THE House having, by several Proclamations | Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative hereto annexed, been prorogued until this day, then to meet for the dispatch of business;

And being met—

A Message from His Excellency the Licutenant Governor, by Henry Palmer, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod:

Mr. Speaker;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House at the Bar of the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber;

And being returned—

Mr. Speaker reported, that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the Council Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of the Legislature, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy, and which was read by the Clerk, and is as follows:—

Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

I have much pleasure in again meeting you for the discharge of the important duties that devolve upon us.

It affords me much satisfaction to be enabled to inform you of the favourable determination of Her Majesty's Government with reference to the suggestion contained in your joint Address of last Session to the Queen, on the subject of a guarantee by Her Majesty's Government for such a Loan as might be sufficient for the purchase of Township Lands in this Island, with a view to the more speedy and general conversion of Leaseholds into Freehold tenures.

The Despatches from the Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, on this subject, shall be communicated to you, and a measure will be submitted for your consideration, in order to secure to the industrious inhabitants of this Island the benefits which have been thus placed within your reach by the paternal solicitude of Her Majesty's Government.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

The condition of the Revenue is satisfactory, and indicates general prosperity among the consuming population of the Island.

The Accounts for the past year, and the Estimates for the current year, shall be laid before you; and I rely on your

readiness to grant such Supplies as may be necessary for the a portion of the community is employed in agricultural purefficient support of the public service.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

The establishment of Municipalities throughout the Island appears to be highly desirable, in order that the principles of local self-government should receive a more extended application, by affording to the people the exercise of a greater degree of power over their own local affairs.

A measure upon this subject will be submitted to you; and I solicit your earnest attention to the establishment of such a form of local Government as may ensure satisfaction to the people; whilst it preserves inviolate the prerogative of the Crown, and maintains the due administration of the Law.

In connection with this subject, it is very desirable that the system under which the public moneys have hitherto been applied to the construction and repair of roads, bridges, and all other public works, should undergo a careful revision; and I would suggest for your consideration the expediency of establishing a Board of Works, which should comprise, besides certain members of the Government, a competent Civil Engineer.

A Board, so constituted, would afford the requisite responsibility, efficiency and economy in the execution of all public works, and greatly tend to promote the interests of the community in this important branch of the public service.

As those laws will shortly expire which have given to this Colony a well merited pre-eminence in securing to the rising generation the blessings of a Free Elucation, it will be for you to consider the expediency of continuing or re-enacting them.

I am fully sensible of the fact, that the educational establishment of this Island involves a very heavy charge upon its revenue, which is small in comparison to those of the sister Provinces; a charge which is larger than is incurred for a similar purpose in older, wealthier and more populous communities; and amounting in all to one-third of the public income. But keeping in view the great advantages that accrue from such an expenditure-advantages which are felt by the present generation, but which will be still more sensibly apparent to future ones,—I strongly incline to the opinion, that the public money could not be better applied than in fostering that free system of public instruction which has hitherto given such general satisfaction to the people of this Colony, and which has been referred to in terms of commendation by our fellow subjects in other portions of Her Majesty's dominions.

The interests of agriculture are entitled to the special care

suits; and I am not aware of any mode by which those interests can be so effectually promoted as by affording liberal encouragement to such institutions as the Royal Agricultural Society, whose exertions have hitherto been attended with very beneficial results.

I am again under the necessity of calling your attention to the subject of Steam Communication with the neighbouring Provinces. Arrangements of a more permanent character than have yet been effected are indispensible for placing that important communication on a satisfactory footing, and I earnestly recommend the subject to your consideration.

In all the measures which you may adopt for the promotion of the interests of the Island, and the happiness and contentment of the people, you may rely on my zealous cooperation; and I humbly hope that the Almighty may render our endeavours efficacious for the public good.

Your Committee cannot recommend the division of the County, unless the petitioners are prepared to pay the expenses necessarily attendant upon it.

> With reference to the petition of divers inhabitants of Caseumpce, also referred to your Committee, praying that there may be erected at Cascumpee a house for the use of the Small Debt Commissioners of that District-your Committee are of opinion that a suitable building ought to be erected where prayed for, provided a site can be procured.

> The Hon. the Colonial Treasurer, from the Committee appointed last Session to examine and report this Session, on a Petition of the inhabitants of Kildare, and others, presented to the House the report of the said Committee, which report being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

> Your Committee appointed, during the last Session of the Legislature, to report on a petition of the inhabitants of Kildare, praying that a sum of money in aid of subscriptions, be granted to cut a channel to improve the navigation of Kildare River-have to state, that there is a Sand-bar at the entrance of the River, which is nearly dry at low water, and they are of opinion that it would be impossible to open a channel through it, which would not be again filled up by the running sand. They are not aware that any similar work has been attempted on the coasts of this Island, with the exception of that undertaken by the Messrs. Haywood of Tignish, who opened a channel at Tignish Run, for the purpose of taking through a new vessel, immediately after which, the channel filled up. Your Committee cannot, therefore, recommend

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

We, Her Majesty's faithful subjects, the House of Assembly of Prince Elward Island, respectfully thank Your Excellency for the Speech with which you have been pleased to open the present Session.

It is with pleasure we receive the information that Her Majesty's Government have come to the determination to aid our endeavours to convert the Leasehold into Freehold tenures, by such means as cannot fail to afford general satisfaction. The sooner that desirable object can be effected, the more it will encourage the Tenants to reclaim their Lands and improve their homesteads, which is a sure sign of a prosperous country and a contented people. When the Despatches on this subject shall be laid before us, as well as the measures which Your Excellency's Government have in contemplation, in order to secure to the inhabitants the fruits of their labour and industry, they shall receive from us the most deliberate consideration; and we trust it will be found that we duly appreciate the paternal solicitude of Her Majesty's Government, in connection with so important a matter.

It is gratifying to learn that the Revenue is in a satisfactory condition, as that is a sure indication of the general prosperity of the Colony.

Your Excellency may rely upon our giving a careful attention to the Accounts for the past year, as well as to the Estimates for the current one; and we will cheerfully make adequate provision for the maintenance of the public service.

We are well aware that the establishment of Municipalities throughout the Island would be an extension of the principles of self-government, and would afford to the people among whom they may be established, greater power over their own local affairs. Any measure which may be therefore submitted to us on this subject, will receive the fullest consideration.

We fully concur with Your Excellency in opinion that the system under which the public moneys are applied for the construction and repair of Roads, Bridges, and other public works, should undergo a careful revision; and the suggestion which Your Excellency has been pleased to offer, with reference to the establishment of a Board of Works, in order to remedy present defects, will be attentively considered. Should such a Board be constituted, and regulated with efficiency and economy, we have no doubt that it would greatly tend to promote the interests of the community.

We shall duly consider the expediency of re-enacting or continuing the Laws which have given to this Colony such an enviable pre-eninence, by securing to its inhabitants the blessings of a free education. We share with Your Excellency in the knowledge of the fact, that the support of our educational establishment involves a heavy charge upon our Revenue—a charge far heavier than that which falls to other communities, circumstanced as we are with regard to revenue, individual wealth and population; but we firmly believe that considerations, with regard to the pecuniary outlay of such an establishment, should never deter us from applying the public money, under wise and judicious regulations, in order to continue that free system of public instruction which has hitherto given such general satisfaction to the people of this Colony, and the effects of which will not only be apparent in our own time, but in after generations.

We have at all times given special care and attention to the interests of agriculture, because we fiel that, in a country where a large portion of the community is employed in agricultural pursuits, such interests imperatively demand the fostering care of the Legislature; and we are quite sensible that the well directed exertions of such institutions as the Royal Agricultural Society have materially tended to promote the prosperity of an agricultural population.

The subject of Steam Communication with the neighbouring Provinces has for many years engaged the attention of the House of Assembly; and so sensible are we of its importance, that we desire to assure Your Excellency of our readiness to assist in making arrangements of a more permanent character than have yet been effected, towards placing that communication on a satisfactory footing.

We beg to thank Your Excellency for the promise of your zealous co-operation in carrying out such measures as may tend to promote the happiness and contentment of the people of this Island; and we humbly pray that an all wise Providence may so direct our united exertions as to accelerate the advancement of the important interests committed to our charge.

And the said Address being again read,

The Hon. Mr. Haviland moved to amend the report, by striking out the second paragraph of the said Address, and inscrting the following in lieu thereof.

In transmitting, for the information of the House of Assembly, the accompanying Despatches regarding alterations in the Colonial Tariffs, rendered necessary by the Reciprocity Treaty with the United States, the Lieutenant Governor invites the attentive consideration of the House of Assembly to this subject, which he trusts will lead to the adoption of such measures as may be necessary for the reconciliation of the Tariff of this Island with the Treaty obligations of the Home Government, and the extension to the Trade of the United Kingdom, of the privileges enjoyed by the neighbouring Colonies and the United States.

After careful consideration of the probable consequences of a compliance with the suggestions of Her Majesty's Government, in regard to the proposed alterations, the Lieutenant Governor fully concurs in the opinion expressed by the Secretary of State, that no practical inconvenience to this Colony is likely to arise from their adoption.

Your Committee appointed last Session to visit the harbour of St. Peter's, and enquire into the expediency of expending a sum of money in deepening the entrance to that harbour, so that vessels of various tonnage might secure at any time a safe anchorage in a spacious harbour, and afford very great facilities to a large portion of the inhabitants of this Island, in extending their commercial transactions, have to report—

That in the month of October last your Committee visited the harbour of St. Peter's, and attended by a considerable number of the most intelligent and experienced inhabitants living in that part of the country, repaired to the entrance of the harbour, and the weather being favourable, were enabled to make full enquiries into the subject, the result of which they respectfully submit.

The bar which stretches across the harbour of St. Peter's, at the entrance to it, in nearly a direct line, shifts and changes its position with violent storms, it being much exposed to the action of the sea. At low tide the depth of water on this bar is about seven feet,—at high tide about ten, shewing a risc of only three feet. To increase the body of water on this bar, so as to afford an easy egress and ingress to vessels at all seasons, would be a work of great importance, not only to the inhabitants of St. Peter's Bay, but to the people of the Colony generally, and to those of King's County particularly, as vessels from other ports would then more frequently resort there than they can at present. The only method for effecting this desirable end, which appears practicable to your Committee, and which meets with the approbation of experienced

persons residing in that part of the country, is to construct a breastwork or embankment on the eastern side of the harbour's mouth. A breastwork that would withstand storms, and secure a sufficient depth of water at all times, would, it is supposed, cost about a thousand pounds. The people who are immediately interested in this undertaking are willing to subscribe liberally towards the cost of it; and your Committee are of opinion that the project is such as to warrant the expenditure of a considerable grant of the public money, in order to test the practicability of removing the impediment which now exists to the entrange of large vessels. The harbour is a magnificent and capacious one, averaging about one mile in breadth, and being nine miles in length, affording in almost every part, excellent anchorage; and if its wide expanse of water could be rendered a secure and easy haven, subservient to the purposes of an extended trade, no portion of the public money could be more profitably applied than that which would be expended on the object in view.

Your Committee have therefore to recommend that there be granted and placed at the disposal of the Government the sum of four hundred pounds, to be expended on the following conditions:—That the inhabitants residing in the vicinity of St. Peter's Bay shall subscribe the sum of two hundred pounds, and that the Government, before expending any portion of the money, shall cause a survey of the intended work to be made by a competent engineer, part of whose duty it will be to give an estimate of the probable cost of completing the work; and should that cost be found not to exceed one thousand pounds, or thereabouts, that the work be given out to competition, as soon as convenient after the receipt of the engineer's report—the said work to be under the superintendence of a competent person, to be appointed for that purpose.

That there be a semi-weekly conveyance of Mails to Orwell, Belfast and Pinette, provided the expense of such, do not exceed the sum of fifteen pounds, as set forth by the petitioners in their application.

That a Post Office be established at Crapaud, Township No. 29.

That a Post Office be established at or near the Chapel at Egmont Bay, as being the most convenient and central station in that District.

That a Post Office be established at or near Sturgeon Bridge, on Township No. 61, there being no Post Office within a distance of eight miles, and as the Mail Courier passess that way to Murray Harbor once a week, provided no additional expense be incurred for the carriage of the Mails.

That a Post Office be established near Plasted's Mills, Township No. 14, so soon as the Mail Courier shall travel that route, and carry a Mail thither, without any additional charge.

Your Committee cannot recommend the conveyance of a semi-weekly Mail to Bedeque, via Tryon, as the additional expense of a Courier will amount to at least twenty shillings per week.

Your Committee cannot recommend the establishment of a Post Office at Grand Tracadic, as the petitioners are not decided where to establish an office.

Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of the Petition of John Macdonald, Postmaster at Souris, for an increase of salary, as the granting of this application would open a way for a general application from other Postmasters.

With reference to the Petition of Josiah Grant, Postmaster, Cascumpec, your Committee cannot recommend any further remuneration for his services as such.

Your Committee recommend that the sum of seven pounds be paid to John Macintosh, Western Mail Carrier, for additional expense and labour in carrying the said Mails, during the past year.

Your Committee have to observe, that the increased and still increasing duties of the Post Office department render the providing of additional assistance a matter of justice to the public service and to the Postmaster General and his present Assistant.

There are at present upwards of sixty Post Offices established in this Island, and applications for new ones are being constantly made, which will involve additional labour and responsibility on the part of the present officers in the General Post Office, as would appear from the communication of the Postmaster General to the Lieutenant Governor, as sent down

to this House by His Excellency; and in view of these considerations, your Committee recommend the appointment of a Clerk, in addition to the present aid, and that his salary be provided for by the House of Assembly.

RESOLVED, That when the House is in Committee of Supply, there be appropriated a sum of one hundred pounds as a salary for an additional Assistant in the Post Office; and also that the sum of thirty pounds be voted in addition to the salary of the present Assistant.

- 7. That a Commission be appointed to appraise what damages, if any, will accrue to the parties through whose lands a Road would pass from the Main Road to Grand River, at Poplar Point.

Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of the Petition of Patrick Connick, praying a grant of the sum of three pounds three shillings and nine-pence, for teaching twenty Saturdays, last year, more than he need have done.

Nor can they recommend the Petition of Josiah McLeod, praying for some remuneration for teaching six months at St. Eleanor's, for the year 1855.

Your Committee have had under their consideration two Petitions—one of Francis Buote, of Township No. 2, and the other of Thomas Mansfield—both praying for retiring allowances. Your Committee are not aware of any provision being made for retiring allowances to Teachers, and therefore they cannot recommend the prayer of the said Petitions.

Your Committee would recommend, that in future no Petition praying for an allowance to unlicensed Teachers be entertained by the House, unless it shall clearly appear that the inhabitants petitioning could not obtain a Teacher qualified according to law; and every such Teacher shall, within twenty days, notify his engagement, and furnish a copy of his agreement with the inhabitants, to the Board of Education.

FINE Hon. Mr. Wightman, from the Special Committee to whom were referred the Message and Correspondence transmitted by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, on the 16th day of March last, on the subject of the better lighting of the coasts of this Island, and with reference to Cape Race Light, together with other references, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the report of the said Committee, which report being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the Merchants' Shipping Act amendment Act of 1855, which House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee, to whom were referred certain Despatches relating to Lighthouses, have to report—that it appears, from these documents, the British Government have built a Lighthouse on Cape Race, the cost of erecting which will be about £5,160 sterling, and the cost of its maintenance somewhat over £400 sterling, per annum; and assuming that the cost of its erection is to be paid off in five years, it will be necessary to raise a sum of about £1,500 sterling a year, to be reduced so soon as the cost of erection is paid off. It is proposed to raise these sums under the provisions of the empowers Her Majesty, by Order in Council, to impose tolls

on British shipping, in respect of any new Lighthouse which may be required, on or near the coast of any British possession, by or with the consent of the Legislative authority of such place. It is suggested that such tolls should be collected at the port of clearance, in the United Kingdom, or in the Colonies, and then remitted to England, or it may be collected entirely in the United Kingdom, in the majority of cases.

It appears, from Despatch No. 42, of the 13th November, 1856, from the Right Hon. H. Labouchere to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that the Law Officers of the Crown, in England, have pronounced their opinion, that under the above Act, the consent of the several Colonial Legislatures to the levying of these tolls must be obtained, before promulgation by Her Majesty, of an Order in Council imposing them, can legally take place; and an expression of assent is requested on the part of the Legislature of this Colony, either by means of an Addsess to the Crown or by Legislative enactment.

Your Committee are of opinion, that great advantage will accrue to the shipping of Prince Edward Island, passing between it and Great Britain or Newfoundhand, from the erection of the said Lighthouse on Cape Race; they have, therefore, no hesitation in recommending that the assent of the Legislature to the promulgation of the Order in Council, imposing the above toll, at the rate of one-sixteenth of a penny per ton, should be at once notified by an Address to Her Majesty, on the subject; and it appears to them that this course will meet all the exigencies of the case, at the present moment, and render unnecessary any Legislative enactment on the subject, until some general arrangement is made, providing for Lighthouses on the coasts of all the Colonies, and establishing a general and equal system of contribution to that object, by the Colonies and the Mother Country.

There are seldom, if ever, any vessels navigating from this Island, upon Transatlantic voyages, to Ports not in the United Kingdom; and the toll upon ships engaged in the trade between this Island and Newfoundland can, at all events, be temporarily collected in Newfoundland, on their arrival there, under the local laws on the subject.

It appears that no communications have been received from the Governments of the neighbouring Colonies, as to their willingness to contribute to the creetion and maintenance of Lighthouses on the North Cape and East Point of this Island; but your Committee are of opinion that the subject should not be lost sight of, as it daily becomes of greater importance, from the constant increase of shipping.

Your Committee have to state, that by far the greater number of ships recently lost on the Northern and Eastern coasts of this Island, belonged to Great Britain, the neighbouring Colonies and the United States of America, which

shews that such Countries have an equal, if not a greater, interest than ourselves in maintaining Lights at East Point and North Cape, and should, in the opinion of your Committee, contribute to their erection and maintenance.

Your Committee having also had under their consideration certain Petitions relating to the erection of Lighthouses and to other matters, further submit—that with reference to the Petition of inhabitants of Princetown Royalty and vicinity, praying for the erection of a more sufficient Lighthouse at Fish Island, your Committee have been informed that it is the intention of the Government, as early as practicable, to make some alteration in the Lighthouse at that station.

That with reference to the Petition praying for the ercetion of a Lighthouse at the North Cape, the subject of erecting Lighthouses on the North Cape and East Point of this Island is now under the consideration of the Government.

That with respect to the Petition of Thomas Robson, of Sackville, New Brunswick, about erecting Fog-bells on Cape Tormentine, in that Province, and on Cape Traverse, in this Island, your Committee cannot recommend their erection at the public expense.

Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, in Colonial Parliament convened, have had under their consideration, during the present Session, a certain Despatch, addressed to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of this Island by Your Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, dated the 23d day of July, 1856, on the subject of the Lighthouse built at Cape Race, in Newfoundland; and also a copy of a letter from the Board of Trade, dated 9th July, 1856, addressed to H. Merivale, Esqr., enclosing the draft of an Order in Council imposing a toll on ships that will derive benefit therefrom.

From the above Communications, it appears that Your Majesty's Imperial Government have built a Lighthouse on Cape Race, the cost of erecting which will be about £5.160 sterling, and of its maintenance somewhat over £400 sterling per annum; and assuming that the cost of its erection is to be paid off in five years, it will be necessary to raise a sum of about £1,500 sterling a year, to be reduced so soon as the cost of erection is paid off. It is proposed to raise these sums under the provisions of the Merchants' Shipping Act Amendment Act of 1855, which empowers Your Majesty, by Order in Council, to impose tolls on British Shipping, in respect of any new Lighthouses which may be required on or near the coast of any British possession, by or with the carry the said Message.

consent of the Legislative authority of such place. It is suggested that such tolls should be collected at the Port of clearance in the United Kingdom or in the Colonies, and then remitted to England, or they may be collected entirely in the United Kingdom, in the majority of cases.

It also appears, from Despatch No. 42, of the 13th November, 1856, addressed to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of this Island by Your Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, that the Law Officers of the Crown, in England, have pronounced their opinion, that under the above Act, the consent of the several Colonial Legislatures to the levying of these tolls must be obtained, before promulgation by Her Majesty, of an Order in Council imposing them, can legally take place; and an expression of assent is requested on the part of the Legislature of this Colony, either by means of an Address to Your Majesty or by Legislative enactment.

Being of opinion that great advantage will accrue to the shipping of Prince Edward Island, passing between it and Great Britain and Newfoundland, from the Lighthouse on Cape Race, we hereby cheerfully and respectfully notify to Your Majesty our assent to the promulgation of an Order in Council, imposing a toll for the purpose of maintaining and erecting the Lighthouse in question, at the rate of onesixteenth of a penny per ton, to be reduced at the end of five years, as mentioned in the Despatches and Documents hereinbefore referred to.

Your Committee, in the above Account of Public Lands, have charged against those Lands only the sum which has been paid, viz., £18,000, there being still a balance of £6,000 retained, partly to meet a deficiency in the quantity of Land sold by the vendors of about 11,000 acres, as stated by the Commissioner of Public Lands, and partly on account of some difference between the vendors and the Government, as to the mode of fulfilling the terms of agreement.

The Committee remark, that although the Revenue for the past year is £1,418 5s. 41d. less than that of the previous year, yet the deficiency on the Impost duty is but £20 17s. 61d., while they understand that £730 of Impost duty has been paid since 1st January at Three Rivers, on goods for this winter's consumption, and which amount does not appear in the Accounts reported on. Mr. Whelan, from the Special Committee to whom was referred the Petition of John McInnis and other inhabitants of north side St. Peter's Bay, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee, which Report being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee to whom was referred the Petition of John McInnis, Angus Gillis and others, St. Peter's Bay, (north) praying the House to consider their want of the means of Education, and to afford them relief, submit-that from the enquiries instituted by your Committee, it appears that in that section of country skirting the North Shore of St. Peter's Bay, from Greenwich farms, on the one hand, to the vicinity of the North Shore, Lot No. 42, on the other, by way of the Chapel, a distance of about seven miles in line or extent, there are two School-houses established under the School Act, which are more than four miles apart,—about mid-way between which the Petitioners are settled. It also appears that one of these Schools, which formerly accommodated all the inhabitants north of the Bay, including the petitioners, was removed from its former central site, so as to bring within its sphere the inhabitants of Greenwich, from which it is still distant more than one mile and a half; this alteration was effected by the authority of the Board of Education, on the recommendation of Commissioners appointed

by them. The Petitioners feeling aggrieved by this arrangement, have made repeated applications to the Board of Education and to the Executive, as well as by Petition to the House of Assembly, last Session, for a separate School, or otherwise, for such re-adjustment of the existing arrangement and boundaries as will bring them within an easy distance of a School. A second Commission was then issued to report upon their case, which resulted in a recommendation to the proper authorities to cause a removal of the Eastern School to a site nearer to the Petitioners; but which recommendation has not hitherto been sanctioned. Your Committee have not the means of ascertaining whether such proposed removal, while it would doubtless supply the want complained of, would not be, on the other hand, detrimental to those settlers at the Eastern extremity of this District, by removing their School too far from them. Another alternative presents itself in the case, viz: the removal of the School-house near the Head of the Bay further Eastward, so as to leave space enough for an intermediate School; but the report of the Commission last named does not afford information sufficient to guide your Committee in arriving at a just opinion or conclusion in reference thereto, as they cannot say to what degree such removal would interfere with the counterminous School boundaries along the Capes.

Another arrangement has been suggested, viz: to leave the present Schools undisturbed, and to grant to the Petitioners an intermediate one; but your Committee find conflicting opinions existing between the Commissioners and the Petitioners—the latter asserting that their children are sufficiently numerous to form an independent School, and the former reporting the contrary. Under these circumstances, your Committee can only conclude that the Petitioners, as at present situated, are in a great measure shut out from the benefits of Education for their children, and they would therefore recommend the propriety of the Government authorising such a further and fuller enquiry as shall conclusively determine whether it would better promote the interests of all concerned to open an additional School, or to remove in either direction the School near the Head of the Bay, and to carry out such determination, under the provisions of the Act, accordingly.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

Most Gracious Sovereign;

Your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, in Colonial Parliament assembled, have had their attention drawn to a Treaty concluded between Your Majesty and His Majesty the Emperor of France, on the 14th January last, ceding to His Imperial Majesty certain important fishery privileges on the coasts of Newfoundland, the Straits of Belle Isle and Labrador, and which Treaty is wisely left to the approval of the Imperial Parliament and the Legislature of the Colony whose interests, if it be ratified, would be seriously affected by its stipulations.

Your Majesty's loyal subjects, in the Legislature of this Dependency of the Crown, deeply regret that the duty devolves upon them of humbly and respectfully representing to Your Majesty the injurious consequences of an international Treaty between Great Britain and a great and powerful Nation in its immediate vicinity, affecting the interests of our fellow Colonists; but the duty which we owe to our own people and to our brethren of Newfoundland, as part and parcel of the great cis-Atlantic family, who look to the Mother Country for guidance and protection in the hour of difficulty and danger, impels us to raise our humble voice against a measure which would be so ruinous in its operation against Colonial rights and privileges as the Treaty under consideration.

Though dependent, weak and isolated to some degree, these lower Provinces, whose interests are imperilled by the recent Fishery Convention, have as strong a claim to the paternal consideration of Your Majesty's Government as if they formed part of the British Islands, or were each of them as powerful a dependency as Canada, for whose advancement we rejoice to believe Your Majesty's Government have always manifested the most earnest solicitude; and having graciously conceded to us the inestimable and truly British right of managing our own affairs, we conceive that Your Majesty's Government should not entertain the application for concessions seriously affecting Colonial rights, emanating from a foreign, though a friendly power, without first ascertaining the views of the Colonists, whose interests might be so affected.

The very liberal concessions of territorial and fishery rights on the coast of Newfoundland, guaranteed to the French by existing Treaties, as well as the frequent encroachments on certain fishery privileges exclusively vested in Your Majesty's subjects, have long been a source of discontent with the people of Newfoundland, and of repeated remonstrance on the part of their Legislative Assemblies. We therefore humbly hope that it is not unbecoming our duty, as loyal subjects of Your Majesty, to question the propriety and justice of rewarding an aggressive policy on the part of France, with respect to Colonial fisheries, by still further concessions, and now especially as these are eminently calculated to cause still greater discontent and irritation, as they would injuriously affect, if not ruin the condition of a loyal and ancient Colony. Under present arrangements, the French are in possession of fully one-half the fisheries on the coast of Newfoundland, with valuable territorial privileges appertaining thereto; and considering that Newfoundland is a British Province, we humbly conceive that it would be an unwise policy to accord to the subjects of a foreign State a still further extension of privileges essentially British and Provincial.

The authorities and people of Newfoundland are fully convinced that the Convention under review, if allowed to go into operation, would not merely destroy their fisheries and check their industry and commercial enterprize, but, by depriving thousands of the means of subsistence, compel them to seek elsewhere an asylum and reward for their labour;

to a more fishing station for the advantage of a rival Power. We regret that we have to share with our fellow Colonists of Newfoundland in this most discouraging conviction; and we therefore earnestly implore that Your Majesty's Government may be pleased to abandon a measure so injurious to Colonial interests-so likely to alienate the affection of a large portion of Your Majesty's subjects, and so calculated to lead to contentions which might, in the course of time, assume national proportions.

Apart from those high considerations of inter-Colonial policy which should always induce sister Provinces to unite for the vindication and protection of common rights, the inhabitants of Prince Edward Island have important interests involved in the preservation of the Newfoundland fisheries. Many of our fishermen resort to the coast of Newfoundland, the Labrador and the Straits of Belle Isle, for their supply of fish. If our Newfoundland brethren should be prevented from successfully competing with their French rivals on the borders of Provincial territory, the injurious effects of such competition would be speedily felt by Your Majesty's subjects in this Colony. Newfoundland has for many years afforded a ready and profitable market for the sale of our surplus agricultural produce, our cattle, and a large proportion of our shipping-which form the staple of our export trade; and should the prosperity of Newfoundland decline by means of undue advantages accorded to the subjects of France, the trade and prosperity of this Colony must also decline in a. ratio proportioned to its territory and population.

But while participating with our fellow subjects of Newfoundland in the gloomy apprehensions which would be too certainly realized should the recent Convention be brought. by any means, into operation—we confidently rely on the assurance which Your Majesty's Colonial Minister has been pleased to afford, that the Imperial Cabinet will not depart from that rule of Colonial Government which is now so firmly established in British North America, of leaving to Colonial legislation the confirmation or rejection of measures affecting local territorial rights. Your Majesty having thus graciously recognized the right of the Legislature of Newfoundland to accept or reject the Treaty now before us, our firm reliance on the honour of the Crown will not permit us to doubt that the recognition will be maintained with inviolable faith.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Henry Palmer, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod:—

Mr. Speaker;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immedate attendance of this Honorable House at the Bar of the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker, with the House, went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber, when His Excellency was pleased, in Her Majesty's name, to assent to the several Bills following, viz:—

An Act to continue and amend the Princetown Royalty Church Incorporation Act.

An Act to continue and amend the Act to prevent Horses, Swine and Geese from going at large in Georgetown.

An Act to continue the Act exempting certain Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, Contracts and Agreements, from the operation of the Laws relating to Usury.

An Act for the naturalization of Lawrence Warren.

An Act to incorporate the Minister and Trustees of the Free Church Congregation in the City of Charlottetown.

An Act in further amendment of an Act made and passed in the Sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to incorporate the Charlottetown Gas-Light Company."

An Act for better securing the liberty of the subject.

An Act to enable Henry Bessemer to obtain Letters Patent for the invention or discovery of certain improvements in the manufacture of Malleable or Bar Iron and Steel.

An Act for the incorporation of certain bodies connected with the Bible Christian Church in Prince Edward Island, and to repeal a certain Act therein mentioned.

An Act to amend the practice of the Supreme Court, and to alter the time for the attendance of Petit Jurors in Queen's County, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

An Act to enable the Supreme Court to give relief against adverse claims made against Sheriffs, and other persons having no interest in the subject of such claims.

An Act to explain and amend the Act authorising the purchase of Lands by the Government, and to remove certain doubts as to the powers of the Commissioner of Public Lands thereunder.

After which, Mr. Speaker spake as followeth:

On behalf of Her Majesty's faithful Commons of Prince Edward Island, I have now to present the following Bills of Aid and Supply, voted to Her Majesty during the present Session, to which I have humbly to request Your Excellency's assent, viz:—

An Act to continue the Act relating to Packets sailing between this Island and the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

An Act to continue and amend the Free Education Law.

An Act to provide for the appointment of an additional Assistant in the Post Office, and to increase the salary of the present Assistant.

An Act granting a yearly sum to the New York, New-foundland and London Telegraph Company.

An Act to alter certain provisions of the Act regulating the sale by license of Spirituous Liquors.

An Act relating to Ferries and Minchin's Point Wharf.

An Act for raising moneys to be applied to the purchase of Lands, under the Act Sixteenth Victoria, Chapter Eighteen, intituled "An Act for the purchase of Lands on behalf of the Government of Prince Edward Island, and to regulate the sale and management thereof, and for other purposes therein mentioned."

An Act for raising a Revenue.

An Act for appropriating certain moneys therein mentioned for the service of the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

To each of which His Excellency was pleased, in Her Majesty's name, to give his assent.

And then His Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses:—

Mr. President and Honorabla Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

The termination of the business that has engaged you enables me to relieve you from further attendance.

The unremitted attention which you have given to the public interests, has, to a considerable extent, realized the expectations I had formed at the opening of the Session; and I congratulate you on the accomplishment of some highly important measures which I had recommended to your consideration, and which I confidently hope will be productive of lasting benefit to the Colony.

Although retaining my opinion as to the advantage that must result from the early establishment of Municipal Institutions, I concur with you in believing that, by affording ample time and opportunity to the people to become familiar with the nature and character of those Institutions, they will be more ready to adopt them when again brought under the consideration of their representatives.

I regret that measures so urgently required for establishing a Board of Works, and for the more secure and effectual application of the public moneys on Roads, Bridges and other public objects, have not been matured in the present Session.

I trust, however, that the consideration those subjects has received may lead to the formation of an enlightened public opinion, which will, ere long, enable the Legislature to arrive at such a just estimate of the abuses of the system that has, up to this time, been persevered in, as may effect their early and final extinction.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

I thank you for the Supplies which you have granted for the Public Service, and also for the confidence which you have reposed in the Government by placing at its disposal the requisite funds for various important objects.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

It is gratifying to me to reflect that, under Providence, the tranquil and improving condition of this Island is such as to hold out a reasonable prospect of steady and satisfactory progress; and it is with the utmost satisfaction, in relieving you from your labours, that I recur to the spirit of moderation and harmony, so eminently conducive to the general welfare, which has characterized your proceedings.

After which, the Hon. the President of the Legislative Council said—

Gentlemen;

SIR;

I have to acknowledge your Despatch No. 22, of the 18th April last, enclosing an Address from both Houses of the Legislature of the Island to Her Majesty, referring to former correspondence on the subject of the Landlord and Tenant question in Prince Edward Island, and suggesting that if Her Majesty's Government would give a guarantee for any sufficient loan required for the purpose of purchasing landlords' rights, the Colony would, in the next Session of its Legislature, make the necessary provision for payment of interest.

I have to state, in reply, that Her Majesty's Government are prepared to give a favourable consideration to this suggestion; and that the local Land Purchase Act, to which reference is made, appears to them to furnish fair principles of adjustment, which might be extended by increasing the sum to be raised under Imperial guarantee. It would be necessary, however, before proceeding further, that Her Majesty's Government should be informed of the amount of the proposed loan; and they should, at the same time, receive a full statement of the financial resources of the Island, and of the precise nature of the provision to be made for securing the repayment of the principal and interest of the loan. Her Majesty's Government would not feel justified in pledging themselves to any decision on this subject until such information is before them.

Sir;

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch No. 41, of the 5th September, transmitting a Minute of Council,

with other documents, explanatory of the financial condition of Prince Edward Island, as required by my Despatch of the 18th of July last.

The resources of the Island, as shewn by these documents, appear to Her Majesty's Government to afford sufficient guarantee for the due payment of the interest as it falls due, and for the formation of a sinking fund for the payment of the principal of the loan proposed to be raised under the Imperial guarantee; and they are therefore prepared to authorise a loan of one hundred thousand pounds, to be appropriated to the purchase of the rights of landed proprietors in the Island, subject to the following conditions:—

Her Majesty's Government observe that, in order to secure the repayment of moneys borrowed under the provisions of the Land Purchase Act, 16 Vic., cap. 18, as well as the interest thereon, the moneys arising from the sale, rent and profits of lands purchased under the Act, and paid into the Treasury, are in the first instance pledged and rendered liable, and the other public funds, moneys and securities, are likewise pledged and rendered liable.

In order, therefore, to secure this country against any undue charge, proper provision must be made for the regular payment of the interest of the proposed loan, as well as for the formation of a sinking fund, such as will secure the liquidation in twenty years of the principal amount of the debt, for the interest of which the Imperial guarantee is proposed to be given.

It will further be necessary that the proceeds of the lands to be purchased, as well as a first charge on the general revenue of the Province, should be secured by Legislative enactments, for the payment of principal and interest, and any other expenses that may be necessarily incurred. I have, therefore, to instruct you to bring the subject again under the consideration of your Council, with a view to the introduction into the Legislature of the measure necessary for giving effect to the proposed arrangement.

Government House, Prince Edward Island, 5th September, 1856.

Sir;

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, of the 18th July, No. 21, conveying the gratifying intimation that Her Majesty's Government are prepared to give a favorable consideration to the suggestion of the Legislature of this Island, in regard to a loan to be raised under Imperial guarantee, and calling for information on certain points theren, stated, to enable Her Majesty's Government to come to a final decision on the subject.

Having brought your Despatch under the considera-tion of my Council, I trust that the minute which I have the honor to enclose, with the accompanying statements (marked A, B and C), therein referred to, will afford all the information required, and be deemed to exhibit a sound state of the financial resources of the Colony.

After the most careful consideration of the difficulties that have so long existed in this Colony, with a view to their final and effectual removal, I have not been able to discover any means, which, in my humble opinion, affords so fair a prospect of success, as the operation of the "Land Purchase Act," with an extension of funds suited to the exigencies of the case, which would be amply supplied by the amount now proposed to be raised, and I incline much to the opinion, that it will not at any time be necessary to raise the whole of that

Experience thus far justifies the belief, that these measures cannot occasion any pecuniary loss, and in the Despatch in question, that Her Majesty's Governoperations under the "Land Purchase Bill" are already producing their effects upon the price of lands generally, and must ultimately bring a large portion of the wild lands, by whomsoever owned, within the reach of fair principles of adjustment, which may be extended by actual settlers, to the advantage of all concerned.

The following Report of the Committee of the Executive Council was laid before the Board, which was read, viz:

May it please your Excellency,

The Committee of the Executive Council, to whom was referred the Despatch from the Right Honorable Henry Labouchere, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, No. 24, dated 18th July, 1856, in reply to your Excellency's Despatch, No. 22, of the 18th April last, enclosing an Address from both branches of the Legislature of this Island, to Her Majesty, referring to former Correspondence on the subject of the Landlord and Tenant question in Prince Edward Island, and suggesting, that if Her Majesty's Government would give a guarantee for any sufficient Loan, required for the purpose of purchasing Landlords' rights, the Colony would, in the next Session of its Legislature, make the necessary provision for the payment of Interest, have given the subject matter of the Despatch careful consideration.

They cannot but feel gratified at the assurance given ment are prepared to give a favorable consideration to the suggestion, and that the local Land Purchase Act. to which reference is made, appears to them to furnish increasing the sum to be raised under Imperial guaran-

Before proceeding further, however, Her Majesty's Government require-

1st.—To be informed of the amount of the proposed

2d.—To receive a statement of the financial resources of the Island.

3rd -And also a statement of the precise nature of Notes afloat, not bearing Interest, that strictly speakthe provision to be made for securing the repayment. ing at that date the Colony was not only out of debt,

the Loan.

Your Committee are of opinion, that it would be requisite to have authority to raise a sum of money, not exceeding £100,000, Sterling, although it is probable that the whole amount will not be required at any one time.

2nd.—That the financial resources and position of the Island will be understood on reference to the Tabular Statements A, B, and C., accompanying this report.

Tabular Statement A is of the Revenue, during eight years ending 31st January, 1856, in which, with the exception of the last year only, there has been a rapid annual increase. The slight decrease in the last year, as compared with that immediately preceding, was caused, it is believed, by the War, and the extreme depression in the Shipping and Mercantile interests consequent upon it, but it is confidently anticipated that the Revenue for the now current year will again exhibit a dicided improvement. It will be observed, that the Revenue, which in the year 1848 was £11,861 10s. 9d, had arisen, in 1854, to £30,689 1s. Sterling, an increase of £18,827 10s. 3d. Sterling, considerably more than double, and its amount, even in 1855, which, as already observed, exhibits a decrease in that of 1854, exceeds that of 1853, by £4,490 12s. 6d. Sterling, and has more than double that of 1848. (Excess over 1848, £16,192 10s. 9d., Sterling.)

Tabular Statement B is of the Revenue and Expenditure during the same period, shewing that £5,786 16s. 5d. Sterling, more on the balance of accounts was to the credit of this Colony in January, 1856, than in 1848, and this too after charging as Expenditure in the year 1854 the sum of £12,000, Sterling, issued in Debentures for the purchase of the Worrell Estate (84,000 acres or thereabouts), and not taking any credit for the lands by that purchase vested in the Govern-

ment.

Tabular Statement C. is a statement of the Finances of the Colony on the 31st January, 1856, which has carefully been prepared, and contains, in the opinion of your Committee, a just and correct view of its present financial condition, which proves, after taking credit to the Colony for the value of Government lands. estimated at a low rate, and charging it with all Debentures affoat, and with £7,666 13s. 4d. Treasury

With regard to the first point, viz: The amount of but that a balance existed in its favor amounting to

£6.521 6s. 3d. Sterling.

With respect to the third point, namely, the precise nature of the provision to be made for securing the repayment of the proposed Loan, your Committee, in the first instance, would remark, that they conceive it will be necessary to pass an Act, in addition to the Land Purchase Act, empowering the Government to raise the required amount, by Debentures or Bonds, in such form as the Imperial Government may point out as usual and most convenient in such cases. The Act should contain a clause securing the repayment of the monies to be raised in accordance with the twentieth section of the original Land Purchase Act, of the 16th Victoria, cap. 18, which reads as follows:-

"For the repayment of all sums of money, borrowed " under this Act, and the Interest thereon, and for the payment of all sums contracted to be paid under this "Act, and expenses incurred thereunder, the moneys " arising from the sale, rents, and profits of lands purchased thereunder, and paid into the Treasury, shall in the first instance, be pledged and rendered liable, " and the other public funds, moneys, and securities of this Island, shall be, and the same are hereby in the

next place pledged and rendered liable.'

Your Committee believe, that Her Majesty's Government, after considering the sound state of the finances of the Island, and that the proceeds of the lands to be purchased, as well as the general revenue, will, by Legislative enactment, be pledged to secure the repayment of the principal and interest of any amount borrowed, will feel fully justified in aiding the Colony in obtaining a loan on advantageous terms, by giving the Imperial guarantee for the sum required.

Report of Commissioners appointed for the purpose of inspecting the Harbour of Tatamagouche, Province of Nova Scotia.

We, the Commissioners appointed by His|wharf and break-water of a very substantial Mails to Halifax, beg respectfully to report— Charlottetown for the Harbour of Tatamagouche, Settlement; and on finding the water not of sufficient depth on the bar of Tatamagouche river to allow the steam-boat (drawing about sixt feet) to proceed up until high water, we examined two points suggested to us as places in the Bay where wharf accommodation could be built, to allow a suitable vessel to lay along side at all times of tide. The first we visited is called the Thrum Cap, situtated at the head of the harbour, on the north side, about two miles from the entrance of Tatamagouche river, and by land about four miles from the village. This point is sufficiently sheltered for a vessel to lay in safety; but the channel being so narrow that no steamer could turn in it, excepting at high water, we did not make any further The other place is called examination there. Block House Point. It is on the south side of the harbour, half a mile from the river, and two miles from the village by land, half a mile of miles. The road is good and nearly level, lead-

We remained at Truro that night, and after breakfast the next morning returned to Tatamagouche.

> The road to Truro is not of that hilly nature one would imagine it to be from the fact of its passing over the mountain, it being of one gradual ascent for fifteen miles; and from the gravelly nature of the soil is a very passable road, and there are plenty of materials at hand to keep it in good repair. If the mails were to be sent by this route the coach proprietor would have a change of horses half-way, which he has not at present; and then the time in going through would be considerably shortened.

On our return to Tatamagouche, we proceeded by coach to Brule Harbour, a distance of six which road must be made to the point. Here a ing along the river and onwards to Pictou.

Mr. John Mockler, through whose farm the road to the shore passes down to Brule Harbour, we found the steamer had arrived from Tatamagouche, and having her steam up, gave us a favourable opportunity for examining the harbour, and ascertaining the best landing place.

We fully accord with the opinion expressed by Captain H. W. Bayfield, R.N., the experienced Admiralty Surveyor, in his communication to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, of 29th May, 1856, that this harbour is the safest and the best for a direct intercourse with Nova Scotia, as being nearest to Charlottetown Harbour, and one where a steamer can lay with safety in any weather, there being good anchorage, and the shore at the old wharf can be approached within 300 feet at any time of tide, and by a small outlay sufficient wharf accommodation could be built.

Mr. Mockler, of Conn House, has the outer blocks of a wharf now built, and if encouragement were given to him, he would make it available for the use of a mail packet from hence.

The present road would be three or four miles further from Brule to Truro than from Tatamagouche, but shorter by water. If about four miles of road, which has been marked out, leading from Conn House to the line of road from River John, by Earl Town, were opened up, the distance to Truro would be some miles less than from Tatamagouche, and we were informed would be a preferable road

On our leaving Brule a strong gale blew from the north-east. The Captain of the Steam-boat told us that before he left the Block House Point at Tatamagouche a heavy swell was setting in, and it took him more than an hour to steam down to Brule; and that as soon as he had rounded the shoal at Brule Point, the water was quite smooth; and he was sure that with that wind it would have taken him an hour longer to reach Charlottetown from Block House Point than from Brule. We arrived at Charlottetown at half past eight o'clock, the passage across occupying four and a half hours.

The village of Tatamagoube may, at the present time, afford greater accommodations for travellers than Brule; but, from the expressed desire of the coach proprietor, Mr. Blair, to give every facility by the supply of coaches, and also

On arriving at Conn House, the residence of landing and entertainment of travellers, we think that nothing will be wanting to encourage travelling, should that route be adopted this season.

> A coach runs three times a week between Pictou and Amherst, passing through Brule and Tatamagouche; and we have no doubt if the proposed arrangement was carried out, that many persons from the United States and North American Provinces would adopt it when coming to the Island; while the Packets from Summerside to Shediac, and from Georgetown to Pictou, would keep up the passenger communication between those places. The proposed route from Charlottetown through Brule, and Truro to Halifax, would be the central line of connection between the Island and Nova Scotia, and the nearest by which Her Majesty's Mails could be forwarded from hence to Great Britain. over, there would be a saving of thirty miles of travelling between Charlottetown and Truro; and under the present coach arrangements, a saving of two dollars in each coach hire, and a great amount of fatigue and inconvenience avoided, as travellers from hence might be in Truro by four o'clock in the afternoon, and remain there until eleven o'clock the next morning, when the coach from Pictou generally arrives, thereby affording a rest of 18 or 20 hours, instead of rising at three o'clock in the morning at Pictou, and having to sit 17 or 18 hours in the coach to Halifax, and riding 104 miles instead of 64 miles.

> There are also advantages on returning from Halifax by resting the night at Truro and not going on to Pictou, for the morning coach would be in Brule in four hours time, and in four hours more the Steam-boat may be at Charlottetown.

> On the completion of the Railroad from Halifax to Shubenacadie, which we understand it will be early in 1857, the journey from Charlottetown to Halifax may be performed by this route in a day; and if it be adopted it is reasonable to suppose that the Government of Nova Scotia would direct our Mails and those for Tatamagouche to be forwarded by that line of road, for, notwithstanding the coaches run thrice a week between Truro and Tatamagouche, yet the mails to Tatamagouche from Halifax are conveyed via Pictou.

We would respectfully submit, that under the of Mr. Mockler to give accommodation for the present postal arrangement, letters sent from the Island to Halifax do not arrive there but on Wednesday and Friday evenings, rendering it almost impossible to receive answers in less time than a week: whereas if our Mail was sent via Brule on Monday, Wednesday and Friday in each week, and return on the following respective days, answers could be received days earlier than is now done, which would be of great benefit to the commercial interests of the Colony.

Sir;

With reference to Sir William Molesworth's Circular Despatch, of the First of September last, I transmit for your information and guidance, a copy of a Letter from the Board of Trade, enclosing the Draft of an Order in Council, imposing a toll upon certain Ships that will derive benefit from the Lighthouse on Cape Race.

You will observe, that the toll which it is intended to impose, can only be levied upon certain classes of vessels, with the consent and aid of the local Governments, but I cannot doubt, that the respective Provinces interested in the maintenance of the Light, will cheerfully co-operate with Her Majesty's Government, in giving effect to the proposed measure.

You will, therefore, bring the subject under the early consideration of your Council, and you will transmit to me, full information on the several points adverted to in the letter from the Board of Trade, so far as the Colony under your Government is con-

Sir:

I am directed by the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, to transmit to you for the consideration of Mr. Secretary Labouchere, the enclosed copy of a Draft Order in Council, imposing a Toll upon certain Ships that will derive benefit from the Lighthouse upon Cape Race, Newfoundland.

The Toll is to be levied under the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Act amendment Act, 1855, (18 & 19 Vict. cap. 91), which empowers Her Majesty, in Council, to impose a Toll in respect of any new Lighthouse erected in or near the coasts of any British Possession, by or with the consent of the

Legislative authority of such place. My Lords calculate that the cost of erecting the

Light will be about £5160, and that the cost of ' maintaining it will be somewhat over £400, per annum, assuming that the cost of erection is to be paid off in five years or thereabouts, it will be necessary to raise by the toll a sum of about £1500 a year, to be reduced as soon as the cost of erection is paid off. From returns which have been furnished in this country, and by the Colonial Governments, it appears that the annual amount of shipping that will pass or derive benefit from this Light, is about 5,500,000 Tons, which, at the sixteenth of a penny per ton, will give the required income; My Lords, therefore, propose to fix the toll to that amount.

It will be observed, that the Order in Council extends to ships navigating between Ports in the United Kingdom and certain Ports in North America, and also to ships navigating to and from Ports in British North America upon transatlantic voyages from and to Ports not in the United Kingdom. Upon the former of these classes, the toll can be collected in this country, upon the latter, the toll can only be levied in the respective Colonies with the consent and by the help of the Colonial Governments; the two classes are, however, so far as regards the benefit to be derived from the Light, precisely in the same position; and, my Lords trust, therefore, that there will be no difficulty on the part of any of the Colonies, n levying and accounting for the toll thus imposed.

There are, however, two other classes of vessels which will derive benefit from the Light, viz.:—1st. Ships engaged in the Coasting Trade of the Colony of Newfoundland—2ndly. Ships engaged in the inter-Colonial Trade of the British Colonies in North America, and passing the Light.

With regard to these two classes, my Lords do not think it desirable to make any provision by the Order in Council, until they learn precisely in what manner, and to what extent the several Colonial Governments are disposed to concur in imposing and collecting the toll. In the case of Newfoundland, my Lords understand, that the Colonial Government are willing to tax coasters to the same extent for which they are taxed for Cape Pine, but they think it desirable to know the exact terms which the Colonial Government propose for the purpose, before embodying them in any Order in Council, if indeed it be necessary to do so at all.

As regards the mode of collecting the toll imposed by the Order in Council, it appears desirable, that they should be collected, whenever it is possible to do so, at the Port of clearance before the vessel sails. My Lords propose, accordingly, that they shall be so collected in Ports of the United Kingdom, in the case of vessels departing from those Ports; whilst in the case of ships arriving in the United Kingdom, my Lords propose, that they shall not be demanded if a Colonial receipt shewing that the toll for the voyage has been paid in the Colony before starting is produced. As regards the management of the Light, it appears to my Lords, that it may very properly be entrusted to the Board of Works mentioned in the Despatch of the Governor of Newfoundland, of the 8th January last, which was transmitted to this Board in your letter of the 26th February, and my Lords will be prepared to make arrangements for the remitting of the tolls, and for providing thereout the funds necessary for maintaining the Light, after learning the arrangements made for collecting and accounting for the tolls to be taken in Newfoundland, and the other Colonies, and the particulars of the measures which the Board of Works propose to adopt for maintaining the Light.

The convenient course will probably be, that an account should be rendered quarterly to this depart-

ment, from the Colony of Newfoundland, of the cost of the management, and also of the amount of tolls received in that Colony, with the particulars of the vessels which have paid the tolls, giving the name of the vessel, and the Port to which she belongs, her tonnage, rate of toll, and account paid by each vessel; if there is a balance due to the Colony, upon such account, it may be settled by a draft upon the accountant to the Board of Trade. But if the receipts are more than the payments, the balance should be remitted to Her Majesty's Paymaster General, to be placed to the credit of the account for Colonial Lighthouses. The balance from the other Colonies should be remitted in like manner.

As regards the proposal contained in the Despatch of the Governor of Newfoundland above referred to, to the effect that the Lighthouse on Cape Pine, and the tolls for that Light, should be placed upon the same footing as the Lighthouse on Cape Race and its tolls. My Lords direct me to state, that as soon as they have concluded the arrangements for Cape Race, and have seen how they answer, they will be prepared to consider the proposal, but they think it better to defer its consideration for the present.

As the Lighthouse on Cape Race will soon be in a condition for exhibiting the Light, it is desirable, that the Order in Council, should be submitted for Her Majesty's sanction as early as possible. My Lords will be glad, therefore, to be favored with Mr. Sccretary Labouchere's opinion, at his earliest convenience, whether there is any objection to the Order in Council, as proposed to be framed, and they would be glad to receive also, the required information upon the several points before adverted to, with reference to the Colonies, so soon as Mr. Labouchere has had an opportunity of making the necessary communications with the Colonial Governments.

With reference to dues to be levied in the Colonies, I am to call your attention particularly to the 3d Section of the Act above mentioned.

"Whereas by the Merchant Shipping Act amendment Act, 1855, it is enacted, that upon the erection of any new Lighthouse, in or near any of the coasts of the British Possessions, by or with the consent of the Legislative authority of such Possession, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such toll, in regard thereof to be paid by the Master or Owner of any Ship which passes the same, or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable.

"And whereas, a Lighthouse is, by and with the consent of the Legislative authority of the Colony of Newfoundland, now being erected on Cape Race, in the said Colony.

"And whereas, the erection of such Lighthouse will soon be completed, and the Light thereof will shortly be exhibited.

"And whereas, the several classes of Ships fol-

lowing, that is to say :-

"All ships, whether sailing ships or steam ships, navigating from any Port or Ports in the British Colonies in North America, to any Port or Ports in the United Kingdom.

"All ships, whether sailing ships or steam ships, navigating from any port or ports in the United Kingdom, to any port or ports in the British Colo-

nies, in North America.

"All ships, whether sailing ships or steam ships, bound from any port or ports in the British Colonies in North America, upon any transatlantic voyage.

"All slips, whether sailing ships or steam ships, arriving at any port or ports in the British Colonies in North America, after any transatlantic voyage.

"All ships, whether sailing ships or steam ships, arriving at any port or ports in the United Kingdom, from New York, or any port in the United States, North of New York.

"All steam ships leaving any port or ports in the United Kingdom, for New York, or any port in the United States, north of New York, will pass the said Lighthouse, and will, when the Light is exhibi-

ted therein, derive benefit therefrom.

"Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct, that upon and after the lighting of the said Light upon Cape Race, there shall be paid for every such ship, as aforesaid, except ships belonging to Her Majesty, Her Heirs and Successors, the toll of ene-sixteenth of a penny, per ton, of the burthen of overy such ship for every such voyage as aforesaid.

Sir;

I am directed by the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, to acknowledge the receipt. of your letter of the 19th ultimo, enclosing the copy of a Despatch from the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, stating that he did not apprehend any difficulty in securing the co-operation of the Colony, for giving effect to the views of Her Majesty's Government, in regard to Cape Race Light, by the enactment of a Law for that purpose, and concurring generally in the terms and conditions of the draft order in Council, for imposing a toll upon ships which pass that Light. My Lords presume, that the Lieutenant Governor will reply more fully to the several points raised by the letter from this Department, dated 9th July last, as soon as he has had the opportunity of consulting the Colonial Legislature.

As regards the suggestion contained in the Report from the Colonial Committee, for erecting two Lighthouses, one on the North Cape, and one on the East Point of the Island, I am to observe, that it appears from their Report that further proceedings with respect to Lighthouses are postponed until the opinion of the neighbouring Colonies has been obtained. My Lords, therefore, postpone for the present, any further consideration of the suggestion in question.

So soon, however, as the opinion of the authorities in the several Colonies on the subject has been ascer tained, my Lords will be glad to receive from the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, a Report, shewing the necessity of two Lighthouses on the proposed sites, together with, any information concerning the sites, the buildings, or the lighting apparatus, which his knowledge of the coast enables him to furnish.

Sir;

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch of the 23d July, No. 26, transmitting for my information and guidance, Copy of a Letter from the Board of Trade, enclosing the Draft of an Order in Council, imposing a toll upon certain ships that will derive benefit from the Lighthouse on Cape Race.

Having brought the subject under the consideration of the Executive Council, I am enabled to inform you, that I do not apprehend any difficulty in securing the co-operation of this Colony for giving effect to the views of Her Majesty's Government in regard to

the Cape Race Light, by the enactment of a Law for that purpose. In so far as this Colony is concerned, I see no ground for objection to the terms and conditions of the proposed Order in Council.

During the last Session, I brought the general subject of Colonial Light Houses under the consideration of the Legislature, with a view to giving effect, in so far as this Colony is concerned, to the measures proposed by Her Majesty's Government, and a Committee having devoted considerable attention to the subject, the Assembly adopted their Report; a printed copy of which I have the honor to enclose. I am taking measures to procure the information desired by the Assembly, as to the sentiments of the neighbouring Colonial Governments on this subject.

I would beg leave to call your attention to that portion of the accompanying Report of the House of Assembly, having reference to the want of Light Houses on the North Cape, and on the East Point of this Island. The necessity for Lights on those positions is very generally felt, and has been represented to me also by Officers of Her Majesty's Naval Service.

Should Her Majesty's Government see fit to authorize their erection, under the provisions of the "Merchant Shipping Act amendment Act", (18 & 19 Vict. cap. 91.) they could not fail to be productive of very considerable advantage to shipping and commercial interests.

Newfoundland Fishery Convention.

Letter from the Speaker of the House of Assembly of Newfoundland to the Speaker of the House of Assembly of P. E. Island, dated 2nd March, 1857, on the subject of a recent Convention between the Governments of Great Britain and France, conceding to the latter Power important fishery rights on the coasts of Newfoundland and Labrador.

> House of Assembly, Newfoundland, 2nd March, 1857.

Sir;

I have the honour, by direction of the House of Assembly of this Colony, to transmit you the following documents, involving a question which they desire to bring under the consideration of the House of Assembly of your Province:-

Copy of Convention between Great Britain and France, relating to fisheries on the coasts of Newfoundland and La-

Convention. Correspondence between Her Majesty's Government and the several Governors of this Colony. Copy of Resolutions and Addresses of Assembly protesting against said Convention.

You will observe, by a perusal of these papers, that the British Government have concluded a Convention with France, by which most important concessions of fishery rights on the coasts of this Island and Labrador are made to the latter Power. The ultimate effects of the operation of this brador. Copy Secretary State's Despatch, accompanying measure will, it is confidently believed, be the depopulation of this Colony of its British inhabitants, and the consequent possession of Newfoundland by a foreign Power. The French pursue the fishery on this coast as a means only to the creation of seamen for their navy, and the aid of the Imperial Government is freely given to carry out this national object. We prosecute the fisheries purely as a commercial speculation, by the agency of private enterprise, and have hitherto been injuriously affected by their unequal competition.

Under the very extended privileges conferred by this Convention, it is the belief of our hest informed men, that our trade and industry must succumb to the influences they will have to encounter. The direct interference of the French with the prosecution of our pursuits on the one hand, and the increase of their bounty (sustained trade), on the other—while lessening the amount of our produce—must lead to the further result of making that smaller production of less relative value than before.

Nova Scotia has a large interest on the coasts on which this Convention proposes to give the subjects of France concurrent rights of fishery; and in the proportion of that interest will this measure be productive to her of the like results that we anticipate.

This act of the British Government has been received here with common feelings of indignation and alarm; and there is the less of palliation for the Concession to the French, since the consequences of such a measure have been repeatedly urged in Despatches from the local Government.

The Convention, it is true, makes the assent of this Colony, by the passing of certain laws, necessary to give it effect.

On this point, I have but to observe, that not only will no such assent be given by the Legislature, but the people, with one voice, have determined that every just and honourable means shall be employed to defeat a project fraught with ruin to every interest in this Colony.

In pursuance of this determination, the Legislature are appealing to Her Majesty and the Imperial Parliament, and will send a Delegation to sustain their rights.

We are unwilling to believe that the British Government or the Imperial Parliament would permit the ratification of such a measure without our consent, and in defiance of the principles our Constitution embodies. But the great importance of the interest involved, and the fact that the British Government has acceded to the Convention, in the face of the strong protests that for years have gone from this Colony. produces in our minds a feeling of shaken confidence, and compels us to admit that our position is one of extreme peril. Nor will it mitigate the effect of the Treaty should it be confirmed—that it involves the broken faith of a parent Government to the oldest North American dependency of the Crown.

I respectfully appeal to you, Sir, as the organ of your Honourable House, to consider whether this Convention does not embrace a question of Colonial right, in which all are concerned, and which it may not be unworthy of you honourable body to entertain.

The wrong will not be done if our fellow Colonists view it as we think they must, and avow their sentiments accordingly.

Our rights are proposed to be sacrificed in this case by Imperial exigency; and if such a principle be sanctioned, its application to other Colonies may be but a question of time and circumstances.

And it will also be well to consider what the effect would be on the other British American Provinces, especially in time of war, if this Island, the key of the St. Lawrence, with its numberless capacious harbours, fell into the hands of a foreign Power—a conjuncture which the operation of the Convention can hardly fail to bring about.

Letter of Messrs. Kent and Carter, Delegates from the House of Assembly of Newfoundland.

HALIFAX, 20th March, 1857.

Sir;

We have the honour to address you on a subject of vital importance to the Colony of Newfoundland, and in which the interests of other neighbouring British Provinces are much involved.

We have been appointed Delegates by the House of Assembly of Newfoundland to obtain the co-operation of the Legislatures and Governments of the Provinces in preventing the confirmation of a Convention entered into on the 14th January last, between the Governments of Great Britain and France, conceding valuable fishery privileges on the coasts of Newfoundland and Labrador to France.

Accompanying this are the documents, printed by order of the House of Assembly, containing an account of the negotiations—a copy of the Convention and Proceedings of the Assembly, as also the evidence of the two Bishops of the Island, very conversant with the extent and character of the Concessions.

For these Concessions there is not any real equivalent.

In our Island great excitement prevailed on the unexpected intelligence of this Convention, so ruinous to our people if carried out, and so opposed to their wishes, as from time to time represented to successive Colonial Ministers.

Delegates are about proceeding to England from both branches of the Legislature, to remonstrate against those Concessions; and it was deemed of great importance that their mission should be strengthened by an expression of opinion from the Legislatures of the Provinces in promotion of their views, and which we felt assured we should receive at a time of such threatening danger to the best interests of our people.

In this Province a deep interest has been manifested by the Members of both branches of the Legislature, and by the most influential citizens; and it is the intention of this Legislature, on the return of the leading Members of the new Administration, to take active steps in joining their remonstrance with ours by an Address to Her Majesty.

We regret that this early season and the difficulty of travelling prevents us the honour of paying you a personal visit; but we feel convinced that the knowledge of the great danger impending over us, apparent on the perusal of the papers, will awaken a lively interest for our position; and

that your Honourable House will not fail to co-operate with us in uniting your remonstrance against a Convention fraught with such ruinous effect to our common interests as British subjects.

Despatches and other Public Documents on the subject of Colonial Tariffs.

SIR;

The Treaty of 1854, commonly known as the Reciprocity Treaty, between Great Britain and the United States, was concluded under circumstances of political exigency, with the immediate object of terminating questions in dispute as to rights of fishery; and at the same time with the desire, on the part of the British Government, to secure commercial advantages for the British North American Provinces.

At the time when the Treaty was concluded many of the articles enumerated in the Treaty were subject to duty in the North American Colonies, equally when brought from Great Britain, the British Colonies, and from foreign countries, so that the immediate effect of the Treaty was to establish differential duties on such of the enumerated articles as were before subject to duty, to the disadvantage of the United Kingdom and the British Colonies, as well as of foreign Countries.

To meet this, in some measure special provision has been made in Colonial Acts. Thus in Newfoundland the Governor is authorised by proclamation to declare some of the articles enumerated to be admissable duty free, when the produce or manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of the British North American Colonies, and others of them to be so only when the produce of the latter Colonies.

By an Act 15 Vic. cap. 2, passed in contemplation of the Reciprocity Treaty, but before its conclusion, the Governor of Nova Scotia is authorised to declare by proclamation that articles, being the produce of any foreign Nation entitled to trade with Nova Scotia, on the same terms as the United States, shall be free from duty in Nova Scotia, if the same articles are free when the produce of the United States; and the wording of the section seems to imply that this proviso is to come into force for countries which admit any of the enumerated articles duty free, and is not restricted to those countries which shall admit them all.

Other modifications have been made in the Tariffs of the North American Provinces, which go far to remove any particular inconvenience which might have arisen under the operation of the Treaty. Still it must be admitted that so long as any articles are admitted duty free from the United States, which are subject to duty when the produce of the United Kingdom, the British Colonies, or other foreign countries, this Treaty clashes with the provisions of several existing commercial treaties with other countries, while at the same time it presents an exception to the whole course of recent legislation; a state of things which certainly tends to encourage other propositions equally at variance with economical principles; such, for instance, as that which has been put forward for the mutual abolition of duties between the West Indies and the North American Provinces.

All the accessible documents in this Office, No. 42. and especially the Customs Returns for the North American Provinces, have been examined, with a view to discover what actual amount of duty would be sacrificed in the North American Provinces, by completely abolishing the duties upon all the articles enumerated in the Treaty, from whatever country imported. But owing to the incompleteness of the available information, it is not possible to arrive at perfectly accurate results. It is, however, most probable that in nearly every instance the operation of the Treaty has been greatly to diminish, if not to put an end to, the import of the enumerated articles from places other than the United States, so that any estimate of the loss which might follow from the complete opening of trade in the enumerated articles, derived from the returns of imports before the Treaty came into complete operation, are probably much in excess of the truth.

By an Act of the General Assembly, c. 35, of 1855, the Lieutenant Governor is empowered, so soon as the enumerated articles are admitted into the other North American Provinces free of duty, when the produce of Prince Edward Island, to admit the same articles when the produce of and imported from those Colonies. Inasmuch as the entire import trade of Prince Edward Island in the enumerated articles seems to be confined to the British Provinces and the United States, it is pretty certain that the receipt of duties upon these articles will henceforward be very trifling; and there is no reason to suppose that any practical cause of complaint will arise under the law as now established; but it cannot be denied that a scale of differential duties, against the United Kingdom and foreign countries having commercial treaties with this country, presents an apparent ground for dissatisfaction, and may hereafter tend to cripple the increasing trade of the Island.

I have, therefore, to request that you will consult with your Council upon this subject, and report to me your opinion as to the expediency of proposing to the General Assembly the complete abolition of duties on all the articles enumerated in the Reciprocity Treaty.

Having brought your Despatch of the 15th July, No. 23, under the consideration of my Executive Council, with a view to the adoption of such legislative action as may be necessary, in order to meet the wishes of Her Majesty's Government, as therein set forth, I have the honour to enclose a Minute, setting forth the views of the Council as to the expediency of discontinuing the scale of differential duties against the United Kingdom and foreign countries having commercial treaties with Great Britain.

There exists, for the present, a strong indisposition on the part of the Council to go the whole length of completely abolishing the duties on all the articles enumerated in the Reciprocity Treaty, arising from the great benefit this Colony already derives from the action of that Treaty, and a disinclination to disturb arrangements which have thus far proved so advantageous, until their operation shall have been further tested.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR, &c. &c. &c.

The following Report of the Special Committee to whom was referred the Despatch of Mr. Labouchere, respecting the Reciprocity Treaty between Great Britain and the United States of of America, was laid before the Board, and the No. 41. same was read, viz:-

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

The Committee of the Executive Council, to whom Your Excellency referred the Despatch of Mr. Labouchere, dated 18th July, 1856, No. 23, respecting the Reciprocity Treaty between Great Britain and the United States of America, as well as an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, passed in the year 1855, empowering the Lieutenant Governor to admit certain enumerated articles from the other North American Colonies duty free; provided the like articles, the produce of this Island, should be admitted duty free into those other Colonies; and complaining that the like articles, when imported from the United Kingdom, the other British Colonies and Foreign Countries, are liable to duty; and that the Treaty clashes with the provisions of several existing Commercial Treaties with other Countries, beg leave to report, that after a full and careful examination as to what would be the effect of the establishment of a similar Reciprocity between Great Britain, her other Colonies and Foreign Countries, and with this Island, in the articles enumerated in the Treaty with the United States, as well as those articles mentioned in the eighth section of the Revenue Act of the last Session, passed on the 14th of April, 1856, being the growth or production of Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, or Newfoundland,—are of opinion, that the views of Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies should be carried out, and that a Bill should be prepared by the Government, and submitted to the Legislature at its next meeting, to give effect to the system of Reciprocity, by the admission of the articles mentioned in the Treaty with the United States, those from other Foreign Countries, and from Great Britain and the other Colonies not mentioned in the present Revenue Act; provided the like articles be admitted duty free from this Island into those Countries.

His Excellency and the Board having taken the foregoing Report into their consideration, were pleased to approve of the same.

In instructing you to bring their Lordships' suggestions before your Council, I have to express the hope that they will be the more readily carried into effect by the local Government, as no practical inconvenience is likely to arise from their adoption.

I am directed by the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 10th instant, transmitting, for the information of this Board, by direction of Mr. Secretary Labouchere, copy of a Despatch from the Lieut. Governor of Prince Edward Island, enclosing a Minute of the Executive Council of that Colony, having reference to Mr. Labouchere's Circular Despatch of the 15th July, 1856, on the subject of the alterations in the Colonial Tariffs, which were rendered necessary by the Reciprocity Treaty with the United States (1854), and the subsequent Acts of the North American Provinces, providing for the mutual free exchange of certain of their products.

although professedly acquiescing in the views of with the commercial policy or the treaty obligathe Secretary of State, limits the extension of tions of the United Kingdom. the tariff privileges which are now enjoyed in Prince Edward Island, by the United States and the other North American Provinces, to the case inapplicability of the limitation in question is of countries who shall confer reciprocal privileges on the trade of that possession.

This limitation would entirely defeat two of the principal objects aimed at in the recommendation of the Secretary of State, viz:—

- 1. The reconciliation of the Colonial Tariffs with the Treaty obligations of the Home Government.
- 2. The extension to the trade of the United Kingdom of the privileges enjoyed by the other North American Provinces, and by the United States.

Several of the treaties at present subsisting between Great Britain and foreign States contain a stipulation of unconditional most favored nation treatment; and the countries in question are therefore entitled to claim for their produce the lowest duties charged by the Colonial Tariffs, independently of any corresponding concession on their side to the trade of the British possessions.

This stipulation, although at first sight, perhaps, inconsistent with abstract ideas of commercial equity, is in accordance with the deliberate policy of this country, and rests, for its justification, on the opinion of Her Majesty's Government, that commercial restrictions, which are not necessary for fiscal purposes, recoil on the country which imposes them; and that in the present state of the national progress the interests of trade are better served even by one sided freedom than by the retaliation of injuries.

So far, therefore, as foreign countries are concerned, the condition of reciprocity, proposed T. F. Elliot, Esqr., &c. &c. &c.

As regards the trade of this country, the still more obvious.

It need hardly be stated that the British Tariff cannot be made to depend upon the arrangements which the commercial requirements of the North American Colonies and the United States of America may render expedient.

Amongst the articles included in the free list inserted in the Reciprocity Treaty, 1854, there are more than one upon which the remission of duty is totally out of the question, under the existing system of taxation in this country. My Lords would more particularly refer to the case of tobacco, the duty upon which yields an annual revenue of nearly £4,000,000.

With regard to several other articles included in the list, viz: cheese, butter, tallow, timber, and fruits, the colonies are still protected against foreign competition by differential duties; but under the present policy of this country, any change that may be made in these duties is more likely to be in the direction of equalizing the duties on foreign and colonial produce, than towards a remission of duty upon colonial produce alone.

My Lords consider that it is important that the attention of the Lieut. Governor should be called to the inadequacy of the recommendation contained in the Minute of the Executive Council, to meet the views of Her Majesty's Government, in order that, before the proposed Bill to give effect to that Minute be submitted to the Legislature of Prince Edward, the subject may receive the further consideration of the Council.

SIR-

In compliance with your request respecting the petition of the inhabitants of Rollo Bay and Sheep Pond, having called a meeting of the inhabitants of that locality on Friday, 25th ult., in order to ascertain the condition of the present roads, and also the necessity of having them altered, my description of which is as follows:-

I commenced my reconnoitre at Sheep Pond, and from thence to John Deagle's eastern line, a distance of about one and a half-miles, which is already tolerably passable for carriages; and the distance from thence in a straight direction to the landing place at Rollo Bay is about sixty chains, crossing clear fields, with the exception of a few chains; and from the said landing place the old chapel road extends to the main post road. The aforesaid John Deagle had stated that he would willingly give a right of way through his farm—a distance of about twenty chains—had it not been for the trouble of fencing the same. At the said J. Deagle's eastern boundary the present road forms a right angle by following the said line to the cliff, a distance of from fifty to sixty chains, and then forms another angle by following the bank from thence to the said landing place.

As regards the necessity of the road, it is carnestly solicited by all the farmers in that settlement except three out of twenty and three. The objecting party owns about thirty-three None of the said twenty and three yeomen's lands extend to the main post road except one of the objecting parties' lands, appears that the altering of the road would be equally beneficial to the objecting parties.

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Estimate and report of repairs required to be done at the Jail of Prince County.

To the Hon. Colonial Secretary.

Sir.—In answer to yours of the 6th inst., requesting me to send in an estimate of the expense of the repairs and improvements recommended in a former report of mine on St. Eleanor's Jail—I beg to state that, as nearly as I am able to judge the prices of labour and material in that

locality, they would cost nearly as follows:-

Jail yard fence secured by new cedar posts, not more than ten feet apart, all around the yard; the posts to be not less than ten inches diameter at the small end, flattened on one side, and set into the ground 4½ feet; the posts to run up 3 feet higher than the present fence, and to receive three-inch planking, put on horizontally, and properly secured with seven-inch spikes, so as to make the fence three feet higher; the brow all refitted, including all materials,

Taking down the chimneys, and rebuilding them with fireplaces in the basement,

including all materials,

New wooden or tin spouts and conductors to the building, at 1s. 6d. per foot, say 200 feet, at 1s. 6d.,

To the Hon. the Colonial Secretary.

Sir—Having, in compliance with your directions, examined the Jail in Charlottetown, and consulted the Jailer, Mr. Harvie, concerning what (if any) repairs were required in and about the said buildings during the ensuing year,—

I beg to report that the high fence enclosing the criminals' yard is in a very tottering condition, and should be taken down, and a new fence or wall erected in a strong and durable

manner.

The flooring and sleepers of the whole of the basement story, with the exception of one room or ward, are become quite decayed and rotten, and will require to be renewed throughout.

The brow round the top of the fence enclosing the debtors' yard will also require to be repaired in several places.

The whole of the outside of the building is perishing for want of paint, and should have two coats, and two or three rooms require painting inside.

Indian Commissioners' Report.

CHARLOTTETOWN, March 17, 1857.

Sir.—

We beg leave to forward herewith an annual account of disbursements to and on behalf of the sick and indigent Indians of the Colony, and desire to acknowledge our gratitude on their behalf to your Excellency and to the other branches of the Legislature for the measure of relief thus far imparted to them.

We have to inform your Excellency that, with a view to test the disposition of the ablebodied Indian to habits of agricultural industry, in the month of May last we procured from the gentlemen representing the respective Officers of Her Majesty's Ordnance in this Island, permission for the Indians to occupy ten acres of ground, reserved for ordnance purposes, on Lot or Township No. 48, near to the Harbour's Mouth, as a potatoe plantation; and where, being supplied by us with seed, together with implements and food, several families succeeded in planting about thirty bushels, which yielded a fair increase. What remained after being consumed were, on the setting in of the frost, deposited under ground; two of the families concerned having respectively greenhoused twenty and thirty bushels each, designed for seed the coming Thus far our object has been fully gained. The voluntary appropriation of so large a proportion of the fruit of their first essay for the next year's seed amply demonstrates the hold which the subject had taken on their minds. In our opinion, it only remains to follow up what has been, apparently, so auspiciously begun; in order to which, we unhesitatingly appeal to your Excellency and to the other branches of the Legislature for the necessary means to be placed within the reach of all parties for the purpose, to enable the Commissioners to carry out a more extended system of relief to their sick and indigent, and to provide locations for planting detachments of these people wherever the necessary conveniences and appliances might be found, avoiding any interference with the rights of other persons. In the possession of these facilities the Commissioners would be enabled to put forth increased efforts in behalf of those children of the forest.

It may be known to your Excellency that there are several large tracts of land in different parts of the Island set apart, from time to time, for the use of the Indians by the Executive Government; two of these are situated on Townships 15 and 55. It is to be observed that the one on Lot 15 was, at the time, and hath since continued in the actual possession of certain French inhabitants, who would, doubtless, require to be compensated for their improvements; the tract on Lot 55 is inconveniently situated, and otherwise valueless to the parties thus benevolently cared for. Provided these respective tracts could be realized, and their proceeds invested in the purchase of more suitable positions, doubtless much of advantage might reasonably be expected to result therefrom.

We regret our inability at present to particularly report on the tract on the Morell, set apart by the Hon. Charles Worrell, in 1842, for the exclusive use of certain Indian families, and from which they had become dispossessed. We hope it will be in our power to do this on a future occasion. In explanation of the excess appearing in our expenditure over the grant, we have to observe that the utmost care and caution was adhered to in every case where relief was afforded, and that in none of the instances could we have conscientiously shrunk from dispensing it. A less sum than the gross amount, we respectfully suggest, will not suffice for the present year's grant, separate provision being at the same time made to relieve us of that excess.

COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, March 24, 1856.

TO THE ROAD CORRESPONDENT.

SIR,—The grant of £30 for the outer block for Ellis River Bridge will not rebuild it. The block and two spaces make 168 feet of the bridge. On the 21st I put it up for sale, and the lowest bid was £68, to rebuild that part of the bridge then. I did not sell the bridge until I hear from you. (Will it be repaired or rebuilt?) The South-West bridge and Haldimand River bridge were both sold according to money voted for them. The people of Lot 16 directed me to write you to see if the Government will grant a few pounds more to complete the South-West River bridge; and some of them will build the remaining part of this bridge, and will wait until the next Session for the balance of the contract. This would be of great advantage to the country.

Letter of the Postmaster General to the Lieutenant Governor

regarding the duties of his Department, and the inadequacy of the Salaries of himself and his Assistant.

GENERAL POST OFFFICE, Charlottetown, March 18, 1857.

Sir,—I had the honor, last year, to bring under your Excellency's notice the inadequacy of the remuneration paid to the Assistant in this office, and I again take the liberty to submit for your Excellency's consideration the same subject, together with other matters, which will require the interference of your Excellency to place the department in this Colony on such a footing as will tend to prevent disarrangement, and to insure a correct carrying out at all times all its details, which, as it is now situated, may be interrupted at any moment, and thereby cause such confusion as could not easily be corrected.

I need not state to your Excellency that the business of the General Post Office of a Colony can only be correctly conducted by persons conversant with all the details and minutia of the department, as well as a knowledge of the regulations and requirements of other countries, and places to which letters are addressed, or through which correspondence pass to its destination.

The business of the General Post Office in this Colony has, to this time, been carried on by incessant labour, toil and attention, by two persons; and it has been performed by a constant application to business of from eleven to fourteen hours every day, without any relaxation whatever; and generally, two or three days in each week, eighteen and sometimes twenty hours are occupied out of the twenty-four. And the business has so increased that one person cannot perform the duties even for a day; and if, from any occurrence from ill health or otherwise should take place, inconvenience would arise that could not easily be overcome or corrected. The time has, therefore, arrived when a second Assistant should be provided, and the salary fixed on such a liberal scale as will ensure a continuance of the services of the person appointed. The duties of the department, which has been faithfully performed, need only be named to your Excellency to show that the sum paid for the services required is a mere pittance; and while every article of consumption has risen in price from fifty to one hundred per cent., and every description of labour in the same proportion, the remuneration to the Officers in the Post Office is placed on the lowest scale. I will take the liberty to point out to your Excellency the peculiar position of the department in this Island, that you may be made aware of the responsibility of the party holding the office of Postmaster General, and the labour that has been performed during the last year.

From the incompetency of the greater number of the country postmasters, many of whom are incapable of keeping any account, and cannot fill up a single paper correctly; and the inadequacy of the remuneration paid to those who could be taught the details necessary, but which would require their constant attendance in their respective offices. The forward system, as carried out in other Colonies, has not nor cannot be safely introduced, as its adoptation would require the services of some twenty persons, capable of corresponding with three or four offices, and managing two or three way offices each, and so situated on the several mail routes as to

afford proper accommodation, thus throwing the responsibility, in a great measure, on the Colony, and making each particular postmaster accountable for the postage collected in his locality. Instead of this, all the unpaid correspondence received from other countries and places, and paid letters sent out of the Island, form a gross charge against the Postmaster General, and has to be divided amongst sixty-seven way offices, and collected in sums of the smallest amount in Charlottetown. During the last year six thousand six hundred mails have been made up in this office, and the same number received. A specific and detailed entry of each mail, both inward and outward, has to be kept; and of those mails, so made up, seven hundred are forwarded out of this Island, and the same received, forming a gross charge against the Postmaster General of over eleven hundred and seventy pounds, to be divided and collected as before stated.

After informing your Excellency of these particulars, you will not be surprised at the number of hours required every day to perform the duties of the department; but in addition to what I have stated, every paper from the country offices has to be examined, checked and corrected, and their quarterly amount made up, and vouchers prepared and sent to each office to be completed. Nor will your Excellency believe that, even with the greatest care, the sum so charged

can be collected without a loss of two or three per cent. at least.

Mr. Desbrisay, during the last two years, has only been paid one hundred and twenty pounds currency—eighty pounds sterling per year—for the service performed by him. I, therefore, have to solicit, in common justice, that he may be paid sixty pounds, to make up his salary one hundred and fifty pounds per annum for these years; and for the labour I have done I was nominally paid three hundred and fifty pounds for the last year, but which does not really exceed three hundred, or two hundred pounds sterling, after allowing for the loss I sustain in collecting. In every arrangement for the transmission of the mails I have studied the convenience of the country districts, and have thereby caused much additional labour by awaiting the arrival of country mails, that no delay may take place in the transmission of their correspondence.

After the statements I have made, I feel assured that your Excellency will see that the sum paid both to Mr. Desbrisay and myself, are quite an insufficient remuneration for our services, and I have taken the liberty minutely to submit all these particulars for your Excellency's consideration; and, in conclusion, I must beg to state to your Excellency that the duties of the department cannot be satisfactorily performed, to afford the accommodation the public require, or insure a punctual transmission of the country correspondence, without much extra labour; and if the interests of the Colony demand the persons performing so important a duty to sacrifice every hour of their time, a very liberal salary should be paid, and every hour's extra service fully remunerated.

Extract of Minute of Council as to proposal of the Electric Telegraph Company.

Council Chamber, January 15, 1857.

The Hon. Colonial Secretary laid before the Board, the following communication, received

by telegraph from St. John, N. B., addressed to the Colonial Secretary, viz:-

"The New York, Newfoundland and London Telegraph Company, being desirous of meeting the wishes of the inhabitants of Prince Edward Island, are willing to establish for business, during the winter months, the otherwise unremunerative offices at Cape Traverse and Cape Tormentine, provided your Government grant to them the sum of three hundred pounds sterling per annum for fifty years—the Company undertaking to keep the cable across the Straits of Northumberland in effective working order during that period."

His Excellency and the Board having given the subject matter of the foregoing communication due consideration, the Colonial Secretary was directed to state in reply that the Government will agree to remunerate the operators for any incidental expense that may be incurred in fitting up the two offices for this winter, provided they are established forthwith; but, as regards the grant required for fifty years, that proposal must be submitted to the Legislature, which shall receive the recommendation of the Government; and further, it is expected that all communications between the two offices will be forwarded free of any charge.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honor to convey to you the Report of my Inspectorial Examinations made during the past year, from February 25th, 1856, to the 21st ultimo.

In consequence of the step taken by the Executive Council in relieving me of the office of Inspector of Schools on the 21st February instead of the first of May next as I requested, and also the inclemency of the weather in the month of January, and the state of my health during that and the succeeding month, to which the medical certicate already placed in your hands testifies, I have been prevented from finishing my annual circuit, and can only lay a partial report before your Board. In these circumstances I am unable, as in former Reports, to give the complete number of Schools that have been in operation during the whole or part of the past year, and a tabular statement of the number of children receiving the benefits of education, and studying the various branches. Had I been permitted to finish my year's work, it was my intention to have given a comparative table of the statistics for the years during which I have held office, in order to shew the great increase in the number of schools, and in the number of children who have profited by the provisions of the Free Education Act, and also of the greatly augmented proportion of those receiving instruction in such branches as geography and grammar.

In my last Report I confined myself to statistics, and remarks on the various branches, but in the following pages I have reverted to the plan adopted on a previous occasion of giving a special report on each school, as I found this method productive of much good in stimulating many of the teachers to treater energy and faithfulness, though it exposed me to revengeful and calumnious attacks from a few.

The two most note-worthy events in the Educational history of the past year are, the establishment of an Orphan School for destitute children, and a Normal School, for the training of teachers. The former was opened in the Spring of 1856, and is conducted by a person well qualified for such a situation. The attendance has not hitherto been very large, being 26 for the first quarter, 18 for the second, and the same number for the third. The children at present attending are beginners; a few of them besides learning to read, are being taught writing and cyphering; but the very irregular attendance, so common, and seemingly so unavoidable amongst children of this class, is the greatest obstacle the teacher has to contend against in her arduous endeavours to impart to them the elements of education.

On the 22d July, 1856, shortly after the arrival in the Colony of the person appointed as Master of the Normal School, one department of that Institution was opened, namely, the students class in the Board Room of the Central Academy, the Normal School Buildings not being then ready for occupancy. The Normal School was formally opened in presence of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, on the 1st October, and on the following day, boys names began to be enrolled.

The Legislature having provided that one of the Charlottetown Female Schools should be incorporated with the Normal School, the Female School of King Square, was removed with its teacher to that Institution on the 20th of the same month, and put under the charge of the master of the Normal School.

The Statistics of the Normal School at the end of the quarter beginning October 1, were as follows:—

On the 22d July, 22 Students, male and female, were entered, and completed their term on the 30th October. Four of these, after having been unsuccessful in obtaining Licence as Teachers at the first Examination, returned home—the following table will shew after what period of attendance, the remainder of those who, up to this time have received Licence, were approved of by the Board:

The Second Session for Students commenced November 3. I regret that I am unable to give the exact number of Students who were then enrolled, not having been furnished since that date, as Super-intendent of the Normal School with any statement from the Master, of the number of Students, their attendance, or progress.

The Normal School in its present state of operation is not carrying out the end which such an Institution is intended to fulfil. Wherever a Normal School has been established, it has been found necessary to provide for the special instruction of the Students in those branches which they will afterwards be required to teach. It is essential to the successful working of such an Institution, that there be at least one Master or Tutor, whose office it is to give instruction to the Students, not in the art of communicating, but in those branches in which their previous study has left them deficient. If this be requisite in other parts of the world, it is surely much more so in a Colony where the educational advantages of young men have hitherto been so limited. This very important feature has not been directly specified in the Normal School Act, but it is implied in the whole spirit of the 6th clause of that Act; for how can young men be taught "the art of communicating the several branches of common School Education" if they themselves be ignorant of those branches. Until some direct provision is made for their special instruction by the appointment of a second Master as above stated, the young people who have made choice of teaching as a profession, and who are obliged to be at considerable expence in supporting themselves in Charlottetown while attending the Normal School, have not full justice done them.

In concluding this my last Report of the Inspection of the Schools of this Colony, it affords me no small pleasure to state, that a very marked improvement is apparent in the vast majority of the Schools since my first visit. This improvement is manifested in the superior order and arrangement adopted in School management; in the intelligence of the pupils; in the method of communicating instruction, and in the zeal, diligence, and faithfulness of the Teachers; while the decided advance in the style and furniture of new School-houses evinces the warm interest felt in Educational matters by parents and teachers. In no part of the country has the spirit of progress been so active, and the desire of self-improvement among the teachers so vigorous and energetic as in Belfast and the surrounding Districts. More

than a year ago, the teachers in that locality formed themselves into an Association or Institute, which has for its object the mutual improvement of its members, and the advancement of their schools. Detachments of the Members are deputed to visit the schools of their fellow-members, and to make a report at the monthly meeting of the Institute, on the state of the schools, and methods they saw pursued by the teachers. All the departments of school management are thus discussed at these meetings, and each member brings to bear upon the various subjects the results of his experience and reading. There is also a Library of useful and instructive works, most of which relate to the theory and practice of education, to which all the members have access. The important advantages of an Institute so conducted are very obvious, and the trustees and parents in the neighbourhood have shewn their appreciation of its results by expressing their satisfaction at the marked improvement visible in the schools. The success which has attended the exertions of the Belfast Teachers' Institute is a most cheering example and encouragement to teachers in other parts of the country who are anxious to advance in their profession.

Although this Report is already so voluminous, I would crave permission in one word to express my sincere and cordial thanks for the warm-hearted hospitality I have everywhere received in the country. Wherever my future lot may be cast, I shall ever cherish with gratitude and pleasure, the recollection of the courtesy and kindness which was accorded to me, a stranger, in travelling over Prince Edward Island.

Downing Street, 17th October, 1856.

Sir,

Her Majesty's Government have had under their consideration the Act passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island on the 14th April last, "for "Raising a Revenue, and to consolidate and amend "several Acts therein mentioned."

This Act being in operation, Her Majesty's Government will not recommend that the consent of the Crown should be withheld from it. The Order, in Council, leaving it to its operation, will accordingly be passed at the next Council.

At the same time, I enclose the copy of a Report from the Commissioners of Customs, pointing out, that although the exigencies of Prince Edward Island may be such as to require rigorous Laws, there are clauses in this Act imposing regulations much more stringent than any contained in the Imperial Customs Acts, which are likely to create dissatisfaction on the part of the shipowners and merchants of this Kingdom.

I request you to call the attention of your Executive Council to these observations when the time arrives for submitting the usual measure for raising a Revenue for the year, to the deliberation of the Colonial Legislature.

To the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury:

Your Lordships having referred to us for any observations we might think proper to make thereon, the annexed Act of the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, entitled, "An Act for raising a revenue, "and to consolidate and amend several Acts there-"in mentioned."

We report-

That we have examined the said Act, and see no objection to the several provisions so far as this department is concerned.

We beg, however, to draw Your Lordship's attention to certain clauses which impose regulations much more stringent than any of those contained in the Imperial Customs' Acts, and although the exigencies of the Colony may be such as to require rigorous laws, we apprehend that vessels, trading from this country to Prince Edward Island, would be subject to consequences arising from those enactments, likely to create dissatisfaction on the part of the Ship Owners and Merchants of the United Kingdom.

The Sections referred to are the 14th, 15th, and 20th.

The 14th Section subjects goods of every kind, not duly entered, to seizure and forfeiture whilst remaining on board a vessel, and does not even specify a time for such entry, although the words, "remain on board such ship not having been duly entered," would seem to imply that the power is not to be exercised, nor the forfeiture to ensue, until after the lapse of 24 hours from the arrival of the Ship,

the time prescribed in the preceding sections for report and entry.

The 15th Section forfeits goods landed after Report, and per margin after Entry, unless contained in the Report.

This enactment is severe, as it would appear that a Consignee properly entering his consignments, and bringing them to account for duty, might still forfeit his goods, because the master had neglected to report thereon.

We have further to observe, that up to the passing of the 16th and 17th Vic., cap. 107, a provision similar to that we now draw attention to, was contained in the Imperial Customs' Acts, but was then repealed for the reason above assigned.

The 20th Section subjects a ship to detention, in case the Master or owner is prosecuted for a violation of the law, as a security to answer the judgement which may be given. The provision might not be objectionable as regards the owner, if he being sole

owner, had rendered himself liable to prosecution, but a proposition to detain a vessel to abide the final judgment in a prosecution against the master does not seem to us equitable or expedient.

We would further remark, that by several sections of the Act in question, Oaths are required to be taken by the Masters of vessels and by the Importers and Exporters of goods, a practice which has for many years been discontinued in the United Kingdom, where declarations have been substituted for oaths in all matters relating to the Customs.

In other respects there does not appear to be any material difference between the Act under consideration and the Imperial Law, except as regards regulations of a local character, with which it would not be expedient for Her Majesty's Government to interfere.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE LUNATIC ASYLUM.

The Trustees of the Lunatic Asylum in presenting their Annual Report, beg to observe, that the contrivances hitherto in use for warming the cells of Lunatics, are inadequate to the purpose, and they are desirous of remedying that which is a great grievance.

They beg to state, that the obedience to the requisitions of the Executive Government, several lunatics and some paupers have been admitted to the benefits of the Institution at the charge of the Government.

That this practice has been proved to be highly beneficial, is shewn by the Medical Report, which demonstrates the very great advantage of early assistance in cases of lunacy, several parties having been relieved, who, without immediate assistance, might have become confirmed lunatics.

Gentlemen,

In compliance with the regulations prescribing my duties, I have again the honor of presenting your Board with the Medical Statistics of the Lunatic Asylum, in which are detailed the admissions, discharges, and general efficiency of the Institution for the last twelve months.

On inspecting the accompanying Chart, it will appear that the total number of Lunatics receiving medical treatment during the past year amounts to 40. Of these 27 are lunatics and 13 paupers; the latter comprising many medical and surgical cases of importance.

Of the lunatics 17 remained at last Report, and 10 have been admitted during the year; among the lunatics 5 deaths have occurred, 4 males and 1 female, viz.: 2 from consumption, 2 from fits, and one from old age.

Of the total number of lunatics, 7 have recovered, 4 males and 3 females; 8 are registered as much

improved, 3 improved, and 5 not improved (being all chronic cases), and deemed incurable, while 19 still remain in the house.

On inspecting the yearly operations of the Asylum, it will be remarked that the number of recoveries are nearly all comprised in the recent admissions; and again, that nearly all those labouring under recent attacks have recovered, which sufficiently shows the immense advantage of early application and treatment.

Of the paupers 2 have been cut off by death, one a female at the age of 70, having become paralytic, was attacked with erysipelas in the limbs, which ended in mortification, and proved fatal; the other a male having become paralytic in his limbs, &c. died of decline at the age of 66 years.

The remaining paupers are all helpless and incapable either from old age, or some constitutional or surgical ailment of rendering service to themselves or the Institution.

Allow me to make one suggestion at this time in regard to the heating of the building: the present brick furnices have been fully tried, found inefficient and condemned, and for the present we have been obliged to adopt isolated stoves for the different sitting-rooms or halls, but their influence does not extend either to the basement cells, or private rooms.

From information recently received respecting the heating of Insane Hospitals by steam, radiating heat in horizontal chambers in the cellar, through iron tubes;—I am led to conclude, that in point of economy, convenience, and effect, no method, on that principle (which has become quite common), combines so many essentials as that of hot water circulating in cast iron pipes of from 4 to 6 inches diamater.
