SIR,—I have the honour to present to you herewith the Public Accounts of Canada for the fiscal year ended the 30th June last, together with the several statements of all previous years since Confederation. These statements have been slightly altered in form from those rendered in previous years, but for all purposes the comparison with former statements is maintained.

In the Public Accounts for 1885 I mentioned that although not appertaining to that fiscal year, I thought it desirable to give particulars of the out-turn of the loan floated on the 20th June, 1885, for £4,000,000 sterling, bearing interest at 4 per cent., and which was placed in the market at 99 without sinking fund. The proceeds of this loan have now been brought into account and the loan itself is included with the other items comprised in the Public Debt. By means of this loan almost all the temporary liabilities of the Dominion were paid off during the last fiscal year, and whatever remained outstanding on the 30th June last, have since been taken up, so that at this date there are no outstanding temporary loans.

I have to report that the following sums, amounting in all to \$6,476,400.39, (after deducting the refunds of previous years) were paid during the last fiscal year on Capital Account, viz.:—

The total of the above mentioned expenditures on Capital Account, Investments and Railway Subsidies, is \$12,324,714.64.

The receipts on account of Dominion Lands during the last fiscal year were \$176,795.78; the investments for the several Sinking Funds amounted to \$1,606,270.77; the amount of Public Debt redeemed was \$3,212,430.63; the circulation was increased by \$664,197.58, and the Savings Bank deposits by \$4,194,737.49, making the amounts standing at the credit of the several depositors in these Banks at the 30th June last, \$37,173,813.88; and the out-come of the year's transactions has been to increase the net debt to \$223,159,107.09, an addition of \$26,751,414.95.

Owing to the settlement with the Canadian Pacific Railway, a change has been effected in the rate of interest payable on the Net Debt of the Dominion. The average rate paid at Confederation on the Net Debt was 5.41; on the 30th June, 1884, the rate was 4.06; on the 30th June, 1885, was 3.80; and by the revision of the Debt as above, the amount payable on the 30th June, 1886, is 4.02.

The total amount of debt payable in England on the 30th June last was \$172,247,082.55, and the several investments for Sinking Funds amounted to \$17,461,623.98.

As I mentioned last year I thought it advisable to leave out a great number of the details comprised in Part II of previous Public Accounts, that is to say, the several expenditure statements, as the Auditor General reports fully on all such matters. This alteration has been carried into effect and the expenditure statements now transmitted herewith are only those under the management of this Department.

I stated in the preface to the last Public Accounts that a re-arrangement would have to be made in the Manitoba Debt Account. This has now been accomplished and the several entries passed and the debt, as allowed by the recent Acts of Parliament, has been credited to the Province.

I have only further to point out in considering the Dominion Debt that during the Session of 1886 Parliament authorized further payments of moneys to the extent of \$2,073,065, as subsidies to Railway Companies, in addition to the sums authorized for similar purposes in previous years.

I am sorry to be again obliged to state that no settlement has been made with respect to the old accounts of the Province of Canada. This has been largely owing to exceptional circumstances, but I sincerely trust that before another twelve months are over these matters will be disposed of. Considering the interests involved I respectfully suggest that measures be taken at as early a date as possible to have these accounts settled.

During the year the Dominion imported silver to the value of \$185,000, and copper to the value of \$23,000, the profits on these operations being \$55,150.11, being about equal to the salaries of the Department during the year.

The business of the Department is still growing as will be seen by the statements submitted herewith for the past fiscal year as compared with previous years. I further submit a statement of the cost of the establishment, and I am glad to be able again to report that the work has been met without increasing the staff.

I have only in conclusion, to state that the officers of the Department have assisted me faithfully and well in disposing of the business connected therewith, and through their efforts no arrears have been allowed to accumulate.
