GENERAL CORRESPONDENCE, AND ANALYTICAL STATEMENTS.

SIR,—I have to request that you will be good enough to inform me under what circumstances a Government official, who is prosecuted by outside parties for some act done by him, or words uttered by him in the discharge of his duty, may be reimbursed for the costs of defending himself. I have had some conversation on the subject with the Minister of Justice and write this letter so that the correct course as explained to me by him may be on record.

JUSTICE DEPT., OTTAWA, Sept. 23, 1889.

SIR,—In answer to your letter of the 16th instant, in which you refer to a conversation you had with the Minister of Justice on the subject of the circumstances under which a Government official who is prosecuted for some act done by him in the discharge of his duty may be reimbursed for the costs of defending himself, the Minister of Justice directs me to say that the conversation in question related to the allowance made to the late Chief Justice Armstrong in relation to his prosecution for something said during investigation by the Labor Commission.

While not undertaking to define all the cases in which an officer might or might not properly be reimbursed for legal expenses resulting to him personally, the Minister stated the view that such reimbursement should be made in the following cases :

Where the officer was found to be justified in doing what was complained of or exonerated from the charge of doing what was complained of, but was unable to recover his expenses from any other source, provided that what was done, or charged as being done, was something in the line of his duty as such officer, or was in obedience to his superiors.

The Minister was of the opinion that the decision of the legal tribunal on these points should not preclude further enquiry.

Chief Justice Armstrong was, in the Minister's opinion, as a matter of fact and according to the decision of the tribunal, within the line of his duty, and he was exonerated by the tribunal and had no indemnity for his expenses.

DEAR SIR,—Let me acknowledge receipt of your letter of Dec. 20, objecting to the classification of Mr. Conroy as an employee of the Finance Department.

You perhaps may not have noticed that the monthly statements of expenditure by the Accountant of Contingencies, as supplied to this Office, are all made out

by Mr. Conroy, and the vouchers all bear marks of having been entered by him. I do not understand this work to form any part of his duty as Superintendent of Laborers and Charwomen.

The account of "Departmental salaries at Ottawa," between pages C—29 and C—55, is the first attempt to exhibit the effective working force of each Department, with no unnecessary complication by tenure-of-office descriptions. To the extent of my knowledge, the information given is substantially accurate.

As your duties cover the whole public service, I hope for your approval in making such an advance.

I must enter a protest against your mention of the Examiners of Accounts in this Office as "irresponsible." Their responsibility differs in no way from that of the employees in other Departments, except that they are required explicitly by Section 38 of the Audit Act to countersign the Appropriation Accounts examined by them.

MY DEAR SIR,—I have your letter of to-day's date in answer to mine of the 20th December last in regard to the classification of Mr. Conroy as an employee of this Department. I should have wished that you had answered my letter earlier, as you ask me to reply at once if I wish to make a reply.

Before entering into the subject of Mr. Conroy's position, I wish to say that I have every sympathy with you in your wish to show the effective working-force of each Department, and I should be glad if everything relating to the public service could be exhibited to the outside world.

You state that because of certain statements sent in to your office, the information given, to the extent of your knowledge, is substantially accurate. I have already told you that Mr. Conroy is not an officer of this Department, and if he retired or his office were abolished, no additional labor or expense would accrue to this Department as a consequence, and I must say that after my statement to this effect, I am rather surprised that you still adhere to the classification already given. Mr. Conroy, I must reiterate, is not, and never was, an employee of this Department, and as you told me yourself that you had a doubt on the matter, I think it would have been better before printing it in your book if you had consulted this Department on the subject.

I don't think it desirable to make any remarks about what officers are or are not responsible.

EXECUTIVE REGULATIONS.

I have thought it advisable to collect for reference several Orders in Council and letters relating to economy in public expenditure, which are frequently quoted in the following pages.

Powers of Attorney.

Rules prescribed by the Treasury Board, under sanction of the Governor General in Council, in reference to the mode of Acquittal of Warrants for the payment of money by the Government of Canada.

1. No officer in the Civil Service shall, under any circumstances, be permitted to act as attorney for the receipt of public moneys.

2. No power of attorney will be recognized, received or acted upon by the Receiver General which is not printed, and of the form to be obtained from the office of the Receiver General, under which only payment can be made, and such power will operate as to any sum of money due only by the Government at the date of the power of attorney.

3. No powers of attorney will be received by the Government for the payments of moneys on warrants which partake of the character of an assignment of the moneys to another party, or purport to be irrevocable, or are in "*any respects qualified.*"

4. General powers of attorney, authorizing the receipt of money due, or which may become due after its date, by which any chartered bank or agent of a chartered bank, or any private individual, is constituted the attorney, will be received and acted upon if printed, and of the special form to be obtained from the office of the Receiver General; and in the event of the power being to the agent of a chartered bank, the bank must declare itself, by a proper instrument in writing, responsible for the acts of such agent, in respect to the receipts of moneys thereunder.

It is, however, optional with the party executing any power of attorney to a bank or agent of a bank, or any private individual, prior to the execution, to erase the words "or may hereafter become due."

5. All powers of attorney must be signed in the presence of a witness.

6. In case of the death of the person in whose behalf payment is claimed, the probate of will or other proof that the applicant is entitled to receive the money, must be furnished on application for such payments.

Blank forms of powers of attorney may be obtained from the office of the Receiver General and at all the branches of the Bank of Montreal.

Duplicate Cheques.

Treasury Minute, June 18, 1888.—The Board had under consideration a communication from the Auditor General suggesting that uniform regulations be prescribed by the Board with reference to the requirements which are to warrant the duplication of lost cheques.

The Board, on the advice of the Department of Justice, direct that if a Government cheque, whether on Letter of Credit or Receiver General's account, does not reach the person in whose favor it is drawn, or is lost or destroyed by such person, the bank on which it is drawn be notified first by such person.

2. That a duplicate cheque be issued, on a bond of indemnity of the form annexed being furnished, securing the Government against loss; such bond to be examined by the Department of Justice after execution.

3. That a declaration showing whether the original cheque was endorsed or not, and how it was lost or destroyed should accompany the bond, in case it is claimed that the cheque was lost or destroyed.

4. That each duplicate cheque should have the word "Duplicate" written in red ink across the face of it.

Accounts for Advertising.

Order in Council, December 17, 1875.—On a memorandum from the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie, on the subject of Departmental advertising, proposing a scheme for adoption as absolutely necessary to prevent the recurrence of abuses which seem inseparable from isolated action, and an inefficient audit by those Departmental officers who may not have the means of ascertaining facts necessary to an accurate correction of advertising accounts.

Mr. Mackenzie states that if this scheme is adopted, he recommends that the Secretary of State shall at once communicate to each Department information of the mode of proceeding for the future.

The Committee advise that the scheme and recommendation submitted be adopted.

Memorandum referred to above.—With a view to similarity of action by the various Departments in respect of orders and accounts for advertising it is recommended that all such orders as are issued at the Seat of Government be given through the Queen's Printer, and that the Queen's Printer certify to the accounts before payment.

The copy to be sent to the Queen's Printer, accompanied by Ministerial directions, naming the papers in which the advertisement is to be published, specifying whether in the daily or weekly issue, and the number of insertions in each paper respectively.

On receipt of these instructions the Queen's Printer to procure the printing by the contractors of a sufficient number of copies to enable him to furnish duplicates to the papers indicated. These to be forwarded by him to the publishers, accompanied by an intimation of the number of lines to which the advertisement is to be limited, himself establishing the space on a proper estimate of the solid matter of the notice, with a moderate allowance for purposes of display; and accompanied also by an instruction to the publishers to render the accounts to him, with a copy of the order attached, and with marked copies of the papers in which advertisements are printed.

The Queen's Printer to ascertain the established tariffs for advertising of the several papers on the list; and on receipt of the accounts, certify to the same in accordance with these rates, and to transmit the accounts for payment to the Departments from which the orders issued, having first satisfied himself that publication has been had as directed.

Accounts for advertising required by the outside services to be also rendered with the orders, and marked copies of the publications, to the Queen's Printer, and the advertisements to be by him measured, certified to, and transmitted for payment in accordance with the rules which obtain for advertisements issued at the Seat of Government.

The Queen's Printer to keep, with each paper, accounts of the advertisements directed to be published in it, under the different Departmental headings, so as at all times to show the state of each account.

Order in Council, March 22, 1888.—On a report dated March 21, 1888, from the Secretary of State, submitting that the Act respecting the Department of Public Printing and Stationery prescribes that all charges for advertising in the *Canada Gazette* shall be paid in advance, and that the Queen's Printer reports that in some cases, after such payment, the parties advertising discontinue their notices before all the insertions asked for have been given, and apply for a refund of moneys paid for insertions ordered but not given.

The Minister recommends that the Queen's Printer be instructed that no such return of moneys can be made, as the Government is ready at all times to fulfil the contract entered into with the advertisers in the *Gazette*, and is in no wise responsible for their discontinuance. The Committee submit the above recommendation for your Excellency's approval.

Printing, not under Contract.

Order in Council, November 2, 1884.—The Board had under consideration a letter from the Auditor-General referring to the discussion in the Public Accounts Committee respecting public printing done otherwise than by the contractors, and requesting a ruling from the Treasury Board thereon.

The Board, on careful consideration of the subject, recommend to Council, that whenever printing is done by others than the contractors, the rates to be charged should be the current rates for work of the same magnitude at the place where the printing is performed.

Stationery Office.

Order in Council, November 17, 1877.—The Committee of Council have had under consideration the items in the Public Accounts under the head of Departmental Contingencies, from which it appears that considerable sums are expended by the several Departments for books, maps and stationery, outside of the Stationery Branch. They are of opinion that those articles could be purchased more cheaply through the Stationery Branch than by the system now pursued. They therefore recommend that hereafter those articles be purchased through the Government Stationery Office, by requisition from the Minister or Deputy Minister of each department, and that the Stationery Office be directed to procure the articles when not kept in stock

Order in Council, October 8, 1880.—On a memorandum dated October 2, 1880, from the Secretary of State, stating that it had been represented to him that the practice occasionally prevails in the Departments of ordering or purchasing stationery otherwise than through the Stationery Office—the accounts for which (accompanied by the orders for the same) are thereafter presented to the clerk of the Stationery Office for payment.

That as it is impossible that the prices of the articles thus ordered can be properly checked, and as the practice appears to him (the Minister) to be otherwise objectionable, he recommends that it be discontinued, and that it be the duty henceforth of the clerk in charge of the Stationery Office to refuse to pay any accounts for articles which have not been ordered through him.

Order in Council, July 24, 1882.—The Board had under consideration a letter from the Auditor-General in connection with the purchase of stationery at Victoria, B.C., for the use of officers of the Dominion Government in that Province.

The Board recommend that the Order in Council of November 17, 1877, be amended, and that power be given to officers in British Columbia to purchase stationery at Victoria, and to officers in other provinces, excepting Ontario and Quebec, to purchase mucilage and ink, viz., at St. John, Halifax, Charlottetown and Winnipeg.

Order in Council, June 26, 1889, as amended by O. C., July 11, 1889.—His Excellency in pursuance of the powers vested in him by the Revised Statutes, Chap. 27, Sec. 7, and by and with the advice of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada, is pleased to direct and order:—

1. In every Department the Deputy Head shall sign all requisitions in accordance with Sec. 7, Chap. 27, of the Revised Statutes, and a clerk, to be named by the Head of the Department shall, under the direction of the Deputy, have charge of all stationery and printing, and shall receive from the Government Stationery and Printing Offices all printing work and articles of stationery ordered and supplied, and grant receipts for the same, superintending also their distribution to the clerks or employees for whose use they have been ordered.

2. The Secretary of State is authorized to prepare a list of all articles to be kept in stock and furnished to the Departments upon ordinary requisitions, such list to be subject to the final revision and approval of the Governor in Council.

3. As soon as such list has been so settled and approved, and printed and distributed to the several Departments, all ordinary requisitions upon the Stationery Office shall be issued for those articles only that are therein enumerated.

4. No articles shall be added to such list thereafter except upon the report of the Secretary of State, approved by the Governor in Council.

5. No plain paper or envelopes, such as are used for ordinary correspondence, shall be asked for by any ordinary requisition or issued upon the same for private use of the employees in any Department, except in the case of Deputy Heads.

6. No paper or envelopes for correspondence bearing relief stamp, cameo, or embossed work or devices, either lithographed or engraved, shall be kept in stock or supplied, except for the use of Ministers or Deputy Ministers, the Governor General's Secretary, the Speakers and Members of the two Houses of Parliament, and the Judges of the Supreme and Exchequer Courts, the Clerk and Law Clerk of the Senate, the Clerk and Law Clerk of the House of Commons, and the Librarians of Parliament.

7. No pocket-knives or pocket-books shall be kept in stock or supplied to any Department except upon special requisitions, stating the names and employment of the persons for whose use they are to be procured.

8. No despatch-boxes or brief-bags shall be issued for the use of members of any Government Commission.

9. All requisitions issued under Rules 6 and 7, or for articles not on the general list (and therefore not procurable upon ordinary requisitions) shall be signed by the Deputy Minister and approved and initialed by the Minister of the Department, or the Clerk and Speaker of each House of Parliament.

10. A return of all articles furnished to each Department upon requisition, with the total cost of the supply to such Department, shall be made up by the Superintendent of Stationery each six months, as soon as possible after the 30th of June and the 31st of December in each year, in order that it may be submitted to the Governor in Council by the Secretary of State.

11. All former Orders in Council in reference hereto are cancelled.

Pamphlets and Books.

Order in Council, April 16, 1880. The Committee of Council have had under consideration the subject of advertising in pamphlets, and the question of the subscription by Departments to books, and they recommend:—

(1.) That no advertisements be authorized in connection with the publication of any pamphlet or book whatever, save only that, where any department of the Government causes to be published a pamphlet or book, the Head of such department may cause to be inserted therein such advertisements connected with his own Department as he thinks expedient in the public service.

(2.) That as regards subscription to books, no Department be allowed to subscribe for or purchase any book whatever unless such book be deemed by the Head of the Department one which will be useful for reference in the administration of the Department, and that not more than four copies shall be taken in any such case.

The Committee further recommend that the foregoing Minute be published in the *Canada Gazette* for the information of the public.

Order in Council, November 1, 1881.—Ordered that the Immigration Branch of the Department of Agriculture be excepted from the provisions of O. C., April 16, 1880, relative to the purchase of pamphlets, books or other publications, and that the same rule of exception be applied to advertisements.

Order in Council, July 1, 1889.—The Committee, on the recommendation of the Secretary of State, advise that the Order in Council of April 16, 1880, be interpreted so as not to apply to, or to limit, the number for distribution among Departments of publications purchased by the Government for their use under authority of an Order in Council.

Order in Council, December 22, 1888.—The Secretary of State desires to draw the attention of Council to the practice in the past, of the granting of authority by Council for the purchase of books for Library exchanges, and for distribution among the Departments, and he recommends that in the future no such authority be granted; but that all books for Library exchanges be procured under the authority of the Joint Library Committee of Parliament, and paid for out of the sums placed at its disposal, and that all purchases of books for the use of any Department of the Government be made on the authority of the Minister charged with its administration, as already provided by Order in Council, through a regular Stationery Office requisition, as required by the Act respecting Public Printing and Stationery. The Committee recommend that this Minute, if approved, be communicated to the Library Committee, and to each Department of the Public Service.

Legal Services.

Order in Council, April 12, 1879.—On a report dated April 2, 1879, from the Hon. Minister of Justice, stating that it has been represented by the Auditor-General that it would facilitate the business of his office were an Order in Council passed making it necessary that the accounts rendered by any legal agent employed professionally by any of the Departments of the Government should be submitted to the Department of Justice for examination and approval before payment.

That at present the practice of the Departments appears to be to submit such accounts to the Department of Justice before paying the same, but no formal Order in Council exists on the subject.

That an Order in Council does exist providing that all accounts for printing and advertising are to be certified by the Queen's Printer before payment.

That he, the Minister, thinks that it would be proper that a formal Order should be passed with respect to legal agents. He recommends, therefore, that it be ordered that the accounts rendered by legal gentlemen employed professionally by any of the Departments of the Government be submitted to the Department of Justice for examination and approval before payment, and that a copy of the Order be transmitted to each of the Departments of the Government.

Order in Council, Oct. 9, 1888.—On a memorandum dated 1st October, 1888, from the Minister of Justice, recommending that authority be given for the payment of the Official Reporters of the Debates of the House of Commons, and of other Reporters who may be designated as occasion may require by the Minister of Justice, to be employed to report Exchequer Court cases, or proceedings under Commissions of Inquiry, or upon arbitrations in which the Government is interested, or upon any other matter requiring a short-hand reporter, at the rate of fifteen cents per folio of one hundred words, the Reporter for such remuneration to supply to the Government four copies of the proceedings and evidence in each case.

The Minister further recommends that the sum of \$3.50 per diem over and above actual moving expenses be allowed to such Reporters on account of travelling expenses while so employed and when absent from their places of residence, the days of leaving and arriving to be counted as full days. Also, that the provisions of this Order shall relate back to the time from which the services of such reporters were first engaged in the capacity mentioned, viz., from November 1, 1887.

The Committee advise that the requisite authority be granted.

Gratuities.

Order in Council, Feb. 1, 1868.—As frequent instances occur of the death of officers in the service of the Government, leaving their families in circumstances of great and immediate want, and destitute of means to defray the expenses of illness and funeral, the Committee respectfully advise that in all cases of the decease of an officer of the Government on the permanent list a gratuity equal to his salary be paid to his widow or orphan children, or to such members of his family or household as His Excellency may approve, for two months from the date of his decease.

Order in Council, Dec. 26, 1887.—The Board having had under consideration the matter of the payment of gratuities to the widows or other representatives of officials of the Government not on the permanent list, are of opinion, and recommend to Council, that the terms of the Order in Council of Feb. 1, 1868, be adhered to.

The Board are further of opinion that should Council, in special cases, deem it necessary that the provisions of the above mentioned Order in Council be extended to include payment of gratuities to the widows or other representatives of officials not on the permanent list, the consent of Parliament should be asked for the payment thereof.

Salaries.

Order in Council, Feb. 9, 1875.—On a memorandum dated Feb. 9, 1875, from the Hon. the Minister of Finance, reporting that there appears to be a want of uniformity in the manner of paying the salaries of deceased officers—that in some cases the salary is paid to the day of death, and in others the salary of the month in which the officer died is paid. He, therefore, recommends that for the future the whole month's salary be paid in all cases. The Committee submit the above recommendation for Your Excellency's approval.

Order in Council, July 29, 1871.—On a report, dated July 29, 1871, from the Minister of Finance, stating that considerable inconvenience has arisen from Orders in Council making promotions and other changes in the Civil Service, and granting superannuation allowances, not naming the time from which they shall count, and that it is desirable that, excepting for special reasons, such changes shall always count from the first day of some month, and recommending that it be established as a general rule that unless some other date is specially named in the Order in Council, all such changes shall be held to count from the first day of the month next succeeding the date of the said order. The Committee submit the above recommendation for Your Excellency's approval.

Order in Council, June 29, 1889.—That hereafter officers shall be eligible to receive their statutory increase upon the first day of the official quarter following the expiration of one year from the day on which they reported for service, regardless of the date of appointment; provided always that the time is not computed from a date prior to the Order in Council making the appointment.

Order in Council, Jan. 13, 1887.—The Committee of the Privy Council have had a memorial from the members of the Civil Service laid before them by the Right Honorable the Prime Minister, praying for relief of their financial embarrassment in reclaiming the advance of salary.

The Committee recommend, with a view to relieving the financial embarrassment, that the pay-list for each month be authorized on the 15th day of the month, provided that when the day for passing any pay-list under the provisions hereof shall be a Sunday, or a bank or departmental holiday, the pay-list be issued on the previous day. The salaries of the Ministers to be paid at the end of each month.

Order in Council, March 22, 1887.—The Committee, on the recommendation of the President of the Privy Council, advise that the Order in Council of the 13th January last, authorizing the issue of the pay lists on the 15th day of each month, be amended so as to include the temporary clerks of the inside service who are continuously employed.

Order in Council, November 14, 1885.—The attention of the Board was called by the Deputy Minister of Finance to the statements of the balances of the several Government accounts with the Bank of Montreal, on the 31st October, 1885, by which it appeared that some of the Departments had issued pay-cheques in advance of the due date.

The Board recommend that the attention of the several Departments be called to the irregularity of such action, and the Board are of opinion and recommend that steps should be immediately taken to stop the practice for the future.

Order in Council, March 5, 1888.—The Treasury Board have had their attention called to the fact that the terms of the Order in Council of Jan. 13, 1887, governing the issue of the Civil Service monthly pay cheques have not been strictly adhered to, and that cheques are sometimes issued in advance of the days authorized by the said Order for the issue of the pay lists. The Board recommend to Council that the several Departments be notified that in future the monthly pay-cheques must not be issued in advance of the days authorized by the said Order for the issue of the pay-lists, and that the provisions of the said Order must be strictly adhered to.

Order in Council, July 1, 1886.—The Board had under consideration the matter of payments for extra services, under various headings, paid to permanent officers of the Public Departments, as shown in the statements submitted to Parliament in the Report of the Auditor-General.

Taking these statements into consideration, the Board are of opinion, and recommend to Council, that, with the following exception, from and after the 1st July, 1886, no payment be made for any extra service of any kind whatever.

The exception referred to in the above, is the amount yearly allowed by Parliament for the computation of interest and balancing the accounts of the depositors in the several Post Office and Government Savings Banks, which has to be performed immediately after the close of the fiscal year, whereby no inconvenience should arise to depositors, and it may be added that an analogous vote for the same service is granted by the English House of Commons.

Order in Council, October 16, 1886.—That the Order in Council of July 1, 1886, founded on a Minute of the Board dated June 24, 1886, providing that no payment be made for any Extra Service of any kind whatever, be amended by excluding from the operation thereof "payments for services performed by persons in the Customs and Fisheries Departments in connection with the distribution of the Fishing Bounty, and collection of statistics," for which a vote of Parliament is taken.

Civil Service Act. of 1888, 51 Vic., cap. 12, sec. 12.—Sub-sections 1 and 2 of section 51, of the Civil Service Act (R.S.C., cap. 17), are hereby repealed, and the following substituted therefor:—

"51. No extra salary or additional remuneration of any kind whatsoever shall be paid to any Deputy Head, officer or employee in the Civil Service of Canada, or to any other person permanently employed in the public service."

Superannuation.

Order in Council, Jan. 7, 1884.—The Board had under consideration the fact that several recommendations to place temporary officers on the permanent list have been referred to them for report.

The Board, in compliance with the law, have recommended favorably on the cases submitted to them, but at the same time the Board have to direct the notice of Council to the fact that placing these officers on the permanent list has the effect of bringing them under the operation of the Superannuation Act, and that hitherto no provision has been made for payment of abatements on the pay of these officers while temporarily employed, although their temporary service counts on retirement.

The Board now recommend to Council that from and after the 1st inst. it shall be optional with temporary officers, on receiving permanent appointments, to place themselves, as far as regards their temporary services, under the operations of the Superannuation Act; but that in the cases where officers desire to avail themselves of this privilege, the Board are of opinion that abatements should be paid on their past temporary salaries since the Superannuation Act came into force, when the officers have served for so long back; otherwise, from the commencement of their temporary services.

The Board further recommend that, as the immediate payment of abatements on past salaries would, in many cases, involve considerable hardship, a period of six months be allowed for paying the same, the deduction to be made in six equal parts, to be taken from each monthly pay for the first six months of the permanent appointments.

Order in Council, May 3, 1886.—That the 34th paragraph of the Treasury Minute of the 11th November, 1870, which paragraph is as follows:—“(34.) When any officer has an official residence or other similar perquisite, his salary shall be stated at such higher sum as may fairly represent these advantages, and he shall pay the abatements on such higher salary, otherwise his superannuation allowance shall only count on the salary on which he has paid abatement;”—be repealed, except in the case of those who now pay superannuation abatement on such allowance or perquisite in addition to the abatements from their salaries.

The Superannuation Act provides that under the circumstances mentioned therein the Governor in Council may grant to a person who has served in an established capacity in the Civil Service a superannuation allowance, and that the Order in Council made in the case shall be laid before Parliament. If the grant was made by Letters Patent, the latter could not be cancelled by authority of an Order in Council, except they had been issued in the name of the wrong party, or contained a clerical error or misnomer, or wrong description of a material fact. (*See 38 Vic.*,

Cap. 13.) As the grant in the case of a member of the Civil Service is made by an Order in Council, I am of opinion that in practice it would be well to adhere to the same rule and not to cancel or amend the Order in Council, except in cases mentioned in the Act referred to (*38 Vic., Cap. 13.*)

Special Qualifications.

TREASURY BOARD, OTTAWA, Nov. 13, 1883.

SIR,—I have been directed by the Hon. the Treasury Board to call your attention to the 5th sub-section of section 7 of 46 Victoria, chap. 7 (C.S. Act), wherein it is stated that "In the case of attorneys, barristers, engineers, architects, actuaries and land surveyors, the examination may be dispensed with on a report from the Deputy Head, concurred in by the Head of the Department, that it is not necessary;" and in connection therewith I have to call your attention to the *Hansard* of last Session, page 1035, when in reply to an observation from Mr. Ross, of Middlesex, Sir Hector Langevin stated that these gentlemen are employed in the Service in the practice of their professions, and therefore an examination would not be required, as they had already passed technical examinations before their admission into the ranks of their professions.

I have now to ask whether, in case any of these professional gentlemen are employed in a Department where their professional attainments are not required, as, for instance, a barrister in the Finance Department, the spirit of the Act would allow of the examination being waived?

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 13th instant, in which you call attention to sub-section 5 of section 7 of 46 Victoria, chapter 7, wherein it is stated that, "In the case of attorneys, barristers, engineers, architects, actuaries and land surveyors, the examination may be dispensed with, on a report from the Deputy Head, concurred in by the Head of the Department, that it is not necessary."

An opinion is requested as to whether, in case any of these professional gentlemen are employed in a Department where their professional attainments are not required, as, for instance, a barrister in the Finance Department, the spirit of the Act will allow of the examination being dispensed with.

I am of opinion that the spirit of the Act does not allow of the examination being dispensed with in the case mentioned, but that the examination can be dispensed with only in cases where the duties to be performed by the officer seeking promotion are those connected with his profession as an attorney, barrister, engineer, architect, actuary or land surveyor.

Travelling Expenses.

Order in Council, Sept. 8, 1871.—The Committee of Council have had under consideration an extract from the minutes of a meeting of the Treasury Board held Sept. 7, recommending that the following rules be adopted for the payment of removal allowances to Government employees, and they respectfully advise that the recommendations therein submitted be approved and adopted :—

“ *Removal Allowances.*—No removal allowance can be granted except on report of the Treasury Board. No removal allowance is to be granted if the salary is increased, except in special cases, and on a report of the Head of the Department. A removal allowance is not to exceed the actual cost on account rendered.”

Order in Council, Nov. 29, 1882.—Ordered, that the Order in Council of May 6, 1876, governing travelling expenses, be modified, and that from July 1, 1882, with the exception of the Major General commanding the Militia, and the judges who are otherwise provided for, there be paid to all officers travelling on public service in the Dominion, except in those parts hereafter specified, over and above the actual moving expenses, a uniform rate of \$3.50 per diem—the days of leaving and arriving to be counted as full days—and to those officers who may be called upon to travel in British Columbia, Manitoba, the North-West Territories or out of Canada, the rate of \$5 per diem.

Order in Council, June 28, 1886.—That from and after the 1st of July, 1886, the Order in Council of the 29th November, 1882, fixing the allowances of officers travelling in Manitoba and the North-West Territories be amended, by placing the *per diem* allowance at three dollars and fifty cents (\$3.50).

Order in Council, Nov. 10, 1886.—The Board having had their attention called by the Auditor-General to the subject of the payment of expenses incurred by officers in the employ of the Government while travelling on Government business, and also advances made to such officers on account of such expenses, after full consideration of the subject, recommend to Council as follows :—

1. The *per diem* allowance for maintenance shall not hereafter be paid to such officers for days spent on board steamers or steamships or other modes of conveyance, if the passage money includes meals and all other accommodation.

2. All advances made to such officers for travelling expenses shall be accounted for within one month from the conclusion of the trip, and the officer shall render to the Auditor-General a detailed statement of such travelling expenses.

Order in Council, Jan. 12, 1888.—That the Order in Council of Nov. 8, 1887, providing that the name of the Lieutenant-Governor of the North-West Territories be added to the list of officers excepted from the operation of the Order in Council of June 28, 1886, and that his travelling allowance be at the rate of \$5 per diem, take effect from and after the commencement of the current financial year. Such

change is recommended to date from that period, inasmuch as the accounts for the year 1886-87 are now closed, and it is not deemed desirable to make the increase take effect from a prior date.

Order in Council, July 5, 1888.—On a memorandum dated June 27, 1888, from the Minister of Justice, recommending that the allowance per diem to be paid to the Registrar of the Exchequer Court, while travelling on the business of the court, be at the rate of \$4.50 per diem, the days of leaving Ottawa and arriving there on return to be counted as full days, and his allowance to be over and above his actual moving expenses. The Minister further recommends that the proposed allowance relate back to the time of the appointment of the present Registrar, and be paid to him in respect to journeys heretofore made by him in his official capacity. The Committee submit the above recommendations for Your Excellency's approval.

Insurance.

Order in Council, July 5, 1881.—The Committee of the Privy Council have had under consideration, upon the suggestion of the Acting Minister of the Interior, the general question of insurance against fire of Government property; and they are of opinion and humbly advise Your Excellency, that in view of the large amount, varied character and widely separated position of the property in the Dominion belonging to the Crown, it is a wise economy for the Government to underwrite its own risks, as well on movable as on immovable property, and they recommend that all existing policies (if any such exist) be suffered to lapse and no new ones effected, and that a copy of this Order, should Your Excellency approve of it, be sent to every Department of the Government.

Order in Council, April 1, 1886.—That the rate to be paid for all copying done for the several Departments of the Government and in the preparation of returns for the Senate and House of Commons, be fixed at five cents (5c.) per folio of 100 words, to commence on the 1st April instant.

Appropriation Balances.

Order in Council, June 27, 1888.—The Treasury Board had under consideration a communication from the Auditor General respecting the interpretation of section 37 of the Audit Act, which provides for the extension of time for closing the Appropriation Accounts.

The Auditor General states that he understands the section to mean: "That an Appropriation Account can be kept open for any time fixed by Council, up to three months, for the purpose of charging against a vote all services or supplies for which the vote was taken, that is, those rendered before June 30."

As the present practice of bringing down the balances of appropriations for three months, and thereby lengthening the financial year to fifteen months, has been productive of delay in the preparation of the accounts for Parliament, and with the view of definitely deciding what course should be followed, the matter was referred to the Department of Justice for opinion.

The Deputy Minister of Justice reports: "The question is, whether, upon an Order in Council having been passed as specified in the section, a Department may make additional expenditure and incur increased liabilities upon the strength of the original estimate; or whether the extension referred to in the section is only for the purpose of enabling a Department to pay after June 30 liabilities that have been incurred previously to that date. It would appear that the latter interpretation is the correct one. The section, without the proviso, categorically provides that any balance unexpended on June 30 shall lapse and be written off. The proviso does not either expressly or by implication give a Department power to make a new expenditure, and if that power is not contained in the proviso it is nowhere: it does not exist. The only meaning to be drawn from the proviso is that the extension is made for the purpose of paying after June 30, out of the original appropriation, such accounts as had at that date been incurred."

The Board, after careful consideration of the matter, recommend to Council that for the current fiscal year the present practice be retained, so that no inconvenience may be experienced by the Departments, the Auditor General having intimated that he is willing that for the present year such course be adopted; but as the law is clearly in accordance with the contention of the Auditor General, the Board are of opinion that under existing circumstances the practice now followed cannot be continued.

Contractors' Securities.

Order in Council, June 16, 1888.—The Board submit for the favorable consideration of Council the annexed memorandum from the Deputy Minister of Finance respecting the mode of treatment of securities deposited by public contractors, to the effect that the proceeds of all cheques and all deposits on account of contractors' securities be deposited in the Government Savings Bank.

Small Balances Due to Estates.

AUDIT OFFICE, June 12, 1888.

SIR,—It frequently happens that there is a small sum due to the estate of a deceased person who has left no will, generally for superannuation or salary, when the whole assets of the estate are so small that the cost of obtaining letters of administration would be a large part of them.

I suppose that in strictness the amounts due by the Government cannot be legally paid to any one but the administrator of the estate. However, the amounts are frequently paid, either on receiving a renunciation from all the other known heirs in favor of one, or on a bond approved by the Department of Justice, indemnifying against loss, should a person who has obtained the legal right to claim the payment make a demand for it.

I would suggest that payment, under the circumstances above set forth, should be made to a person who is not legally empowered to demand it, only when the assets of the estate are under one hundred dollars, and after the execution of a bond as above described, approved by the Department of Justice, with any additional safeguards which, in the opinion of the Department of Justice, the special circumstances of the case call for.

Letter-of-Credit Cheques.

Order in Council, June 27, 1888.—The Treasury Board had under consideration a communication from the Auditor-General with regard to the signing of letter-of-credit cheques, and submitting a list of the names of persons who sign such cheques for the different departments; and they recommend to Council:

(1.) That, for each department, substitutes be authorized by Order in Council to sign for those in whose favor the letter-of-credit is drawn, and that a copy of the Order in Council be sent to the Bank of Montreal, or other bank on which the credit may be drawn.

(2.) That the departments be instructed not to permit any person to sign except those authorized by Order in Council.

(3.) That no cheques be signed in blank, either in the inside or outside service.

(4.) That all cheques be drawn in the form: "Pay to the order of——;" and not in either of the forms: "Pay to——or bearer," or "Pay to——or order."

(5.) That authority be given for the signing of letter-of-credit cheques in the different departments by the following substitutes: (List not printed).

Franking Privilege at Ottawa.

Order in Council, Oct. 10, 1870.—That with a view of introducing uniformity of practice in franking letters, and of preventing any improper use of the privilege, the following be adopted :—

Letters may be franked in writing or by a stamp. If by a stamp, it should be kept in possession of and only used by the deputy head, or by a confidential officer intrusted with it.

A printed frank on an envelope can only be used where the direction itself is also printed.

A stamp should be a *fac-simile* of the signature of the franking officer.

The right of franking should be confined to the deputy head of the department, besides the political head.

All letters should be initialed by the sender. No franking of blank envelopes.

All letters received should pass through the hands of the deputy head, or the person he may intrust with the duty.

A pass-book with each department should be kept by the post office, in which postage charged on unofficial letters received, and prepaid on foreign letters sent, shall be entered.

Order in Council, Oct. 26, 1875.—1st. That in view of the difficulties which arise in exacting from the general public conformity to particular forms of official address upon letters intended for the public departments, and of the inconvenience to the public service which might ensue if any want of such conformity were suffered to remain a reason for not forwarding directly to destination any part of said correspondence, postmasters in Canada be directed to forward to Ottawa, free of Canada postage, as correspondence intended for the public departments, all mail matter addressed to the respective Ministers and deputy heads, as well as all mail matter on which the name or designation of one of the said departments, or of its branches at Ottawa, forms part of the address.

2nd. The mail matter sent from the several public departments in Ottawa shall be sent under the regulations approved by the Order in Council of Oct. 10, 1870.

Certificates on Vouchers.

Revised Statutes of Canada, Cap. 29, Sec. 33.—No payment shall be authorized by the Auditor General in respect of work performed, or material supplied by any person in connection with any part of the public service of Canada, unless, in addition to any other voucher or certificate which is required in that behalf, the officer, under whose special charge such part of the public service is, certifies that such work has been performed, or such materials supplied, as the case may be, and that the price charged is according to contract, or if not covered by a contract, is fair and just.

Note.—The proper officers to make these certificates are those who have personal knowledge of the facts, in each case.—J. L. McD.

SIR,—Your entry warrant of the 8th inst., covering transactions of the Crown agents for the colonies for the quarter ended 31st December last, includes an item of \$21.68 for "Brokers' commission, stamps and incidental expenses in effecting the transfer of stocks to new trustees, consequent on the retirement of Sir W. C. Sargeant." I would like to have some explanation of the nature of these charges and the reason why the Dominion Government should pay them. If they are proper charges, a detailed account and vouchers should be furnished. In the meantime, if this item is eliminated, I can pass the entry warrant.

OFFICE OF THE CROWN AGENT, LONDON, March 12, 1889.

DEAR MR. COLMER,—In reply to your letter of the 6th, I send you a statement showing how the charge of \$21.68 on the transfer of the British Columbia loan sinking fund from Sir William Sargeant to his successors was made up. I do not know how transfers of the sinking funds of Canadian loans are effected without cost, but I presume it is because those funds are invested in Canadian securities which are domiciled with those who have the management of the funds. You will see that we had to transfer New South Wales $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cents, and Victoria 4 per cents domiciled with the Bank of England and the London and Westminster Bank, and the transfers had to be effected by power of attorney, the stamp duty on which is \$2.43. In addition, the Bank of England charge \$0.36 for preparing the power. These charges can only be escaped by the personal attendance of the transferors, which in this case was impossible, but we managed to reduce the charge to British Columbia to one-third in one case and one-half in the other, by including in the same power of attorney securities belonging to other funds.

The four fees of \$4.87 each paid to our brokers were for effecting the transfer, by deed of transfer, of Canada $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent, and South Australian 4 per cent. If the usual $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. had been charged, instead of the uniform fee of \$4.87 per transaction which we arranged with our brokers, the cost to the fund would have been \$45.64 instead of \$19.47.

On the \$305,140 of debentures, and the Ceylon and Mauritius stock domiciled with us, we made no charge, although, of course, we had to obtain the necessary orders from the old trustees to the bank in respect of the change of names in which the debentures of each kind were in future to be held.

The cost at which these transfers have been effected is thus, the Minister of Finance will perceive, exceedingly moderate, and as this office makes no charge whatever for the management of sinking funds it can hardly be expected to bear the necessary out-of-pocket expenses involved in a change of trustees.

SIR,—In receipt of your entry warrant of the 26th inst., covering brokerage charge of $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. on the whole of the last loan, viz.—\$48,666.67.

By reference to the correspondence held by us on this question in connection with loans of '85, I find that at that time I asked for the vouchers, and you furnished an extract from a letter of Messrs. Barings & Glyn, stating that it was impossible to furnish them, the commission paid to each broker is upon the application-form bearing the signature of his name, and that this is the usual practice with all agents issuing foreign colonial loans.

In my letter of the 23rd December, 1885, I inquired if there was any reason why these application-forms would not be furnished, and asked for a detailed statement of payment made. When acknowledging the receipt of that statement on the 18th March, 1886, I added that all future payments for brokerage, as well as all other outlay, it should be understood, by the agents that vouchers will be required.

In reply to my letter of the 19th July last, asking for the vouchers for the brokerage of \$48,666.67 now in question, you forward a letter from Messrs. Barings & Glyn stating that it was impossible to furnish vouchers, for the reason previously mentioned, and giving a certificate that they have paid the amount.

Leaving in abeyance for the present the question of the supplying of vouchers, I have to request that you name the persons to whom the brokerage was paid, with the amount paid to each, given by the agents.

DEAR SIR,—Referring to your letter of the 7th ult., we have now the honor to inform you that we have consulted Sir Charles Tupper with reference thereto, and explained to him the difficulty there is in furnishing you with the particulars you require with reference to the brokerage paid by us upon the last issue of \$19,466,666.67 Canada 3 per cent. bonds and stock.

Sir Charles Tupper suggests that we should leave the matter in abeyance until his return to Canada, when he will fully explain the difficulty we have in this particular loan to furnish you with the details you require.

The explanation given in our letter of 31st October last, and the certificate which accompanied the same, is, in the opinion of Sir Charles, a sufficient voucher for the payments in question. We may mention that our payments for brokerage considerably exceed the \$48,666.67 allowed.

DEAR SIR,—I have completed my examination of expenditure on "Civil Government Contingencies" for the four months ended June 30, 1889, and beg to offer the following remarks on items contained therein.

The petty cash account of the Queen's Printer's office for May covers a purchase of a water-cooler from J. R. Esmonde for \$7.50. Supplies of this nature should be obtained through the Public Works Dept.

Cheque 3601, in favor of J. G. Moylan, covers \$5 "for subscription to National Prison Association," and \$10 "towards printing reports of the Association." These items should have been paid by a separate contingency cheque, upon the usual form of voucher.

Cheque 3949 covers \$18.35 paid by Mr. Geo. L. Foster, the Accountant of Penitentiaries, for a ticket from Ottawa to Dorchester, Dec. 11, and another entry of \$18.35 for a ticket from Dorchester to Ottawa, Dec. 19. The reason for not buying a return ticket should be mentioned.

The payment of \$40 to Mr. S. Greenfield for firing the noon-gun for 6 months is contrary to the Civil Service Act. Moreover, if paid, it should have been charged to "Departments Generally," as also should the ammunition for the gun.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 8th ultimo, having reference to the prices paid for supplies, in excess of contract rates during the current year at the Kingston and Manitoba Penitentiaries. In reply, I beg to say that I have received the following explanations in regard thereto from the respective Wardens:—

Kingston.—"Referring to your letter relative to the overcharge on supplies furnished this Penitentiary, I beg to say I have made inquiry of Macnee & Minnes, contractors for dry goods, and obtained the following information from them, viz.: Broad cloth is worth 10s. 9d. stg., the duty is 20 per cent. and 7½c. per lb., the weight of the cloth 16 ozs., this will be found to bring the duty to more than the 50c. overcharge. Beaver is worth 7s. 6d. stg., the duty is the same as on broad cloth, and the weight of the goods is 29 ozs., the extra charges on this will also be found to exceed the overcharge of 30c. The duty on both the serge and doeskin is the same as in the two cases mentioned above, the serge is worth 6s. 6d. stg. and the weight 24 ozs., and the doeskin 4s. 9d. stg. and weight 8 ozs., so that in these two cases, as in the former, the extra charges will be found in excess of the overcharge. The white duck is not the same as on contract, but is some that was got for use in the shoe shop to make slippers for the men."

Manitoba.—"In answer to enquiry from the Department of Justice concerning sundry items of expenditure appearing on the different vouchers in excess of contract prices, I beg to say first, that white woollen blankets were purchased specially for the hospital, and consequently are not under contract. Second, that the 4 sacks of flour were purchased under unavoidable circumstances during the first part of July, and previous to the signing of the contract."

"The gross of stove polish referred to is put up in tins, and contains nearly three times the quantity of that put up in paper packages, as heretofore supplied; taking the quantity into consideration this article is not in excess of contract price. I may add we have a considerable portion of this polish still in stock."

AUDIT OFFICE OTTAWA, Dec. 13, 1886.

SIR, I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 20th ultimo, declining to supply this office with the prison population of the different penitentiaries for 1888-89.

The following reasons against the view embodied in your letter of the 11th November appear to me worthy your consideration.

With the frankness if not the humor of your correspondence, I may remark that the view which would confine the duties of the Audit Office to those directly laid down by the Audit Act seems to me narrow.

You admit that the information asked by this office is such as should go to the public, because you are to publish it in your own report. The objection, then, to giving the information to this office, is confined to the use which may be made of it here.

The duties of the Audit Office, so far as the expenditure accounts are concerned, may be divided into three classes:

- (1) Seeing that expenditure charged to an appropriation belongs to that appropriation;
- (2) Examining that expenditures are not contrary to Acts of Parliament, Orders in Council and Departmental regulations, and are not for any reason excessive;
- (3) Reporting to Parliament.

(1) does not enter into this discussion, but (2) and (3) do.

I assume that this office was not established with the expectation that each spending Department is to put in the way of the office every obstacle that has not been forbidden by Act of Parliament; but to afford every assistance that can be given in saving the people's money.

It seems unreasonable to suppose that Parliament intended, in establishing the Audit office, to test the skill and ingenuity of the office by deliberately confining it to certain information. The object manifestly was to provide a general examination of accounts to insure the spending of the people's money for the purposes for which it is obtained, and that a dollar's worth is received for a dollar—with the implied direction that every information that may be of service for the object, and that cannot be hurtful on any other account, shall be supplied to the Office.

You may reply that the people's money is not to be saved by the use which this Office is likely to make of the information, or that our results may be mislead-

ing. I answer by saying, the responsibility for the use which may be made of the information, either in examining the accounts or reporting to Parliament, may be left to this office, and I may add that I feel the responsibility.

A knowledge of the number of persons supported is of the greatest consequence in examining the accounts for maintenance. The accounts which go through this office are not examined with uniform care. In the majority of cases the irregularity, which has been in the end proved to have existed, was suspected on account of the apparent overcharge for what was probably supplied. Now, if you let this office know, while the accounts are being considered here, only the amount of the expenditure of a penitentiary, we are likely to suppose that the Kingston Penitentiary with a total cost of \$112,000, is expensively conducted, as compared with the Manitoba one, with a cost of \$49,000; but Kingston's outlay for each convict is only \$200 while that for Manitoba is \$700.

(3.) For the report the same reasoning holds. A member of Parliament finds the charge for each convict for each kind of supply, and is assisted by this information to an accurate conclusion as to the economy or extravagance of any particular institution. It is true that his conclusion may not be sound. He may have neglected to take into consideration facts which the report does not give, such as the current prices of provisions of the various kinds at the place where those under consideration were furnished; but the Minister of Justice, having a seat in Parliament, can provide the needed information.

If the complaint in this case is that the Audit Office Report does not supply all the information, the same complaint might be made with reference to other subjects, the charges in connection with which are given in the report.

I can understand your watching jealously any prerogative in connection with your right to spend money; but why there should be any objection to the closest examination, after the expenditure is made, I cannot understand.

Halifax, N. S.

W. N. Wickwire—Boat service, 5 mos., \$250: If this is not an allowance, a receipt and details are required from the person to whom it is paid.

Nova Scotia Telephone Co.—Rent from Sept. 1, 1888, to Mar. 1, 1889, \$20: This account is not certified.

I observe that W. N. Wickwire signs the receipts for Mary Devlin and John Devlin, and the receipt for repairs done by Henry Davis: This is an objectionable practice. Their marks in presence of a witness other than Mr. Wickwire would be preferable.

Province of Quebec.

J. A. Couture—Advances, 5 mos., \$1,000: Instead of making monthly advances by separate cheques, I would suggest that in cases of this kind you advance a small sum in July, and pay the accounts in full as they are presented, and that the balance, after paying the June accounts, be deposited to the credit of the Receiver General. This would simplify matters greatly.

D. McEachran, Montreal—Use of office, \$10 a month; clerical assistance, \$20; cleaning office, \$3; light, \$2.50; fuel, \$4.50; postage, \$1: Please have these amounts covered by vouchers in future.

D. McEachran, Montreal—Travel, Montreal to Toronto, \$20; Montreal to Ottawa, \$7; Toronto to Owen Sound, \$7.50: It would appear from these items of expense that full fare each way was charged. Return tickets are good for 30 days, and should be purchased by the agent. Livery hire requires a voucher.

M. C. Baker—Travel, \$93.90: Fare to Owen Sound and return \$22.80. This same item was charged by Mr. McEachran at \$27.50. Would you obtain an explanation? Livery hire in travelling expenses should be covered by vouchers.

G. T. Ry.—Return ticket to Sarnia, \$24.30; Whom was this for?

SIR,—I have completed the examination of the vouchers in connection with the High Commissioner's Office, London, up to September 30, and have the following remarks to make thereon:—

Bonus on Continental Emigrants at \$5:—The London Office is still paying this as a commission to Agents of Steamship Lines for Emigrants settling in Manitoba. Is this of the nature of assistance to Emigrants, and if so, was it authorized by an agreement similar to the Tripartite Agreement of 1882? I would like you to send me a copy of the authority for this expenditure now that Assisted Emigration has been abolished.

H. Fabre, Paris, Canada, \$429.75:—I would call your attention to the fact that there seems to be no certificate from an Agent, responsible to the Government of Canada, that these papers have been distributed in the manner desired. There should be a check, by a responsible officer, upon the number of each issue, and a certificate attached to that effect before any payment is made. Would you let me have a copy of the contract governing this expenditure?

A. W. Reynolds—Removal allowance \$174.35:—While Mr. Reynolds was employed in the Dominion Lands Office at Brandon he received a salary of \$3 a day. When he was appointed Assistant Secretary and Accountant in the High Commissioner's Office his salary was increased to \$1,400 per annum. An Order in Council of Sept. 8, 1871 says: “No removal allowance can be granted, except on report of the Treasury Board. No removal allowance is to be granted if the salary is increased, except in special cases, and on report of the Head of the Department.” This includes Mr. Reynolds' case.

Per diem Allowance to Agents:—They are made as follows: John Dyke, Liverpool, \$4; John Graham, Glasgow, \$4; H. Merrick, Belfast, \$4; Thos. Connolly, Dublin, \$2. They are disposed of as follows:

Mr. Dyke furnishes general details of his allowance in which he includes Clerk, (G. H. Mitchell), \$7.30 per week; incidental expenses, cab-fares, telegrams to press, entertaining clergymen, and all this is called “ordinary expenditure.” His other expenses are called “extraordinary,” and paid by separate cheques. Under his “extraordinary expenses” he also includes Mr. G. H. Mitchell's salary, \$6.08 per week, telegrams and cabs. From this it would appear that one person was paid a second salary from the \$4 allowance to Mr. Dyke.

Mr. Graham furnishes details, including only Railway Expenses visiting the surrounding towns.

Messrs. Merrick and Connolly appear to look upon the per diem allowance as a grant, and merely give a receipt for the same. Kindly let me have a copy of any Regulations of your Department governing these allowances.

Postage: John Dyke, \$162.75; J. W. Down, \$61.45; John Graham, \$37.75; T. Connolly, \$23.70; H. Merrick, \$3.40. As these items now amount to material sums I would suggest that a statement receipt from the Stamp vendor be obtained in each case by the Agent. Heretofore, only the Agents' certificate accompanied the charge.

Would you kindly let me know by what officer in your Department these accounts are examined? I do not find that evidence of a departmental audit which is called for by Section 40 of the Audit Act. I suggest again that the examining

officer in your Department place his initials upon the vouchers, thereby certifying to their correctness, and satisfying me that such audit has been made.

SIR,—I have not as yet received any acknowledgement of the letters I addressed to you with reference to the expenditure under your charge during the year 1888-89. Let me again call your attention to the following objections which have not been met:—

1. The payment of \$400 to the Queen's Fire Insurance Co., as an insurance premium on the buildings at the Central Experimental Farm, cannot be certified as a correct charge against any Vote of Parliament in the face of the Order in Council of July 5, 1881. A special Order in Council is needed to authorize this charge.

2. Mr. T. P. Bedard, of Quebec, was paid the sum of \$718.55 for copying, at the rate of 6 cents per folio. The Order in Council of April 1, 1886, fixes the rate for copying at 5 cents per folio, making this an overpayment of \$119.75. Please have this overpayment refunded.

3. Legal expenses *re* Experimental Farm: O'Gara & Remon, \$202.34; Pinhey, Christie & Christie, \$3,008.21. Neither the accounts in detail nor the authority of the Justice Department which is necessary have as yet reached me. Please furnish them.

An advance of \$150 on account of chemical apparatus was made to Mr. Shutt in June 1888. This has not yet been accounted for to this office.

Mr. T. A. Sharpe was advanced in June, the sum of \$200 on account of travel and services, and also paid \$200 as salary at Agassiz Farm for May and June. Please explain what services this advance is intended to cover.

Would you please explain why J. H. Metcalfe, Intelligence Officer at Winnipeg, was paid his travelling expenses from Winnipeg to Kingston in January, 1889, and return from Kingston in May, 1889? Unless this trip was on official business it is not a proper charge against any vote, and the amount, \$104.90, should be refunded.

Your immediate attention to the above points would allow of your explanations being published in my report for the year 1888-9, now preparing.

SIR,—I have to acknowledge your letter of the 19th instant, in which you make enquiries in relation to items of the expenditure of this Departments during 1888-89. I send you the following information, in reply, in the order of numbers:—

1. An Order in Council will be requested to sanction the payment of \$400 to the Queen's Fire Insurance Company for an insurance premium on the buildings at the Central Experimental Farm, in view of the regulations relating to insurance of Government buildings. The reason for desiring this insurance at the time was quite special, pending the erections which were then going on.

2. The item to Mr. T. P. Bedard for copying, at the rate of six cents per folio, is not an overcharge, but, on the contrary, a very moderate remuneration for the special service rendered. The documents copied were very old land titles in the often faint caligraphy and idiom of a former time, and being not always very clear they could not be at all copied by an ordinary copyist. The technical skill required for such copying is relatively much more cheaply paid at six cents per folio than five cents for the ordinary copying specifically defined in the general Order in Council. In view, however, of the doubt created by the existence of such Order, a special Order will be requested.

3. In answer to your request under this number, I enclose to you, herewith, the detailed account of Messrs. Pinhey, Christie & Christie, with the certificate of the

Department of Justice. With respect to the amount of \$17.56 apparently overpaid to Messrs. Pinhey, Christie & Christie on May 16 last, I have to state that this firm allege they have a further account of \$15 for expenses, the details of which have been requested to be furnished. They have forwarded their cheque for \$2.76, which has been deposited to the credit of the Receiver General.

With respect to the item of Messrs. O'Gara & Remon of \$202.34, I enclose to you, herewith, the certificate of Mr. Featherstone, the taxing officer of the court, in virtue of which the item was paid. The details of expenditure have been requested to be furnished by Messrs. O'Gara & Remon, and they will be forwarded as soon as received.

5. The details of the advance to Mr. Shutt in June, 1888, on account of chemical apparatus for the Experimental Farm are promised by the Accountant of the Farm to be furnished at the beginning of next week, when they will be forwarded to you.

6. Mr. T. A. Sharpe. The sum of \$200 advanced to him on account of travelling expenses and services, and also the item of \$200 paid to him as salary at Agassiz for May and June, were paid for the reasons which you have stated in your letter, namely, travelling expenses and services on account of the Experimental Farm, Mr. Sharpe being requested to render such services by the Minister previous to the date of his appointment by Order in Council.

7. As respects the item of travelling expenses to Mr. J. H. Metcalfe, Intelligence Officer at Winnipeg, at the dates stated in your letter, in January and May, 1889, I have to say that such travelling was directed and authorized by the Minister of Agriculture. Mr. Metcalfe lives at Kingston, being employed during a certain portion of the year at Winnipeg. I hope you will permit me to observe that we do not recognize your right to enquire into the propriety of any authorization to his agents to incur travelling expenses by the Minister of Agriculture, he being alone responsible for matters of this nature.

DEAR SIR,—Mr. W. A. Shepard, of Toronto, is paid at the rate of \$200 per annum for "Services distributing Pamphlets in United States." Please give details of distribution, and separate the services and travelling expenses.

Mr. A. S. Gerald receives the sum of \$100 for services in connection with immigration. This payment is irregular under sec. 51, Civil Service Act, Mr. Gerald being a Civil Servant in the employment of the Customs Department at Prescott. A special Vote of Parliament is required to cover this payment.

Mr. Metcalfe's account of expenses from Kingston to Winnipeg on May 16, 1889, was not certified as being necessary and in the interest of immigration, by yourself or any one in your Department.

SIR,—I have received your letter of the 27th inst., in which you ask for explanations in relation to Mr. W. A. Shepard, Mr. A. S. Gerald, and in relation to Mr. Metcalfe's account.

(1.) In relation to Mr. Shepard, I cannot give "details of distribution and separate services," which I understand would imply a statement as to where each publication, or set of publications, was placed, but I may say to you that Mr. Shepard has continuously requested to be furnished with supplies of publications, and he has reported that he has distributed those sent, a statement which the Department has not seen any reason to question. The distribution for some months past has taken place in the United States and parts of the Maritime Provinces. As

respects the request relating to the details of Mr. Shepard's travelling expenses, I cannot see how such information can be given to you, for the reason that no travelling expenses have been paid to him by the Department. Mr. Shepard is simply paid \$50 every three months for specific services.

(2.) As respects Mr. A. S. Gerald, the payment to him is a salary of \$100 per annum, for services. Mr. Gerald was appointed by Order in Council, dated 10th February, 1873, with an annual salary of the amount stated, to attend to the arrival of immigrants on trains at Prescott, and to see generally to their wants.

You state that this payment is irregular, under section 15 of the Civil Service Act, Mr. Gerald being a Civil Servant, in the employment of the Customs Department at Prescott, but I fail to see that that Section has any relation to the fact of an officer being paid a salary, in part by one Department, and in part by another, for joint service. Whatever question could arise from an arrangement of this nature, would be one for the respective Departments to consider.

(3.) You state that Mr. Metcalfe's account for expenses from Kingston to Winnipeg, on the 16th May, 1889, was not certified as being necessary and in the interests of immigration, either by myself, or anyone in this Department. On this point I beg to point out that the account was initialed by myself, having been made out in the first place on a slip of paper, and subsequently pasted on one of the Departmental forms, containing the declaration to which you refer.

I understand that my initials to this account bring my responsibility in relation to it within the provisions of the 42nd Section of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act. Those initials were understood by the officer in charge, and who countersigned the cheque, to establish that I had certified the account to be regular and authorized; and there cannot be a question that my initials would establish my responsibility, under the provisions of the Act referred to, in the event of any question arising.

The section of the Act referred to does not prescribe any particular form of certificate or declaration. The printed forms in use in this Department are purely Departmental, and I think that the pasting of the initialed account on one of such forms may be held to be an act bringing the account in question under the declarations contained in the form.

SIR.—In reply to your letter of the 28th ult., let me say:—

Is Mr. Shepard's employment authorized by Order in Council? If so please give the date.

I was not aware that Mr. Gerald's employment was under Order in Council. He should obtain a certificate from his immediate superior in the Customs Dept. that his duties for your Department do not interfere with the discharge of those in the Customs.

With reference to the account of Mr. Metcalfe for travelling expenses from Winnipeg to Kingston, it appears to me that your initials were put on the account before Mr. Metcalfe's certificate. If I understand your contention rightly, it is that your initials on an account should carry with them the evidence, that unless the contrary is proved, all the requirements of the Audit Act, and every Act affecting expenditure in your Department, have been complied with. Everything affecting the Department of Agriculture is not known to you, just as everything affecting the Audit office is not known to me, and it is important to know what each of us implies by his signature. An easy, and it appears to me, a rational way of knowing what is conveyed, is by putting it in writing over the signature.

Cheque 8, Nova Scotia.—“Drill Sheds,” Halifax Gas Company, \$66.25. This was not paid in time to save the discount of 20 per cent.

SIR,—I desire to call your attention to the following observations on the balances in the hands of your paymasters on the 31st December, 1888, for Annual Drill:

District No. 1.—Paymaster Dawson had a balance in his hands July 31, of \$1,193.12. From that time to December 31 (5 months) his expenditure was \$309.45, still leaving a balance of \$883.67.

Districts Nos. 2, 3 and 4.—Paymasters Alger and King have still balances remaining to their credit of \$187.38 and \$62.10 respectively.

District No. 8.—Paymaster Armstrong had a balance in his hands, August 31, of \$1,513.13 up to 31st December (4 months); he charged to this balance \$145.43, leaving a balance still to his credit of \$1,367.70.

District No. 9.—Paymaster Murray had a balance, October 31, of \$2,595.59. His expenditure since this was \$507.10, \$364.60 of which was made in December. He has still a balance to his credit of \$2,088.49.

District No. 10.—Paymaster Peebles had a balance to his credit, September 30, of \$361.10, against which no charge has since been made.

District No. 12.—Paymaster Jones was given a credit of \$1,500, September 19, by cheque No. 11 B. C. The first charge against this credit was made December 3, to the amount of \$1,001.76, leaving a balance of \$498.24 in his hands.

You will observe from the above statements that there are in the hands of paymasters larger balances than their current expenditure would seem to require. Is there no way of getting the accounts of this branch of your service closed more quickly? If there is not, I would suggest that the sums on hand, after the principal payments have been made, be deposited, and that amounts as required from time to time be obtained on applications from the paymasters.

Cheque No. 12, B. C.—B. C. Rifle Association, \$40. Should this not be charged along with the other grants to “Contingencies,” instead of to “Drill Shed and Rifle Ranges?”

Cheque No. 16, Manitoba—Jno. Vinen, pension, \$82.80. This receipt was signed “John Vinen by his attorney, W. J. Rutherford.” Please furnish me with a copy of the power of attorney.

Please have, as far as possible, a separate account and receipt for each payment made and charged to any one vote. I find in some cases one voucher covering a sum which is distributed among different votes. By arranging your vouchers so that all those supporting the expenditure on each vote could be placed together, you would simplify matters for me in preparing my report.

Unless the final measurement was performed by Mr. Page himself, there should be an additional certificate by the measuring-engineer.

Of the items for "Forming passing-place," is not \$2 a high rate for helpers? As the watchman was probably on at night, when the plant was idle, should he not be paid by Messrs. Gilbert? How many hours were considered a full day, to make up the 30 days in August? Should 15 per cent. for tools be reckoned on the scows, the tug, and the diver's suits?

The application for \$24,500 will be passed on receipt of the measuring engineer's certificate for 88,866 yards.

SIR,—I have the honor, by direction, to inform you that your request that the certificate of the Chief Engineer of Canals, in favor of Messrs. Gilbert & Sons, under their contract for excavation work at Ste. Anne, (such certificate being his final estimate), should be supplemented by the certificate of another engineer, has been brought before him.

In reply, he points out that under the terms of the contract the "engineer is constituted the sole judge of work and material in respect of both quantity and quality," and that under the first paragraph of such contract the word "engineer" shall mean the Chief Engineer.

He points out that, in fact, all final estimates have been prepared and certified to in accordance with that paragraph, and is therefore unable to admit that the estimate referred to can be questioned.

The Department, I am to say, trusts that the explanation above given will be satisfactory to you, and that the amount of his award, \$25,172, which includes the final estimate, \$3,443.02, may be passed.

DEAR SIR,—Let me acknowledge your letter of March 22, mentioning Mr. Page's inability to admit that his certificate to Gilbert & Son's final estimate can be questioned.

The clause of the contract which constitutes the Chief Engineer "the sole judge of work and material in respect of both quality and quantity" refers only to differences between the contractor and the Department. A contract cannot dispense with the provisions of the Audit Act, which governs all expenditure.

Sec. 33 of the Audit Act (Cons. Stat., Cap. 29), says that "No payment shall be authorized by the Auditor General unless the officer under whose special charge such part of the public service is, certifies that such work has been performed."

In this case, "the officer in special charge" is naturally the local engineer, who alone has personal knowledge of the measurements. The Chief Engineer, may certify that he instructed the local engineer to perform the work, and has confidence in his ability—but when the question arises of paying for 88,866 yards instead of more or less, I need the certificate of the Engineer who was on the spot when the measurements of actual excavation were taken. No other certificate will satisfy section 33 of the Audit Act.

I have not in this, or any other instance, asked for more information from Mr. Page than is expected from and supplied by other Departments. I do not understand Mr. Page's unwillingness to supply the certificate, which must be in his possession, since it is for the work actually done under the contract.

Aside from the law, the work of the local engineer has so much to do with fixing the amount of the payment, that it is well to make him recognize his responsibility, by giving his certificate all possible publicity.

If the discussion is to be further prolonged, I am willing to pass to-day an application for \$18,828.98, to complete Mr. Stark's last certificate, together with the award for excavation below grade line

1. That under the contract the contractor was to deepen to 10 feet, and receive therefor at the rate of \$2.75 per yard, and apparently never had any verbal or written agreement that the contract should be in any way modified.

2. That from the evidence and argument before the arbitrator there was no legal liability under the contract.

3. That the Department of Justice was apparently not consulted as to liability before the reference to an arbitration.

It seems to me that the award, under the circumstances, requires a special appropriation of Parliament before it can legally be paid. This view certainly involves the one that the Government has not the same right to increase the liabilities of the people that a private individual has to increase his own; but I presume that the whole question is how far the right of the Government to increase the liabilities of the people goes, as it is manifestly limited.

Opinion of Christopher Robinson, Q. C., re Award to E. E. Gilbert & Sons.

The questions asked relate to the contract of Messrs. Gilbert & Sons for the formation of a channel through the shoal above the new canal works at St. Anne. This contract is executed by the Minister of Railways and Canals, and was, I assume, entered into in accordance with the Statute relating to that Department, now R. S. C., ch. 37.

The contract was to form a channel 10 feet deep below the water line, and the claim appears to be in respect of excavation below the grade line, which was necessary in order to remove projections of rock above it.

This claim, under the authority of an Order in Council, was referred to Mr. John Page, Chief Engineer of Canals, for sole arbitrament; and by the submission, as recited in the award, his award was to be accepted as final, conclusive, and without appeal.

The arbitrator has awarded to the claimants \$25,172, and my opinion is desired as to the liability of the Government for the amount of this award, in view of the facts: (1) That under the contract the contractors was to deepen to 10 feet and to receive therefor at the rate of \$2.75 per yard, and apparently never had any verbal or written agreement that the contract should be in any way modified. (2) That from the evidence and argument before the arbitrator there was no legal liability under the contract. (3) That the Department of Justice was apparently not consulted as to the liability, before a reference to an arbitration.

It is suggested that under these circumstances the award requires a special appropriation of Parliament before it can legally be paid.

Assuming the contract to be binding, which I see no reason to doubt, I think the award may be legally paid.

The Government, I apprehend, having the right to construct this work, may contract for its performance under such provisions as are to be found in the contract in question, which seems to be not unusual, and certainly not unduly favorable to the contractor.

I see no reason why any dispute arising under it may not be referred as in this case. The reference being to the Chief Engineer of the Department carries out the general intention of the contract, and while the award stands I do not see that payment under it can be properly objected to on the ground that by the strict letter of the contract the sum awarded could not have been recovered by law.

SIR,—I have the honor, by direction, to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 5th August, in further reference to the matter of the estimates of the Chief Engineer of Government canals on the Rapide Plat contract of Mr. Broder, certain items, which you have, you state, failed to find in the contract-schedule. By your letter of the 11th July last you ask for the authority fixing the rates for these items, citing three such items, namely:

1. Cement mortar in sheet-pile trenches and foundations.
2. Pile driving at foot of slope.
3. Wales for piles do

Your letter, I am to say, has been duly submitted to the Chief Engineer.

Before dealing with the questions involved in your request, I am to say that there is no intention or wish on the part of this office to withhold from you any information you may desire to obtain for the auditing of its transactions with its contractors or others under the powers and for the objects of the Audit Act, and I am to say that it is the express wish of the Acting Minister of this Department, and of all the officers controlling it, that all possible assistance should be afforded you for the proper fulfilment of the duties entrusted to you.

At the same time it will be apparent to you, on reflection, that this is a Department whose working is more than usually subject to technical difficulties, and that these difficulties, calling as they often do for prompt and efficient action, entail on those on whom the supervision of its works depends a degree of personal responsibility only to be met, within certain limits, by a corresponding liberty of action.

For the proper use of these powers its assistant engineers are responsible to the Department, and to the Department only, and it is for this office to determine the extent of the powers so to be given and the degree of commendation or blame attaching to their exercise.

Under these conditions, competent engineers are set in charge for the special purpose of employing their individual tact and scientific acquirements for the meeting of emergencies on the spur of the moment, without consultation with headquarters, for the immediate decision of questions as to the choice of material, the expediency of protective or other works subsidiary and essential to the main work in hand, and, generally, of acting as the eyes and mind of the Department, on the spot, for the solution of the many problems to which their work gives rise.

As a necessary consequence, expenditure must be incurred, and inasmuch as the specific schedule rates fixed by a contract cannot be made to embrace all and every contingency—the contracts (which you must please bear in mind have been carefully prepared by the best qualified officers of the Department, and approved and authorized by the Government, and therefore call for no other approval, but must be taken as the definite bond of the contractor to the Government and of the Government to the contractor) are so framed as to place discretionary powers for what is termed "Extra Work," and the prices to be paid for it, in the hands of the officer best qualified to understand the matter, the Chief Engineer.

This officer, though not, perhaps, on the ground in person, is there through his duly deputed and qualified assistant, and finally exercises the powers conferred on him by the Department and the Government by giving or withholding his certificate as to the items of such extra work.

To apply the foregoing to the case now in point: The Resident Engineer of the work embraced in Mr. Broder's contract, in the due exercise of his matured judgment and experience, deemed it advisable, four years ago, to use cement mortar, to drive piles, and to place wales on those piles. The estimate he sent in, based on full personal knowledge of the facts, fixed the prices which should fairly be paid. This estimate was, in the judgment of the Chief Engineer, fair and reasonable, and he accordingly, by his signature, gave it the stamp of his approval and made it as valid as if he had himself given the order direct for the work. This estimate was duly forwarded to you, passed and paid.

The above explanation as to the working of this as a technical Department appears to be necessary, and is made to you in view of your enquiries in this and

other similar directions, and will, it is hoped, have the effect of convincing you that in respect of such certificates the Department has not only complied with legal requirements, but has also duly and faithfully protected the public interests involved.

SIR,—In reply to your letter 125393 of the 9th inst., I beg to say I can quite understand that, to carry out efficiently the great works under his charge, the Chief Engineer of your Department should have extensive powers in modifying contracts, but it seems to me that by the 5th section of the contracts all instructions for modifications or additions should (1) be made in writing, (2) be given before the modifications or additions are begun, and (3) contain the prices to be paid.

I take the words of the section to convey not only that the contractor is to have no claim unless the instructions are written, but that it is the duty of the engineer to give the instructions in writing.

It is not for me to determine whether it is advisable, for the proper carrying on of the work, that contracts should or should not be sufficiently elastic to admit of their being changed by verbal instructions from the engineer; but if they should be so elastic, section 5 should be modified.

Allow me to thank you for the tone of your letter, and to add that it is what I should have expected from the uniformly broad-minded spirit shown by the Prime Minister in his conduct toward this office.

SIR,—Referring to your letter of the 29th ultimo, indicating the construction you have placed on clause No. 5 of the form of canal contract in use in this Department, I have the honor by direction to say that this clause was framed by practical men who understood to the full the powers to be conferred on the engineer and the contractors respectively, and that while on the one side giving the most unrestricted liberty to the engineer to order at any time extra work and to make changes, the mode in which such orders are to be conveyed, is left entirely to his own discretion. On the other hand, it distinctly and emphatically prohibits the contractor, of his own volition, from making changes or additions to the work, and as an effective deterrent this clause compels him, should he consider such change or extra work advisable, first to obtain the written authority of the engineer.

The two-fold object of the Department was to place full powers in the hands of its engineer, and to absolutely bar the contractor from unauthorized action.

It is conceived these objects are fully met by the clause in question.

I am to express the hope that this further explanation may have the effect of removing from your mind any remaining difficulty you may experience in dealing with the estimates of the Chief Engineer.

It is, I may say, thoroughly understood by the Department and its engineer that the orders given under this clause are not for work involving heavy expenditures, or any radical change in the approved scheme, for which, of course, other and far more complicated instructions would be required from headquarters.

SIR,—I have completed the examination of your expenditure in 1888–89 for "Welland Canal—Capital and Income," and beg leave to offer the following remarks thereon :

Cheque 2788 is for \$1,000 in favor of Capt. Donald Manson, of Port Hope, for damages to the schooner "Erie Belle" in October, 1884, by a stone in the Welland Canal aqueduct. From the fact that this is charged to "Construction," I infer that the injury resulted from works connected with the enlargement of the canal. Please let me know upon whose contract the accident occurred, and whether the damages could not have been recovered from the contractor. Did the specification contain the usual provisions that "the contractor will be held strictly and legally liable for any damage that any vessel may sustain from any of his acts," and that "if any stones or loose material be forced into the channel, they must be at once removed by the contractor at his own cost and expense"? It would be well to have attached to the voucher a certificate from the Government officer, if any, who examined the schooner and who admitted damages of \$1,000: and the certificate of the Justice Department, required by the Order in Council, that Capt. Manson has executed a satisfactory release. (See Page D—142).

On Section 34 of the Construction, Messrs. C. F. & W. T. Dunbar were paid \$12,000, Dec. 26, 1888, on account, pending a final estimate, making \$154,900 paid in all. The latest estimate which I have received is that for July, 1888, amounting to \$154,279.18. As the work has probably been completed for some time, a Final Estimate should be prepared to close the account.

Also, the following contracts for Deepening have remained at the same figures since the dates indicated :

Stark (Superintending Engineer of the four Ottawa River canals and of the Trent River works), his assistants and expenses, amounting to \$6,143.93, are all classed under "Culbute Canal." It is difficult for me to certify in such cases, as directed by sec. 44 of the Audit Act, that "the money expended has been applied to the purposes for which the grant was intended to provide."

For example, Mr. Stark's travelling expenses, \$214.20, cover \$54 for visiting the Carillon and Grenville Canals, and \$102.20 for visiting the Ste. Anne's Lock. Mr. Marceau's travel, \$319, includes \$19.25 for Carillon and Grenville, \$55.25 for Ste. Anne's. Similarly, the accounts for telegraphing contain at least \$14.11 for Carillon and Grenville, \$6.53 for Ste. Anne's, and \$3.74 for Trent River works.

Please get Mr. Stark to make a detailed separation of all the items which are properly chargeable on other canals than the Culbute, and apply for a transfer-entry to correct the charges in the appropriation ledger.

Mr. Wm. Pollock, inspector of masonry on the Trent River up to July 15th, 1888, was employed as inspector on the Calumet Island road-raising from August 15 to December 31, 1888, and from May, to June 30, 1889 at, \$80 a month. A further payment was made to him in June, 1889, of \$80 voted in the Supplementary Estimates as a gratuity, "his services being no longer required, owing to the completion of the work on which he was employed," in December, 1888.

An examination of the other vouchers for "road-raising" show that work was stopped in November, 1888, none of the men having been paid for more than 20 days in that month. Mr. Pollock returned to his home in Ottawa November 24, and was absent therefrom in December for three days, when he went up to Calumet Island with Mr. Marceau to pay the November wages.

The inference is that Mr. Pollock was paid \$80 in December for a month's wages after his work was completed, that this should have been the payment charged against the special vote, and that he should not have received the additional \$80 in June, 1889. Also, a gratuity paid to any one "on completion of work," should, I think, be charged against his actual services, in case it is found necessary to reopen the work, as in the present instance. Otherwise, if the interval between suspension and resumption were less than a month, it would be possible to obtain more than a year's pay for less than a year's work.

The only vouchers which reach me for land damages are the paid cheques and the Orders in Council. I think that sec. 33 of the Audit Act would warrant my expecting certificates from the arbitrators who assess the damages.

Murray Canal.

SIR,—In making up the details of "Murray Canal, Capital" for my annual report, I find several items on which further information would be useful.

A payment of \$800 was made in November, 1888, to Mr. Robt. Weddell, on account of his 8th progress estimate for three road-bridges over the Murray Canal, making \$15,800 in all. No payment has been made since that time. Please let me know if a final estimate to close the account may soon be expected.

Messrs. A. M. Coffeen and T. P. Keeler are classed as "inspectors." The difference in the nature of their employments might be described.

Mr. T. P. Keeler was paid in October, 1888, the sum of \$550 as eleven months' salary to September 30, at \$50 a month. On all such vouchers for arrears there should be an explanation of the delay in payment.

The pay-lists for the year include an assistant engineer, a leveller, two inspectors, four chainmen and three axemen. The summaries are certified "Correct in every particular of time, material and value." The pay-lists themselves should carry explicitly the certificate "Work performed."

SIR,—I have the honor to furnish information respecting certain details of "Murray Canal, Capital" Account in reply to your letter of the 19th instant.

1. The Department has not yet received the final estimate of the Chief Engineer in respect of Mr. Robert Weddell's contract for road-bridges over the canal. I am unable to state when such estimate may be given in.

2. The duties of Messrs. A. M. Coffeen and T. P. Keeler, as "inspectors" are analogous, namely, to see that the orders of the Chief Engineer and resident engineer are properly carried out.

3. The payment of salary to Mr. T. P. Keeler, at the rate of \$50 a month, dating from 1st November 1887, was made under an Order in Council of the 12th of January, 1888 (a copy of which I enclose), appointing him as Assistant Superintendent of the canal; also a copy of a letter of the 25th of that month, directing the Chief Engineer to utilize Mr. Keeler's services as inspector, pending the completion of the canal. There was no regular canal working-staff, and consequently no pay-lists. Mr. Keeler neglected to send in his own account, and hence the delay in payment to which you refer.

4. If you will return any pay-lists not certified as you require, they will be sent for correction to the proper parties.

SIR,—Let me acknowledge receipt of your letter of Aug. 30, containing information respecting "Murray Canal" expenditure.

As the works were probably completed before the canal was opened for traffic, I suppose we may expect final estimates, on both the Weddell and Silcox contracts, within two months, under section 25 of your contract form. It is generally desirable to have such accounts closed without delay, while all the circumstances of the work are fresh in the mind of the local measuring-engineer.

I would like to know if each of the two inspectors had a separate class of material or work to oversee. On other works, such officers are usually described as "Inspector of Masonry," or "Inspector of Timber." The information is useful for publication.

The discussion of Mr. Keeler's arrears of \$550 will be satisfactorily closed by a certificate from the local engineer that the work was actually performed. I return Mr. Keeler's vouchers for \$1,000, and other pay-lists for \$7,874.97, to have this certificate placed on them, as mentioned in your letter of August 30.

Arbitrations on Canal Contracts.

SIR,—I think it my duty to draw your attention to the references made to Mr. Page as sole arbitrator by the Department of Railways and Canals.

There are now four cases at least which, under Order in Council, have been referred to Mr. Page, and on which no evidence, or other action as arbitrator, has been taken by Mr. Page.

The four cases are; "Welland Canal, Beemer;" "Welland Canal, Sutton;" "Burleigh Locks, Goodwin;" and "Tait."

The rule has been to refer both law and fact to Mr. Page. If, in the interest of the Government, Mr. Page should determine the facts, should not his investigations be confined to points which the Department of Justice may consider legal obligations on the Government?

What objection is there in such cases, as in all other cases where the Government is interested, to leave to the Exchequer Court the whole matter in final dispute between the claimants and the Government?

I suppose all the other contracts have the same provision. Since they are sanctioned by Order in Council, an alteration in the terms should be made under the same authority. It might be well to get a general Order recognizing the existing practice.

SIR,—Let me draw your attention to the following remarks on your expenditure for "Intercolonial Railway, Capital" in 1888-89.

St. Charles Branch.

The following seven vouchers cover advances to Casgrain, Angers and Lavery to pay for land:—

Cheque 6280 for \$8,762.50 was outstanding Oct. 31, 1889. Please mention the reason for this. The other cheques were endorsed over to Mr. Theofred Hamel, of Quebec. Mr. Hamel charges a commission of 2½ per cent. on the first three items, or \$800 in 1888-89; and 5 per cent. on \$18,963.75 in 1889-90. Some of the amounts are supported by deeds from Mr. Hamel to the Government, naming the prices as given in the vouchers. If the lots were purchased from Mr. Hamel he should not have been paid a commission; but if the commission made him a Government agent, he should produce receipts from the persons to whom he paid the money.

In voucher 7342, Mr. Hamel charges \$155 for three days, and expenses to Ottawa and Moncton. Details of this amount should be given.

For the items of costs taxed against the Government I shall need the bills as presented by the lawyers who rendered the services.

5335: Thos. P. Owens, reporting in cases of Carrier and Samson, \$23. The voucher should be certified by the Justice Department, and should specify whether or not Mr. Owens was designated for this work by the Minister of Justice, under the Order in Council of Oct. 9, 1888.

3249: Wm. Bridges, 50 days drilling well at St. Charles, \$500. This is certified by Mr. H. A. Whitney alone. Since no local officer's certificate intervenes, are we to infer that Mr. Whitney has personal knowledge of the whole work?

For all the awards for land, interest, and costs, it would be well to arrange with the arbitrators, and with the Registrar of the Exchequer Court, to keep this office notified of the amounts fixed in their decisions.

6732: D. O'Connor, balance of \$815.92 *re* Charland *vs.* Queen. This includes, under date of Feb. 10, 1888, an entry: "Paid printer for printing case and factum, \$230." For these and for all items of outlay, legal agents should furnish vouchers, in the same manner as all other Government officers do when spending public money. Please obtain for me the vouchers in this case.

Increased Accommodation at St. John.

7921: D. O'Connor, advance on account of outlay *re* St. John Water Commissioners. Has a statement yet been given of the application of this sum?

Rolling Stock.

1094, 1652, 2053: Canadian Locomotive Co., on contract for 14 locomotives, \$117,000. Please let me know what progress has been made towards closing this account.

6129: James Crossen, 100 box cars at \$593, \$59,300. This is certified by Mr. Whitney alone, which is correct only on the supposition that he himself checked off all the cars.

Cheques 6,334 and 6,335, (and 6,331 and 6,333, charged to other votes,) in favor of James Harris & Co., for \$4,925 each, were outstanding Oct. 31, 1889. Please explain the reason of this. If the cars were not furnished in June, the cheques should not have been drawn.

8075: Rotary Steam Snow-Shovel Co., 2 steam snow-shovels, \$26,000. This voucher is certified by Mr. Thomas Evans. Should it not have been examined by Mr. Whitney?

Pictou Town Branch.

3561: Dribs & Co., Glasgow, two locomotives, \$18,109.45. This was paid by bill of exchange through the Bank of Montreal at Moncton, at 10½. The usual method of making payments in Europe is to obtain a bill of exchange from the Government at Ottawa, at 9½. The saving in this instance would have been \$102.78.

Construction.

8309: D. O'Connor, paid printer for 50 copies of case, "McGreevy *vs.* Queen," \$216.25. Please obtain a copy of the printer's bill.

3145: Wallace Graham, legal services *re* Maria Kearney, \$845.43. This covers two sub-vouchers of taxed costs, \$557.85 and \$127.15, which do not mention the name of the lawyer to whom they are due.

2701, 2702: Halifax *Herald*, advertising, \$171.25. The Queen's Printer's certificate is copied. Our set of vouchers should show original certificates in all cases.

SIR,—With regard to Nos. 16, 135, 189, 191, for buoy service in Nova Scotia, and 61, 62 and 173 for similar service in New Brunswick, I would direct your attention to the fact that these vouchers seem to have been forwarded direct to the Department, and not through the respective agencies, and in consequence Section 33 of the Audit Act has not been complied with. The officers under whose immediate superintendence this service is performed are, it appears to me, the agents and inspectors of these Provinces; and Section 33 explicitly states that no payment for work performed shall be authorized unless the voucher rendered for such is supported by the certificate of the officer under whose special charge the service is. In view of this enactment, I would suggest that in future accounts rendered for buoy service and work of a similar nature be first forwarded to the proper provincial agency for examination and certificate.

SIR,—Referring to your letter of Jan. 31, in which you suggest that accounts for buoy service and work of a similar nature be forwarded to the proper provincial agency for examination and certificate, I beg to inform you that the Harbor Masters Act places the supervision and management of buoys in the hands of the harbor master, and I am of opinion that the Audit Act is fully satisfied when the harbor master certifies to the account. The provincial agent, as a rule, has nothing whatever to do with buoys, and they are managed direct from this office, and the certificate of the harbor master who oversees the work and my certificate should be quite sufficient for the purposes of the Audit Act. To forward the accounts as suggested by you to the agent, who often knows nothing of the work performed, and who would have to write to the harbor master for information, would only cause additional work and delay in the payment of the accounts.

McEvoy for salary as light-keeper at Brown's Wharf, Wolfe Island, for the quarter ended 31st of March last, and in reply I have to inform you that Mrs. McEvoy is the widow of the late keeper, and is merely filling the place temporarily until the name of a suitable person can be obtained, who will be appointed permanently. In cases where the light-keeper dies this is frequently done, as there is no immediate hurry, provided the light is well taken care of.

In regard to the cheque No. 5675, for \$100, in favor of N. A. Seelye for services of an assistant at Head Harbor Light, N.B., I have to inform you that it is not intended that an assistant should be appointed by the Governor General in Council; the keeper himself gets a sum of money with which to hire an assistant. In many of our stations we give the keeper a sum sufficient to enable him to procure the services

of an assistant, as it has been found much more efficient to give the keeper a small sum in addition to his salary than to appoint an independent assistant, who would require to have a larger salary. I have also to inform you that this is not a case which would come under the section alluded to.

SIR,—I have the honor to say, in reply to your letter of the 12th, in explanation of the payment of \$45 to Mrs P. McEvoy, for salary as light-keeper at Brown's Point, Wolfe Island, for quarter ended 31st March last, that the section of the Act of Parliament respecting lighthouses and Sable Island, to which I directed your attention in my letter of the 11th inst., plainly states that the Governor in Council may appoint light-keepers, and makes no distinction as to such appointment being of a temporary or permanent nature. I can quite understand that it is frequently necessary to make a temporary appointment without an Order in Council, but no payment for the services should be made until after the Order in Council has been obtained.

Respecting the amount paid N. A. Seelyo for the services of an assistant, I beg to say that I am not in a position to judge whether or not the course you adopted was the more efficient one. My duty is to see that the public money is expended according to law, and I submit that the salary of a lightkeeper may not be increased (even if the increased remuneration be intended to secure the services of an assistant), except on the authority of the Governor in Council, by whom alone his appointment is legally made.

SIR,—With reference to the payments made Captain Pelletier for the maintenance of Upper Traverse Lightship during the current year, I beg to direct your attention to the fact that up to the 30th April last they amounted to \$1,580, a sum \$180 in excess of the annual amount allowed him by Order in Council. Please let me have your explanation of this over-payment.

Respecting the payments made to Captain Bergeron, amounting to \$1,900, to 30th April, I beg to say that as he is performing the service on a per diem allowance, his account, showing the number of days he was employed, and certified by the proper officer, should have been sent me.

I understand from the agreement with Captain Pelletier that he was bound to pay Captain Gourdeau \$300 for seven months' service, the Department paying him (Gourdeau) \$200. Up to 30th April the Department had paid Gourdeau \$500. The appointments of Bergeron and Gourdeau do not appear to have been made by the Governor in Council.

I notice in the Order in Council appointing Captain Pelletier and DeLisle, that provision is made for superannuation deductions from \$400 and \$500 respectively. I cannot find that such deductions have been made.

You will observe that in addition to the certificate as to the price, it is further required that it should be stated the articles enumerated in the accounts have been supplied. The bills of lading you enclose do not meet this requirement; they merely prove that the goods were received by the shipping agent, to be delivered at the different ports named thereon. The officers of your Department to whom the goods in question were consigned, and whose duty it was to examine them with a view to ascertaining that they were received in good order and in proper quantity, are the persons to give the certificate of receipt required by Act of Parliament.

I did not ask for a certificate as to the fairness of the amount; but, as the judgment in the case was given against Laberge, on the ground that he had exceeded his duty in seizing the plaintiff's boat, the sum in question did not appear to me to be a liability of the Government, and I deemed it necessary that the Department of Justice should certify that, under the circumstances, the payment was one which your Department ought reasonably to have made.

SIR,—I have the honor to bring to your notice the following vouchers sent me in support of expenditure by the Department of Fisheries during the fiscal year ended 30th June last—(Nos. 6, 739, 1362, 2498, 3447, 3448, 3683.)

In these vouchers sundry charges for stationery occur. With reference to these charges, I beg to direct your attention to the Act of Parliament respecting the Department of Public Printing and Stationery, which provides, under Section 6, that all stationery for use by employees of the Government of Canada shall be obtained through the Superintendent of the Stationery Office.

Nos. 451 and 2413 are receipts for \$75 and \$25 paid E. S. Goudey and C. Neal for extra services. A description of the nature of these services has not been given.

No. 707 : This is an account for advertising in "Dominion Hand Book," amounting to \$30. This payment is contrary to the Order in Council of 16th April, 1888, which limits advertising in pamphlets to such as are issued by the Department.

Nos. 289, 1369, 3834 are not certified in accordance with Section 33 of the Audit Act.

No. 1427 is for \$25 paid R. Billingsley for a claim against the Department of Fisheries. Please state the nature of this claim.

Voucher 51, B. Columbia, is an account for labor from 10th September to 31st October, inclusive, at \$50 per month. This has been paid at \$100, though the proper amount is apparently \$85.

Vouchers 52, 53, 54, 55 are similar accounts, which have been paid at \$117.70, \$120, 105.76 and \$90.40—when the amounts properly due should apparently be \$100, \$102, \$93.32 and \$78.33.

I find Mr. Bucke, of the Government steamer "Cruiser" has accounted for only \$46.06 of \$90 advanced him during the fiscal year 1887-88. The balance should be refunded or accounted for without delay.

SIR,—In reply to your letter of the 30th ultimo, asking for explanations of certain payments made by this Department during the fiscal year ended 30th June last, I have the honor to state that vouchers Nos. 739, 1362, 2498, 3447 and 3448 cover expenditures for stationery amounting in the aggregate to \$23.36. The larger portion of this amount is for stationery purchased by the Inspector of Fisheries for P. E. Island. He is no longer in the service, but his successor and all other outside officers have been informed that stationery must in future be procured from Ottawa, on application to the Department.

Voucher 3683 is for log-books and charts used by the Fisheries Protection Steamers, and cannot be classed as stationery.

Voucher No. 451.—The amount of \$75.00 paid to Mr. E. S. Goudy was for special services enforcing Lobster Regulations during the fishing season. The amount was paid on the certificate of the Inspector of Fisheries for Nova Scotia.

Voucher No. 2413.—The amount of \$25 paid to Charles Neal was for services in taking charge of the room containing the stores of the Fishery Protection Service for the year ended 31st December, 1888. The account was paid on the certificate of the officer in charge of the Fishery Protection Service.

Voucher No. 707.—The amount of \$30 paid to "Dominion Hand Book" was for advertising the different close seasons for fish through the Dominion. This advertisement was inserted upon the authority of the then Minister, it being very desirable that the public should be advised as to the existing close-seasons for fish in Canada.

Vouchers Nos. 289, 1869 and 3834.—These vouchers cover expenditure for articles supplied, and for which the prices charged are fair and just. The certificates you require will be procured.

Voucher No. 1427.—This amount was paid on the authority of the Minister, upon a special report on the case from W. Wakeham, Esq., M.D., Inspector of Fisheries for the Province of Quebec.

With reference to vouchers Nos. 51, 52, 53, 54 and 55, the Superintendent of Fish Culture reports that the men employed in the collection of ova were employed on the understanding that four weeks constitute a month, and that they would be paid extra when working on Sundays, which they are obliged to do at certain seasons of the year. This will explain the difference to which you call attention. The accounts are certified by the Superintendent of Fish Culture, and also by the officer in charge of the British Columbia Hatchery.

With reference to the advances made to Captain Buck, he has been asked to forward detailed vouchers, or to refund the balance unaccounted for.

SIR,—In reply to your letter of the 12th instant, about the accounts of the explorers of the Geological Survey for last season, I am directed by the Deputy Minister of the Interior to call your attention to his letter of the 7th of May, 1888, which covered a copy of a communication which he had on that date addressed to the Director of the Geological Survey on the subject of the travelling allowances of members of that branch of this Department, in which the Director was informed that for short trips on special business the members of his staff would be regarded as coming under the operation of the Order in Council governing the allowances to members of the service absent from headquarters on business; but that the regular trips of the survey must be conducted as in the past, that is to say, the actual cost will be paid for, subject to the production of vouchers.

Although, as stated in my letter to you of the 15th December last, the accounts of Messrs. Bailey, Ingall, McConnell, Tyrrell and Willimott, for the season of 1887, were rendered so late that it was impossible to make as careful a calculation of the days for which those officials should be allowed the living allowance of \$3.50 per diem, as the Department would otherwise have done, had you not been pressing for the accounts in order to close your annual report for 1887-8, it was not intended that the allowance of those accounts at that time should be taken as a precedent, and I have now to inform you that the rule defined by the letter of the Deputy Minister to the Director of the Survey of the 7th May, 1888, above mentioned, will govern the Department in auditing any future accounts of members of the Geological Survey Staff.

As, according to the regulations of the Minister of the Interior, actual expenses only are to be allowed when on regular exploratory trips, I would suggest that the amounts in question be disallowed until statements showing the actual expenditure incurred are furnished.

Mr. E. Coste and his assistant, H. P. Brumell, were allowed a per diem allowance of \$3.50 in place of actual expenses when travelling on Geological Survey business during last season. It seems to me that the trips made by those employees were of the nature of ordinary exploration trips, and in such a case the regulations made by the Minister allowed actual expenses only. I may remark that from one of the vouchers rendered by Mr. Coste, it appears that when in the City of Sherbrooke he was paying only \$2 a day for board while charging \$3.50 for living allowance—an overcharge of \$1.50 a day. Mr. Coste drew an allowance of \$3.50 a day for 67 days, and \$5 for 4 days when travelling in the United States or \$254.50 in all. Mr. Brumell drew \$3.50 a day for 70 days, or \$245 in all.

Dr. A. C. Lawson received an advance of \$200 for travelling expenses July 3, 1888. Although the other advances made to Dr. Lawson for the season of 1888 have been accounted for, I have as yet received no statement of the expenditure under this advance. Please have the statement in question forwarded to me as soon as possible.

I notice the following items for stationery purchased at Ottawa:—R. Chalmers, \$2.60, T. C. Weston, \$1.70. All stationery should be obtained from the Government Stationery Office.

Please explain the charges for tobacco which appear in the following Surveyors accounts:—W. McInnes, \$3.90, T. C. Weston, \$1.70.

I would also ask for an explanation of the item in Mr. Weston's account of \$5 for 4 Indian photographs, and of the item of \$8 in Dr. Dawson's account for purchase of British Columbia trees sent to the Experimental Farm, and for charges thereon. Should not the latter item have been paid by the Agriculture Department?

The accounts of the following gentlemen for the season of 1888 have not yet reached me:—Amos Bowman, H. Fletcher, E. D. Ingall, R. G. McConnell, J. B. Tyrrell, A. P. Low, John Macoun, R. Bell, Dr. R. W. Ells, J. F. Whiteaves, J. A. K. Laflamme, C. W. Willimot.

I take it that the Order in Council which authorizes a living allowance of \$3.50 a day is based upon the understanding that it is to apply only to cases where the stay in each place is short. As a matter of fact, unless Mr. McGirr has a family, his living in Ottawa for a lengthened period is probably not more expensive than it would be in Regina for the same time. His living in Ottawa with his allowance would thus give him the allowance without additional outlay besides what he would have had if he had remained at Regina.

SIR,—With further reference to your letter of the 11th September last and subsequent correspondence respecting Mr. William McGirr, of the Indian Commissioner's office, Regina, drawing a *per diem* living allowance of \$3.50 while in Ottawa, I beg to inform you that Mr. McGirr was, towards the latter part of September, 1888, brought to Ottawa on departmental business; that he remained until the latter part of October, when he returned to Regina; that late in November of that year he was again called to Ottawa on official business, where he remained engaged in special North-West work from month to month, not knowing the day he might receive instructions to return to Regina. After the Session of Parliament Mr. McGirr was informed that he should make preparations to return, which he did, but special work in connection with Manitoba and the North-West Territories requiring his further attendance at Ottawa, he was detained a considerable time longer. Mr. McGirr bases his claim to the usual living allowance on the above data, as he states he was put to great personal expense here, not being able to make permanent living arrangements; that he stayed at a hotel, the Russell House, and was obliged to pay transient rates. He further states that, had he been in Regina, he could have saved more money out

of his salary without the allowance than he did at Ottawa. In consideration of the explanations above given, I submit that Mr. McGirr was not improperly allowed to draw the usual living allowance while absent on duty from his headquarters.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 26th June, enclosing copy of one from the Auditor General, respecting a payment made to Mr. F. Draynor for services as Private Secretary to the Lieutenant Governor of the North-West Territories, and in which the Auditor General states that Mr. Draynor is an Inspector of the North-West Mounted Police, and as such is a permanent officer in the employment of the Government, and is therefore debarred by "The Civil Service Act," as amended in the Session of 1888, from receiving any additional pay whatever.

I have now, by direction, to state that there are not sufficient facts stated to enable an opinion to be given.

The section to which the Auditor General refers does not prevent a Government official from being paid from more than one source or Department of the Government, or from receiving more than one salary if he holds more than one appointment. If at any time Inspector Draynor was legally entitled to be paid the salary of \$50 a

month as Private Secretary to the Lieutenant Governor (by virtue of a regular appointment to that office) in addition to his salary as a Mounted Police officer, Sec. 51 of "The Civil Service Act" does not apply to his case. It would, however, I apprehend, be illegal to pay \$50 per month to Inspector Draynor, in addition to his other salary, if such payment is in the nature of extra remuneration or remuneration for extra services merely as Inspector.

SIR,—I beg to draw your attention to the following remarks on your departmental expenditure on account of Government in the North-West Territories, and on the contingent expenditure by the different Registrars.

I notice that Mr. P. M. Barker, Inspector of Registry Offices, gives in his contingent accounts only the gross amount paid for travelling expenses, including fares, pullman, porters, etc. A statement should be given in each case showing in detail the exact amounts paid for the different services. During the months of July, August and September last Mr. Barker appears to have been at Orangeville, although during that time he drew a living allowance of \$3.50 *per diem*. I think that though the Order in Council appointing Mr. Barker allows him \$3.50 a day when absent from Regina, still it never was intended that he should receive this allowance when not in the discharge of his duties. I would add that in the absence of a statement showing where Mr. Barker was each day, it is very difficult to determine the exact dates during which he was in any particular locality.

I would ask how it is that, while Mr. A. Sproat has drawn his salary as Registrar for the district of East Saskatchewan regularly each month, Mr. P. M. Barker has signed the contingent accounts for the months of December, January, February and March as Acting Registrar.

I notice from the contingent accounts of George Roy, Registrar at Edmonton, that he himself draws \$5 a month for cleaning office and \$1 for water supply. As Mr. Roy is a permanent employee of the Dominion Government he is debarred, by the Civil Service Act, as amended in the Session of 1888, from receiving any pay or allowance in addition to his regular salary. Mr. Roy can hardly have done this work himself. I would therefore suggest that he be asked to give vouchers for the actual amounts paid out by him for this service, and that such amounts only be allowed in his accounts.

I would also ask an explanation of the monthly allowance of \$5 to Mr. George A. Montgomery, Registrar for the District of Assiniboia. The preceding remarks as to the legality of the allowances to Mr. Roy will apply equally in this case.

Mr. T. McLean, Registrar at Calgary, gives in his Contingent Accounts nothing but receipts from the different tradesmen. A mere receipt is insufficient for purposes of audit, and I have therefore to request that he be asked to furnish full accounts in each instance.

I notice that Mr. W. J. Scott, Registrar at Battleford, does not appear to render any accounts for his contingent expenditure. During the year 1887-88 he received \$29, and during the first seven months of the current year \$97. I have as yet received no accounts of Mr. Scott's expenditure.

Mr. Barker, the Inspector of Registry Offices, will be asked for details of the accounts you mention. During the period of last year spent by Mr. Barker at Orangeville he was engaged in preparing certain reports for this Department, and was therefore occupied in the discharge of his duties.

During the months in which Mr. Barker signed the contingent accounts of the East Saskatchewan registration office he was acting as Registrar under authority of section 5 of the Act 51 Vic., cap. 20, Mr. Sproat, the Registrar, being sick. Although Mr. Sproat was temporarily incapacitated by ill-health, being a permanent officer, his salary for the months mentioned was paid him in the usual manner.

The monthly allowances to the Registrars at Edmonton and Regina for cleaning their offices have been fixed at the lowest amount for which it has been found possible to have that work done. No doubt, these officers could furnish vouchers from the parties who clean the offices.

Mr. McLean, the Registrar at Calgary, will be called upon at once to furnish particulars of the accounts you mention ; and

Mr. W. J. Scott, the Registrar at Battleford, will also be asked to expedite the return of his accounts.

SIR,—Referring to your letter of 24th June, in reply to mine of 7th June, respecting departmental expenditure on account of Government in the North-West Territories, and more particularly to that part of it which relates to Mr. Barker, I beg to say that I am of opinion that Mr. Barker is not entitled to the *per diem* allowance during the time spent by him in Orangeville, even if he was occupied in the discharge of his duties. Mr. Barker's home is, or was up to the time of his permanent appointment, at Orangeville. The *per diem* allowance is granted to officers of the Government when their duties call them away from their homes. As Mr. Barker was at home during the period in question, the allowance should not have been paid him.

Another argument against paying Mr. Barker the *per diem* allowance when at Orangeville is that it cannot have been necessary for Mr. Barker to come down to Orangeville to write his reports. They could have been prepared quite as well at Regina, his official headquarters, in which case the allowance could not be claimed. His coming down to Orangeville to prepare these reports appears to me to have been more for personal convenience than to further the Government's interest.

With reference to that part of your letter referring to Mr. Sproat's absence from duty on account of illness, I beg to ask if an Order in Council was obtained granting him sick leave.

DEAR SIR,—Let me acknowledge receipt of your application No. 445, for \$3,016.70, in favor of J. A. Phelan, for May pay-lists and accounts on the Cornwall Canal.

The accounts—two in number—are not certified by the local officer as to receipt of goods and fairness of price, as demanded by the Audit Act. I have passed \$2,657.75, the amount of the pay-lists, and return accounts for \$358.95 for completion.

I notice that a lighthouse-keeper is employed on the Cornwall Canal at 75 cents a day, and I infer that the large quantity of oil charged is mostly used in the lighthouse. Let me draw your attention to Cons. Stat., Cap. 70, Sec. 1:—"All lighthouses shall be under the control of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries." Please explain the reasons for having made an exception of this lighthouse.

The May account of W. H. Dunkin, of Cornwall, for oil, and his two previous bills in 1888-89, make up 1,312 gallons at 30 cents. The lighthouses in this part of Ontario are supplied with petroleum laid down by contract in Montreal at 18 $\frac{3}{4}$ cents a gallon. The specification is on page 21 of the Marine Report for 1888. The difference on 1,312 gallons is \$147.60.

Please ask the Superintendent, when certifying Mr. Dunkin's account, to describe more fully the kind of oil, and to specify its destination: whether it is all used in the lighthouse, or whether part of it is consumed in some other described way.

As mentioned in a previous letter, the days on which each man works should be detailed. I would like to have all future pay-lists made out in this manner.

convenience, and has been so continued to the present time. Steps will, however, be taken to carry out the provisions of the Act, and to have this light transferred to the Marine Department.

The consumption of oil to which you refer is necessitated by the number of lights on the canal during navigation—42 being maintained—besides the lights required in the carpenters shops, &c., and the lamps used at each lock during the winter by the men in charge of the regulation of the water supply. The quantity used for the lighthouse is about 50 gallons; the quality is the "Star Brand."

I return, certified as you requested, the account of Mr. Dunkin for oil, and also the account of Mr. Denny for lumber supplied for the use of the canal.

DEAR SIR,—I am passing your application in favor of Mr. Phelan for the October expenses of the Cornwall Canal, after deducting \$135 for Sunday labor of permanent employes.

I notice that Mr. Robert Lockerby, a carpenter on the repairs list, who pays superannuation tax, had his salary raised, April 1, 1889, from \$2 to \$2.25 a day. It would be well to have the increase sanctioned by Order in Council.

There has not yet been an explanation given of the difference between the sums allowed for rent, namely \$2.50 each to 8 laborers and \$6 each to 12 laborers.

Please ask the Superintendent to designate the lock at which each man works, as is done on the other canals.

The account of W. H. Dunkin for coal oil does not describe the brand of the oil, and is apparently certified "received" and "fair and just" by Mr. Dunkin himself.

SIR,—Let me acknowledge receipt of your application, No. 145, in favor of R. D. Dunn, to pay "Welland Canal—Staff and Repairs," for September.

I am deducting two amounts: \$108 for Sunday labor of permanent employes, as explained in my letter of Oct. 7; and \$36.05 for travelling expenses of T. R. Secord, the voucher not being certified by Superintendent Ellis.

The certificate "Prices fair and good," which Mr. Ellis now places on the accounts, is not the certificate "Prices fair and just," demanded by Sec. 33 of the Audit Act. Please draw his attention to the difference.

The pay-lists for Staff and Repairs are not certified at all. They should be marked "Work performed," under the same section. The certificates should be those of the local foremen, who have personal knowledge of the work, and the whole should be covered by the approval of Mr. Ellis.

I would be well to have the Repairs pay-list made out on a time-sheet, as is done for the Quebec canals. The days on which work was done are not yet described.

Quebec Canals—January.

DEAR SIR,—Let me make the following remarks on items contained in the January accounts for Quebec Canals presented for payment:

Alfred Coderre, the Superintendent of St. Ours Lock, has charged 25 cents a day for going from the Lock to the post office, since his appointment, September 1, 1888. His predecessor, Levi Larue, charged for journeys to the post office on alternate days. Please let me know what special circumstances justify this allowance, which might become an inconvenient precedent.

In "St. Ours—Completing coffer-dam," there appears a charge by Piché, Tisdale & Painchaud, of Montreal, of \$16 for a steel tape. Articles like this are usually considered as stationery, and are kept in stock at the Stationery Office. Two sizes, $\frac{3}{8}$ and $\frac{1}{2}$ of an inch wide, are supplied for \$7.90 and \$12.40 respectively.

There is no bill in support of the item of \$18 for services of G. Vivian Dowker.

Where is the residence of Mr. L. S. Pariseau, the engineer employed on the Richelieu River Survey?

All accounts for materials supplied should be certified as "received" by the officer who handles the goods. They should also be certified "Prices fair and just" by some officer who has examined the supplies, and who is familiar with their value. Neither of these certificates is on the accounts forwarded for payment.

I do not find that the items of the expenditure are inspected and sanctioned by any one but the resident Superintendents. The responsibility of payment should be assumed by some officer in the Department at Ottawa, over his signature.

SIR,—With reference to your letter, No. 77736, dated 19th instant, enclosing for report a copy of the Auditor General's letter, bearing date 12th instant, with the E—228

request to state my opinion on the class of goods or instruments supplied by the Stationery Office, and drawing my attention to the suggestions made by the Auditor. In reporting on contents of said letter, I will take up each item separately, viz. :—

1. As regards the charge of twenty-five (25) cents a day made by the Superintendent of St. Ours Lock for going from the lock to the post office at St. Ours, as compared with his predecessor's charge, twenty-five (25) cents every second day, I beg to state that, owing to the important works now going on at the lock, the Superintendent thought it advisable to go every day to the post office, which is $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant. However, this increase in the charge will likely disappear with the present month.

2, *Re* charge by Piché, Tisdale & Painchaud, of Montreal, of \$16 for a steel tape. I may state that on 4th January last a requisition was presented to the Stationery Office in Ottawa for one 100 feet $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch steel tape, but the size desired, it appears, was not in stock. In the meantime the engineer in charge of the works at St. Ours could not wait, and had to purchase one at the ordinary trade price.

As regards the class of goods supplied by the Stationery Office, specially draughting supplies, they are, as a rule, of very poor quality. This applies more particularly to graduated instruments, scales, protractors, &c., drawing paper and brushes. The mucilage furnished has been of very inferior grade. I may add also that when requisitions were presented from this office some of the most elementary articles were found not to be in stock, and we had either to wait or go outside to purchase them.

3. The Auditor states there is no bill in support of the item of \$18 for services of G. Vivian Dowker. In reply to this, I may refer you to Departmental letter No. 64518, dated 5th September, 1884, authorizing me "to return each month account in favor of Miss G. Vivian Dowker, covering assistance to Paymaster in copying pay-sheets, &c." In order to enable the Paymaster to make out his bordereaux or otherwise prepare his monthly payments, he receives from this office one copy of the pay-sheets and accounts, which are made out here in quadruplicate. Of the three remaining copies, one is kept on record in this office, the two others are sent to the Department (one being for the Auditor). Instead of making out a separate bill for this item of \$18, the Paymaster has been in the habit of embodying this account in his monthly return. However, I will advise him to make out in future a separate bill for said services.

4. In reply to enquiry as to the residence of L. S. Pariseau, employed on the Richelieu River, I beg to state that, although his family resides at St. Johns, P.Q., he himself has no fixed residence, being subject to follow the works of his survey on the Richelieu River, besides being sometimes called out to work on other canals. However, his address each month is indicated in both pay-lists and vouchers forwarded for the Audit Office.

5. As regards the suggestions made that all accounts for materials supplied should be certified as "Received" by the officer who handles the goods, and further, that they should also be certified "Prices fair and just" by some officer who has examined the supplies and who is familiar with their value. I beg to state that I consider the different Superintendents on the works under my charge as fully competent to judge of the value of articles or materials purchased by them; and further, I have no hesitation to say that they would not certify any accounts as being *correct in all details and particulars* if the goods had not been received by them or the prices marked not just and fair. The only account which they do not certify to is that of the Paymaster himself.

6. The Auditor further states he does not find that the items of expenditure are inspected and sanctioned by any one but the resident Superintendents, and adds that the responsibility of payment should be assumed by some officer in the Department at Ottawa, over his signature. To the foregoing I will answer that all accounts or items of expenditure forwarded monthly to this office by the Superintendents of works under my charge are duly inspected by me and sanctioned for payment, in my capacity of Superintending Engineer, only after they have been found correct in *all particulars*. I consider that the responsibility of payment is assumed by me as

assistant to the Chief Engineer, and placed by the Department in charge of canals of this district so that, although residing in Montreal, I may be properly considered an officer of the Department at Ottawa.

DEAR SIR.—Let me draw your attention to Mr. Parent's letter of Feb. 23, concerning the January expenditure on canals in the Province of Quebec.

(1.) The travel to St. Ours post office has not been explained in the line of my request for information. This charge made by a Government official for going to the post office (whether every day or every second day) is, to the extent of my knowledge, unprecedented. Why has it not been considered part of his regular work? Are there any special circumstances about the case which would enable you to discriminate and refuse a similar claim by any other officer?

(2.) The Stationery Act is conclusive as to the purchase of supplies from the Stationery Office. The question of quality should be laid before the Superintendent of Stationery, who will probably consider Mr. Parent's description too severe.

(4.) A living allowance should only be paid when an officer is away from home. Every officer must necessarily have some headquarters, at which personal expenses cannot be charged. Mr. Pariseau charges \$1.50 for every day. Since his family lives at St. Johns, P.Q., that place must be considered his headquarters, and he should be called upon to refund for every day on which he was not absent from home. Please obtain from Mr. Pariseau a detailed statement of his location on each day, and a cash deposit for the days spent in St. Johns. Similar steps should be taken with reference to Mr. Marchand and the other assistants, who have been paid \$25 a month, if any portion of their time has been spent at home.

(5.) Under this head it will be sufficient to quote Cons. Stat., Cap 29, Sec 33. The certificate should be explicitly as described.—“Correct in all particulars” is not definite enough. Please see that the April accounts are certified as demanded by the Act.

(6.) A departmental examination of outside expenditure is necessary, to ensure uniformity in the nature of items allowed.

DEAR SIR,—My letter of February 12, 1889, contained the following remark on the January accounts for Quebec canals: “All accounts for materials supplied should be certified as *received* by the officer who handles the goods. They should also be certified *prices fair and just* by some officer who has examined the supplies, and who is familiar with their value. Neither of these certificates is on the accounts forwarded for payment.”

Mr. Parent, in his letter of February 23, discusses the question thus: “I consider the different Superintendents on the works under my charge as fully competent to judge of the value of articles or materials purchased by them; and further, I have no hesitation to say that they would not certify any accounts as being *correct in all details and particulars* if the goods had not been received by them, or the prices not just and fair. The only account which they do not certify is that of the Paymaster himself.”

This was answered by me April 10, as follows: “Under this head it will be sufficient to quote Cons. Stat., Cap. 29, Sec. 33. The certificate should be explicitly as described. Correct in all particulars is not definite enough. Please see that the April accounts are certified as demanded by the Act.”

The April accounts came in with the old certificate of “*Correct in all particulars*,” and were passed through this office, to avoid inconvenience to the lock laborers.

Please notify Mr. Parent that I shall be unable to pass such vouchers for May expenditure as are not certified in the form prescribed by the Audit Act.

SIR,—Referring to enclosed: After diligent search, both in our books and at the Auditor General's, I am unable to trace any requisition for the steel tape to which Mr. Parent refers. In regard thereto, I beg to say that this particular tape (100 feet $\frac{3}{4}$ inch steel) was in stock at the alleged date of order, and has been so continuously ever since and before that, so that had any order come it would have been filled at once and without scruple.

As to draughting supplies they are mostly purchased from the best makers and of the best materials. For instance, all instruments are of albata; drawing papers, Whatman's and Pirie's; brushes from Rowney, and of best camel's hair. I know that when we go outside to buy any article the difference in our favor is clear enough, and my statements can be verified by an officer of many years' active service in railway work.

Mr. Parent complains of the mucilage: but I cannot trace ever supplying him with a single bottle; and as to shortness of stock, his requisitions now before me show that ninety-nine hundredths of his requirements were supplied at once. Facts are against him all along the line: documents and professional evidence are overwhelmingly in favor of this office.

Quebec Canals—March.

DEAR SIR,—I wish to make the following remarks on the accounts presented for March expenses of Quebec canals:

Mr. Coderre, the Superintendent at St. Ours Lock, makes a charge of \$24 for six cords of wood, for use in the office next winter. There should be a bill from the per-

son who supplied the wood. What building is used for an office? Is it necessary to keep the office open through the winter? Why is fuel bought now for next winter's use?

At Riviere aux Iroquois, on the Chambly Canal, the engineer and fireman each charge for work in March during 30 days and 21 nights. There should be some further explanation of this circumstance, as it approaches closely to a physical impossibility.

Is Alex. Cockburn, at \$2.50, the captain of steam dredge No. 1, the same person as Alex. Cockburn at 50 cents, the night-watchman on the same dredge? And is Frs. Chaloux, at \$75, the foreman of works on the dredge, the same person as Frs. Chaloux at \$1.25, the supervisor of the re-building at Fryer's By-wash?

The item of \$30 in Mr. Dowker's account for 3 months' office rent should be supported by a bill from the person to whom the money is due.

The pay-lists, in all cases, should specify the days on which the men worked, and the places at which they are located. Please see that this change is made as soon as practicable.

SIR,—With reference to your letter, No. 78161, dated 11th instant, enclosing for report thereon copy of a letter from the Auditor General, bearing date 10th inst., and in which he asks queries and makes remarks on the accounts for month of March last, I beg to state I will answer each remark separately:—

1. The Superintendent of St. Ours Lock, besides his salary of \$730 per annum, is provided with a residence, which is erected on Government land, between the lock and the dam. A portion of this building is set apart for an office, wherein he keeps all his books, papers, records and correspondence, and which is lighted and heated at Government expense, and kept open the year around, the same as on all the other canals.

The reason why fuel is bought now for next year's use is, that being bought green, it may have time to dry properly, so that it will render good service in due time. As desired, I enclose herewith acquitted account from the person who supplied the wood.

2. The Superintendent of Chambly Canal reports that at Rivière aux Iroquois, Solyme Davignon, engineer, and Alexandre Benoit, fireman, of the steam pump used for unwatering a section of the canal, pending the rebuilding of the culvert at that point, have kept said steam pump going during twenty-six week days and two Sundays, Sunday work being paid double, this giving them thirty days each. They have besides these thirty days, worked twenty-one nights, and although night work is generally paid time and a-half, they were only allowed twenty-one ordinary days for such night work. Davignon and Benoit during all that time, never set foot inside of a house, nor absented themselves from the pump, they kept constantly at work in open air, in mud and water, barely taking a few hours per day in turn, to take their meals or a little rest, under a rough plank shelter, erected a few feet from the pump. Their work was well done, and their money was well earned. I may further add, that there was really a saving to the Department in this instance, as if Benoit and Davignon had refused to perform the night work required (for the pump had to be kept going night and day), it would have necessitated the service of an outside engineer and fireman, whom the Department would have had to pay at the rate of \$5, and \$2 per night each.

3. Mr. Francis Chaloux, foreman of the Works on Repairs, at \$75 per month, is the same Francis Chaloux, returned at \$1.25 per day as supervisor on March pay list, rebuilding Fryer's By-Wash. For some years past extensive and important works have been executed on the Chambly Canal, such as rebuilding large portions of the nine old locks, two waste weirs, dredging the bottom of the canal, raising and widening the banks, &c. These works necessitated the constant supervision of an

able man. I may here state that Mr. Chaloux is a man of no ordinary ability, since for nine months he was entrusted with the situation of superintendent *pro temp.* between the death of late superintendent and the appointment of Mr. Benoit in July, 1886. He is cognizant of all the details of construction of that canal, and as such a most valuable officer of this canal. Mr. Chaloux was therefore employed as supervisor of these works, and the valuable services he rendered in this new position entitled him to a larger salary than that of a foreman on ordinary repairs, which he continued to fulfil in the workshop. On this ground he was granted \$1.25 per day more. When the works above alluded to are completed Mr. Chaloux will return to his former position and foreman's salary. In performing this extra work, he has in reality for \$1.25 per day, enabled us to dispense with the services of an inspector whom we would have had to pay at the rate of \$75 or \$80 per month. This mode may be irregular, but it is economical and practical, and to my knowledge has often been followed in the past.

Alexander Cockburn at \$2, the captain of Steam Dredge No. 1, is the same Alexander Cockburn at 50 cents, the night watchman on the same dredge. While the dredge is working in the canal, Captain Cockburn has his cabin on board, where he retires at night and has to see that lights are kept in good order and otherwise supervise the dredge and scows moored or at anchor for the night, so as to prevent any damage being done. This is a rather responsible task, and when Captain Cockburn offered to fulfil it, instead of an outsider without experience, his offer was accepted. For doing this, he has been paid at the rate of 50 cents per night during dredging season for the last twenty years. This 50 cents after all, only brings Mr. Cockburn's salary to the ordinary salary of a dredge captain, say \$90, and the latter have a night watchman besides.

4. As regards the item of \$30 in Mr. Dowker's account for three months office rent, I enclose herewith a letter from Paymaster Dowker, who states that the item of rent will be supported in future by a bill from the person to whom the money is due, and that the dates of his trips on the canals shall also be furnished as arranged by a personal interview with the Auditor General.

5. With regard to the Auditor's request that pay-lists in all cases should specify the days on which the men worked and the places at which they are located, I beg to state that in making their monthly returns to this office, the Superintendents copy the time of each man from a time book kept specially on each canal for that purpose by time keepers or foremen, as the case may be. The time books have always been carefully checked, and the total number of days worked by each man given accurately. If the blank forms corresponding with the time books were furnished to this office, we could no doubt comply with the Auditor's wish, under this head, but it would be impossible to mention the places at which the men are located, for the reason that the men are working at different places each day as the case may require. Sometimes men are working at two or more places through the day or night; it is therefore out of question to give this kind of information.

DEAR SIR,—I have passed the May vouchers for Quebec canals, with the exception of the following three items:—

The first two items are for extra work, as explained previously. Mr. Coderre's trips to the post office have already been noticed as unusual; and it occurs to me that, since the travel is probably on foot, it is an "extra service," coming under Sec. 12 of the Civil Service Act of 1888.

The certificates on most of the accounts for materials are now satisfactory; but where stamps are used for "Fair and just" and "Goods received," care should be taken that only the signer has access to them.

The Ste. Anne's accounts are not yet certified by the Superintendent as to "Receipt of Goods."

The St. Ours accounts are certified "Correct in all particulars" by the Superintendent, Mr. Coderre. Over this certificate, and in Mr. Lesage's writing, is "Received above goods." In Lacoste's account, Beauharnois Staff, Supt. Beique certifies "the above account correct." Between this and Mr. Beique's signature, Mr. Lesage has written "and the goods were duly received." It can reasonably be inferred that the alterations were made after the Superintendents signed their names. Although well meant, the irregularity is essentially serious, and should not be repeated.

The copies of accounts which are left on record in this office should carry the complete set of certificates made by the Superintendent or foreman, and the engineer. This would be impracticable under the present system, as the copy is made in the Montreal office. But after July 1, if duplicate accounts are demanded from creditors, as I lately suggested, the Superintendent will be able to certify both copies as to "Receipt of Goods."

Under "Chambly—Income—Lighting St. Johns Wharf," there is a bill of H. Riendeau for 359 gallons of coal oil, at 28 cents, making \$100.52. Why is this charged to an Income Vote, instead of to Collection of Revenue?

DEAR SIR,—Mr. Dowker explained in conversation last Thursday, that he had always thought himself entitled to charge the full return-fare between Ste. Anne's and Montreal, although holding an annual commutation-ticket.

Mr. Dowker describes eleven trips as necessary in each month, and the fares charged by him between Ste. Anne's and Montreal amount yearly to \$186. His commutation-ticket costs \$65 annually.

I have elucidated to Mr. Dowker the law on this subject, and he will revise his accounts since July 1, 1888, on the basis of charging only his actual outlay. The difference for the nine months, from July to March, is \$74.50, which sum will be subtracted by Mr. Dowker from his April pay-list.

This, however, is merely a rectification for the present fiscal year. Any similar over-payments made in previous years are, of course, equally irregular, and should be refunded. Please obtain, therefore, from Mr. Dowker, a statement of the differences between his charges and his actual outlay for fares, from the time that he took office in December, 1878.

DEAR SIR,—Let me suggest to you the expediency of giving Mr. Dowker a letter of credit on the Bank of Montreal at Ottawa. The cheques would be separate to pay the different accounts for supplies, and in Mr. Dowker's name to pay wages.

When the Paymaster is unable to see a creditor at the time of his visit to a canal, the Superintendent or some other person signs for the cash—a manifestly inconclusive receipt in the absence of written authority from the creditors. The paid cheques would necessarily carry the creditor's signature.

The "Receipt" columns of the pay-lists contain the workmen's names, written out in Mr. Dowker's office at Ste. Anne's, with a cross made by the same writer. The pen-handle is touched by the men at the time the money is paid; and the Superintendent certifies that he witnessed the payments. I am inclined to think that a number of the men could sign if time were given; and the paymaster's business is to furnish receipts as well as to pay the money. Please see that each pay-list is certified in the following sense: "The men who have signed by marks have expressed their inability to sign their names." The marks must be made by the men themselves.

The question of shortness of available time should not be allowed to interfere with the validity of receipts.

SIR,—I have subtracted from your Lachine Canal Staff application for June the sum of \$64.05, on account of Mr. Dowker's travelling expenses.

Mr. Dowker has been repeatedly asked for details of his charges for fares and cab-hire, but has never furnished them.

The \$64.05 is made up of \$39.95, fares and cab-hire for June not supported by the necessary details, and \$24.10, the overcharge admitted by Mr. Dowker on fares between Ste. Anne's and Montreal. This last amount I calculated at \$74.50 for nine months, but Mr. Dowker does not agree with me; and I am postponing the collection of the difference until I can obtain from him the information which he has omitted to give. Further payment will be made for June travel when the charges are supported by descriptions of the items.

Let me call your attention to my letter of April 29, 1889, asking you to arrange with Mr. Dowker for a refund of all overcharges made by him previous to July 1, 1888, for travelling between Ste. Anne's and Montreal. I would like to know if any steps have been taken in this direction.

To complete the audit of Mr. Dowker's accounts as paymaster for the fiscal year 1888-89, I shall need to examine the cheques drawn by him for Government business since July 1, 1888, whether to pay creditors directly or to draw out cash. The cheques for his own pay and expenses need not be included. Please see that these vouchers are furnished to me some time during this month.

DEAR SIR,—Let me acknowledge receipt of your application No. 4 for \$200 in favor of Paymaster Dowker as an advance for travelling expenses.

Mr. Dowker's monthly charge for travel, as reduced by recent discussions, is now under \$80—being \$78.45 for June. This is made up of \$11.25 for fares, \$28.60 for cabs, and \$38.50 for 11 days' living allowance. There is, in addition, an annual item of \$65 for a commutation-ticket between Ste. Anne's and Montreal.

It is a generally recognized principle that an officer having fixed work should be treated as if he resided where his work can be best performed. Mr. Dowker's travel can be divided into two parts: between Ste. Anne's and the Bank in Montreal, and from the Bank to the different canals. The first item would be eliminated if Montreal were considered to be Mr. Dowker's headquarters.

If you do not consider it advisable to require Mr. Dowker to live in Montreal, his expenses in going from his residence to Montreal should be paid by himself.

I return the application for \$200, and suggest that the amount be reduced.

DEAR SIR,—Please ask Mr. Dowker to separate and describe fully each item for fares and cab-hire, giving the date for each sum charged, and the time of departure and arrival of each train or boat taken. The payments for cab-hire should be shown to agree with any tariffs that may exist.

I notice that the vouchers for travel are the only accounts which are not certified by the Superintendents of the different canals. It would be well, I think, to submit them to the Superintendents, who are always familiar with the ground covered.

I have already indicated the desirability of obtaining the actual signature or mark of each employé on the pay list, as is done on the Western Canals. For the Quebec Canal pay lists, the only evidence of payment is the certificate made by the Superintendent as witness. The crosses and signatures made by the Paymaster's clerk are no evidence at all.

Please have these changes adopted by the Paymaster on the accounts which will soon be presented for August. The discussion of Mr. Dowker's work was begun April 9, and I would like to get it closed as soon as convenient.

Mr. Dowker should be asked to make a statutory declaration each month that all sums charged as disbursements, for transport or otherwise, were actually expended by himself, that they were necessary, and that they were for the public service. From the previous correspondence I draw the inference that this officer has not made up his charges on a basis of actual outlay. I am anxious to know whether your Department agrees with me in this conclusion, and if so, whether you will get the accounts recast from the time of Mr. Dowker's assumption of office, and obtain a refund of the total overcharge.

An examination of the dates of receipts given by Montreal merchants shows that they are seldom paid by Mr. Dowker until after the 20th of each month, when he has completed his payments for wages. If these services were covered by a letter-of-credit, in the line of my recent recommendation, the cheques could be mailed immediately after the accounts were returned from Ottawa, thus saving a large portion of Mr. Dowker's cab-hire in Montreal, and satisfying the Government's creditors some two weeks earlier.

A further reduction of expenses could be made if it were suggested to the Paymaster to drive in the same carriage with the Superintendent, whose horsehire is already paid for by the Dominion. Their travel is over the same ground, since the Superintendent goes to witness the Paymaster's work.

Of my suggestions as to the necessity for further details of his travelling expenses, none have yet gained Mr. Dowker's attention. I am passing \$50 on account of his charges of \$80.50, and will take up the difference when sufficient information is presented by him.

I return you herewith the September pay-lists which have been sent in as "acquitted." You will notice that the names in the "receipt" column are again written in by Mr. Dowker's assistant at St. Anne's. I am unable to accept these pay-lists as a discharge of the paymaster from liability. Please ask him to take them out again, along with the October pay-lists, and get them receipted by as many of the men as are still on the works. There might be a second receipt column, in blank, pasted over the names as now written.

In conclusion, I wish that you would make another request for Mr. Dowker's cheque stubs for 1888-89, and for a copy of his bank account. As mentioned previously, I shall be unable to certify the appropriation statement in the usual form, "examined and found correct," unless I am supplied with this information.

DEAR SIR,—In an interview with Mr. Dowker at the time of his recent visit to Ottawa, I again explained to him the manner in which he should itemize and certify his accounts for travelling. He says that he now understands what is wanted.

He will send up his paid cheques for 1888-89 sometime before January 15, 1890, as far as they relate to Government services.

He objects to the proposition that his vouchers should be certified by the different superintendents (in the same manner as all the other expenses of the canals) on the ground that he is unable to make them out before the end of the month, and they would not be returned to Montreal in time to be included in the monthly application.

His November travel was not included in the November application, on account of matters in dispute; but \$100 was paid December 11 to keep him in funds, on the understanding that it would be deducted from the December application, which would contain his travel for both November and December.

I now propose that the \$100 be left with Mr. Dowker as part of the yearly advance, and that his vouchers for travel remain one month in arrears, that is, his December travel might be included in the application for January expenses, and so on, adjusting at the end of each fiscal year, as usual.

This arrangement will remove the only objection which Mr. Dowker raises to forwarding his accounts to the superintendents to be certified.

SIR,—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 13th inst., asking for the source of my information regarding Mr. Waggoner's leave of absence from his duties at Prince Albert since July, 1887. If you will read my letter of the 10th inst. carefully, you will find I simply inferred that he had been granted leave of absence from the fact that he was absent from his duties at Prince Albert for the period in question.

As to the source of my information about his actual absence, you will find this on page F—82 of my report of 1887—88, being Section K of a letter addressed to you, May 30, 1888; and again in my letter of May 10, 1889. The remark made in the former of the letters above referred to, does not seem to have attracted your attention at the time, as the irregularity was neither explained nor rectified.

Mr. Waggoner came down to Ontario in July, 1887, and since then I have received no accounts for travelling expenses that would indicate that he had returned to Prince Albert. The Contingent Accounts and Revenue Returns since July, 1887, have all been signed by Forest Ranger R. S. Cook as "Acting Timber Agent." Mr. Waggoner's receipts and cheques have been signed either by himself at Kingston or Ottawa, or by his attorney in the North-West or at Kingston. Of all the documents which would naturally come in course of signature by the Crown Timber Agent since July, 1887, there is not one in my possession signed by Mr. Waggoner and dated from Prince Albert. The inference of his protracted absence from duty is unavoidable. The same inference could probably have been drawn from the set of duplicate vouchers in your Department, if inspected with the aid of my letter of May 30, 1888.

The questions contained in my original letter of May 10 still remain unanswered. What I am trying to get is simply this: an explanation of the payment of an officer while absent from his work for over 18 months, and at a distance of some 1,900 miles.

In conclusion, the mere fact of Mr. Cook signing as "Acting Timber Agent" would indicate that Mr. Waggoner was not acting as Timber Agent, and he would not, therefore, except under very special circumstances, be entitled to his pay as Timber Agent.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt here on the 16th ultimo of a letter from you concerning the payment by this Department of a percentage on collections and seizures made by W. H. Stevenson, William Toole, R. Gunne, J. W. Astley and B. McLellan, respectively. In reply I have to say that Mr. Stevenson is a sub-Crown Timber Agent, and on the 27th day of July last you were informed that the Dominion Lands Agents who were acting as sub-Crown Timber Agents were appointed by this Department, and that the law does not appear to call for the sanction of the Governor in Council for an appointment of the above nature. Mr. Stevenson therefore, as a sub-Crown Timber Agent, is not a permanent employee. The same may be said with reference to the remainder of the persons mentioned, who are Forest Rangers and who are not appointed by Order in Council. In any event the Order in Council of the 6th of July, 1883, a copy of which is enclosed herewith, provides that in addition to their salary Forest Rangers may be paid a commission of 20 per cent. of the dues collected on seizures of timber cut from the Crown domain.

Order in Council, July, 6, 1883.—On a memorandum dated June, 19th 1883, from the Minister of the Interior, representing that it is desirable to take early steps to more effectually prevent the illegal cutting of timber on Dominion Lands in the Province of Manitoba and the North-West Territories. The Minister observes that

the rapid development of the North-West which has taken place during the past few years has produced an extraordinary demand for the products of the forest, and it is found that the office duties of the Crown Timber Agents engross so large a proportion of their time and attention, that they are powerless, especially in the outlying districts, to prevent trespass or to ensure the adequate punishment of the trespassers. The Minister recommends, with a view of overcoming this difficulty, that he be authorized to appoint from time to time as may be found expedient, one or more Forest Rangers in connection with each Crown Timber Agency, to be under the supervision and direction of the Crown Timber Agents for the respective districts; and furthermore that he be authorized to pay these Forest Rangers at a rate not in excess of seven hundred dollars (\$700) per annum, with 20 per cent. of the dues collected on seizures of timber cut from the Crown domain in contravention of the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act in that behalf. The Minister also recommends that when absent on duty from headquarters, which in each agency shall be the place where the Crown Timber Office is situated, they be allowed actual travelling and living expenses. The Committee submit the foregoing recommendations for Your Excellency's approval.

SIR,—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 5th inst., enclosing a memorandum from Mr. A. O. Wheeler, respecting a cheque issued in his favor, on account of W. N. Small's Outline Survey. In reply, I beg to say that no moneys due by the Government, to any one person, can be paid to any other person, unless the one receiving payment holds a power of attorney from the original payee. The rules prescribed by the Treasury Board, with regard to Power of Attorney, will be found on page C—1 of my report for 1887-88. The second of these rules requires that all such Powers of Attorney should be on a regular printed form. The first of these rules forbids any officer of the Civil Service from acting as Attorney for the receipt of public moneys. Both of these rules appear to have been transgressed in the present instance.

AUDIT OFFICE, OTTAWA, March 5, 1889.

SIR,—In connection with the examination and audit of the revenue, I have to request your attention to the following observations on the returns and departmental summary furnished by your Department:

(1.) *Collector's Returns*:—For auditing purposes the collector's returns should show his receipts in detail as they appear on his cash book. The memo. of deposits made in acquittance is given in sufficient detail as now made out. Each return should be certified to by the collector as follows: (a) that it is a true and correct statement of all moneys received by him in respect to revenue, during the month; (b) that returns fully acquitted have been received from each sub-collector under the control of his port.

(2.) *Departmental Summary*:—In addition to the details given on this statement as now furnished, there should be a summary of totals by Provinces, showing a gross total for each class of revenue for the month; it should also bear the following certificate signed by the Commissioner or Assistant Commissioner, and countersigned by the Accountant, viz.: I certify (1) that a return has been received from each collector for the month of _____ as per the above summary; (2) that each return has been examined in this Department and is correct; (3) that receipts, for the deposits claimed to have been made, have been received and transmitted to the Receiver General; and (4) that the sums collected are the amounts which, after examination, appear to be the amounts which should have been collected.

(3.) *Daily Return of Receipts*:—The date of each receipt should be entered on the return, for the purpose of comparison with the dates given on the collector's return.

(4.) The departmental summaries and collectors' returns have already been received for the months of July, August and September last. I have to request that the summaries and returns for the intervening months may be furnished as soon as possible, and in accordance with the above; and that in future the usual monthly summary and collectors' returns should be furnished regularly, and as early as possible in the succeeding month.

(5.) Each time an Inspector visits a port he should make a report to be forwarded to this office, which should state, in addition to any other information he may deem fit to give, the balance in the hands of the collector on the date of his inspection, and the balance on the last day of the preceding month, as shown by his cash book.

(8.) If you should find any difficulty in carrying out any of these requests, please mention it at an early date.

AUDIT OFFICE, OTTAWA, March 5, 1889.

SIR,—I beg to submit the following observations in connection with the audit and examination of Excise Revenue:—

(1.) Collector's Return:—For auditing purposes the collector's return should show his receipts in detail as they appear on his cash-book. The memo. of deposits made in acquittance is given in sufficient detail on the return as now made out. Any returns from sub-collectors that reach a collector subsequent to the 30th June should be included in a supplementary return for June. Each return should be certified to by the collector; (a) That it is a true and correct copy of the cash-book kept in his office in respect to Revenue; (b) That returns fully acquitted have been received from each sub-collector under the control of his port.

(2.) Departmental Summary:—This statement should be a summary of the collector's returns for the month, notwithstanding that all the deposits may not have been made during the month. It should bear the following certificate, signed by the Commissioner or Assistant Commissioner, and countersigned by the Accountant, viz.:—I certify (a) That a Return has been received from each collector of Inland Revenue for the month of _____, as per the above summary; (b) That each return has been examined in this Department and is correct; (c) That receipts, for the deposits claimed to have been made, have been received and transmitted to the Receiver General; and (4) That the sums collected are the amounts which, after examination, appear to be the amounts which should have been collected.

(3.) Daily Return of Receipts:—The return transmitted daily with the bank receipts to the Receiver General should show the date of each receipt, the port, the amount and the service to be credited. Receipts for deposits made by collectors during the first days of July, in acquittance of June returns, should be entered on a separate return, and carried to the fiscal year in which the collection was made.

(4.) As no departmental summaries nor collectors' Returns have yet been furnished appertaining to the present fiscal year, I have to request that they may be furnished as soon as possible, and in accordance with the above; and that in future the usual monthly Departmental Summary and Collector's Returns should be forwarded regularly, and as early as possible in the succeeding month.

If there is any difficulty in complying with any of these requests I should like to have the difficulty stated at your early convenience.

This clause might be numbered (b), and the clause now numbered (b) might be numbered (c).

The plan decided upon in the case of bill stamps was followed also in respect of law stamps—that is, certain parties were appointed as distributors—and stamps were sold to them at the rate of \$95 for every one hundred dollars worth of face value.

I should like you to consider whether the amendment of the C. S. Act, referred to by you, precludes parties from purchasing stamps for distribution because they are employes of the Government, and otherwise subject to the provisions of the said Act.

On re-considering the question, I am not prepared to say that the C. S. Act, as amended, makes it illegal for a civil servant to deal in law stamps, as has been done by the Registrars of the Supreme and Exchequer Courts. But he should pay for the stamps when he receives them from the Department, and not, as now, after he disposes of them.

Please say whether this change will be made in the future.

1. That the St. John Bridge and Railway Extension Company, the Albert Railway Company and the Three Rivers Harbor Commission had been written to and their accounts furnished early in July.

2. On looking, during the past year, into the old assets enumerated by you, it has been found that (a) the City of Hamilton 5 per cent. coupons had been paid in error to the Province of Ontario, and correspondence has taken place to have the amount and interest thereon recouped to the Dominion; (b) The Quebec Government would seem to be liable for the Quebec Turnpike Trust debentures, and interest thereon. This question will be settled with the others now in dispute between the Provinces and the Dominion. (c) Nothing has been received from the remaining items. The Government receives interest from the Grand Trunk Railway preference stock when a dividend is declared; this, however, has not occurred for some years. The Bank of Upper Canada stock is worthless, and from some of the others I am sorry to say it is doubtful if anything will be realized.

My general statement for 1887-88, submitted under date 22 September, 1888, showed a balance of \$743.40 outstanding on account to end of May.

The statement "A" herewith includes this balance, and closes the account to the end of June, 1888, with a balance of \$276.15 carried forward to the credit of the account for 1888-89.

And the statement "B" herewith includes this later balance, and completes the account to the end of November.

Subsequent months will be dealt with separately, and a complete account will in each instance be submitted with my regular monthly returns to your office.

With regard to the composition of the account, you will notice that I credit the lines (the District Superintendent nominally) with the total collections due from the Canadian Pacific Railway Telegraph, and Indian Affairs, and Mounted Police Departments, whether paid in or not. This method will enable me to keep the account straight. When remittances are made from the Canadian Pacific Railway Telegraph, or when transfer entries are reported by either of the Departments, I credit the same in the respective accounts. And the amounts of these entries (being regarded in your office as revenue to hand, and credited to North-West lines), plus the balances due (according to my accounts) from these sources, should yield the same total that is nominally credited to the District Superintendent. Hence, at any time the accounts in your office and in mine may be brought into correspondence.

SIR,—Referring to items 3 and 4, Masters and Mates and Steamboat Inspection, mentioned in your letter of the 21st January last, I have to inform you that the statements of revenue for these two services for the six months ended 31st December last are being prepared, and will be forwarded to you as soon as possible.

With reference to your second letter of the above mentioned date, I have to inform you that as regards comparing the returns made of steamboat inspection dues by Collectors of Custom with the returns made by Inspectors of Steamboats, no arrangement has yet been arrived at by which this Department will receive regular returns of the dues collected by Customs officers. If you can suggest any plan by which regular returns can be obtained by this Department from the collectors I will have them audited in this Department. The law does not require collectors to account to this Department.

In regard to the revenue derived from the inspection of ships' registers, the amounts are, as you say, small, but if you deem it advisable to carry out the plan suggested in regard to this small revenue, I will issue circulars to the collectors, who are also registrars, and have the plan adopted. A number of the collectors deposit the fees along with their Customs deposits.

SIR,—I have to ask your attention to the following remarks arising out of the examination of the wharves and piers revenue that has so far come to account for the present fiscal year, and I would be pleased to have your explanations of the different cases stated:—

(1.) No returns or receipts have been received from the following wharves, neither for this nor the two previous years during which these accounts have been examined in this office:—Inverhuron, [Berthier, Les Eboulements, L'Islet, Murray Bay, River Ouelle, Rivière du Loup], Brooklyn Pier, East Bay, Port Greville, Hickey's Pier, Mink River, Port Selkirk, Victoria Pier and Wood Island. Those within brackets were leased to the St. Lawrence Steam Navigation Co. I have called your attention at different times to the fact that this company had not paid anything for years on account of the rent of these wharves.

(2.) No returns or receipts have been received from the following wharves for the six months ended on the 31st December last:—Pickett's Wharf, Oak Point and Lacolle.

(3.) Souris: No deposit or return for 1886–87, for 1887–88, nor for six months to 31st December, 1888.

(4.) Maitland: J. Douglas deposited \$17.47, and C. S. Stewart \$37.91. No return received for six months ended 31st December, 1888.

(5.) Port Maitland: The revenue for 1886–87 was only \$43.89 for 1887–88 it was \$50.32; for six months to 31st December, 1888, it was only \$17.51.

(6.) Lewis Point Pier: J. E. McDonald deposited \$83.50 in acquittance of two years' receipts to 31st December, 1888.

- (7.) Rondeau: 38 cents revenue in 1887-88; none for 1888-89.
- (8.) Cascades: \$14.11 came to account in 1887-88; none in 1888-89.
- (9.) China Point: \$37.50 came to account in 1886-87; none in 1887-88, nor in 1888-89.
- (10.) Murray Harbor South: \$16 came to account in 1886-87; none in 1887-88, nor in 1888-89.
- (11.) Cardigan Bridge: \$95.25 came to account in 1886-87, none in 1887-88, nor in 1888-89.
- (12.) St. Mary's; \$61.43 came to account in 1886-87, \$19.65 in 1887-88, none in 1888-89.
- (13.) Chapel Point: \$19.50 came to account in 1888-89, but no return.
- (14.) Goderich Pier: R. P. Bearman, lessee. Memorandum from Department states that this lease expired spring, 1887. Mr. Bearman writes that it expired spring 1889 and asks for a renewal. Information should be given of the action in reference thereto.
- (15.) Goderich Pier: J. Williams, lessee. The rental of this pier was \$150 per annum. Last year it appears, by the letter of Mr. Williams, that it was raised to \$205. Notice should have been given to this office of the increase. Your memo. also stated that this lease expired in the spring of 1887. Please explain why there was no increase in the rental for 1887-88. Only \$138 of the \$205 has come to account. Mr. Williams has deducted \$42 for handling lumber, and \$25 for time pier was occupied.
- (16.) Pownal: \$60 received on account of the receipts for six months to the 31st December, 1888. No return has been furnished. Wharfinger writes that as soon as he can collect the balance he will send it and the returns.
- (17.) Nine Mile Creek: \$7.92 received on account of the receipts for six months to the 31st December, 1888. The wharfinger writes that \$7 is still due, but not collected by him.
- (18.) Pickett's Wharf; Previously referred to. Wharfinger writes that \$20 was lost by the failure of Jacob Walton.
- (19.) Digby: \$75 was deposited Sept. 1, 1887, and \$100 April 12, 1888, but no return was furnished. No deposit or return has since come to hand.
- (20.) According to Appendix No. 10 of your Report for 1888 a number of wharves came under control of your Department during the summer and autumn of 1888. When new wharves are added notice should be given to this office. No deposit nor return has been received from any of the wharves added:—
- (21.) Buctouche: No revenue nor return since the date of the appointment of the wharfinger, 7th July, 1887.
- (22.) The rule that a deposit or remittance should be made whenever \$25 or more is on hand should be enforced.
- (23.) Should any returns be made for the six months to 30th June next, the deposits in acquittance should be credited to the present fiscal year.

Some of the returns furnished last year were sworn to by the harbor masters—some were not even signed. Chap. 86, Revised Statutes of Canada, Sec. 5, provide that returns shall be furnished on oath. This provision should be enforced, and it would be well to have the form of oath printed at foot or on back of each blank form of return. The oath should cover the following points:—

- (1.) That fees as per tariff were collected from all vessels entering the Harbor of _____, from the _____ to _____
- (2.) That the above is a full and correct statement of all such fees collected.

Chap. 86, Sec. 12, Revised Statutes, provides that fees shall be payable on vessels passing through or arriving at the harbors of Sorel, St. John, Three Rivers or Lachine. Why do the two latter harbors not appear now on your summary? They did formerly.

SIR,—In connection with the revenue from Dominion steamers during the present fiscal year, I beg to make the following remarks:—

(1.) According to the returns that have reached this office, the steamer "Stanley" made 54 trips between Prince Edward Island and the mainland—the first Dec. 18, 1888, and the last Feb. 23, 1889; and the steamer "Lansdowne" made 30 trips between St. John, Digby and Annapolis—the first Dec. 29, 1888, and the last March 7, 1889. The certificate of the captain and purser, verified by the agent of the Department, should be furnished, specifying that the trip run on a certain date was the first trip, the trip run on another date was the last trip, and also giving the total number of trips during the season.

(2.) The first trip run by the steamer "Lansdowne" was Dec. 29, 1888. The first deposit to the credit of the Receiver-General was made on the 23rd January. The last trip was on the 7th March. The last deposit was made on the 27th March. The total receipts of the season, amounting to \$3,144.76, were covered by ten deposits.

(3.) The first trip run by the steamer "Stanley" was on the 18th December, 1888. The first deposit to the credit of the Receiver-General was made on the 29th December. The last trip run was on the 23rd February, 1889. Deposits to close were made as follows:—\$1,092.06 on the 1st March, \$300.87 on the 11th March; and \$30.60 on the 16th March. The total receipts of the season, amounting to \$6,096.48, were covered by eleven deposits.

(4.) A deposit should be made to the credit of the Receiver-General on the completion of each trip.

(5.) According to the returns of the steamer "Lansdowne," there seems to have been no receipts for freight carried in trips Nos. 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12; and no receipts for either passengers or freight on trips 13 and 14. No explanation is given of the omission.

(6.) Certain expenses are still being paid out of the receipts, and the balance only deposited. I called your attention to this point in my letter of the 25th October last.

(7.) I also referred in that letter to the form of departmental summary and certificate.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 13th ultimo, in reference to revenue received from the Dominion steamers "Stanley" and "Lansdowne" for the present fiscal year, and in reply I am to inform you that the

steamer "Stanley" made seventy-nine trips between Prince Edward Island and the mainland—the first on the 18th of December, 1888—and she completed the seventy-ninth trip on the 9th of April, 1889, and the total earnings collected up to date amounted to \$8,330.11.

The steamer "Lansdowne" made thirty-seven trips—the first on the 29th of December, 1888—and she completed the last trip on the 25th of March, 1889. Total earnings, \$6,337.17.

The captain's daily report shows the number and date of the trip, and the purser's statement is verified by the agent, and checked with the captain's daily report when received in the Department, and under these circumstances a certificate from the captain and purser, verified by the agent, as suggested, would scarcely appear to be necessary.

As regards deposit being made at the completion of each trip, I may observe that this is impracticable, owing to the fact that the freight cannot be collected immediately, and sometimes the amounts for coupon tickets issued by railways and other conveyances are not received from the companies for some time after the trip is completed.

The receipt for freight, trip No. 8, was \$35.63; No. 9, \$76.97; No. 10, \$103.25; No. 11, \$14.76; No. 12, \$43.91; and for No. 13, freight, \$111.97; passengers, \$73; No. 14, freight, \$44.44; passengers, \$67.

Certain expenses have been paid out of receipts, in order to save paying a commission for advancing the amount, and thus avoid additional expense.

SIR,—I am in receipt of a letter from your Department, dated the 3rd inst., in reply to my letter of the 13th ult., in reference to the earnings of the Dominion steamers.

I still consider that the certificate of the captain and purser, verified by the agent, as to the first and last trips, &c., should be furnished. The captain's daily report is not furnished to this office.

You state that it is impracticable to make a deposit at the completion of each trip, as the freight cannot be collected immediately. If all the earnings of each trip cannot be deposited immediately on its completion, all the cash that has been received, either on account of that or previous trips can, and I have to request your particular attention to this point.

You state that certain expenses have been paid out of the receipts to save a commission for advancing the amount. I again repeat the question asked in my letter of the 25th October last: "Why are these expenses not paid and charged, as are all other expenses in connection with the running of the steamers? In any case the gross receipts should be deposited. See 49 Vic., chap. 29, sec. 27."

I pointed out that according to the returns of the steamer "Lansdowne" there appeared to have been no receipts for freight carried in trips Nos. 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, nor for passengers or freight on trips Nos. 13 and 14. I should have added trip No. 15. You reply, giving the amount of the receipts on each of the trips referred to, which amount to \$570.93. To this is to be added the earnings of trip No. 15. No returns

nor deposit receipts have yet reached this office covering these amounts. According to the bank returns, there are three deposits made by J. H. Harding in the Bank of Montreal, St. John, in February last, still outstanding, viz.: No. 707, for \$254.57; No. 717, for \$199.75; and No. 725, for \$185.92—total of \$640.24. Probably those are the receipts covering the missing returns. Be good enough to have the receipts and returns forwarded to this office as soon as possible.

Please let me know the arrangements with the Post Office Department as to the carrying of mails by the steamers "Stanley" and "Lansdowne" during last winter. I do not notice any deposit receipt for this service.

The receipts that have come to account for Prince Edward Island mail service for last winter are \$22.57. The receipts for that service for winter of 1887-88 were \$702.54. No returns have been furnished this office. I would like to have them.

You state that the total earnings of the steamer "Stanley" were \$8,330.11, and of the steamer "Lansdowne" \$6,337.17. I find that \$9,322.20 has come to account for earnings of the former and \$4,075.99 for earnings of the latter.

It would be desirable to carry all the statements asked for up to the date of the transfer of the business to Commissioner Smith in November last. Vouchers should be furnished for all outlay.

SIR,—I have received a statement of the letter of credit cheques drawn by R. Pope, Deputy Commissioner of Patents during the quarter ended 31st December last.

The amounts paid Mr. Grist and others for drawings are, I understand, collected from patentees, and deposited to credit of patent fees revenue. In this case these payments should be made a charge against that account, and not to expenditure.

An Order in Council of the 9th October last, in reference to payment of reporters, reads as follows.—“That authority be given for the payment of the official reporters, and of other reporters who may be designated by the Minister of Justice.”

I would like to have the authority of the Minister for the employment of Mr. Cook, to whom payments of \$143.55 and \$66 were made for reporting, and extending evidence in the case of the *Royal vs. Edison Electric Light Co.* Should the expenses of these enquiries or arbitrations not be borne by the parties to the suit, instead of by the Government?

With reference to the payments of gratuities to telegraph messengers, I would call your attention to the circular of the Accountant of Contingencies of the 14th November, 1888.

deposits evidently included part of the current day's receipts. Is there any reason why the deposit, which should be made every day, should not cover all receipts up to the time of making it?

SIR,—I am in receipt of your letter of the 18th instant, referring to receipts on account of patent fees, trade marks, &c., and in reply I have to inform you that the rule of depositing daily is complied with as far as it is practicable; depositing on Saturday is generally avoided, owing to the short day at the bank, and to the fact, that a deposit could not be prepared until near the closing hour.

In regard to the second paragraph of your letter, I would say it is quite impossible to deposit all the fees on the day on which they are received, for the reason that usually half of them are not in bankable funds; money orders and express orders largely compose the remittances sent, and they have to be presented at the Money Order Office for acceptance. Those from the United States are usually accepted on the second day or third day, while European orders are frequently delayed a week before they are pay-stamped, although sent daily to the post office. Payment of American express orders are likewise delayed; at the present moment the Accountant has in his possession two of these orders of \$40 each, which were received on the 17th instant, and presented at the express office twice since; and again, it is not an unusual occurrence to receive from \$100 to \$200 after banking hours by express packages and paid in by city solicitors. Postage stamps not receivable at the bank are also very frequently received for fractional fees.

I may take this opportunity to inform you that the Accountant, in accordance with Ministerial direction, and the requirements of the Act, cap. 19 of the "Revised Statutes of Canada," has furnished security to the amount of \$8,000, in order to guarantee his accountability for the monies passing through his hands.

SIR,—The revenue statements for the month of July received with your letter of Nov. 20 have been examined in this office, and I now beg to submit the following observations in reference thereto :

(1.) No counterfoils of receipts issued have been furnished, with the exception of those referring to the issue of hay permits. I assume that as soon as the new books of receipt forms are in the hands of the agents, counterfoils will be furnished, covering the total receipts.

(2.) As the permit itself is returned with the affidavit of the grantee, in order to determine the balance due it would be well that the amount paid at the time of issue should be entered on it.

(3.) When a payment is made in person the payer, as well as the agent, should sign the counterfoil. When a payment is made by mail the covering letter should be furnished.

(4.) Any spoiled or cancelled blanks should be returned with the counterfoils.

(5.) In the return from the agent at Brandon credit is taken for \$600 as for "Trust Account." I find only \$440 credited in the Trust Account as having been received from that agency for July. The difference, \$160, seems to be a payment by Maria Bower. After the entry on the agent's statement the words "Suspense Account" are written. I would like to have further explanation in reference to this item.

(6.) Please explain the nature of the Trust Account. According to the statements furnished me there was a balance of \$11,133.61 at debit of this account on the 31st of December last. Any portion of this amount that belongs to the Government, and further amounts as they become the property of the Government, should be transferred to credit of the Receiver-General. The cheques and vouchers in connection with this account should be furnished regularly in the same manner as any ordinary expenditure account.

(7.) All scrip redeemed for which credit is taken by an agent should be entered in detail on his statement, and the scrip forwarded to this office with the statement. Promptly on receipt the scrip will be checked off with the statement and returned to the Department.

(8.) According to the weekly statements of revenue received from your Department, a number of deposits made in July in acquittance of June returns comes to account as part of the revenue for the present fiscal year. I have to ask for a supplementary Departmental statement, with such returns from the agents as you have, covering the deposits above referred to. Deposits made in acquittance of an agent's statement should be credited to the year to which the statement appertains. I would suggest that this arrangement should be followed in connection with the statements for June next.

(9.) Please add the following paragraph to the Departmental certificate: "(5) That the scrip redeemed during the month, as stated in this return has been received, marked off in the registry of scrip ledger, and found correct."

SIR,—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 15th inst., enclosing a statement of the Trust Account for the month of January last. I referred to this account in my letter of the 6th inst.

I notice that credit is taken for expenses of school lands sales, \$70.70; for petty expenditure by E. H. Taylor, \$5.69; and for a credit to the Receiver-Generals' balance not expended, \$8.35: in all \$84.74. Please explain why these payments, which do not appear to be proper charges against this account, have been made.

The collections on Trust Account by Mr. Aikman, the agent at New Westminster, B. C., do not appear on the statements of Trust Accounts furnished. Please explain the nature of this account as well as the account in the name of the Commissioner at Winnipeg.

In my opinion all moneys received by any agent of the Government should be deposited to the credit of the Receiver-General. If it is not practicable to classify them at the time of deposit they may be credited to a special account. The Commissioner might be instructed to draw through means of his ordinary letter of credit to cover any refunds that it is necessary to make, and such refunds would become a charge against the special account.

A return should be made on the form for agents' return, of the receipts at head office, of all amounts which will not appear subsequently on the agents' return; and this return should be included in the Departmental summary for each month.

A return should also be made of the receipts at head office, which will subsequently appear on the Agents' Return, specifying in connection with each entry the agent on whose return it should appear.

Any receipts at head office so close to the end of the fiscal year as to render it impossible to have them entered on the agents' return for June should be entered by the agents on a supplementary return for June; and a Departmental summary of such returns should be furnished, with a view to having all receipts by the agents or at the head office carried to the year in which they were received.

On the 9th January, 1888, a cheque for \$250 was issued by the Department of Finance in favor of the Commissioner of Dominion Lands, on account of school lands, which, I presume, has been deposited by him to the credit of Trust Account. The Commissioner has lately sent in an account, with vouchers, for an expenditure of \$241.65 which will be sent to you in due course. The balance of \$8.35 was deposited by him to the credit of the Receiver-General on the 29th January, 1889, which explains the item of \$8.35 to which you refer. The other items mentioned by you, amounting to \$70.70, are accounted for by the Commissioner in the account for \$241.65 above referred to.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 17th instant, enclosing copy of correspondence with the Auditor General, regarding the statement of Trust Account for the month of January, and to say that the disbursements on account of school lands sales, referred to in the first paragraph of the Auditor General's letter dispose of the balance of the advance of \$250 made by the Finance Department, and deposited to credit of Trust Account on the 13th January, 1888.

In answer to the 2nd paragraph of the letter referred to the Trust account of the New Westminster agent is kept in his name, with the Bank of British Columbia at New Westminster, as it was found that owing to the great distance between that Province and Manitoba, and the discount chargeable on bank notes, the transmission of funds and cashing cheques would be attended with considerable difficulty.

The Bank of British Columbia, New Westminster will, no doubt furnish a statement of this account, if desired.

A weekly statement of this account is furnished to this office, by the agent of the Dominion Lands, and the bank account is inspected by Mr. Inspector Gordon, when he inspects the agency.

With reference to the enquiry as to the nature of the Trust Account, I beg to say that the sums which are deposited to credit of this account form no part of the revenue of the Department.

When application is made for inspection of the entries held by a homesteader, it is the rule to exact the deposit of a \$20 bond fee, which the applicant agrees may be forfeited and disposed of as the Minister may see fit, if the application proves to be frivolous or vexatious.

When cancellation is carried out, it frequently occurs that the value of the improvements made by the former homesteader is ordered to be paid for his benefit, and the sum so collected is deposited to the credit of the Trust Account and paid to him on application.

The balance of the Trust Account is composed of bond fees and payments for improvements, such as I have described, the only other items being fees which may be received by the agent, and held for a short time in suspense, pending receipt of instructions from your Department, or from this office.

If it becomes apparent that any of the items which are comprised in the Trust Account balance may, by change of circumstances, be transferred to the revenue of the Department, a refund cheque is at once issued, and the amount deposited to the credit of the Receiver-General.

Before the close of the present fiscal year it is proposed to enquire into the position of all sums which were received for improvements, and have been held for upwards of two years past, at the disposal of the former homesteader, but have not been claimed.

In many such cases the address of the person entitled to receive the improvements cannot be found, and such amounts will, if no cause to the contrary is found upon enquiry, be transferred to the credit of the Receiver-General.

You will no doubt remember that the keeping of this Trust Account was instituted in lieu of the former system, under which the various agents kept the cash in their safes, at considerable risk to the Department, and was established with your approval, and that of the Deputy Minister of Finance. See your letter of the 5th of January, 1886, No. 101564.

Since the Trust Account was opened with The Merchants' Bank on 1st June, 1886, the sum of \$920.10 has been received for interest on the balance remaining in the bank's hands.

SIR,—I am in receipt of your letter of the 15th instant, enclosing a letter from the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Winnipeg, dated 30th April last, in reply to my letter to you of 21st February previous, in reference to the Trust Account.

The Commissioner states in his letter that the Trust Account of the New Westminster agency is kept in the agent's name with the Bank of British Columbia; that a weekly statement of the account is furnished to his office; and that the bank account is inspected by Inspector Gordon.

I have to request that a copy of the Trust Account kept in the Bank of British Columbia, made up to the end of this month, may be transmitted to this office, and in future that a statement be furnished regularly each month with the statement kept in the Merchant's Bank, Winnipeg. Mr. Gordon should be directed to report to this office his inspection of the Trust Account.

I still consider that all moneys collected by an agent should be deposited to the credit of the Receiver-General and drawn again in the usual manner by means of the letter of credit. In any case, the cheques drawn against this account, both on

the Merchants Bank, Winnipeg, and the Bank of British Columbia, should be forwarded regularly each month with the statements.

I note the intention of the Commissioner to enquire before the close of the present fiscal year into the position of all sums held in this account for upwards of two years.

SIR,—I have received from your Department statements of sales of ammunition, military stores and clothing for the six months to December 31 ; also a statement of rents of military properties for the same period.

I now beg to offer the following observations on the general subject of the audit and examination of this class of revenue :

1. All requisitions for stores should be entered on the statement in consecutive order, even when the requisition is for stores for military companies, for which no payment is exacted. The requisitions should also be furnished: they can be returned at any time if required. In any case they will be returned on completion of the examination.

2. The statement should be certified by the Director of Stores and the Accountant, as follows :

I certify (a) that the above statement is a true and correct copy of the entries for the month of _____ in the register kept in this Department, in which all requisitions for stores, &c., are entered ; (b) that no issues have been made other than those entered above ; (c) that the prices charged are as fixed by _____ ; (d) that the bank receipts for deposits made have been forwarded to the Receiver-General.

3. Please inform me if it is customary to take an inventory of the stores on hand ? If so, I would ask for a copy of the last inventory taken.

4. The statement of rents should specify the respective dates to which the payments, then made, pay. A statement of all rents maturing during the period, and unpaid, should be furnished.

The counterfoils of the departmental receipts issued should be furnished, and the numbers entered on the statement.

5. The statement should be certified by the Deputy Minister and the officer in charge, as follows :

I certify (a) that the above is a true and correct statement of all receipts on account of rents of military properties during the _____ ; (b) that the statement marked "B" annexed hereto is a true and correct statement of all rents maturing during the _____ and which have not been paid ; (c) that the amounts received for rents are in accordance with the terms of the leases ; (d) that the bank receipts for deposits, have been forwarded to the Receiver-General.

6. In addition to the revenue covered by the statements of sales of ammunition, and of rents collected, there are receipts for the sale of horses and drill sheds.

A statement covering all such receipts should be furnished, as well as all the papers in connection with each sale, and the counterfoils of the departmental receipts issued therefor.

7. This statement should also be certified by the Deputy Minister and the Accountant, as follows :

I certify (a) that the above is a true and correct statement of all miscellaneous receipts received by this Department during _____ ; (b) that all properties sold were sold under departmental authority, and the proceeds deposited to the credit of the Receiver-General, less the expenses connected therewith, for which vouchers have been furnished.

8. In connection with the sale of condemned stores, the detailed statement of the auctioneer should be furnished, showing the goods sold, the gross amount realized, and the expenses ; and vouchers should be furnished for the expenses.

If any difficulty is found in carrying out any of these requests, please draw attention to it at an early date.

October, November and part of December, on account of great amount of work at officers' cottages, building new stables and out houses, I was compelled to take all the shoemakers and some of the tailors to assist at these most necessary works, endeavoring to have them completed as soon as possible, and before our winter set in. When the men came back to the shops in December there was so much work to be done—clothing for convicts, officers uniforms, &c.—there was no possible chance for any revenue. As it happened, dress uniforms and overcoats were due in October to a majority of the officers, besides the usual winter uniforms. Unfortunately, about this time our Tailor Instructor resigned, there was some delay, which could not be helped, before a new one was appointed."

Any expenditure which it is necessary to make out of the amount received for the fees can be made through the ordinary letter of credit in favor of Mr. Hartney, and charged against the account to which the fees were credited. That is the practice followed by the Customs and Inland Revenue Departments in making expenditure out of revenue, and should be followed by the House of Commons.

SIR,—I have your letter of the 29th ultimo, in reply to mine in reference to the fees collected on Private Bills.

I note your statement that the mode of dealing with these fees was settled some years ago by an order issued by Hon. Mr. Kirkpatrick, then Speaker and Chairman of the Board of the Commissioners on the Internal Economy of the House, and that my suggestion that these fees should be deposited direct to the credit of the Receiver General when received cannot be entertained.

I take the liberty of pointing out that this order seems to be at variance with Section 25 of Chap. 29, Revised Statutes of Canada, which reads as follows: "All public moneys, from whatever source of revenue derived, shall be paid to the credit of the account of the Minister of Finance and Receiver-General, through such officers, banks or persons, and in such manner as the said Minister from time to time directs and appoints."

If the words in this Act cover, as they seem to do, all that the resolution deals with, the Act must of course be obeyed.

Section 27 of the same Act also directs that the gross revenue shall be paid into the account of the Receiver-General.

The item of \$200 paid to the clerk who has charge of collecting these bills, should, in my opinion, be charged to expenditure.
