lency's pleasure they attend him immediately in this House."

Who, being come with their Speaker,

His Excellency the Governor General was then pleased to open the Session by a gracious Speech to both Houses.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

In fulfilment of the important trust committed to me by Her Majesty, I have recourse for the first time to your advice and assistance. It is a source of the deepest personal satisfaction to me that I should have been called by Her Majesty to an office in which, as Her Representative, I am enabled to take a part in the public affairs of the Dominion, and to associate myself with you in the performance of the honorable duties which you are about to approach.

I rejoice to learn that although the last harvest has been less productive than its predecessors, and although there are indications that the rapid expansion of your commerce has to some extent been followed by over-trading, the general condition of the Dominion is such as to justify me in congratulating you upon its prosperity.

The marked success attained by Canada at the International Fishery Exhibition in London, must be very gratifying to you, and has, I doubt not, been of great service in showing to the world the wealth of our fisheries and the extent of our marine

industries and resources.

The Commissioners appointed by my predecessor for the purposes of consolidating the Statutes affecting the Dominion, have pursued their task with diligence, and I am enabled to lay before you for examination about sixty chapters of the proposed consolidation. The remainder of the work will be prepared, and the whole of it revised during the present year, so that the final report will be ready at your next Session for your approval.

The number of immigrants to Canada during the past season has, I am glad to say, been greater than in any previous year, and is a proof that the better Canada is

known the more it is valued by those seeking a home in the new world.

Arrangements are in progress to diminish the cost of inland transport, and I have reason to believe that the result will be a steady increase of valuable settlers, in the future.

During the recess, negotiations were resumed with British Columbia in regard to several matters upon which differences had for some time existed between the two Governments. One of my Ministers visited that Province last summer on a special mission, with a view to the adjustment of all questions in controversy, and his efforts have happily been successful. Should your sanction be given to the arrangements then made, all occasions of dispute will have been removed, and the most cordial relations established between the Dominion and Provincial Governments. The papers will be laid before you and your consideration invited to measures enabling me to give effect to the agreement.

The rapid increase of population in the North-West, renders some amendments in the North-West Territories Act expedient, and your attention will be called to

this important matter.

The progress of the Indians in Manitoba and the North-West during last year has been, on the whole, satisfactory. The Bands included in the several Indian Treaties have for the most part betaken themselves to their Reserves. A Bill for the further promotion of their interests will be submitted to you as well as a measure applicable to the whole Dominion, for the purpose of encouraging the more advanced Indian communities to assume the responsibilities of self-government.

The Bill laid before you last Session for the representation of the people in Parliament and the assimilation of the electoral franchises existing in the several Provinces has now been before the Country for a year. The measure will be re-intro-

duced and I commend it to your attention.

I would also urge upon you the expediency of providing for the regulation of factory labour and the protection of the workingman and his family. The measure

submitted last Session, with some amendments, will be laid before you.

The rapid progress of the Canadian P. cific Railway has been maintained throughout the past year. Of the two thousand eight hundred and thirty-three miles of the main line between Pembroke and Port Moody, one thousand seven hundred and thirtyeight miles are now constructed, rendering practicable the completion of that great work within the next two years. Although the time within which the Railway Company is bound to finish the road will not expire until 1891, my Government has thought it of the greatest importance for the settlement of the North West and the development of our trade that its completion from sea to sea should be hastened and the Company enabled to open the line throughout by the spring of 1886. With this view, and in order to aid the Company in procuring sufficient capital for the purpose, by the disposal of its unsold shares, the Government agreed to receive a deposit of money and securities sufficient to pay a minimum three per cent. dividend for ten years on sixty-five millions of the stock. That arrangement was made on the belief that it would give steadiness and increased value to the shares on the market. A combination of unfavorable circumstances has prevented the fulfilment of these expectations, and the Company has not been able to obtain the required capital by a sale of its stock. The best means of preventing any delay in the great object of the early completion of the railway, demands your earnest consideration.

I am pleased to be able to state that the operation of that portion of the railway already opened affords the most gratifying evidence of its soundness as a commercial

enterprise and of its great value to Canada.

The large increase of the volume of traffic on the Intercolonial Railway over that of any previous year, without involving any burden upon the country, is a satisfactory proof of the continued development of trade between the eastern and western portions of the Dominion.

A provisional arrangement made with the Government of Nova Scotia for the retention of the Pictou Branch and the acquisition of the Eastern Extension Railway

to the Strait of Canso will be submitted for your approval.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

The accounts for the past year will be laid before you. You will find that the expenditure has been considerably less and the receipts larger than the estimates, the surplus exceeding that of any previous year. The revenues of the first half of the current year, notwithstanding the large importations of last season, have been such that we may reasonably expect that the estimates for the year will be fairly maintained.

The estimates for the ensuing year will also be submitted to you. They will, I trust, be found to have been prepared with due regard to economy.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I feel assured that you will devote yourselves with earnestness and assiduity to the consideration of the subjects I have mentioned, and to all matters affecting the public interests that may be brought before you.

His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to retire, and the House of Commons withdrew.

The Honorable Sir Alexander Campbell presented to the House, a Bill intituled "An Act relating to Railways."

The said Bill was read for the first time.

The Honorable the Speaker reported His Excellency's Speech from the Throne and the same was then read by the Clerk.

On motion of the Honorable Sir Alexander Campbell, seconded by the Honorable

Ordered, That the House do take into consideration the Speech of His Excelency the Governor General on Monday next.

On motion of the Honorable Sir Alexander Campbell, seconded by the Honorable

Ordered, That all the Members present during this Session be appointed a Committee to consider the Orders and Customs of this House and Privileges of Parliament, and that the said Committee have leave to meet in this House, when and as often as they please.

The Honorable Sir Alexander Campbell, Minister of Justice, informed the House that he had a Message from His Excellency the Governor General under his sign Manual, which His Excellency had commanded him to deliver to this House.

RERORT of the Minister of Justice with reference to the arrangement made for the settlement of matters in difference between the 'Government of Canada and the Government of British Columbia.

VANCOUVER ISLAND RAILWAY, ESQUIMALT GRAVING DOCK, RAILWAY LANDS, JUDICIAL DISTRICTS.

CERTIFIED COPY of a Report of a Committee of the Honourable the Privy Council, approved by His Excellency the Governor General in Council, on the 27th September, 1883.

The Committee of the Privy Council have had under consideration a Report herewith, dated 25th September, 1883, from Sir Alexander Compbell, who was

authorized by Orders of Your Excellency in Council, under dates of 14th and 23rd June last, to visit British Columbia to make arrangements relative to the various points remaining unsettled between the Government of the Dominion and that of the Province of British Columbia. The Committee concur in the said Report and the several matters proposed to be carried into effect, and they submit the same for Your Excellency's approval.

To His Excellency the Marquis of Lorne, P.C., K. T., G.C. M. G., Governor General of Canada:

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

I have the honor to submit for your information a Report on my visit to the Province of British Columbia, for the purposes mentioned in the Order of Your

Excellency in Council of the 23rd of June last.

After some delay at San Francisco, I reached Victoria on the 27th of July, and immediately waited upon His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, on the subject of my visit. I was most cordially received and placed by him in communication with his Ministers. The Lieutenant-Governor, throughout my stay, lent me valuable aid in my efforts towards establishing those relations with the members of his Government, which were so essential to the success of the mission with which Your Excellency had entrusted me.

1. The negotiations between the Government of the Dominion and that of British Columbia in regard to the construction of the Vancouver Island Railway and the taking over of the Graving Dock commenced by the Province on Esquimalt Harbour were prolonged late into last Session of Parliament. Unfortunately they had been conducted very much by telegraphic communications, and their successful issue was hindered by difficulties which might not have arisen, or might have been readily removed, had the more ample opportunity afforded by personal intercourse been possible.

At repeated meetings of the Executive Council, and at many interviews with individual members of the Government—particularly with Mr. Smithe, himself—that gentleman and his colleagues discussed with me, in a spirit of the greatest frankness, the misunderstandings which had occasioned the postponement of the negotiations of last winter, and, animated by a sincere desire to overcome them, we found from

day to day, reasonable solutions of the various points in dispute.

2. The Railway Belt on the Mainland.—The change in the route of the Canadian Pacific Railway to the more southerly pass, which it is now intended to occupy, rendering it expedient to effect a change of the location of the railway belt. The Government of British Columbia had not admitted that there was any obligation on their part to assent to such a change, and had contended that they had performed their whole obligation in granting the belt along the line as originally proposed. We were happily able, however, in view of what we were mutually ready to concede in respect of other parts of the general arrangement, to arrive at an understanding by which the railway belt was transferred to the new line and the grant made absolute in its terms, the Government of the Dominion undertaking, through me, to place the land thus acquired in the market for sale to actual settlers at an early day.

In this connection I have the honor to state that instructions were given to Mr. Trutch, the Agent of the Dominion in British Columbia, to take at once the initiatory

steps necessary to carry out this understanding.

3. The Act of the Legislation of the Province assigning districts to the Judges of the Supreme Court of the Province had been pronounced by the Court there as ultra vires, a result which led to the submission, by command of Your Excellency, to

the Supreme Court of Canada, of certain questions propounded, in order to obtain the advantage of the legal advice of the Court upon the points thus adversely decided by the Provincial Court. The answers of the Supreme Court of Canada to these questions had been transmitted to the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province for the information of his Ministers and of the Judges, in advance of my leaving Ottawa, and in this way the ground was a good deal cleared as regarded this object of my visit. I took early occasion to see the several Judges of the Supreme Court of British Columbia, and discuss the matter with them, and also with Mr. Smiths and the members of the Government.

Another difficulty has been created in regard to the powers which one of the Statutes of the Province proposed to confer upon Gold Commissioners, which powers seemed to Your Excellency's advisers to be of a judicial character, and therefore only to be granted by the Government of the Dominion. The subject was further complicated by disputes which had arisen at Metlakatla, showing the necessity of having a Stipendiary Magistrate there, and probably, also, at several other points in the

Province.

All these embarrassments were happily adjusted by the course finally agreed on between the Government of the Province and myself, under which Mr. Justice McCreight is to be assigned to the District of New Westminster, Mr. Justice Walken. to the District of Kamloops, and an officer who is to be at the same time County Court Judge and Stipendiary Magistrate for Cariboo and Lilloost, to be appointed by the two Governments—that of the Dominion paying the salary of Judge, and that of the Province the salary of Stipendiary Magistrate. This arrangement will leave a Supreme Court composed of three members, the Chief Justice, Mr. Justice Crease, and Mr. Justice Gray, at Victoria, the seat of the Court, for transaction of business at the Capital and on the Island of Vancouver.

I have the honour to submit herewith a memorandum, dated the 20th of August,

embodying the agreement between the two Governments on the various points re-

ferred to.

I have to report further, for the information of Your Excellency, that I executed at Victoria, on behalf of the Minister of Railways, a provisional contract for the construction of the Island Railway, and that Messrs. Robert and James Dunsmuir and John Bryden executed it on their own behalf, and deposited with me \$250,000 required as security for its performance. I afterwards proceeded to San Franciso and procured the execution of the contract there by the remaining contractors. The contract, thus executed, I transmitted from San Francisco to the Agent of the Dominion Government in British Columbia, Mr. Trutch, to be held by him, in accordance with the terms of the memorandum, until such time as the necessary legislative authority should be given by the Parliament of Canada and the Legislature of British Columbia. I enclose herewith a copy of the contract.

I have the honour further to state that, prior to leaving the Province, I instructed Mr. Trutch to take over from the local authorities, on behalf of the Dominion, the Graving Dock, and to take such steps as were necessary for the safety of the work

and materials on hand and the plant.

The Minister of Public Works has, I understand, since received an intimation

from Mr. Trutch, that he has assumed possession of the work accordingly.

The petition for the disallowance of the Act to incorporate the Columbia and Kootenay Railway and Transportation Company, referred to by an order of Your Excellency in Council on the 14th of June, I have reported upon in a separate paper.

During my stay in British Columbia I had occasion to examine into a number of matters for the different Departments of the Government, and to report on them to several of my colleagues, as per margin.

MEMORANDUM of arrangement made at Victoria on the twentieth day of August, 1883, relative to the various points remaining unsettled between the Government of the Dominion and that of the Province of British Columbia.

Island Railway.

1. The Government of British Columbia will invite the adoption by the Legislature of the Province, of certain amendments to the Act of 1883, entitled "An Act relating to the Island Railway, the Graving Dock and the Railway Lands of the Province," which amendments are indicated by red lines in the copy of the proposed new Bill hereto annexed, signed by Sir Alexander Campbell and Mr. Smithe.

2. The Government of British Columbia will procure the assent of the contractor for the construction of the Island Railway to the provisions of clause (f) of the

agreement recited in the amending Bill.

3. Upon the amending Bill becoming law in British Columbia, and the assent of the contractor for the construction of the railway to the provisions of clause (f) of the agreement recited in the Act being procured; the Government of the Dominion will seek the sanction of Parliament to measures to enable them to give effect to the stipulations on their part contained in the agreement recited in the amending Bill.

4. The contract shall be provisionally signed by Sir Alexander Campbell on behalf of the Minister of Railways and Canals, but is to be deposited with Mr. Trutch, awaiting execution by delivery until the necessary legislative authority shall have been given, as well by the Parliament of the Dominion, as by the Legislature of British Columbia.

The Graving Dock.

The Government of the Dominion shall take over the Graving Dock forthwith, and, upon Parliamentary sanction being given, complete it with all convenient speed, and thereafter operate it as a Dominion work, acquiring the right to the Imperial subsidy and paying the Province of British Columbia, on the sanction aforesaid being given, the sums mentioned in clause (g) of the agreement recited in the amending Bill, and they will, in the meantime, pay out of the subsidy voted by Parliament to aid in the construction of the Dock such sum as the Government of British Columbia may be entitled to receive under the existing arrangement in regard to the moneys advanced thereon by them since the 27th June, 1882, and sums so paid to be taken as part of the moneys going to British Columbia ou Graving Dock account under the present arrangement, should it receive Legislative sanction on both sides as before mentioned, failing which the status quo will be resumed.

Railway Belt on Mainland.

The Dominion Government will use every exertion to place their land in the railway belt on the mainland in the market at the earliest possible date, and for this

purpose they will give all necessary instructions to their officers.

The Government of British Columbia will, on their part, render all the aid in their power, and place all the information which they have in their Lands Department at the disposal of the Dominion officers, the expense to be borne by the Dominion Government. In the meantime the land shall be open for "entry," to bond fide settlers, in such lots and at such prices as the Dominion Government may fix.

The Judiciary.

The Order in Council fixing the residences of the Judges to be revoked. Mr. McCreight to be assigned to New Westminster, and Mr. Walkem to Kamloops. Legis-

lative authority to be sought for for this change, if necessary.

A County Court Judge shall be appointed by the Dominion Government, for the District of Cariboo and Lillooet, at a salary of twenty-four hundred dollars, and he shall receive from the Local Government the appointment of Stipendiary Magistrate, at a salary of five hundred dollars; legislative authority for this arrangement, if necessary, and for the payment of the Judge, to be sought for.

The above includes all matters as to which there is any dispute or difference between the Government of the Dominion and the Government of British Columbia, and when carried into effect, will constitute a full settlement of all existing claims on either side or by either Government.

SPECIFICATION for a line of railway from Esquimalt to Nanamio, in Vancouver Island in British Columbia.

1. The railway shall be a single line, with gauge 4 feet 8½ inches, with necessary sidings.

2. The alignments, gradients and curvatures shall be the best that the physical features of the country will admit of, the maximum grade not to exceed 80 feet to the mile, and the minimum curvature not to be of less radius than 800 feet.

3. In all wooded sections the land must be cleared to the width of 50 feet on each side of the centre of line.

All brush and logs must be completely burnt up and none thrown on to the adjacent lands.

4. All stumps must be grubbed out within the limits of cuttings under 3 feet in depth or embankments less than 2 feet in depth.

5. All stumps must be close-cut where embankments are less than 4 feet and

more than 2 feet in height.

6. Through settlements, the railway must be enclosed with substantially built legal fences.
7. Road crossings, with cattle guards and sign boards, shall be provided where-

ever required.

8. The width of cuttings at formations shall be 20 feet, embankments, 16 feet.

9. Efficient drainage must be provided either by open ditches or under drains.

- 10. All bridges, culverts and other structures must be of ample size and strength for the purpose intended. Piers and abutments of bridges must be either of substantial massive stone masonry, iron or wood, and in every essential particular, equal to the best description of like works employed in the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway in British Columbia. Arched culverts must be of good solid masonry, equal in every respect to similar structures designed for the Canadian Pacific Railway in British Columbia. Box culverts must be of either masonry, iron or wood
- 11. The passenger station houses, freight sheds, workshops, engine houses, other buildings and wharves, shall be sufficient in number and size to efficiently accommodate the business of the road, and they shall be either stone, brick or timber of neat design, substantially and strongly built.

12. The rails shall be of steel, weighing not less than 50 pounds per lineal yard

of approved section, and with the most approved fish-plate joints.

13. The roadway must be well ballasted with clean gravel or other suitable material.

14. Sufficient siding accommodation shall be provided by the contractors, as

may be necessary to meet the requirements of the traffic.

15. Sufficient rolling stock, necessary to accommodate the business of the line, shall be provided by the contractors, with stations and terminal accommodations, including engine sheds, turn-tables, shops, water tanks, machinery, wharves, &c.

ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT made and entered into this Twentieth day of August, in the year of Our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty-three.

Between Robert Dunsmuir, James Dunsmuir and John Bryden, all of Nanaimo, in the Province of British Columbia; Charles Crocker, Charles F. Crocker, and Leland Stanford, all of the City of San Francisco, California, United States of America; and Collis P. Huntington, of the City of New York, United States of America, of the first part, and Her Majesty Queen Victoria, represented herein by the Minister of Railways and Canals, of the second part.

Whereas, it has been agreed by and between the Governments of Canada and British Columbia, that the Government of British Columbia should procure the incorporation, by an Act of their Legislature, of certain persons to be designated by the Government of Canada, for the construction of a railway from Esquimalt to Nanaimo, and that the Government of Canada should take security from such Company for

the construction of such railway:

And whereas, the parties hereto of the first part are associated together for the purpose of constructing or contracting for the construction of a railway and telegraph line from *Esquimalt* to *Nanaimo*, and are hereafter referred to as the said contractors:

Now these presents witness, that in consideration of the covenants and agreements on the part of Her Majesty hereinafter contained, the said contractors

covenant and agree with Her Majesty as follows :-

1. In this contract the word "work" or "works" shall, unless the context requires a different meaning, mean the whole of the works, material, matter and things to be done, furnished and performed by the said contractors under this contract.

2. All covenants and agreements herein contained, shall be binding on and extend to the executors, administrators and assigns of the said contractors, and shall extend and be binding upon the successors of Her Majesty; and wherever in this contract Her Majesty is referred to, such reference shall include Her successors; and wherever the said contractors are referred to, such reference shall include their executors,

administrators and assigns.

3. That the said contractors shall and will well, truly and faithfully lay out, make, build, construct, complete, equip, maintain and work continuously a line of railway of a uniform gauge of 4 feet 8½ inches, from Esquimalt to Nanaimo, in Vancouver Island, British Columbia, the points and approximate route and course being shown on the map hereunto annexed, marked B, and also construct, maintain and work continuously a telegraph line throughout and along the said line of railway, and supply all such telegraphic apparatus as way be required for the proper equipment of such telegraph line, and perform all engineering services, whether in the field or in preparing plans or doing other office work, to the entire satisfaction of the Governor in Council.

4. That the said contractors shall and will locate and construct the said line of railway in as straight a course as practicable between *Esquimalt* and *Nanaimo*, with only such deviations as may seem absolutely indispensable to avoid serious engineer-

ing obstacles, and as shall be allowed by the Governor in Council.

5. That the gradients and alignments shall be the best that the physical features of the country will admit of without involving unusually or unnecessarily heavy works of construction, with respect to which the Governor in Council shall decide.

6. That the said contractors shall and will furnish profiles, plans and bills of quantities of the whole line of railway in ten miles sections, and that before the work is commenced on any ten miles section, such profiles, plans and bills of quantities shall be approved by the Governor in Council, and before any payments are made the said contractors will furnish such further returns as may be required to satisfy the Minister of Railways and Canals as to the relative value of the works executed

with that remaining to be done.

7. That the Minister of Railways and Canals may keep and retain five per cent of the subsidy, or of such part thereof as the said contractors may be entitled to, for three months after the completion of the said railway and telegraph line and the works appertaining thereto, and for a further period, until the said Minister of Railways and Canals is satisfied that all failures or defects in said line of railway and telegraph line, respectively, and the works appertaining thereto that may have been discovered during the said period of three months, or such further period, have been permanently made good, and that no lands shall be conveyed to the said contractors until the road is fully completed and equipped.

8. That the said contractors shall commence the works embraced in this contract forthwith, and shall complete and equip the same by the 10th day of June, 1887, time being declared material and of the essence of the contract, and in default of such completion and equipment, as aforesaid, on or before the last mentioned date, the said contractors shall forfeit all right, claim or demand to the sum of money and percentage hereinbefore agreed to be retained by the Minister of Railways and Canals, and any and every part thereof, and also to any moneys whatever which

may be at the time of the failure of the completion as aforesaid due or owing to the said contractors, as also to the land grant and also to the moneys to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned.

9. That the said contractors will upon and after the completion and equipment of the said line of railway and works appertaining thereto truly, and in good faith, keep and maintain the same, and the rolling stock required therefor in good and efficient working and running order, and shall continuously and in good faith operate the same, and also the said telegraph line, and will keep the said telegraph line and appurtenances in good running order.

10. That the said contractors will build, construct, complete and equip the said line of railway and works appertaining thereto in all respects in accordance with the specification hereunto annexed, marked A, and upon the line of location, to be

approved by the Governor in Council.

11. The character of the railway and its equipments shall be in all respects equal to the general character of the Canadian Pacific Railway, now under construc-

tion in British Columbia, and the equipments thereof.

12. And that the said line of railway and telegraph line, and all works appertaining thereto respectively, together with all franchise rights, privileges, property, personal and real estate of every character appartaining thereto, shall upon the completion and equipment of the said line of railway and works appertaining thereto, in so far as Her Majesty shall have power to grant the same respectively, but no further,

or otherwise, be the property of the said contractors.

13. And Her Majesty in consideration of the premises, hereby covenants and agrees to permit the admission free of duty of all steel rails, fish-plates and other fastenings, spikes, bolts and nuts, wire, timber and all material for bridges to be used in the original construction of the railway, and of a telegraph line in connection therewith, and all telegraphic apparatus required for the first equipment of such telegraph line; and to grant to the said contractors a subsidy in money of \$750,000, (seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars), and in land, all of the land situated on Vancouver Island (except such parts thereof as may have at any time heretofore been reserved for naval or military purposes, it having been intended that all of the lands so reserved should be excluded from the operation of the Act passed by the Legislature of the Province of British Columbia, in the year 1883, entitled "An Act relating to the Island Railway, the Graving Dock and Railway Lands of the Province," in like manner as Indian reserves are excluded therefrom), which has been granted to Her Majesty by the Government of British Columbia by the aforesaid Act in consideration of the construction of the said line of railway, in so far as such land shall be vested in Her Majesty, and held by her for the purposes of the said railway, or for the purpose of constructing or to aid in the construction of the same, and also all coal, coal oil, ores, stones, clay, marble, slate, mines, minerals and substances whatsoever in on or under the lands so agreed to be granted to the said contractors as aforesaid, and the foreshore rights in respect of all such lands as aforesaid, which are hereby agreed to be granted to the said contractors as aforesaid, and border on the sea, together with the privilege of mining under the foreshore and sea opposite any such land, and of mining and keeping for their own use all coal and minerals (herein mentioned) under the foreshore or sea opposite any such lands, in so far as such coal, coal oil, ores, stones, clay, marble, slate, mines, minerals and substances whatsoever, and foreshore rights are owned by the Dominion Government, for which subsides, the construction of the railway and telegraph line from Esquimalt to Nanaimo shall be completed, and the same shall be equipped, maintained and operated.

14. The said money subsidy will be paid to the said contractors, by instalments,

14. The said money subsidy will be paid to the said contractors, by instalments, on the completion of each ten miles of railway and telegraph line, such instalments to be proportionate to the value of the part of the lines completed and equipped in comparison with the whole of the works undertaken, the proportion to be established

by the report of the Minister of Railways and Canals.

15. The land grant shall be made, and the land, in so far as the same shall be wested in Her Majesty and held by Her Majesty for the purposes of the said railway,

or for the purposes of constructing, or to aid in the construction of the same, shall be conveyed to the said contractors upon the completion of the whole work to the entire satisfaction of the Governor in Council, but so, nevertheless, that the said lands, and the coal oil, coal, and other minerals and timber thereunder, therein or thereon, shall be subject in every respect to the several clauses, provisions and stipulations referring to or affecting the same respectively, contained in the aforesaid Act passed by the Legislature of the Province of British Columbia, in the year 1883, entitled, "An Act relating to the Island Railway, the Graving Dock and Railway Lands of the Province," as the same may be amended by the Legislature of the said Province, in accordance with a Draft Bill now prepared, which has been identified by Sir Alexander Campbell and the Hon. Mr. Smithe, and signed by them and placed in the hands of the Hon. Joseph William Trutch, and particularly to sections 23, 24, 25 and 26 of the said Act.

And it is hereby further agreed by and between Her Majesty, represented as aforesaid, and the said contractors that the said contractors shall, within ten days after the execution hereof by Her Majesty, represented as aforesaid, or by the said Minister on behalf of Her Majesty, apply to the Government of Canada to be named by the Governor in Council as the persons to be incorporated under the name of the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway Company, and that immediately after the said contractors shall have been so incorporated, this contract shall be assigned and transferred by them to the said Company, and such Company shall forthwith, by deed entered into by and between Her Majesty, represented as aforesaid, and the said Company, assume all the obligations and liabilities incurred by the said contractors

hereunder or in any way in relation to the premises.

The said contractors shall, on the execution hereof, deposit with the Receiver General of Canada the sum of \$250,000 (two hundred and fifty thousand dollars) in cash as a security for the construction of the railway and telegraph line hereby contracted for. The Government shall pay to the contractors interest on the cash deposited, at the rate of 4 per cent, per annum, half yearly, until default in the performance of the conditions hereof or until the return of the deposit and shall return the deposit to the said contractors on the completion of the said railway and telegraph line, according to the terms hereof, with any interest accrued thereon, but if the said railway and telegraph line shall not be so completed, such deposit and all interest thereon which shall not have been paid to the contractors shall be forfeited to Her Majesty for the use of the Government of the Dominion of Canada. In witness, whereof the parties hereto have executed these presents, the day and year first above written.

BILL.

An Act relating to the Island Railway, the Graving Dock, and Railway Lands of the Province.

Whereas, negotiations between the Governments of Canada and British Columbia have been recently pending, relative to delays in the commencement and construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and relative to the Island Railway, the Graving Dock, and the Railway Lands of the Province:

And whereas, for the purpose of settling all existing disputes and difficulties between

the two Governments, it hath been agreed as follows:-

(a) The Legislature of British Columbia shall be invited to amend the Act No. 11, of 1880, intituled "An Act to authorize the grant of certain public lands on the Mainland of British Columbia to the Government of the Dominion of Canada for Canadian Pacific Railway purposes," so that the same extent of land on each side of the line of railway through British Columbia, wherever finally settled, shall be granted

to the Dominion Government in lieu of the lands conveyed by that Act.

(b) The Government of British Columbia shall obtain the authority of the Legislature to grant to the Government of Canada a portion of the lands set forth and described in the Act No 15, of 1882, intituled "An Act to incorporate the Vancouver Land and Railway Company," namely, that portion of the said lands therein described, commencing at the southern boundary thereof and extending to a line running east and west, half-way between Comox and Seymour Narrows; and also a further portion of the lands conveyed by the said Act to the northward of and contiguous to that portion of the said lands last hereinbefore specified, equal in extent to the lands within the limits thereof, which may have been alienated from the Crown by Crown grants, pre-emption or otherwise.

(c) The Government of British Columbia shall obtain the authority of the Legislature to convey to the Government of Canada three and one half millions of acres of land in the Peace River District of British Columbia, in one rectangular block, east

of the Rocky Mountains and adjoining the North-West Territory of Canada.

(d) The Government of British Columbia shall procure the incorporation, by Act of their Legislature, of certain persons, to be designated by the Government of

Canada for the construction of the Railway from Esquimalt to Nanaimo.

(e) The Government of Canada shall, upon the adoption by the Legislature of British Columbia of the terms of this agreement, seek the sanction of the Parliament to enable them to contribute to the construction of a Railway from Esquimalt to Nanaimo the sum of \$750,000, and they agree to hand over to the contractors who may build such railway the lands which are or may be placed in their hands for that purpose by British Columbia; and they agree to take security to the satisfaction of the Government of that Province, for the construction and completion of such railway on or before the 10th day of June, 1887; such construction to commence forthwith.

(f) The lands on Vancouver Island to be so conveyed shall, except as to coal and other minerals, and also except as to timber lands as hereinafter mentioned, be open for four years from the passing of this Act to actual settlers, for agricultural

purposes, at the rate of one dollar an acre, to the extent of 160 acres to each such actual settler; and in any grants to settlers the right to cut timber for railway purposes and rights of way for the railway and stations and workshops shall be reserved. In the meantime, and until the Railway from Esquimalt to Nanaimo shall have been completed, the Government of British Columbia shall be the Agents of the Government of Canada for administering, for the purposes of settlement, the lands in this sub-section mentioned; and for such purposes the Government of British Columbia may make and issue, subject as aforesaid, pre-emption records to actual settlers of the said lands. All moneys received by the Government of British Columbia in respect of such administration shall be paid, as received, into the Bank of British Columbia, to the credit of the Receiver-General of Canada; and such moneys, less expenses incurred (if any) shall, upon the completion of the railway to the satisfaction of the Dominion Government, be paid over to the railway contractors.

(g) The Government of Canada shall forthwith take over and seek the authority of Parliament to purchase and complete, and shall, upon the completion thereof, operate as a Dominion work, the dry dock at Esquimalt; and shall be entitled to and have conveyed to them all the lands, approaches, and plant belonging thereto, together with the Imperial appropriation therefor, and shall pay to the Province as the price thereof the sum of \$250,000, and shall further pay to the Province whatever amounts shall have been expended by the Provincial Government or which remain due up to the time of the passing of this Act. for work, or material supplied by the Government of British Columbia since the 27th day of

June, 1882.

(h). The Government of Canada shall, with all convenient speed, offer for sale the lands within the railway belt upon the mainland on liberal terms to actual

settlers; and

(i) Shall give persons who have squatted on any of the said lands, within the railway belt on the mainland, prior to the passing of this Act and who have made substantial improvements thereon, a prior right of purchasing the lands so improved

at the rates charged to settlers generally.

(k) This agreement is to be taken by the Province in full of all claims up to this date by the Province against the Dominion, in respect of delays in the commencement and construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and in respect of the non-const uction of the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway, and shall be taken by the Dominion Government in satisfaction of all claims for additional lands under the terms of Union, but shall not be binding unless and until the same shall have been ratified by the Parliament of Canada and the Legislature of British Columbia.

And whereas, it is expedient that the said agreement should be ratified, and

that provision should be made to carry out the terms thereof;

Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia, enacts as follows:

1. The hereinbefore recited agreement shall be and is hereby ratified and adopted.

2. Section 1 of the Act of the Legislature of British Columbia, No. 11, of 1880, intituled: "An Act to authorize the grant of certain public lands on the mainland of British Columbia to the Government of the Dominion of Canada for Canadian Pacific

Railway purposes," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

From and after the passing of this Act there shall be, and there is hereby granted to the Dominion Government for the purpose of constructing and to aid in the construction of the portion of the Canadian Pacific Railway on the mainland of British Columbia, in trust, to be appropriated as the Dominion Government may deem advisable, the public lands along the line of the railway before mentioned, wherever it may be finally located, to a width of 20 miles on each side of the said line as provided in the Order in Council, section 11, admitting the Province of British Columbia into Confederation; but nothing in this section contained, shall prejudice the right of the Province to receive and be paid by the Dominion Government the sum of \$100,000 per annum, in half yearly payments in advance, in consideration of the lands so conveyed, as provided in section 11 of the terms of Union: Provided always, that the line of railway before referred to, shall be one continuous line of Railway only, connecting the seaboard of *British Columbia* with the Canadian Pacific Railway, now under construction on the east of the *Rocky Mountains*.

3. There is hereby granted to the Dominion Government, for the purpose of constructing and to aid in the construction of a Railway between *Esquimalt* and *Nanaimo*, and in trust to be appropriated as they may deem advisable (but save as is hereinafter excepted) all that piece or parcel of land situate in *Vancouver Island*, described as follows:—

Bounded on the south by a straight line drawn from the head of Saanich Inlet to

Muir Creek, on the Straits of Fuca:

On the west by a straight line drawn from Muir Creek aforesaid to Crown Mountain;

On the no th by a straight line drawn from Crown Mountain to Seymour Narrows; and

On the east by the coast line of Vancouver Island to the point of commencement; and including all coal, coal oil, ores, stones, clay, marble, slate, mines, minerals and substances whatsoever thereupon, therein and thereunder.

- 4. There is excepted out of the tract of land granted by the preceding section all that portion the reof lying to the northward of a line running east and west half way between the mouth of the Courtney River (Comox District) and Seymour Narrows.
- 5. Provided always that the Government of Canada shall be entitled out of such excepted tract to lands equal in extent to those alienated up to the date of this Act by Crown graut, pre emption, or otherwise, within the limits of the grant mentioned in section 3 of this Act.

6. The grant mentioned in section 3 of this Act shall not include any lands now held under Crown grant, lease, agreement for sale, or other alienation by the Crown, nor shall it include Indian reserves or settlements, nor Naval or Military reserves.

7. There is hereby granted to the Dominion Government three and a-half million acres of land in that portion of the *Peace River District* of *British Columbia*, lying east of the *Rocky Mountains* and adjoining the North-West Territory of *Canada*, to

be located by the Lominion in one rectangular block.

8. For the purpose of facilitating the construction of the railway between Esquimalt and Nanaimo, it is hereby enacted that such persons, hereinafter called the "company," as may be named by the Governor General in Council, with all such other persons and corporations as shall become shareholders in the company, shall be and are hereby constituted a body corporate and politic by the name of "The

Esquimatt and Nanaimo Railway Company."

- 9. The company and their agents and servants, shall lay out, construct, equip, maintain and work a continuous double or single track steel railway, of the gauge of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and also a telegraph line, with the proper appurtenances, from a point at or near the Harbour of Esquimalt, in British Columbia, to a port or place at or near Nanaimo, on the eastern crast of Vancouver Island, with power to extend the main line to Comox and Victoria, and to construct branches to settlements on the cast coast, and also to extend the said railway by ferry communications to the mainland of British Columbia, and there to connect or amalgamate with any railway line in operation or course of construction. The company shall also have power and authority to build, own, and operate steam and other vessels in connection with the said railway, on and over the bays, gulfs, and inland waters of British Columbia.
- 10. The company may accept and receive from the Government of Canada any lease, grant or conveyance of lands, by way of subsidy or otherwise, in aid of the construction of the said railway, and may enter into any contract with the said Government for or respecting the use, occupation, mortgage, or sale of the said lands, or any part thereof, on such conditions as may be agreed upon between the Government and the company.

11. The capital stock of the company shall be three millions of dollars, and shall be divided into shares of one hundred dollars each, but may be increased from time to time by the vote of the majority in value of the shareholders present in person, or represented by proxy, at any meetings specially called for the purpose, to an amount not exceeding five million dollars.

12. The persons to be named as aforesaid by the Governor General in Council shall be and are hereby constituted a board of provisional directors of the company, and shall hold office as such until other directors shall be elected under the provisions of this Act, and shall have power to fill any vacancies that may occur in the said board; to open stock books at Victoria, British Columbia, or any other city in Canada,

procure subscriptions, and receive payments on stock subscribed.

13. When, and so soon as one-half of the capital stock shall have been subscribed, and one-tenth of the amount thereof paid into any chartered bank, either at Victoria or San Francisco, or partly in each, the provisional directors may order a meeting of shareholders to be called at Victoria, British Columbia, at such time as they think proper, giving at least three weeks' notice thereof in one or more newspapers published in the City of Victoria, and by a circular letter mailed to each shareholder, at which meeting the shareholders present in person, or by proxy, shall elect five directors qualified as hereinafter provided, who shall hold office until the first Wednesday in October, in the year following their election.

14. On the said first Wednesday in October, and on the same day in each year thereafter, at the City of Victoria, or at such other place as shall be fixed by the by-laws of the company, there shall be held a general meeting of the shareholders for receiving the report of the directors, transacting the business of the company, general or special, and electing the directors thereof; and public notice of such annual meeting and election shall be published for one month before the day of meeting, in one or more newspapers in the City of Victoria, and by circular letter mailed to each shareholder at least one month prior thereto. The election of directors shall be by

ballot, and all shareholders may vote by proxy.

15. Three of the directors shall form a quorum for the transaction of business, and the board may employ one or more of their number as paid director or directors,

provided that no person shall be elected director unless he owns at least twenty-five shares of the stock of the company on which calls have been paid.

16. No call shall be made for more than ten per centum at any one time on the amount subscribed, nor shall more than fifty per centum of the stock be called up in

any one year.

17. The Consolidated Railway Act, eighteen hundred and seventy-nine (1879) of Canada, shall, so far as its provisions are applicable to the undertaking and are not inconsistent with or contrary to the provisions of this Act, apply to the said

railway, and shall be read with and form part of this Act.

18. The words "Superior Court," "Clerks of the Peace," "Registry Offices," "Clerk of Court," as used in the said Consolidated Railway Act, eighteen hundred and seventy-nine (1879), shall, for the purposes of this Act, be read and construed in the same sense and meaning as is provided by the Act passed by this Lagislature, thirty-eight (38) Victoria, chapter thirteen (13), section three (3).

19. Sections five (5) and six (6) of the said last mentioned Act shall be read

with and form part of this Act.

20. The said railway line from Esquimalt to Nanaimo shall be commenced forth-

with and completed on or before the 10th day of June, 1887.

21. The railway, with its workshops, stations and other necessary buildings and rolling stock, and also the capital stock of the railroad company, shall be exempt from Provincial and municipal taxation until the expiration of ten years from the completion of the railroad.

22. The lands to be acquired by the company from the Dominion Government for the construction of the railway, shall not be subject to taxation, unless and until the same are used by the company for other than railroad purposes, or leased, occupied, sold or alienated.

23. The Company shall be governed by subsection (f) of the hereinbefore recited agreement, and each bond fide squatter who has continuously occupied and improved any of the lands within the tract of land to be acquired by the company from the Dominion Government for a period of one year prior to the first day of January, 1883, shall be entitled to a grant of the freehold of the surface rights of the said squatted land, to the extent of 160 acres to each squatter, at the rate of one dollar an acre.

24. The Company shall, at all times, sell coals gotten from the lands that may be acquired by their from the Dominion Government to any Canadian railway company having the terminus of its railway on the seaboard of *British Columbia*, and to the Imperial, Dominion and Provincial authorities, at the same rates as may be charged to any railway company owning or operating any railway in the United

States, or to any foreign customer whatsoever.

25. All lands acquired by the company from the Dominion Government under this Act, containing belts of timber fit for milling purposes, shall be sold at a price to be hereafter fixed by the Government of the Dominion, or by the company hereby incorporated.

26. The existing rights (if any) of any persons or corporations in any of the lands so to be acquired by the company, shall not be affected by this Act, nor shall

it affect military or naval reserves.

27. The said Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway Company shall be bound by any contract or agreement for the construction of the railway from Esquimalt to Nanaimo, which shall be entered into by and between the persons so to be incorporated as aforesaid, and Her Majesty, represented by the Minister of Railways and Canals, and shall be entitled to the full benefit of such contract or agreement, which shall be construed and operated in like manner as if such company had been a party thereto in lieu of such persons, and the document had been duly executed by such company under their corporate seal.

28. The railways to be constructed by the company in pursuance of this Act,

shall be the property of the company.

29. The Act of 1883, chapter 14, intituled: "An Act relating to the Island Railway, the Graving Dock and the Railway Lands of the Province," is hereby repealed.

TO THE HONOURABLE THE SENATE OF CANADA, IN PARLIAMENT ASSEMBLED.

The Report of the Librarian, on the state of the Library of Parliament, respectfully showeth:—

By the liberality of Parliament, at its last Session, the annual grant for the augmentation of the Library, was considerably increased. This additional provision was

voted upon the advice of the Library Committee, who were desirous of seeing our great National Collection enlarged and improved—their main object being to secure the perfecting of the scientific section, and the completion of the classes appertain-

ing to American and Canadian history.

Bearing in mind the impetus that has been given of late, in Canada, to scientific studies, and the consequent necessity for providing students of science in the Dominion with access to the kindred researches of learned societies elsewhere, we have endeavoured to complete our existing series of transactions of scientific associations, and of periodicals devoted to particular branches of knowledge,—adding thereto similar publications, not already on our shelves,—with a view to an adequate representation of all departments of mental inquiry, in the Libary of Parliament.

Upon application to our London Agent, I learned that collections of this description, which are seldom reprinted, were now exceedingly scarce, and not easily obtainable in a complete shape at the present time. Every year, this difficulty would naturally become more serious; and in some instances insurmountable. I therefore ventured to assume the responsibility of completing most of such Collections without further delay, lest we should be unable to procure these important acquisitions at a later period. This has unavoidably occasioned a large expenditure on this behalf within the past year.

In compliance with the expressed wishes of the Committee, I have likewise bought a number of Miscellaneous Books; some of which have been on the Order List for two or three years, waiting until an opportunity offered to procure them. In such purchases, special attention has been bestowed upon works in relation to

Canada, and other parts of the North American Continent.

Abundant facility for shelving these additions has been afforded through the liberty given by the Board of Works to make use of space in the Reading Room of the House of Commons; where several thousand volumes can be securely stored, under lock and key. Such classes only, are thus placed as are not in frequent de-

mand, leaving space in the main Library available for current literature.

Authority was given, by Parliament, last Session, for the purchase, from Mr. Gerald Hart, of Montreal, of his valuable and unique Collection of Canadian Coins and Medals. This series has accordingly been deposited in the Library. For the purpose of economizing room, these Coins and Medals have been arranged in covered glass receptacles, which do not encroach upon the limited space of the Library apartment, or interfere with present opportunities for the comfort or accommodation of Similarly, provision has been made for the safe custody and exhibition of a complete Collection of Postal Cards and Stamps, which represent the postal apparatus in use throughout the entire British Empire; a collection which will prove of peculiar interest to students of philately. These Stamps are being now prepared for deposit under glass, to range with the Coins and Medals above mentioned.

The various additions to the Library during the past year are included in a bapplementary Catalogue, which is ready for distribution. In the compilation of this Catalogue, some improvement has been attempted, by the separation of additions to the series of Pamphlets from that of the titles of separate Books. Such titles, however, are unavoidably brief, and afford small indication of the contents or value of the

works referred to; save only to those who are already conversant with them.

Appended to this Report, there is a List of Donations received, since the last return, and of Canadian Works, deposited under the Copyright Act.

The number of volumes in the Library, last year, was estimated at 104,000. Since then, the total number has increased to about 107,500.

That the following Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General to offer the respectful thanks of this House to His Excellency for the gracious Speech which His Excellency has been pleased to make to both Houses of Parliament, namely:—

To His Excellency the Most Honorable Henry Charles Keith Petty-Fitzmaurice, Marquis of Lansdowne, in the County of Somerset, Earl of Wycombe, of Chipping Wycombe, in the County of Bucks, Viscount Caln and Calnstone, in the County of Wilts, and Lord Wycombe, Baron of Chipping Wycombe in the County of Bucks, in the Peerage of Great Britain; Earl of Kerry and Earl of Shelburne, Viscount Clanmaurice and Fitzmaurice, Baron of Kerry, Lixnaw, and Dunkerron, in the Peerage of Ireland; Governor General of Canada.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:-

We, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects the Senate of Canada in Parliament assembled, humbly thank Your Excellency for your gracious Speech at the opening

of this Session.

Your Excellency, in fulfilment of the important trust committed to you by Her Majesty, has been graciously pleased to have recourse for the first time to our advice and assistance. We respectfully thank Your Excellency for the expression that it is a source of the deepest personal satisfaction to you that you should have been called by Her Majesty to an office in which, as Her Representative, Your Excellency is enabled to take a part in the public affairs of the Dominion, and to associate yourself with us in the performance of the honorable duties which we are about to approach.

We rejoice with Your Excellency to learn that, although the last harvest has been less productive than its predecessors, and although there are indications that the rapid expansion of our commerce has to some extent been followed by overtrading, the general condition of the Dominion is such as to justify Your Excellency

in congratulating us upon its prosperity.

We are much pleased at hearing from Your Excellency of the marked success attained by *Canada* at the International Fishery Exhibition in *London*. It is very gratifying to us, and has, we doubt not, been of great service in showing to the world the wealth of our fisheries and the extent of our marine industries and resources.

We are glad to be informed that the Commissioners appointed by Your Excellency's predecessor for the purpose of consolidating the Statutes affecting the Dominion, have pursued their task with diligence, that Your Excellency is enabled to lay before us for examination about sixty chapters of the proposed consolidation, that the remainder of the work will be prepared, and that the whole of it will be revised during the present year, so that the final report will be ready at our next Session for our approval.

We beg leave to thank Your Excellency for the expression of gladness with which Your Excellency has informed us that the number of immigrants to Canada during the past season has been greater than in any previous year, and we highly appreciate Your Excellency's opinion that this is a proof that the better Canada is known the more it is valued by those seeking a home in the New World. We are also pleased to be informed that arrangements are in progress to

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diminish the cost of inland transport, and that Your Excellency has reason to believe

that the result will be a steady increase of valuable settlers, in the future.

We are glad to learn from Your Excellency that during the recess negotiations were resumed with British Columbia in regard to several matters upon which differences had for some time existed between the two Governments; that one of Your Excellency's ministers visited that Province last summer on a special mission with a view to the adjustment of all questions in controversy and that his efforts have happily been successful. We trust that we shall be able to sanction the arrangements then made, and that by our so doing, all occasions of dispute will have been removed, and the most cordial relations established between the Dominion and Provincial Governments. The papers which Your Excellency has been pleased to say will be laid before us and the measures enabling Your Excellency to give effect to the agreement will not fail to receive from us the consideration Your Excellency has invited.

We hear with interest that the rapid increase of population in the North-West renders some amendments in the North-West Territories Act expedient. Our attention, which Your Excellency has been pleased to say will be called to this important

matter, shall be given thereto.

We are much gratified to be informed that the progress of the Indians in Manitoba and the North-West during last year has been on the whole satisfactory and that the Bands included in the several Treaties have for the most part betaken themselves to their reserves. The Bill for the further promotion of their interests which Your Excellency has informed us will be submitted to us, as well as the measure applicable to the whole Dominion for the purpose of encouraging the more advanced Indian communities to assume the responsibilities of self-government, shall receive our most attentive consideration.

Your Excellency has been pleased to inform us that the Bill laid before us last Session for the representation of the people in Parliament and the assimilation of the electoral franchises existing in the several Provinces has now been before the Country for a year and that the measure will be reintroduced. Our attention, to which Your Excellency has commended it, shall be cheerfully given to this measure.

We respectfully note that Your Excellency would also urge upon us the expediency of providing for the regulation of factory labor and the protection of the workingman and his family, and that the measure submitted last Session with some amendments will be laid before us. This important subject shall receive our most careful consideration.

It is with the greatest gratification we hear from Your Excellency that the rapid progress of the Canadian Pacific Railway has been maintained throughout the past year; that of the two thousand eight hundred and thirty-three miles of the main line between Pembroke and Port Moody, one thousand seven hundred and thirtyeight miles are now constructed, rendering practicable the completion of that great work within the next two years. We receive with the deepest interest the information that although the time within which the Railway Company is bound to finish the road will not expire until 1891, Your Excellency's Government has thought it of the greatest importance for the settlement of the North West and the development of our trade that its completion from sea to sea should be hastened and the company enabled to open the line throughout by the spring of 1886; that with this view, and in order to aid the Company in procuring sufficient capital for the purpose by the disposal of its unsold shares, the Government agreed to receive a deposit of money and securities sufficient to pay a minimum three per cent dividend for ten years on sixty-five millions of the stock, and that this arrangement was made in the belief that it would give steadiness and increased value to the shares on the market. We are much concerned to learn that a combination of unfavorable circumstances has prevented the fulfilment of these expectations, and that the Company has not been able to obtain the required capital by a sale of its stock; and we respectfully concur with Your Excellency's opinion that the best means of preventing any delay in the great object of the early completion of the railway demands

our earnest consideration.

We share the pleasure with which Your Excellency is able to state that the operation of that portion of the railway already opened affords the most gratifying evidence of its soundness as a commercial enterprise and of its great value to Canada.

It gratifies us to know that the large increase of the volume of traffic on the Intercolonial Railway over that of any previous year, without involving any burden upon the country, is, as Your Excellency is pleased to observe, a satisfactory proof of the continued development of trade between the eastern and western portions of the Dominion.

The provisional arrangement made with the Government of Nova Scotia for the retention of the Pictou Branch and the acquisition of the Eastern Extension Railway to the Strait of Canso, which Your Excellency has stated will be submitted for our approval, shall be carefully considered by us.

Your Excellency may rest assured that we will devote ourselves with earnestness and assiduity to the consideration of the subjects Your Excellency has mentioned, and to all matters affecting the public interests that may be brought before us.

After Debate,

On this eighteenth day of February, in the year of Our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eight-four, personally came and appeared John Graham, of Ottawa, in the County of Carleton, hotelkeeper, the Petitioner for the said Bill, who being duly sworn and examined upon oath as well generally in regard to any collusion or connivance between the parties, deposeth as follows:—

I am the John Graham, the Petitioner for this Bill of Divorce. I reside in the City of Ottawa, in the Province of Ontario, and am an hotelkeeper. I have had no collusion nor connivance with my wife, Sarah Ann Graham, to obtain the separation prayed for in this Bill. This proceeding is taken by myself without her consent. I have had no collusion nor connivance with any other parties to obtain the separation prayed for in this Bill.

Examined by Mr. Remon: --

I was married to the Respondent Sarah Ann Graham, on the 4th day of October, Eighteen Hundred and Fifty-nine. Her maiden name was Sarah Ann Graham, daughter of George Graham, of the Township of Huntley, in the County of Carleton, Ontario; I was residing in Ottawa at the time of the marriage. I belonged to the Church of England, she, I think, to the Methodist Church. We were married in her Mother's house, in the said Township of Huntley, by the Reverend Mr. Godfrey, Church of England Rector in that Township. The marriage was solemnized according to the forms of the Church of England. We lived together as husband and wife till about the fifth day of May, eighteen hundred and eighty-two. We were married by license. We have no issue of the said marriage living; there are six children dead; the oldest was only three years old. They all died in infancy. The Respondent left me about the fifth day of May, eighteen hundred and eighty-two. She went from here without my knowledge or consent. I understood she went to Cleveland. Ohio. There was a man named Onslow boarding at the hotel of which my wife had charge at that time. She took charge of the Albion Hotel, and I took charge of the Grand Union Hotel. He boarded there several months. I could not say how many—three or four months perhaps. Onslow left the Albion Hotel about three or four months before my wife left—I could not possibly swear how many months—about four or five months perhaps before she did. I know of no improper intimacy between Onslow and my wife, of my own knowledge. I first heard of any improper intimacy between them about a month after she left. I heard she had gone to Cleveland, Ohio, and from Cleveland to New York. I got a letter from her, dated from New York. Onslow was a clerk in a store here. I have brought no action of any kind against Onslow with respect to this matter. Onslow was a man of no means, and did not pay his bill. Onslow has not, to my knowledge, been within the jurisdiction of the Ontario Courts since the fifth of May, eighteen hundred and eighty-two.

I now produce and fyle as Petitioner's Exhibits No, 1 and No. 2 a letter dated New York, July 19th, and signed "Sarah," and an envelope addressed "J. Graham,

Esq., Grand Union, Ottawa, Ont.," and bearing a New York post mark July 20th. The letter and the address on the envelope are both in my wife's handwriting. This letter was received in July, eighteen hundred and eighty: three. I also produce and fyle as Petitioner's Exhibit No. 3 a letter dated New York, July 9th, 1883, addressed to me and signed "S. G." It is in my wife's handwriting, and was received by me about that date. I do not know where Onslow is now.

My wife was about nineteen or twenty years of age when we were married. She

has not been in Ottawa, to my knowledge, since she left.

Henry Borbridge, saddler and harness maker, who lives here in Ottawa; Harriet Graham, now married and living in Winnipeg, were the witnesses of our marriage.

I have not seen my wife since she left about the fifth of May, eighteen hundred and eighty two, and have not cohabited with her since that date. We lived together

as man and wife up to that time.

1: -

I never had the original marriage certificate in my possession. My wife told me she had it. I used generally to sleep at the Albion Hotel with my wife at the time she was in charge of that hotel. And I have signed

I first saw herein October, eighteen hundred and fifty-nine, in the Township of Huntley, on the occasion of her marriage to the Petitioner. I have known her and have seen her nearly every day up to the time she left Ottawa, about a year ago. She had been living with the Petitioner. They lived as husband and wife. I was present at the marriage. I think Mr. Godfrey was the officiating clergyman. He was of the Church of England and the ceremony was performed according to the rites of that Church. I could not say whether Mr. Godfrey was robed or not. The usual marriage service of the Church of England was performed. I know what that service is. The marriage was in accordance with that service. I do not know whether Mr. Godfrey was the Rector of that Parish. I would recognize Mrs. Graham if I were to see her now. I would recognize her photograph. The photograph now shown to me marked Petitioner's Exhibit No. 4 is the likeness of Mrs. Graham, Sarah Ann Graham, wife of the Petitioner. I was groomsman at the marriage. A great fire took place in eighteen hundred and seventy which swept over the Parish of Huntley and other places in the County of Carleton. Houses buildings and farms were burned in the Parish of Huntley,

the country was left almost desert. And further the deponent saith not, and hath signed.

I reside in Dundas, Ontario, and am an hotel-keeper. In eighteen hundred and eighty-two I was proprietor of the Striebinger House in Cleveland, Ohio, and resided there. A lady came to my house and stopped there in eighteen hundred and eightytwo. The photograph, Petitioner's Exhibit No. 4 now shown me is the likeness of the same woman, who I should say, was a little older than the photograph shows her. She arrived in the spring of that year, not earlier I think than the middle of May. L was expecting her arrival. A gentleman boarding with me who professed to be her husband said his wife was coming over. He introduced me to her as his wife when she came. He came to my house about the end of December or beginning of January Previous, and was a day boarder at my house continuously from them. The went by the name of William L. O. Burton. He was about twenty four or twenty five years of age, dark complexion, black hair, black eyes and a small black moustache. His height Was about five feet seven inches. He worked in McGillen's dry goods department as salesman. After the arrival of the lady he took a room for them both at my house, having engaged it previously for that purpose. She was a very large woman, quite flishy and quite tall, considerably taller than he. They remained at my house a month at least. They occupied one room, number fifteen. They spoke of each other as husband and wife. The room was a bedroom. They both stopped there at night. They had no other room. They both occupied the same bed if they went to bed. He used to call her "Mrs. Burton." She told told me herself she was Mrs. Burton. She called him her husband and Mr. Burton, and generally "Will." When she arrived I had some conversation with her. She asked for her husband and spoke of him as Mr. Burton. She was recognized as Mrs. Burton by my wife and family. I had a short time afterwards a conversation with her in which she told me about her life previous to marrying this Burton. She said she was a widow, that her name Was Graham before she married again, that she lived in Ottawa; that she had been a widow about three years before marrying again; that her husband's will deprived her of all property if she married again; that she was married the Soptember before her arrival at my house and had kept it a secret on account of the property; that it had commenced to leak out among her late husband's family that she had married again and that she had began to gather together what property she could for her own support. She did not tell me what her former husband's name was, she only told me her name was Graham before she married again. She said she had had seven children, all of whom were dead. She said she had goods on the way from Ottawa coming to Cleveland. I saw

quite an amount of goods in the parlour of the house they moved into after they left me. She told me these goods were hers. While she was at my house she told me she had married Burton "because she loved the little cuss." She was angry with him at the time. She told me that pretty much all the clothing he had she had sent him from Ottawa. On his birthday she gave him a gold watch, with a long gold chain. She once told me she had always been in the hotel business. She said Burton had boarded with her in her hotel. She did not, as far as I remember, mention how long he had been so boarding with her, nor the name of the hotel. She said this boarding with her led to their marriage. The relations between Burton and this lady were very friendly all the time they lived with me, except on the one occasion I have spoken of. On that occasion she said there was another woman causing trouble between them. They went to house-keeping together at 55 Seneca Street after they left my house. From memory I should say they kept house together there about a couple of months. The parlor I referred to above was in that house, No. 55 Seneca Street. I was there twice only. The time I called, and, when the furniture was sold at auction, the time I called she showed me the things she had, and said they were her own. After they broke up housekeeping they went to New York; this was in eighteen hundred and eighty-two still. While they were boarding at my house a lady, whose name I do not know, called on Mrs. Burton. She was tail and stout, but not so tall as Mrs. Burton.

I recognize the man now pointed out to me in this room, his name is Montgomery. He came to my house when they were boarding at Mr. Partridge's in Superior street, after they returned from New York. The Mr. and Mrs. Burton who were boarding at my house were the same who afterwards boarded at Mr. Partridge's, I never heard Mr. Burton address her by her christian name, I was in their bed-room on one

occasion because of trouble between them.

Complaint was made once to me by the people who occupied the room adjoining that of the Burton's that the noise made by the latter disturbed them. This noise was caused by the bed, it was Burton's bed that made the noise. The bed in Burton's room was against the door between these two rooms. It was not the noise of quarrelling that was complained of, far from it.

The Burton's owed me no hing when they left. They paid their bills, and I had no misunderstanding with them. He paid the bills but she told me she gave him the

money to do so.

The ring she apparently has on in this photograph, Petitioner's Exhibit No. 4, I

recognize as the same ring Burton used to wear.

And further the deponent saith not and hath signed.

I reside in Ottawa. I am a police constable I am aged?twenty-four. I am a detective officer. I was in Cleveland, Ohio, on the fifteenth of September, 1882, I then saw there Mrs. Graham, wife of the Petitioner and a young man named Burton.

Onslow was the name he went by when here. I have known Mrs. John Graham, wife of the Petitioner, from my childhood up. She was living with her husband the Petitioner when I knew her here. Onslow was a salesman in Russell, Gardner & Leggetts, Dry Goods Merchants in Ottawa. I have seen Mrs. Graham and Onslow alias Burton together here in Ottawa. When I saw them in Cleveland they were living together at a boarding house in Superior Street in Cleveland, kept by a Mr. and Mrs. Partridge. I conversed with them both. They were together at the time in her room in this boarding house. There was a double room with a door between the two parts of it. She said Burton occupied the one room and she the other. Just the one door led to the two rooms, which opened one off the other Mrs. Graham's was the outer room of the two. I had a paper to serve on Mrs. Graham. I asked for her. She was at tea and came out from the dining room. Burton followed her out and wanted to know What was the matter. She took the paper from me and gave it to him saying "Willy, dear, it is nothing." The three of us then went to her room up stairs. She then questioned me about Mr. Graham, the Petitioner, and his business. She told me how she sent Burton away from Ottawa, where a warrant was issued against him for embezzlement, that she had paid the expenses of sending him away. She told me that she had sent him clothes and money after he left, that she then left Ottawa herself, and followed him there. I asked her if she would ever go back to Ottawa. She said "No, unless to give that red headed neice of Mr. Graham's a licking; "it was her own neice she referred to. She told me she had seen some letters from Mr. Graham to a detective in Cleveland named Hulligan, that she knew all that was going on. Onslow was wanted here on a warrant for embezzling fifteen dollars from his employers Russell & Co. He escaped. Mrs. Graham told me she had him concealed in St. Andrew Street for two or three days after the warrant was issued, and engaged a carter to drive him out to Brockville. I know the place; it is on the corner of St. Andrew's and King Streets. I do not remember the names of the people who were then there.

When I saw them, Mrs. Graham and Onslow alias Burton, in Cleveland, she told me she was living there as his aunt. I would say they appeared to be living together as man and wife. I judged so, from the appearance of their rooms and the way in which they addressed each other. I did not see her after that evening. She told me she had sold out her goods at the house where she had been living previously, on account of the letter Hultigan the detective showed her. The photograph, Petitioner's Exhibit No. 4, now shown me, I recognize as that of Mrs. Graham, the wife of the Petitioner. All the conversation between me and Mrs. Graham that I have referred to took place in the presence and hearing of Burton. And further the deponent saith not,

and hath signed.

2. Your Committee recommend that Mr. Charles T. Gibbs and Mr. F. A. McCord be appointed "Junior Clerks," at a salary of \$800 a year each, with an annual increase of \$50 until \$1,000 is reached; and that Mr. Charles T. Gibbs perform the

duties of "Assistant Accountant."

3. Your Committee recommend that the salaries of Messrs. A. A. Boucher, "Second Clerk Assistant and Chief French Translator," and Alfred Garneau, "First French Translator and Clerk," be increased by \$300, from \$1,900 and \$1,600 respec-

tively to \$2,200 and \$1,900 respectively.

- 4. 6. Your Committee recommend that all the increases of salary hereinabove

6a. Whereas doubts have arisen as to the positions of certain messengers of the Senate, which doubts it is desirable to remove, Your Committee recommend that Frederick Gilbert, who has for some time acted as "Keeper of the Wardrobe and Assistant Doorkeeper," be continued and confirmed in those offices at his present selary, viz., \$750 a year; that John Dunne, "Senior Permanent Messenger," be appointed "Bank Messenger" at the salary now attached to that office, viz., \$750 a year; and that Joseph Larose's appointment as "Permanent Messenger" be held to that from 11th May, 1882.

The Members on behalf of the Senate of the Joint Committee on the Library of Parliament beg leave to present a First Report:—

The Committee have taken occasion of their first meeting to record their extreme regret at the recent sudden death of Dr. Alpheus Todd, for many years Librarian of the Parliament of Canada. In his demise not only this Parliament and country, but all countries possessing similar forms of Government, have sustained a heavy loss. His great constitutional knowledge and general erudition made him a most reliable

counsellor to all those who had occasion to consult him, whilst his courteous manners and kindly disposition enhanced the value of his intellectual endowments.

The regret which the Members of the Committee, in common with Dr. Todd's many other friends, experience at his unexpected removal from their midst, finds some mitigation in the reflection that his admirable works will survive as an enduring monument of his untiring industry and extensive and accurate knowledge, and of his

devotion to the institutions under which we live.

Last Session the Committee recommended that the bulk of the Law Books be permanently transferred to the Supreme Court Building, where the series of English and American Law Reports, formerly in the Library, have been sent by Order of this House; that the Department of Justice be henceforth responsible for the maintenance and management of this Law Library, that it be no longer regarded as forming part of the Library of Parliament; subject, however, to a right of preferential access by Members of both Houses to these books whenever and wherever they may require to consult them. Such text-books only to be retained in the Library of Parliament, or hereafter added thereto, as may be necessary for purposes of Legislation. The Committee beg leave to renew their recommendation,—their Report of last year not having been concurred in by Parliament.

A Sub-Committee has been appointed to determine, along with the Assistant

Librarian, what Law Books should be retained in the Library.

In view of the vast number of Maps and Charts possessed by the Library, and of the numerous publications of this nature issued every year referring to Canada and the North-West Territories, it is thought advisable to adopt means to render them more accessible for reference. The Committee, therefore, recommend the organization of a section of chartography and to set aside for this purpose one of the side rooms of the Library and to furnish it with the necessary apparatus.

The Committee also recommend that wire-screens, similar to those placed over the works on Canada, be extended to the principal sections on the ground floor to

secure better protection for the books placed therein.

The Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, beg leave to submit as their Fifth Report, the Report of their Sub-Committee (hereto appended) "appointed to enquire as to the best method of performing the Printing Services in "future," which having adopted, they respectfully recommend for the consideration of both Houses.

The Sub-Committee appointed to enquire as to the best method of performing the Printing Services in future beg leave to submit the following as their Report:—

Your Committee have had under consideration the subject of the best method of carrying on the Public Printing, namely:—Whether by the establishment of a Government Printing Office where all the printing and binding of Parliament and of the

Public Departments could be performed, or by contract, as heretofore.

They have obtained a Statement (Appendix No. 1) from Mr. Ro

They have obtained a Statement (Appendix No. 1) from Mr. Robert Romaine who was for many years Superintendent of the Queen's Printing Office under the late Messrs. Derbishire and Desbarats, and a letter (Appendix No. 2) from Mr. S. P. Rounds the United States Public Printer, which are hereto appended. They have also examined Mr. Gliddon of the Queen's Printer's Office as to the manner in which the Departmental printing is now carried on, that is the prices paid for special work, and the manner of measurement adopted in checking and auditing the accounts of the Public Contractors and others performing printing for the Government.

They append statements of the cost of the Public Printing forthe last four years, both that done for the Departments (Appendix No. 3) and for Parliament (Appendix No. 4), and they are of opinion that the sum of two hundred thousand dollars may be regarded as the minimum cost per annum in the future, of the Public Printing and Binding including the Departmental and Parliamentary work, and the Printing of

the Official Debates of the Senate and the House of Commons.

Your Committee have not been able to obtain such information as would enable them to make a positive recommendation on this important subject. Such information as they have obtained points to this result: that, by means of a Government Printing Office under the superintendence of an experienced man, the printing would be done about as cheaply, and certainly better than by the Contract system; and they have formed this opinion on the belief that with the Public Printing under the control of an efficient superintendent whose interest and duty it would be to economise, the duplication and the spacing out of matter, which now obtains in the Public Reports, adding to their size as well as to their cost, would be avoided.

Your Committee however as already stated, do not venture upon a positive recommendation. They believe the subject is one which should be thoroughly enquired into before a final decision is arrived at, and with the view of permitting that enquiry to be made they would recommend that in accordance with the provision contained in the present Contracts, by which Parliament has the right to extend the same for five years, they be extended for the present for one year, from 31st December next, and further thereafter it found necessary, to which extension the several

Contractors have signified their consent in writing.

APPENDIX No. 1.

REPORT.

To the Sub-Committee of the Joint Committee on Printing;—

Gentlemen,—In compliance with your instructions dated 6th February, 1884, to report as to the best method of performing the Printing Services of Parliament for the future, the probable cost of such an office as would be capable of performing all the Departmental and Parliamentary work, that is, the cost of the building, the necessary plant, &c., the cost of working, and a comparison as to the work performed in a public printing office as compared with the present contract system, I have the honour to submit the following Report:—

In all my experience as a practical printer, well acquainted with all the Departmental and Parliamentary Printing and Binding, not only as apprentice and con-

ductor of the late Messrs. Derbishire & Desbarats' Queen's Printing Office, but the actual organizer, in detail, of all the printing plant and machinery in that establishment; and being the first printer in Canada to introduce steam printing in 1844, I am convinced the contract system has not been a success, either to the Government or to the contractors, for the following reasons among many others I could mention:—

1st. Workmanship.

By the wording of the printing contracts it has been evident the Government desired to have first-class workmanship. In this they certainly have not succeeded, as can be readily verified by comparing the Canadian Public Documents with those we exchange with other countries. Nor is it likely we ever will under the contract system.

2nd, Economy.

If the Government desired economy in the price of composition and presswork, they have also failed to obtain their desire, because the contractors will, invariably, in order to make the low-priced composition remunerate them, have to blank or space out the matter from 20 to 40 per cent. thereby adding to the number of tokens of presswork, besides adding to the quantity of paper to be supplied by the Government and also the extra number of volumes of the Sessionals to be bound, which, if allowed to go on at the rate of the last ten years, will necessitate the Government providing more storage and shelving. As to the increased expense in forwarding by mail this extra and unnecessary weight of matter I have no means of ascertaining.

3RD. DEBATES CONTRACT.

With regard to the English Debates Contract, I think it ought to pay well at 60c. per M., and all alterations being paid for extra. Especially so will this be this Session, now that copy is supplied from the Type Writers, punctuated and capitalized, before being sent to the printers. The French Debates ought also to pay if any kind of readable copy is supplied and alterations paid for, seeing it is principally daywork.

4th. DEPARTMENTAL JOB WORK.

It is a well known fact that the last two or three Government contracts for printing have been more profitable than those preceding, on account of the large and gradually increasing Departmental job work. And it is in this class of work that a well-managed Government Printing Bureau would produce the greatest economy, as well as the best service and workmanship. With a suitable building a portion of which could be set apart for storage of printing and fine job papers, advantage could be taken of the slack time to strike off the needed supplies of all permanent and standard jobs for the several Departments, especially those of the Customs and Post Office Departments. Then again a large portion of the jobs requiring heavy editions might remain in store till called for, and if found convenient might be wrapped, packed, addressed and shipped direct from the Printing Bureau to the place of destination, by means of the present staff appointed for that purpose, saving time, double handling and the expense of cartage, first inwards and then outwards, relieving thereby some of the now overcrowded rooms in several of the Departments.

5th. Excessive Handling and Cartage-The want of Storage.

To illustrate the economic results that would be certain to follow in having the storage immediately alongside the Printing Office, under the one roof, take for instance, the tons weight of Parliamentary matter to be mailed by the House of Commons and Bureau of Agriculture, every heavy parcel of which, could, at least, be wrapped in

covers by the same hands that folded and stitched them, and be ready when required for the proper parties to ship direct to their place of destination, saving several

handlings, cartage and time.

The foregoing merely refers to the Parliamentary matter after it has been printed and received by the Senate, House of Commons, the Bureau of Agriculture or any of the other Departments previous to its being mailed or otherwise distributed. I will now describe the round-about method the annual 115 tons weight of Printing Paper takes before it reaches the hands of the Printing contractor and binder, and then

afterwards delivered to the Departments alluded to.

It is first received at the station, carted to the east or west end of the Parliamentary Buildings, unloaded off the carter's vehicle and loaded on to a tramway truck and run into one or other of two vaults, consigned for its reception, under the Chambers of the Senate and House of Commons respectively. Then it is again unloaded from the tram-truck and carried, in single bundles, of 104 pounds each, into the vaults, piled up, checked as to quantity and quality by the Clerk of Stationery and then delivered by him on requisitions from the printer, in quantities of 50 bundles or 200 reams at a time, having to go through a similar process of handling and carting as already mentioned. The cartage from the station to the Parliamentary Buildings is paid for by the contractor for the supply of the paper, and costs \$4.16 per hundred bundles, or at the rate of \$1 per load, but the cartage from the vaults to the printer is paid for through the Contingent Fund of the House of Commons at the same rate of \$4.16 per 100 bundles.

The expense of returning these 115 tons of double royal and double cap printing paper to the several Departments and House of Commons, after it has been struck off in printed sheets, is not so easily computed as that just mentioned for receiving it from the station, because fire proof storage must be had, and is insisted upon by the Government, to store the sneets until the several documents, in the act of being printed, are completed and ready to be stitched into Blue Books, or bound as Sessional Papers. It is computed that about one third of the bulk or weight of the 115 tons of paper is returned direct to the House of Commons Distribution Department for daily requirements, the other two-thirds being carted back daily to vaults under

the Library of the House, in small bundles.

The next process the printing paper takes is to be again carted back from the vaults, one portion,—the Blue Book sheets to the printer to be stitched and covered,—the other, the Sessional sheets, to the bookbinder, and both to be dealt with in delivering back again as already explained. These printed sheets are certainly not improved in appearance after so much handling and carting. This last expense of handling and carting these.115 tons of paper has to be borne by the contractors of both the printing and binding and is no doubt a heavy item to be deducted from the profits of doing the work by contract.

6TH. BUILDING.

Having resided in London and other parts of England off and on for nine years, in Paris for seven or eight months, and worked for a season in one of the best book and job offices in New York, and having met and discussed in these places with some of the best Master Printers, about the best methods of laying out and organizing large printing and bookbinding establishments, I have no hesitation in stating that a great deal more reliable work, contentment, respect for their overseers, and orderly conduct, can be had from a body of employees in a large and permanent printing office, well lighted, ventilated and clean, than there could be had from, what is now very common, a crowded and filthy office.

A Government Printing Bureau, therefore, ought to be located in an open space capable of being added to if required hereafter. It ought to be two stories high having a good basement and attic, built of stone and lined with brick, having an air space to dispense with furring and lathing, and be plastered on the brick; it ought to be 60 feet wide and about 150 feet long, divided longitudinally in the centre and trans-

versely into three compartments by brick walls; the basement to be divided into three compartments longitudinally, the centre one the narrowest being appropriated to the steam heating apparatus. The six compartments having their dividing walls built up above the roof would render them fire proof from each other, with the sid of

fire-proof doors for communication.

This building being divided longitudinally one half facing the north would be devoted to the printing department, and the other half facing the south, devoted to the storage of all the printing and job paper; and the Blue Books and Sessional volumes would also be stored here until finally mailed or otherwise distributed. The press-room, with all its machinery, the job and making-up departments, with the stereotype room, would be located on the ground floor, preventing any noise or bustle reaching the second floor, where would be located the composing room, proofreading or any other offices. There ought to be four fire-proof staircases all built outside the main walls of the building, one at each end and one at each side about the middle, all being extended at their ends, to accommodate the water closets or dry earth system if approved of. Each side of the building would have its hoist or elevator located at one side of the staircase, no openings or staircases to be allowed from one floor to the other inside the main walls of the building from basement to attic, the communication to be had only by way of the outside staircases, so that in the event of a fire taking place in any one of the eighteen rooms of 30×50 ft., an easy exit for the employees to escape by would be constantly present from basement to attic.

Looking to the very probable increased demand in the near future for storage, printing, and lithographing accommodation, and the absolute necessity of its being located in close proximity to the Parliamentary, the East and West Departmental Buildings, as well as to the Post Office and Custom House, I know of no open space so admirably adapted for a site as the south end of Major's Hill Park, with its broad Park Avenue on the east side, by which all the traffic required to or from could be be had. Starting from the south end of the Park say 300 or 400 ft. along the avenue, the Printing Bureau ought to be placed the most northerly, in order that if at any future time the Government thought it advisable to stretch a light steel angle lattice girder bridge across the Rideau Canal, the building would then be very convenient for the transit of parcels, messengers, &c., besides being out of the thoroughfare of the City; it would also have perfect immunity from fire from outside causes.

A building of the dimensions given of plain but substantial stone work, having very little wood work inside, good strong floors deafened between the joists and wood-sheeted ceilings, would cost in the vicinity of \$50,000, and the printing plant complete to do the present wants about \$50,000.

7TH. FUTURE METHOD OF PERFORMING THE SERVICE.

The foregoing relates principally to the immediate necessity for a Government Printing Bureau, namely, cleaner press-work and better composition—more storage room for the Sessional documents and the unprinted paper, less expense and labour in handling both the printed and unprinted paper, and lastly the size and class of

building and where it ought to be located.

Although the reasons thus far put forward are considered quite sufficient to warrant the establishment of a Government Printing Bureau, still very much yet remains to be said in favour of the undertaking, if time permitted to do so, in order to enable me to consult some of the Deputy Heads of Departments in regard to condensing some of the Departmental Reports. I believe, however, I am justified in stating that information is given in the Trade and Navigation Returns, that is repeated in the Public Accounts, and some information is given in the latter that is also given in the Auditor-General's Report. A Government printer interested in doing his duty, no doubt would naturally remedy this if permitted to do so. It would be his duty to see that official printed matter would not be repeated two or more times

in the public documents unnecessarily. The fact is, a Government printing contractor cannot have the interest of the Government at heart, but is working all his might and main in the contrary direction to make the most he can out of his contract, knowing full well he has, while his contract lasts, to recoup himself for the large capital invested in his printing plant, not being at all certain he will be awarded the next contract.

I will now place a few facts before your Committee in relation to the inside management and organization of what a Government Printing Bureau ought to be. The first and most important necessity is that the Government printer should be a practical printer, acquainted if possible, with both the French and English languages. One acquainted, if possible, not only with Government printing but with commercial printing also, in order, that, in purchasing printing material for daily consumption, he may be enabled to go into the market and be a match to cope with the keen wholesale merchant, or his assistant, the commercial traveller. He ought to have been a Master Printer and therefore accustomed to command a body of men, and avert any attempt at discontent or actual strikes amongst the employees. When I speak of a practical printer I do not mean a mere newspaper type setter, but a printer who has served his five or six years apprenticeship to the business in all its details, one who as a boy has learned to wash an ink table and dry it from all moisture, and who can readily detect when a roller, after being washed and sponged, has lug enough to make good distribution; who when he becomes an older apprentice can put a job to press, make a good impression, who before he has completed his time will be well acquainted with book and job work. Such a printer after he has travelled and worked as journeyman in other towns or cities, need not hesitate to start business on his own account, other things being equal. Such a Master Printer can not be hood winked or cheated by his foremen, journeymen and apprentices, as has often been the case with some of the printing contractors. The really few permanent journeymen and apprentices requisite as a reliable staff for a Printing Bureau could without difficulty be trained in the manner mentioned.

Another important fact and one that would have to be gradually remedied, is the manner in which the printer has always been supplied with copy for the Departmental Reports. He has at least a dozen masters to please in the proof reading, who are, as a rule, not experienced in that line of business, and who have no fixed ideas as to uniformity or style of typography. The result is, the foreman printer and

compositor are allowed to space and blank out as they please.

With regard to the documents laid on the Tables of the Senate and House of Commons, and ordered to be printed, the blanking out practice is largely curtailed, as has been often shown and explained by me to several of the members of the Printing Committee for these last three Sessions. Before the copy is sent down to the printer we examine it thoroughly, take out all duplicate and useless matter, condense and mark all head and date lines, signatures and addresses as close in as possible. But still all we can do and threaten we are often checkmated after we return our first galley proof, by several little dodges, as spacing out a few lines at the end of a few paragraphs in order to gain a few lines and thereby a page in making up a form. This blanking out practice in contract Government printing is a very old one, and I cannot see any remedy but for the Government to do their own printing, and I have no doubt this may be as easily accomplished, as when several years since, the Government became their own importers of stationery.

After a careful study of not only the desirability, but the absolute necessity there is for the establishment of a Government Printing Bureau I have arrived at the

following conclusions:—

1st. That for the reasons set forth in the foregoing, a saving of at least 25 per cent., can be had in the quantity of paper, presswork and book-binding,—especially now as five copies of the Debates are ordered for the members instead of three as formerly.

2nd. That taking the nominal prices now paid the contractor for the composition of Parliamentary and Departmental job work, I do not consider them excessive at

all, but taking in conjunction with the facts stated in regard to the bad workmanship and blanking out system then I do consider the prices excessive, because the contract is not honestly carried out, nor ever will be under any contract that can be written.

3rd. That taking the amount now paid under the contract system annually, I firmly believe that the whole cost of the plant and building of a Government Bureau

would be recouped in five years.

4th. That irrespective of the profit and loss involved in the contract system of printing, there still remains the question of the absolute necessity for more storage room, as set forth under the head of storage and excessive handling and carting.

DEBATES.

In the former part of my Report I have alluded to the Debates contract paying well. I have not seen the contract, and only base my opinion upon the price per mille ems, and the hearsay arrangement that all "alterations" are to be paid for "extra." It would, therefore, be advisable to have Mr. Boyce, the proof reader of the Debates, brought before your Committee to find out what is meant by the word "alterations,"—is it merely the natural corrections in first proofs for first edition, or is it alterations in the speeches made by the members for the second edition? Then again who is it decides and examines these "extra" charges, is it Mr. Boyce who is a practical English printer, or is it left to the discretion of the contractor.

DEPARTMENTAL JOB WORK.

On application to the Postmaster General and the Minister of Customs, I have obtained a complete set of formes, very well classified, from both Departments, the former numbering about 800 and the latter about 400. It would be impossible in a written report to give a correct or adequate idea of the extent and variety of these jobs. Mr. Gliddon, who is also a practical printer, in the Department of the Queen's Printer, ought also to be called before your Committee and state as to the several prices paid, how often these jobs are put to press and paid for as new composition, faint lining, binding, &c., and whether the indorses are paid for as full pages or not, as they are in the case of the Parliamentary printing.

There are several questions of importance alluded to in my Report, which, in a technical sense, could be more clearly explained and described when accompanied by the documents themselves, both printed and unprinted. For this reason I would like to be permitted to appear before your Committee also, and give what information you may think necessary in furtherance of your views for the establishment of a permanent Printing Bureau, an establishment that would be a credit to this great and

rapidly increasing Dominion of Canada.

DEAR SIR,—I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 6th instant; and I regret to say that it came just at a time when every hour

of my time is taken up with pressing official duties, and which will at this time prevent my giving you any articles, figures or estimates. But I will send you by this mail a copy of my last Report to Congress, which will give you much information about the working of this office. I can say that for many years the work of this Government was done on the contract system and it gave so much trouble, and was so expensive that Congress determined to establish this office; and the change has been a very beneficial one. Not only is the work done much cheaper, but far more promptly and satisfactorily than ever before,—and I have no doubt but that you would have the same experience should you establish a Government office. With a proper and careful selection of modern machinery, type and material, good workmen, and care in the purchase of stock, &c.,—there is no reason why the Government should not save all the profits that are earned in the regular business, as conducted by private parties.

Should your Parliament decide to establish a Government Office, I have no doubt that with my life-long experience as a Printer and a manufacturer of printing materials, added to my experience as Public Printer, I might be able to be of some

service, and I would be very glad to render any such aid in my power.

The members, on behalf of the Senate of the Joint Committee on the Library of

Parliament, beg leave to present a Second Report :-

The Honorable the Speaker of the House of Commons having communicated a request from the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, to borrow from the Library the Journals of the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada from 1792 to 1825, the question whether MSS, should be taken out of the Library was brought up. The Committee considered that such a practice would be most objectionable and recommend that it be a Standing Order: -"That while every facility be given to those "who shall be authorized to copy MSS., under no circumstances are the latter to be "removed from the Library."

It having been brought to the notice of the Committee that it is proposed to publish a second edition of the late Dr. Todd's work on "Parliamentary Government in the Colonies," they recommend that, in view of the desirability of bringing out a new edition of this valuable work, the Government be requested to ask for an appropriation of \$2,000 for the purpose of purchasing three hundred copies of the same.

In 1879 it was found necessary to supply the Library with a new Catalogue, to replace the old one worn out by twenty years use, and, at the request of the late Dr. Todd, the work was entrusted to Mr. Thayne, on account of his special qualifications. Experience has shown that it would be advisable to give the charge of the Catalogue to the same person in order to insure uniformity of classification in the constant additions made to the Library, and in view of the fact, that it will soon be necessary to remodel the American and Canadian Sections of the Catalogue—a work requiringa great deal of method and extensive biblio raphical knowledge. The Committee, therefore, think it desirable to have Mr. Thayne, who has been employed since 1879 as extra clerk, added to the permanent Staff of the Library, and they recommend. his appointment at a salary of \$1,000.

The Committee have considered the question of loaning books to the public during recess, and they have agreed to the following Rules which they recommend

to both Houses to be adopted as Standing Orders:-

1. That the Librarian be directed to report at the beginning of each Session to the Committee the names of those persons who have failed to comply with the Rules under which they have been permitted to borrow books from the Library.

2. That the Librarian be authorized to renew the tickets of admission to the

Library to those who have complied with the Rules.

DEAR SIR,—We, the reporters of the Senate, respectfully submit:—

That the report of the Debates Committee of the House of Commons, adopted by the House last Wednesday, will have the effect of materially changing our position

as the reporters of the Senate.

For eight years we have held the contract for the reporting and publishing of the Debates of the Senate, and have performed the service at exceptionally low rates as compared with the remuneration for such work in other countries. We have been enabled to do so from the fact that, of late years, we have been fortunate in obtaining outside work from time to time during the recess, especially reporting arbitrations and commissions for the Government.

The decision of the House of Commons to place their reporters on the Civil Service list at salaries of \$2,000 each, and to give them the benefit of the Government work to which we have referred, renders our occupation so precarious that we feel that the time has come when, if we are to be retained in the service of the Senate, we should be placed on a more permanent and satisfactory footing.

Last Session the Debates Committee, recognizing the difficulty we had in arranging for our printing and assistance, in consequence of the short tenure of our contract, renewed it for a term of two years, and even that concession has been a

decided advantage to us.

When eight years ago we gave up our positions on the reporting staff of the House of Commons to undertake the reporting contract in the Senate, we were given to understand that if we performed the service in a satisfactory manner our position as reporters of the Senate would be practically permanent, and that we would at all events occupy as good a position as the reporters in the other House.

Though at times the work in the Senate is light, we would respectfully call your attention to the fact that on the whole it is as heavy as the work performed by the reporters in the House of Commons. Our contract embraces not only the

reporting, but also the printing, proof-reading, indexing and binding.

and April.

In the House of Commons each reporter is responsible for the accuracy of his notes, and for nothing more. The staff consists of eight reporters, and no reporter is required to take notes for more than ten minutes at a time on the floor of the House. The House furnishes him with a writing machine and an amanuensis to operate it, and he is enabled to transcribe his notes, revise them and prepare his manuscript for the printer "between takes;" so that when the House adjourns his work is through until it meets again the next day. He is not troubled with the proof-reading, printing or indexing; when Parliament prorogues his sessional duties are at an end. An editor is employed by the House to manage the printing and prepare an index.

In the Senate, our contract includes not only the reporting, but also the printing, editing, proof-reading, indexing and publishing, and our work does not end until a month or more after the prorogation of Parliament. When the Session lasts for three months the reporters in the other House have three months work, whereas

the reporters of the Senate have at least four months work.

Owing to the irregularity of the work in the Senate and the small remuneration, we are unable to employ sufficient assistance to cope with heavy debates, such as the debate which occurred this Session on the Canadian Pacific Railway Bill. A sitting of the Senate which lasts until six o'clock, is as heavy for our staff as a sitting which lasts until midnight is for the staff in the House of Commons. It occupies us until midnight preparing manuscript for the printer, and we must resume work early in the morning to attend to the proof-reading and revising forms, work from which the Commons reporters are entirely free. When the Senate sits after six o'clock the work thrown on us is as heavy as two days' ordinary reporting in the House of Commons for the staff there.

When adjournments occur during the Session, our expenses are not diminished; we have to retain our staff under pay; and our printer, owing to the irregularity of the reports, charges us a higher rate than the Government is obliged to pay for the House of Commons work.

The amount provided for the reporting and editing of the Commons Debates, apart altogether from the translating and printing, is as follows:—

and, besides, writing machines for the transcription of the reporters' notes are pro-

vided by the House.

In the Senate the total amount allowed us for our own services, the services of assistants, the proof reading, binding, indexing, furnishing paper for 700 copies of the Debates for daily distribution during the Session, and 500 bound volumes at the end of the Session—the entire services—is only \$4,500; and if the volume should exceed 500 pages, we are allowed merely sufficient to reimburse us for our actual outlay for assistance and printing; leaving us for our own services very little more than any one of the reporters in the House of Commons is to receive under the new system.

In addition to the facts submitted in the report of the Debates Committee of the House of Commons, we learn through correspondence with official reporters in other countries that in no case—not even in the smallest of the Australian colonies—is any reporting staff called upon to perform so much work, requiring the highest reporting

skill, for so little remuneration.

The Senate has had eight years experience of our services. During that period we have had offers at different times of better positions, but we have preferred remaining here, believing that a time would come when the Senate would signify its appreciation of our services by placing us on a permanent footing and making our position more remunerative.

We therefore respectfully submit that at the expiration of our contract next Session, our position should be made permanent and that the remuneration should be fixed as follows:—

If the Government should at any time assume the printing and proof reading, we would be willing to make a deduction of the amount we have estimated for the

printing.

We would respectfully urge the Committee to give this application their early attention, in order that the matter may be decided during the present Session.

That they have carefully examined the Annual Statement of the Parliamentary Printing Accounts for the fiscal year from 1st July, 1882, to the 30th June, 1883, and compared the several items of expenditure with the vouchers connected therewith, and found all the entries correct, and being thus satisfied with the correctness of the accounts, they have certified accordingly—and have signed.

On the reference of the Sub-Committee as to the appointment of an additional Messenger in the Distribution Office, they would respectfully recommend that John Wiltshire be so appointed at the same rate of remuneration as the other Messengers.

On the reference to the Sub-Committee of the letter of Mr. Romaine applying for remuneration for extra proof reading and preparing Index during the past Recess, they would recommend that the sum of \$100 be granted for that purpose, to be paid to Mr. Romaine and his Assistant.

To the Chairman and Members of the Joint Committee on Printing:

GENTLEMEN,—I beg to submit the Annual Statement of the Receipts and Expenditure on account of the Printing of Parliament, for the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1883. It is certified to by the Auditor General, and signed by him, as being correct.

During the Recess the several services have been performed in the usual manner; but I must again respectfully draw attention to the crowded state of the Distribution Office. The space being so very limited that it is impossible for the Employés to perform the necessary work with safety, or with satisfaction to themselves, or those whom they serve. Action was taken by the Committee in this matter last Session, but no practical result has as yet followed.

I received notice from the Deputy Minister of Finance, requiring me to send in the Estimates for the printing of Parliament for next year; and also, whether a Supplementary would be required for this year. As the quantity of work performed during the first six months of the present fiscal year was much larger than usual, and estimating the cost of the present Session by that of the preceding one, I thought it advisable, in reply, to ask that \$20,000 be placed on the Supplementary Estimates for this year, and \$70,000 on the Estimates for next year, subject to the approval of the Committee.

On the 31st December next the present contracts for the Printing, Binding and the supply of Printing Paper, will expire,—it is therefore necessary to make immediate provision for the future performance of those services. The contracts however contain the following provision: "With the right nevertheless to the said "party of the second part, or his successors in office, at the option and by the direction of the two Houses of Parliament of Canada, to continue the contracts during the further period of five years, from the day last aforesaid," that is, from the 31st day of December, 1884.

OFFICE DUTIES OF THE STATIONERY AND PROOF-READING DEPARTMENT.

The Office during the Session is kept open from 9:30 a.m. to 11 or 12 p.m. (except from 6 to 7:30 for tea) for the delivery of stationery to the several Committees, Members, Reporters and Officers of the House. During the Recess we often remain in the Office till 6 p.m. to push forward the proof-reading. We took exactly five months after the close of the last Session to finish the proof-reading of the Sessional Papers.

Stationery Department.

(1.) Stock has to be taken by the end of June to ascertain what has been issued the past year and what will be required for the following Session.

(2.) To make out the orders for Stationery required for the ensuing year.

(3.) The new stock begins to arrive from England about the middle of September and ends about the middle of January, and generally consists of upwards of 200 cases, which have to be unpacked, invoices checked, the contents sorted and placed on the shelves.

(4). As soon as sufficient stationery is received, the work of packing the Members

and Reporters trunks is commenced; this year they numbered 250 in all.

(5). Deliver the stationery, as it may be required to the Members, the Committees, the Officers, and Extra Clerks of the House, etc., and keep accounts of the quantity.

(6). Keep a Stock-Book of all the stationery delivered, of that on hand, and

that to be ordered, with the cost price.

- (7). To count out the paper and prepare for the binder and printer the annual blank books, blank printed forms, circulars, tickets required by the several Officers of the House.
- (8). A good deal of time is taken up attending to the Hansard Staff (English and French) giving practical instructions to the binder and printer, and making small purchases of stationery in the city during the Session and Recess; requisitions having to be given and the accounts for the same certified before payment.

Proof-Reading Department:

(1.) To receive all Returns ordered to be printed by the Printing Comm tee, examine their paging, cull out duplicate matter, shorten the signatures, date ines, titles, etc., and keep a memorandum of the number of pages of manuscript expunged.

(2.) Read and revise the proofs of Documents required during the Session, as well as proofs of Sessional Papers, and Appendix to the Journals, as soon as possible so as not to dotain the Printer from putting to press. There are also several miscel-

laneous jobs to be read for the Officers of the House during the year.

- (3.) A Register is kept of the dates of all Sessional Papers received from the Clerk of Printing, when they are sent, when the first proof is received, and final revise is returned to the Printer, in which is also entered the number of manuscript pages, maps, etc., contained in each document, and whether extra copies are ordered or not.
- (4.) We keep also a Register of the Proofs and first and second Revises received and returned to the Printer.
- (5.) The collating of the 28 Volumes of English and French Sessional Papers was not completed till the latter end of October last.

(6) Propage during, and in time for the close of the Session the Numerical and

Alphabetical Indexes for the Sessional Papers.

(7.) To receive from the Contractor, during the year, about 8,500 reams (or 11 car loads) of printing paper, check it as to quantity, quality and weight, see it stowed away into the vaults, and then after deliver it in small quantities to the Printer and Binder as required.

If it had been the intention of the House to apply a similar restriction to Public Bills, I presume there would have been a rule to that effect. There is nothing in the rules of the House to sustain the Honorable gentleman's point of order, and I must decide against him.

On the second point, I consider there is nothing in the point of order raised. This is a Bill to amend the Canada Temperance Act, 1878, and an amendment such as that which is proposed by the Honorable member for Amherst, is quite relevant to the purpose of this Bill as much so as any clause which the Bill itself contains. The Honorable gentleman has quoted authorities, but I think if he will take the trouble to consider them more carefully, he will find that with with one exception they relate to the relevancy of amendments to clauses in Bills; an amendment cannot be made to a clause of a Bill which is not relevant to that clause. It must form a separate and distinct clause of itself. Under these circumstances, I decide that the amendment is in order.

The Committee have taken occasion of their first meeting to record their extreme regret at the recent sudden death of Dr. Alpheus Todd, for many years Librarian of the Parliament of Canada. In his demise, not only this Parliament and country, but all countries possessing similar forms of government have sustained a heavy loss. His great constitutional knowledge and general erudition made him a most reliable counsellor to all those who had occasion to consult him, whilst his courteous manners and kindly disposition enhanced the value of his intellectual endowments.

The regret which the Members of the Committee, in common with Dr. Todd's many other friends, experience at his unexpected removal from their midst, finds some mitigation in the reflection that his almirable works will survive as an enduring monument of his untiring industry and extensive and accurate knowledge, and of his

devotion to the institutions under which we live.

In view of the vast number of Maps and Charts possessed by the Library, and of the numerous publications of this nature issued every year referring to Canada and the North-West Territories, it is thought advisable to adopt means to render them more accessible for reference. The Committee, therefore, recommend the organization of a section of chartography and to set aside for this purpose one of the side rooms of the Library and to furnish it with the necessary apparatus.

The Committee also recommend that wire screens similar to those placed over the works on Canada, be extended to the principal sections on the ground floor, to secure better protection for the books placed therein.

The Select Committee appointed to examine and report upon the Contingent Accounts of the Senate for the present Session beg leave to make their Fifth Report, as follows:—

1. Your Committee recommend that Mr. Noil W. McLean, until recently Clerk of Private Bills, who for some time past has been incapacitated by bodily infirmity from properly performing his duties, be superannuated from the first day of May next, and that the gratuity of one year's salary from the first day of May last allowed him by Your Honorable House, be considered equivalent to the leave of absence which usually precedes the superannuation of Officers of long service.

Clerk of the Senate, or the Clerk Assistant.

"These regulations to be posted on the door and walls of the Realing Room."

"imprisonment within the limits aforesaid, at the discretion of the Court before "which the conviction is had, and every offender against the provisions of this "section may be tried in a summary manner by two Justices of the Peace or by any "Stipendiary or other Magistrate having the power of two Justices of the Peace."

Every Indian or other person who engages in or assists in celebrating the "Indian festival known as the 'Potlach' or in the Indian dance known as 'Tamana-"" was ' is guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be liable to imprisonment for a term "of not more than six nor less than two months in any gaol or other place of con-"finement; and any Indian or other person who oncourages, either directly or "indirectly an Indian or Indians to get up such a festival or dance, or to celebrate "the same, or who shall assist in the colebration of the same, is guilty of a like "offence, and shall be liable to the same punishment."

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

"The Commons of Canada have voted the Supplies required to enable the Government to defray the expenses of the Public Service.

"In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Excellency a Bill intituled: 'An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for defraying

certain expenses of the Public Service, for the financial years ending respectively the 30th June, 1884, and the 30th June, 1885, and for other purposes relating to the Public Service,'—to which I humbly request Your Excellency's Assent."

To this Bill the Clerk of this House by His Excellency's command did thereupon

say:
"In Her Majesty's name, His Excellency the Governor General thanks Her Loyal subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill."

His Excellency the Governor General was then pleased to deliver the following Speech :—

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons.

The assiduity and zeal shown by you in the performance of your important

duties deserve my best thanks, and I desire to convey them to you.

There is every reason to anticipate that the liberal aid given by the loan to the Canadian Pacific Railway will secure the speedy and satisfactory completion of that great national work.

I congratulate you on the adjustment of all matters of difference between the Dominion and the Province of British Columbia by the legislation of this Session.

The larger appropriations made for the furtherance of railway construction may be expected to assist materially in the development of our commerce, both foreign and domestic, as well as to open up for settlement extensive fertile districts hitherto almost inaccessible.

The several measures for the benefit of the Indian communities and for their encouragement to assume the responsibilities of self-government are well adapted for the purpose, and the amendments of the laws relating to the Dominion lands will give additional facilities and advantages to settlers in the North-West Territories.

The re-adjustment of the annual subsidies to the several Provinces, while adding to their resources, will place their pecuniary relations with the Dominion on a satis-

factory and permanent basis.

The several important measures which occupied your attention, and will now become law, must all tend to the benefit and improvement of the country, and the numerous Private Bills with industrial objects, submitted to me, indicate the existence of a healthy spirit of enterprise among our people.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I thank you, in Her Majesty's name, for the supplies you have granted for the Public Service.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

In bidding you now farewell until next Session, I trust that when we next meet I may be able to congratulate you on the continuing prosperity of our country.

Then the Honorable the Speaker of the Senate said:

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate;

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

It is His Excellency the Governor General's will and pleasure, that this Parliament be prorogued until Thursday, the twenty ninth day of May next to be here holden, and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued until Thursday, the twentyninth day of May next.

I was in hopes to hear from you again if I had only one friend to intercede a little for me but I have not John I want to ask you did you ever hear from me before, in three weeks after I left you I wrote to Aunt Margeret to speak to you for me that was in the month of May, again in July I wrote & once again immediately after coming here & no answer, at Xmas I sent you a card then when all failed me I went to Dr. Pomroy & he wrote you twice & no answer, at easter I sent you a card again also a band for the crown of your hat & on valingtines day I sent you a card then the easter one then for the twenty fourth of May I sent you a handkerchief which cost me three dollars & fifty cents with John embroiderd in the corner I sent it in a newspaper to you so you can see every hour since I left you I have regretit it, I am doing nothing now so you can imagine how the time drags on me. dear John there is no use of coming over the past I cannot when I think of it I am almost ready to throw myself in the river on would to God that I had my life to live over again how different it would be but John I ask you once more can you forgive me try & bury the past & let me Atone to God & you for the very great injury I have done you These many stories you have heard that is not true but their is no use of me saying anything I have been to you what no true good woman should be, yes you were always good to me, but oh do not forsake me as I have done to you oh God if I were only with you now I am sure you would find no fault, forgive me you are not the first man that has done so, John I am not without money I have earned enough to keep me for quite a while till the work commences again so you can see it is not for want that makes me appeal to you as some folks in Ottawa said as soon as my clothes & money would run out I would want to come back to you oh, if you only knew how sick of life I am, I am sure you would pity me, oh John for God sake try & forgive me have pity on me oh forgive me as you will want God to forgive you, oh dear dear John write me you will get this letter by tomorrow night & on next Friday I will go to the office for an answer & if I do not get an answer I will think you never received my last two letters then I will address my next to Mr. Clemow but oh John if ever you had any love for me you will answer me & after that I will ask you for an interview. MY DEAR HUSBAND,—For as such I must call you to the end of time, it is only this morning I received your letter & I hasten to reply I should have got it four weeks ago it has been knocking around among the stations & they told me at the main office to make inquiries at some of the stations & at station D-I got it? although I made inquiries I did not expect to get one after treating one so noble so good & kind as you are I have injured a good man & dishonored a noble name may God forgive me for it I know I will have to atone for it sooner or later, the questions you ask me some of them are as false as hell and more of them are true which I ought to be ashamed to admit too, could you John ever forgive me try in your own good noble heart to do so it is a hard thing for me to ask you there is not one moment in the day but I think of you & only for my constant work I would go crazy, five wooman & myself have turned out eighty shades per week it is beautiful work and not hard. John dear no crimanal one moment before his execution feels worse guilty then I do or more penitent, if I were with you now I would be more then mortal woeman could be to any man I would try my best to recompence you ten fold with my kindness for all the injuries I have done you, I am not alone here I will tell you who is with me if you will promise not to tell. Mrs Abbott is with me all the time & we both work together & my intentions are now to go housekeeping the peginning of September there are hundreds of woemen making a good living keeping boarders & I can get my furniture on instalments, yet I would like to ask your advise. oh John how good you are to pray for me I require them I see my great mistake & feel it hourly I have nearly all the things I had when I left home I would like to make a nice home & show to you how good I could be & perhaps sometime you might forgive me & come & see me but if there is anything you wish me to do tell me & I will do it willing excuse m., bad writing I am very nervous, when you answer address to Mrs Graham & I will get it myself without any trouble from your heart broken wife S. G.

EXHIBIT NO. 5.

WOLFE ISLAND, Nov. 30th, 1883.

DEAR MR. CODD,—The Parochial Register was the only book I saved from the fire of August 17th, 1870. It was an oblong book, bound in velumn, with brass clasps. There was another book containing only marriages. It was not saved, as in the hurry and confusion of the fire, when lives were in the greatest danger, I either forgot it, or there was not time to look for it. Either some part of the Parish Register has been abstracted, or the marriage was registered in the book referred to. * * *

I remember, perfectly, marrying two John Graham's. One, the proprietor of the Albion House, Ottawa, to a Miss Graham of the 1st Concession of Huntley; the other, his uncle, to a Miss McCurdy of the 12th Concession of Goulbourn. But I cannot remember the date of either marriage. Poor William Acres. I am sorry for his loss. He was a kind hearted, worthy fellow, and I thought he might live to be a hundred. What a splendid young man he was thirty years ago. I hope he was prepared for the change, and if so, how little cause there is to mourn on his account. But it is a sad bereavement to his wife and other friends. I met not long since, a letter, which I wrote to him, probably in the half of 1871, asking him to come to Ottawa, in order that I might sign the deed of his farm, while I had strength to attend to business, as at that time, I did not expect to live for any great length of time. I did not send the letter, as his brother-in-law, John Holmes, came to see me

and took a verbal message instead. And they are both gone before me. "So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom."

As far as I know, there is no document in existence except the Parish

Register from which you can make out a certificate.

* * The marriage certificate was no doubt in the book thus referred to. F. C.

If I had saved the Marriage Licenses, I could have supplied all necessary par-

ticulars, as I endorsed names and dates on the back of every one of them.

And I kept them carefully filed away. But the hurricane of fire was so tremendous that it was a very great wonder that I was able to save even the Parish Register, and a tin box containing some important papers. Even some money became a prey to the flames.
