

The undersigned, Pierre Gosselin, Returning Officer for the Electoral Division of The Laurentides, being duly sworn, deposes and says and makes return, that in obedience to Her Majesty's Writ, dated the first day of September last, and after the notices and formalities, required by the law, had been given and observed, he proceeded to the registration of the votes in the said Electoral Division of The Laurentides, on the twenty-seventh and twenty-eighth of October last, and that on the 29th of the same month, the day appointed for the Proclamation, all the Poll Books not having been returned to me, I postponed the Proclamation to the following day, and for the same reason from day to day until the fourth of November instant, on which said day, not having yet received the Poll Books for Les Escoumins, and my powers ceasing on the said day, in virtue of the said Writ, I have made my present Return.

All the Poll Books returned to me the said fourth day of November, which were all the different Poll Books of the said division of The Laurentides less that of Les Escoumins, as aforesaid, gave two thousand five hundred and nine votes taken and registered in favor of Marc Pascal de Salle Laterrière, one of the Candidates at the said Election, and one thousand one hundred and thirty-four votes taken and registered in favor of Adoph Gagnon, the other Candidate, giving to the said Marc Pascal De Salle Laterrière, a majority of one thousand three hundred and seventy-five votes over the said Adolphe Gagnon as it appears by the Poll Books which accompany my present return; but that notwithstanding this majority in favor of the said Marc Pascal De Salle Laterrière, not having all the Poll Books as aforesaid, and that of Les Escoumins, being wanting, I have not deemed it in my power to proclaim him, although I am informed that there are not at the said place called Les Escoumins more than one hundred Electors.

I make my present return a special one in order that thereupon whatever is by law required to be done may be done.

His Excellency Sir Edmund Walker Head, Baronet, Governor General of British North America, and Captain General and Governor in Chief in and over the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and the Island of Prince Edward, and Vice Admiral of the same, being seared in the Chair on the Throne, the Speaker commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, to let the Assembly know "it is His Excellency's pleasure that they attend him "immediately in this House,"

Who being come,

His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to open the Session by a Gracious Speech to both Houses.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

The time of year has arrived when the Country again requires your services; and I have called you together in the full belief that every effort will be made by you to promote the good government and increase the prosperity of Canada.

By the blessing of Providence that prosperity has met with no check: the restoration of peace to Europe, and the hope that good will and friendly feeling will continue to prevail on this continent, inspire me with confidence in the future. The increased cultivation of the soil, and the growth of our trade as shewn by the Official Returns, afford the best proof of rapid progress.

Among the outward signs of such progress, the opening of the Grand Trunk Railway from St. Thomas in the East, to Stratford, must hold a prominent place, great Cities like Quebec, Montreal and Toronto which have hitherto been separated in winter by a waste of snow, now enjoy daily intercourse one with the other.

With regard to the internal communications of the Country, I have taken measures for examining the Valley of the Ottawa, that great River in which Upper and Lower Canada are equally interested, with a view to ascertain what facilities its course may hereafter afford for inland traffic. The final report of the survey of this district is not yet received, but when made will deserve your most attentive consideration.

At any rate the tract which is on three sides bounded by Lake Ontario, the Ottawa and Lake Huron, has appeared to me one of vast importance to Canada. Its settlements will add breadth to the Province, and its lands are, I am informed, such as may fairly attract the industry and reward the toil of a large population. Steps have accordingly been taken to intersect parts of this district by roads, and to offer, along the line of such roads, lands on easy terms to actual settlers.

I entertain little doubt that the banks of the St. Maurice, in Lower Canada, may be advantageously dealt with in the same manner.

Exertions have been made to diffuse in Europe a knowledge of Canada and its resources. On these and other grounds I venture to anticipate in the coming season a considerable increase in the Emigration from Europe. Such an increase must be of inestimable advantage to the Province. Those who are already in occupation of land will receive a supply of labour on easier terms, and the wealth of the whole community will be augmented by the application of fresh industry to the profitable development of our real capital, the soi! now covered by our forests.

I congratulate you on the success of the Line of Steamers which, in the course of last summer, have performed the voyage between Liverpool on the one hand, and Quebec and Montreal on the other. I shall rejoice to see a weekly line established by this route. As it is, the character of Canada, and the advantages of the St. Lawrence as a channel of communication with the old world, have become much better known. To attract to our shores a larger portion of the passenger traffic from Europe is an object of high importance to our commerce.

A sum exceeding £300,000, derived from the proceeds of the Clergy Reserves, has already been distributed among the Municipalities of *Upper Canada*, in pursuance of the Acts of 1855 and 1856; and a further amount will be in like manner available in the course of the present year.

The measures for carrying out the commutation of the Seignorial Tenure have been steadily pursued, and I see no reason to think that any material difficulties remain to be overcome.

A communitation from the Secretary of State will inform you that Her Majesty's Government have determined to submit certain questions connected with he affairs and territory of the *Hudson's* Bay Company to the consideration of a Committee of the House of Commons.

Knowing how deeply Canada may be affected by this enquiry, I have lost no time in taking measures for securing the attendance in England of a gentleman unconnected with party politics, in all respects competent to afford information, and watch over the interests of the Province

As Commander in Chief of the Militia, I cannot on this occasion forbear to acknowledge the continued zeal, energy and loyalty of the people of this Province; the readiness with which Volunteer Corps have been formed under the Acts of 1855 and 1856, affords the surest pledge of your determination as Canadians to protect and transsit to your children the blessings of a free soil, and a constitutional Government which God has bestowed upon you.

I turn now to certain measures which appear to me to require especial attention in the course of the Session about to commence.

I recommend you most earnestly to take steps for ensuring the proper construction and regulation of Prisons throughout the Province. The evils of defective classification and over-crowding have been urged by several Grand Juries in such a manner as to prove that too many of our Cities and Counties suffer from the want of systematic attention to the moral and physical welfare of prisoners.

I cannot speak too strongly on this matter, in our Common Goals the young are corrupted, and from them the adult criminal is cast loose upon society unrestrained and unimproved.

I shall rejoice if, with the supervision of the Gaols, you can combine the exercise of a proper control over other public institutions which require constant watchfulness and attention.

A measure will be submitted to you to provide for the repeal of the Lunatic Asylum tax levied in *Upper Canada*, inasmuch as it differs in character and in its mode of collection from the rest of our Provincial taxation.

I shall cause to be laid before you a measure calculated to make justice in Lower Canada more easily accessible to the people at large, and to secure the codification of the law and procedure in civil matters in that section of the Province. I trust too that you will find it expedient to sanction measures for carrying out more completely the improvements of the law already commenced in Upper Canada.

The time has come when I have thought it right to submit to you a Bill for improving the organization and increasing the efficiency of the C vil Service in Canada. With a view to attain these objects, I am anxious that so far as possible admission to the public officers shall depend on competence tested by impartial examination rather than on favour or regard for individuals.

You have ascertained by experience the usefulness of the prizes offered by the Agricultural Societies in *Upper* and *Lower Canada*—I shall be glad if you can extend the same principle of encouragement to arts and manufactures, and can stimulate the ingenuity of our mechanics and artizans by distinctions of the same character.

A Bill will be laid before you which may prove to be the first step towards admitting to the full rights and duties of British subjects the more educated and civilized of the Aboriginal Indians yet dwelling on their own lands. I feel a deep anxiety for the welfare of this people, and I shall endeavour to adopt measures such as will at once secure their interests and diminish the obstacles to the complete settlement of the country now offered by the tracts reserved for their use.

## Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

The accounts of the last year will be submitted to you. I trust you will find that due economy has been observed in the expenditure of the public funds, and that the mode of accounting for such funds has been improved by the amended

system of audit adopted in the Inspector General's department. The increase in the revenue has, I conceive, fulfilled the expectation held out by the Inspector General in the course of last session.

The estimates for the current year will be laid before you at the earliest moment, consistent with their due consideration.

Honorable Gentlemen, and Gentlemen:

The Act altering the constitution of the Legislative Council having been sanctioned by Her Most Gracious Majesty, the steps required for the first election of Members of the Council were duly taken by me. The result has been that twelve Legislative Councillors, elected by the people, are already entitled to sit and vote as such. Although the constitutional position and functions of the Legislative Council remain exactly what they were, yet I believe that the consciousness of deriving a portion of its power from the confidence of the people will add to the consideration of the whole body, and will uphold it in the sober and dignified discharge of its most important duties.

I have now only to leave in your hands the various grave and weighty matters which require calm discussion and anxious deliberation.

His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to retire, and the Legislative Assembly withdrew.

To thank His Excellency for his congratulations on the success of the Line of Steamers which, in the course of last Summer, have performed the voyage between Liverpool on the one hand, and Quebec and Montreal on the other; to assure His Excellency that this House will rejoice with him to see a Weekly Line established by this route, and to agree with His Excellency that, as it is, the character of Canada and the advantages of the St. Lawrence as a channel of communication with the old world have become much better known, and that to attract to our shores a large portion of the passenger traffic from Europe, is an object of high importance to our commerce.

To express to His Excellency the satisfaction with which this House learns that a sum exceeding £300,000, derived from the proceeds of the Clergy Reserves has already been distributed among the Municipalities of *Upper Canada*, in pur suance of the Acts of the 1855 and 1856, and that a further amount will be in like manner available in the course of the present year.

To convey also to His Excellency an expression of the pleasure it affords this House to be informed that the measures for carrying out the commutation of the Seigniorial Tenure have been steadily pursued, and that His Excellency sees no reason to think that any material difficulties remain to be overcome.

To thank His Excellency for his promise of a communication from the Secretary of State, containing information to the effect that Her Majesty and Government have determined to submit certain questions connected with the affairs and territory of the Hudson's Bay Company, to the consideration of a Committee of the House of Commons, and to express the satisfaction of this House at the intelligence that His Excellency, knowing how deeply Canada may be affected by this enquiry, has lost no time in taking measures for securing the attendance in England of a gentleman unconnected with party politics and in all respects competent to afford information and watch over the interests of the Province.

To thank His Excellency for his acknowledgment, as Commander in Chief of the Militia, of the continued zeal, energy and loyalty of the people of this Province, and for his just appreciation of the readiness with which Volunteeer Corps have been formed under the Acts of 1855 and 1856, as affording the surest pledge of our determination as Canadians to protect and transmit to our children the blessing of a free soil and a constitutional government which God has bestowed upon us.

With respect to certain measures which His Excellency mentions as appearing to him to require special attention in the course of the Session about to commence—to thank His Excellency for his earnest recommendation that steps should be taken for ensuring the proper construction and regulation of Prisons throughout the Province, and to agree with His Excellency that the evils of defective classification and over-crowding have been urged by several Grand Juries in such a manner as to prove that too many of our Cities and Counties suffer from the want of systematic attention to the moral and physical welfare of prisoners.

To admit with His Excellency that it is impossible to speak too strongly on this matter; for, in our common gaols, the young are corrupted, and from them the adult criminal is cast loose upon society unrestrained and unimproved.

To assure His Excellency that we shall rejoice with him if we can succeed in combining with the supervision of the gaols the exercise of a proper control over other public institutions which require constant watchfulness and attention.

To promise His Excellency that the earnest attention of this house will be given to any measure which may be submitted to it providing for the repeal of the

Lunatic Asylum tax levied in *Upper Canada*, a tax which differs, as His Excellency is pleased to remark, in character and in its mode of Collection from the rest of our provincial taxation.

To assure His Excellency, that this House will also consider attentively the measure calculated to make justice in *Lower Canada* more easily accessible to the people at large and to secure the codification of the law and procedure in civil matters in that section of the province, which His Excellency has been pleased to say he will cause to be laid before us, and also the expediency of sanctioning measures for carrying out more completely the improvement of the law already commenced in *Upper Canada*.

To hail with pleasure the announcement that the time has come when His Excellency has thought it right to submit to Parliament a Bill for improving the organization and increasing the efficiency of the civil service in *Canada*, and that with a view to attain these objects His Excellency is anxious that, so far as possible, admission to the public offices shall depend on competence tested by impartial examination rather than on favor or regard for individuals.

To assure His Excellency that, having ascertained by experience the usefulness of the Prizes offered by the Agricultural Societies of *Upper* and *Lower Canada*, we shall rejoice with His Excellency, if the same principle of encouragement can be extended to arts and manufactures, so that the ingenuity of our mechanics and artizans may be stimulated by distinctions of the same character.

To thank His Excellency for the promise that a Bill will be laid before us, which may prove to be the first step towards admitting to the full rights and duties of British subjects the more educated and civilized of the aboriginal Indians yet dwelling on their own lands; and to express sympathy with His Excellency in his deep anxiety for the welfare of this people, and the satisfaction which this House derives from the assurance that it is His Excellency's intention to endeavour to adopt measures such as will at once secure their interests and diminish the obstacles to the complete settlement of the Country now offered by the tracts reserved for their use.

To express the satisfaction of this House at the fact of twelve Legislative Councillors having been elected by the people and being already entitled to sit and vote as such; the Act altering the Constitution of the Legislative Council having been sanctioned by Her Most Gracious Majesty, and the steps-required for the first Election of Members of the Council having been duly taken by His Excellency.

To thank His Excellency for the expression of his belief that, although the constitutional position and functions of the Legislative Council remain exactly what they were, the consciousness of deriving a portion of its power from the confidence of the people will add to the consideration of the whole body, and will uphold it in the sober and dignified discharge of its most important duties.

And to assure His Excellency that the various grave and weighty matters which he has been pleased to leave in our hands shall receive calm discussion and anxious deliberation.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE, Toronto, May 19, 1856.

SIR,

Your are aware of the fact, that before Lord Elgin left Canada, a Bill was

laid before the Legislative Assembly, for the purpose of rendering the Legislative Council elective. This Bill was then in the charge of the Honorable Mr. *Morin*, who having accepted a place on Bench, quitted the Executive Council, and vacated his seat in the Assembly.

2. The Honorable Mr. Cauchon, who succeeded Mr. Morin, as Commissioner of Crown Lands, took up the subject, after full consideration with his colleagues, he withdrew the original Bill, and introduced another, of which the provisions were somewhat different.

The latter measure passed the Legislative Assembly last year by large majorities, but was lost in the Legislative Council.

The second reading was carried in the Legislative Assembly by a majority of 80 to 4; nor did these four Members, as I understand, belong to one party, or oppose the measure on one and the same principle.

- 3. In the present Session, (1856) a similar measure was introduced, and after undergoing some amendments in the Legislative Council, has been passed by both Houses.
- 4. I have now the honor to submit for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure, in pursuance of the Statute 17 and 18 Victoria, Cap. 118, this Bill. I feel it my duty to enter fully on the subject of so important a measure, and I therefore fear that I must trouble you at considerable length in the present despatch.
- 5. It is almost superfluous to argue on the expediency of two Chambers in order to secure full and fair discussion for every legislative measure, and to guard against the haste, which is likely to result from a popular feeling in favor of a particular enactment. This necessity has been pretty well admitted whenever Representative Government is established. A measure may often be said to come forth from the Assembly holding in solution certain noxious elements, likely to be ultimately injurious to those who at the moment clamour for it. What sound Statesmanship requires is, that time should be gained for a Bill in such condition to be subjected to some test or agent; which may, as it were, precipitate and make manifest these latent principles of evil;—If this can be, done and a certain delay interposed, common sense generally regains its strength, and the wishes of the people will probably in the end point in the direction of their real interest.
- 6. The best means for attaining this object may, as I have said, be assumed to be the operation of a second Chamber, under such conditions as give time and opportunity for free and deliberate discussion. Discussion however, to secure its end, must be conducted by men who feel that they have in their hands the power of rejection, when they disapprove, and who are conscious of holding a position in the Community such as will bear them out in temporary opposition at least, to the apparent wishes of the people themselves. On any other terms it is little better than the consideration of a measure by a debating Society or Club.

- 7. The necessary defects of a Legislative Council appointed by the Crown, and the difficulty which exists in remedying them—how little such a Council complies with the conditions of fearless discussion and conscious power—all this is pointed Report of the Queen out in the very able Report of the Privy Council to Her most Grain Council, 50,8,15. cious Majesty, in language much more forcible than any I can employ. Independently of other considerations, the difficulty of finding persons who would be recognized by all parties as fit to hold the position assigned to members of a Legislative Council is, in most Colonies, very great.
- 8. It may be said moreover, that the number of Members usually attending the Legislative Council in Canada has scarcely been sufficient to carry the weight which such a body ought to possess. The annexed papers will give you an opEnclosure No. 1 portunity of judging on this point. It exhibits the number in Return of attendance attendance each day during the Sessions of the years 1850-1-2-3 and 1854. I know that the thin attendance may, on the other hand, be attributed to the want of the sense of self-importance.
- 9. The principal difficulty however, connected with the Constitution of the the Legislative Council, has forced itself on the attention of thinking men, since the introduction of Parliamentary Government in the Colony.

It is clearly felt that the greatest embarrassment might be caused by the rejection of a popular measure by the Legislative Council, and by a consequent pressure on the Crown, through the advisers of the Governor General, to appoint fresh members of that body holding such opinions as would serve to over-rule the previous decision of the majority. The dependence of Ministers on the confidence of the Lower House, as now acknowledged, makes it almost certain that such a pressure would be applied. In England the same risk no doubt exists theoretically, but the more steady action of public opinion, sure in the end to censure Ministers who should abuse such a power, and the character of the House of Lords itself, are practical safeguards against its real exercise. No such safeguards can be said to exist in a Colony.

- 10. It may be alleged indeed, that the Governor of a Colony acting with fairness would refuse the advice given him to offer such a recommendation to the Queen. Cases may be put in which it would without doubt be his duty to do so; and to run all risks; but these cases must be rare exceptions, for according to the theory of "Responsible Government," he must sacrifice his Ministry. Should the popular feeling be strong, it might be very difficult for him to get another, even after a new election. If the Home Government supported him, the quarrel would be with them; if they disapproved of his conduct, he could be of no further service in the Colony.
- 11. Of course a large class of politicians whose opinions are entitled to respect, will meet these arguments by saying that Parliamentary Government in a Colony is an evil in itself, whether this be so or not, that form of Government is now an existing fact, which cannot be helped, and which I believe to have been inevitable. Government against the deliberate wishes of the mass of the people of any

Colony, and above all of the British North American Colonies, had become utterly impossible. Nor do I, looking back at the time, which in Canada preceded the introduction of "Responsible Government," recognize the existence of that peaceful submission on the part of the governed, and that uniformly successful administration on the part of the rulers, which might make us regret the change.

- 12. At the same time there is no doubt that opportunity for consideration and amendment is, in some degree, afforded by the present Legislative Council, and its influence has often been profitably applied. A recent instance of this kind may be found in the Seigniorial Tenure Bill of last year which was virtually re-modelled in the Council. That measure however was one of a peculiar kind; its operation was confined to Lower Canada; it specially affected the interests of many Members of the Legislative Council, and there was every disposition on the part of the Assembly to deal fairly and liberally with any proposed amendments.
- 13. Notwithstanding this and other instances which might be cited, I do not think that the present Legislative Council of *Canada* possesses as a body the independent standing and position which it ought to hold in such a country and which is essential for dealing fairly and impartially with measures coming to it from the Lower House.
- 14. I impute no blame to the existing Members of the Legislative Council. It is a body of the highest respectability; but its defects are inherent in its Beport of Privy constitution, for the reasons pointed out in the Report already referred Council, 1850. to. To quote the words reported to have been employed by the Hon. Mr. McDonald, Attorney General for Upper Canada, in his Speech on the second reading of the measure when last year before the Assembly. "The most conclusive "reason however which should induce the people and the majority of that "House to adopt this reform was the danger to be apprehended from a single "chamber."
- 15. It is pretty certain that in a Colony under Parliamentary Government, the consciousness of power to force the ministers to advise a fresh creation of Members of the Legislative Council might easily end in establishing a government virtually of one chamber, though nominally of two. A government in which the existence of a second House would operate so far as to diminish the sense of responsibility on the part of the Assembly without imposing such further check as would be available on an emergency.
- 16. I must own that in my opinion such a state of things would be far more objectionable than a legislature professedly consisting of one chamber. It would in fact be virtually more "democratic" than any other form which would be suggested. In saying this, I desire to be understood, as applying the word "democratic" to a political condition in which the true interest of the people as it appears to their representatives after full and free discussion, is likely to be over-ruled and controlled by a popular cry or by direct expression of a temporary feeling. Such a state of things would approach much more to government by a Convention, than to government by Representative Institutions, and is supposed o be unknown to the British Constitution.

17. I cannot help thinking that in discussing the policy of an Elective Legislative Council, a good deal of misunderstanding has been occasioned by a contrast or comparison between the Legislative Council of a Colony and two other bodies, the American Senate, and the British House of Peers. In their ordinary legislative functions, all those three political assemblies resemble one another, inasmuch as they all possess the same theoretical power of negativing a bill, or (with certain exceptions) originating a legislative measure. There is no doubt too, that the original form of Representative Governments in the Colonies, was an imitation of the English system, and so far the Legislative Council resembles the House of Lords. But although the legislative action of the three is in some respects the same, each differs from the other two, most materially, in all the means which it employs, and in all the conditions which secure its weight and consideration.

If it appears that the contrivances employed in each one of these cases are wholly impracticable or wholly inapplicable, in the other two the parallel will be of less importance than it is usually assumed to be.

- 18. Let us look at the American Senate. This body is in fact far more than a second chamber, and represents the federal principle of the *United States*. The number of Senators sent by *Rhode Island* is the same as that for the State of *New York*. The same legal influence is exercised by each separate State. Then again the Senators do not represent the people of each State directly; but are sent by its Legislature. Their functions are not entirely—it may be said, they are not principally legislative. They check the appointments made by the President and control his treaty-making power, whilst the limited range of the Federal Government necessarily confines within narrow limits the ordinary legislative action of the Senate. They are, it appears to me, at least as much Executive as Legislative.
- 19. Even without the difference in their sphere of action how could this constitution of a second chamber be imitated in a Colony without the creation in some shape or other of a federal element?—a subject on which it is no business of mine to enter at the present moment, but which implies the creation and the union of more than one subordinate Government.
- 20. If we now turn to the British House of Peers, where are we to find in a Colony the elements of intellectual and social strength which are concentrated in that body? An aristocracy of long standing has been combined with a system which from time to time gleans from the ordinary ranks of society the most acute lawyers, the ablest statesmen and the best financiers of the day, and unites them in one assembly with distinguished military and naval commanders as well as with the heads of an Established Church. To these influences are added the weight of large landed property, and the prestige connected with the historical reputation of certain families, and the respect for rank and station inherited from former times.

- 21. Nothing can be conceived more different from the principle on which the House of Lords is founded than the system on which the American Senate depends for its free and independent action—and nothing can bear less analogy than either of these two does to the state of things which must control the institutions of a Colony under the most favourable circumstances. The mere nomination by the Crown of respectable men, assuming that such nominations were always judiciously made and were not to be influenced by any pressure on the part of the majority of the Legislative Assembly, supplies most imperfectly the weight which attaches to a combination of all those various elements of political influence which exist in the House of Lords. The form is there, but life and substance are wanting—nor can we supply the defect.
- 22. We cannot create an Aristocracy on a sudden, unless we could imitate the feat of those Indian Jugglers who are said to plant the pip and produce the ripe fruit before the eyes of the spectators. Even then it is not clear that, if created, the atmosphere in which it would have to exist, would allow any thing in the nature of an aristocracy to flourish in *Canada*. I need only say that physical proximity is powerful in polictics: whether or not we may regret its action, we cannot alter the geographical facts.
- 23. I believe therefore, that on the whole, no remedy for the defective relation of our Legislative Council to the Assembly can be found, except by having recourse in some shape or other, to popular Election. This source of power can alone supply to the Council, that hold in public opinion, and that consciousness of strength, which will enable it fearlessly to discuss, and, if necessary, to reject an imperfect or imprudent measure.
- 24. The enactments of the present Bill, in the shape in which, after having been amended by the Upper House, it has finally passed both branches of the Legislature, are substantially as follows:—
- 1. The Legislative Council shall, in addition to its present strentgh, be composed of 48 Members, 24 of whom are to be elected by *Lower Canada*, and an equal number by the Western section of the Province.
- 2. The present Councillors shall retain their seats under the conditions prescribed by the Union Act.
  - 3. The new Members shall be elected for 8 years.
- 4. Each Member so elected must be a British Subject, resident in *Canada*, not under 30 years of age, and possessing real property of the clear value of at least £2,000 situated in the Electoral Division, which he represent—Clauses 5 and 6 prescribe that no defaulter, nor person convicted of any infamous crime, nor any Member of the other tranch of the Legislative, shall be eligible—and Clause 7 vacates the seat of a Member, becoming disqualified as above by crime, or by bankruptcy, or by want of qualification.
- 8. The Elective Members are to be added to the Council by twelve at a time, so that the full number will not be elected till after the lapse of six years.

Clause 10, gives the form of the Writs of Election.

Clauses 11 and 12, relate to the functions of the Returning Officers, who are to be chosen from those legally eligible to perform similar duties at the Election of Members of the Assembly.

By Clause 13, the franchise of Electors is declared to be the same as that of those for the Lower House, and the Electoral Divisions are marked out.

14 and 15, prescribe that the Laws now in force, relating to Election of Members of the Legislative Assembly, shall hold good at the Election of Legislative Councillors.

- 16, Marks out the commencement and duration of the time of service.
- 17, Settles the form of oath to be taken by the Legislative Councillors.
- 18, 21. The order in which the Districts are to return Members shall be determined by Lot, and proclamation made accordingly.

Clause 22. Allows resignation of his seat by a Councillor.

- 23, Makes the Members subject to the same laws, as bind the Members of the Lower House, relating to the independence of Parliament.
- 24, Declares that the acceptance of the Speakership of the Legislative Council shall not vacate a seat.
  - 25-28, Provide for the filling up of accidental vacancies.
  - 29, Vests the appointment of Speaker in the Governor.
- 30, Determines that the Councillor who may be Speaker at the passing of this Act shall continue so.
  - 31, Fixes what shall constitute a new Parliament.

The enclosed Copy shews the Bill as at first introduced, with all the changes made in it in both Houses. The first Clause in the original measure, providing that no Councillors should be hereafter appointed by the Crown, was struck out in the Upper House, and the retention of the present Members gives a considerate and conservative character to the measure. As originally passed by the Assembly it did not provide for the gradual introduction of the Elective Members one-fourth at a time, by which means the Elective body will not be constituted for a period, of six years. The qualification too was raised in the Upper House from £1,000 to £2000, and some other changes of a less important character were made.

25.—Besides the objections which have been made to an Elective Legislative Council on the ground of its democratic character, one of a kind entirely opposite has been urged with considerable skill by some of the strongest liberals here and elsewhere. This objection is grounded on the fear lest two elective bodies should if the Ministers were supported by the Crown, neutralize their responsibility to the Representatives of the people in the Lower House. In case of an adverse vote in the latter, it might be asked "which set of representatives are we bound to look to? It is true that the Assembly have no confidence in us, but the Legislative

"Council have. They represent the people as well as the others—why may not

"this confidence balance the mistrust of the other branch? we refuse to resign?"

- 26. If we consider a moment the ground on which rests the necessary responsibility of Ministers to the Commons, I think it will be seen that this difficulty need not be dreaded. The Ministers as advisers of the Crown carry on the ordinary duties of the Executive Government from day to day. These duties cannot be discharged without money, and whichever House, therefore, retains the chief control of money bills and the exclusive power of originating them necessarily must retain the principle check on the Executive Council. As a matter of course the Members of that Council are not free from all responsibility to the Legislative Council or to the Queen, but resignation is inevitable only when that Body which can prevent even the discussion of a money vote, declares its want of confidence in the persons who will have to expend the money.
- 27. Another great anticipated difficulty with an elective Council is the fear of what is vulgarly called "a dead lock" in the Government—that is to say—an obstinate difference of opinion between the two Houses in which neither will yield to the other.
- 28. In the original bill introduced by the Honorable Mr. *Morin* at the beginning of the last Session, it was proposed to meet this apprehension by a power of dissolving the Legislative Council similar to that exercised with regard to the Assembly.
- 29. On further discussion of such a scheme among the Members of the Council it was argued that if the power of dissolution existed to be exercised by the Governor General, usually, as must be presumed on the advice of his Ministers, the same sort of pressure which might now be exercised to procure the appointment of new Legislative Councillors to pass a certain measure, would surely be applied to procure an immediate dissolution of the whole refractory body. Ministers would be threatened with being left in a minority in the Assembly if they did not get the Legislative Council dissolved. An appeal to the people would have to be made under circumstances of considerable excitement, and if the constituencies were not precisely the same, one does not see any limit to the repetition of the process except by the uncertain action of public opinion on the dissolution of both Houses.
- 30. On the other hand if no power of dissolution exists, it may be hoped that the Lower House will be careful in risking a conflict with the Legislative Council. All pressure on the ministry by the majority of the Lower House because a popular measure had been rejected by the Council must probably result in causing a dissolution of the former Body—a process which, however objectionable under such circumstances, would furnish at any rate the desired appeal to the people, and secure some delay. If, after an election under these circumstances, the opinion of the majority of the Legislative Assembly having been confirmed by their constituents, remained unchanged, it seems likely that the Legislative Council would hesitate to oppose further obstacles to the questionable measure, especially as they would feel themselves ultimately dependent on the judgment of the people of the

Province, slowly but surely exercised in modifiying their own body. For let us suppose that even after a demonstration of public opinion in the election of a new Assembly the Upper House did not give way, every one will know that according to the present bill within, at the utmost, two years, one-fourth of the Elective Members must return to their constituents, and that an infusion of public opinion would then probably turn the scale or swell the ranks of the minority. At any rate the delay and discussion requisite for the formation of a deliberate judgment would have been secured.

- 31. I know well, Sir, that in all such arguments as this, the practical objection is—"men's tempers excited by political controversy and stimulated by interest, "may sometimes not allow such provisions as these to work themselves out in "practice, uproar and riot may cut the knot before the experiment is fairly tried "by the regular modification of this Elective Council."
- 32. I cannot answer the objection derived from this contingency. I admit that it has some weight, but in all constitutional arrangements, if one or both parties are determined to bring about a conflict and obstinately abide each by their own views, no prudence can steer the vessel. Any measure like the present is an experiment, and all we can do is to diminish the action of motives likely to provoke such a conflict. We must give such credit to the practical good sense of men trained in Constitutional Government, as to believe that they will rather avoid than seek opportunities for desperate experiments, and the display of unbending obstinacy. The absence of the power to dissolve has at least the merit of keeping the Crown and its Representative out of the quarrel between the two Houses.
- 33. I come now to a point which I know will be much canvassed, and I am far from saying that I consider the present measure faultless with regard to it. It will be seen that the constituents by whom the Legislative Council is to be elected are the same as those empowered to choose the Legislative Assembly, distributed in a different manner, and in larger districts.
- 34. I need not repeat the arguments in favour of different constituencies. But in support of the same constituents for both Houses may be urged the following considerations: If the Council were elected by persons with a higher qualification or one different in kind, such as was proposed in the Report of the Committee of the Privy Council approved in 1850, the Government after a dissolution would again be exposed to the same risk of a "dead lock" with the additional difficulty of a pretext for depreciating the value of an appeal to the people by dissolution of the Legislative Council. It would be asserted that this constituency of the Council was too limited or was of such a character as deprived it of its claim to represent the popular will—that a dissolution of the Legislative Council was therefore no appeal to the people properly so called, but an appeal to a constituency of a different kind and of less weight. The conflict would, if obsti-

nately persisted in, become one of classes of the community rather than of two Houses of Parliament. What do we seek in the Elective Legislative Council?—a popular basis for the second Chamber which will sustain it in a conflict with the Assembly.

- 35. Now it is obvious that the currency of such an objection to the class character of its constituency must destroy much of the benefit sought to be obtained by popular election of the Council. It must be remembered that the power of resistance is only required in cases of difficulty, and pressure from without. This consideration constitutes in my mind the chief obstacle to adopting any system of election of the Council by a Constituency made up of persons who had previously served certain elective offices whether municipal or otherwise. A man might plausibly allege "I thought such an individual a fit "and proper person for Reeve of a Township or School Trustee; but I do not "therefore think him a proper man to be one of a small number entrusted with "the choice of Legislative Councillors." The fitness for one set of functions in no wise implies fitness for the other except so far as general intelligence is concerned; and political opinions, not general intelligence, might be the main qualification to which a constituency would wish to look in electing members of the Legislative Council on a particular occasion. If the people disavowed sa select constituency the value of election by that constituency would be lost.
- 36. These objections, such as they are, may be worth little, and I believe it to be possible to frame a system of double election by the people themselves more likely than the present scheme to produce a really good Council. But I do not hesitate to affirm that any election of the Legislative Council to be really effectual for good, whether double or single, must ultimately be based on a constituency as wide and popular in its character as that which elects the Assembly. Without this condition I do not see how the desired object of balancing the Assembly by the Council in cases of difficulty and popular excitement can ever be attained.
- 37. In conclusion therefore, I have to recommend that the enclosed Bill may be approved by Her Most Gracious Majesty, not because I believe it to be the best measure in the abstract, but because it is the best measure accessible to us under existing circumstances, and because it embodies the results of full and complete consideration of the subject by the Canadian Parliament.

I desire to call particular attention to the fact, that, by the 8th Section to the Bill, unless the Royal assent be notified in *Canada* a sufficient time before the 1st of September next, the first election of Legislative Councillors will necessarily be postponed till 1857. The 1st of September is the latest day on which the necessary writs can issue.

The Select Committee to whom was referred the subject of the Honorable Mr. de Blaquière's motion of the sixth instant in relation to the reading of the minutes, and to their being printed and distributed daily, beg leave to report thereon as follows:—

Your Committee having, after mature consideration, come to the conclusion that it would be desirable to have printed minutes of each day's proceedings placed in the hands of Members on the ensuing day, the question presented itself whether the extended form in which the minutes have hitherto been daily read, and afterwards printed as your Journal, or some condensed and abbreviated form of them, should be used; and although there is room for doubt as to whether the former course is practicable, your Committee have agreed to recommend that it be adopted, experimentally, in the first instance. If it can be successfully carried out, it will no doubt be more satisfactory to your Honorable House, while it will entail less addition to your expenses,—one change only for composition being incurred for the Daily Minutes and for the Journal.

And your Committee recommend that at the end of the minutes of each day's proceedings there be printed the Orders of the Day and Notices of Motion for subsequent days, in due sequence and under their respective dates.

With regard to the additional labour which will thus be cast upon certain officers of your Honorable House, your Committee have pleasure in reporting that a laudable determination to meet it by increased exertion, and to perform it, if possible, without assistance, appears to animate these gentlemen, and your Committee are of opinion that they should be allowed a fair trial of their ability in that respect.

In furtherance of the plan thus recommended by your Committee it will be necessary to adopt the practise observed in the Legislative Assembly of having the petitions brought up each day, "laid on the table" and of having them "read and received" only on the next sitting day but one after; so that the contents of each petition may be epitomised and endorsed on it before, instead of after, its receipt is to be noticed in the minutes.

The minutes thus printed from day to day will of course be subject to revision before they pass into the form of Journal; and as each Member will daily have it in his power to call attention to any error which may occur in them. Your Committee are of opinion that the fifth Standing Order should be rescinded, and the daily reading of the minutes in the House accordingly dispensed with for the future.

The Committee have received from the Hon. P. H. Moore, a Report upon the mission entrusted to him, under the authority of both Houses of the Legislature, last Session, to visit the Capital of the *United States*, and the Seats of Governments of *Louisiana*, and of certain border States of the American Union, for the purpose of organizing a system of exchange of their Laws, Journals, and public documents, with this Province.

The Committee beg leave to lay before your Honors a copy of this Report, and at the same time, to express their satisfaction at the zeal with which Mr. *Moore* has carried out the charge entrusted to him, and also at the very successful results of the same.

Hereafter, the Committee will submit Resolutions for the suitable acknowledgement of the donations received by Mr. *Moore*, and also for reciprocating these valuable gifts, by providing for the presentation of the Official Publications of this Province to the several Governments in the *United States*, with whom provision has been made for the exchange of such works.

LIBRARY OF PARLIAMENT, 20th March, 1857.

To the Joint Committee of the Honorable the Legislative Council and the Honorable the Legislative Assembly, appointed to assist the Honorable Speakers in the direction of the Library of Parliament.

## Honorable Gentlemen:

I beg leave to submit the following Report, shewing the general results of the mission to the *United States*, with which I was charged by your Honorable Committee.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE,

P. H. MOORE.

Toronto, 10th March, 1857.

The Joint Committee of both Houses of the Provincial Parliament during the last Session of the Legislature,

Resolved, In order to supply the place of Mr. Langton, in carrying out the views expressed in their Fourth Report of the previous Session, that I should be requested to proceed to Washington, to Louisiana and other States of the American Union, for the purpose of organising a system of exchanges of the Laws, Journals, and other public documents of the principal Legislatures of the United States, with this Province, and also to procure for the Library such important historical, constitutional, and scientific works as could be procured by way of gift or donation.

Being entrusted by your Committee with the execution of this duty, and having been also requested by a letter from the Honorable the Speaker of the Legislative Council and the Honorable the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, to comply with the request of your Committee I accordingly undertook the mission, and left Toronto on the 28th day of May last, proceeded to my residence in Eastern Canada, where I remained for a few days, to make the necessary arrangements for my absence from home; and from thence I went direct to the City of Wash ington. On my arrival there, Congress being in Session, I was enabled to make the necessary arrangements with the general government for the establishment and the carrying out hereafter, of a system of exchanges between the United States and Canada. Those proceedings were facilitated by several gentlemen of the Senate and House of Representatives, with whom I had formerly been acquainted, who interested themselves, and gave me valuable assistance. To Judge Collamer of the United States Senate, and Judge Chipman of the Secretary of State's Department, I am greatly indebted for the success of my mission at Washington, and desire to make those gentlemen a public acknowledgment of their kindness.

The President of the *United States*, by whom I was most courteously received, assured me, that he would give the necessary instructions to the several departments of the Federal Government as would authorize them to furnish such documents as were at their disposal. The large and valuable donations received

from the several Departments of State sufficiently attest that those instructions were faithfully given and liberally carried out.

In the several States of "the Union" that I visited, I found the Governors and authorities desirous to make the exchanges, and to respond with alacrity to my application, manifesting an anxious desire to cultivate the most friendly relations with our people and Government; but inasmuch as no authority had been given by several of the State Legislatures, for exchanges with our Government, it became necessary for the Governors of those States to call an Executive Session, for the purpose of adopting resolutions to give effect to the object of my mission. And as the Governors of the State Legislatures are seldom at the Capital, except during the Sessions of the Legislature, I was obliged frequently to travel from one part of the State to another, to get the Officials collected together for the purposes above mentioned; nevertheless, I trust the result of the mission has proved amply remunerative for the time and trouble taken in the execution of it.

By reference to the Catalogue of Books contained in the Report of the Librarian of the Honorable the Legislative Council, and Librarian of the Honorable the Legislative Assembly, the numerous and important publications which I obtained from the Federal Government at Washington, and from several States of the American Union, will be found, with the exception of a valuable collection from the States of Louisiana and Michigan, that are now on the way to Toronto. The selections that I made in Louisiana, consist of works on Civil and Criminal Jurisprudence, together with several volumes political, historical, literary and scientific, both in French and English.

I humbly submit, that the importance and result of the mission can be duly appreciated from the fact, that the valuable addition made to our Provincial Library, this year, is only the first instalment, and that we shall continue to receive, from year to year, from the *United States*, those valuable works upon which that Government expends large sums of money annually.

In conclusion, permit me to congratulate your Committee on the great improvement and fine appearance of the Library, which may be ranked amongst the very first on this Continent, for the value and beauty of the volumes it contains, and the careful industry with which they have been classified and catalogued.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN:

We, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council of the Province of *Canado*, in Provincial Parliament assembled, beg leave humbly to approach Your Majesty with renewed expressions of our loyalty and attachment to Your Majesty's Person and Government.

Deeply sensible as we are of the inestimable value of the privileges which Your Majesty's Colonial subjects enjoy, as being equally with Your Majesty's Home subjects, members of the greatest and freest Empire on the face of the Globe, we are not the less mindful of the fact that our full enjoyment of these blessed privileges is inseparably connected with, and dependent upon, the right of self-government which the latter have long exercised, and which has, during Your Majesty's Reign, been fully and completely conceded and recognized as belonging to the former also.

We are fully aware also that these inherent rights and priviliges would be entirely nugatory and of no avail to us if we were subject to be driven from our homes or excluded from any portion of the soil or waters of our Country, or debarred from the exercise of our lawful industry thereon or therein, without our consent directly or indirectly first sought and obtained.

With these convictions deeply implanted in our minds we are naturally disposed to regard with watchful jealousy the slightest appearance of any disposition on the part of Your Majesty's immediate advisers, in whose selection Your Majesty's Colonial subjects have no voice, to recommend to Your Majesty the adoption of measures which might tend to inflict upon any of the latter such grievous injuries.

It has been therefore with the deepest concern and anxiety that we have received the intelligence that Your Majesties Principal Secretaries of State for Foreign Affairs, and for the Colonies, have concluded the preliminaries of a Convention to be entered into between Your Majesty and the Emperor of the French, relative to the rights of Fishery on the Coast of Newfoundland and the neighboring Coasts, whereby all these species of injury would be inflicted upon our fellow subjects in the Colony of Newfoundland, in this Province and elsewhere.

Deeply sympathising as we do with Your Majesty's brave and loyal subjects in Newfoundland and on the Coast of Labrador in their alarm and distress on this occasion, we cannot fail to be aware that numbers of the inhabitants of the Eastern portion of this Province would be injuriously affected also by the conclusion of such a Convention, and we therefore humbly beseech Your Majesty to pause before giving

Your Royal Sanction thereto, and to protect the rights of Your Majesty's brave and loyal subjects in these Colonies from being forfeited, infringed upon, or subjected to any injury or risk.

After a long Debate,

I have to acknowledge your Despatches of the numbers and dates specified in the margin.

When Her Majesty's Government entered into the convention with that of France, which has formed the occasion of that correspondence, they did so in the hope of bringing to a satisfactory arrangement the many complicated and difficult questions which have arisen between the two countries on the subject of the Newfoundland Fisheries, but they did so with the full intention of adhering to two principles which have guided them, and will continue to guide them; namely, that the rights at present enjoyed by the community of Newfoundland are not to be ceded or exchanged without their assent, and that the constitutional mode of submitting measures for that assent is by laying them before the Colonial Legislature. For this reason they pursued the same form of proceeding which had been before pursued in the case of the Reciprocity Convention with the United States, and which was in that case adopted and acted upon by the Newfoundland Legislature. It was in perfect uniformity with the same precedent that it ap-

peared necessary in the present instance to add a condition respecting Parliamentary enactment, in order that, if necessary, any existing obstacles to the arrangement in the series of Imperial Statutes might be subsequently removed.

The proposals contained in the convention having been now unequivocally refused by the Colony, they will of course fall to the ground, and you are authorized to give such assurance as you may think proper that the consent of the community of *Newfoundland* is regarded by Her Majesty's Government as the essential preliminary to any modification of their territorial or maritime rights.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, COMMITTEE ROOM, 29th April, 1857.

The Select Committee appointed on the twenty-second instant to report upon all Petitions presented to this House praying for the better observance of the Sabbath, beg leave to report thereon as follows:

Having maturely considered the subject of such Petitions, your Committee have come to the conclusion that it is one which would call for the thoughtful and earnest consideration of your Honorable House, even if it had not been pressed upon you, as it has been, Session after Session, by hundreds of Petitioners in all parts of the Province.

Your Committee are of opinion that the first and highest duty of the Legislature of any country is to provide, so far as it can be done by law, that no inhabitant of that country shall be unnecessarily deprived of the enjoyment of his natural rights and privileges.

Among the most valuable of these rights and privileges your Committee would place that of resting from labour during one day in every seven, in obedience to the command of our beneficent Creator;—which most persons indeed, are desirous to enjoy, however widely they may differ from each other as to the use to be made of the leisure thus obtained.

There are laws for the protection of individuals and the maintenance of order in this respect already in force in the Province; but your Committee deem it hopeless to expect that these laws will be strictly obeyed or enforced, or that correct sentiments in regard to human rights in this connection will prevail in the community so long as the sanction of public authority is openly and systematically given to the exaction of unnecessary labour and service from others on the Lord's day.

Deeply impressed with these convictions, and viewing the subject as one of no ordinary importance or mere transient interest, even in its slightest bearings, your Committee would earnestly bespeak the favorable consideration of your Honorable House to a Bill having for its object the closing of the Canals and Post-Offices, and of all offices of the Public Departments, on the Lord's day, and the prohibition of the running of trains on Railways and the departure of Steamers and other vessels from port on that day.

Widely as men may and do differ as to what constitutes on the one hand a violation and on the other hand a due observance of the Sabbath,—there can be but one opinion as to the obligation upon all to respect the rights of others in connection with it.

Your Committee therefore hope that no opposition will be offered to a Bill for securing to the servants of the public and to the servants of Common Carriers, who are themselves the servants of the public, the enjoyment of their individual rights, in this respect.

The Honorable Mr. Moore, from the Select Committee appointed to examine and report upon the Contingent Accounts of the Legislative Council for the present Session presented their second Report.

Ordered, That it be received, and

The same was then read by the Clerk as follows:-

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, Committee Room, 1st May, 1857.

The Select Committee appointed to examine and report upon the Contingent Accounts of the Legislative Council for the present Session, beg leave to make their second Report.

Soon after the opening of the Session the Clerk laid a detailed statement of his disbursements since the date of the then last audit of his Accounts, with vouchers in support thereof, before Your Committee, who have since carefully examined the same.

The balance in the hands of the Clerk on the twelfth of June last, being the date to which the last audit of his accounts extended, was one hundred pounds eight shillings and ten pence (£100 8s. 10d.). Between that day and the twenty-eighth day of February last he received for Your Honorable House ten thousand one hunderd and thirty-five pounds (£10,135) making in all ten thousand two hundred and thirty-five pounds eight shillings and ten pence (£10,235 8s. 10d.) to be accounted for by him at the latter date.

The Clerk has accounted to the satisfaction of Your Committee (by vouchers numbered from one to three hundred and thirty-five inclusive) for payments between the above dates to the amount of nine thousand eight hundred and eighty-one pounds twelve shillings and eleven pence (£9,881 12s. 11d.) leaving a balance of three hundred and fifty-three pounds fifteen shillings and eleven pence (£353 15s. 11d.) in his hands at the credit of Your Honorable House on the said twenty-eighth day of February last.

Your Committee have been favored with the reference to them by the Honorable the Speaker of a letter recently addressed to him by the Clerk, to the effect that he was unable to keep up the Account Books of his office without assistance.

In referring this letter to Your Committee His Honor the Speaker expresses his opinion that the Clerk should have the help he requires, and that it can be given to him without increasing the staff of the House.

Your Committee therefore recommend that the Honorable the Speaker be

requested to give directions to the Clerk to make such distribution and apportionment of the work in his office, as may enable him to receive from Mr. Maingy one of the Additional Assistant Clerks, whose name has been submitted by the Speaker to Your Committee for that purpose, the help he requires.

The Honorable the Speaker has also referred to Your Committee a letter addressed to him by Mr. Le Moine, one of the Clerks Assistant, and French Translator, to the effect that he and the Additional Assistant Clerk and Assistant French Translator Mr. Doucet, are no longer able to perform the whole of the duties devolving upon them, and has accompanied this reference also with the expression of his opinion that such is the case. His Honor accordingly recommends that a person well versed in the knowledge of his own tongue and possessing the idiom and acquainted with the genius of the English language, be employed temporarily for the remainder of the Session to assist those gentlemen, and in the same manner every year whenever the want of the services of such a person may be felt; and Your Committee are of opinion that this suggestion also should be adopted, and that the Speaker should be requested to take steps without delay for securing the services of such a person for the remainder of this Session.

A letter, addressed by Messrs. Desbarats and Derbishire, as publishers of a new Map of the North-west Territories of America, to the Hon. the Speaker, with a printed prospectus enclosed, has also been referred by the Speaker to your Committee; and, having taken the same into consideration, your Committee recommend that one hundred copies of said Map be subscribed for by the Clerk on behalf of your Honorable House, and for use and distribution by the Members thereof.

Your Committee have been given to understand that Mr. de Léry, the late Clerk, would have it in his power to pay five hundred pounds, if that sum could be accepted in full for the deflicencies in his accounts with your Honorable House, and they accordingly beg leave to express their opinion that, under the peculiar circumstances of the case, it would be advisable that on payment of that sum, with all costs incurred, on or before the first day of June next, he should be discharged from all further liability for such deficiencies.

On the reference made to your Committee of the Petition from Mr. Kimber, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, "praying that he may be re-imbursed a "certain amount received by the Clerk of the House from the Insurances Offices "on account of certain articles of furniture which belonged to him, and which "were destroyed in the fire which burned the Parliament House on the 1st of "February, 1854," your Committee are under the necessity of reporting unfavorably. As Mr. Kimber cannot tell the number of the room in which his furniture was contained, and the inventory upon which the Insurance was effected was not made in very minute detail, your Committee have no means of ascertaining what articles of furniture belonging to him were insured, nor for how much. It is

therefore quite out of their power to recommend that any sum be paid to him on this account.

All which is respectfully submitted.

EDMUND HEAD,

The Governor General transmits for the information of the Honorable the Legislative Council copy of a Despatch which he addressed to the Secretary of State for the Colonies in forwarding the Addresses of the Legislative Council and Assembly to Her Majesty the Queen on the subject of the Seat of Government; together with a copy of the Secretary of State's reply thereto.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE,

Toronto, 4th May, 1857.

Copy No. 49.

"Government House, Toronto,
"28th March, 1857.

"Sir,—I forward with the present Despatch two addresses to Her Most Gracious Majesty of an unusual character. They are respectively from the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly, and the prayer of both is the same.

2. "That from the Legislative Council is as follows:-

TO THE QEEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN,

We, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council of Canada in Provincial Parliament assembled, beg leave to approach Your Majesty

with renewed assurances of devotion and attachment to your Royal Person and Government.

We desire, may it please Your Majesty, to express our opinion, that the interests of Canada require that the Seat of the Provincial Government should be fixed at some certain place.

We therefore respectfully pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to exercise Your Royal Prerogative, and select some one place for the Permanent Seat of Government in Canada.

- 3. The address from the Legislative Assembly is founded on resolutions passed in Committee of the whole House, which Resolutions contain the additional assurance that the House resolves to appropriate a sum not exceeding £225,000 for providing the necessary buildings and accommodation for the Government and Legislature at such place as Her Majesty may see fit to select.
- 4. You are aware, Sir, of the difficulty which in this Colony has long surrounded the question of the Seat of Government. After its removal from Kingston to Montreal in 1843, certain circumstances caused the Legislature to adopt a migratory system by which Parliament was to sit alternately four years at Toronto and four years at Quebec.
- 5. The inconvenience of this arrangement has been strongly felt. It is attended by great expense, and by a periodical suspension of public business in every office. At the same time it is impossible to deny that it has done good; prejudices have been softened and misconceptions removed by it.
- 6. In the last session, however, the Legislative Assembly asserted the necessity of a fixed Seat of Government by a Resolution of their own, and a vote was carried in favor of Quebec. When the question of providing money for the erection of the public buildings at Quebec came up, a clause appropriating £50,000 for that purpose was struck out of the supplies by the Legislative Council, and the whole supply bill had to be introduced again in the Lower House. Practically, therefore, this main question at the commencement of this session remained yet undecided.
- 7. Yet my own conviction was, and is, that the time has arrived when this matter ought to be definitely settled. To keep it open is to maintain in full flow a constant source of local bitterness and sectional animosity, which by a little management can always be turned against the Government of the day. Nor is this the worst consequence of its unsettled condition. If the Province of Canada is to remain one, it is essential that its Seat of Government should be fixed and recognized by all.
- 8. There can be no doubt that Her Majesty's prerogative enables her to summon the Parliament wherever she may please; but Her Majesty, with a desire to meet the wishes of the people of *Canada*, has in practice generally left the matter to be determined by those most immediately interested therein.

- 9. It now appears to a majority of both branches of the Legislature that the question is one not likely to be arranged satisfactorily by themselves. They do not, I conceive, by their present addresses, in any way renounce or disclaim their own capacity for self-government, nor do they, by referring this question to the Queen, intend to establish a principle in any way inconsistent with the free and unimpeded action of Parliamentary responsibility in the Colony.
- 10. The matter itself is one of exceptional character. Nothing but this consideration and a strong conviction that its speedy settlement is of the utmost importance, would induce me to recommend that so soon as money necessary for erecting the public buildings at the spot which Her Majesty may select, shall have been placed at her disposal, the prayer of these addresses should be complied with.
- 11. Under any circumstances I apprehend that the Legislature and public officers will, in 1859, have to be removed again to *Quebec*, according to the present arrangement. What is asked of the Queen is, to select a site at which in the meantime fit and suitable buildings may be erected for the establishment of the permanent Legislative capital of *Canada*.
- 12. In order to lay fully before the Queen the claims of the several places which may be said to consider themselves entitled to selection as the Seat of 28th March, 1857, Government, I have caused a circular (of which a copy is annexed to this despatch,) to be addressed by my Secretary to the Mayor of each of these cities. I have asked each Corporation to set forth the reasons in favour of their own city, and to forward the statement of such reasons to the Secretary of State before the 1st of July.
- 13. In doing this I have perhaps presumed too much on the probability of Her Majesty complying with the request of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly. If so I must entreat forgiveness, but I have thought it important that no time should be lost. The question, of course, must be decided after ealm and deliberate consideration of the interests of the whole Province, not of those of any particular city or place.
- 14 It would evidently be improper to convey to the Queen's advisers in England any opinion or advice in this matter as on the part of the Executive Council here. The whole reference is, as I have observed, of an exceptional character, and if it were to be finally decided on the advice of persons, any of whom are responsible to the Parliament of Canada, the great object of removing it beyond the cross-action of local politics and sectional jealousies would be altogether frustrated.
- 15. I annex to this despatch copies of the votes and proceedings of the Legislative Assembly relative to this matter in this and the preceding session.
- 16 This despatch has been shown to the Members of my Council and concurred in by them. With this observation I again submit my recommendation that Her

Majesty may be advised to comply with the prayer of the addresses now transmitted.

SIR,—You are probably aware that the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Canada have addressed Her Most Gracious Majesty to exercise Her Prerogate in the selection of a permanent Seat of Government for the whole Province.

In the event of Her Majesty complying with the prayer of these Addresses, His Excellency is anxious that Her advisers in England should be enable to place before Her a full and fair statement of the claim of each separate City, which may be considered a candidate for the honor of becoming the future capital of Canada.

As a matter of course, the final selection must depend on a comprehensive survey of the interests, not of any one place, but of the whole Province, as part of British North America.

The claims, however, of each City are likely to be stated by the persons most interested in supporting them better than they would be by any other party.

His Excellency therefore invites the Corporation of to cause to be prepared a paper setting forth the reasons which may in their opinion favor the claim of that place to be selected by the Queen.

With every wish to afford full time for preparing these statements, His Excellency desires that it may be in the hands of the Colonial Secretary by the first week of July in the present year.

You will please, if you see fit to comply with His Excellency's desire, to address the packet to the Right Honorable the Secretary of State, London, and endorse it with the words "City of Canada."

In conformity with the intention expressed in their First Report, the Committee have the honor to submit, for the approval of the House, a series of Resolutions conveying the thanks of the House to the President of the *United States* and to the authorities of the several States of the American Union, with whom, upon the application of the Honorable Mr. *Moore*, arrangements have been entered into for the purpose of organizing a system of exchange of their official publications with this Province.

The Dommittee have caused a list to be prepared of the Works available for

presentation, on behalf of this Legislature, which consists of the Provincial Journals, Statutes and Law Reports, with copies of such other Works as may have been purchased from time to time, by order of the Committee, with a view to their being distributed in this manner. It has been the endeavour of the Committee to make up a selection for each State, which shall fully answer the purposes in view in regard to these exchanges, and which, as far as possible, shall be a suitable acknowledgement for the liberality evinced in answer to the application of our agent. To enable the Committee to effect this desirable object, it has been necessary to incur an expense of about three hundred pounds for the purchase of Statutes, Law Reports, &c., spare copies of which were not in the possession of the House.

The Committee have directed the Librarians to superintend the annual transmission of the boxes of books intended for the different State Governments with whom exchanges have been agreed upon; and in order to comply with a wish which has been generally expressed by the State Legislatures to possess copies of Reports from all our Public Institutions, as speedily as possible after their publication, they beg to submit a Resolution requiring the Clerk of the House to furnish the Librarians with a sufficient number of copies of all such documents, for this purpose, as there may be issued from the press. These arrangements, they trust, will, suffice to ensure a faithful carrying out, on the part of this Province, of the great principle of International Exchange, which will doubtless operate to the mutual advantage of this Province and of the States, with whom we have been enabled to enter into these friendly relations.

"The plaintiff or demandant, and the defendant or tenant, "respectively in any action or suit whatever commenced or brought, or to be commenced or brought in either of the "Courts of Queen's Bench or Common Pleas for Upper "Canada, may in the Term next after issue joined apply to "the said Courts respectively for a trial at Bar, and each of "the said Courts respectively may, in its discretion, upon "hearing the parties, grant or refuse the same."

## CLAUSE B.

"In all cases in which the Crown may be actually or immediately interested, a trial at bar may be had as of right
upon the same principle, and be regulated and governed
thereby as in similar cases in England."

## CLAUSE C.

"If any trial at bar shall be directed by either of the said "Courts, it shall be competent to the Judges of such Court "to appoint such day or days for the trial thereof as they "shall think fit, and the time so appointed, if in vacation

"shall for the purposes of such trial be deemed and taken "to be a part of the preceding term."

In Upper Canada—A notice inserted in one newspaper published in the County or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

In Lower Canada—A notice inserted in one newspaper in the English and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, or in both languages if there be but one paper: or if there be no paper published therein, then [in both languages] in a paper published in an adjoining District. Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months, during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the

Petition. Provided that if the application be of such a nature as not to affect any particular locality the notice may be published in the Official Gazette.

That before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to this House, the person or persons purposing to petition for such bill shall, upon giving the notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give a notice in writing stating the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of Rafts and Vessels, and mentioning also whether they purpose to erect a Drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of such Drawbridge—neither House shall enquire whether any rule of the other House respecting a private or local Bill has been complied with, but each House shall confine itself to enquiries into the compliance with its own rules. That the fee payable on the second reading of any private or local Bill, shall be paid only in the House in which such Bill originates, but the disbursements for printing such Bill shall be paid in each House.

That when any private or local Bill requiring the publication of notice in any local newspaper, shall be read a second time in either House, notice of such second reading shall be communicated to the Clerk of the other House, and notice shall be immediately put up in the Lobby of both Houses, that such second reading has taken place, and the putting up of such notice shall be a sufficient compliance with the Rules of either House, requiring notice to be posted in the Lobby.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Moore, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Ferrie, it was

Ordered, That the subject matter of the said Paper be printed and taken into consideration by the House on Monday next.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day the Bill intituled "An Act to repeal a "certain Act therein mentioned, and make better provision for the encouragement of Agriculture, and also to provide for the promotion of Mechanical

The Honorable Mr. de Blaquière from the Committee appointed on the 19th day of March last to examine the Rules of this Honorable House, and report such changes and amendments as experience may deem necessary and advisable, and to whom was also referred the Message of the Legislative Assembly dated the 28th ultimo, requesting a Conference with this House on the subject of the Rules relating to Private Bills with a view to uniformity of regulation respecting the same; and also the paper delivered to the Managers on the part of this House by the Managers on the part of the Legislative Assembly at the Conference, held on Saturday the 30th ultimo, presented their Report.

Ordered, That the Report be now received, and The same was then read by the Clerk as follows:

# LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,

The Select Committee appointed, on the nineteenth day of March last, to examine the Rules of Your Honorable House and report such changes and amendments as experience may deem advisable, and to whom were yesterday referred for consideration and report the Message of the Legislative Assembly, dated the twenty-eighth ultimo, requesting a conference with this House on the subject of the Rules relating to Private Bills, with a view to uniformity of regulation respecting the same, and also the paper delivered to the Managers on the part of this

House by the Managers on the part of the Legislative Assembly at the conference held on Saturday the thirtieth ultimo, have in obedience to your commands considered the said Message and Paper, and now beg leave to report thereon as follows:—

Your Committee are of opinion that it is desirable to incorporate the Rules contained in the said Paper with those already existing in Your Honorable House as to such Bills, but Your Committee deem it indispensable for the protection of private rights that notice of all such Bills be required still to appear, as at present, in the Canada Gazette.

Your Committee are also of opinion that it should be required of parties seeking the interference of the Legislature in any private or local matter, to file with the Clerk of this House the evidence of their having complied with the Rules and Standing Orders in this behalf and that in the absence of such proof being so furnished it should be competent to the Clerk to report in regard to such Bill, "that the Rules have not been complied with."

A copy of the said Paper, altered and modified so as to convert it into the draught of a Standing Order of Your Honorable House in conformity with the above suggestions, is hereunto annexed, and in the event of their adoption, Your Committee would recommend that such Standing Order be printed, and that a copy thereof be sent by the Clerk to the Warden, Mayor or Reeve of each Municipal Council and Municipality in Upper and Lower Canada, with a view to an effective knowledge of such Rules being communicated throughout the Province as well as in the ordinary mode of publication in the Official Gazette.

All which is respectfully submitted.

That all applications for private or local Bills for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatsoever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act, shall require the tollowing notice to be published, viz:

In Upper Canada—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette and in one newspaper published in the County or Union of Counties affected, (or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.)

In Lower Canada—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette in the English and French languages and in one newspaper in the English and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, or in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District. Such notices

shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months, during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the consideration of the Petition.

That before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to this House, the person or persons purposing to petition for such Bill shall, upon giving the notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give a notice in writing, stating the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of Rafts and Vessels, and mentioning also whether they purpose to erect a Drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of such Drawbridge. That the fee payable on the second reading of any private or local Bill, shall be paid only in the House in which such Bill originates, but the disbursements for printing such Bill shall be paid in each House.

That when any private or local Bill requiring the publication of notice in any local newspaper, shall be read a second time in either House, notice of such second reading shall be communicated to the Clerk of the other House, and notice shall be immediately put up in the lobby of both Houses, that such second reading has taken place, and the putting up of such notice shall be a sufficient compliance with the Rules of either House, requiring notice to be posted in the lobby.

That it shall be the duty of parties seeking the interference of the Legislature in any private or local matter, to file with the Clerk of this House the evidence of their having complied with the foregoing Rules and Standing Orders thereof; and that in default of such proof being so furnished as aforesaid, it shall be competent to the Clerk to report the Bill of such parties respecting such matter, that said Rules and Standing Orders have not been complied with.

That all applications for Private or Local Bills for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatsoever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require the following notice to be published, viz:

In *Upper Canada*—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties, affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

In Lower Canada—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, or in both languages if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session, and the presentation of the Petition.

The Members on behalf of the Legislative Council of the Joint Committee of both Houses for the direction of the Library of Parliament,

Beg leave to present a third Report.

An application has been made to the Committee by the Reverend J. B. Ferland and G. B. Faribault, Esquire, for a grant of £350 to procure 6,000 pages of manuscripts on Canada affairs, from the archives of the Ministry of Marine of the Government of France in addition to the series previously obtained from that department. The Library already possesses 23 volumes of these papers, containing documents concerning the years 1637 to 1730, but it has been represented to the Committee that a further selection of documents relating to the history, the jurisprudence, and the civil administration of New France between the years 1730 and 1760, could be advantageously made as a complement to the former series. The Committee are of opinion that it is most desirable to render our collection of manuscripts concerning the early history of Canada, as complete as possible, and they have entered into a correspondence with the Reverend Mr. Ferland for the purpose of obtaining his assistance in effecting this object.

The Committee have received from Mr. Gould, the eminent Ornithologist, a Prospectus with specimen plates, of his magnificent series of works descriptive of the Birds of Europe, Asia and Australia, with Monographs of certain species commonly found in America, and they have had much pleasure in subscribing for the entire series of these publications. They have authorised the Librarians to make arrangements with Mr. Gould, in accordance with this determination.

The Honorable P. H. Moore has laid before the Committee his account of expenses and disbursements in the execution of the mission with which he was charged by the Legislature to the United States, on behalf of the Library. It appears that he entered upon his duties on the 10th of June last, and was engaged therein, with the intermission of a few weeks only, until the 8th of February of the present year. His account for disbursements actually incurred in this service, amounts to £487; but it having been represented to the Committee that his actual outlay for incidental expenses considerably exceeded this sum, they resolved unanimously, (with the exception of the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly) to recommend that a further payment of £125 should be made to Mr. Moore, in full of all demands; the same to be defrayed in equal proportions out of the Contingencies of the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly respectively.

The Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, however, desires to record his dissent from this recommendation, he being of opinion that no further payment should be made to Mr. *Moore* beyond the amount stated by that Gentleman to have been his actual expenses on behalf of the Mission.

The Committee have subscribed for two hundred copies of the Map of the North Western Territory recently prepared under the direction of the Crown Lands Department, and they have directed that copies of the same be transmitted to the several States and Provinces with whom Exchanges may be made.

They have also directed the purchase of two hundred copies of a work which has been written by the Reverend Father *Martin*, upon certain Indian Remains and Antiquities discovered by the French Missionaries in remote parts of this Province. The cost of these copies will not exceed £50.

" All Collectors of Her Majesty's Customs are hereby au-"thorized and required from time to time to demand of the "Owners or Masters of any Steam Vessels, which they may "have reason to think have not been inspected for more than "six months, or in respect of which they may have reason "to think the rate or duty aforesaid, may be due and unpaid, "the exhibition of the receipts and certificates in that behalf, "appertaining to such Steam Vessels, and if receipts and "certificates as aforesaid, to their satisfaction, be not pro-"duced within a reasonable time, then to seize and detain "such Steam Vessels until the same are procured, and "exhibited, and any fines or penalties incurred and lawfully "imposed in respect of such Vessels under the provisions "of this Act, have been paid in full; and default of pay-"ment, to sell such Steam Vessels, for the payment of "such rate or duty, fines or penalties in the usual man-"ner."

"No Inspector shall make or deliver a certificate respecting "any Steam Vessel under the said Act or this Act, unless "the receipt of a Collector of Her Majesty's Customs for the "rate or duty payable in respect of such vessel for the then "current year have been produced and shewn to him, nor " unless he be satisfied that all the conditions and requirements "of the said Act and of the Act passed in the sixteenth year "of Her Majesty's Reign chapter one hundeed and sixty "seven amending the said Act, and of this Act, have been " fulfilled and complied with by and in respect of such Steam "Vessel, and it shall be the duty of every Inspector to report "to some one of the Collectors of Her Majesty's Customs, any "case of omission to pay such rate or duty or of omission to "apply for such inspection as aforesaid, for more than six "months from the date of the then last inspection, or refusal to " submit to inspection at any time which may at any time or in "any way come to his knowledge and any Inspector shall be " carried free of expense on every vessel which he shall desire "to inspect while under way and during such period as may "be necessary for such Inspection and for his return to the "Port at which he may have embarked on such vessel for "such purpose or tor his disembarkation at any Port which "such vessel may touch on her voyage."

"All penalties incurred under the said Act or this Act, "may be recovered in the name of Her Majesty by Her "Majesty's Attorney General in any Court having jurisdic"tion to the amount thereof, and all penalties recovered "under the said Act or this Act, shall be paid to the "Receiver General, and shall be by him placed to the credit "and form part of "The Steamboat Inspection Fund.

The last audit of the Clerk's Accounts extended to the twenty-eight day of February last, on which day there was a balance of three hundred and fifty-three pounds fifteen shillings and eleven pence, (£353 15s. 11d,) left in his hands at the credit of your Honorable House.

He has since received to the thirty-first day of May last, inclusive, five thousand five hundred and eighty pounds, (£5,580,) making with the aforesaid sum a total of five thousand nine hundred and thirty three pounds fifteen shillings and eleven pence (£5,933 15s. 11d.,) to be accounted for by him on the first day of June instant.

Your Committee deem it right to inform your Honorable House that in the above sum of five thousand five hundred and eighty pounds there is included a sum of five hundred pounds received on the twenty eight day of May last from Mr. de Lery, the late Clerk, in full for the deficiencies in his Accounts with your Honorable House, according to the terms of the recommendation contained in their last Report, which was adopted.

With respect to the several Petitions from the Officers, Clerks, and Servants of your Honorable House for increase of Salary, which have been referred to your Committee, they have agreed to recommend that it be referred to the Honorable the Speaker of this House to consider the subject of the Salaries of the Officers, Clerks and Servants of this House with a view to regulate the same, and to place them on some proper footing in correspondence with the Salaries of Officers, Clerks and Servants holding corresponding positions in the either Branch of the Legislature, and with this view to communicate with the Honorable the Speaker of the other House, upon whom a similar duty has been devolved by that House.

A Message was brought from the Legislative Assembly by the Honorable Mr. Drummond and others, in the following words:—

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,

Tuesday, 9th June, 1857.

Resolved, That a Message be sent to the Honorable the Legislative Council, acquainting their Honors that this House have agreed to all the amendments made by the Legislative Council to the Bill intituled "The Lower Canada" Municipal and Road Amendment Act of 1857," except the fifth, and that the reasons which have induced this House to disagree to the said last mentioned amendment, are the following:—

1st.—Because they are of opinion that it would be more expedient to allow the Municipal Councils to continue to tax the inhabitants by divisions so as to be enabled to apply the taxes towards the performance of work to be dene in the divisions where they are levied, or to tax the whole Municipality as they may see fit and as circumstances may require.

2nd.—Because in the opinion of this House much confusion as well as injustice would be occasioned by annulling all By-laws and procesverbaux in the Townships of Lower Canada in so far as they relate to the manner of making roads and bridges, and

3rd.—Because it is not expedient to introduce a system of compulsory legislation in one part of *Lower Canada* which cannot be extended to another portion of the same section of the Province.

Ordered, That the Honorable Mr. Drummond do carry the said Message to the Legislative Council.

Then the Honorable Mr. Vankoughnet moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Knowlton, to

Resolve, That this House does not insist upon their fifth amendment to the said Bill.

The question of concurrence being put thereon, the same was resolved in the affirmative, and it was

Ordered, That the foregoing Resolution be communicated to the Legislative Assembly by the Clerk of this House.

A Message was brought from the Legislative Assembly by their Clerk to return the Bill intituled "An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to the "hunting of Wild Animals and other Game in Lower Canada,"

And also the Bill intituled "An Act to provide for the better administration of "Justice in unorganized tracts of Country within this Province," and to acquaint this House that they have agreed to the amendments made by the Legislative Council to the said Bill without any amendment.

The Order being read for the consideration of the amendments proposed by the Select Committee to the Bill intituled "An Act to explain and amend the Act to "authorize the improvement of Water Courses,"

Which said amendments being again read by the Clerk,

The Honorable Mr. Ferrier moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Ferrie, That the said amendments be now adopted.

After Debate,

The Honorable Mr. de La Terrière moved, in amendment, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Seymour,

That the said amendments be not now adopted, but that they be taken into consideration this day three months.

The question of concurrence being put thereon the same was resolved in the affirmative.

The question being then put on the main motion, as amended, the same was also resolved in the affimative, and

Ordered accordingly.

The Honorable Mr. Ross from the Select Committee to whom was referred the Bill intituled "An Act to provide for ascertaining unknown Boundaries in all "cases in which the Concession Lines were not run in the original survey," reported that they had gone through the said Bill and had directed him to report the same to the House without any amendment.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Ross, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Moore, it was

Ordered. That the said Bill be read a third time presently.

The said Bill was then read a third time accordingly.

The question was put whether this Bill shall pass?

It was resolved in the affirmative.

Ordered, That the Clerk do go down to the Legislative Assembly and acquaint that House that the Legislative Council have passed this Bill without any amendment.

The Honorable Mr. Ferrie moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Ross,

That when the House adjourns this day it do stand adjourned until to-morrow at twelve o'clock, noon.

The question of concurrence being put thereon, the same was resolved in the affirmative, and

The Honorable the Speaker then declared this House continued until to-morrow at twelve o'clock, noon, the House so decreeing.

By the Honarable Mr. Prince—of the Municipal Council of the Town of Sarnia.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day the following Petitions were severally read:

Of the South Megantic Library Association and Mechanics' Institute, praying

Of George Duggan of the City of Toronto, praying to be indemnified for services rendered during the War.

Of Polycarpe Renaud and others, of that part of the Seigniory of Lachenaie, which lies in the County of L'Assomption, praying that an Act may be passed to provide for the establishment of the Boundary lines of the said Seigniory.

The Honorable Mr. Vankoughnet presented to the House a return in compliance with an Address to His Excellency the Govornor General, dated the 20th May, 1856, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to cause to be laid before this House a return shewing the number of Licenses issued in the years 1854, 1855, and 1856, in Upper and Lower Canada, for the sale of intoxicating liquors, distinguishing the number issued in each City, Town, Township, or Parish in the Province, and also the amount received in each locality for the issue of such Licenses; and also shewing to what extent the persons who obtained such Licenses have sleeping accommodation for travellers.

Ordered. That the same do lie on the Table, and it is as follows:

The Honorable Messieurs Cartier, Duchesnay, Armstrong, Dickson, Mills, and Moore enter.

The Honorable Mr. Prince, moved seconded by the Honorable Mr. Dickson, That all Bills, Petitions, and other Proceedings now before this House, and which may remain incomplete and undisposed of at the end of the present Session, be revived and taken up at the commencement of the next Session (unless Parliament be in the meantime dissolved) in the order in which they happen to stand at the Prorogation of this House, and that the Select Committees to whom any Petition, or other proceeding has been referred during this Session, do remain the same, and do proceed with the business so referred to them in the next Session, as if no such Prorogation had taken place.

After debate

The said motion was by leave of the House withdrawn.

A Message was brought from the Legislative Assembly by their Clerk to return the Bill intituled "An Act to amend the Railway Clauses Consolidation "Act," and to acquaint this House that they have agreed to the amendments made by the Legislative Council to the said Bill without any amendment.

A Message was brought from the Legislative Assembly by their Clerk to return the Bill intituled "An Act to incorporate the Board of Trade of the City of "Ottoma."

Also, the Bill intituled "An Act to enable the Incumbent and Churchwardens "of the Mission of the Church of *England* at *Georgina* to dispose of certain lands "belonging to the said Mission.

And also, the bill intituled "An Act to prevent the cruel and improper treat"ment of Cattle and other Animals, and to amend the Law relating to impound"ing the same," and to acquaint this House that they have passed the said Bills without any amendment.

The Honorable Messieurs Patton and Boulton enter.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day the Bill intituled "An Act to improve the "mode of obtaining evidence in cases of Controverted Elections," was read a third time.

The question was put whether this Bill shall pass?

It was resolved in the affirmative.

Ordered, That the Clerk do go down to the Legislative Assembly and acquaint that House that the Legislative Council have passed this Bill without any amendment.

The Honorable Mr. J. Morris enters.

The Honorable Mr. de Blaquière moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Moore,

That the Standing Orders, numbers forty-nine and fifty-four, be repealed, and the following be substituted for Rule forty-nine.

That all applications for Private and Local Bills for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatsoever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties; or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require the following notice to be published, viz:

In Upper Canada—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County, or Union of Counties, affected, (or if there be no paper published! therein, then in a newspaper in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.)

In Lower Canada—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, or in both languages if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District. Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of a least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session, and the presentation of the Petition.

That before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a Private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge, is presented to this House, the person or persons purposing to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving the notice prescribed by the preceding Rule, also, at the same time, and in the same manner, give a notice in writing, stating the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they purpose to erect a draw-bridge or not, and the dimensions of such draw-bridge.

That the Fee payable on the second reading of any Private or Local Bill, shall be paid only in the House in which such Bill originates, but the disbursements for printing such Bill shall be paid in each House.

That it shall be the duty of parties seeking the interference of the Legislature in any private or local matter, to file with the Clerk of this House the evidence of their having complied with the Rules and Standing Orders thereof: and that in default of such proof being so furnished as aforesaid, it shall be competent to the Clerk to report in regard to such matter, "that the Rules and Standing Orders have not been complied with."

That the foregoing Rules be published in both languages in the Official Gazette, over the signature of the Clerk of this House, weekly during each Recess of Parliament.

The question of concurrence being put thereon the same was resolved in the affirmative and

Ordered accordingly.

The Honorable Mr. Ross enters.

The Honorable Mr. Vankoughnet from the Select Committee appointed to enquire into and report upon the expediency of adopting measures to ascertain the boundary line between Upper and Lower Canada at the time of the Union, so that private rights dependent thereon can be more clearly ascertained, presented their Report.

Ordered, That it be received, and
The same was then read by the Clerk as follows:—

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,

Committee Room,

10th June, 1857.

The Select Committee apointed to enquire into and report upon the expediency of adopting measures to ascertain the Boundary Line between Upper and Lower Canada, at the time of the Union, so that private rights dependent thereof, can be more clearly ascertained, beg leave respectfully to report, that they have heard the statements of several persons who have appeared before them, and that they have examined a variety of documents relating to the matter submitted to them, and have not considered it necessary to take any additional evidence to enable them to report to your Honorable House that in their opinion it is a matter of great importance that the true Boundary Line between the two divisions of the Province should be ascertained on the ground.

It appears that upwards of two thousand acres are affected by the disputed line, and that a number of people reside upon that tract who in consequence of the doubt as to the true line refuse to recognize a title in any one.

The consequences that may result from this state of things ought if possible to be averted; and your Committee respectfully recommend that it be left to the Executive Government to take such action as they may think best, either by appointing Commissioners or by selecting competent Surveyors to run and fix the line on the ground, under such instructions as may enable them accurately to ascertain the true line.

When this has been done, final legislation, if legislation be then necessary, can be had on the matter; but at present your Committee are of opinion that the Legislature would not be in a position to do justice to the question, as they could not, with a certainty of being right, fix the line where it should properly be.

All which is respectfully submitted.

Then the Honorable Mr. Vankoughnet moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr.  $R_{088}$ ,

That the said Report be now adopted.

After Debate,

The Honorable Mr. de Beaujeu moved in amendment, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Prince,

That the said Report be not now adopted, but that it be referred back to the Select Committee for further consideration.

Which being objected to,

After Debate,

The question of concurrence was put thereon, and the same was resolved in the negative.

The question being then put on the main motion, the same was resolved in the affirmative, and

The said Report was adopted accordingly.

The Honorable Mr. de Beaujeu moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Prince, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to cause to be laid before this Honorable House,

1st. Copies of all papers and correspondence which may have been exchanged beween the Ordnance Department and the Provincial Government, since the 19th February, 1855, on the subject of seven acres of Land at Côteau-du-Lac, taken possession of by the Military Authorities for Military purposes, and upon which were constructed a Fort, Barracks and Canal, (now all in ruins.)

2nd. Copies of all Despatches received since the 19th of February, 1855, from Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, respecting the above piece of land, or respecting generally the Ordnance Lands in Canada mentioned in the Schedule G, in the Report of the Commissioners on the re-organization of the Militia of Canada.

3rd. Copies of the Reports of the Executive Council on the Petitions of the Heirs and Representatives of the lat: Colonel Baron de Longueuil, real owners of the said above mentioned piece of land, and revertable to them if not occupied solely for military purposes, the said Petitions bearing respectively the dates of 3rd October, 1854, 29th May, 1855, and 17th March, 1857, to which Petitions no answers were received.

4th. Copies of the Instructions with respect to the said above mentioned land at Coteau-du-Luc, or of the land mentioned in the said Schedule G in the above cited Report, given to the Superintendent of the Ordnance Lands, W. F. Coffin Esquire.

5. Copies of all applications by Petitions, Letters or recommendations, with their respective dates to the Government, for the grant, lease or purchase of any part of the said land and canal at Côteau-du-Lac, with the name or names of the applicant with the nature of these applications and the replies thereto by the Government.

An Act to provide for ascertaining unknown Boundaries in all cases in which the Concession Lines were not ruu in the original survey.

An Act to incorporate the St. Maurice Railway and Navigation Company.

An Act to continue for a limited time the several Acts and Ordinances therein mentioned, and for other purposes.

An Act to divide the Township of *Fredericsburgh* in the County of *Lennox*, into two separate Municipalities.

An Act to incorporate the "International Bank of Canada."

An Act to enable Counties united for Municipal purposes to carry on improve ments independently of each other.

An Act to authorize investigations in cases of accident by Fire, and to repeal the Act authorising such investigations in the Cities of Quebec and Montreal.

An Act to consolidate the debt of the City of Ottawa.

An Act to afford relief to the sufferers by the late fire at *Three Rivers*, by authorizing a loan on the credit of the Consolidated Municipal Loan Fund, to enable them to rebuild the houses and other buildings destroyed by the said fire.

An Act to extend the right of Appeal in Criminal Cases in Upper Canada.

An Act to authorize the Corporation of the City of Quebec to establish a Police force for the said City.

An Act to enable the Trustees of a certain School Lot in the Town of *Prescott* to sell the said Lot, and for other purposes.

An Act to alter and amend the Act incorporating the Niagara District Bank.

An Act to incorporate the Village of Mitchell, in the County of Perth.

An Act to extend the powers of the St. Clair and Rond Eau Plank Road Company.

An Act to vest a certain allowance for road in the Township of Oxford, in John Christie.

An Act to incorporate the Fort Erie Ship Canal Company.

An Act to incorporate the Western Canada Loan Company.

An Act to divide the Quebec Turnpike Roads into two separate Trusts, and to make other provision relative thereto.

The Lower Canada Municipal and Road Amendment Act of 1857.

An Act to prevent the cruel and improper treatment of Cattle or other Animals. and to amend the Law relating to impounding the same.

An Act to incorporate the Board of Trade of the City of Ottawa.

An Act to enable the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the Mission of the Church of *England* at *Georgina* to dispose of certain lands belonging to the said Mission.

An Act to amend the Railway clauses Consolidation Act.

An Act to improve the mode of obtaining Evidence in cases of controverted Elections.

To these Bills the Royal Assent was severally pronounced by the Clerk of this House, in the words following:

"In Her Majesty's name His Excellency the Governor General doth Assent to "this Bill."

The Acting Clerk of the Crown in Chancery read the title of another Bill to be passed as follows:

"An Act to incorporate the International Bridge Company."

To this Bill the Clerk of this House, by His Excellency's command did there upon say,

"His Excellency the Governor General doth reserve this Bill for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon."

Then the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly addressed His Excellency as follows:

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The Commons, in their liberality have voted the supplies required to defray the expenses of your Government. I have the honor to present to Your Excellency or this purpose, a Bill intituled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain."

"sums of money required for defraying certain expenses of the Civil Government for the year 1857, and for certain other expenses connected with the public service, and also for raising a Loan on the Credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund," for which Bill Her Majesty's faithful Commons solicit the Royal Assent.

To this Bill the Clerk of this House, by His Excellency's command, did thereupon say:

"His Excellency the Governor General thanks Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill in Her Majesty name."

Then His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to deliver the following Speech:—

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

When I opened this Session of the Legislature I recommended to your especial consideration certain subjects, on which, in your addresses, you assured me you were ready to deliberate. On the present occasion, at the close of the Session, it is my welcome duty to thank you for the manner in which you have fulfilled these assurances, and for the labour which you have bestowed on the general business of the Province.

Every one of the matters which I ventured to submit to you has been dealt with by the wisdom of Parliament.

The state of our Prisons and Lunatic Asylums—the administration of the Law in Lower Canada—the improved organization of the Civil Service—the encouragement of Arts and Agriculture—and the welfare of the Indian Tribes—all these have become the subject matter of fresh legislation.

You have not failed to show your impartial zeal for the progress of the Province and for the increase of settlement in every direction. The valleys of the Ottawa and the St. Maurice, and our western frontiers towards the territory of the Hudson's Bay Company, have alike received consideration at your hands.

I earnestly hope that our efforts on all these important subjects may be crowned with success, and that the measures devised by your wisdom will be promptly and effectually carried cut by the agercy of t e servants of the Queen.

In submitting to the decision of Her Most Gracious Majesty the final choice of a seat of Government for Canada, you have done that, which, without derogating from the rights of the Colonial Parliament, will remove from its walls a constant source of heart burning and local jealousy.

By generously postponing your lien on the Grand Trunk Railway, you will, I conceive, infuse new vigor into an association the interests of which are inseparably connected with those of *United Canada*; I, myself, view with much satisfaction the complete separation of the Executive Government from the direction of the Commercial Body.

### Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

In the Queen's name I thank you for the supplies which you have liberally granted for Her Service.

The additional appropriation for the Ocean Steamers, will give a fresh impulse to the trade of the St. Lawrence, and the power given me to meet overtures of the Imperial Government for the better lighting of the Gulf will tend to promote the same important object.

By your votes in aid of the Militia you have responded to the zeal and loyalty of the people, and you appear to admit the fact that the growing importance of *Canada* demands a military organization of your own, in some degree at least corresponding to the position which you hold.

I rejoice that you have repealed the anomalous tax for the support of Lunatic Asylums in *Upper Canada*, and that you have appropriated a sum which may be applied for improving our communications with the Red River.

### Honorable Gentlemen and Gentlemen:

I am bold enough to believe that the experience of the present Session in the working of our Legislative Council, composed, as it now is, partly of those named by the Crown, and partly of those chosen by the people, gives strong assurance of ultimate success. The test is, I know, as yet imperfect, but from what I already see. I anticipate with confidence the continued action among you of a second Legislative body capable in itself of calm deliberation, firm in its loyalty to our Sovereign, and strong in the consciousness of popular support.

My earnest prayer is that Providence may bless the produce of your lands and the increase of your Trade, and that our people, whilst rejoicing in the full measure of prosperity, may be kept from those snares of rash speculation and improvidence, which sometimes attend on such a state of things.

Once more, I thank you for your diligence in the work of Legislation, and I release you from such work for the present by proroguing the Parliament.

Then the Speaker of this House said,

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

It is His Excellency the Governor General's will and pleasure that this Provincial Parliament be prorogued until Monday, the twentieth day of July next, to be here held; and this Provincial Parliament is accordingly prorogued until Monday, the twentieth day of July next.

## APPENDIX No. 1.

## LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable the Legislative Council of the Province of Canada, in Provincial Parliament Assembled.

The Report of Librarian upon the State of the Library,

#### RESPECTFULLY SHEWITH:

That since the last Session of Parliament, a building has been erected under the the superintendance of the Commissioners of Public Works, which, by connecting the wings wherein the Library apartments were originally placed, affords accommodation for the Books, and space for the exhibition of a series of Portraits of the Speakers of the Legislative Assembly of Canada, and of the Upper and Lower Provinces previous to the Union. This building was delivered over to the Librarians on the 27th of December last, but owing to the dampness of the walls, which had very recently been plastered, it was not deemed prudent to commence the removal of the Books until about three weeks afterwards, when they were all transferred from the ground floor of the buildings to the suite of rooms prepared for their reception.

The extent of the collection to be removed and arranged, within such a limited period, has prevented the classification of the Books, from having been so thoroughly completed as could be wished and is intended; but, in their general arrangement, the convenience of Members of both Houses has been carefully consulted. The two rooms nearest to the respective Legislative Chambers having been especially appropriated to the reception of Books which may be useful in furthering the progress of public business in either House, while in the central apartment, those of a more general character have been placed.

During the recess, unremitting attention has been bestowed upon the compilation and printing of a complete Catalogue of the Library; copies of which will, within a few days, be placed in the hands of Honorable Members. The extent of this catalogue, and the time occupied in its preparation, have prevented its completion before the commencement of the Session, besides which, it was not considered

advisable to place it in the hands of the printer until the arrival in Canada of some valuable series of volumes, the last of which did not reach your Librarian's hands until the month of January last, had these books not been included in the catalogue, the immediate publication of a supplement would have been requisite. These series comprise, 1st, An extensive and valuable collection of works presented by the Honorable the East India Company; 2nd, Numerous and important Official Publications from the Federal Government at Washington, and from several States of the American Union, obtained through the instrumentality of the Honorable P. H. Moore, who, last Session, was specially authorized to proceed to the United States to solicit donations, and to organize a system of exchanges with the Canadian Legislature; and 3rd, Books expressly directed by the Speakers to be obtained from Paris, London and New York, to supply deficiencies in the Library.

Your Librarian is glad to be enabled to state, that all the Books above referred to have been received, and their titles included in the Catalogue, with the exception of a few volumes from the States of *Pennsylvania* and *Ohio*, which were not received until the present month.

Since last Session, there has also been received from the House of Lords, the remainder of their Lordships Series of Sessional Papers, from 1789 to the present time—a most valuable donation to the Library.

Measures have been taken to replace the magnificent donation of the Maps of the Ordnance Survey of *Great Britain* and *Ireland*, which were unfortunately shipwrecked last year, by the purchase (with the funds obtained from the insurance effected upon that set) of another series still more complete, and which includes in addition, the Maps of the Geological Survey of the United Kingdom, a collection which will be highly prized by all who are interested in Geological investigations.

Your Librarian humbly hopes that the general condition of the Library will be found to be satisfactory; although during the progress of the alterations which have been made since last Session, the Books have been unavoidably exposed to much risk of damage, from lime-dust, carpentry and paint, as well as from the continual presence of workmen for several months.

Your Librarian regrets to state, that in one important particular, the recommendations of the Library Committee of last Session have not been carried out. Notwithstanding the opinion expressed by that Committee, as to the necessity for providing accommodation for the residence, adjoining the Library, of some person connected with the Library, and having a knowledge of the Books, who should be forthcoming at every emergency, by day and by night. No such provision has been made, and the valuable collection, in consequence, remains exposed to much risk and danger. Being strongly impressed with the necessity for the continual presence, in or adjacent to the Library buildings, of some responsible

person connected with the department, and conversant with its arrangements and requirements, your Librarian respectfully submits this matter to Your Honorable House, in the hope that some provision will be speedily made for this purpose.

Reference has already been made to the results of the mission of the Hon. Mr. *Moore*, and as that gentleman purposes to present a detailed Report, it is merely necessary for your Librarian to add, that Lists of the Donations he succeeded in procuring, will be found appended to this Report.

In consequence of the press of business lately devolving upon your Librarian he has not been able to ascertain the precise number of volumes now upon your shelves, but it may be fairly estimated at about Thirty Thousand.

Sm,—I am desirous of informing you at the earliest period, of certain important questions which have recently been raised respecting the affairs of the *Hudson's* Bay Company in *British North America*, and of the steps which Her Majesty's Government have in contemplation regarding them.

You are aware that the *Hudson's* Bay Company claim under their Charter of 1670, and the various Acts of Parliament which they consider to have ubsequently recognized it, rights of proprietorship, exclusive trade, taxation, and government, over all the regions under the British Dominion watered by streams flowing into *Hudson's* Bay. The extent and ground of this claim are defined in Parl. Paper, No. the "Statements of Rights" printed in the annexed Parliamentary Paper and in the accompanying Map.

The *Hudson's* Bay Company also claim, and actually exercises rights of exclusive trade, although not the ownership of the soil, over all the territory comprised in a certain license to trade, granted in the year 1838, by the Crown, Parl. Paper, No under the provisions of the Act "for regulating the Fur Trade," 1 & 2, 547 of 1842, page 9. Geo. IV., Cap. 66, of which license, copy is also annexed to this Despatch.

It has been intimated to me, on the part of the Hudson's Bay Company, that as their license expires in 1859, and as a very long period is required before any imporant change of arrangements can be notified and acted on throughout the vast and distant regions affected by it, it will be very desirable that the views of Her Majesty's Government and of Parliament as to the renewal of the license should be ascertained as early as possible.

Her Majesty's Government have therefore determined on bringing the whole subject under the investigation of a Committee of the House of Commons, at the earliest convenient time. The enquiry will be mainly directed to the question of the renewal of the license; but it must incidentally embrace the general position and prospects of the *Hudson's* Bay Company.

As many points may arise in the course of this enquiry which may affect the interests of Canada, I have to instruct you to consider, with the advice of your Council, the question whether it may be desirable to send witnesses to appear before the Committee, or in any other manner to cause the views of the Provincial Government, and the interests of the Canadian community to be represented before this Committee.

### MINUTE OF COUNCIL.

Approved, Jan. 17, 1857. E. Head. despatch of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, of the 4th of December last, on the subject of the *Hudson's* Bay Company's occupation of the great North Western Territory of America.

They rejoice that the important position and advantages of that great portion of the Continent have received such prominent attention from the Imperial Government, and are to undergo the examination and consideration of a Committee of the House of Commons in England.

The Committeee desire to urge the importance of ascertaining the limits of Canada in the direction of the Territory over which the Hudson's Bay Company claim jurisdiction. The general feeling here is strongly that the Western Boundary of Canada extends to the Pacific Ocean.

In this, or in any view, the tracing and fixing on the ground, the line of separation between the United States and these territories of the North West, is of great importance. The rapid settlement of Minnesota, shortly to be admitted a State of the American Union, renders this the more necessary, for as civilization approaches the boundary, so will be increased the difficulty of maintaining the distinction between the rights of the two nations on the Frontier. Already, the Committee have reason to believe, that difficulties in this respect have occurred or at least, have been threatened, and the importance cannot be underrated of any guarding against any such.

The Committee are most anxious that Canadian interests should be properly represented before the proposed Committee of the House, and that opportunity should be afforded for carefully and closely watching any evidence that may be adduced before that body, and they will take the earliest occasion of suggesting to Your Excellency the manner in which they conceive this can be best accomplished. Situated as Canada is, she necessarily has an immediate interest in every portion of British North America, and the question of the jurisdiction and title claimed by the Hudson's Bay Company, is to her of paramount importance.

Copy of a Report of a Committee of the Honorable the Executive Conncil, dated 16th February, 1857, approved by His Excellency the Governor General.

In furtherance of the order in Council of the 27th January, ultimo, directing the appointment of a Special Agent to proceed to *England* to represent Canadian rights and interests before the proposed Committee of the House of Commons, on the subject of the *Hudson's* Bay Territory, the Committee respectfully recommend that the instructions to be given to such Agent for his guidance in the matter referred to, be as follows:—

"The fact that a Parliamentary Committee will probably hear evidence and report to the House of Commons on the subject of the *Hudson's* Bay Territory, makes it impossible for His Excellency to convey to you instructions which are not in themselves more or less vague.

- "His Excellency cannot anticipate the nature of the evidence to be given, or forestal the conclusion to be arrived at by such Committee. Even after the Committee shall have reported, the course likely to be taken by Parliament or by Her Majesty's Government can only be conjectured.
- "You will not therefore expect to receive instructions of a very definite character, but His Excellency has full and complete confidence in your knowledge and discretion, and he confides this mission to you the more readily, because your position in the Country is such as to imply an entire estrangement from all the ordinary ties of local or party politics.
- "Immediately on your arrival in London, you will place yourself in communication, with the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Colonies, (to whom these instructions have been communicated) and as soon as any Parliamentary Committee on the subject of the Hudson's Bay Company or Territory is constituted, you will take steps for offering to afford all information in your power, relating to the interest or claims of Canada.
- "You will consider it as part of your duty to watch over those interests by correcting any erroneous impressions, and by bringing forward any claims of a legal or equitable kind which this Province may possess, on account its territorial position, or its past history,
- "You will not consider yourself as authorized to conclude any negociation, or to assent to any definite plan of settlement affecting *Canada*, without reporting the particulars of the same, and your own views thereon, to His Excellency in Council.
- "His Excellency has full and complete confidence in the justice and consideration of Her Majesty's Government, and he is sure that the interests and feelings of *Canada* will be consulted, so far as is consistent with right and justice.
  - "The people of Canada desire nothing more.
- "His Excellency feels it particularly necessary that the importance of securing the North West Territory against the sudden and unauthorized influx of immigration from the United States side, should be strongly pressed. He fears that the continued vacancy of this great tract, with a boundary not marked on the soil itself, may lead to future loss and injury, both to England and to Canada. He wishes you to urge the expediency of marking out the limits, and so protecting the frontier of the lands above Lake Superior, about the Red River, and thence to the Pacific, as effectually to secure them against violent seizure or irregular settlement, until the advancing tide of emigrants from Canada and the United Kingdom may fairly flow into them, and occupy them as subjects of the Queen on behalf of the British Empire.
  - "With these objects in view, it is especially important that Her Majesty's

Government should guard any renewal of a license of occupation (should such be determined on) or any recognition of rights in the Company, by such stipulations as will cause such license or such rights not to interfere with the fair and legitimate occupation of tracts adapted for settlement.

- "It is unnecessary, of course, to urge in any way the future importance of Vancouver's Island as the key to all British North America on the side of the Pacific, situated as it is between the extensive sea-board of Russian America and the vast territory in the hands of the United States.
- "His Excellency cannot foresee the course which a Committee of the House of Commons may see fit to pursue in the proposed enquiry, or determine beforehand on what points evidence may be required.
- "At any moment, however, His Excellency will be ready to attend to your suggestions, and supply such information, either by documentary evidence, or by witnesses from *Canada*, as you think necessary, and he may be able to send over.
- "You will, of course, act upon such instructions as you may, from to time receive.

Immediately on arriving in London, you will place yourself in communication with the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, (to whom these instructions have been communicated), and as soon as any Parliamentary Committee on the subject of the Hudson's Bay Company or Territory is constituted, you will take steps for offering to afford all information in your power, relating to the interests or claims of Canada.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL, &c., &c., &c.

The Petition of *Henry Garrett* humbly and respectfully represents;

That on or about the 29th day of December last, on the information and complaint of one George Osborne, an American citizen, resident in the city of Detroit or elsewhere in the United States, a warrant for the apprehension of Archy Luster (a colored man resident at Windsor, C. W.) was issued by Thomas Woodbridge and John A. Wilkinson, Esquires, Justices of the Peace for the County of Essex.

That the said magistrates ordered one Samuel Port, a constable, to execute the warrant, and that in obedience to the instructions he had received, the said constable proceeded to Windsor and arrested the said Archy Luster, handcuffed him, and in his own (the constable's sleigh) accompanied by two American citizens from Detroit, drove to Sandwich.

That on arriving there (after dark) the sleigh was driven to a public house; that here the constable left the prisoner, in company of the two Americans, and intimated his intention to proceed in search of the magistrates. That while the constable was absent, the two Americans forced the prisoner, who was still hand-cuffed, into the sleigh, and drove across the river, on the ice, to the American side. That on the following day the horse and sleigh were returned to the constable. That your Petitioner has repeatedly applied to the magistrates to investigate the circumstances of this case, and call upon the constable either to produce the prisoner, or hold him answerable for not doing so, but that up to this date, they have declined taking any action in the matter, alleging that it is not their duty to act except upon the sworn complaint of some one acquainted with the facts.

That your Petitioner is informed and believes, that the prisoner who was kidnapped in the manner above described was a fugitive from slavery, and that the

charge advanced against him, was a mere device, by which to get him into the hands of his pursuers.

That the only redress which could be obtained by lodging a complaint before the Magistrates above named, would in all probability, be some trifling punishment inflicted upon the constable. That your Petitioner has a higher object in view, than the gratification of a spirit of resentment, and he confidently relies upon the belief that your Excellency and your honorable Council, will at once perceive, that if Magistrates suffer conduct, such as he has described, on the part of the constable acting under their orders to pass unnoticed, there must at once be an end to that happy feeling of security which the colored inhabitants of this Province have hitherto enjoyed under the Government of Her Majesty.

Your Petitioner therefore humbly prays that your Excellency in Council will be graciously pleased to order an enquiry to be made into the circumstances of this case, and as in duty bound your Petitioner will ever pray, &c.

Sir:

I beg leave to acknowledge the receipt of the Petition referred to in yours of the 22nd inst.

In reply thereto, I beg to state for the information of His Excellency, that the following are the facts of the case, alluded to in the Petition.

On the 29th of December last, one George Osborne of the County of Wastinaw in the State of Michigan, Deputy Sheriff, came to me for the purpose of obtaining a warrant to apprehend Archy Lanton (not Luster) a colored man, who had made his escape from the custody of the said Sheriff, charged with horse stealing, and upon his presenting a requisition, to which was attached the signature and seal of the Governor of the State of Michigan, wherein was stated the nature of the crime committed by the said Archy Lanton, and after taking an affidavit of the facts, myself and Mr. Wilkinson issued a warrant directed to Samuel Port, constable for this county, to apprehend the said Archy Lanton, and bring him before us, the said Justices.

On the 5th of January last, one week from the date of the warrant, I went to my office about 3 o'clock in the afternoon (not after dark as stated in Petition.) During my absence, Samuel Port had been there with the prisoner Lanton. I waited for his return, and shortly after Port came and told me had he been for Mr. Wilkinson, he (Port) was alone. I then ordered him to bring the prisoner. He soon returned and said the prisoner was gone, and the men (with whom the prisoner was left) also. I then told him he must search for him; it was not dark then. On my afterwards learning that the prisoner was not found, I enquired from the Chairman of the Quarter Sessions how I should proceed, as I had no proof of any intentional conniving or neglect of the constable. He informed me I could not do anything, as he considered the remedy was by civil action. I also consulted the Statutes, and found I could do nothing without a complaint upon oath, touching the guilt or innocence of the constable.

About three or four days after the occurrence, Petitioner came to lay a complaint to me, which I at once proceeded to take. Upon enquiry, he said, that he was in London, C. W., at the time alluded to, and knew nothing of the matter but what he had heard, neither could he produce any evidence of the escape or how it occurred. I then pointed out to him the course of the law in such cases, and furnished him with the names of the parties concerned, and dates. In fact I gave him all the advice I could upon the subject to assist, and the communication from His Excellency the Governor General is the first I have heard of it since, to which I most cheerfully respond.

Should His Exceellency require any further information, I shall be most happy to give it; but I believe I have stated all I know in reference to the charges against myself.

I have the honor of giving you all the information I have, relating to the Petition of a colored man of the name of Henry Garrett, concerning a colored man, who was arrested under a Warrant issued by Mr. Thomas Woodbridge and myself, as Magistrates, charged under Oath by a Mr. Osborne a Deputy Sheriff, that he, the colored man named Archy Lanton had committed a crime in the United States, and on the said information, Mr. Woodbridge and myself issued our Warrant, directed to the Constable Samuel Port, to apprehend the said colored man, and bring him before us The said Constable about a week afterwards told me that he had arrested the said man, and that he had made his escape from him:—On enquiry I found that he had been taken away, or had consented to go to the other side with some men; I could not got any reliable information in what manner the prisoner had been taken away.

The Petitioner Henry Garrett came to my house shortly after, and he had one other colored man with him, to give me information upon the subject, and when I asked the colored man what he could prove, he said that a colored man had told him that he saw the prisoner, Archy Lanton, in the custody of Samuel Port, the Constable, and I said that as the Constable had said he had taken the colored man, that it was not of any use to take this, as it was only hearsay evidence, and the Constable acknowledged that he had taken the man prisoner.

I have read the letter of Mr. Woodbridge, and I fully agree with him as far as I know of the circumstances, and I do not believe Mr. Woodbridge has ever seen the prisoner, neither have I.

### WARRANT TO APPREHEND.

Whereas Archy Lanton (colored man) from the State of Ohio, has this day been charged upon oath before the undersigned two of her Majesty's Justices of the Peace in and for the said County of Essex, for that he is a refugee from Justice, being charged with Felony in the United States, and has made his escape from the Officer who had him in custody.

These are therefore to command you in Her Majesty's name forthwith to apprehend the said *Archy Lanton*, and bring him before us, or some other of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, in and for the said County of *Essex*, to answer unto the said charge, and to be further dealt with according to law.

Given under our hands and Seals, this twenty-ninth day of December, in the year of Our Lord, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, at the Town of Sandwich, in the County of Essex aforesaid.

Gentlemen,—I am commanded by His Excellency the Governor General, to inform you that His Excellency has had under his consideration the Petition of Henry Garrett, (a copy of which was transmitted to you in my letter of the 22nd

February last,) together with the several letters and papers forwarded by you to me, for His Excellency's information in connection therewith.

His Excellency directs me now to inform you, that he is advised that you had no power to arrest the colored man *Lanton*, referred to in the Petition, for a crime committed in the *United States*, unless under the Statute 12 *Victoria*, chapter 19, and then only on a specific application for his Extradition, under the *Ashburton* Treaty.

Had you taken the trouble to consult the above mentioned Statute, (as in a matter of such importance, it was your duty to do), you could not have failed to see that neither the Warrant from the authorities in *Michigan*, nor the deposition of *Osborne*, the complainant, shewed that *Lanton* had committed any crime, for which he could be surrendered to the Authorities of the *United States*.

It appears therefore that *Lanton* was illegally arrested and improperly put into the hands of the pursuing parties; and His Excellency considers that your conduct, even if it was caused from ignorance or carelessness, was highly reprehensible, and that your supineness in not pressing an enquiry into the complaint made to you, by *Henry Garrett*, and into the conduct of the constable concerned was equally so.

Under these circumstances His Excellency is forced to the conclusion, that your further continuance in the Commission of the Peace would not be conducive to the ends of Justice, His Excellency has accordingly directed your removal from the Commission of the Peace by the usual Writ of Discharge.

# TO HIS EXCELLENCY SIR EDMUND WALKER HEAD, BARONET, GOVERNOR GENERAL OF BRITISH NORTH AMERICA, &c. &c.

The Memorial of the undersigned inhabitants of Sandwich, and its immediate neighbourhood.

#### MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

In the month of April last, or about that time, John Alexander Wilkinson and Thomas Woodbridge, Esquires, of Sandwich, were dimissed by Your Excellency from the Commission of the Peace for this County, in consequence of an error committed by them, with reference to a man of colour from the United States, whom they caused to be arrested, by mistake, as we sincerely believe. Both the above gentlemen are two of the oldest Magistrates in this County, and we may add, two of the most respectable. Mr. Woodbridge is Reeve of the Township of Sandwich, and being a Justice of the Peace, by virtue of his office as Reeve, he has applied himself, and still applies himself, most properly and sedulously to his magisterial duties; and his time has, to our knowledge, been occupied for whole days together in those duties, without any remuneration whatever. In short, there is but one other magistrate in Sandwich (the County town) to assist him in his labors.

As good and loyal subjects of the Queen, and as citizens of the County, we believe that Your Excellency will perform an act of justice, (and such act would be most gratefully accepted by us, and every body else, who can estimate the character and useful conduct of worthy and experienced magistrates) if these gentlemen, Mr. Wilkinson and Mr. Woodbridge, were restored to the Commission of the Peace for this County; and we therefore do most humbly and most respectfully solicit Your Excellency to perform to them, as well as to ourselves and the community at large, a gracious act of justice, and a very high compliment, by directing a Commission to issue, with their names included as Magistrates for our County.

NOTE.—The sleeping accommodation for Travellers in Taverns, is set forth in the certificates of qualifications of applicants, submitted for the approval and sanction of local or Municipal Councils, such certificates bear the signatures of fifty Municipal Electors, as perform hereunto annexed. There are not many more than three Counties in the District of Quebec, in which Licensed Taverns exist; Boarding Houses and Temperance Hotels are the only places for the reception of Travellers in the other Counties. The refusal of municipalities to license even proper Houses, renders travelling in the rural parts of the District frequently unpleasant; every one having the right to open Bearding Houses, no one incurs the expense of fitting up a house properly, and complaints are very general, especially in the Winter months. In many Taverns in the City the sleeping accommodation is scarcely in accordance with the requirements of the Law. The Licensed Houses of public entertainment are generally orderly and well kept, but complaints are frequently made about unlicensed Houses, in localities such as Champlain Street, or the suburbs of Quebec.

Copy of Complaint against Geo. M. Boswell, Esquire, Judge of the United Counties of Northnmberland and Dnrham, and of that Gentleman's reply thereto.

Cobourg, February 18th, 1857.

Sir,—Having recently been informed of several matters, in which the integrity and uprightness of the Judge of the County Court for the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham, are implicated; and suspicions having been entertained that he is endeavouring to effect his resignation upon some terms which may be advantageous to himself, I beg respectfully to suggest that a Commission should be appointed to enquire into his conduct.

The matters to which I particularly refer, are:—First, That one of the Bailiffs appointed by him, Almond Buck, Father-in-law, to his own son, A. G. Boswell Equire, a practising Attorney, in conjunction with his son-in-law, attempted to prevail upon a widow lady of straightened means to compound a claim she had

sued before the said Judge, and the money for which claim, had actually been paid to the said Bailiff, of which she was kept in ignorance. The said Judge was made acquainted with this conduct of one of his Bailiff's, and continued him in office until a short time ago, when he is said to have resigned, although it is thought by many, he will yet resume his office.

Another matter referred to is, that it is asserted and believed, that the said Judge has bestowed offices in his gift upon members of his family, or upon others, who, with the supposed knowledge of the said Judge, have afterwards sold their offices.

A further matter is, that the said Judge, by himself, or through his son, is in the habit of loaning money to persons in embarrassed circumstances, at exorbitant and unlawful rates of interest; a practise calculated to lessen the respect due to the office of a Judge, who should enforce the laws as far in his power, instead of wilfully violate them.

A fourth matter referred to is, that the said Judge, a few years ago, was a Director in the Cobourg and Peterboro' Railway Company, and was well aware that the said Company had made a road across a small piece of land belonging to a nephew of the said Judge's wife, a lad of about 19 years of age. The said land was of comparatively little value at the time, and the Company was assured by the Judge that the portion of it required by the Company should be conveyed by the Company upon moderate and reasonable terms, such as the Judge himself and others had accepted for lands similarly situated. The Judge was supposed then to be acting as the friend or guardian of the infant, and the price then spoken of for the quantity of land required for the use of the Company, belonging to the infant Bogert, was eighty pounds, or eighty pounds for each quarter acre which I considered was beyond its value; and far beyond the price which others had accepted for land in the vicinity, equally well situated. The said Judge within a few weeks since the young Mr. Bogert has come of age, has purchased the piece of land alluded to from Mr. Bogert, although he was not fully aware of its being occupied by the Railway, which passes over it. The said Judge now claims £500 for it, from the Cobourg and Peterboro Railway.

He is said to have borrowed about £1000 from one of his Clerks at 6 per cent interest for a number of years, although he loans money himself at 18 and 20 per cent.

These transactions would generally be considered improper in any one, but especially so in a Judge. Should His Excellency in Council consider that such conduct should undergo investigation, I believe ample testimony can be produced to substantiate the statements herein made.

I am satisfied that the Hon. Geo. S. Boulton of this town, would, if applied to, afford his conviction of the correctness of the statements I have made.

Sir,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter, of the 5th instant, enclosing "a copy of a Memorial from Mr. T. F. Nichol, preferring "certain charges against me, as Judge of the United Counties of Northumber- "land and Durham, and requesting me to furnish you, for His Excellency's "information, with any remarks I may desire to make with reference to the "statements contained in the Memorial."

The first charge made, is in relation to a former Bailiff, of the Court, and the substance of the complaint as respects my own conduct in the matter, is that, although I was made aware of the transaction alluded to, I permitted the Bailiff for a considerable period to continue in the Office. In reply to this I have to state that no complaint was ever made to me, by any person whatever on the subject: Mr. Nicholl, it is true, published in a Newspaper of this Town, a statement similar to that contained in his Memorial. As soon as I heard of it, I spoke to the Bailiff on the subject, and he denied to me in the most positive terms the truth of the statement. I think it is due to this party to state, that, I believed his denial of the matter at the time, and still believe it: He ceased to be a Bailiff of the Court last November.

The second charge, in general terms, is, that I bestowed Offices in my gift "upon "Members of my family or upon others, who, with the supposed knowledge of my"self, have afterwards sold their offices." This charge, I assert to be untrue and unfounded in every particular, and I deny in terms as positive, as I can find language to make the denial in, that there is any ground whatever for this scandalous imputation. I have never been a party to, or had any knowledge of any Office in my gift, being transferred from one party to another for any consideration, pecuniary or otherwise. My practice has always been to promise no Office to an applicant until a vacancy occurred, for the express purpose of preventing any bargaining respecting it. I will further observe that no Member of my family has ever held any Office within my gift, except in one instance, that of my eldest son, who was Clerk of a Division Court, while under articles: In 1854, when he was amitted a Barrister and Attorney, he resigned this Office, and now to member of my family, or any person related to, or connected with me in any may, holds any Office of which I had the bestowal.

The two charges above referred to, are the only ones contained in Mr. Nicholl's Memorial connected with the duties of my Office as Judge.

Respecting these matters His Excellency has a right to expect from me the fullest information, and I have desired to give it.

With reference to the other charges, three in number, they have relation only to personal matters, altogether unconnected with my official duties, and I have to remark with reference to all of them, that in every particuler, in which they

convey, or are intended to convey any imputation against my character and conduct, as a gentleman, and man of honor, or of one holding the dignified and important office of a Judge, they are malicious, false, and unfounded.

I abstain purposely from making any statement in reference to the Author of this Memorial; but in self-defence I feel bound to observe, that I am prepared to shew, that he is influenced in his attack upon me, by motives of the worst description. This reference to the Honorable Geo. S. Boulton may, to some extent be adduced in proof of this, for it so happens that Mr. Boulton is the only gentleman in the community, so far as I know, who entertains any other than friendly feelings towards me, and this no doubt Mr. Nicholl is perfectly aware of,

In conclusion, I may be permitted, humbly to solicit the attention of His Excellency to the fact, that the complaint made against me, comes from no person professing to have received injury at my hands, and I am perfectly conscious, that throughout the country no one can be found, who will state that I have committed towards him wrong of any kind.

Sir,—In reference to the charges brought against me by Mr. Nicholl, I beg leave respectfully to submit to His Excellency the following remarks, in addition to my former communication on the same subject.

Of these charges there is one, and one only, which from its nature admits, in some respects, if untrue, of direct refutation, I allude to that, respecting some Town Lots, through which the Cobourg and Peterboro' Railway runs, purchased by me of Mr. Bogert.

Although this charge relates altogether to a private transaction, it would, if true, as stated by Mr. Nicholl, be a deep stain on my conduct. I therefore deem it proper to give a short history of the matter, and to furnish proof of the falsehood of that portion of the charge, which more particularly affects my character.

Several years ago, when I was Director of the Railway, after the Survey of the line was principally made; but previous to Titles being acquired for any considerable portion of it, the general question as to the probable cost of the right of

way was a matter of frequent conversation at the Board. When the Lots in question were spoken of, I stated my connection with the owner of them, and the probability that I might be referred to as to their value. I never held out that I had any right to make any bargain respecting them; but on the contrary I expressly stated to Mr. Scott, who at the time was acting President, and the principal party to whom the settlement of these matters was entrusted; that I had no authority with reference to them, I did state what my opinion as to their value was at that time, and I have no doubt that I put it at the extreme amount. I wrote to the late Mr. Bogert's Executors on the subject, and informed them of the fact of the Railway passing through the Lots, and offered my services to get the I received however no authority to act for them. I was asked matter settled. for further information, which I gave. Thus the matter stood in the Spring of 1852, when I ceased to be a Director, and left this country on a visit to England for several months. I took it for granted that the Company having ascertained what they deemed to be a proper value of the land, would take the course pointed out by the Railway Clauses Act with reference to the land of Minors required for Railway purposes. No proceeding however of this kind was taken, and no communication was ever made to me by any person with reference to those Lots, in behalf of the Company, or to any one on Mr. Bogert's behalf. When Mr. Bogert therefore came of age, he had a just claim on the Company for the full and increased value of the land. I spoke to him soon afterwards on the subject and pointed out the Lots to him, and subsequently contracted with him for the purchase of them, together with other property owned by him in this Town. Some time after the purchase I wrote to the President of the Railway Company, offering to take five hundred pounds for the Lots, but in the same letter stated that I was quite willing to submit the price to arbitration.

I have now to refer to that portion of the same charge, and this is the main object of my present communication, which accuses me of a gross fraud on Mr. Bogert. I permitted the matter to rest, without any reference to that Gentleman, for a considerable period after a Copy of Mr. Nicholl's Memorial had been communicated to me: I did so in the belief that some busy maligner, in the hope of making a case against me, might refer to him, and I wished him to give his own account of the matter without any communication with me. I found out, that, through his friends, some enquiry had been made of him, on the subject, and I knew that his answer could not have been otherwise than favorable to me. On the 30th March last, I forwarded to him a verbatim copy of all Mr. Nicholl's charge respecting this subject, with the request that he would give me his own unbiassed account of the matter. The following is a copy of his reply.

Toronto, 2nd April, 1857.

My dear Mr. Boswell,—I have to acknowledge the receipt of a letter from your dated March 30th, containing a copy of some charges brought against you in

reference to your actions about those lots which I sold you, and through which the Cobourg and Peterboro' Railway passes: Thanks to you I was fully aware of the position of these Lots, having walked over them with you, and having a copy of a registered Map which you were kind enough to mark for me: Previous to your buying the Lots, you had volunteered to obtain from the Cobourg and Peterboro' Railway their full value for me. Before I sold to you, I had consulted my friends, and was in no way taken advantage of by you, in respect of our relative position. In fact I consider that your conduct throughbut the whole transaction was kind, upright, honest and honorable, so much so, that I consider the charges brought against you, as nothing but an impertment prying into your private transactions, and base and malicious slanders.

It will be perceived that this Letter refutes most directly and positively the most injurious of all the charges made by Mr. Nicholl, and I desire to draw attention to the fact that it convicts my accuser of direct falsehood, in a matter where his charge is not stated as made from rumour, but is direct and without any reserve whatever.

All the matters charged by him, where they impute to me any distinct wrong, I assert to be equally false.

As a key to Mr. Nicholl's motives I annex an anonymous communication sent to me through the Post Office some months ago. I am perfectly persuaded the letter was written by himself. The word "appearantly" I have myself heard him speak as spelt in this letter.

The note he refers to, and which he gave me for a pair of horses I had sold, I did not of course send to him. I think it was only a few days after this letter was received that he attempted to attack me through the local press here, but the Editor expunged from his communication, as I afterwards learnt, the parts relating to myself. It was only a short period after I had obtained security for this debt, and which he was compelled to give, because a Chattel Mortgage he had given of his property was found to be defective, that the Memorial making his charges against me was sent to the Government.

I am well aware that the motives of a party who prefers a charge, are not generally a proper subject of enquiry, but when the accusation is positively denied, and no other proof given of it but the word of the accuser himself, his conduct, character and motives, become matters of deep importance.

I have not considered it my duty to suggest any course that the Government might take in this matter. I have every confidence that the protection to which my office entitles me will be afforded.

I entertain no fear whatever of the result as respects myself, and am quite prepared for any course that may be taken. My chief desire is, that no scandal shall befall the honorable office with which I have been entrusted. Should I be disappointed in this, the fault lies not with me, but with my malignant accuser, and any party who may abet or countenance his most disgraceful proceeding.

I conclusion, I have respectfully to request that in case the documents relative to the subject of this letter should be communicated to the Legislature, that the statement now submitted may accompany them.

From the Reports on the Paris Industrial Exhibition of 1855, by the Mixed International Jury, being those portions relating to Canadian Products.

### FIRST CLASS.

MINING AND METALLURGY.

1st Section.—Statistics and Documents of a general nature.
GRAND MEDALS OF HONOR.

Canada.

At the suggestion of the Governor of Canada, the Legislature of that Province in 1841, for the first time, voted funds for a Geological Survey, which was commenced the following year by Mr. W. E. Logan, assisted by Mr. A. Murray and with the cooperation, for the chemistry and mineralogy, of one of our colleagues. Since that period, with the aid of fresh grants from the Colonial Government and by means of personal sacrifices, Mr. Logan has prosecuted his difficult task with perseverance and energy deserving of the highest praise. He contributes to the Exhibition, as the result of fifteen years' study, a Geological Map of the Colony, comprising both banks of the St. Lawrence and the borders of the Great Lakes, and also a collection remarkable for the great size of some of its specimens and exhibiting a complete series, classified and ticketed with the greatest care, of the economic minerals and building materials contained in the soil of Canada.

Among these specimens are some magnetic and hematitic iron ores taken from several localities and from beds of remarkable thickness and extent, masses of chromic iron and of titaniferous iron associated with rutile, together with various ores of silver, cobalt, copper, nickel and zinc, amongst which are some from the Bruce Copper Mines, which are now worked on a large scale; gold obtained from the sands of Nouvelle Beauce, where it is combined with platinum and with alloys of osmium and iridium; a collection of copper and gold ores presented by Mr. Sleeper, of Que-

bec; a fine collection of minerals, containing in particular some remarkable crystals of phosphate of lime, presented by Doctor Wilson; lastly, some specimens of gypsum, bitumen and carbonate of magnesia, which occur in masses sufficiently considerable to admit of their being worked on a large scale.

The Jury of the First Class consider that independently of the intrinsic merit of Mr. Logan's work, the peculiar difficulties which present themselves to the explorer of a new country like Canada should be taken into account. They have no hesitation in awarding the Grand Medal of Honor to Mr. Logan, Director of the Geological Commission of Canada (No. 8 of the Special Catalogue of that Colony.)—Callon, Reporter.

### SECOND CLASS.

WOODS AND FORESTS, HUNTING, FISHING, AND THE GATHERING OF PRODUCE OBTAINED WITHOUT CULTIVATION.

### MEDALS OF HONOR.

The Colony of Canada took steps for the exhibition of its products in a masterly manner. At the same time that the Executive Committee for the Paris Exhibition was making a magnificent collection of natural, industrial and commercial products, determined to make known to Europe the vast country made fertile by the hands of its English and French population, they promoted the composition of interesting essays on the actual state of Canada, its commerce, its resources and its future prospects; and lastly, the Commissioners on behalf of the Executive Committee at the Industrial Palace completed its zealous labours by the successive publication of a valuable series of documents on political, commercial and maritime subjects connected with Canada, in 1854, and of a catalogue of the Canadian collection classified in accordance with the system adopted by the Imperial Commission. All these very valuable documents, translated into French when necessary, were freely given to all who applied at the Office of the Commissioners for information on the subject of their country.

Thus prepared and explained the Canadian Exhibition presented itself, moreover, in most excellent and intelligible order. No one can have passed through the gallery on the river-side called the *Annexe* without remarking near the entrance at the North East end a rectangular compartment, the centre of which was occupied by a pyramid of the most beautiful specimens of woods, and in which was brought together a vast and beautiful collection of animal and vegetable products, furniture, vehicles, metals, instruments of labour, articles of luxury, in a word, all the signs of an industrious and a productive community.

Among these interesting objects the Jury of the 2nd class had to examine the productions of twenty-seven exhibitors, The Jury noticed in particular the rich collection of Canadian woods and some magnificent specimens of those beautiful furs which the Hudson's Bay Company annually contributes to the commerce of the world.

The collection of woods made by several exhibitors at the instigation of the Executive Committee, and at the expense of the Colonial Government, is composed of about 120 specimens, the greater number of which are of undeniable beauty. This collection represents important commercial interests in a magnificent manner. The exports from Canada of the products of the forest amounted in value in 1853, to £2,355,255 Sterling, (58,881,375 francs) besides timber used in the building of vessels at Quebec, amounting in value to £620,187 Sterling (15,504,675 francs.)

The most valuable of the woods so exported are, white pine (Pinus strobus); red pine (Pinus resinosa); several kinds of oak: white oak, (Quercus alba et Quercus bicolor,) red oak (Quercus rubra) and black oak (Quercus nigra); white Elm (Ulmus Americana), and red Elm (Ulmus fulva.) Besides this important foreign commerce, the domestic consumption of woods of all kinds is estimated at more than £2,000,000 Sterling, (50,000,000 francs.) so that the forests of Canada yielded in 1853, products to the value of about £4,552,000 Sterling, (113,800,000 francs.)

The partial collections intended to make known the different species of woods which form the staples of Canadian commerce are four in number, to which must be added some solitary or less numerous specimens, furnished by several other exhibitors.

Mr. Andrew Dickson, of Kingston (Upper Canada) has carefully collected named and made a catalogue of 64 specimens of different woods, one half of which were taken from a superficies of 100 acres. These specimens belong to 16 families and are set forth in the following catalogue, which gives successively the botanical name and the Canadian, English, and French names.

Mr. John Sharples, of Quebec (Lower Canada) furnished the Executive Committee with 36 magnificent specimens of the woods of the country, collected by him, and carefully enumerated in a catalogue, with an indication of their uses.

The dimensions of these specimens of woods are really grand; there may have been seen rising up there, in the elegant central pyramid, boards of three and four *mètres* long by 50, 60 and 70 *centimètres* wide. Some of these pieces were really of remarkable dimensions, considering the substance of which they were composed.

It appears from the remarks annexed to the Catalogue, that in Canada the Larix Americana, the Quercus alba, the Ulmus Americana, and the Betulalenta are very generally used in ship-building; and the Juglans cinerea, the Betula lenta and the Acer saccharinum in cabinet-work; the Betula alba is used in the construction of canoes and in the making of coverings for houses; the Tilia Americana is considered a good material for panels of carriages, because it neither warps nor splits, and takes a beautiful polish.

Besides these, Mr. Sharples' catalogue does not contain any species which does not appear in the foregoing.

A collection of the same kinds, to the number of 17, was turnished by Messrs. Farmer and de Blaquière, of Woodstock (Upper Canada.) Mr. Gamble has sent specimens of six of these kinds; and several other Canadians have added single pieces to them.

In another section I will speak of the specimens of furs exhibited by the Hudson's Bay Company; these are in truth articles of commerce, the produce of the chace, and not objects intended merely to make known the products of the country

To sum up, the Colony of Canada has sent to our Exhibition some splendid pieces of indigenous woods, in large boards and in round blocks. Although all these kinds of wood were already known, the care with which the specimens have been selected, their beauty, their richness, could not fail to arrest the attention of the Jury.— The Jury have had occasion to notice also a good number of natural products, such as fine samples of potash, maple sugar, &c., which taken together give a correct idea of the commerce of those vast regions. And lastly, the beautiful specimens of skins and furs which accompany these vegetable products complete this rich and instructive collection. The Jury have therefore awarded a medal of honor to the Colony of Canada; and in order to reward those who have seconded the efforts of the Executive Committee, they have also granted a first class medal to Mr. Andrew Dickson, of Kingston, and two second class medals, one to Mr John Sharples, of Quebec, and the other to Messrs. Farmer and de Blaquière of Woodstock.

# 4th Section.—Hunting of Land and Amphibious Animals.

The most important article in this section is evidently that of furs. Although, in consequence no doubt of present circumstances, there has been a lamentable deficiency under this head of animal product, we have seen some beautiful things, and it has been our duty to award prizes that have been fairly earned.

I have already, in speaking of the Canadian exhibition, noticed the rich specimens of furs sent, although in small numbers, by the Hudson's Bay Company (No. 55.) of Canada, under the name of Sir George Simpson, their Governor. Among the furs so sent, the following, of which I give the value as stated to us, exclusive of import duties, were particularly worthy of notice.

In fact the mere name of the Hudson's Bay Company suggests the idea of a

trade in furs so extensive that Europe is indebted to it for about half of what it annually consumes in this line. The Jury have awarded a first Class Medal to the Hudson's Bay Company.

#### 5th SECTION .- FISHING.

## § I.—Fishing for Cetaceous Animals.

This portion of the subjects of the art of fishing was represented chiefly by products, consisting principally of the oils of various cetaceous animals, which have been submitted to examination in the sixteenth class rather than in this class. I will specify, however, some products of this kind contained in those large collections, which I have already described.

The valuable qualities of the porpoise oil which was seen in the Canadian collection, under the names of two exhibitors, Mr. Keefer, (No. 176,) of Montreal, and Messrs. Lepage and Lévêque, (No. 178,) of Rimouski, could no doubt be advantageously turned to account in the industrial arts. This oil has the property of congealing only at a very low temperature, and it is the only one which can withstand the intense cold of the winter season in that country; accordingly it is much used in the light-houses on the rivers there. From what we have heard it is perhaps employed also in the preparation of certain kinds of varnish. It is obtained from a species of dolphin, the name of which I cannot exactly specify.

In the same Canadian collection Mr. Têtu (No. 82.) of Rivière Ouelle, exhibited whale oil and porpoise oil, and even some leather made of the skin of the last named cetaceous animal.

# 6th SECTION.—COLLECTIONS OF PRODUCE OBTAINED WITHOUT CULTIVATION § I.—Alimentary Substances.

We viewed with interest in the Canadian Exhibition the maple sugar of Messrs. Gasse, (No. 191,) Rimouski; Redpath, (No. 202,) Montreal; Taylor, (No. 207.) of Hatley, and Valois (No. 184,) of Montreal.—Although now very well known, the maple sugar (Acer saccharinum and Acer platanoides) is nevertheless one of the most curious products of the vegetable kingdom. This sugar is peculiarly valuable to persons living in isolated places, who are forced to depend almost entirely upon nature for the supply of their primary wants.—Each family has its tree or trees, and gathers its crop in a very simple manner. About the month of March a hole is made in the trunk of the tree, into which a small wooden conduit is introduced, and the sap runs out rapidly. The hole is made obliquely upwards, and penetrates about two centimetres into the soft wood beneath the bark; two are usually made, about sixty centimetres from the ground and on the south side of the tree, because the contrast between the heat of the day and the coolness of the night is indispensably required for causing the juice of the tree to run. The liquid is caught in vessels and immediately boiled in kettles,

to prevent its fermenting; after having been concentrated by evaporation, it is passed through a blanket, then it is boiled to the consistency of syrup and cast in a mould; a single tree will furnish every spring for thirty years from two to three *kilogrammes* of very white and well tasted sugar. In consequence of the case with which this manufacture is accomplished, three women can look after and work a plantation capable of furnishing 500 *kilogrammes* of sugar.

This branch of industry, however, can only be practised in the country itself, and out of the reach of competition with other sugars, for its products are not very economical. Maple sugar costs about one *franc* and forty *centimes* the *kilogramme*, and maple syrup seventy *centimes*.—Fochlon, *Reporter*.

### THIRD CLASS.

#### AGRICULTURE.

1st Section.—Statistics and Documents of a general nature.

The exhibition has not produced any statistical documents concerning non-European Countries, with the exception of Algeria and Canada.—But these documents exhibit such characteristics of exactness and interest, that it is impossible to abstain from mentioning them here in some detail.

All those who visited the Industrial Palace must surely have remarked the magnificent Algerian and Canadian collections; these collections, being composed almost entirely of agricultural products would not have had their full significancy if it had not been possible to obtain circumstantial information as to the articles they contained.

Canada, a country almost as new as Algeria as far as modern agricultural civilization is concerned, presents a striking contrast to the African Colony of France. The progress of agriculture there is almost as rapid as it is in England; there is not an improved instrument invented in Europe which is not immediately used there; the most perfect breeds of animals, Durham cattle, Berkshire pigs and Scotch horses are there in all their beauty. The most improved modes of culture have met with no opposition, but have been introduced there at once. It will be one of the most striking results of the Universal Exhibition of 1855, that it will have made known to Europe the prodigious growth of a Colony which by means of agricultural labour alone has raised itself to a high degree of prosperity.

The Government of Canada has made great exertions to attract attention to this prosperity. Not only was its exhibition highly remarkable, but it had also offered three prizes, for the best essays on Canada and its resources.

The competition on this occasion produced nineteen essays, from which the Jury appointed to examine them selected six, for which prizes were awarded.

The essay which obtained the first prize, written in English, has been translated into French and printed at the expense of the Canadian Government; another, written originally in French, which reminds us that a great part of Canada is in some sort a French country, from the origin and language of its inhabitants, has also been printed.

The two books of Messrs Hogan and Taché have been distributed with great liberality. We shall borrow from them some figures which will speak well for the progress of the agriculture of that vast region of America which was formerly la Nouvelle France, and which has preserved the traditions of the mother country.

The entire area of Canada contains 96,000,000 hectares lying along both banks of the magnificent River St. Lawrence; this is almost twice the extent of France and three times that of Great Britain; the population is now 2,000,000; it was not 700,000 in 1827. It is chiefly in Upper Canada, or Canada West, that is to say in the region which appertains to English civilization, that this enormous increase has taken place. Lower Canada, which appertains to French civilization, has advanced less rapidly of late years; it does not seem to be animated to the same extent by the spirit of enterprize; the population there is of longer standing, and it does not attract in so great a degree the shoals of emigrants whom Europe is constantly sending to that land which offers a country, property, and a happy though laborious life to those who experienced only suffering and wretchedness on their native soil.

Canada is far from being yet cleared of its forests; the lands hitherto granted, it is an interesting fact to mention, form a small portion of the extent of this colony; they amount to only 7,196,000 hectares, which are divided as tollows:—

It will be readily understood, on comparing these comparatively low figures with those which represent the whole extent of the country, that the British Government warmly encourages emigration to Canada, which it looks upon as a granary for the mother country. Accordingly the Crown Lands are sold to the Emigrants at from 3 to 12 francs the hectare\* in Lower Canada, and at from

<sup>\*</sup>The hectare is equal to 2.47 English acres; the hectolitre, to 22. imperial gallons; and the kilogramme to 2.2 pounds avoirdupois.

12 to 60 francs the hectare in Upper Canada. In the former Province the purchase money is payable in five years, and in the latter in ten years. It is seldom that less than from 40 to 80 hectares are sold at a time, and the purchaser must settle upon his new property.

8th Section.—Hydraulic Elevating Machines, and other Machines.

First Class Medals.

Mr. Perry, (No. 130,) of Montreal, (Canada).— Exhibited a very well arranged fire engine, the cylinders of which are inclined in order more completely

to ensure the movement of the piston-rods in a strait line. This arrangement facilitates also the examination of the valves.—The different parts of this engine are well proportioned, and in addition to the usual reservoir for water it is furnished with an air-box for regulating the process of suction, when it becomes necessary to resort to it. At the trial made at the Conservatoire des arts et métiers this engine worked at the rate of twenty revolutions in a minute, with a jet of fifteen millimètres. The stroke of the piston is perhaps a little too long to admit of attaining the greatest ease in working.

### Honorable Mentions.

Mr. Lemoine, (No. 128,) of Quebec, (Canada).—For the very highly finished workmanship of his fire-engine with a single chamber, mounted on wheels.—General Morin, Reporter.

This State, which is just beginning to be civilized, makes unheard of efforts to create manufacturing establishments; but every thing is excessively dear there, and allowances must be made in its favor on account of the difficulties it has to surmount.

Messrs. Barrington, Morris and Magloire have succeeded in making some very well finished harnesses, displaying a great profusion of ornamental stitching, which seems to be much admired in Canada.—Arnoux, Reporter.

### SIXTH CLASS.

#### SPECIAL MACHINERY AND APPARATUS OF WORKSHOPS

1st Section.—Machines and Tools for working in wood, stone and metal.

MACHINES FOR WORKING IN WOOD.

#### First Class Medals.

Mr. W. Rodden, (No. 156,) of Montreal, (Canada).-

1st. Trenail Machine. This little machine is intended for making trenails for Ships.

Two arbours placed one over the other are furnished with blades in the form of an S; the edges of these blades form segments of a circle. It is between these two smoothing planes that the article is shaped. The guides are four triangles, armed with a circular line of teeth. This machine appears to be one of ordinary merit.

2nd. Cabinet-maker's lathe—price 600 francs. This machine is intended for making round sticks. A hollow arbour carries in front a conical ring of cast iron, which carries within an oblique blade forming a cutter; the wood is rounded in passing through this ring. This machine is of no great importance and seems likely to present some inconveniences.

3rd. A machine for planing deals—price, 800 francs.—The piece of wood to be planed is placed upon a wooden table moving by means of a rack upon wooden sleepers fitted with a track of cast iron. The frame of the machine is of cast iron and similar in form to that of an ordinary planing machine. The cutters are two small steel hooks attached to the two extremities of a horizontal bar turning at one end of a vertical arbour. This machine has the advantage of requiring but little force, compared to the cylindrical planing machines. It works well when properly managed, and can take off a considerable thickness at once. It is an excellent machine for use, but one that requires an able workman to manage it.

4th. A Carpenter's Bench—price 2,000 francs. This is, properly speaking, only a bench furnished with a very complete collection of tools for working in wood—It is at least as much a specimen as a very practical article.

It has an auger, a circular saw, a whip saw, moulding planes and a tenor-cutter.

The table and many other pieces are of wood; power is applied by means of a belt; the machinery works easily and the tools are well adapted for the work they have to do. Some of the details are ingenious and well carried out. This machine fulfils, in a very satisfactory manner, and at a very cheap rate, all the needful conditions.

Machines for working wood in Canada are constructed on an entirely different principle from those which we have already examined. In their construction, attention has been paid principally to economy and to that facility in repairing and keeping in order which is so desirable in localities at a distance from great machine-shops.

In consequence of the necessity which is sometimes felt for fulfilling both of these conditions, and because machines which can be easily transported are often required, machines in the American style are destined to be of very great service; we will even say that if working in wood is to become general beyond the limits of great workshops, as there is reason to think it will, it is rather, one might even say it is only, with machines constructed like those of Canada, that it will

be accomplished; they are suited to all the minor departments of joinery and to those workmen who desire to be able to do every thing themselves.

Mr. Rodden is not the original inventor of these machines, but merely the manufacturer of them.

### Second Class Medal.

Mr. Munro, of Montreal, (Canada.)—A machine for making flooring—price, 2,800 francs. The machine does its work by means of three cylindrical planes, two vertical and one horizontal. The table is of wood, as well as many parts of the machine. The planes are set in motion by belts, and the machine requires very little power, and works with great ease. It is governed by hand, and without the least effort when it is working empty. This machine is well made with reference to the conditions of economy and facility of repair which we have already mentioned.

### Honorable Mentions.

Mr. Lellan, (Canada). Before concluding our remarks on the subject of machines for working in wood we must say a few words of one for making mortises founded on a new principle which deserves to be cited.

The chisel is in the shape of a hollow quadrangular prism, the four faces of which terminate in sharp edges placed so as to form four holes towards the angles. Inside the prism a spiral borer works with a circular motion; the whole of this apparatus moves on together and produces a square hole in the wood. By repeating the operation, the requisite length is given to the mortise.

This implement, which we were told worked with great regularity and rapidity, did not at the Exhibition produce satisfactory results as to neatness, and its system of motion involved great loss of time.

Nevertheless the implement invented by Mr. Lellan seems ingenious, and deserves to attract attention.—Polonogau, Reporter.

3rd Section.—Apparatus and Machines used in Agricultural operations.

#### THRESHING MACHINES.

### Second Class Medals.

Mr. Page, of Montreal, (Canada). Mr. Page's machine is intended to be set in motion by horses, by means of a circular-mill or an inclined plane. It has been tried with a steam engine, with very good results. The straw is well shaken and the grain well separated. This machine is very conveniently arranged, and presents several remarkable peculiarities. Makers will find in it the principles of several

arrangements which may be imitated with advantage when by certain improvements the arrangements shall be made more practically available.

### Honorable Mentions.

Messrs. Dion and Lepage, (No. 94,) of Rimouski, (Canada).—The model exhibited by these gentlemen is of half size. It gives a very clear idea of the apparatus, and may itself be worked by hand. This threshing machine is remarkable for its extreme cheapness; it is sold in the country for 200 francs; its construction is simple and well contrived

#### CLEANERS.

Mr. W. H. Rice, (No. 155,) of Montreal, (Canada).—Exhibited a farmer's smut machine, and some hand-sieves. Neither the former nor the latter present any positively novel features; but the smut machine is a good one of its kind and would not disgrace the stock of implements on a farm in our most advanced districts.—Sliding shutters admit of the size of the air-hole in the ventilater being varied at pleasure. This is a very good arrangement, which seems to have originated either in Canada or in the United States, and which, since the London Exhibition all our good makers have been forward to adopt.

5th Section.—Machines peculiar to certain trades.

### Honorable Mentions.

Mr. G. Dunn, (No. 148,) of Montreal (Canada).—A nail-cutting machine. Mr. Dunn, a machine maker, exhibits the only large machine for cutting nails out of iron-plate that figures in the *Annexe*. This machine, solidly constructed in all its part, presented to us nothing novel in its arrangement; we were assured that it could cut eighty nails in a minute, but the Jury have not had it in their power to verify the exactness of this assertion, the motive power at their disposal not being sufficient to produce the necessary velocity.

#### BISCUITS.

The Jury tasted all these products with the greatest care and find that the dessert biscuits and other delicacies of the house of Gaillout, of Paris, are delicious, that the Canadian biscuits, and among others those of Mr. Fitts, are light and perfectly dry, so that they will keep a very long time, while they are of a dazzling whiteness, and of such tempting delicacy that one discovers, on examining them thoroughly, something which denotes a French origin.

### Second Class Medals.

Mr. Fitts, (No. 189), Canada.—The whiteness, the delicacy, the beauty of all the biscuits from Canada were much admired. The Jury were in doubt for some time to which of the biscuit bakers of that country they should give the second class meal; for the biscuits they exhibited were all remarkably good. Nevertheless Mr. Fitts appeared to us to be entitled to a preference over hiscompetitors, for the variety and perfection of his productions.

### Mention by way of note.

The manufacture of maple sugar is of no great importance, and does not seem likely to increase;—no notable improvement in this branch of industry has been made known to the Jury; they have not thought they would be justified in awarding to the exhibitors of this article either first or second classs medals.

The Jury confine themselves to mentioning by way of note the Government of Canada, which has exhibited maple sugar of good quality. This Colony has obtained in the second class a medal of honor for the whole of its collections.

### THIRTEENTH CLASS.

#### MARINE AND MILITARY ART.

# I.—Ship-building and equipment of Ships.

We have expressed our regret that the Ship-builders of the United States have not caused their workmanship to be represented at the Universal Exhibition. Their Canadian neighbours have made amends for this omission by sending very

remarkable models; and the interesting mission recently performed by Captain Belvèze of the Navy in that country has made known to us its rich resources, as well as the adventurous spirit of enterprize of its inhabitants.

Mr. Lee, a French Canadian, of Quebec, is one of the principal and of the most successful Ship-builders in Canada,—we might almost say in the world. The clipper *Marco Polo* came out of his ship-yard. This vessel, which plies between England and Australia, has made on an average the shortest voyages between those countries, and this result has produced a considerable sensation among maritime nations. Mr. Lee built also the *Shooting Star*, of 1,500 tons, chartered at present by the War Department in England, for transport service to the Crimea. This vessel has made the shortest sailing voyage on record from Plymouth to Malta.

The Quebec ship-yards have, indeed, as it were, a monopoly in the building of large merchant vessels, clippers or others. Forty-eight vessels, measuring together 49,000 tons, were built there in 1853, and among them the Arthur the Great, which has also made the shortest known voyage to Australia.

Mr. Lee justly enjoys the reputation of being the principal builder of the finest ships; they are all classed A. 1 at Lloyds; he employs as many as 700 workmen.

Mr. Cantin sent to the Exhibition only some ash oars, but he is also one of the principal ship-builders in Canada.

This manufacturer, who is also of the old French race still so numerous and so vigorous in that country, has extensive ship-yards at Montreal. He is chiefly engaged in building steamers for the Lakes, makes his own steam-engines and employs not less than 400 workmen.

#### LIFE-BOATS .- LIFE BUOYS .- LIFE PRESERVERS.

For the purpose of saving lives in cases of shipwreck, Mr. Thomas, a ship captain of Toronto, in Canada, has invented a plan, as simple as it is practical, for improvising a life raft on board of paddle-wheel steamers. This raft is formed simply of the outer vertical surface of either paddle box, merely made a little more solid than usual; this surface is in that case fastened only by a few hooks. If the vessel goes down, these hooks are easily withdrawn, and that part of the paddle-box falling into the water floats and serves for a life-raft; it is furnished beforehand for that purpose with short pieces of rope which the shipwrecked persons lay hold of. In case that part of the paddle-box should not detach itself at once, the air rushing up under the paddle-box as the vessel sinks would force it to detach itself.

The idea of this invention was suggested to Mr. Thomas by the following circumstance, which occurred on the occasion of the unfortunate collision which caused the magnificent steamer Arctic to go down in so short a time; at the last moment, when the steamer was going down, the Captain was standing on one of

the paddle-boxes; the air rushing up under that paddle-box blew off the upper part of it and caused some of the boards to be detached from it, and it was upon those boards that the Captain of the *Arctic* saved himself.

#### CANADA.

### First Class Medals.

Mr. T. C. Lee, (No. 220), ship-builder at Quebec. Mr. Lee is the most eminent ship-builder at Quebec; he builds immense clippers renowned for their superio speed; he built amongst others the *Marco Polo* and the *Shooting Star*.

### Second Class Medals.

Mr. A. Cantin, (No. 217), ship-builder at Montreal. Mr. Cantin exhibits only some ash oars, but he has a considerable ship-yard at Montreal, where he is ranked by common consent among the number of distinguished ship-builders. He builds steam engines as well as ships.

### Honorable Mention.

Mr. Thomas, (No. 221), Ship Captain at Toronto. Captain Thomas makes a raft of the outer side of the paddle-boxes of the gigantic paddle-wheel steamers of North America.

#### ENGLISH COLONIES.

### Honorable Mention.

The quarries of the Shipton Slate Company, of Canada, are in the Lower Silurean system.

#### REMARKS.

Other specimens of slates coming from the quarries of Oxford, Westbury and Tring, were also exhibited.

The beds of slate in Canada have been discovered within five years only, and large quarries are already opened there. The slates of Canada are of good quality, they belong to the Silurian system; those of Melbourne, Richmond and Kingsey are to be referred to the Hudson River group; those of Westbury and Rivière du Loup are found at the base of the Upper Silurian system.

Several slate works in Canada, which have sent slates, are not in operation, or continue to be inoperative.

Shipton Slate Company, (No. 227).—The Shipton Slate Company, of Canada, quarries its slate in the Lower Silurian system.

Specimens of slate have been shewn by three other exhibitors: Mr. John Gray (No. 232), of Melbourne, slate from the Oxford quarry; Mr. James Leslie, (No. 239), of Sherbrooke, slate from Westbury; Mr. Joseph Tardif, (No. 247), slate from Tring.

C .- SERPENTINES AND CHLORITIC AND TALCOSE ROCKS.

#### ENGLISH COLONIES.

#### CANADA.

### First Class Medals.

Geological Commission of Canada.—(No. 8.)—Serpentines occupy an important place in the Geology of Canada; they occur at Grenville, and they cover an area of fifty leagues in the Eastern Townships. They are enclosed in the metamorphic rocks, and belong to the Hudson River group, which forms part of the Lower Silurian system; others of them belong to the Laurentian system.

The Geological Commission exhibited two polished slabs of serpentine, one from Oxford, the other from Brompton Lake. They are of the variety of ophicalce, somewhat resemblnig that of St. Verran, *Hautes Alpes*; the carbonate of lime which runs through them in small veins shews a green color lighter than that of the rock. In the serpentine rock of Brompton Lake, the fragments of serpentine are of a blackish-green; they are sometimes surrounded by sinuous veins of a bluish-green color; this last variety especially is very remarkable, and might be employed to advantage as a marble.

#### REMARKS.

The Colony of Canada exhibited a chlorite schist from Potton, in Lower Canada.

This rock is of a very light greyish-green color. It is soft to the touch. The magnifying glass shews it to be composed of small thin scales of chlorite, all lying in the same direction, which gives it a schistoid structure. It has been found on analysis to be composed of: silica, 29.88; alumina, magnesia and oxyd of iron, 57.85; lime, 0.77; water, 11.50; it is not blended with carbonates, like most of the preceding rocks; it is therefore a schist which appears to be formed entirely of chlorite.

The chlorite-schist of Potton may be cut and dressed with great ease. It may be cut into slabs or flags with a common wood-saw. It is employed in various ways in building. As it stands fire well, it is used particularly for making furnaces. Coffins are also made of it.

It occurs in large beds in the Lower Silurian system, which lies immediately over the Laurentian system. It is sometimes associated with dolomite or with

serpentine, and like this latter rock it contains chromic iron. In Vermont, and at Boston, in the United States, the same chlorite-schist is quarried on a large scale, and forms the subject of an important trade.

It is associated particularly with compact tale or steatite, which is found at a great many places in Canada, particularly at Sutton, at Bolton, at Melbourne, at Potton, at Vaudreuil (Beauce), at Broughton, at Elzivir.

The steatite of Canada is used as a fire stone. That of Stanstead and Leeds is ground and used as a paint.\*

#### CANADA.

Mention by way of Note.

GEOLOGICAL COMMISSION OF CANADA.—The learned Director of the Geological Commission of Canada, Mr. Logan, exhibited avery fine collection of the marbles of Canada.

The most curious is a serpentine marble from Grenville. It is formed of white crystalline carbonate of lime, associated with serpentine of different shades of green. This serpentine was at first considered as a new mineral species, to which Thompson gave the name of retinalite; but Mr. Hunt has ascertained that the retinalite is but an ordinary serpentine. The serpentine-marble of Grenville can be quarried in large blocks. It is more or less serpentinous in proportion to its proximity to a trap dyke.

The Dudswell marble is of a yellowish white, intersected by ochre-yellow veins. It is also yellow and grey. Its age is that of the Niagara limestone, and it contains polypi and fossils of the Upper Silurian system.

The marble of Missisquoi Bay is black with white spots and grey veins. It corresponds with the Trenton group. The quarrying of it has lately been given up, owing to the competition of the quarry of Glenn's Falls, in the United States.

The St. Lin marble has a rather dull chesnut-brown color. It contains polypi and atrypæ. Its age is that of the Chazy limestone.

Although Canada is a new country, the mineral riches of its soil are much better known than those of many portions of Europe. These happy results are due to the persevering efforts of Mr. Logan, and of the Geological Commission of Canada.

Mr. Logan has in fact described most of these beds of marble in Canada; and the Jury have not hesitated in concurring in the decision of that of the 1st class, who awarded a medal of honor to Mr. Logan, as Director of the Geological Commission of Conada.

### Second Class Medal.

Mr. Brown, of Rice Lake, exhibited a very crystalline white marble, which might be used in the decoration of apartments, but the grain of which is too coarse to admit of its being made use of in statuary. This marble belongs to the Laurentian system.

#### REMARKS.

Mr. Cheesman exhibited a yellowish-white marble, belonging to the Trenton limestone, and found at St. Armand, in Missisquoi Bay. It passes into a black limestone, like that of the Trenton formation generally.

Mr. Thomas C. Keefer, of Montreal, sent a blackish-grey marble, with red spots. It is of the Chazy limestone, found at Caughnawaga. It is frequently used in building.

Messrs. Hutchinson and Morrison, of Montreal, exhibit a common laminated black marble, resembling carboniferous limestone. A great part of Montreal is built of this limestone, which belongs to the Trenton formation.

Mr. McDonald, of Les Chats, exhibits a white marble, with grey veins of graphite. It contains also some quartz, which would make it hard to saw. This limestone has been employed hitherto only in the making of lime, and as building stone. It has been used chiefly in the construction of docks.

Mr. D. MacLachlan, of Bytown, sent a laminated greyish-white marble, intersected by very undulating veins of graphite, and containing black crystals. This marble has a very good appearance. It is found in considerable quantities at Amprior, and belongs to the Laurentian system of Mr. Logan.

Mr. Dickson, of Kingston, exhibits a brown marble from Packenham. The quarrying of this marble has been abandoned on account of its being rather brittle and containing veins of chert.

#### LIMESTONES.

#### CANADA.

### ${\it Remark}$ ş.

The Grand Trunk Railway Company have sent a limestone quarried at Poi Claire, near Montreal, in Canada. This limestone is black, very compact and very durable. It takes a slight polish, and furnishes a marble of inferior quality. It is found over-lying the Chazy limestone. It is being used at present in the construction of the Victoria Tubular Bridge, which will be no less than 2,700 metres long; this bridge is being built by the Grand Trunk Railway Company, under the direction of Stevenson the Engineer, and is intended to cross the St. Lawrence, near Montreal.

#### II. ARTIFICIAL MATERIALS.

# Lime, Cements and Mortar.

#### CANADA.

### Second Class Medals.

Mr. John Brown, (No. 258), of St. Catherines. The Thorold Cement, manufactured at St. Catherines, in Upper Canada, is obtained by burning an argillaceous limestone of the Upper Silurian system. This limestone is of a blackish grey colour and gives when breathed upon an odour of clay. It belongs to the Niagara limestone formation.

On being burnt it yields a cement of a yellow colour. The sample which was placed at our disposal by Mr. Logan did not effervesce when exposed to the action of acids. It contained only 3.37 of water. The setting takes place in fifteen minutes and is attended with heat. A mould immersed ten minutes after it was mixed became set under water, and was as hard as one that was immersed at the end of two hours. Only a small quantity of lime was dissolved from the mould. The power of resistance of this cement to traction is equal to 85 kilogrammes.

This cement belongs to ordinary cements in M. Vicat's classification.

The Thorold cement is sold at 5 francs 37 centimes for a barrel weighing 300 pounds, English measure, or 136 kilogrammes. Nearly 4000 barrels were used last summer in the Victoria Tubular Bridge; it cost 7 francs, 50 centimes laid down at Montreal. It is much used in Canada, and is even exported to the United States.

### Honorable Mention.

Mr. P. Gauvreau, (No. 231)-Quebec cement. At Quebec, in Lower Canada, a limestone, belonging to the Lower Silurian system, is quarried for the purpose of making cement.

The stone which furnishes it was discovered by Captain Baddeley, of the Royal Engineers. It is a compact argillaceous limestone, without fossils, deeply stained of a black colour by a carbonaceous matter. The cement itself is yellow, and effervesces slightly when exposed to the action of acids; its loss in the fire is 11.6; consisting of water and carbonic acid. Its setting takes place in twenty-five minutes; the mould obtained is not so hard as that of the Thorold cement. Its resistance to traction is equal to 49 kilogrammes, and it remains very moist.

It contains a remarkable proportion of sulphate of lime, owing, no doubt, to the pyrites which generally abound in limestones containing carbonaceous matters.

The composition of the Quebec cement nearly resembles that of the Thorold cement; but it is inferior to it in quality. It has begun to be manufactured within the last year only, and it is probable that it will come into use in Lower Canada.

# Mention by way of note.

Geological Commission.—(No. 261). The Geological Commission exhibited a magnesian limestone belonging to the Chazy limestone formation, which might serve to make cement. This limestone, which extends over more than fifty miles, is argillaceous, compact, homogeneous; it effervesces briskly when exposed to the action of acids.

On being burnt the Chazy limestone would yield a cement, which would rank as an ordinary one, according to M. Vicat's classification.

Magnesian mortar. The Geological Commission of Canada exhibited a very remarkable stone, composed of carbonate of magnesia. It will be well to give a description of this stone here, on account of the use that may be made of it in the composition of mortar.

The carbonate of magnesia of Canada is so like saccharoidal limestone that it may easily be mistaken for it, and yet it does not contain a trace of carbonate of time. It is moreover ferriferous. Part of it is tinged with a green colour by

chromic oxyd, and some quartz, in white transparent grains, is scattered through it; when the stone has been treated with acid this quartz remains, forming a skeleton.

An analysis of the specimen exhibited, which came from Bolton, gave us the following result, which agrees with that of Mr. Hunt's analysis:—

This carbonate of magnesia contains, therefore, about one-third of quartz. There is only eight per cent of it in that from Sutton. When calcined the carbonate of magnesia from Bolton would contain 47.28 of quartz; but it would contain also 43.72 of caustic magnesia.

The carbonate of magnesia of Canada might be turned to good account in the composition of the magnesian mortar, unalterable by sea water, which has been suggested by Mr. J. B. Vicat; perhaps even it might be worth sending, as ballast to some of the European ports.

#### BITUMENS.

#### CANADA.

# Mention by way of Note.

Geological Commission.—There are in Canada several springs of petroleum and beds of bitumen. The petroleum, as well as the bitumen, proceeds from Utica schists, which contain graphtolites and belong to the Silurian system; the schists are sometimes strongly impregnated with it. Petroleum is found at Mosa and on the River Trent, on the River St. John and at Ruisseau Argenté.\*

At Enniskillen there are also springs of petroleum, and by the spontaneous evaporation of the naphtha they seem to have given rise to bitumen.

This bitumen was shown at the exhibition, we shall therefore speak of it somewhat in detail.

It has been found spread over a surface of several acres and forms three beds, which are 0.65 of a *mètre* thick in certain places. Like most of the bitumens of northern countries, it is very rich in naphtha, in which it was dissolved and which has not entirely evaporated. The consequence is that it is quite soft and glutinous at an ordinary temperature, staining the hands, and that it has a low density.

We found that it was as 1,006, so that it is nearly equal to that of water.

Its melting point is 83 ° c. Below that temperature it no longer gives out vapour, and becomes pasty.

When heated it soon begins to boil; it gives out naphtha and various oils as well as water. It diffuses also a disagreeable odour, resembling that of caproic acid. When the temperature is raised still higher concrete bituminous matters and paraffine are obtained; when raised to a red heat in a crucible it yields a light and inflated coke, which is very impure; its weight is at least 11 per cent.

Alcohol dissolves certain portions of the bitumen from Enniskillen, acquiring a light-brown colour. Benzine dissolves it easily and leaves a brownish residue, resembling vegetable mould, and containing organic matters and vegetable remains. When this mould is heated to a low red heat it burns with a flame and diffuses a pungent odour like that of peat. When the combustion has ceased, there remains an argillaceous substance which does not effervesce when exposed to the action of acids, and which proceeds no doubt from the schists which contain the bitumen. If the solution of bitumen in benzine be evaporated, a thick bitumen is obtained, having little ductility and resembling those produced from animal matter.

An attempt was made to purify the bitumen from Enniskillen by warming it in boiling water, as is done with certain bitumens, in order to separate the earthy particles from them; but it spreads itself in liquid layers on the surface of the water, and the earthy powder with which it is mixed is but very imperfectly deposited. In order to purify it, the country people in Canada squeeze it in a cloth, through which it passes, while the earthy particles remain inside.

The Enniskillen bitumen is not yet regularly made an article of traffic.

It will be seen from what we have just said that it contains a great quantity of oil of petroleum, which is now applied to various uses in the industrial arts; and it seems that it would be more profitable to extract this oil than the bitumen itself.

# Mentions by way of note.

The Board of Works of Canada, (No. 224), exhibited—1st, a map of its canals; 2nd, a plan in relief, showing the old and the new locks at Montreal, at the end of the Lachine Canal; 3rd, models of the sluices of the lock-gates of that canal; 4th, a model of a wooden bridge.

In 1833 Canada commenced works for the opening of a passage for large vessels between the Lakes and the Sea.\*

The St. Lawrence Canals comprise nine distinct works, constructed at places where the navigation of the river was obstructed. Their entire length is 42 miles, (67,591 mètres); they have 27 locks, with an aggregate of 205 feet (62 mètres 48). The locks are 200 feet long, 45 feet wide, and nine feet deep (60m. 96, 13m 72, and 2m. 74).

The Lachine Canal is one of the links of which we have just spoken; that which is furthest from the Lakes. It passes by the Saut Saint Louis; it was built as far back as 1825, but its locks were of small dimensions. In 1846, new ones were built, similar to those of the other portions of the Saint Lawrence Canals.

The Welland Canal unites Lakes Erie and Ontario. Its length is 28 miles (45 kil.); it has 27 locks, with an aggregate fall of 346 feet (105m. 47). The locks are a little smaller than those on the St. Lawrence Canals.

Most of the locks of these Canals have wooden aprons, with a depression of two feet six inches (0m 76) in the centre. The side-walls are of stone. The sluices of the lock-gates turn round a horizontal axis; they have the advantage of giving a large opening in a very short time and with little effort.

The Canals have been finished since 1853; they were built by Mr. Killaly. C. E., A. M. T. C. D., under the authority of Mr. Lemieux, M. P., Chief Commissioner of Public Works.

Trade has already resumed in part its natural direction, by the valley of the Saint Lawrence, which it had abandoned for the Erie Canal. But the traffic seems sufficient to ensure the success of both these channels of navigation.

A Company owning a large tract of land on Lake Superior have built a Canal round the Falls of the River Sainte Marie. This Canal has been cut on the United States' bank. The fall is overcome by two locks joined to each other. The works were completed in the season of 1855, and Lake Superior is now connected with the vast chain of navigation of the Saint Lawrence and the Hudson.

The bridge exhibited belongs to the category of American bridges. The mode of uniting the stretching piece to the compressing one is nearly the same as Mr. Howe's. The supports are strengthened by arches as in Burr's system. The bridge of which this is a model has not been built; but a bridge of the same kind, and of 150 feet) 45m. 73) has been built at Rock Island.

So far the emigration exceeds that of any year since 1847, and the emigrants in general character and means, are superior to those of any preceding year. Very little assistance has been asked for or granted during this season. Of the English and Scotch a large proportion were respectable farmers apparently in comfortable circumstances, and their destination was Upper Canada, where many has friends. Fully five-sixths of the English and Scotch remain in Canada; two-thirds of the Irish have gone to the United States. Of Germans about 460 remain in Canada, some with good means; the rest have gone to the States.

Since the completion of the above, Mr. Buchanan telegraphs the arrival of two foreign ships at Grosse Isle with 160 German and 500 Norwegian emigrants.
