long been depressed.

The House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island having appointed a Special Committee, to transmit to you their Petition to the House of Commons, to intimate that they had trusted you would accept of the situation of Agent for the Colony, and had entered into Resolutions accordingly, and for the payment of £150, this currency, while such Agency should, by the circumstances of the Colony, be requisite, we, as Members of said Committee, have to state, that the Legislative Council having objected to the sum of £150, and having expressed themselves in no measured terms as to the choice, it appeared to the House of Assembly inadvisable to occasion the rejection of the Appropriation Bill, by insisting on the item, trusting that, in future, this difficulty will be

overcome. SIR;

After long delay, the two boxes, containing the Pamphlets, made their appearance a few days ago.

One box was brought by the Postman, with a demand of £69 4s. for postage, which, by representation to the

Post Master General, that it contained printed papers, and had been put into the Post Office by mistake, I got reduced to a fine of One Pound, which I paid, and got the Box and Pamphlets.

The other box was found in the Custom House, with my address on it, and reported to me by an Agent, who, at my request, paid freight and charges, amounting to £1 16s. 6d., which I was obliged to pay before I got possession.

How your Agents have managed the mission of these boxes I know not; but I have seldom heard of a more mismanaged concern than that has been.

Parliament will meet on the 3d of next month, and when I have had time to read the Pamphlets, and have considered your request, I shall either apply to the Colonial Secretary first, and then see if any movement can be made with effect in Parliament.

I mentioned, in my last letter, that if any of your citizens were coming to England, it would be wise to invest two of them, or even one, with power to act for the Petitioners, by representations and explanations to the Ministers and others who may be considered influential, to get your case fairly considered.

SIR;

A GREEABLY to the wishes of the House of Assembly, I have had an audience of Lord Stanley, the Colonial Minister, respecting the present state of your Island, in respect to the tenures of land.

I sent him, 10 days ago, a copy of the printed documents sent to England, and yesterday saw him to ascertain whether he would adopt any measures to quiet possession in your Island, and put an end to the discontent which has so long existed.

I urged the absolute necessity of the Government interfering between the two parties; and I pointed out the occupiers, who had expended time and labour to improve their lands, as best entitled to the favourable consideration of his Lordship; but I asked for justice, so long delayed. I pointed out the conduct of the Government of late years, in confiscating every grant of land in New South Wales and Van Dieman's Land, where the conditions of the grant had not been complied with by the Grantee, and I asked for the same conduct towards Prince Edward Island.

I stated that, on presenting your Petition to the House of Commons, in the past year, I had seen Lord John Russell, who expressed his anxious desire to see the disputes settled, and promised to consider what could be done. My own impressions, at the time, were, that he would have made an effort to quiet your disputes, and I was sorry to learn from Lord Stanley that nothing had been done by Lord John Russell, except to desire the Governor to let matters alone, as he thought both parties were too unreasonable.

Lord Stanley asked me what course I would take with probable chance of succeeding, as any interference, without the power of enforcing a settlement, would only aggravate the existing differences? He stated that a recommendation had once been made by the Colonial Office for a settlement, but it had been scouted by the House of Assembly.

I suggested the appointment of a Commissioner, who should, on the spot, enquire and decide what should be done; but he observed that unless both parties would agree to that reference, it would be useless.

Your Petition of the 24th of April, 1841, does not point out the course to be followed, to meet your views. But the Resolutions of the House of Assembly, of the 25th of April, 1840, point at an evil which under Lord John Russell's own doctrine, in his dispatch to the Governor General of Canada, ought ere this to have been removed.—The constitution of the Executive Government has, in almost all the Colonies, been the chief cause of all the troubles that have arisen from time to time; and if Lord John Russell had followed Lord Durham's advice, you might have had relief ere this to your difficulties.

The Resolutions of the House of Assembly of the 23d April, 1841, so mix up the question of Escheat with that of an Elective Executive Council, that it is difficult to separate them, or to bring them to the notice of the House of Commons, at a time when the difficulties and dissensions of the mother country engross all public attention, and I do not consider there can be any good done until party strife in the House of Commons shall be somewhat settled.

I now address you to ask whether the House of Assembly would agree to any other means of settling the differences respecting the land tenures than that of a Court of Escheat,—and if so, I should be ready to receive any propositions, and to try what could be done with Lord Stanley to bring on a settlement.

Dr. Bowring, with whom I have communicated, will be ready, if I am not in the House, to bring the state of the Island before the House of Commons; but, at present, for the reasons I have stated, it would be premature.

Lord Stanley will write to the new Governor, to consider and report whether any, and what, measures could be adopted, with the sanction of both parties; and I advise you to try what you can induce him to recommend to the Colonial Office.

AS Lord Stanley informed me that the tax of 4s. currency, per 100 acres of Wild Land, together with 2s. per 100 acres on all lands, had been levied in Prince Edward Island, although your statement induced me to think otherwise, I addressed to his Lordship (of which I enclose a copy) a letter calling his attention to the difference of the statement, and I now enclose you the answer.

At this time the attention of the Legislature is directed to the *Corn Laws*, and to the distress generally amongst the artizans in the country, and Colonial interests obtain little attention. I hope, however, soon to hear from you whether Lord Stanley has sent out any instructions to your Governor, as he promised; and I remain,

MY LORD;

In the conversation respecting Prince Edward Island, on the 20th, you stated that Lord Goderich had suggested a tax of 4s. per 100 acres on Wild Land, which you considered as some relief to the Colony.

I request your attention to Page 5 of the written documents I sent to you, where it is stated, that the House of Assembly had, on the advice of Lord Goderich, passed an Act imposing that tax; but that the same was rejected by the King in Council.

If therefore you are under a mistake, in respect to the existence of that tax, you may be induced to consider whether a Court of Escheat, asked for by the House of Assembly in 1802, agreeably to the orders of the Colonial Minister at that time, may not now be granted.

SIR;

I have been directed by Lord Stanley to acknowledge the receipt of your letter, of the 22d ult. and to inform you, in reply, that though the Act passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, in 1827, for the imposition of a tax of 4s. currency, per 100 acres of Wild Land, together with a tax of 2s. currency, per 100 acres, on *all Lands*, was for various reasons, delayed many years in coming into operation, yet the question was finally referred to Lord Durham, who, on the 8th of October, 1838, expressed a strong opinion that the Act ought to be confirmed, which accordingly was done by an Order of the Queen in Council, dated 12th December following.

The statement therefore made in the Appendix to Lord Durham's Report, which you have quoted, that the Act was disallowed, is not, as you will perceive, correct in point of fact.

Second Report of the Special Committee appointed by the House of Assembly to ascertain the value of the Property enumerated in the Census Returns—the Prices paid by those who claim to be Proprietors of the Townships, &c.

YOUR Committee respectfully submit, that having caused search to be made in the Registry, in regard to the prices paid by those who bought up the claims of the Grantees to the Townships of this Island, they have obtained a statement thereof;—that many of the Townships are not comprehended in said statement, as no Grants are upon record of the same; that for 160,000 acres, no consideration appears to have been given—at least, none is stated in the Conveyance; that for 193,332 acres, purchased by the Earl of Selkirk at different times, since 1802, the amount of consideration moneys is £3,005;—that for 96,333 acres, purchased by the late Governor Fanning, and all purchased after his having entered on his office, and chiefly, if not all, purchased during his administration, and about the years when the House of Assembly were praying the Crown to direct the greater part of the Townships to be escheated, the amount of consideration moneys appears to have been £623—one Township of 28,000 acres having been bought for Nine Pounds!—That in regard to the land claimed by the late John Cambridge, only 51,200 Acres appear on the Record, and the amount of consideration moneys for these appears to have been £1,198. Thus, three of those who have made the largest claims on the right of the soil of the Island, appear to have given for these claims (which at the time they bought them were all liable to forfeiture) at the rate of threepence and a fraction of a penny per acre, and at the same time, and immediately thereafter, to have exacted from every individual who had settled on such land, a rent of one shilling per acre; and in the case of the Earl of Selkirk, to have induced hundreds to transport themselves and their families, at their own expense, from Scotland to this Island, here to commence clearing away the woods, struggling with the difficulties incident to want of roads, mills, markets, churches and schools; undergoing the ri-

gour of the winters of this climate, when ill prepared to contend therewith, and for the most part unable to buy, and obliged to lease from him the land they had to clear, paying him every year a rent, per acre, more than equivalent to three times the price he paid per acre, and still remaining, in many instances, in arrears of rent, and frequently distrained on and ejected.

Your Committee have had before them the evidence of the late Mr. Uniacke, Attorney General of Nova Scotia, and of Colonel Cockburn, both given in 1826, before a Committee of the House of Commons [see Uniacke questions, 345 to 349, and Cockburn questions, 1483 to 1493], and think it useful to refer to their answers, in regard to the exacting rent for wild land.

Your Committee have further to remark, that though no Grants of several Townships are recorded, yet these Townships are claimed under recorded Conveyances from individuals designated in such Conveyance as Assigns of the original grantees, and sometimes no ways referring to such grantees. Further, that many individuals who had settled on Townships which, at the time of their settling, and for many years thereafter, were unclaimed, on such claimant appearing, have been terrified, by the expense of resisting such claim at law, into a promise to pay rent; and even though such promise was only verbal, or without promising even, if they paid only one year's rent, they are by such promise or payment for ever precluded from resisting payment, even though such claimant will not exhibit a single document in support of his claim.

Your Committee have further to remark, that as a suit for £20, if in regard to land, can be transferred to Britain, it is in most instances utterly impossible for the majority of settlers in this Colony to contend with a claimant resident in Britain, or having regular correspondence therewith. One particular instance may be cited by the Committee, that of *Sullivan v. Ramsay*. The late S. Sullivan bought the claims to several Townships. Ramsay was settled thereon for years, paying rent to the agents of S. Sullivan, who, it is believed, never visited the Island, and died in England. Laurence Sulivan

claims to be his heir, and appoints agents—said Laurence never having been on the Island. Ramsay refused to pay till Laurence Sullivan should prove himself to be the heir of Stephen. It was found necessary, to prove this, to get evidence from the East Indies, and this being produced, judgment was given against Ramsay, including all the expenses, even the expense of procuring such proof from the East Indies.

A law to require claimants of Townships to record, in the Registry of this Island, their title to such Townships, was disallowed by the Privy Council.

All which is respectfully submitted by the Committee.

Third Report of the Special Committee appointed by the House of Assembly to value the Property enumerated in the Census, &c.

Your Committee respectfully submit, that in that part

of the First Report which alludes to the Road Compensation Act of 1830, they omitted to state, that in 1790, an Act was passed, authorizing Magistrates to levy an Assessment in aid of Roads and Bridges, on Townships whereon there were not resident ten persons liable to statute labour; and that your Committee believe assessments were levied in virtue thereof on two Townships—in one instance of £11 to £15 on the Township—and that the whole sums levied under this act fell short of One hundred Pounds. The present Treasurer has not been able to find the amounts stated in any of the books handed over to him, on his entering on the office. This would make the total sum paid by the Proprietary claimants for *repairing* roads through wilderness land, as well as for opening such roads, something short of Four hundred and eighty-eight Pounds, Currency.
