SIR,—I have the honour to submit the Public Accounts of the Dominion of Canada for the fiscal year ended 30th June, 1892, together with the usual comparative statistical tables.

The expenditure on account of the Canadian Pacific Railway has, heretofore, been included under the heading of Public Works. As the Government has now no claim on the railway the account should be transferred and shown under another heading. I would suggest that this should be done during the present financial year.

The receipts from Dominion Lands amounted during the year to \$322,796.38. The amount invested for Sinking Funds was \$2,027,860.79, and the total amount held on 30th June last for Sinking Fund purposes was \$28,583,475.29. The debt redeemed, including temporary loans but exclusive of Savings Bank withdrawals, amounted to \$9,837,579.69.

On the 30th June last the total amount at the credit of the depositors in the Savings Banks was \$39,529,547.63, an increase of \$129,521.47, as compared with the balance held at the end of the previous year. The interest allowed to depositors for the year amounted to \$1,320,580, and if this amount is deducted from the balance at the credit of the depositors it will be found that the excess of withdrawals of cash over cash deposits was \$1,191,058.53, as against \$3,960,964.14, in 1890-91.

To meet the withdrawals from the Savings Banks, and to cover the redemption of debt noted above, a new 3 per cent loan for £2,250,000 was floated in England. The minimum price was fixed at 91, and tenders were received for £6,950,000; the rate realized was about £92 0s. 10½d, as shown by the table of accepted tenders annexed.

The Dominion notes in circulation increased \$1,106,381.43, and at the close of the year amounted to \$17,282,698.66, which had increased on the 30th November to

\$18,045,577.16. Owing to this rapid increase in the circulation an Order in Council has been passed, under the power granted by the Currency Act, to issue notes up to the limit \$20,000,000 authorized by the Act. It will be a question for the Government to decide whether or not this limit should be raised.

The net debt of the Dominion at the close of the fiscal year was \$241,131,434.44, an increase of \$3,322,403.93 over 1890-91, accounted for thus:—

The rate of interest paid on the gross debt averaged for the year \$3.30 per cent, against \$3.35 for the previous year. The net rate of interest paid on the debt was \$2.93 per cent, the same as last year.

During the year silver and copper coinage to the amount of \$410,000 was procured for the Dominion through the office of the High Commissioner for Canada, and a quantity of uncurrent copper coin which had accumulated in the vaults of the department was sent to the mint and recoined, making a further issue of \$4,525.37. The profit on these transactions amounted to \$132,517.08.

It is a matter of gratification to be able to report that steps have been taken to appoint arbitrators to settle the outstanding accounts between the Dominion and the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, that Hon. Mr. Justice Burbidge has been appointed for the Dominion, and that Mr. Chancellor Boyd and Mr. Justice Casault have been appointed arbitrators for Ontario and Quebec respectively. I trust that by the close of the present fiscal year a settlement shall have been arrived at.

which, compared with the expenditure of 1890-91, \$71,071.65, shows a decrease of \$3,490.93. It may also be noted that the expenditure on the staff of the Department has steadily decreased from \$56,034.09 in 1883-84 to the amount above named, \$48,482.52.

All the work of the department is well up, and I have again to place on record my appreciation of the prompt and willing help I have received from the members of the staff, which, owing to my absence in England and subsequent illness during the year, has been all the more acceptable.

### TRADE WITH GREAT BRITAIN.

#### HORSES.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT,  
OTTAWA, CANADA, 30th September, 1892.

Owing to the higher rates of duty placed by the McKinley Bill upon horses imported into the United States, inquiry has been lately turned in other directions with a view to obtain a market for our superfluous stock.

In order to afford information on this point, with regard to Great Britain, in which there exists a large and increasing demand for horses of various kinds, the Minister of Finance has caused investigations to be made and reports to be submitted from the High Commissioner and Government agents in that country.

The following tables will show the course of exports of horses from Canada since 1887 and the nature and extent of the imports of the same into Great Britain :—

From this it appears that our exports of horses to Great Britain have been small and decreasing until 1891, when an extraordinary increase of 1,097 in number and \$138,329 in value took place. This has been more than maintained in 1892.

The exports to the United States, which has been our principal market, have decreased since 1888, and in 1892 show a drop of 6,857 in number and \$793,434 in value as compared with 1890, and of more than 50 per cent as compared with 1888.

The exports to the West Indies have shown a steady increase, although the amount is not large.

The total export of horses shows a decrease since 1888.

This shows that the demand for horses in Great Britain is large and rapidly growing, the import value having increased since 1887 over one hundred per cent. It also shows that but a very small portion of this demand is satisfied from Canada, thus opening up a possibility of very largely supplementing our contribution to that market.

An intelligent study of the grades and quality of horses required in Great Britain will, without doubt, enable Canadian producers and dealers to open up a large and remunerative trade with that country.

Appended hereto are the reports of the High Commissioner, of Mr. Dyke, Canadian agent at Liverpool, of Mr. Thomas Grahame, Canadian agent at Glasgow and of Mr. John W. Down, Canadian agent at Bristol.

#### REPORT FROM SIR CHARLES TUPPER, BART.

VICTORIA CHAMBERS, 17, VICTORIA STREET,  
LONDON, S.W., 19th March, 1892.

DEAR MR. FOSTER,—In accordance with your request, Mr. Colmer, my secretary, has been making inquiry under my directions, as to the possibility of developing a trade in London in Canadian horses of various classes. As you will have gathered from my previous communications, considerable information upon this subject was given in the reports from the agents of the Department of Agriculture which accompanied my annual report to Mr. Carling, and I have no doubt the particulars then furnished have already been circulated in different parts of the Dominion. In the course of the further investigations much valuable information has been collected, which I think will be useful to the farmers and breeders in Canada.

#### *Carriage Horses.*

There is, all the year round, a considerable demand in London for horses of this class for carriage work, and as hunters and hacks. It is estimated that over 40,000 carriage horses alone are in use in this city, of various values, ranging from £20 to £150 or more. Speaking generally, the age should be 5 to 6 years, and the colour bays and browns principally, although chestnuts and roans are not objected to. Nothing under 15 hands should be sent and the most saleable animals are those from 15·2 to 16 hands. If with good action they are likely to command a readier sale, and a guarantee of their having been broken, and being quiet in harness, is indispensable, as unbroken horses do not find

a ready or profitable market. As you are aware, one or two consignments of Canadian horses of this class have been sent from Canada during the last two or three years; and I understand they brought good prices, ranging about £60 on an average. Some of them sold at a lower price, while for others as much as 100 guineas were given. These horses ranged from 15·3 to 17 hands high, and those between 15·3 and 16 hands obtained the highest prices. They were all bred, I understand, from imported English stallions, had plenty of quality and substance, and many of them showed excellent action. Such horses are much sought after by leading job masters and dealers. A leading firm in London selling horses on commission, write me as follows:—

“We sell weekly, hunters, hacks, harness horses and ponies. The price of hunters varies according to their character, from 40 to 400 guineas. The price of harness horses according to their size and action, from 30 to 200 guineas, and hacks the same, with the addition of good manners. It is no use sending harness horses to be sold by auction unless they are thoroughly broken, and can be sold as quiet in single and double harness.”

#### *Cab Horses.*

To show the demand that exists in London for cab horses, I may say that the number of vehicles licensed last year was over 11,000, and it is estimated that about 15,000 horses are used for the work. They are generally purchased when from 4 to 5 years old; and as to colour browns appear to be the favourites, although there is no objection to any other colour, excepting perhaps greys, which are not regarded with favour. The London Improved Cab Company, which works about 600 horses, informs me that for a hansom cab a sharp, active, well-bred horse of good stamp, possessing substance, quality and action, is preferred. The height should be from 15 to 15·2 hands, and the age from 5 to 7 years. A half-bred mare put to a thoroughbred stallion produces the class of horses they require. A slow horse is of no use. Bays, browns and chestnuts are the preferable colours, but a good black can always find a place. The price usually paid for such horses is £30 to £35. The secretary states that they will be pleased to receive information regarding the importation of horses of a class suitable for their work; but adds that they do not buy unbroken horses, they must have been driven in single harness. The horses are bought usually from dealers in London, but the companies and individuals using large numbers also have agents who select and purchase horses in different parts of the United Kingdom, and they are bought subject to being found suitable for the work, and to passing the veterinary inspection.

In the course of my inquiries I ascertained that the London Improved Cab Company bought last year a few Canadian horses. Their ages ran from 5 to 6 years, and their height 15·1 to 15·3 hands. I am told that the horses were all of splendid substance, and look as though they would wear well. They were in good, hard condition when purchased, and required no driving or seasoning after purchase, but went straight into hard work. They carry more flesh than Irish horses, which I may say are largely used for the London cab work, and are hardly so sharp in harness, but they are regarded as excellent workers, as most reliable, and have all the appearance of lasting, which, from a cab proprietor's point of view, is, of course, most important. The price of this lot of horses ranged from £30 to £32.

#### *Horses used by Railway Companies in London, by General Carriers and for ordinary carting purposes.*

It is estimated that no less than 25,000 horses are in use in London in connection with the carrying trade, of which 6,000 belong to the railway companies. The balance are owned by the carriers, who not only act as agents to the railway companies, but collect and deliver goods on their own account, acting as middle-men, in this respect, between the merchants and manufacturers and the railway companies. In addition to the railway and carrying business, a large number of similar horses are in use for the Post Office work, and by the large wholesale and retail establishments in different



branches of business. The horses used for these purposes may be divided into four classes :

1. Heavy draught horses for dray work and railway shunting. The height of these animals ranges from 16·2 to 17·2 hands, and the weight from 1,680 lbs. to upwards of 2,000 lbs. The average price given for them is from £60 to £70. For exceptionally fine horses, which are mostly Shires, such as those used by brewers, by vestries, and for other very heavy work, as much as £90 to £100 is often paid.

2. Medium draught horses able to trot in one or two-horse vans. The height of these horses should be from 15·3 to 16·2 hands and the weight from 1,450 to 1,680 lbs. The average price is from £45 to £65.

3. Lighter draught horses for railway omnibus work. The height preferred is about 16 hands, and weight about 1,400 lbs. to 1,450 lbs. The price paid ranges from £50 to £60.

4. Somewhat similar but rather lighter horses for parcels cart work. Height from 15 to 16 hands ; weight, 1,350 to 1,450 lbs. ; price from £35 to £50.

Similar horses to those mentioned in classes 2, 3 and 4 are used for Post Office work, and by large business establishments for the delivery of goods.

Railway and general carriers use largely the class of horses mentioned in class 2.

The animals are usually purchased at from 5 to 7 years of age ; they are rarely taken under 5 years, or over 7 years. For London work they usually last from 4 to 6 years. The horses should be proportionately formed, well ribbed-up, and short legged, with plenty of bone and good feet. Particular attention is paid to the legs and feet. As to colour there is no especial partiality, but greys do not seem to be in favour. They are often taken a month on trial, or, at any rate, a guarantee is required from the seller.

I may say that considerable interest has been taken in the inquiries I have been making, by the railway and carrying companies of London. They appear to find an increasing difficulty in procuring the class of horse they require at a reasonable price, and I have no doubt that some importations of horses, of the classes to which I have been referring, would be much inquired after. My impression is that under proper and careful management a considerable trade could be readily developed, always supposing, of course (in view of the freight and other charges), the prices I have mentioned would leave a fair margin of profit to the shippers.

#### *Omnibus and Tramway Horses.*

It is estimated that there are 2,200 'busses employed in London, and that about 22,000 horses are used in connection with the work. The tramways also employ about 10,000 horses on an average. The omnibus horse lasts about five years and the tramway horse about four years. For omnibus work, horses with a fair amount of breed (half or three-quarters bred) on clean, short legs, not quite good enough for coaches, are required ; and the height should be from 15½ to 16 hands. They are generally purchased at from five to seven years old. There is no choice as to colour, although, here again, greys are not popular, and the average price seems to be about £36. This class of horse as a rule weighs from 1,450 to 1,600 lbs. One of the London companies informs me that they have some Canadian horses and that they are, upon the whole, suitable for the work, but are rather too long in the legs.

Tramway horses as a rule are rather smaller than omnibus horses, weighing about 1,300 to 1,460 lbs. Roans and bays are preferred and the average price is from £35 to £36. In all other respects the remarks I have made about omnibus horses will apply to tram horses.

The freight upon horses across the Atlantic is from £10 to £12 per head ; the steamship company only supplying fittings and water, the owner taking all risk and providing food and attendance. I have no doubt, however, that a lower rate could be arranged for a fairly numerous consignment.

The large number of horses employed in London is the best evidence that can be given of the market that exists for horses of the classes that can be readily reared in

Canada. In my opinion the best way to develop the trade would be for the shippers in various provinces to have representatives in different counties of the Kingdom to whom they could ship their horses direct. These would naturally be found among the dealers, but care would have to be taken to secure reliable and responsible men, and this can be done much better by the shippers themselves than by the Government.

The above report was shown to Mr. Walter G. Boswell, M.R.C.V.S., G.O.V.C., of No. 7, Lavender Sweep, Clapham Junction, who writes as follows:—

“With respect to the conversation regarding the prospects of finding a good market for Canadian horses in London, I have read the report drawn up by you, and can endorse the statements therein. The prices that good, sound horses are commanding have not been reached for years.

“A ready market is to be found for carriage horses, cobs for riding, cobs for driving, cab horses for hansoms, vanners and cart horses, provided that in the case of the carriage animals they show quality and good action; cobs for riding require to be up to weight and good walkers; cobs for driving must be sharp, quick, and have plenty of knee action; horses for hansom cabs require to be sharp, quick on their feet; vanners and cart horses require to have size and weight, short legs, with plenty of bone below the knee, good feet, free from sidebones, and not flat. Such animals command the highest prices, as being able to stand the London stones.”

#### REQUIREMENTS OF HORSES FOR ARMY PURPOSES.

In addition to this report the High Commissioner transmits the following letter from the Inspector General of Remounts for the British Army:—

HORSE GUARDS, S.W.,

WAR OFFICE, 16th July, 1892.

SIR,—With reference to your letter of the 17th March, and in continuation of my No. 116, Gen. No. 3338, of the 21st May last, I am directed by H. R. H. the Commander-in-Chief to forward you the following information respecting the class, &c., of horses purchased by Her Majesty's Government in Great Britain for army purposes.

In submitting horses to be purchased as remounts for the regular service in ordinary times, the following points must be remembered:—

Nothing but young, sound, good going, fresh jointed, promising stock, will be taken.

Age, from 4 to 6 years old. The Government does not look to obtaining a carefully broken, perfectly finished, good mannered horse, though a horse showing vice out of or in the stable will not be accepted.

Height, between 15 hands 2 inches and 16 hands.

Weight, draught about 11 cwt., riding about 9 cwt.

Colour; bay, brown, black or chestnut; no roans or parti-coloured horses are taken, and those of washy colours will not be accepted.

Tail; no short docked horses are purchased.

Blemishes of a material nature preclude a horse from being bought.

Soundness in eyes, wind, and limb essential; no stale, upright, or overshooting joints, and no curby hocks admitted.

Action must be good and true.

Classes—One-half of the horses required for the Royal Artillery and Royal Engineers are for riding, and the other half for draught. For Cavalry purposes, nothing but riding horses are required. Farmers in Canada should look to breeding from riding stock, as is done in Great Britain.

In forwarding these particulars I am also directed, by the Secretary of State for War, to inform you that no orders for the purchase of any horses for British army purposes in the Dominion of Canada can at present in any way be given.

With regard to the concluding paragraph of this letter, the High Commissioner says: "that although the Secretary of State for War may not be purchasing horses in the Dominion for army remounts at the present time, there can be no doubt but that the authorities would be glad to inspect any animals that might be sent here suitable for such purposes."

EXTRACT FROM REPORT OF JOHN DYKE, CANADIAN GOVERNMENT  
AGENT, LIVERPOOL, FOR 1891.

HORSES.

During the past season probably some of the finest horses ever shipped to the Dominion have sailed from this port. Specially noteworthy were the consignments of hackney stallions to Calgary, thoroughbred and coaching stallions to Moosomin and the Qu'Appelle Valley, hackneys and coaching stallions to Brandon, by Messrs. McGregor & Munn; and more important than any, the hackneys purchased by the Honourable Senator Cochrane. I feel sure that the value of this class of stock will become more widely recognized in the Dominion, and that each year I shall have to record more numerous purchases by Canadian breeders.

The demand for Clydesdale and Shire stallions for export has fallen off somewhat during the last year or two, but owners here find they can obtain almost as much for them as geldings for use in cities as they can by selling them for export. For the use of stallions of special merit, the demand here was never better, and the Welshpool Shire Horse Breeding Society is giving to Lord Ellesmere no less than £1,000 for the hire of his champion Shire stallion "Vulcan" to travel in their district for one season.

I am glad to note that several stallions closely related to "Vulcan" have been exported to the Dominion during the past year.

The total number of horses imported has been 21,715 as compared with 19,404 in 1890, and 13,859 in 1889. I am glad to note that there has been a material increase in the number sent by Canada, the figures being 225 for 1890, and 1,058 for 1891.

The demand for first class carriage horses continues to increase, and anything of merit finds a ready market here at the highest prices to be obtained in any country in the world. Dealers, who have agents always scouring the agricultural districts of England and Ireland, are annually finding greater difficulty in getting supplies of horses for hunting and carriage purposes. A very important trade has been conducted between Germany and this country during the last few years in first-class carriage horses, and considerable number of the best horses to be found, not only in London, but in Liverpool and Manchester, have been imported from Germany. The leading dealers are constant attendants at the horse sales in Hanover, Holstein and at Berlin, but apparently there also the supply of really first-class horses is not always to be had, and the numbers received from that country decreased from 12,600 in 1890, to 11,599 in 1891.

From the Dominion Trade and Navigation Returns, I glean that there were 16,550 horses exported during the fiscal year ending June, 1890: to the United States, 16,118; to Newfoundland, 157; to the British West Indies, 149; to St. Pierre, 1; and to the British Islands, 125. The value of those sent to the United States, as given in the returns, average \$117. You will be aware from my previous reports that I have for many years endeavoured to create a trade in horses between Canada and this country.

In February, 1877, I wrote a series of letters to the Canadian press, setting forth the classes of horse required for the European market and the best method of shipping and disposing of them, and as a result a good number of horses were shipped here. Since then, at different times, attempts have been made to develop this trade with varied success. The principal difficulty is that of the horses being selected by Canadians who are not sufficiently well acquainted with the requirements of this market; and the consequence is that whilst individual horses have fetched very high prices, showing a good profit, a number in each shipment were rejected by the dealers and the trade, and the losses on these in many cases absorbed the profit made on the better animals. With a view of getting over this difficulty, the late Mr. Joseph Grand started periodical sales in Toronto, at each of which he got together several hundred Canadian horses. I advertised these sales in the leading journals in England, in "Le Sport" in Paris, the "Cologne Gazette" and other prominent continent journals; in addition to this I wrote a series of articles which were copied in the sporting papers throughout Europe, and thus the attendance at Toronto was secured of several of the principal horse dealers and job masters, or their representatives, from various parts of Great Britain and the continent. Upon their return they expressed themselves as highly pleased with their purchases, and one of the largest of these dealers has from that time had an agent in Western Ontario buying horses for him. Unfortunately Mr. Grand died before the arrangements were placed on a permanent footing, and I look upon this as a great loss to the Dominion.

I have in former years referred to the advisability of establishing horse fairs in Canada, and I fear that no very great trade will be developed until this is done. The time of British horse dealers is too valuable to permit of their scouring the Dominion on the chance of picking up two or three suitable horses in a week. Companies have been formed in this country for the purpose of importing horses from Canada, and notable amongst them was the British Empire Horse Supply Association of London, established in 1877, with Lord Combermere as chairman. This, however, came to grief, as indeed have several other similar companies. The peculiarities of the trade in horses are such that I think, until the exacting requirements of this market are better understood, the selection must be left to the individual effort of the English dealer, who knows just what is wanted by his clients. It is to be regretted that the efforts of Mr. T. C. Patterson, the postmaster of Toronto, Mr. Wm. Hendrie, of Hamilton, Messrs. Allan, of Montreal, the late Mr. Simon Beattie, and others who were at great pains and expense to import the best classes of English thoroughbred stallions, did not meet with better support. The want of appreciation on the part of Canadian farmers in failing to use these stallions, necessitated the importers in several cases returning them to Great Britain. There is no doubt that the day of the low class horse has passed, not only in the Dominion and the United States, but in this country. Their sphere of usefulness is rapidly going, owing to the introduction of electricity as a motive power for tramways.

It is to be hoped that Canadian farmers will note these facts. Unfortunately, in many districts they have so little enterprise that, for the sake of a few dollars, they use stallions which beget wretched stock, and so forego all chance of profit. It seems a pity in the interests of the country at large that there is no regulation subjecting all stallions to an examination by competent authorities before being allowed to travel for hire, a supervision something similar to that exercised in France and other continental countries.

The State stud of stallions in France, standing for service at a nominal fee, was made up as follows at the beginning of 1891:—

The number of stallions owned by private individuals examined for certificate to serve in 1891 was 6,173, of which 5,992 passed. The rejections for unsoundness were only 2.93 per cent, as compared with 5.84 per cent in 1888, which shows the advantage of the restrictions against the use of unsound horses imposed by the French law of 1885.

The annual report of the general inspector of the German State Studts for 1891, which are under the control of the Minister of Agriculture, contains much interesting matter. These studts are of two categories, the three principal ones (Graditz, Trahehnen and Beberbeck) being reserved for the breeding of high class animals, while the twenty-eight Government depots are for stallions suited to get general stock. At the Graditz stud, near Torgan, the stallions and mares are nearly all thoroughbred, the majority having been imported from England; while at Beberbeck, in Upper Nassau, big carriage horses are principally bred, and at Trahehnen, in Eastern Prussia, the produce of the stud are chiefly thoroughbreds and riding horses, with as much blood as possible. There are about 3,000 stallions in the twenty-eight provincial depots, or 500 more than in the twenty-two of France, and no expense is spared in getting the best of each breed. There are types of the Hackney, Clydesdale, Shire, Percheron and Ardennes breeds to be found. Each stallion has about fifty mares in the season, the fee ranging from three to seventeen shillings, though for a few of the choicest thoroughbred sires, such as St. Gatien, Flageolet, The Palmer, Savernake, Breadalbane and Chamant, the exceptional charge of two pounds was made. The average of live foals to services is about 60 per cent, rising to as much as 80 per cent in Eastern Prussia, and the Government makes advances to private associations which buy stallions and mares, retaining a right of control over them, and exercising an inspection over all sires covering public mares. Premiums are awarded to brood mares, yearlings and stallions, while the number of horses annually required by the army is about 9,500.

Whilst a few horses of special merit have been imported from the Dominion during the last 15 years and have realized handsome prices, the bulk of them have not had sufficient size or quality to meet the requirements of dealers here. During the past year Mr. Thos. Hodgins, of London, Ontario, and Mr. Folkes, have made two shipments of carriage horses to this country. The first shipment was of a very superior class, and was greatly admired by the trade in London, where they were sold by auction at an average of nearly \$500 each. The second shipment, unfortunately, contained a proportion of inferior animals and did not make so high an average, although three of them, at public auction, brought upwards of \$500 each; four over \$400, and five over \$300.

Referring to this sale the *Live Stock Journal* says:—

“The Canadian horses sold at Aldridge’s fetched such good prices from London job masters of experience, as to suggest a danger to the home business, if we do not take the utmost precautions for the protection of the latter.”

And further:—

“It is stated that more than one-half of the good looking matched pairs of carriage horses we are using are distinctly foreign importations.”

I was pleased to learn that the results of these shipments will probably lead to a further development of this trade during the coming season. The stock raised in the district of London, Ontario, is, as you know, generally sired by English thoroughbred and coaching stallions, exactly the classes used for so many years in Schleswig-Holstein, Pomerania and Northern Russia, whence the finest specimens of horse flesh are imported into this country.

The very great importance to the Dominion of the export horse trade, which can hardly be less than that of horned stock, has led me to make particular inquiries as to the classes of horses required for the British markets.

The latest returns which are available for comparison show that there were in the United Kingdom 1,945,386 horses, whilst in Canada there were 1,100,000.

Some years ago there were a number of heavy draught horses included in the shipments from the Dominion, and two of these were bought for the stud of the Liverpool Corporation, which is one of the finest in the world. With regard to the

qualities of these two horses, and in reference to the whole subject of heavy draught horses, I cannot do better than give the following letter from Mr. Reynolds, the veterinary superintendent and manager of the Liverpool Corporation farms. Mr. Reynolds is acknowledged to be one of the best judges of horse flesh in the British Isles, and his writings on the subject are looked upon as standard works. He says:—

“In reply to your inquiry, I am very pleased to give you the results of my experience and observation upon the Canadian horses that I have come across at work.

“The great majority of horses imported into this neighbourhood from the Dominion have been of the light harness type, and I consider they are naturally sound, fairly free goers, and possess more than average robustness of constitution.

“In November, 1878, there was offered for sale at Lucas's Repository a small consignment of Canadian horses of the class especially suitable for pole waggon work; they were about 16½ hands high and weighed about 1,600 lbs. They were big bodied, handsome horses, with good action; they possessed hard, wearing-like legs and sound feet. Two of them came into possession of the Liverpool Corporation. One of them died in 1882 from disease of the digestive organs not attributable to inherent weakness; the other has worn excellently well, and is now a fairly useful animal, notwithstanding a continuous service of over thirteen years, a period of usefulness more than double the average of horses employed on town works.

“Horses of similar class to the above named two are rather too light in build to fulfil the requirements of the heavy dock traffic of Liverpool, but I have not the slightest doubt they would meet with a ready sale for the lighter and quicker street traffic of London and some important provincial towns.

“It cannot be too often repeated that the usual load for a team of two horses working on the line of docks in this city is, approximately, seven tons, exclusive of the lorry capable of withstanding the strain of so heavy a load.

“It is a fact, and one worthy of consideration by the breeders of draught horses, that ‘Percherons’ and Belgian horses are found to be quite unsuitable for Liverpool, and I am certainly within the mark in stating that there are not at the present time 100 Clydesdale horses participating in the heavy draught work of this sea-port.

“Geldings adapted by their size and build to suit the wants of railway companies, carrying firms, brewers, millers and commercial men having business here, command a very high figure, the best specimens being worth £100 apiece. There is an ever increasing demand for such horses that can scarcely be met by the limited number bred in England, and the field is open for the enterprising colonist, who can acquire the nucleus of a stud fitted to produce animals of the required type, and who has pastures adapted for raising them to their highest capabilities of development.

“I hold a very strong opinion that the demand for horses weighing from 1,700 lbs. to 2,000 lbs. can only be supplied by breeding from the ‘English Shire,’ and that any expectation of obtaining the highest prices for animals of less massive proportions will be met by disappointment and diminished profit to the producer.”

In my report for 1883, pages 169-173, I gave the opinions of the principal owners and users of draught horses as to the breeds most suitable for their work. The requirements have somewhat altered since that time.

My strong conviction that a large and profitable trade can be done by Canadians with this country in horses, led me to obtain an interview with Mr. Warburton, who is one of the buyers for the Cheshire Lines Committee (the Midland, Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire and Cheshire Lines Railways) and for Messrs. Thompson, McKay & Co., the well-known carriers, who own 600 horses. This gentleman has had 16 years' experience, and buys about 300 heavy draught horses each year, so that he can claim to speak with some authority on the subject. He informs me that Clydesdales are too small for railway purposes, that they have not sufficient weight, are short of bone, are deficient in stamina, and not powerful enough for the heavy loads, which range per horse from 3 to 6 tons, according to the gradients to be traversed. That this opinion is general is proved by the fact that there are not 100 Clydesdales in use in Liverpool in

railway or dock work. The horses required are Shires, between 5 and 7 years old, standing from 16·3 upwards and weighing towards 18 cwt. or more. For sound animals such as these between £70 and £80 is readily obtainable, while for anything of special size and merit there is no difficulty in getting £100 and upwards. A few weeks ago at the Rugby Fair, a Liverpool dealer paid £113 for a 6-year old Shire gelding, which was sent to a brewer in this city. Mr. Warburton himself within the last 10 days has bought 16 such horses as I have described, paying for them £1,187 or an average of £74 each. The general weight of the horses in the studs with which Mr. Warburton is connected is about 2,000 lbs., whilst a few will turn the scale at 2,200 lbs.; none of them stand below 16·3, most of them being 17 hands, whilst one of them is 17·2; their working life averages 5 years, and the average cost is £75. He does not hesitate to give more than this sum when he meets with a horse of more than ordinary merit, as he considers the best and soundest horses are the cheapest. They last longer, do the work more comfortably without any strain, are not so liable to fall lame, and bringing up their loads without distress and perspiring, they are not so liable to catch cold while standing. There can be no error in the conclusions arrived at by Mr. Warburton with the aid of the system of tabulation which is followed by the firms with which he is connected. When a horse is bought his price and all particulars concerning him are entered up, every day's sickness and absence from work is recorded, and when he dies or they have finished with him, his net cost is carefully calculated, and it has been found from many years' experience that the higher the class of horse, the longer is his working life and the less his sickness, and consequently the cheaper his cost. It is reckoned that the railway companies in England have at least 20,000 such horses in use, and as the average life is 5 years, it follows that they require to buy 4,000 per annum for renewals alone. The demand, however, is continually increasing with the expansion of trade, and the supplies are not increasing in the same ratio. For instance, the amount of shipping entered at this port and paying dues to the Dock Board was 9,772,506 tons, showing an increase since 1887 of 974,723 tons. It is estimated that the draught horses of Liverpool move some 10,000 tons of freight per diem, or a total of 20,000,000 tons per annum. Each horse must haul 7 tons per day, at 1s. 3d. per ton, in order to prove remunerative to the owner. The Liverpool Cart Owners' Association alone has 400 members who own no less than 4,000 heavy draught horses, and in addition there are a number of private firms and others who own large studs. These with the van horses belonging to tradesmen, &c., bring up the total to about 16,000. The number of heavy draught horses which have to be purchased every year in Liverpool is estimated at 1,600; nearly the same number is required in Manchester, and Glasgow requires very few less. It has recently been stated that 84,000,000 tons of general merchandise were hauled along the railroads of Great Britain in 1890, and the bulk of this was collected and delivered by railway horses. The van horses engaged in collecting and delivering goods to London, to which I am alluding elsewhere, number 6,000. The same authority gives the number of cab horses in London as 15,000. They are generally Irish and many of them are shipped direct from Waterford to the metropolis. As a rule they are four years old when they arrive, and only cost £30. As the freight from the districts in which they are raised will be about the same to Liverpool or Glasgow and other large centres of population in the interior, this may be taken as the average price of the English cab horses when purchased.

I am favoured with the following letter from the Liverpool Tramway Company :

"I have the pleasure to inform you that the average price paid for horses by this company during the year 1891 was £30. 14s. 10d. each: the number purchased 496; the average life 6·26 years. The general average life for the last seven years has been about 6·87."

Most of these horses are bought in England, Ireland and Wales. The horses for tramway purposes recently imported from Canada have not, I fear, shown a profit, in consequence of such a large proportion of them having been rejected by the tramway companies.

During the year 1891 horses have reached the port of Liverpool from the Argentine Republic. These, however, have been of a miserable character and with few exceptions could not have made a profit. Some of them were purchased for use on tramway lines and it is only in this class of horse that any competition need be feared from that quarter.

The London van horses are a distinct class of animal altogether. They are purchased mostly in England, not being bred either in Ireland or on the continent; they cost from £50 to £60; they are not bought under five or over seven years of age; weigh from 12 cwt. to 14 cwt., and stand from 15·3 to 16·2. Over 16·2 they are too big for this purpose. They must be active and clean, and not heavy boned; they are bred by light horses from heavy mares, or by heavy horses from light mares.

A word as to Belgian and Percheron horses. These were given a thorough trial some years ago in Liverpool, Manchester, Sheffield, Birmingham and other large towns, but it was found that they had no stamina, and their legs and feet went directly. They have been entirely discarded, and I do not think there are a score now being used in the whole of England for heavy draught purposes.

Before leaving this subject I must express my indebtedness to Mr. Derbyshire, of Messrs. Thompson, McKay & Co., who has made the draught and van horse supply of this country a special study for many years, for the great assistance and valuable information he has given me in reference to it.

## REPORT UPON THE DESCRIPTION OF HORSES SUITABLE FOR SCOTLAND.

[BY THOS. GRAHAME, DOMINION AGENT AT GLASGOW.]

SIR,—In accordance with your instructions, I would beg to state that I have made extensive inquiries as regards the above, and the following is what I am enabled to state upon the subject in regard to all the points contained in yours:

### 1. *Tram Horses, or for Light Vans.*

In all cases, animals must be sound. Height, from 15·2 to 16 hands, with clean legs; from 1,000 to 1,300 lbs. in weight. They may be of any colour. From 4 to 8 years old. Prices according to quality.

In the opinion of some, from . . . . . £27 to £40

In the opinion of others, from . . . . . 28 to 34

### 2. *Heavy Van or Lorry Horses.*

In all cases animals must be sound. Height, from 15·2 to 17 hands, with more body, and heavier all over, than tramway ones. From 1,200 to 1,500 lbs. in weight, deep ribs and short backs. They may be of any colour. From 4 to 8 years old. Should have clean legs and good big feet.

Prices, according to quality.

In the opinion of some, from . . . . . £30 to £60

In the opinion of others, from . . . . . 33 to 53

### 3. *Carriage Horses.*

In all cases animals must be sound. Height, from 15·2 to 16·1 hands. From 1,000 to 1,300 lbs. in weight. From 5 to 7 years old. Bays and browns are much the most preferable in colour, with as little white as possible, better with none; and if of superior quality with first-class action, blacks, dark chestnuts (light chestnuts no use) or even



greys might do very well. They must have good action, good ribs, feet indispensably good, open and not contracted, good compact heads and long necks, on short legs and short backs. They should be high steppers and straight goers, that is, not swing the feet round in their action.

As to price, all depends on class and quality.

According to some, from . . . . . £50 to £100 and even more

According to others, from . . . . . 40 to 75

Some animals in this class turn out to be useful hunters occasionally.

4. The present sources of supply, as far as I can ascertain, are the following, large numbers home-bred (in Scotland), some come from England, a good number from Ireland, some from the United States, and a fair number from Canada. A few also come from Holland, Germany, Russia, and South America, but these I understand are of inferior quality and not much liked. From all I can learn the supply is short here as regards *good* horses.

A suggestion was made to me by Mr. Alexander McKinlay, one of the most responsible dealers in horses in this city, that from five to ten horses of each class should be sent over to him to sell on commission, and that he would then report on the animals and advise the best classes to be sent in the future from a selection from those that arrived. Whoever had to do with sending them should keep a note of each horse, and a number should be attached to each, so that those sending the animals would be easily enabled to distinguish the ones that proved most suitable as referred to in the proposed report by Mr. McKinlay.

#### REPORT ON THE HORSE TRADE.

[BY JOHN W. DOWN, DOMINION AGENT AT BRISTOL.]

BRISTOL, 8th February, 1892.

Throughout the west of England there is always a constant demand for good horses, and I believe I may safely apply the same remark to the whole of England.

The hunter secures the premier position, and commands prices ranging from £50 to £300, and in cases of exceptional merit a considerably higher figure. Hunters are required at all heights, but are greatly in demand at heights varying from 14 to 16 hands, according to the nature of the country hunted. As a rule, in this country the hunter with plenty of blood and bone is bred from a half-breed mare by a thoroughbred horse. I may here point out that in England no attention is paid to the weight of horses.

Next in demand is the carriage or brougham horse, one bred similar to the above, only a heavier animal to the hunter. Carriage horses are usually sold in pairs, but singly they fetch from £50 to £150.

Then comes the gentleman's or lady's hack and hansom cab class, standing about 14 hands high, on strong, short legs, stout grown, and able to move well for riding and driving purposes. The prices in this class are regulated according to action and quality, some may be purchased for a nominal £25, while others will even fetch as much as £100.

In the next class we have the van or omnibus horses, which are preferred about 15 to 16 hands in height, and command a ready market at prices ranging from £20 to £50, according to the quality of the animal.

I am strongly of the opinion that the hackney sire is far more suitable to the requirements of the Canadian farmers for breeding purposes than the thoroughbred. I would suggest to those who have Canadian brood mares, to obtain a half-breed horse—(from a good cart mare and a thoroughbred horse)—when I am sure the result would show plenty of bone and substance.

Hunters, carriage horses, &c., are all bred in a similar manner. Colts bred in this way require careful attention during the first winter.

There are many thousands of horses imported annually to England from France, Germany, Holland, Buenos Ayres, &c., while Ireland keeps up a constant supply of several hundred weekly. Ireland has learned by experience exactly what England requires, and therefore breeds accordingly. But surely the Canadian farmer can supply the same as cheaply as the sister isle.

What is required is the sizable, symmetrical, upstanding, true-actioned, well-balanced animal, which will bear himself gaily and go in good form. Any one who is so fortunate as to breed such an animal standing not less than 15·2 or 3 hands high, and possessing such qualities, can readily dispose of him at remunerative figures. Some may, however, be tempted to remark, "This is all very true, but what are the conditions precedent to such a system of breeding?" To all such inquiries I would recommend the practice of using a hackney stallion, one possessing quality and action, with a mare which I might define as a strong half-breed, or of a class occasionally seen in parcel cart-vans, omnibuses and the like in every city of the Dominion. Many of these mares have in their veins the blood of the best kind, and previous to their coming into the cities have been doing the general work on farms. I think the Canadian farmer would do well to import one or two stallions, and endeavour to breed in the manner suggested in the foregoing, viz., a cart mare and a thoroughbred horse—for I am convinced that nothing would suit the Canadian brood mare better.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :—

Prior to the organization of the Department of Trade and Commerce, the parliamentary appropriations for commercial agencies and steam-ship subventions, as well as all negotiations for the extension of the trade relations of Canada with other countries were under the supervision and control of the Minister of Finance, and it seems fitting, now that these matters have been intrusted to the Minister of Trade and Commerce, to lay before Your Excellency a short sketch of the action that has been taken by this department in the above connection.

Taking up in the first place our commercial relations with foreign countries, it would appear that Canada now enjoys under treaties made by Great Britain most-favoured-nation treatment in the following countries :—

#### BELGIUM AND GERMANY.

In 1862, a treaty of commerce and navigation was entered into between Great Britain and Belgium, whereby articles, the produce or manufacture of Belgium, were not to be subject in the British Colonies to other or higher duties than those which were or might be imposed upon similar articles of British origin, and in 1865 a treaty of commerce was entered in by Great Britain with the German Zollverein, which contained similar provisions as regarded the British Colonies to those of the Belgian treaty, and further stipulated that any favour, privilege or reduction in the tariff of duties of importation

or exportation which either of the contracting parties might concede to any third power should be extended immediately and unconditionally to the other. In 1882, an effort was made on the part of Canada to be exempted from the provisions of these treaties, but as to carry this desire into effect would necessitate fresh treaty negotiations on the part of Her Majesty's Government, the exemptions asked for were not made and the stipulations of the treaties remained applicable to Canada. During the session of 1891, an address to Her Majesty the Queen on the subject of these treaties was passed by the Canadian Parliament asking that steps should be taken to denounce or terminate the effect of the provisions referred to. No action has as yet been taken in this direction, but early in 1892, treaties were made by Germany with Austria-Hungary, Italy and Belgium, and in the reductions in tariff thereby effected Canada shares. Thus in Germany reductions have been made on the following articles :—

The total imports from Germany during the same years were :—1889, \$3,692,570 ; 1890, \$3,778,993 ; 1891, \$3,804,090 ; 1892, \$5,583,530.

Our exports to the other countries named (Austria-Hungary, Italy and Belgium) are small, the largest exportation being to Italy (\$149,280 in 1892—nearly all dry-salted fish). With this country, however, we have no arrangements for most-favoured-nation treatment, having declined to accede to the treaty made by it with Great Britain in 1883.



## SPAIN AND SPANISH ANTILLES.

On the 26th April, 1886, a treaty was signed at Madrid between Great Britain and Spain, under which Canada obtained most-favoured-nation treatment in Spain and the Spanish Antilles. This treaty remained in force until the 30th June, 1892, at which date it was denounced by Spain, in consequence of a special convention entered into by that power with the United States of America. At once notice was received of the intended abrogation of this treaty, steps were taken to secure, if possible, for Canada the advantages accorded to the United States, and the High Commissioner was given by the Imperial Government full powers as joint plenipotentiary with Her Majesty's Ambassador at Madrid to make such arrangements with the Spanish Government on behalf of Canada, as the Government of Canada might deem most advisable with regard to trade with the Spanish Antilles. Although the Spanish Government has recently conceded to this country the benefit of the second column of the Spanish tariff, the United States enjoys exceptional advantages in regard to the class of goods provided for in the convention above referred to. This convention was of a double character, providing a transitory schedule of goods which were to be admitted free of duty or at reduced rates until the 1st July, 1892, that is to say, during the continuance of the treaty with Great Britain, and a definitive arrangement from and after the last named date embracing a much more extensive schedule. In the reductions effected by the transitory schedule Canada shared under the treaty with Great Britain, but the effect of the definitive arrangement may best be illustrated by the following statement which shows the volume of the principal exports from Canada to the Spanish West Indies during the year 1891-92 (the last year under the treaty) and the duties to which the goods are subject under the present minimum tariff as compared with the duties on the same articles when coming from the United States.

All the above articles are free when coming from the United States with the exception of flour, upon which the duty is \$1 per 100 kilos (220 lbs.), and in addition the United States goods are also apparently relieved from a 25 per cent war duty and an increase of 20 per cent, to which Canadian goods are subject.

## FRANCE.

On the 28th February, 1882, a treaty was signed between Great Britain and France to come into operation on the 16th May in that year, and to remain in force until the 1st February, 1892, then or thereafter to be terminated on one year's notice from either side. By this treaty the customs tariff in each country on goods imported from the other was to be regulated by the internal legislation of each state, and they guaranteed to each other reciprocally in the United Kingdom, and in France and Algeria, in all other matters the treatment of the most-favoured-nation. At that time France had a general and a conventional tariff, the latter being the tariff accorded to countries entitled to the privilege of most-favoured-nation treatment. By a French law promulgated on the 27th February, 1882, it was declared from that date goods of English origin or manufacture should be liable on their entry into France to the same treatment as those of the most-favoured-nations, with the exception of colonial produce, which it was declared would remain subject to the general customs tariff. In 1892 a revision of the French tariff was made, a maximum and a minimum column being established. In the Bill, as originally introduced by the French Government, the minimum tariff rates were usually about equal in amount to those of the old general tariff, that is to say, about 24 per cent above the old conventional tariff, and the new general tariff was correspondingly increased as compared with the old general tariff, but in the course of the passage of the Bill through the two Chambers further large changes were made. In order to be free in dealing with other nations, all treaties which in any way bound France to a particular custom tariff were denounced, the French Government being authorized to apply, in whole or in part, the minimum tariff to products or merchandise of countries which actually benefited by the conventional tariff, and which in return would consent to give most-favoured-nation treatment to French goods. It will be seen from the above that while goods from Great Britain entered France under the conventional and now enter under the minimum tariff, goods from Canada were and are subject to the higher duties, and if shipped through a European port, for example, if they go *via* England, are subject in addition to a *surtaxe d'entrepot*, equivalent to 3 francs 60 centimes per 100 kilogrammes.

Since 1878, at which time Sir Alexander Galt and Col. Bernard visited Paris as Commissioners on behalf of the Canadian Government, offers have been made from time to time with the view of effecting a commercial convention between this country and France, and extending the trade relations of the two countries. In addition to these efforts, the Canadian Parliament for a number of years voted \$50,000 as a yearly subsidy for a line of steamers to connect the two countries, and two attempts were made, both of which failed to establish and carry on such a line. Direct connection with a French port was made one of the conditions upon which Parliament in the year 1889 voted \$500,000 a year, to aid in the establishment of a fast steam-ship service across the Atlantic. By an Order in Council of date 16th April, 1892, Sir Charles Tupper was authorized to enter into communication with the French Government with a view to improving the trade relations between Canada and France, and in order to aid Canada in its wishes, the Imperial Government gave the High Commissioner full power as plenipotentiary with Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris for the purpose of the negotiations. A treaty has recently been signed, subject to ratification by the Canadian Parliament, but such ratification was not asked for during the session which has just closed, as the Government was awaiting the result of communications as to certain

clauses in the treaty, of some of which the meaning was not clear. Under this treaty the minimum tariff would be applied to certain articles of Canadian product or manufacture when imported direct from Canada, and the following statement which shows the rates in francs and centimes on these articles under the general tariff of 1882, and the maximum and minimum tariff of 1892, will also illustrate the course of French legislation :—

#### UNITED STATES.

The result of the adoption from October, 1890, by the United States of what is generally known as the McKinley tariff has been a large decrease in the exports to that country from Canada. Appended, beginning on page 120, is a statement of the changes made by that tariff on goods exported from Canada, and also a statement of the values of our principal exports to the United States for the last four fiscal years, a summary of which is as follows :—

It will be seen from the above that by far the largest decrease was in agricultural products, such as apples, barley, beans, split pease, malt and potatoes, and there was also a falling off in the exports of horses, poultry and eggs, on all of which articles there had been a heavy increase of duty under the McKinley tariff.

Since the abrogation in 1866 by the United States of the reciprocity treaty, Canada has, time and again, made advances for the resumption of the old or the inauguration of new relations upon some fair and equitable basis. A standing offer to make free or reduce the duties on certain named articles in case of equivalent reductions on the part of the United States, has been on the Statute Book for years, and still remains open for acceptance. In addition the Government has sent at different periods delegations to Washington to endeavour to arrive at a basis for more extended trade relations, the last visit being in February, 1892, when members of the Canadian Government met the then United States Secretary of State, Mr. Blaine, and for five successive days had a full, frank and prolonged conference upon the trade and other questions existing between the two countries. The result of the conference so far as the trade question is concerned may be briefly stated thus:—That it was found impossible to frame a treaty upon the basis of the mutual free interchange of the natural products of both countries alone; that manufactured goods must be included, and that any agreement for an interchange of natural and manufactured goods must be based upon preferential treatment in favour of the United States and upon a uniform tariff for that country and Canada as against the rest of the world. As this involved discrimination against Great Britain and practical tariff control by the United States the Canadian commissioners declined to accept these conditions. How far the recent change of administration in the United States will affect Canadian interests remains to be seen.

#### BRITISH WEST INDIES.

Efforts have also been made to extend our trade with the British West India Islands, and with this object in view, in addition to subsidizing lines of steamers, as will be hereafter noted, the Government of Canada in 1886 sent Mr. John T. Wylde to the Islands to bring to the notice of their inhabitants the trade advantages which Canada could offer. Mr. Wylde in addition to other places visited Jamaica and Barbados. Again in 1890, the present Minister of Finance visited the principal Islands, and submitted to the Governors of Barbados, Jamaica, the Bahamas, and the Leeward and Windward Islands, and as well also to the Governors of Bermuda and British Guiana the following propositions on behalf of Canada:—

1. “The Government of Canada will ask such legislation as will permit the introduction of all sugars, being the product of the British West India Islands, to be used for refining purposes at a reduction from the present duty of about 25 per cent, and of fruits being the product of the said Islands at a reduced differential duty to be agreed upon.

2nd. “In return for this differential treatment of sugars and fruits, the British West India Islands are asked to accord an equivalent differential treatment to the products of Canada imported into their territory, comprised under the following heads:—

- “ (a). The products of the forest.
- “ (b). The products of the sea.
- “ (c). Agricultural products of all kinds.

“(d). Animals and their products.

“(e). Coal.

“(f). Such manufactured articles as may be agreed upon.

“As an earnest of its desire to enlarge the trade relations with the British West Indies, the Government of Canada has already made arrangements to establish two important lines of regular steam communication—one to make sixteen trips per year between St. John and Demerara, touching at all the principal Leeward and Windward Islands, and one to make twelve trips per year between Halifax and Jamaica—the cost of which to Canada will amount to about eighty-three thousand dollars per year.

“In return for these services which are of equal benefit to both countries, the Government of Canada confidently expects the co-operation of your Government in the way of reasonable concessions to the lines established, and compensating liberal differentials upon the Canadian products above mentioned.

“If the principle of this proposal is accepted by your Government the details can be arranged either by correspondence or by a deputation from the British West Indies to the Canadian Government at Ottawa.”

By section 3 of the McKinley Act power was given to the President of the United States, after the 1st January, 1892, if he was satisfied that the Government of any country producing and exporting sugars, molasses, coffee, tea and hides, raw and uncurd, or any of such articles, imposed duties or other exactions upon the agricultural or other products of the United States, which in view of the free introduction of such sugar, molasses, coffee, tea and hides into the United States he might deem to be reciprocally unequal and unreasonable, to suspend by proclamation for such time as he deemed just, the provision of the Act in relation to the free introduction of the articles named, and during the time of such suspension duties were to be collected thereon as specified in said section 3.

In consequence of the power so given and under the threat of practical exclusion from their markets of the products above mentioned, the United States has made trade arrangements (among other countries) with Trinidad and Tobago, Barbados, the Leeward and Windward Islands and British Guiana, under which they have secured admission for an important list of their goods, especially in the line of farm products, either free or at reduced duties. No discrimination was, however, made in the case of the British Colonies against Canadian trade as the concessions do not apply to the United States alone, but are open to all the world. Appended hereto, beginning at page 74, will be found full reports from our commercial agents as to trade matters and requirements in the several Islands, and in British Guiana and, beginning at page 118, are appended statements showing the values of the principal articles of export and import between Canada and the British West Indies and British Guiana during the years 1891 and 1892. The total trade between these from 1889 to 1892 is shown by the following statement.

## CHINA AND JAPAN.

In 1889, an Act was passed by the Canadian Parliament, granting a subsidy of £15,000 sterling a year for a monthly or £25,000 for a fortnightly service between British Columbia and China and Japan in addition to subsidies to be given by the Imperial Government, and a monthly line of steamers operated by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company now makes direct connection between Canada and the countries named. Appended on page 124 are statements of trade between Canada and China and Japan during the past four fiscal years. It will be noticed that the exports to Japan have been doubled, and to China quadrupled during this period, the chief export to China last year being cotton goods, and the chief import from both countries being tea. Some wheat flour was exported last year to both China and Japan, and it is expected that trade in this article will develop rapidly, and it is said that there is a good market there for tinned butter.

## AUSTRALIA.

By the same Act of 1889 a subsidy of £25,000 was granted for the establishment of a fortnightly steam-ship service between Canada and Australia or a proportional amount for a monthly service. By an Act passed in 1893 this was amended so as to authorize the payment of a subsidy for a service not less frequent than monthly. An arrangement has recently been entered into for the immediate establishment of a service between Sydney and Vancouver, B.C., calling at Honolulu in the Sandwich Islands and Victoria, B.C., and making connection as far as practicable at Sydney with all local lines to ports in Australia and New Zealand. Two steamers, the "Miawera" and "Warrimoo" are to be used, each of a gross tonnage of over 3,300 tons, and capable of an average speed of not less than 15½ knots an hour, with saloon and cabin accommodation for at least 130 passengers, and with every comfort and convenience of best Atlantic liners of their size; they being specially adapted for tropical voyages. The service will be monthly, and the trip between Sydney and Vancouver is not to exceed twenty-one days, including one day's detention at Honolulu.

Appended will be found a full report from the High Commissioner of Canada and our commercial agents in England with regard to the British market and its requirements, and lines of trade which might be opened up and developed with advantage by Canadian shippers.

SOUTH AMERICA.

The subject of the South American markets has also been under the consideration of the Government of Canada. The proposal made to British Guiana has before been noticed, and proposals have also been made to Brazil for participation in the advantages accorded to the United States under the provisions of section 3 of the McKinley tariff. Mr. Simeon Jones, in 1888, visited the latter country as well as the Argentine Republic to bring to the attention of their people the advantages for trade which Canada offers, and for a number of years Parliament placed at the disposal of the Government the sum of \$50,000 to aid in establishing a direct line of steamers to Brazil, a vote which was never used, it being contingent upon the appropriation of a like amount on the part of the Brazilian Government.

STEAM-SHIP SUBSIDIES.

The Government of Canada has for a number of years past also endeavoured to develop trade by means of subsidized steam-ship lines. Mention has been made of the offer of a subsidy to a Brazilian line; of the fact that on two occasions for short periods subsidies were paid to lines between Canada and France; of the subsidies paid for the service to China and Japan; and of the arrangements just completed to establish a monthly



service between British Columbia and Australia. The Government is also authorized to enter into a contract for a period of ten years for the performance of a fast weekly steam-ship service with the United Kingdom, making connection with a French port, for an annual subsidy not exceeding \$500,000, but this line is not yet in operation, although on two occasions contracts for its performance were made, both of which fell through, the first from a failure on the part of the contractors to secure the necessary capital, and the second by reason of the death of the chief promoter of the company which was to undertake the service. For a number of years also subsidies were paid to the White Cross and Hansa steam-ship lines for a service from Montreal in summer and Halifax in winter to Antwerp and Hamburg, but these are not now subsidized. The only lines connecting Canada with foreign countries and which are receiving aid in the way of trade subsidies are the following, all being direct lines and not calling at ports other than those named :—

1st.—Furness Line—Between St. John and Halifax and London, England; at least twenty trips a year; annual subsidy \$25,000; three steamers employed on route.

2nd.—Halifax to Cuba and return, calling at Havana and Matanzas; one steamer making monthly trips; subsidy \$20,000 a year.

3rd.—Halifax to Jamaica and return, calling at Bermuda and Turk's Island both going and returning; one steamer monthly; subsidy \$15,000 a year.

4th.—St. John, N.B., to Demerara, British Guiana, and return, calling at Halifax, on the outward voyage, and at Bermuda, St. Thomas, St. Kitts, Antigua, Guadaloupe, Dominica, Martinique, St. Lucia, Barbados and Trinidad, both going and returning; two steamers employed; subsidy \$68,000 a year, namely, \$5,000 a trip for twelve trips and \$2,000 a trip for four extra trips.

The contracts for all these services will expire in 1894.

With regard to the trade done by these vessels, the Furness Line steamers have been on the route for a number of years and take out and in full cargoes of lumber and general merchandise; the Cuban line, so long as the treaty with Great Britain remained in force, carried cargoes to Cuba of an average value of about \$12,000, but the cargoes have fallen off since the abrogation of the treaty, owing to the excessive duties imposed on our goods as compared with those on goods coming from the United States; the Jamaica line for the three full years it has been running shows an increase each year in the value of the cargoes carried from Canada, the average cargo being in 1889-90, \$16,500; in 1890-91, \$22,300, and in 1891-92, \$25,150; the Demerara service shows an increase in value of cargo outwards from about \$12,000 on the first trip to between \$35,000 and \$40,000 a trip at the present time, and the nature of the goods carried can be best illustrated by the following statement of the outward cargo from St. John per steam-ship "Duart Castle" on the 29th September, 1892:

The return cargoes from the West Indies consist of sugar, molasses and tropical fruits, but no idea can be given of their value as the information is not afforded by the manifests and we have no method of arriving at it.

#### BULLETINS.

At once the McKinley tariff was adopted by the United States attention was directed toward the British markets as a means of disposing of the farm products which by its provisions were heavily taxed upon entering the United States. Special agents were sent to Great Britain, and the information collected by them and through inquiries made by the High Commissioner and his staff on the subjects hereinafter referred to, has been given to the Canadian public in the form of bulletins, which have from time to time been issued from this department, showing the needs and requirements of the British market in regard to the special lines named, the prices current therein, the mode in which the goods should be prepared and packed, &c., &c. The bulletins so issued were on the following subjects:—

1. Eggs and poultry—issued November, 1890.
2. do do December, 1890.
3. Poultry do November, 1891.
4. Eggs, poultry, canned goods and dried and evaporated fruits—issued May, 1892.
5. Horses—issued September, 1892.
6. Hay and condensed milk—issued January, 1893.

These bulletins and the information therein contained were distributed as widely as possible through the agency of the press, the Boards of Trade, &c., and copies were also sent direct to parties engaged in the trades treated of. It is gratifying to note the success which has attended the efforts of the Government in regard to the articles forming the subject of these bulletins. Thus the export of eggs to Great Britain has increased from \$820 in 1890 (the year before the McKinley Bill) to \$592,218 in 1892, and the export of horses from \$17,925 in 1890 to \$214,785 in 1892. Reference to the table given with regard to the exports of farm products to Great Britain will show equally satisfactory results as regards butter, cheese, bacon, canned meats and fruits, apples, barley, pease, oats, wheat and wheat flour, oatmeal and hay.

Generally speaking, the increase in the export of these articles to the United States in consequence of their tariff legislation has been far more than compensated by the increased exports to Great Britain, as will be seen from the following comparison:—

There is little doubt that with careful attention to the quality of the goods sent, the method of packing and other requirements of the British market, Canadian trade with Great Britain may hope for still greater developments.

COMMERCIAL AGENTS.

For a number of years past a vote has been taken for commercial agencies, out of which were paid the expenses of the Trade Commissioners above referred to. By Order in Council, dated 21st November, 1891, the present Minister of Finance was authorized to establish such a system of commercial agencies as he might deem most suitable, the expenditure upon the agencies and the printing of reports to be kept within the limits of the vote of Parliament. The Minister in the report upon which the order in question was founded suggested the appointment of resident corresponding agents at Yokohama, Shanghai, and the various important points in the West Indies, South America, in Europe and Great Britain, and so far as the latter country was concerned, he believed that the principal resident emigration agents could be advantageously utilized for this

purpose, inasmuch as they were already under pay of the Government, and their long experience and extended sphere of observation eminently fitted them for the work required. Accordingly under this order, the following commercial agents were appointed, from 1st April, 1893 :—

Edgar Tripp, Port of Spain, Trinidad, agent for Trinidad and Tobago.

G. Eustace Burke, Kingston, Jamaica, agent for Jamaica.

Edwin McLeod, Georgetown, Demerara, agent for British Guiana.

W. Ogilvie Bennett, St. Johns, Antigua, agent for Antigua, Montserrat and Dominica.

S. L. Horsford, St. Kitts, agent for St. Kitts, Nevis and the Virgin Islands.

Darnly C. DaCosta, Barbados, agent for Barbados.

The reports of these agents, which are appended, will show what is being done, and would indicate the beginning of a system full of promise. In this connection it might also be noted that in consequence of representations from this department, increased postal and money order facilities have been extended to the West Indies. Canada now exchanges money orders and parcels by mail direct with Barbados, Jamaica, Antigua, Dominica, Montserrat, Nevis, St. Christopher and the Virgin Islands, as well as with British Guiana, and also exchanges parcels by mail with Grenada, St. Lucia and St. Vincent, by way of Barbados.

In France the Hon. Hector Fabre has for a number of years past acted as agent for the Government of Canada, and so far as Great Britain is concerned, the services of the emigration agents have been utilized, and their reports are appended. These are as follows :—

J. G. Colmer, London ; John Dyke, Liverpool ; Thomas Connolly, Dublin ; H. Merrick, Belfast ; Thos. Graham, Glasgow ; and J. W. Down, Bristol.

These agents, in addition to their other duties, will answer correspondence relative to commercial and trade matters.

#### REPORTS AND STATISTICS.

In addition to the reports and statements above referred to, there is appended a list of the Boards of Trade in Canada, with the names of the president and secretary and number of members in each.

Sir,—In former years I dealt with matters connected with trade between Canada and Great Britain in my general report to the Minister of Agriculture, but as immigration has been transferred from that department, I have addressed my report relating to that subject to the Minister of the Interior, and have the honour to address you on commercial matters, for the year ended on the 31st ultimo.

You will be aware that, for many years, the Government agents in the United Kingdom confined their attention largely to the dissemination of information about Canada, and to promoting immigration to the different provinces of the Dominion. In recent years, however, they have, under my direction, been devoting more attention to commercial matters, and to stimulating and developing the demand for Canadian produce of various kinds in the markets of Great Britain. Their endeavours in this direction have been attended with considerable success. Their annual reports have, I believe, been read with much interest, and, I venture to say also, with profit in the Dominion; and they have been successful in bringing about an increase in the export of Canadian produce.

The imports into Great Britain from Canada have increased considerably within the last few years; the share of the food supply, which Canada at present contributes, is comparatively small, but is capable of indefinite extension if proper regard is paid to the requirements of the trade.

During the last twelve months, commercial matters have received a great deal of attention, both in my own office, and in those of the agents of the Department of the Interior, owing to the desire of the Government to take advantage of every opportunity of acquiring information as to the British markets, for the benefit of Canadian shippers and dealers, and in order to provide outlets for the trade which it became necessary to divert, as the result of the operations of the McKinley tariff. Reports have been made on various branches of trade; firms in this country have been stimulated to enter the Canadian trade, and much information has been supplied to individual shippers in Canada who have communicated with me.

It is gratifying to see from the Trade and Navigation Reports, for the year ending June 30th last, which have just been published, that the exports of Canada have reached a total never before attained, and that although the trade to the United States shows a considerable falling off, there has been an increase in the year in the exports to Great Britain of nearly twenty millions of dollars. When it is mentioned, however, that the imports of food into Great Britain reach the enormous figure of about two hundred millions sterling, it will be seen, as already stated, that there is ample room for the development of Canadian trade, especially as the soil and climate of Canada are admirably suited for the production, in large quantities, of most of the kinds of produce that are in such great demand in this country.

I cordially invite persons in Canada, interested in finding new markets for any kind of produce, either in Great Britain or on the continent, to communicate freely

with me, at any time. It will be a great pleasure to me to receive correspondence of that nature, and I shall be happy to give any information and assistance in my power, which may lead to the development of Canadian trade. In the case of enquiry of the kind, it may often be desirable that small samples of the goods should be sent to me, but it will be readily understood that I have no accommodation for receiving bulky articles. A few samples, however, placed at my disposal, might often help me in obtaining reliable information from persons interested in the trade. Correspondence of the kind will also be valuable to me for other reasons. British and continental commercial houses often write to me for the names of houses in Canada engaged in certain lines of business, in order that by corresponding with them, they may open up business relations. It will be seen, therefore, that a good list of shippers in the different branches of Canadian commerce would be of value to me in many ways.

Before dealing with the extracts from the December monthly number of the British Trade and Navigation Returns, which give the import of various articles, in which Canada is interested, for three years, I may say that I have been endeavouring to induce the Board of Trade to give more prominence to Canada in its returns, even although, in some cases, the trade may be comparatively small. So long as Canada, in the majority of items, is included in the monthly returns amongst "other countries," it is difficult to ascertain, until more detailed returns are published some months later, the extent to which we participate in the trade. I am glad, therefore, to be able to quote the following letter received from the Board of Trade on the subject:—

"I am directed by the Board of Trade to inform you that the suggestions contained in your letter to Mr. Meade of the Colonial Office under date 5th April last, as to separately specifying the imports of certain articles of food from Canada in the 'Monthly Accounts of Trade and Navigation,' were referred in due course to the Departmental Committee for the revision of the trade accounts for consideration at their recent annual meeting. The committee have now reported in favour of the separate specification of the quantities and values of the imports of bacon, hams and eggs from Canada, and their recommendations having received the sanction of the Lords of the Treasury, these particulars will be regularly shown in the monthly accounts for the future.

The Board would express the hope that, although it has not been found practicable to afford the desired information with regard to all the articles mentioned in your letter to Mr. Meade, the arrangements which have been made will afford satisfaction."

This letter is very satisfactory, so far as it goes, and I hope our trade will develop in such a manner as to warrant still greater prominence being given to the imports from and exports to the Dominion.

## WHEAT.

It will be seen that although the total imports of wheat for the year was valued at £24,887,902, the imports from Canada were only £1,443,938. In this connection, however, it must be remembered that prices have been about 10s. per quarter lower than they were on an average during 1891, which of course tends to reduce the aggregate value of the Canadian trade, notwithstanding that the quantity exported for 1892 exceeded that of 1891 by 700,000 cwts. There is no doubt that a very much larger quantity of Canadian wheat could be absorbed than is now imported. The hard wheats of Manitoba are much in favour all over the country; and, if in good order, readily brings 2s. to 3s. per quarter more than any other wheats upon the market. Only small parcels of Manitoba wheat have been received during the past year, but they were readily disposed of, and at favourable prices, compared with the quotations for other varieties. It may be mentioned in this connection that the Red Fyfe wheat from Manitoba and the North-west, at the recent millers' and bakers' exhibition in London, gained the champion prize and gold medal,—a fact which should be very encouraging to Canadian shippers, and induce them to pay more regard to the British market than they have hitherto done.

I beg to quote an interesting letter from the judges at the exhibition in question, on the various qualities of Canadian wheats exhibited, most of them, I may say, not for competition:—

“We, the undersigned jurors of seed, wheats and flours exhibited at the International Milling and Baking Exhibition, wish to express our opinion of the splendid sample of No. 1 ‘Red Fyfe’ wheat, amongst other Canadian wheats entered (but not for competition) by Sir Charles Tupper, Bt., G.C.M.G., C.B., High Commissioner for Canada, and Mr. Archer Baker, the European traffic agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, as follows:—

“That the wheat shown in the large glass vessel, No. 1, Hard Fyfe, would be most valuable to the British millers for mixing with English wheat, as when milled together it would give a flour of great strength and good flavour. A large produce in baking would be the result, and we only hope that in the future a good bulk of it will find its



way to this country. The No. 1 Hard Fyfe wheat also recommends itself as of great value, from a miller's point of view, not only in the above named points, but also on account of its clean condition and uniformity.

"Had these samples been in the competition they would have secured the Champion Prize; as it is, the Champion Prize was awarded to a Canadian grown 'Red Fyfe,' entered by the Government of Manitoba.

"(Signed), Wilson Marriage, (Last Mills and Dillridge Hill Farm, Colchester), J. Rank, (Clarence and Alexandra Mills, Hull), R. W. Dunham, (The 'Miller' Mark Lane, E.C.), Fras. Davis, (Albert Bridge Flour Mills, Battersea)."

MR. ROFFEY of 41 Seething Lane, London, E.C., says:—

"In reply to your polite favour of the 5th inst., which I regret has remained unanswered so long, I have much pleasure in placing before you a few facts which strike me, in reference to the Canadian Grain Trade.

Wheat, pease, oats, maize and barley ought to interest the grower in the order in which I place them; wheat most, barley least, the reason I place the latter last, is, that in your northern latitude, I take it that you can very seldom grow Barley with sufficient "sun" in it to compete with the inequalities of Europe, and out of the many thousands of quarters that annually pass through our hands it is all of very medium to inferior quality, and has to compete in price with the low class barleys of Southern Europe and Russia, and they, the Canadian, always give one the impression of having been cut before they were thoroughly ripe.

"With regard to maize, we invariably find that the condition of the shipments from Canadian ports is decidedly more risky than from American ports, suggesting that the grade inspection was not so systematically or carefully done.

"Canadian Oats are yearly growing in favour in the English markets and there is no reason why the trade in them should not develop very considerably, always provided the grade inspection is carefully attended to; for instance the early shipments are always the best, and the natural weight is gradually let down from 40 lbs. per bushel to sometimes 32 lbs. per bushel, without any warning from shippers, this causes great shyness in dealing in large quantities, and shippers would find it an advantage to guarantee a natural weight of some sort; they ought also to be more careful in keeping the two qualities distinct, viz.: White Canadians ought not to have a large admixture of blacks, and in Mixed Canadians, the proportions of black and white ought to be about equal.

"I look upon pease as being one of the best paying crops per acre in the general way next to wheat.

"Of flour, I know nothing, except that until a duty is put upon American flour the competition will be so keen, that there will be no room for legitimate profit.

"There is a great shyness as to taking your grade inspection certificates, as they are so frequently proved to be valueless on arrival of the grain on this side, and this is a great drawback to trade; at the present time I know for a fact that the business in pease to London has come to a standstill, for the simple reason, that several boatloads sold as Upper Canada No. 2, have arrived in London of very inferior quality even for Lower Canada; I believe they were all shipped by the same firm, but nevertheless, the certificates were all in order.

"But underneath the whole of your export trade to this country, lies the much vexed question of bills of lading (I am now speaking of trade done by the direct liners) so serious has this become, that in making contracts for American grain, many firms invariably boycott Canadian ports, for the simple reason that the documents tendered in exchange for payment are not strictly speaking legal tenders, they are purely and simply only railway receipts, and are not binding on the ship or captain; these are known in the trade as through bills of lading, and it often occurs that after having paid for your goods which are supposed to be shipped on board one steamer, that steamer arrives without any goods on board, and they ultimately come forward by the 2nd or 3rd or 4th; now, this not only upsets your calculations as to market, but it might nullify the insurance, besides which, supposing the shipper to have failed in the mean time, and my goods have been shut out of the steamer they were supposed to be shipped by, they could be seized by creditors in Canada, while I had

already paid for same in London; and I feel certain that so long as the Canadian shippers stick to this form of through bills of lading they will find a very great reluctance, on the part of London merchants at any rate, to deal with them.

"There is one other point which strikes me, that would give the Canadians a great pull over the Americans if they could arrange it, and that is if they could induce their steamers to discharge in Mill Wall Docks or Commercial Docks instead of the Victoria and Albert or the Tilbury; there is no reason why this could not be done, and they would gain a real advantage over the American shippers if they were to do so; of course you will see that these remarks only apply to the London trade.

"There is one other grievance, which occasionally annoys a London trader, with your steamer traffic, and that is we can never tell if these steamers intend taking the northern route, or sail direct for London; this all puts difficulties in the way of trade and you therefore cannot wonder that preference is given *always* to the American liners.

"I am afraid that I have written a great deal that may be very wide of what you want to know, but what I have mentioned, if rectified, would, I feel sure, greatly benefit and stimulate trade with London."\*

#### FLOUR.

The value of flour imported during the last year was £12,267,453, to which Canada contributed £701,913. It will be seen that the trade shows a considerable increase over the two previous years. The great proportion of it (£10,686,558) is credited to the United States. It is satisfactory to notice that Canada now occupies the third place on the list of exporting countries in regard to flour. The imports both from Germany and Austria have fallen off considerably. There is, however, ample room for an extension of the business, so far as Canada is concerned. The United States export almost as much flour as they do wheat; and, as it is the general impression that their exports of both commodities are more likely to decrease than to increase, owing to the fact that the area under cultivation is not expanding, whilst the population is largely increasing, the outlook for Canadian grain and flour on the British market is most favourable, providing the prices are such as to admit of business being profitably done.

#### BARLEY.

With regard to barley the total value of the imports was £4,313,452, a considerable decrease compared with 1891 and 1890. The figures do not, however, show the proportion contributed by Canada. Taking the figures, however, for 1891, the import from Canada was £122,149 as compared with £2,209 in 1890 and £496 in 1889. Considering the comparatively short time in which attention has been given to the British market for barley, the result cannot but be considered as eminently satisfactory. I doubt, however, whether the exports from Canada have been as large in 1892 as they were in 1891. Prices have been very low, and the Canadian samples were deficient in weight, and not satisfactory in colour. In fact, the year does not appear to have been an average one; and, in any case, the prices that have prevailed could hardly have yielded any return to the shipper. Whilst barley is so cheap, it is a question whether it is not more profitable to send the grain over in the shape of meat, and I am glad to notice that this matter is receiving considerable attention in Canada.

Barley coming to Great Britain is imported chiefly from the following countries, and against each, in parenthesis, is stated, the value of the imports for 1891:—Russia (£2,070,690); Turkey, (£1,079,143); Roumania (£903,573); France (£452,679); United States (£279,852).

These statistics show the extensive market Great Britain offers for barley, and it is a matter worthy the attention of Canadian farmers and shippers. Considerable interest has been awakened in Canadian barley during the last two years, and especially

\* *Note by the High Commissioner.*—Mr. Roffey has been informed that he is under a misapprehension with regard to the growth of barley in Canada, and that the climatic conditions are in every respect suitable to the raising of grain of the highest class. The other suggestions of Mr. Roffey, respecting the drawbacks to trade, are worthy of consideration.

in the efforts that are being made in the Dominion to grow two-rowed barley, the quality most suited for the market. It cannot be too often repeated, however, that proper attention must be paid to the cultivation of the grain; and it should be allowed to sweat in the stack before threshing, and not be threshed too closely. Last year there were considerable complaints that the barley sent over, was often not equal in quality to the samples from which the purchases were made. It was found that the barley sometimes contained rubbish; that the two-rowed and six-rowed were occasionally shipped together; and that the ends of the berries were frequently chipped off, which made them unsuitable for malting purposes. Another complaint was that time contracts were not kept, and that considerable loss was entailed, both to shippers and importers, by the delays which occurred, to say nothing of the feeling of want of confidence, which was inspired amongst many of those who were interesting themselves in the development of the trade.

It is really to the interest of Canadian shippers to send over only the best of all kinds of produce. It costs no more to bring over than inferior quality; a profit may be obtained on the former, but there is often difficulty in marketing the latter, and the chance of profit is small indeed. I trust this matter will receive the attention of the Government in order to see whether, by officially grading the barley, we cannot restore confidence in the market, and convince the importers that they may rely on receiving shipments in bulk of a quality equal to sample.

## OATS.

The total value of the import of oats for the year was £5,013,551. The returns with which I am now dealing do not give the names of the countries from which the imports chiefly come; but taking the returns for 1891, the total import was £5,475,734, of which Canada contributed £125,554. Most of the oats imported in the year came from:—Russia (£3,521,796); Sweden (£853,312); United States (£305,508); New Zealand (£206,512); Germany (£122,967).

There seems to be no adequate reason why Canada should not enter more largely into the trade, when the prices are favourable, being in as good position, to say the least, to engage in it profitably as several of the others which I have mentioned.

## PEASE.

The total importation was valued at £863,235. Canada contributes more than any other country, her proportion in 1891 being £342,399. The other countries engaged in the trade in 1891 (the details for 1892 are not yet available), were as follows:—United States (£22,212); British East Indies (£89,475); Russia (£64,210); Germany (£61,465); Holland (£35,587).

## BEANS.

In this trade the total value of the imports for the year was £1,365,221. Canada does not appear to send any. The principal countries from which the beans came were Egypt, Morocco and Turkey.

## INDIAN CORN.

There is a large trade in Indian corn in this country, principally for feeding purposes. The total importation was valued at £9,425,211. In this case, also, the details of the importation are not yet available; but in 1891, 975,594 cwt., valued at £310,637 are represented to have come from Canada. The following are the chief importations:—Roumania (£3,569,859); United States (£2,241,926); Russia (£1,593,416); Argentine Republic (£253,104); Egypt (£280,163).

I beg to quote extracts from letters received from firms engaged in importing the articles I have so far mentioned:—

Messrs. Norman & Company, 3 East India Avenue, London, E.C., say:—

“During the past year the grain trade generally has passed through an exceptionally depressing period, and the business with Canada has accordingly not shown that development, which, under ordinary circumstances, one would have anticipated. Cana-

dian shippers are partly to blame for the paucity of results, as generally speaking they have failed to respond to the tone of our markets. In other words, in a continuously falling market such as we have experienced throughout the year, the Canadian shippers by holding out for limits in excess of market values on this side have been compelled in the long run to sacrifice heavily, and where this has not been done, the trade has been diverted into other channels. In addition to this the Canadian new season crops are not up to the standard of last year, and this, for the time being, has exerted a further check."

*Wheat.*—"Having handled large quantities of No. 1 and No. 2 White Winter, also Spring and Goose wheats during the past year, we are in a position to state that the same have given every satisfaction, and there is every prospect of an increased trade resulting during the coming year—always subject to shippers being willing to compete with other grain producing centres."

*Barley.*—"The new season's crop is decidedly disappointing in weight and colour, and as the market is at present glutted with large home and continental supplies, maltsters have not shown much desire to operate at present. Of the two-rowed description we have handled some very good duck-bill barley, averaging about 54 lbs. to the bushel, which has given satisfaction, and if there were a larger outcrop of this variety it could be placed to advantage. The six-rowed variety has hitherto been much neglected, but here again we are pleased to report that there is a better feeling, and we are encouraged to hope that trade will be renewed during the coming year. Shippers must, however, be prepared to make the necessary concessions engendered by competition if they desire to establish this barley on our market."

"In oats and pease a fair trade has passed of a comparatively satisfactory nature."

"We are of opinion that Canada is making steady headway on this market, and probably during the coming year we shall be able to report a further development of her cereal trade with this country."

Messrs. Harris Bros. & Co. of 6, Crosby Square, London, E.C., say: "Only handle grain, and have nothing very special to say, except that the hard Manitoba Red wheats are fine, from crop 1892, and are much liked by millers."

Messrs. Henderson & Greenwood, of 33, Mark Lane, London, say: "We have handled during the year 1892 a large quantity of Canadian grain—the oats and wheat have been satisfactory, but the barley does not seem to give the satisfaction to the brewers it was anticipated it would do, and very low prices had to be accepted in consequence."

Messrs. Vogan & Co., of Mill Wharf, Dockhead, London, S. E., say: "We only deal in pease from Canada. Quality steadily deteriorates; probably seed is not properly selected. The points which make for value here and in Europe are":

1. "All one quality, viz. : white, blue, dun and maple pease each grown and shipped by themselves, not mixed together, each being more valuable if unmixed.
2. "As nearly as possible of one size.
3. "As free from oats and grain o. other descriptions as possible.
4. "As free from fly and worm eaten pease as possible."

Mr. Edwin Kay, of 62 and 63, Mark Lane, London, E. C., says: "The Canadian produce I handle comprises pease, oats and clover-seed, and I am pleased to say that the qualities of all during the past year 1892, have been most satisfactory."

In concluding my remarks upon this branch of the import trade, I may say that during the past year, the food supplies to Great Britain have been the subject of much discussion and of correspondence. The importance of being independent of foreign countries for food, is becoming more widely recognized, and there is a decided feeling in favour of using every legitimate means of encouraging the importation of such products from the colonies. I was requested to read a short paper on the subject at the annual

meeting of the United Empire Trade League; and I venture to quote some extracts in this report:—

\* \* \* \* \* “I have been requested to say something as to the wheat-growing capacity of Canada. Canada covers a larger portion of the continent of North America than the United States, excluding Alaska, and comprises one-third of the area of the British Empire. A considerable portion of it lies within the wheat zone, and is admirably adapted for the growth of cereals and cattle. The average yield of wheat in Manitoba and the North-west Territories, may be stated at from 20 to 25 bushels to the acre—a much larger yield than in the United States. This great undeveloped granary has only recently been rendered accessible by the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway. The farmers now there are chiefly immigrants with but little capital, working under the disadvantages that attend the opening up of a new country, and many of them are inexperienced; but notwithstanding these adverse circumstances the estimated crop of last year, raised by 19,000 farmers, in Manitoba was 23,000,000 bushels of wheat, over 14,000,000 bushels of oats, 3,200 bushels of barley, and 2,200 bushels of potatoes. The wheat crop of 3,000 farmers in the North-west Territories was 7,000,000 bushels. As only the fringe of this great wheat-field has been cultivated, some idea may be formed from these figures of what population and capital could accomplish at an early day. The import of wheat and flour into England in 1890 from foreign countries, represented about 130,000,000 bushels of wheat, and of this the United States supplied about 78,000,000 bushels. The average yield per farmer of wheat in Manitoba and the North-west of Canada being over 1,350 bushels, it will be seen that, with an export of but 1,000 bushels from each farm, it would take only 130,000 farmers to supply the whole demand in this country, and but 78,000 to provide all the wheat and flour that came from the United States. In the United States the total area under cultivation in 1889 was 146,281,000 acres, of which about 38,000,000 acres were under wheat.

“In Canada at the present time there are 25,000,000 acres under cultivation, of which, according to the census of 1881, only 2,336,554 were under wheat. Leaving out of computation the unorganized territories in the Dominion, and only taking about 50 per cent of the area of the provinces as land available for agriculture, it may safely be predicted that in course of time we shall have at least 500,000,000 acres under cultivation. As most of this territory is suitable for the growth of cereals and for the raising of cattle, it will at once be seen how large the exports of such products from Canada may become—ininitely larger than the exports from the United States at the present time.”

“So far, I have been chiefly referring to the newly opened up districts of Canada. It is, however, well known that all the eastern provinces of the Dominion already send large quantities of food supplies to this country. The export of live animals, meat, butter, cheese, wheat, flour, fruit, and other farm and dairy produce, and fish, amounts to about £10,000,000 per annum, the greater part of which goes to Great Britain, and most of the balance to the United States.”

“In addition to the organized portions of the Dominion, to which my calculations have been confined, there is the immense territory to the north, thus described by a Committee of the Canadian Senate appointed in 1887 to “inquire into and report upon the resources of the Great Mackenzie Basin.” After taking a great mass of evidence from men with an extensive knowledge of the country, including Hudson Bay Company’s officials the eminent geological professors, Messrs. Dawson, Bell, Saunders, Selwyn, and Macoun, missionaries, arctic explorers, the Hon. Mr. Dewdney, late Governor of the North-west Territories, and others, issued an interim report, 1888, in which they say:— “That the scope of the committee’s inquiry embraced 1,200,000 square miles of territory, and that there is a possible area of 650,000 square miles fitted for the growth of potatoes, 407,000 suitable for barley, and 316,000 suitable for wheat. That there is a pastoral area of 860,000 square miles, 26,000 of which is open prairie with occasional groves; 274,000 square miles, including the prairie, may be considered as arable land.”

There is a growing feeling in favour of giving some preferential treatment to imports from the Colonies, as compared with those from foreign countries, and I have

no doubt that this feeling has received considerable stimulus from the resolution passed by the Senate and House of Commons of Canada in the session of 1892. While the subject cannot be said to have been brought within the reach of practical politics at present, there is no doubt that there is a considerable current of public opinion setting in its favour. It has received expression at various meetings in different parts of the country and in the press. The discussions at the Congress of Chambers of Commerce of the Empire, the speeches of leading public men both in and out of Parliament, and the resolution in favour of the imposition of a duty on grain, passed by the recent Agricultural Conference, indicate a state of things that would have been deemed impossible a few years ago. The development of the food producing resources of the Colonies is a matter as important to the mother country, as to the colonies themselves, and everything tends to indicate that the question will be solved in a manner that will benefit the outlying portions of the Empire, as well as the consumer at home, and, at the same time, be beneficial to the British Agriculturist.

## LIVE ANIMALS.

It will be seen that under every heading, a slight decrease is shown in the imports from Canada. This no doubt is due largely to the unprofitable nature of the trade during the latter months of the season, and also to the restrictions on the importation of cattle from the Dominion, which came into force on the 21st November.

The prices of live cattle have ruled very low during the whole of the year, and especially in the latter half. Agriculture has been suffering from serious depression for the last two or three years, and the generally unsatisfactory season of 1892 has placed many farmers in a disadvantageous position financially. The hay crop was almost a failure; cereals, excepting perhaps barley, have been a poor crop; and prices (except for hay) have been unprecedentedly low. In these circumstances, therefore, in order to realize money, and in view of the high price of hay, cattle were forced upon the market, and in many cases were sold for sums that were ridiculous as compared with those realized a few years ago. No doubt the prices were also affected by the large imports of living animals and also of dead meat, a trade which continues to expand.

The price of fodder, and the difficulties of farmers, also depressed the prices of store cattle, and as it is this quality which largely comes from Canada during the greater part of the season, the prices must have been very unfavourable and unprofitable to Canadian shippers.

The reports I have received from different parts of the country indicate, generally speaking, an improvement in the quality of the cattle sent over and in some cases they brought prices equal to English stock, which, however, is not saying very much, in view of the depressed prices to which I have referred. On the other hand, mention is often made of low grade and indifferent cattle that are brought over and which are not viewed with favour by anybody. It cannot be too often repeated that it costs just as much to bring over an indifferent animal as one of good quality and that it is only upon the latter that even in the best of years a profit is likely to be realized. There is not only no money to be made of inferior stock, but it does not tend to improve the reputation in which Canadian cattle are coming to be held in English markets.

Most of the cows coming from Canada seem to be absorbed in the neighbourhood of Liverpool, and the estimation in which they are held is shown by the following quotation from *The Meat Trades Journal* of 17th December:—

“It was generally remarked at the Liverpool Cow-keepers’ Show that it had been an exhibition of Canadian cows, so many of those animals taking prizes offered by the Society.”

While this is very satisfactory, so far as it goes, I think it is a question for argument whether the export of cows from Canada is in the interests of the country. Not only should those of good quality be kept for breeding purposes, but in view of the increasing attention which is being devoted to developing the trade in dairy products, cheese, butter and condensed milk, it seems to me that the point I have raised is worthy of consideration. In proof of what I have stated, I would call attention to the fact that Canada exported during the last two years more cows to Great Britain than any other country. From Denmark and Sweden, which, as you will be aware, send dairy produce to the value of several millions of pounds sterling to this country every year, the export of cows has been rapidly falling off. In 1890 Denmark sent 32,699 cows; in 1891, 11,998; and last year 844. Sweden in the three years mentioned sent 1,660, 293 and 45 respectively. Even the United States forward few of these animals, while out of the total imports of 1892 of 10,506 cows, Canada contributed no less than 7,934. Of course hitherto the animals from Canada were admitted without any restrictions, and in this respect differed from some of the other countries; but this does not materially affect the question.

The Trade in calves is a very small one, and the imports of sheep and lambs seem to be very rapidly diminishing, no doubt largely in consequence of the wonderful manner in which the frozen mutton trade has developed from Australia, New Zealand, and the River Plate, although the prevalence of foot and mouth disease on the continent has had much to do with the decrease. This will be understood when it is stated that so recently as 1882—ten years ago—the imports of sheep and lambs were valued at £2,557,827 as against a total import of £124,239 last year. It is stated that at present

dead sheep can be imported from the River Plate at a cost of less than 2½d. per lb. ex-ship, including all freezing expenses, freight and insurance. The average price realized by Australian mutton for 1892, was 4¼d. per lb., and it is considered that it will be difficult to maintain that price in view of the competition from South America. This seems to indicate that for the present at any rate there is not much prospect of a revival of the live sheep trade.

I am sorry to have to report that Canada has been removed from the unique position she has occupied for so many years, in being one of the very few countries whose cattle are allowed to land in Great Britain without restriction, and to be moved about the interior with the same freedom as cattle raised in the country. At the end of September, two vessels—the “Monkseaton” and “Hurona”—arrived at Dundee from Montreal. The cattle they conveyed were landed and dispersed, but, nearly three weeks afterwards, two of the cattle were alleged to be suffering from pleuro-pneumonia. They were slaughtered, and the whole of the animals comprising the two cargoes were subsequently traced and killed; and in the examination of the lungs that followed, two or three more cases were discovered which the veterinary authorities of the Board of Agriculture, alleged to be pleuro-pneumonia. The Board of Agriculture, after fully considering the matter, decided that for the present, Canada must be placed on the list of scheduled countries. In this connection I may point out that very strong pressure was brought to bear upon the Board by the great English Agricultural Societies to take the step in question. It is hardly necessary for me to say that I did all I could to avert the blow which has fallen upon the trade, and my action in the matter was ably supported and strengthened by Sir John Abbott and yourself, who were in London at the time. I pointed out in the strongest possible way that pleuro-pneumonia had never existed in Canada, and that as the disease could only be communicated by actual contact, if the animals really had pleuro-pneumonia there would be other cases in Canada, which, however, all the efforts of the Canadian Government had failed to discover. I was also able to report to the Board of Agriculture that every animal shipped by the “Monkseaton” and “Hurona” had been traced to the farms from which they came, and that the localities had all been reported by competent veterinary authorities free from disease. I had several conversations upon the subject with Mr. Gardner, the President of the Board of Agriculture, and with the Marquess of Ripon, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and, in company with Sir John Abbott, also had a conference with a Committee of the Cabinet which had been requested to report upon the matter. As the season was so nearly at an end, I suggested that if Canada were not scheduled, any further exports, except those on the way and to complete existing contracts, might be prohibited by the Canadian Government, and that in the meantime, before the opening of the next season, ample opportunity would be afforded for making any investigations which the Imperial Government might consider necessary in order to prove to the most sceptical person, that pleuro-pneumonia did not exist in the Dominion. On the other hand, however, the veterinary advisers of the Board of Agriculture having reported that in their opinion the animals in question were affected with pleuro-pneumonia, the Law Officers of the Crown advised that the Board of Agriculture had no option under the existing legislation, but to place Canada on the scheduled list.

Mr. Gardner, in his speech to a deputation which waited upon him in connection with the matter, said:—

“We trust that the efforts of the Canadian Government, which we know to be a most patriotic and efficiently administered Government, will enable us to allow our trade with the Colony to be continued once again under conditions which so many of our country-men on both sides of Atlantic have found most advantageous.”

In a letter to the Colonial Office on the same day, November 5th, 1892, he said:—

“It only remains for me to say that the Board deeply regret that it should have become necessary for them, in pursuance of the statutory obligations devolving upon them, to withdraw a privilege which has proved to be advantageous and profitable to many persons both in Canada and the mother country, and it would be a matter of the greatest satisfaction to the board to find themselves in the position to restore that privilege, and to permit the trade in cattle between the United Kingdom and the Dominion to be carried on once again under the conditions heretofore existing.”



As several thousands of animals have arrived at British ports since the arrival of the "Monkseaton" and "Hurona," without a single case of disease having been discovered, I hope that it will be found possible before the opening of the next season to remove the restrictions that are at present imposed upon the trade, and you may depend upon the matter receiving my earnest attention.

At the same time, however, I would urge that the respective merits of the fat cattle and store cattle trade should be considered. It is a well-known fact that the fat stock which is sent over in the early part of the season, generally returns a fair profit to the shippers, while the return of profit on the store cattle which form the balance of the trade is very much less. For many years past cattle from the United States have been required to be slaughtered at the port of landing and this necessitates that the animals should be in condition for killing, on their arrival. Notwithstanding this disadvantage, the United States trade in live animals to Great Britain at the present time is of the value of £7,500,000 sterling per annum, in addition to a large export of fresh beef sent over in the carcase, and which is valued at about £4,500,000 sterling. But, apart from other reasons, the effect upon the farms of the home feeding of the cattle, and the utilization of low grade and inferior grain, which cannot be disposed of at a profit at present prices, deserve special consideration, and I therefore venture to mention them in this report.

## HORSES.

IMPORTS OF MEATS INTO GREAT BRITAIN.

The following table gives the figures relating to the importation of meat of various kinds, and they deserve the study of Canadian farmers and shippers, as showing the extensive market the United Kingdom offers for articles of the kind :—

## BACON.

The statistics do not show the proportion of bacon that comes from Canada, but there is no doubt that the trade from the Dominion is increasing. In 1891 the total importation of bacon into Great Britain was valued at £6,650,324, of which £284,115 came from Canada. It will be observed that the total trade has increased by over a million and a quarter sterling in the past year, Denmark and the United States being the principal countries engaged in the trade. During the last few months the prices of pork and pork products have appreciably increased. So far as I have been able to ascertain the Canadian bacon that is imported into this country is generally regarded with favour, and is quoted at a higher price than American bacon, as will be seen from the following quotations of a wholesale house :—

The price, however, is still below that given for Danish and British, which shows that something has yet to be done to bring Canadian bacon, as regards quality, into the front rank. The quality of the bacons produced in the Dominion, and the facilities for raising and feeding pigs, which undoubtedly exist there, have during the last year attracted the attention of capitalists engaged in the trade in this country, and especially of some gentlemen who have been instrumental in developing the Danish trade to its present dimensions. As the result of their investigations in Canada, they have decided to start a factory in the neighbourhood of London, Ontario, and I hope its success will lead to the extension of the business.

There is a very large demand for bacon in this country, as it is one of the standard dishes; and if proper attention is paid to feeding and curing, and the method of cutting, to suit the English markets, there is no reason why our exports of the kind should not considerably increase.

As I have pointed out on previous occasions the extension of the dairy industry in Canada ought to lead to an increase in the pork industry. There is a large amount of matter both from the cheese factories and the creameries that might be utilized for feeding purposes; this, in connection with the low prices of grain of various kinds, to say nothing of the inferior qualities which are always to be had in considerable abundance, might be converted into pork and bacon at a profit, which could not be realized by the disposal of the material in any other way.

## HAMS.

Very much the same remarks apply to hams, the import of which during the last year was valued at £2,963,712, the greater proportion of which came from the United States. There is no reason whatever why Canada, if proper arrangements are made, should not secure a larger share in this trade than at present, (in 1891 the imports for Canada were £196,296) and if the business is developed in a manner to meet the demands of the British market there is a tolerable certainty that the better quality of the Canadian product, largely owing to the better kind of food used in Canada, will command a ready market, and at a price equal to the product of any other country.

Not only is there a demand for bacon and hams in Great Britain, but on the continent as well, and both in Germany and France the Canadian products have been favourably spoken of.

I send you extracts from letters I have received from firms engaged in this trade:—

Messrs. Boyd & Grant, of 20 and 22 Matthew Street, Liverpool, say:—

“With regard to Canadian bacon and hams, the past season has been a favourable one for the manufacturers, on account of the persistent and extraordinary rise in the value of hog products, not only in England but on the continents of Europe and America. The present prices of hogs in Canada are very profitable to the Canadian farmers, as we believe the price now stands from  $7\frac{1}{2}$  to 8 cents per pound, dressed weight, which is the highest price paid for many years.

“With regard to the quality of the Canadian hog, we think we have done our duty in trying to improve the breed; for many years the hogs were getting in-bred, short and small. A few years ago we sent out about 50 Tamworth swine for breeding purposes, which we selected from the best breeders in England, and we are glad to say that there is already a marked improvement in the style of the bacon and hams now coming from Canada, but this improvement is confined principally to where we draw our supplies in the county of Oxford.

“With reference to the quality of Canadian bacon, our customers find no fault with the flavour of the meat; as far as the fat is concerned the quality is perfection, but a peculiarity of Canadian bacon (*which is a grave fault*) is, that the lean of it eats very hard and it is at once detected as not being equal to the product of the English or Irish curers. We were under the impression for some time that it was our style of manufacturing, but we have experimented in all the known methods of curing to try and remedy the evil, and we have come to the conclusion that it is not the fault of the manufacturer, but that the fault lies at the door of the farmer. We would suggest, to obviate the dryness and hardness of the lean of the meat, that your Government should recommend potatoes as a food, mixed with grain, in order to remedy the fault we have indicated.

“As you are aware, Canada is not what is termed a hog-producing country, although considering its wonderful position as a cheese manufacturing country, we do not understand why the hog is so completely ignored. Around Ingersoll there are large quantities of hogs produced and the production of swine is very satisfactory, but we think that arises solely on account of the business being fostered there by our packing-house.

“Another grave fault with the Canadian hog business is the absurd and old-fashioned custom of dressing hogs in the winter time by the farming community. We have from time to time pointed out the great loss incurred by farmers dressing their hogs, the business is then left to the country store keepers, who put down a few hogs for their own trade and manufacture an article that does not please home consumers and that is totally unfitted for export.

“Farmers also carry their hogs on until the winter time, instead of keeping up a supply and marketing from time to time: thus making them heavy and fat and unsuitable not only for the requirements of England, but also for the dwellers in the towns and cities of Canada. The heavy hogs are in less and less request every year, the product of which is only fit for the lumber-woods.

“The quality of the bacon made from frozen hogs is also unsatisfactory and the cost of manufacturing the product is twice as high as the cost incurred where the hogs are killed at the manufacturer's own packing house.

“In conclusion, there are three things necessary to bring the Canadian hog well to the front, firstly, some alteration in the food in order that the meat should eat more luscious and tender, *as far as the lean is concerned*; secondly, that the old-fashioned idea of dressing hogs should be abandoned; thirdly, a steady supply for packer's requirements, of the class wanted, all the year round. We have then no hesitation in saying that if the supply was doubled, or trebled, or quadrupled that the price would be higher, as it would attract men with capital to go into the packing business and raise Canada to a position equal to Denmark as a hog producing country. As far as we are concerned, it is not the competition we fear, but it is simply the lack of supply.”

Messrs. GILCRIEST & Co., 3 Peter Street, Liverpool, say :—

“The exports of Canadian hog products during the last year have been in excess of that of previous years but we understand to the detriment of home supply. During that period, Canadian bacon and hams have improved so far as quality is concerned, but there are many things left to be desired before they can hold their own with the other hog products of the world. They occupy a position midway between meats cured in the United States and those cured by European countries. American hog products have been getting better and better, farmers and packers uniting to turn out as fine an article as they can produce. This co-operation is what is wanted in the Dominion of Canada.

“Messrs. J. R. Grant & Co., of Ingersoll, Western Ontario, and Messrs. Bennett & Co., Toronto, have erected packing-houses replete with the most modern conveniences for their business, but we understand they cannot run a successful business because of the intermittent character of their supplies.

“In this and continental countries generally, the market for Canadian hog products cannot be maintained without continuity of supply, and Canadian farmers cannot afford to ignore this fact.

“They have too long considered it good enough to supply the packer with hogs when it suited them; and when it did not, they let him alone.

“The result in this country is, that the Canadian packers above mentioned, after much anxiety and trouble, in developing their markets and establishing a quick outlet for their goods, find themselves cut off for four or five months of the year, during which period nothing is sent forward to them, and when new supplies come forward, the work has to be gone all over again.

“We may call attention to the fact that in no other hog producing country of the world does this peculiarity exist. From the British Isles, Germany, Denmark, and the United States, a steady flow of supplies continues all the year round, thereby keeping before the public prominently their various manufactures.

“Some of the largest, we may say the very largest packers in Chicago, made their first efforts at pork packing in the Dominion, and have been compelled owing to the fact we mention to close their establishments there and open them in the United States.

“We may instance Messrs. Fowler Bros., who twenty years ago opened a packing house in London, Ont., and who now have established in Chicago a packing house handling frequently 50,000 hogs per day. Messrs. Morrell & Co., Ltd., Ottumwa, with a capacity for 30,000 hogs per diem, were also originally established in London, Ont., Messrs. Hatley Bros., made their first attempts in Brantford, Ont., but were compelled to change their business to Chicago.

“One of the few existing packers in the Dominion, Messrs. J. R. Grant & Co., Ingersoll, Western Ontario, is only able to manufacture one-tenth of his requirements in the Dominion. They, with Messrs. Bennett & Co., of Toronto, have for many years earnestly pushed Canadian produce in the United Kingdom, and we fear without much success to themselves owing to the intermittent character of the supplies. This ought to convince the Canadian farmer that there is no want of capital and no want of enterprise to back him up.

“Another feature we think advisable to point out is that the lean of Canadian bacon is too hard and dry, a fault we think would be remedied by a more varied character of feed, such as is given in Ireland, say a mixture of greater quantity of potatoes and softer food.

“There ought to be a great future before Canadian hog products if successfully managed.

“In our opinion the assistance of the Minister of Agriculture in directing dairy schools to report on the possibilities of hog supplies and hog feeding, and to render packers all the assistance in their power, would be a material benefit. Dairy farming and hog raising go hand-in-hand, and the success shown by government assistance in dairy farming, would be repeated in hog raising. To show what can be effected, we may instance Denmark, a country unsuitable for hog raising, but through state assistance

directed to dairy and hog products, has produced marvellous results and enabled the Danish farmer to place his butter and bacon in the front rank of the markets of the world.

“The Canadian farmer has now not only the British Isles for his produce, which for themselves would take all he could manufacture, but France, Germany, and other European countries, hitherto closed, are now open to him.”

The following interesting circular has been issued by the persons interested in the factory about to be opened in London, Ontario, and I understand 20,000 copies have been circulated in Ontario. It contains much valuable information to farmers, and might with advantage be included in my report:—

“The Managers of the Canadian Packing Co., who have started a business on the outskirts of the City of London for the manufacture of bacon suitable for the English markets, wish to place before all the farmers of the Province of Ontario the desirability of raising hogs after the fashion of the Danish farmers, who are acknowledged the best dairy-men and hog breeders in the whole of Europe, and we may even go still further and say of the whole world.

In the year 1880 Denmark was raising few hogs, compared with what she exports at the present time to the old country.

For example, we give below a table showing the rapid growth from the year 1880 to 1892.

From 1880 to 1882 Denmark exported to England 4,000,000 lbs. of bacon, equal to 17,000 hogs, or 4,250 bales, averaging two hogs per bale.

From 1887 to 1890 the export was 60,000,000 lbs. of bacon, equal to 140,000 hogs, or 66,250 bales.

From 1891 to 1892 Denmark exported 420,000,000 lbs. of bacon, equal to 1,000,000 hogs, or 463,750 bales.

Thus these figures (which are perfectly accurate) prove that from 1880 to 1890 the supply increased fifteen times as much in ten years. And from 1890 to 1892, the latter year which has not yet expired, seven times as much again in two years.

It must be remembered that Denmark is only about two-thirds the area of Nova Scotia, one of Canada's smallest Provinces. Denmark has at the present time nearly forty packing houses, of which the Canadian Packing Co. controls eight of the largest.

By the figures recently given, in the year 1880 only 17,000 hogs were made into bacon and sent to England.

At that time the price that Danish bacon was selling at was 15s. (nearly equal to \$4.00) under the price that Irish bacon realized. What is the result now? The Danish farmers, by simply paying close attention to the breed and quality of their hogs, can now produce over one million hogs annually, suitable for the English markets, and make the same price that Irish is now sold for.

These are plain facts which cannot be contradicted.

The Danish farmers always select the longest and best developed young sows, from the best mothers, more especially white sows, but do not use them for breeding purposes until they are six months old.

Of all the various breeds of boars, the White Yorkshire, middle size, has always given the most satisfactory results, and the quality of the bacon suits the English markets the best of all, as also in length, style and thickness of bacon.

Select your hogs for breeding purposes that are good feeders and which grow the largest on the same food, under similar circumstances, in the same time.

Never sell a good sow that has proved a good mother; nor dispose of a good boar that has produced good stock, on account of his age, appearance, or form.

The finest pork is made by feeding hogs on barley, rye, wheat, and peas (as grain food); but, besides that, you must use boiled potatoes, skimmed milk, buttermilk or whey.

Turnips (raw), cut small, are excellent to mix with grain.

We strongly advise farmers to avoid feeding hogs on indian corn, or maize, for this reason; it tends to make the meat extremely hard, coarse and dry; and the fat that should be a firm white, it causes to be very yellow, oily, soft and rank.

It shows itself in that form after it is smoked and cured.

If you use Indian corn, or maize, only, you will not be able to produce better pork than the Americans, and the English trade does not demand such quality, nor will they pay the price, as it would be impossible to classify such meat as finest.

Bear in mind, that it does not cost more to make the finest quality than the common American bacon.

Hogs most suitable for the finest bacon should range from 180 lbs. to 220 lbs., live weight, which weight will pay the farmer the best.

The trade requires a long, lean hog, with good, well developed hams, thick, straight bellies, and fat on back not to exceed one and a-half inch thick.

The Danish Government have proved many times by experiments on their farms the various values of the different sorts of food for hogs, and the results they exactly gave as to the individual merits of the foods are as follows:—

440 pounds of grain	make	100 pounds of live hog.
One pound of grain	equals	4 lbs. of boiled potatoes.
“ “ “	“	6 lbs. of skimmed milk or buttermilk.
“ “ “	“	8 lbs. of turnips, cut small.
“ “ “	“	12 lbs. of whey.

(This is a tabulated form translated from the Danish Government Dairy Report.)

Barley, rye, wheat and pease produce the best pork.

All grain should be ground and soaked overnight, and mixed with other foods, and given to the hogs when on the point of turning sour. In all cases feed hogs with mixed foods, which will give the best and most valuable results.

Never give more food than a hog can comfortably eat, and also remove any food left in trough not eaten.

Hogs will grow faster and do much better by keeping them perfectly clean in every respect.

In cold or wet weather keep the pens or styes well littered and dry. This extra trouble will repay farmers, as it always gives the best results.

Six or eight weeks previous to marketing in the summer, and when it is not cold, allow the hogs a range for exercise; and if a farmer studies his own interests, he will never feed his hogs previous to shipping them, as in many cases he loses one or more before or about the time of delivery, as many have proved to their cost in the past.

The Danish Government have given special attention to bringing the pork packing and butter making industries to the highest standard of perfection, by instructing the farmer in producing the best quality, and at the least cost, and the results have been most satisfactory to every farmer in Denmark.

The Danish butter is acknowledged to be vastly superior to that of Canada, and it is possible that the Danish whey or buttermilk may be superior in feeding quality to that of the Canadian.

The London market is the most critical market in England. The Danes send what London wants, viz., long, lean bacon, and their product is appreciated, and is seriously handicapping all American and Canadian meats.

Now, we hold that what the Danes have succeeded in doing,—and that in a climate similar to Canada,—Canadians can do, and do easily. Only let the farmers of Canada raise the right kind of hogs, feed them on the Danish principle, keeping the animals dry and warm, and of course thriving and doing well,—then the Canadian farmers will see that by raising all the hogs they can, it will pay them better than anything else on the farm, just as clearly as the Danish farmers see it, and a big future is in store for Canada.

To insure a good market, it is absolutely necessary that a steady supply be maintained all the year round, in order to meet and satisfy the demand of the English consumer.

If the farmer regards his own interest, he will sell his hogs on foot, alive, as he will obtain more money that way than by dressing his own hogs at home, and also save a lot of time, trouble and expense to himself and family. Besides, the Canadian Packing Co., *must* have the hogs they buy delivered *alive*, as they can dress them to better advantage, produce a finer quality and better style of Bacon, and realize a greater money value, by utilizing much of the offal which the farmer must necessarily throw away; and again, with the facilities now possessed by packing houses, they are enabled to kill and dress so much more *expeditiously*, that a large item of expenditure is also saved, thereby enabling the packer to pay the farmer a higher price for the live hog. These facts show why the farmer should always sell his hogs alive. Any farmer can easily satisfy himself on these points if he will take the trouble to practically test the results, by weighing one lot of average sized hogs,—say three or more,—and seeing what they would bring alive, then to kill and dress the same hogs and note what they would fetch at the same time and in the same market killed and dressed.

The Canadian Packing Company will commence to buy in the spring of 1893, and for the convenience of farmers who deliver their hogs locally or direct, will receive hogs at their packing house, east of the City of London, every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, on or before 10 o'clock in the forenoon, and will pay the highest market price for finished hogs.

For hogs from drovers, commissioners, or jobbers who buy' on the outside districts, to be shipped here from different points on the Railroads, the Canadian Packing Co. will receive every day in the week (Sundays excepted), in carload lots, and will pay the highest price of the day for finished hogs."

#### FRESH AND SALTED BEEF.

Canada has taken but little part in this trade, no doubt in consequence of the facilities which have hitherto existed for the export of live animals from Canada to Great Britain. The total value of dead beef imported, however, exceeds over £1,500,000, of which the greater part comes from the United States. While I hope, as explained in another part of this report, that the restrictions now imposed on the Canadian cattle trade may be removed before the opening of next season, I think the dead meat trade is one to which more attention may profitably be devoted in Canada, (if the prices offer sufficient encouragement, which, however, is a matter of further enquiry) especially considering that, even in favourable seasons, the margin of profit in the case of store or lean cattle is comparatively small.

#### PRESERVED MEATS.

This also is a trade in which Canada has taken but small interest up to the present time, although there is a large market for commodities of the kind in various large parts of the world. The following paragraph which has appeared in the British papers is full of encouragement to any packing houses which may decide to take part in the business.

"The Canada Meat Packing Company has, it is announced, been awarded a contract from the French army office for 15,000 cases of canned corn beef. The firm in question tendered in competition with Armour and other large United States firms. The samples of the Canadian product were, it is said, so much superior to the United States goods that the French authorities have stipulated no price, allowing the order to be filled at the current wholesale price."

#### MUTTON.

The frozen meat trade continues to develop and I have made some remarks respecting it, in dealing with the importation of sheep. I am afraid, having regard to the present state of the market in this country, and to the increased supplies that are coming from Australasia, and the River Plate, at very low prices, that there will not be much opportunity for a development of Canadian exports, in this direction, for some time to come.

## BUTTER.

The butter trade still continues to increase, and the imports for the year reach the marvellous total of nearly £12,000,000 sterling, to which Denmark, France, and Sweden contributed £9,000,000. It will be noticed with satisfaction that the imports of Canada have more than quadrupled in the last three years, and I believe that the attention which the Government is now devoting to the matter, through the experimental farms, will eventually be instrumental in placing the trade in as satisfactory a position as that now occupied by Canadian cheese. The visit of Professor Robertson to Great Britain recently, and the energy and ability which he displayed in bringing to the notice of those interested, the facilities that exist in Canada for the production and export of dairy produce of all kinds of the highest quality, will, I have no doubt, lead to an increased trade. The great development in the exports from Denmark, France, and Sweden is entirely owing to the systematic way in which the preparation of butter, and its exports, have been organized and supervised by the Governments in at least two of those countries, and to a uniform quality being maintained and regular supplies ensured. Australasia and New Zealand are now beginning to export butter to Great Britain in considerable quantities, and the trade is fostered and encouraged not only by official inspection, being exported under the auspices of the Government, but by in some cases the payment of a bonus to exporters, the bonus increasing in proportion to the prices realized by the butter in this market. Professor Robertson mentioned to me when here that he saw no reason whatever why the butter trade from Canada should not increase enormously, and that, he believed this result would be achieved within the course of a few years.

The following letters received from houses engaged in the trade are interesting :—

MR. ARTHUR J. ROWSON, of 35 Tooley Street, says :—

“ I have not handled a great deal of this article, but what I have seen has been exceptionally good, though not shipped from the Creamery, whilst quite fresh ; and I strongly recommend producers to give a trial to weekly or fortnightly shipments continuously throughout the Season 1893, as they will thereby ensure the highest average price. I also favour grease-proof paper linings.”

MR. J. T. WARRINGTON, of 49 Tooley Street, says :—

“ The arrivals this season have not been suitable for the London Market because, (1) the quality has run too irregular. (2) the majority of arrivals have been too salt. (3) the butter has arrived woody at the sides and top by not being protected by butter paper.

“ Tubs holding 56 to 60 lbs. carry the butter in as good condition as can be expected.

“ I should recommend shipments to be made regularly every week for sale here immediately on arrival, at best price ; so that the buyers may get confidence in the article which, when once established, will make the trade a success.”

MR. J. B. EILERS, of 12 and 13 Water Lane, E.C. says :—

“ \* \* \* I would observe that in my opinion butter should be exported to Europe during the summer and autumn months, and this for the reason that of late years large and increasing quantities of butter are landed here from New Zealand and Australasia, at the beginning of December and during the winter months. Hence, Canadian has a better chance of getting value, when landed here in the months of August, September, October and early in November. I would suggest also that the packages should be made casks of beech or oak of, say, 112 lbs. net in each cask, and half casks of 56 lbs. in each. The tubs now used are not in great favour being too much like American and frequently mistaken for the product of that country, the irregularity of the weights and tares is also of some little hindrance in the regular sale. Of late, French butters and also those above referred to from Australia and New Zealand, are all of a regular net weight in each package.”

MESSRS. FORREST & TURNBULL, of Leith—say :—

“ Canadian Creamery—Although the quantity imported this season has been very considerable, it would have been much larger if shippers had sold their fresh arrivals as

they came to hand instead of putting these into cold storage and holding for a better price (the quality in the meantime deteriorating.) On the whole, the quality has not been satisfactory—it has turned out to be more or less oily or fishy flavoured. Whether this is caused by the feeding, it is difficult to tell, but it is most objectionable. The Government Brunswick Dairy Station Creamery has just arrived in this country, branded “fall made.” The quality when new made has no doubt been very fine, but it has been kept until it has (at the sides) become quite tallowy flavoured and rendered at least 10s. to 15s. per cwt. less in value than if it had been shipped fresh and new made.”

## CHEESE.

Canada now occupies the position of sending more cheese to Great Britain than any other country. The total value of the imports for the year just ended having been £5,417,770, of which Canada's share was £2,493,625 as against £1,961,407 from the United States. But this trade is in such a satisfactory condition that it needs no comment from me and will doubtless continue to develop and drive inferior grades out of the market. Complaints have, however, been made recently of some of the exports not having been up to the mark and this led to a resolution being passed by the Bristol Provision Trades Association detrimental to cheese generally from the Province of Quebec. The matter at once attracted the attention of the Minister of Agriculture who requested Professor Robertson, through me, to investigate the matter, in order that the resolution being founded on imperfect information should not pass into operation. Professor Robertson has accordingly been in communication with the association and I hope his representations will be successful.

A firm largely engaged in the trade, Messrs. Coey and Company, of Tooley Street, has represented to me the desirability of Canadian cheese being branded with the month in which it is made, if it can in any way be managed satisfactorily. At the present time orders for August, September and October, cheeses are sometime filled with those made in June and July, the quality not being so good or the price so high as those for the later months. This does not of course apply to the many houses engaged in the export trade, but they deem it necessary to protect the trade here against any improper sales of the kind. Professor Robertson also looked into the matter, and I have no doubt, will report the result of his investigations to the minister on his return. We cannot do too much to keep the Canadian cheese trade on the high level it now occupies, and it is to the advantage, not only of the producers, but as tending to give confidence to the public, in the case of many other varieties of provisions, which can be exported profitably from the Dominion to this country.

I commend the following letters, on the subject of the cheese trade, to your consideration :—

MR. ARTHUR J. ROWSON, of 35 Tooley Street, says :—

“The fodder and early grass make of 1892 were too stiff and leathery ; such goods are not required and are a stumbling block to quick repeat orders, as the consumer finds that they get harder with age.”

\* \* \* \* \*

“The absence of a brand on the skins of Cheese (which brand I suggest should contain the date of the make of each cheese, and the words “Canadian Produce”) has helped unscrupulous Shippers to send United States America Cheese as Canadian (notwithstanding the efforts of Customs officials) also to ship July and August cheese (by cold storage) as September's, which has robbed the legitimate September make of its true value, to the detriment of every one concerned, save the defrauder. Again, in the early part of the season, cheeses are offered as 14 days old, when they are only 4 to 6 days old. The date branding would, therefore, be conclusive and act as a general production.”

“Personally I favour government legislation on the branding.”

“Ingersoll section, as a rule send sound, well-seasoned boxes ; other sections seem indifferent to the quality and strength of package, so long as it is a package. Green or unseasoned wood spoils flavor, promotes mould on tops and sides of the Cheese, and causes excessive loss in weight.”

MESSRS. WALLIS, SONS & Co., of Custom House and Wool Quay, say :—

“The Canadian Cheese we have received into this port has, generally speaking, given great satisfaction, the quality finds favour with consumers and some factories have shipped beautiful cheese, silky in texture and of perfect curd.

“Our greatest grievance is the outrageous mutilation of the boxes. Hundreds are delivered into the buyers' warehouses without lids and with mere fragments of boxes enveloping them. Not only is this a most serious drawback and inconvenience to the buyers, but it occasions a great loss of weight, to the importers' prejudice and often converts an otherwise profitable transaction into a loss.

“Again, the inexactitude of the quantities delivered by the ships or their agents is a difficulty fraught with mischievous results. Out of twenty deliveries, we have had eleven inaccurate; one, two or more cheese short in each lot, and odd marks and stranger cheese put in the bulk to make up.

“This state of looseness in the deliveries is vexatious and expensive, and a drastic reform is needed here.”

MESSRS. TRENGROUSE & Co., 51-57 Tooley Street, say :—

“Canada has now a first place in the English markets, but there are still further improvements to be made and safe-guards to be provided to maintain this supremacy and retain the confidence of the English importers and it is the earnest hope of our Committee that through the agency of Professor Robertson (whom we have been pleased to welcome) the following suggestions or most of them, may soon be carried into practical effect.

“It is the unanimous opinion of our Committee that every cheese should be skin branded with the date of manufacture, that, in doing so, the factory man, importer, and consumer, will all be benefitted, each month's make will then be sold on its merits at its proper value and be consumed when ripe. The importer would also get what he purchased while the speculative element of selling fall-made cheese below the current value of September's will be got rid of entirely, when the operator knows that he can only tender actual September's instead of drawing on three month's make, and even a fourth when stored July's can be made to do duty for all cheese as in the present season. Skin branding is imperative, to ensure the confidence of the importer, and maintain the premier position now held by Canadian manufacture.

“The early fodder make comes too hard and corky, some think the milk is over-scalded, or the ripening room kept at too low a temperature; anyway, a remedy is needed, though generally speaking, the manufacture is good later in the season, and if buyers receive the month's goods they expected, there would not be much to complain of, the usual size cheese, 60 to 70 lbs. are best fitted for the general trade, and the factory men should only manufacture larger sizes when ordered.

“Many factory men are using too slender wood, and their shipments arrive in a broken and unattractive condition, stouter wood is essential and will amply repay factory men who use it for any additional expense incurred; green wood must also be avoided as the excess moisture in the green timber is, by the heat generated in the steamer's hold, driven into the cheese “blooming” it excessively and shrinking the weight from 3 to 5 per cent.

“Another important point to which the Dominion Government official's attention should be directed is that any cheese coming into the Dominion for export shall not leave the shipping port with Canadian produce added to the boxes—this has occurred and will occur again if extra vigilance is not observed—considerable injustice is thus done to the importer while real Canadians suffer in prestige: shipments, *via* Montreal, of cheese frequently mean a great deal more than the cheapest route—Closely watch it one season.

“Factory men should cordially co-operate in bringing the foregoing into active operation, for they have most of the gain. Any opposition will come from the intermediary, who now benefits by the opportunities for substitution of one month's make for another, and to unscrupulous dealers who ship United States as Canadians.”

MR. J. T. WARRINGTON, of 49 Tooley Street, says :—

“ On the whole there has been an improvement, but the fodder and early grass makes were too tough and corky, we require close, mellow cheese, ready for immediate consumption on arrival.

“ In this respect I think the trade are well satisfied, the upright shapes weighing from 60 to 80 lbs., seem to meet all requirements. Care should be taken that individual factories run as uniform as possible in size and shape.

“ On this point I have received a great many complaints from my clients, about the bad and broken condition in which parcels have been delivered, in fact, many of the lots have been so badly broken that identification has been difficult, and value is reduced one shilling and two shillings per cent. Again in many cases, cheese have been shipped in damp boxes, which affects the keeping quality, and rendering the outside appearance very unattractive by mould ; this causes them to lose much in weight during transit.

“ Great damage has been done to the trade by unprincipled shippers, who sell September make at less than current prices, and then deliver earlier makes of non-keeping quality, which cost a low price ; thus the farmer who received no benefit from his early make of goods, is prevented from getting a premium on his autumn make. A simple remedy would be the compulsory branding on the skin of the cheese, the day and month when they were made.”

MR. J. B. EILERS, of 12 and 13 Water Lane, Great Tower Street, E. C., says :—

“ As to cheese, I would observe that much American has been sold for Canadian. Before, the New York houses have suggested that they should mark States cheese as from Canadian origin, but I would not lend myself to it. To me, it seems that the Merchandise Marks Act is intended to thwart this imposition ; that where here in this country you see Canadian cheese advertised or offered, the seller should produce the original invoices as to cheese being from the Dominion.”

MESSRS. FORREST & TURNBULL, of Leith, say :—

“ *Cheese.*—The quality as a rule throughout the season has been very satisfactory, especially from the Ingersoll District. The September make has proved to be as choice quality as could be desired, approaching very closely to the quality of Cheddar. The very best quality we have ever seen from Canada were shipped to us this year by the Hon. Thos. Ballantyne. We would call the attention of shippers to desire dairymen in the Montreal district not to make cheese of a high colour—in some cases almost red. The annutto spoils the flavour of the cheese and renders them almost unsaleable in this market.”

#### EGGS.

This is another branch of the export trade to which Canada has only recently begun to devote attention, and I am glad to learn on all sides that it is developing in a satisfactory manner. The figures are not yet available to enable me to state the value of the imports from Canada during the past year, but I may say that the imports in 1891 were valued at £90,520, as against £6,922 in 1890, and nothing in 1889.

The trade in 1890, and in the early part of 1891, was very satisfactory both to shippers and to dealers in this country ; the eggs were a good quality and well selected, so much was this the case that the dealers here were buying eggs while on the way to this country, and before seeing them. Subsequently, however, inferior eggs began to be sent over, and, for a time, the trade lost confidence in them, and the business was temporarily injured. I am glad, however, to notice that the trade is rapidly assuming considerable proportions again, and I believe that the exports for 1892 will be found to equal those in 1891, even if they are not larger.

The fact that the import of eggs in 1892 was £3,793,018, and that large quantities come from countries from which the transit takes as long as it does from Canada, is full of encouragement to those interested in the development of the trade. It cannot, however, be too strongly stated that care must be taken in the selection of the eggs, and in their packing, and that the requirements of the market here in this respect must be very closely studied.

The following letter regarding the egg trade has reached me, through Messrs. M. L. Wurzburg & Co., of 4 Fenchurch Buildings, E.C., from the Continental Egg Company, of Royal Dock Chambers, Grimsby:—

CANADIAN EGGS.

“The British import season of 1892, which began in May and closed about the end of December, has been on the whole the most satisfactory since the trade opened, in proportion to the volume of business done. The heavy losses sustained by Canadian shippers and others in 1891, weeded out the unsound and merely speculative shippers, and the shipments this season have been made by exporters who have taken up the trade with England with the intention of testing it for all it is worth.

“Consequently, goods have been better selected, the quality has been more regular, and the eggs have reached here in better condition. The result being a more favourable feeling towards them amongst the retailers than existed a year ago, although it will probably take several good seasons consecutively, to efface the bad impression caused by the distribution of wrongly handled eggs which did so much harm in 1890-91.

“There is certain to be a better enquiry during the coming season because they have become much more widely known, and, if only rightly dealt with by the shippers and placed in proper hands here, will eventually become a much more profitable and marketable article than hitherto.

“So far, Canadian eggs have undoubtedly occupied a false position amongst the trade here and have not realized their true market value, but, continued efforts on the part of the shippers to adapt their exports in all respects, as far as possible, to the requirements of the British market, backed up by careful handling on this side, must bring Canadian stock into the front ranks of our egg imports from distant points.

“Energetic enterprise, skilfully directed, showed during last year (1892) what could be done with the formerly much-derided Russian egg, and the chances and prospects of Canadian eggs are infinitely better, if dealt with on the same lines, because they are so much superior in size, quality and appearance, and can be placed on our market in a much shorter time than the Russian product.

“To show how disproportionately the prices of Canadian eggs have ruled as compared with the eggs of some other countries, we append approximate weights and prices of the imports of different classes ranging over the greater part of the past season.

“Reviewing the season as a whole, May and early June shipments, necessarily limited because mainly despatched by houses who were neither pickling nor putting eggs into cold storage, were distinctly satisfactory. They required no repacking on arrival here, and the prices realized reached close upon those of Irish eggs, a fairly trustworthy criterion of the actual market value of the goods. With the advent of hot weather the trouble began which is more or less inseparable from all trade in perishable articles, but which is unreasonably heavy in connection with Canadian egg imports. Larger contingents began to reach us and this together with their inferior quality promptly depreciated their value. Prices did not decline, but did not advance *pro rata* with Irish and other quotations. Regular buyers of Canadians would only look at them if either a price was quoted to cover all probable loss by repacking and consequent waste, or, if with an allowance guaranteed to cover all actual waste, even then the price would be unsatisfactory and the importer could never be certain he was being fairly dealt with by his customer.

“The only course which left any margin of satisfaction was the repacking of all consignments, which showed after fair test an appreciable proportion of waste. The eggs could then be quoted “guaranteed good,” and, although the loss would at times be heavy, the retailer was not turned against Canadian eggs and would repeat his order, which was never the case when good and bad eggs together were sent to him. This is the method adopted by successful importers of Russian stock after years of unsatisfactory trading on the other lines indicated, only, with them, the bulk of the candling and repacking is done at the ports of shipment, viz., Riga, Libou or St. Petersburg, instead of at the ports of arrival in England. At the same time, it must be admitted that when the Canadian shipper has, after making himself fully alive to the necessities of the business, acted up to his knowledge, candling and repacking on this side with its attendant loss and expense, even in the hottest season, was scarcely necessary, because, after all, we are not unreasonable, and we do not quite expect even Irish eggs to turn out every egg good.

“October returns were encouraging, and in November lined stock began to arrive. Unfortunately, however, a most unaccountable falling off in the demand

occurred, and the whole of November and early December saw continually dropping prices, and on all classes of eggs importers lost heavily. The one gleam of brightness at this time was the consistently excellent quality, after the first shipments, of Canadian limed eggs, and with proper handling on this side, Canadian packers with vats ought to prepare for the heavy demand which is certain to arise here once the fine quality of Canadian pickles is fairly appreciated. It should, however, be clearly understood that these eggs must be handled on this side by houses who can command the trade of the districts where pickled eggs are marketable. Fresh eggs are saleable everywhere, but certain districts and classes of buyers will not look at pickled eggs.

“One very expensive mistake was made in the shipment to Glasgow during November of very large quantities of limed stock. The origin probably arose in the fact that for a short time previously the Glasgow returns were more favourable to the shippers than the Liverpool returns, consequent upon much smaller supplies having been shipped to the former port. Be that as it may, Canadian packers, apparently with one accord—losing sight of the important fact, well known to the home trade, that Scotland has never been an outlet for an appreciable quantity of pickled eggs while fresh eggs at anything like a reasonable price can be obtained—made Glasgow for a time their dumping-ground and they must have paid dearly for the business. For a time, at least, every Scotch house in the provision trade was glutted with Canadian eggs, which they would almost give away, in order to clear their warehouses of the accumulated stocks.

“Mid and late December shipments met an excellent demand here, prices ruled high, and no doubt shippers found the last trade of the season very satisfactory.

“One good and important feature of season 1892 was the non appearance of the egg which was so exasperating to the whole trade when it first came in the previous season's imports. No satisfactory explanation of this egg's deficiencies has yet appeared but it is generally believed here to be mis-handled, cold storage stock. When held to the light they appeared perfectly sound but on being opened, whether boiled or not, presented to view an utterly useless, watery liquid. These eggs caused more lasting and bitter prejudice against Canadian eggs than any quantity of rotten eggs could do. They were new to our dealers; the apparent impossibility of detecting them by way of the ordinary tests baffled the whole trade, losses over them were enormous and much heartburning was the result.

“To sum up this glance at the season's trade we must register a marked improvement in the quality of the shipments made over those of previous seasons, but there must still be improvement if Canadian eggs are to be properly appreciated in England and their standard of market value raised from its present low level to the high level they intrinsically deserve if rightly handled. To this end shippers cannot pay too much attention to the following vital points:—

1. Careful grading into regular sizes to given standards which should be strictly maintained.

“2. Colour of selection.

“3. The careful elimination of all suspicious eggs by sorting and candling when packing.

“4. Transit in shortest possible time.

“5. Prompt bi-weekly shipments of freshly-gathered eggs in small lots rather than weekly or fortnightly large shipments of accumulated goods.

“(Paragraphs 4 and 5 refer specially to fresh, not pickled eggs).

“6. PACKING.—The use of only the most absolutely dry, scentless and dustless materials. Oat hulls, or excelsior, or both in preference to chopped straw; this applies to the packing for the long continental cases but the American small 30 dozen boxes with fillers are coming into favour here, and with them oat-hulls should be used to fill up the boxes and avoid thereby the smashing the eggs otherwise receive on the English railways.”



## LARD.

The lard trade shows a considerable increase over 1891. Canada does not, however, contribute much to the imports. The detailed figures for 1892 are not available, but out of the imports of £1,720,051 in 1891, Canada only sent £12,669. With the development of the trade in pork and pork products it is possible that greater attention will be given to the matter.

## POULTRY AND GAME.

It will be observed that this trade also shows an increase during the past year. France and Belgium are the countries which principally engage in it. The total imports from all British possessions, including Canada, in 1891, was £1,241, but it is possible that for the year just ended the imports from Canada will show considerable increase. Just about Christmas time large consignments of turkeys and poultry arrived, and, I believe, were disposed of at fairly good prices, largely in the neighbourhood of Liverpool, although some of them came to London. The preparation of poultry for this market is a matter to which I have often referred in previous reports, and there is little or nothing further to be added upon this subject. It is considered, however, in the trade, that a mistake is made in crowding all the Canadian shipments upon the market at Christmas, when birds are coming in from all countries, and, as a matter of fact, the market is generally glutted. Poultry of all kinds can safely be sent over from November to March, and would probably bring higher prices at any other time than just at Christmas.

The following extracts from the *Canadian Gazette* are interesting; and I also quote a letter I have received from a Liverpool firm upon this subject:—

(*Canadian Gazette*, 22nd December, 1892.)

Encouraged by the reception given last Christmas to Canadian turkeys in British markets, consignments amounting up to date to no fewer than 100 tons, and comprising about 20,000 birds, have been landed at the port of Liverpool alone during the past few days. The first consignment of the season consisted of sixty tons, and was shipped by Messrs. Sanders & Soule, of Kemptville, Chesterville, and Morrisburg, Ont. The birds, numbering some 12,000, arrived in splendid condition, and were despatched to various centres in the north of England, and some were forwarded to Messrs. Thomas Borthwick & Co., of Smithfield Market, London, where, with later consignments, they are now being sold both wholesale and retail. The Allan Line steamer "Sardinian" and the Cunard steamer "Aurania" brought forty tons; and so far as can be ascertained at present there will be between 40,000 and 50,000 Canadian turkeys landed in Liverpool and Glasgow during the present season.

It is gratifying to learn that in the majority of cases shippers have profited by the advice given them in the Dominion Government bulletin based upon the advice of the High Commissioner and the Dominion Government agents in this country. A few small lots of both turkeys and geese were not shipped according to these instructions, but were plucked and, in some cases, drawn, and the consequence has been that nearly the whole of them have had to be destroyed. Mr. Borthwick, speaking to a representative of the *Canadian Gazette* on Tuesday, made special complaint of the geese in this respect. They were, he said, not quite up to the mark, and Canadian shippers should clearly understand that they should not be plucked. As a whole, however, the consignments have arrived in excellent condition, and are of very good quality, comparing favourably with English birds. The price quoted by Mr. Borthwick is about 6½d. or 7d. per lb. Last year many of the consignees buried the heads of the birds under the wings, but this year the packing shows much improvement in most cases, the heads being packed in paper.

Inquiries made during the present week show that there is a strong feeling in the trade that Canada may with ease develop a highly profitable market here. Two things, however, are essential. In the first place, as is suggested above, strict attention must be paid to the advice of the Dominion agents, who know the requirements of the market,

and in the second place, there must be no tampering with the quality of the consignments. They must be uniformly of a high class. Last season, says Mr. Brooke, of Leadenhall Market, the trade was spoiled in a measure by want of uniformity. One lot would be of good quality and the next be musty. The birds should, he adds, always be sent over in a chill-room. With proper organization a splendid trade could, he believes, be built up from Canada for fowls and ducks, as well as turkeys. Another point which may be worthy of consideration is raised by Mr. Brooke in regard to the time of shipments. "There seems," he said, "to be an idea in Canada that Christmas is the only season during which to send poultry to the British markets. This, of course, is not so. With English producers turkeys and fowls of all sorts are most plentiful during October, November and December, and a great mistake has been made in former years by Canadian shippers who, in their hurry to get the birds ready for the Christmas market, sent them across in bad condition. Arrivals in February, March and April, and even May, would find a ready sale in this country, and English people are very partial to Canadian turkeys because they are rather 'wild' in flavour." Arriving at Christmas time, Canadian poultry find British markets almost flooded not only from English and Irish, but from French, Belgian and Dutch poultry yards. It must also be remembered that the prices of all home products this season are lower than has been the case for a long time past.

The experience of Canadian poultry in the London markets this Christmas tends to bear out what we said on the subject a few weeks ago. Speaking to a representative of the *Canadian Gazette* on Tuesday, Mr. Brooke, of Leadenhall Market, remarked that whereas Canadian poultry reaching London immediately prior to Christmas, had, owing to the general glut of produce and the universal lowness of prices, realized comparatively small returns, the demand was at the present moment such as to well repay exportation:—

Turkeys if sent over now (he said) would find the market bare and a demand springing up, so that they would make from 6d. to 8d. per pound, and very likely in February and March better prices still would be realized. English and French farmers have sold out all their poultry, and very little stock remains in the hands of the Irish farmers. The supply is, indeed, very limited, and now is the time for receiving Canadian poultry. It should, however, be borne in mind that the birds should be sent over unpicked, as their feathers form the finest preservative of flavour. The beautiful plumage adds in fact to the price of the turkeys, and is the only way in which they can be sold to pay. Canadian turkeys if sent across now would be put up as specialties and sold as such, and their peculiar "wild" flavour is so well known that they would find a ready sale.

Mr. Brooke added that he had always been strenuously opposed to the sending over of Canadian turkeys for the Christmas market. To be really good, he said, they must be unpicked, and at Christmas the English people have no time to pick them, and consequently the turkeys have to be sold to second-class dealers and hawkers. After Christmas, however, any dealer would buy the birds for their name alone. As a proof of this, he mentioned that whereas last year Canadian turkeys fetched only 6d. a lb. before Christmas, a few weeks afterwards they were selling at from 7d. to 9d. a lb.

MESSRS. BORTHWICK & Co., of 41 Russell Street, Liverpool, say:—

"We had over a 100 tons of turkeys, including a few tons of geese, from Messrs. Sanders & Soule, of Chesterville, Ont. The bulk arrived in good condition, but a few got musty, owing to the mild weather at time of arrival.

"In regard to packing these came in cases almost air-tight with the heads turned on the backs, but improvement might be made by packing similar to the French or Italian style.

"It is of the utmost importance that the condition be perfect. When this is right, the quality is of the finest and equal to the best English birds, while prices are on a par with the best foreign.

“With care in packing, the trade might develop to a great extent, but the supply should be kept up not only at Christmas, but all the year round. Unfortunately this Christmas the market has been quite overstocked, but holding the large quantity we did, have got well cleared.”

APPLES.

The apple trade this year has not been generally satisfactory as to quality and prices, and I think I cannot do better than quote several letters I have received from firms in the trade, which, in many cases, are worthy of careful perusal.

MR. FRANK RAND, of Spitalfields Market, says :—

“Respecting Canadian apples which we are in the habit of handling, we might say that at the present, this business is suffering from several drawbacks.

During the early part of this season we were inundated with large quantities of inferior apples from Ontario, and as the season commenced earlier than usual, a fair stock of English-grown fruit besides large quantities from Nova Scotia were all on the market at once, with the result that prices were unsatisfactory, and in some cases, disastrous.

“The principle supplies of apples coming direct to this market are from Nova Scotia and Ontario, the Nova Scotia apples arriving here in cargoes of from 5,000 to 10,000 barrels every two weeks and for the most part meeting with a satisfactory market.

“With the Ontario apples, it is different, for after navigation closes at Montreal, apples from the interior have to be shipped either *via* Boston, New York or Philadelphia, and more often than not they are sent in some cattle-boat with the result that, in many cases, they arrive here in bad condition, while, if they are shipped to Portland, and thence *via* Liverpool to London, the charges are so heavy that it leaves a very small margin of profit for the shipper.

“We would strongly urge shippers from Ontario to discontinue sending their soft, autumn fruit here, for in most seasons its value would be greater at home ; but as for the late autumn and winter varieties, which, if judiciously handled, could almost every year be sent here at a profit, we think as far as our experience goes that apples, after Montreal is closed, should be shipped through New York as shippers who have been forwarding regular consignments of really well packed fruit have done well.”

MESSRS. KEELING & HUNT, of Monument Buildings, say :—

“We regret to inform you that the out-turn, so far during the present season, has been far from satisfactory, the quality, etc., being much below what we were led to expect this season, much of the fruit being of very poor quality and more or less out of condition.

“The bulk appears to consist of fruit, either purchased while growing, or perhaps when nearly ready to be picked and packed, and evidently has not received the personal superintendence of the buyer, the result being that it is very much mixed, not well packed, and has turned out, with very few exceptions, more or less dull in appearance, and spotty ; some parcels being thickly spotted and showing signs of frost. The spot appears to be a kind of fungi, which may develop on the voyage, but no doubt there is some indication of it when being packed, and while not perhaps damaging the interior of the fruit, it renders it so unsightly that our best buyers avoid it, the consequence being that the demand for such is limited, and prices only moderate and in many instances low.

“Some of the shippers having previously experienced this, have dealt in a lesser quantity, which has been well selected and packed under their *personal supervision*, with the result that it has turned out well, and realized very good prices.

“Many parcels of fall fruit have been sent forward during the season, with, as anticipated, very poor and often disastrous results, many barrels being in such bad condition that they had to be destroyed.

“We have always advised shippers never to send fall fruit to this market ; if they have too much for the local demand, and must find an outlet for the surplus, then, by all means, send it to the nearest port, if to the United Kingdom, then to Liverpool or Glasgow, the extra time occupied on the voyage to London, while not causing any harm to winter fruit, is almost sure to cause fall fruit to arrive in bad condition.

"We cannot too strongly condemn the practice of sending it (fall fruit) here, neither can we too strongly advise all those interested to give more personal attention to the selection and packing of any fruit they may wish to send, if they desire to see their shipments do well.

"It may be of interest to shippers to know that the first arrival of apples from Tasmania last year, reached us on the 9th April, they may be a little later in the coming season, but, at present, we are without definite advice, the first shipment is expected to be made on the 22nd February, this should make them due 9th-12th April."

MESSRS. W. N. WHITE & Co., of Covent Garden, say:—

"... As regards the apples from Canada that have come forward to our care this season, we regret to say that our report cannot be of the same cheering character as last season. In the first place, owing to the excessive speculation by parties this side, who are not fully posted up as to the crops of England and the continent, large purchases were made with Canada early in the season for fall fruit, most of which were of such soft varieties that they could not travel to this country in good order, and many other shippers in Canada who had hitherto refrained from shipping these soft varieties, seeing large quantities going forward daily, thought they would do the same. The consequence was, that they arrived here in bad order at a time when our markets were fully supplied with home and continental produce—and to effect sales, very low prices had to be taken—in some instances just sufficient to pay the freight—in very few instances did the fall fruit make an adequate price sufficient to pay for shipping to this country. That gave the Canadian fruit a bad name, and this bad impression being made early in the season, the winter kinds have depreciated in consequence for the whole of the season; but none of the winter fruits have been of good quality, which every one was expecting, after last years experience, when Canadian fruit proved to be the best on the market. We think that the growers must have omitted to wash their trees this season in the same manner as past seasons; the consequence was that a large portion, even of their best fruit was attacked by moth of some sort, which interfered with their good keeping qualities. To such an extent has this taken place that unless the fruit can be used immediately on its arrival in this country, they soon go rotten. Many of our retail shop keepers have complained bitterly about this, when, on buying thirty or forty barrels of these apples, thinking they could take them home and use them as required, when on opening them, they found they turned out two-thirds rotten.

"We hope for the sake of everybody concerned, that your people will adopt the same measures as they did in 1890, so that their fruit may arrive here in the same good order as they did last season."

MESSRS. NOTHARD & LOWE, of 33 Tooley street, say:—

"The season of 1892-3 has been a very unfavourable one for Ontario shippers. Nearly the whole of the apples from there, arriving in the London market, have been spotted, unsound and generally inferior. Parcels that have appeared good from the top of the barrels, on inspection have been found to be topped up with fairly good fruit, and underneath, say after the first five or six layers off, the fruit has been small, spotted and unsound; there is no doubt the crop in Ontario has not been of good quality, but shippers make a great mistake in sending apples unfairly packed. They should be as good through the barrel as they are on top. There was a considerable quantity of Gravensteins sent early in the season from Nova Scotia; the demand for this apple increases every season, but the great difficulty is in packing it so that it carries across in a sound condition; of course it will seldom make a high price, as it arrives here early; has to be sent forward during a very short period, and will not keep, but as the Gravenstein is a heavy bearer and is much liked here, it will always sell, if the condition is sound. The Ribstons, Blenheims and Kings shipped this season from Nova Scotia, have been mostly good and have made, for the season, high prices. The bulk of their Blenheims and hard apples have yet to arrive, but the probability is that they will be small in size and spotted. All Canadian growers should endeavour to find some cure for the spot in their apples, in the opinion of the writer: it increases in the barrel after apples are packed, and seriously injures the sale for them

here. The price of all kinds of apples has been low this season; we have had large arrivals of continental apples selling at exceedingly low prices, and the quality has been very good. There are still great quantities to be shipped from France, Belgium, &c. The English crop has also turned out very much larger than was expected and there are still considerable quantities to be sent to market."

MESSRS. PARKHURST & Co., of Covent Garden say:—

"A very large quantity of Canadian apples have been sold in this market, the bulk of which we are sorry to say were of poor quality (with few exceptions); prices have ruled low in consequence of their being spotted and small. We received a consignment of 3,000 barrels from one sender in Hamilton, Ont., the quality and packing of which left nothing to be desired. He is comparatively a new sender to London, and it was very satisfactory to see the style in which they were packed and handled. Small class fruit does not pay, unless good eating quality and well coloured. A very large quantity of fall apples arrived here this season and lost packers and shippers a lot of money. A limited quantity only is required in this country of these sorts. Buyers look to American and Canadian apples about the middle of November. We are pleased to give you details of the prices we have made during the season from November last, viz. :—

"King Tomkins, 17s. 20s. and 22s.

Twenty-oz, Pipens, 15s. to 18s., some very rough and discoloured, 6s. to 10s.

Glori Mundi, 14s. to 16s.

Seeks, 12s.6d. to 16s.

MR. J. B. THOMAS, of Covent Garden Market, says:—

"I beg to acknowledge your favour of the 5th instant, and in reply I have to state that the principal article of Canadian produce handled by my firm has been apples; and as the other articles dealt with have been in such small quantities, what I might have to say respecting them would have little interest or value.

"My experience of handling Canadian apples extends over twelve years. The development of the trade during this period has been by leaps and bounds. The demand for *first class fruit* is always largely in excess of the supply, which has not increased proportionately during the last few years. During my business experience (over thirty years) I have seen many articles of produce from different parts of the world, as well as from home districts, flourish or fade. And to reckon upon a long term of monopoly of the apple trade of Great Britain, enjoyed in the past by America and Canada, would certainly end in disappointment. In fact, many experts consider the highest standard of the fruit was passed some years since, and that it is now fast on the wane. Whether a fact or not, certainly the supplies this season confirm the opinion. The standard could no doubt, by care, be kept up (artificially) for some years; but the interests being so varied, with indifference as to the future, and with difficulties that generally beset artificial means, the result must eventually be failure, when competing with "pastures new." The combined immediate points arrived at by growers, dealers (local), speculators, agents (British), swamp any consideration of each individual's interest for the future.

"And as long as the grower can make a ready sale of his orchard very little extra care will be given, when it means much cost and labour. Of course I don't say there may not be exceptions, and perhaps in a young country, a good many; but the plantations will get aged, and with age will come greater liability to at-

tacks by insects, disease and consequent chances of small crops, and very small fruit, even with much care and attention.

"The country's only chance of retaining a portion of this vast trade is by extensive new plantations.

"Selected best fruit only from the old orchards should be exported. In dealing with the older plantations will be the trouble of the future; therein will be found the greater cause of decline.

"While the dealers continue to buy, the growers (generally) will ignore the requirements of the future—and the dealers themselves are slow to grasp the situation, and find it difficult to account for their loss of usual profits and possibility of capital in addition. British speculators (often having a joint interest with a British merchant) who deal with tens of thousands of barrels during a season, are perhaps the first to become alive to the special requirements of proper grading. But before that requirement is brought home to the grower, the mischief is done. Trade and capital are diverted to other channels and new countries. Unless the British demand is kept up by new plantations, nothing can save your country from being "knocked out."

"The mode of transit to the London markets for the supply of the South of England may be termed very defective; up to date, either very slow-sailing steamers, taking nearly a week longer on passage than those to Liverpool, have had to be used; or the payment of 2s. per barrel additional rail charge has had to be made for quick transit *via* Liverpool. The former should be avoided as the condition of the fruit is generally lost after seven or eight days in the hold of a steamer. The latter should be saved by faster steaming to a southern port where goods can be delivered into London and sold often two days earlier at the same cost as a delivery made from a London dock.

"By adopting Southampton as a port of discharge at least twenty-four hours is saved in passage, without taking into consideration the delay consequent on the frequent fogs to which London and the Thames are subject during the apple season.

The following paragraphs refer to items of trade which are not dealt with in the monthly returns issued by the British Government. The figures I have given relate therefore to 1891; they may be interesting and give ideas to Canadian manufacturers and shippers, and lead possibly to their attention being devoted to some of the items that are mentioned.

*Oatmeal and Groats.*—The quantity of this import was not large—being only 171,711 cwts. of the value of £100,843; the amount sent from Canada was 39,897 cwts., valued at £23,637. The greater proportion of the balance came from the United States.

*Feathers.*—The imports of feathers and down for beds was 35,601 cwts., valued at £132,587; of this quantity British North America contributed 186 cwts., valued at £985. The different countries engaged in the trade are: Germany (£52,471); France (£28,504); China (£24,697); Holland (£10,769).

*Sardines.*—The import of sardines was 125,618 cwts., valued at £379,694, and of this Canada contributed 428 cwts., valued at £1,779. The greater part of the sardines imported came from France (£186,405) and Portugal (£178,529). It is a question for consideration whether the development of this trade might not with advantage be considered in the Maritime Provinces. The matter was referred to at length in the bulletin No. 4, published by your Department in May, 1892, based on information supplied by me.

*Cured and Salted Fish, unenumerated.*—The imports under this category were 873,340 cwts., valued at £1,583,687. Of this quantity Canada supplied 256,528 cwts., worth £580,609. The principal other countries engaged in the trade were the United States (£597,307); Norway (£254,218); Denmark (£84,692).

*Flax.*—The import of flax was 1,473,135 cwt., valued at £2,581,054. Canada does not appear to be represented in this trade. Most of the flax comes from Russia (£1,362,468); Belgium (£864,692); Holland (£213,005). Australia also sent 62,734 cwt., valued at £73,066.

There is no doubt as to the suitability of many parts of Canada for the growth of superior flax, and the matter has often been referred to in my annual reports. It seems to me that the growth of flax, and its preparation, might with advantage be taken up by the Experimental Farms. The dissemination of accurate and reliable information on the subject would probably lead to some attention being devoted to it by the farming community.

*Dried Fruit, unenumerated.*—Imports of this character represent 371,998 cwt., valued at £332,432. Canada has only commenced to take part in this trade, her proportion of it being very small at present, namely 1,240 cwt., valued at £2,866.

*Fruit, unenumerated, preserved without sugar.*—This trade represented 38,182,759 lbs., of the value of £338,352, of which Canada sent 423,752 lbs., valued at £3,229. The principal countries engaged in the trade are:—Italy (£100,201); the United States (£89,754); France (£49,909); the British East Indies (£35,019); Spain (£29,414).

*Sewing Machines and parts thereof.*—The value of such imports was £208,226, of which Canada contributed £1,098.

*Leather, undressed.*—The total imports were 78,016,789 lbs., valued at £3,882,489. Canada supplied 1,077,891 lbs., valued at £36,739. Most of the leather imported comes from the British East Indies (£2,000,000), and the United States (£1,082,206). Australasia also sent 11,018,855 lbs., valued at £437,807.

*Leather, dressed.*—The total imports were 20,986,121 lbs., valued at £2,609,964. Canada sent 1,000,097 lbs., valued at £48,067. The principal countries engaged in this trade are:—The United States (£1,088,048); France (£734,840); Holland (£413,619); Germany (£245,592).

*Boots and Shoes.*—The imports were 102,082 dozen pairs, valued at £322,746, of which Canada contributed 689 dozen pairs, valued at £1,592. Most of this trade is done by France (£141,207), and Belgium (£136,503).

*Gloves.*—The total imports were 1,777,697 dozen pairs, valued at £1,916,109. Canada sent 70 dozen pairs valued at (£57), Holland (£820,285); France (£652,127); and Belgium (£412,743).

#### PHOSPHATE OF LIME AND ROCK.

The total import was 256,772 tons, valued at £628,395. Canada sent 15,918 tons, valued at £54,285. The other countries engaged in the trade were:—The United States (£353,183); Belgium (£106,849); France (£52,418); Dutch West Indies, (£30,007).

The following letter has reached me from the British Phosphate Company, 15 Leadenhall Street, London, E.C. :—

“We are sorry to have to report that the present prospects for the Canadian phosphate industry are most unfavourable. In consequence of the discovery of the extensive phosphate beds in Florida, and the enormous development of exports therefrom, the value of high class phosphate has fallen within the last eighteen months about 50 per cent, the price being now at such a low level that Canadian phosphate can apparently not be worked at a profit. In the Canadian mines the phosphate has to be extracted from veins and pockets, situated at considerable depth, difficult to work, and yielding uncertain results, whereas in Florida the mineral is obtained principally from open pits, without difficulty, and in large quantities.

“As you may be aware, all the Canadian mines have closed down, with the exception of two or three, which are being worked on a reduced scale. Our own mines, which were acquired a few years ago, are among the latter.

“With regard to the future prospects, it is impossible to express an opinion. If the consumption of phosphate manure increases largely, so that the bulk of Florida production finds a market in the States, then there may again be an opening for the exportation of Canadian apatite at a profit. But this is an eventuality which we fear will not occur without the lapse of some time.”

## CONDENSED MILK.

The total imports were 444,666 cwt., valued at £900,170. Much attention does not appear to have been yet devoted in Canada to this important trade. In my previous annual reports reference has frequently been made to this subject, and it is somewhat disappointing that it has not been taken up. France sent over such commodities in 1891 to the value of £446,512; Holland, £255,019; Norway, £119,555; Belgium, £64,047. I am glad to notice that at your request the Experimental Farms have been publishing some information respecting condensed milk. The analysis shows that the article produced in Canada is equal, if not superior, to the best brands on the European market to-day; and the importance of the subject must be my excuse for suggesting that the report on the subject, in the latest report of the Dairy Commissioner of the Experimental Farms should be widely published, as it contains most important information.

The enquiries I have been making here, at your request, tend to prove that Canadian condensed milk would find a ready sale in Great Britain, if placed in proper hands, and carefully exploited. There are many wholesale houses who would be prepared to take it up, but it is a business that would require a little expenditure on advertising and attractive show cards to popularize.

In order to show the prices at which such commodities are sold, I quote from the wholesale price list of the well-known brands of Irish condensed milk manufactured by Messrs. Cleeve Bros., of Mark Lane, London, and Victoria St., Liverpool:—

*Fish Oil.*—The total import of 21,360 tuns was valued at £246,823. Canada supplied 7,145 tuns or equal to £156,864. The balance of the trade was from Norway, 9,405 tuns (£177,191) and United States, 2,771 tuns (£54,716).

*Turpentine.*—The total import was 422,530 cwts. valued at £576,207. Canada does not appear to take any part in this trade, which is largely under the control of the United States, the imports from that country being £561,097, the balance coming from Russia and France. The matter seems to be worth investigation.

*Oilseed Cake.*—The total imports were 270,671, tons, valued at £1,843,285. The total from Canada was 323 tons valued at £2,276. This trade is largely under the control of the United States which sent £1,192,851; other countries—Russia (£291,826); Germany (£140,632); France (£92,706); The British East Indies (£36,732).

*Pickles; Vegetables, preserved in salt or vinegar.*—The total import was 1,967,652 gallons, valued at £145,703. To this trade Canada only supplied 192 gallons worth £10. The rest of the commodities came from France, (£90,442); Holland (£46,291); Germany, Italy, the British East Indies; and Australasia.

*Plumbago.*—The import of plumbago amounted to 12,738 tons, valued at £184,927. Canada does not yet appear to have exported any plumbago to Great Britain, notwithstanding the attention which has been devoted to the matter. Many inquiries have been received as to the possibilities of opening up a trade in Canadian Plumbago and the fullest information has been sent in return, including letters from firms anxious to have samples for experiments.

*Salt Pork.*—The total imports were 226,798 cwts. of the value of £295,932; from Canada 2,968 cwts. valued at £3,387. The rest of the pork came largely from the United States (£232,753) and Denmark (£52,090).

*Wood Pulp.*—The total import was 156,609 loads, valued at £851,389. Canada does not appear to have entered into this trade as yet to any extent. The principal countries engaged in it were:—Norway (£436,481); Sweden (£258,883); Germany (£68,605); Holland (£45,114); Russia (£21,455).

*Rosin.*—This is another trade in which Canada does not take part, but which seems worthy of mention. The total imports were 1,638,840 cwts., valued at £399,939, of which the United States sent 1,599,707 cwts., (£387,216); the greater proportion of the balance came from France.

*Furs.*—The imports of furs was 39,158,304 skins, valued at £998,963. Canada contributed 1,334,131 skins, valued at £263,291. The other countries engaged in the trade were the United States (£145,687); New Zealand (£126,147) and Victoria (£100,863).

*Tallow and Stearine.*—The total imports were 1,371,201 cwts., valued at £1,772,268. Of this quantity Canada contributed 2,799 cwts., valued at £3,706. The other countries engaged in the trade were: The United States (£606,598); New South Wales (£305,831); New Zealand (£254,061); Victoria (£129,267); Queensland (£113,330); The Argentine Republic, Belgium, France and Uruguay.

*Furniture Woods and Hard Woods unenumerated.*—The total imports were 91,077 tons, valued at £671,532. From Canada 3,237 tons of the value of £18,562. The larger proportion of the imports came from the United States (£364,876); the Argentine Republic (£46,781); France (£41,925); Russia (£33,886) and Germany (£20,073).

*House Frames, fitting, joiners' and cabinet-work.*—The total import was £653,845; from Canada £9,496. The imports from other countries were the United States (£195,481); Germany (£121,001); France (£93,454); Belgium (£89,021); Sweden (£72,978) and Holland (£47,572).

Canada being one of the greatest exporters of timber in the world, ought surely to have a greater share of the trade in "furniture woods, and hard woods unenumerated" and the same remark applies to "house frames, fittings, joiners' and cabinet work." It may be that the prices do not afford any large margin of profit, but to the outsider, it seems that if the United States are able to work up a large trade of the kind, Canada ought to be able to do so.

*Potash and Pearl Ash.*—Messrs. Charles and Fox, of No. 3, Mincing Lane, write as follows:—

“We are only interested in Canadian or Montreal Potash and Pearl Ash, being sole consignees for the London market. This article is being gradually superseded for many purposes by the French and German products, yet the Canadian is preferred for many purposes on account of its vegetable origin, purity and uniformity of manufacture, but its consumption of late years is seriously curtailed in consequence of the foreign product being lower in price.”

#### HAY.

It is so short a time since I sent you an exhaustive report on the subject, with the names and addresses of many firms prepared and desirous of securing a part of the business, that I do not think it is necessary to refer to the matter again. Many thousands of tons of hay have been sent from Canada during the last year, and I trust that it has proved profitable to the shippers; although, during a part of the season, the freights were higher than the price of the commodity would seem to warrant, and more than it could fairly stand. A firm, whom I induced to go into the trade—Messrs. Underwood & Sons, limited, of Nine Elms and Brentford—have handled several hundreds of tons, and I quote a letter they have written to some of their friends in Canada, as it seems worthy of careful perusal and attention.

“With reference to the Canadian hay trade, it is manifestly impossible to carry it on the way it is being done at present. It seems impossible to satisfactorily make use of the through bills of lading issued by the railway companies that are now being sent. Some of the wagons appear to be delayed on their way to the port, and the consequence is during the last week or two, we have several times had only parts, out of three different bills of lading, all in the same ship; therefore, we have had to pay three drafts for about three times as much hay as we have received, and moreover, the hay is so mixed up that it is impossible to check quantities or qualities. The only way out of this difficulty seems to be to issue a bill of lading and draft for each wagon, this would be rather more trouble, but it is the only other way out of the difficulty we can see. There seems to be a future before this hay trade, but it must be done on altogether different lines than at present. The best way is to send it to the coast consigned to your shipping agent there, and then let him make out the bills of lading for the actual quantity shipped each steamer, and arrangements should be made to send the documents direct from the port of shipment; otherwise, if they have to go back to Quebec, Montreal, or inland towns before being sent to England, they generally arrive after the hay, in which case the hay is landed and heavy charges are incurred which have to be debited to the shipper in Canada.

“It is necessary that every bale of hay be marked, but not with the name and address of the presser; an initial or daub of any coloured paint will do.

“The quality that commands the best sale here is timothy well mixed with clover, and bright and green.

“We prefer bales weighing 100 to 130 pounds to the large ones.

“Shipments should be at least 30 to 40 tons in order to enable us to get the lighterage done at this end as economically as possible. Hay trade in this country is done on a long credit, and if the trade with Canada is to assume any great dimension, arrangements will have to be made on your side for the banks to deliver the documents on acceptance, and not payment as at present.”

Of course the present season has been exceptional in England. Hay has been very scarce, and prices have ruled much higher than usual. In ordinary years, unless the price is low in Canada and freight charges light, it is a question whether there would be much margin for profit. However, the trade has fairly been started, I am glad to say, and I trust it may be found possible to continue and extend it.

#### PRESERVED LOBSTERS AND SALMON.

The following letter has been addressed to me by Messrs. George Cooper & Company, St. George's House, Eastcheap:—

“In reply to your letter we would like to say that, being probably the largest importers of preserved lobsters from the Maritime Provinces of Canada, we have found

during the last season a very serious falling off in quality, some of the goods being absolutely unmerchantable. This arises, we are informed, partly through the multitude of small people preserving lobsters on the coast not understanding their business, and also, partly owing to the fact that last season, for six weeks after the packing season had closed, these small men continued to preserve; we consider the trade has been seriously damaged in consequence. We have never received so many inferior goods as we have this last season. Unless the Canadian Government enforces the law more strictly in regard to closing the canning season at the date legally fixed, we believe that this trade will in a few years become extinct, as there will be no demand. We must say that we think the canned lobster business has degenerated more than any other commodity from Canada with which we are acquainted; and it is very desirable that a considerable improvement should be made in the packing of this article. We would suggest that it should never be preserved without a paper lining in the can, and that nothing but the whole lobster should be packed, no broken pieces, or at any rate not any larger proportion than 10 per cent.

“Large shipments of salmon were received by us from the Fraser and Skeena Rivers, British Columbia, and the quality was very good, superior we think to anything now put up in the United States, or Alaska.”

M. L. Wurzburg and Co., of 4, Fenchurch buildings, E. C., writing on the subject of Canadian lobsters, salmon, canned fruits and vegetables, say:—

*Lobsters.*—“These crustacea seem to become scarcer and scarcer every year, and Canadian packers—probably for this reason—are not using the same care as in former years. It is however a grave mistake to suppose that consumers in this country must buy canned lobsters even if the quality is not what it ought to be. The variety of canned goods offered all over the United Kingdom and imported from all parts of the world is so great that lobsters only form a small item, and the high prices now ruling can only be paid by a class of consumers who demand and expect a first-class article. As a matter of fact, and as a consequence of the increased prices on the one part and the impoverished condition of the British workman, mostly caused by unionism and strikes, on the other part, the demand for canned lobsters is now limited to a better class trade, and tall cans which in previous years found a ready market at 20 to 22 per case are little sought after at 30s. and 32s. While it is therefore impossible for the packer to sell the canned product in tall cans at less money than has been demanded these past two years, he would be wise to restrict his pack of this shape cans to the smallest possible quantity consistent with quality to be put up in flat. 1 lb. and  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb. flat cans, if nicely packed with small meat neatly concealed in the centre, and protected against black oxide, will always find a ready market on this side, and ought to net the packer from \$8 to \$8.40 for 1-lb. flats and \$9.50 to \$10 for  $\frac{1}{2}$ -lb. flats. Canners' attention must also be drawn to the fact that the total quantity of lobsters imported here shows hardly any decrease during the past few years, and while individual canners suffer by the decrease of fish on their fishing grounds, and consequently must have the higher prices spoken of, it is well to remember that this decrease of individual outputs is more than counterbalanced by the continual increase in the number of factories. For one factory which say eight years ago packed 2,500 cases and last year only 1,200 cases, we have at least two more filling each 600 to 800 cases.

A great deal has been said and written about “black lobster,” yet the re-appearance of these worthless goods occurs as regularly as our summers. Many a business connection has been dropped on their account and many dollars lost. It would be ludicrous to suppose for one moment that packers do not try their best to avoid the evil, but comparatively few seem to know the cause. The popular idea—that the more or less abundant use of acid causes “black”—is the same as it was when this enemy of the industry made its first appearance several years ago. Muriatic acid used for soldering has nothing to do with the evil. Cans made of iron plate coated by the old palm oil process and sealed with sweet oil, lard, resin, patent fluid, or any other device, are quite as liable to show more or less “blacks” all the same. Twenty years ago, nay, ten years ago this defect was not known, the nature

of the fish did not allow of it—because canners had only to deal with fine large lobsters, two—at the outside two and a half—of which filled a 1-lb. flat can. Now the factories have to take very much smaller fish, and the meat of them contains sufficient acid and sulphur that, when coming in contact with the untinned inner edge of a seam, will form a sulphur oxide, black as shoe-blackening, which in time will eat through the whole contents of the can. There are packers on the south coast of Nova Scotia and in a few other districts, who by dint of great care and manipulation know how to avoid the evil, but as their lobsters command so much better prices in consequence of time and trouble given to the matter, it would not be fair to them to make the result of their labour public property. Others have tried paper or parchment linings, and while this is of course a decided improvement, yet it only meets the difficulty half-way, because the black smut will form behind the paper and make the liquor dirty and black looking. Only lobsters weighing alive 3 lbs. each and more, may be said to be free of sulphur and excess of acid, but as no factory can now command such fish, the only and best safeguard against black cans consists in wrapping the contents. The bottoms of cans should be soldered on the inside to have as little untinned edge as possible and one large piece of pure vegetable parchment or paper the size of a good sized pocket-handkerchief (for 1-lb. flat cans), with corners rounded off should be put into the can, then the lobsters packed in the usual way and the overlapping paper folded over the fish completely covering it, so that in opening, the contents may be lifted out in this paper bundle. Lobsters preserved in this way would arrive in Europe in first-class condition and command a ready sale and best prices. Besides, the ever growing distrust against canned lobsters, shown not only by dealers, but by the consumers at large, would be checked and perhaps entirely conquered.

*Salmon.*—The very demoralized condition of the British market which we experienced during the first half of the past year and under which we laboured all through '91 (in consequence of over-production and the decreased demand from the provinces) has gradually disappeared, and business although far from "booming" may be said to be moderately fair. The imports of British Columbia salmon to London and Liverpool, which amounted in 1890 to 293,400 cases, and in 1891 to 220,800 cases, have further decreased in 1892 to 163,300 cases, and although the total stocks of salmon held in the United Kingdom on 1st January, 1893, were estimated at about 250,000 cases, which with the total imports now on their way will amount to more than the highest possible demand during the year, yet the prices now realised ought to leave canners a very fair profit. The average prices realised during the past few months were about 21s. 6d. to 22s. for Talls, and 24s. to 24s. 6d. for Flats. Already a good deal of forward business has been done for fish to be packed during the coming season, at prices practically the same as the figures just quoted; the quality of the great bulk of British Columbia salmon has been so long and so favorably known on this side that nothing need be said about it. It would be wise to again restrict the pack so as to keep the output and exports to this country in proportion to the true demand. Contrary to lobsters the demand for salmon is mostly for tall cans, and 1-lb. flats have been more or less neglected and difficult of sale. With the exception of  $\frac{1}{2}$ -lb. flats no novelty has been introduced of late years and  $\frac{1}{2}$ -lb. cans can hardly be called a novelty. Key cans are little in demand and it would certainly not pay to introduce them, although they seem to make their way in the States. A certain export business is done from here with India in cans containing one whole salmon, and there is no reason why the experiment should not be tried to introduce into the home-market cans containing a whole fish—head to tail—weighing about 6 lbs. each. The Columbia River fish may perhaps be too soft, the Alaska fish is certainly too dry, but the Fraser River spring salmon would be just what is wanted. Flat cans, with narrow oval ends, hugging the fish as closely as possible would be required. The cans must be carefully made so as to avoid blowage, and the cases (containing not more than six cans) secured against pilferage. The experiment is well worth trying and the proceeds of a first shipment would refund the cost of dies.

*Fruit and Vegetables.*—During 1892, we have seen a larger quantity and greater variety of Canadian canned fruit and vegetables in this country than in any previous

year. The reason why Canadians find it slow work to introduce their goods into our market is no doubt to be found in the fact that unlike salmon and lobsters (of which America holds the monopoly) fruits and vegetables are grown and now preserved almost the whole length and breadth of the globe. We receive consignments of these goods from Belgium, France, Germany, Spain, Portugal, Italy, Africa and African Islands, Australia, and various South American States, not to speak of the United States of North America which supply us with more canned fruits and vegetables than perhaps all the other countries together. In the face of such competition dealers may well pick and choose, and the quality of the Canadian product has hitherto been such that buyers have not cared to handle it, and the prices eventually realized have not left any margin to the canners. Every-one will at once understand that in a market where the products of the world are exhibited an inferior article has no chance at all, at least producers cannot expect to make any money by shipping such goods. On the other hand there is no reason why Ontario, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island should not be able to put up tomatoes or apples quite equal to those preserved in New York State. As a matter of fact we have received last year gallon apples from Ontario and Nova Scotia which are quite equal to any United States brand, both in quality, weight, and outward appearance of cans and boxes. The prices realized ranged from 9s. to 9s. 6d. per doz. Ontario has supplied us with some very good 3-lb. cans tomatoes, thus showing that the quality grown in that fine province is quite equal to anything produced in the States. Prices for tomatoes ranged unfortunately rather low during '92, and many parcels changed hands at 3s. 3d. per doz. best qualities fetching 3s. 7½d. to 3s. 9d. In sympathy with the United States market our prices have now stiffened and as much as 4s. is asked, but business remains slow at this figure. Canners who wish to sell in this market and not lose money ought to put up full weight, sound good quality, and make the appearance of cans and boxes attractive. If they wish to consign to London they should bear in mind that our landing charges for parcels under 15 tons gross weight are very heavy and they should therefore make proper arrangements before shipping, to avoid minimum charges, if they intend to try this market with small lots of 50 and 100 cases.

Although various fruits and vegetables have been shipped, the only business that amounted to anything has been done in apples and tomatoes. Corn has been tried, but so far the British public has not taken to it. It is, however, not many years since that American canned tomatoes were unsaleable in this market, and we have now houses who handle from 50 to 75 thousand cases annually. Ontario corn of very fair quality has been offered at 4s. 9d. per doz. No. 2 cans, but business done is practically nil. Asparagus could be sold in No. 3 cans at 12s. per doz.

British Columbia which has now commenced to grow small fruit will no doubt supply us in a few years with apricots, peaches, pears, greengages, &c., quite equal to what we now receive from California. Fruit canned in Ontario has so far not appeared in this market and although it would probably not command the prices which will be paid for British Columbia fruit, yet it might pay canners to try the experiment; but quality and care, again, must be their motto.

My last two reports dealt so fully with the trade in canned goods, such as peaches, pears, tomatoes and apples, that I do not propose to enter into the subject fully again on this occasion. The same remark applies to apples prepared and dressed in the forms known as "Rings" and "Normandy pippins." I may prepare a special report on these and other matters of the kind shortly. In the meantime it would appear that my former reports have had good results, for two or three gentlemen engaged in the canning trade have visited London recently to enquire into the subject personally, and I have been assured they are of opinion that a large business may be done, and that the prices leave a fair margin of profit.

In conclusion I need only repeat that I am very anxious to do anything that is in my power to develop the trade in Canadian products in this country. The figures I

have quoted show that in many lines of merchandise, Canada takes a small part ; and there seems no reason why that share should not be largely increased. The country is large enough, and the products are there, or can be raised or manufactured ; and if our neighbours in the States can send over such large quantities, there is no reason why Canada should not participate in the trade to a larger extent than she does. The conditions, from every point of view being more favourable in Canada than in the States. The same remarks apply to many other countries, from which the transit takes longer than from the Dominion and is more expensive. Large as the increase in Canada's exports to Great Britain has been, I look forward to a greater expansion, from the interest that has been shown to the subject in this country. I have frequent applications from persons desiring to do trade with Canada, and from others who want to deal in different kinds of produce coming from the Dominion, which indicates the prominence the matter is obtaining.

I regard the questions of immigration and the extension of trade as most important matters for consideration in Canada at the present time ; and it will be a pleasure to me personally, (as I am sure it will be to the agents of the Government) to do anything in my power to further, in the directions I have indicated, the interests of our great Dominion.

## REPORT OF THE LIVERPOOL AGENT.

(MR. JOHN DYKE).

15, WATER STREET, LIVERPOOL, December 31st, 1892.

The Honourable  
The Minister of Finance,  
Ottawa, Canada.

SIR,—Acting under instructions I have the honour to make the following report to you.

Inquiries both personal and by letter on trade subjects are becoming more numerous each year as of course is natural with the annually increasing business done between the two countries; and information is daily applied for in reference to the Canadian tariff, navigation, probate, canal and railway communications, Canadian prices current, or kindred subjects. Owing to its having been made known through the Canadian press that the agents of the Government here were prepared to give information on trade matters I have been besieged with letters from all parts of Canada. When not in a position to give the particulars desired, I have endeavoured to obtain them and I am glad to note that in many instances business has resulted. As you may be aware I have been labouring under the great disadvantage of having an insufficient clerical staff but this has now been remedied and I am confident that during the coming year this office will be found a valuable auxiliary by your Department. Liverpool is the port in this country to which the bulk of Canadian products is shipped; my long residence here has made me well known among merchants, brokers and others, and I have acquired a knowledge of the different businesses and the opportunities offered for trade, which places me in a position to obtain any information that may be wanted and to materially assist in the development of Canadian trade and commerce.

The large number of correspondents I have throughout Europe and in other parts of the world has enabled me to help Canadians desirous of finding foreign openings for their goods, and in some cases ascertaining for them the methods which are in existence elsewhere in the manufacture of certain articles.

In my endeavours to promote Canadian interests I have devoted considerable attention to the press, sending out paragraphs almost weekly in reference to one Canadian commodity or another: wheat, cattle, horses, cheese, butter, eggs, poultry, &c., all having received frequent notice, and special articles on such subjects have been written or inspired by me for a large number of journals.

## HORNED STOCK.

The increasing population of the British Isles and the larger quantities of meat used by the labouring classes, now as compared with a few years ago, necessitate greater imports and though the demand at the moment is affected by the depression in trade, it will improve with the passing away of what has been appropriately called the period of idle capital and unemployed labour.

A calculation recently made of the meat consumption in this country gives the total as 2,139,000 tons. Of that quantity, 1,478,000 tons (cattle, sheep and swine) were produced at home; 489,000 tons of dead meat (the larger proportion being mutton) and 172,000 tons of live animals were imported; or in round figures 70 per cent is home produce, 22 per cent imported dead meat, and 8 per cent imported live animals. The total amount annually expended on this one article is estimated at £87,000,000.

The total number of horned stock imported during the year has been 502,237 head against 507,407 in 1891, a decrease of 5,170. The United States is the only

country that show an increase, from 314,895 to 392,934. From Canada the decrease is from 108,289 to 98,237 partly attributable to the falling off in the shipments owing to the scheduling of Canadian cattle towards the end of the season, and to larger numbers being sent during the same period *viâ* United States ports. More were sent this way than usual as the advantages of shipping direct had been lost.

Holland and Denmark having been declared infected with foot and mouth disease, the trade from those countries was entirely suspended early in the year, and less than 3,000 animals were received thence, as against over 60,000 last year.

Unfortunately low prices have been the rule in almost all commodities this year, and meat has proved no exception. The fact is accounted for by the general depression in trade, the strikes, lock-outs and so on, and it is hoped that with better times the markets will revive. Freights have fallen very considerably also so that the whole of the loss is not borne by the farmers and cattle dealers.

The mortality on the voyage has again been very small as the following figures will show:—

The Canadian ranch cattle which have been sent to Liverpool have been animals of extraordinarily good quality. There were some 500 on the "Mongolian" when I returned in that vessel from Canada, and I had an opportunity of seeing them from day to day, and if they did not actually improve they in no way deteriorated on the voyage, and they landed in perfect condition.

The feature in the trade which has excited most remark has been the scheduling of the Dominion as a country infected with pleuro-pneumonia, owing to an alleged discovery in two shipments made to Scotland. It will be remembered that it was proposed to schedule Canadian cattle under the Duke of Richmond's Cattle Bill in 1878, but I was able to produce evidence at that time which decided the Select Committee of the House of Lords to exempt Canadian cattle from the compulsory slaughter clauses, and our immunity has continued until a month or so ago. The trade here is in hopes that evidence will be again forthcoming which will prove to Imperial authorities that a misapprehension exists, and so obtain the withdrawal of the recent order. This order, of course, destroys altogether the trade in dairy cows. All cattle having now to be slaughtered, it became incumbent upon the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board to make arrangements to meet the altered conditions of the trade, and this they propose to do by increasing their accommodation at both Woodside and Wallasey.

Formerly the great proportion of the meat of the animals slaughtered here went to London, but for some years more and more has been taken by the larger provincial towns in the Midlands and North of England. This tendency will be increased owing to the fact that no Canadians can now be offered alive at local markets. Butchers and others from over a large area adjacent to Liverpool come to the Woodside Lairages and purchase their ten, twenty or a hundred head of cattle, and have them killed, and the meat is shipped to their several places of business as it is required, and consequently it is highly desirable that we should have equal facilities with the United States. The dealers prefer to have their cattle at Woodside,



as being more accessible and a better market. Wallasey is a mile or so distant and is difficult to reach, and if our cattle are relegated to that place, as is possible, serious loss will result. Dealers therefore have been pressing the Dock Board to enlarge their Woodside premises sufficiently to accommodate the whole trade, and in the interests of Canada I have used my best endeavours to the same end, bringing the importance of the matter to the attention of the Dock Board and to the public through the press and in other ways. Our efforts, so far, have been of no avail, and the Dock Board persists in its original scheme, but other methods of meeting the difficulty are under consideration.

The magnitude of the interests involved in the trans-Atlantic cattle trade is clearly shown in the statement that £76,780 5s. 9d. were paid in Mersey Dock Dues by cattle ships in 1892, this representing 1,083,957 tons at 1s. 5d. per ton.

I have been making enquiries with the view of ascertaining if it would pay better to ship dressed beef, and the following calculation is based on recent transactions. The average carcass weighs 800 lbs. and the cost of freight and refrigerator comes to 24s. per carcass. Freights on live cattle to Liverpool have recently been as low as 27s. 6d., but take the average as 40s. The wages of engineers in the one case and cattle men in the other will be about equal, and the difference in favour of live stock in dock and town dues, &c., will be about balanced by the cost of maintenance. The difference in favour of dressed beef then, so far, is 12s. 6d. per carcass, but the beef of the live animal slaughtered here will bring quite  $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per lb. more than the dressed meat, which on 800 lbs represents 33s. 4d. and the small offal will bring from 17s. to 18s. more in this country than in Canada, which makes the difference at least 37s. 6d. in favour of the live animal. I consider this an inside estimate, as the difference in price is more often 1d. than  $\frac{1}{2}$ d., and sometimes more than that, dead meat having been known to go as low as 1d. per lb. in hot weather, a point never yet approached in the live cattle trade.

Of the meat slaughtered in Liverpool 30 per cent goes to London, 10 per cent is taken by the local trade, and the remainder, 60 per cent, is consumed within a radius of 100 miles of this city, there being within that distance a population of quite ten millions.

#### DEAD MEAT.

The imports of fresh beef from the United States continue to increase, the figures being 1,951,887 cwts. in 1892, against 1,747,578 in 1891. The United States at present practically monopolises this market, as all other countries sent but the comparatively insignificant quantity of 127,750 cwts.

Into the port of Liverpool, we have received 887,422 quarters of beef from the United States, and 70,618 carcasses of mutton from Australia and New Zealand. Direct shipments of the latter to Liverpool are a new development. From South America, there have been received here 1,166,949 carcasses of mutton, as compared with 977,085 carcasses in 1891.

It may be difficult to understand the continuance of the large shipments of dressed beef from the United States, it being admitted on all hands that the business for a very long period has been carried on at a loss. Eastmans Limited and Hammons Limited, the two leading slaughtering and exporting firms in America, have not paid a dividend for a long time, and the experience of other American exporters has been most disastrous. Of course, the contracts of these people are made a year or so in advance and have to be carried out, and no doubt they go on hoping that matters will improve. The meat is carried in mail and other steamers which cannot carry live cattle, and the space is contracted for twelve months beforehand, and the loss is perhaps less to carry on the business than it would be to pay forfeit. With a corporation like Eastmans the matter is clearer, the business being the *raison d'être* of the Company's existence. A considerable interest is now being taken in the question of shipping dressed meat from the Dominion, I cannot do better than quote the following from Alderman J. H. Lee's (Boston, United States America) Review of the New England live stock trade for 1892, Mr. Lee, says:—

“Let us now pass to the market abroad for American refrigerated beef. One year ago, best American beef sold readily for 9 $\frac{3}{4}$ c. per lb.; at Boston, it brought 9c.;

the cattle cost alive \$5.30 per cwt.; to-day, the same grade of beef costs \$5.85 per cwt. alive, sells for 8½ cts. per lb. at Boston and at Liverpool for scant 7½ cts. per lb. If that don't tell a story of stupendous losses in the shipment of American refrigerated beef, these figures lie. One of the modern wonders of the cattle world is how beef exporters can ship cattle, and keep at it, in the face of losses that must be enormous. It is a monument to our people's will and their resolve to keep at the game and win somehow."

I am as firm in my opinion now as I was when I gave evidence before the Select Committee of the House of Lords in 1878, that the dead meat trade will not supplant the trade in live cattle. Refrigerated meat can never be profitably carried on the upper decks which are now utilised for the transport of live stock.

#### MUTTON.

The imports of mutton only show a slight increase from 1,662,994 cwts. in 1891 to 1,699,966 in 1892. The live sheep trade from Holland being prohibited, a development has taken place in their exports of mutton, the increase received in England being 108,204 cwts. or over three times the quantity imported from that country in 1891.

The receipts from the Argentine Republic also show a slight expansion, from 436,358 cwts. to 471,128 cwts., Australasia on the other hand registers a fall from 1,063,457 cwts. to 977,394 cwts.

I have already mentioned the fact that direct shipments from New Zealand have been made to Liverpool; other and larger consignments are expected.

#### SHEEP AND LAMBS.

The causes which have affected values in other commodities have influenced the prices of British mutton, and Scotch fat sheep are worth at least 20s. per head less than at this time last year, and it is thought there is little chance of a recovery.

Foot and mouth disease is responsible for the enormous decrease in the number of sheep and lambs imported, 79,048 as compared with 344,504 last year, Holland being the principal sufferer with a falling off of 201,757 dead. The imports from Canada declined from 31,633 to 15,743, and from the United States from 10,537 to 2,829.

The largest contributor to the total received is given as Denmark with 38,529, but this is explained by the fact that Iceland, which belongs to Denmark, is included in the returns for that country. Sheep from Iceland are allowed to land as there is no foot and mouth disease in that island.

#### DAIRY COWS.

The requirements of dairymen in large centres of population not being well met by the British raisers of milch cows, large numbers are needed from abroad to supply the demand. Holland was the chief source from which these were drawn, but owing to disease in that centre they can be brought from that place no longer. Canada unfortunately has been scheduled also, but previous to that being done a most profitable trade was conducted in dairy cows from the Dominion. Messrs. J. Sullivan & Co., the principal importers, brought over some 1,151 head and realised an average of about £14 for them.

#### MILK.

Some statistics have recently been published in reference to the milk supply in this country, a matter which is of much interest to the large centres of population. It is said that in 1890 no less than 40,431,819 gallons of milk were carried into London by seven of the nine railway companies having their termini there. This trade will be seriously injured by the new and higher railway rates which come into operation on the 1st January.

It is estimated that there are about 3,500,000 milch cows in Great Britain, and Professor Sheldon calculates that each cow gives on an average 403 gallons of milk

per annum, so that a total of about 1,410,000,000 gallons is reached. The estimated consumption of milk and milk products in the United Kingdom is as follows:—

The enormous sum of £61,000,000 (upwards of three hundred millions of dollars) is given as the sum annually spent on dairy products and poultry.

A form of distribution which is coming into great favour is cream put in small earthen pots and sealed up: these are retailed at from 6d upwards. The form, however, which is of most practical interest to Canadians is the condensed.

#### CONDENSED MILK.

Condensed milk is an article which I have frequently referred to in my reports as one in which Canada should be able to compete. I have gone into the matter very fully at different times and have obtained and forwarded samples of the different brands to the Department of Agriculture to show the quality and the style of package, &c. An analysis which has been made proves, I believe, that the Reindeer brand of condensed milk turned out by the factory in Nova Scotia is a very superior article, and it is a pity that an effort is not made to extend the manufacture in Canada and export the product to this country. The imports increased from 407,426 cwts. in 1890 to 444,666 in 1891 and 481,374 cwts. in 1892, the value this year being returned at nearly five million dollars.

The following table shows the growth of the import trade during the last few years:—

and this increase has taken place notwithstanding the fact that the home factories are turning out larger quantities each year.

#### BUTTER.

There is again an increase in the butter imports though it is not a large one, from 2,135,607 cwts. in 1891 to 2,182,999 cwts. in 1892, the latter being returned as of the value of £11,965,284 or say sixty million dollars. Canada is credited with an increase from 46,267 to 59,571 cwts. the latter being valued at £255,752. The United States on the other hand continues to send less each year and the quantity is now only 46,846 cwts. which is less than was received from the Dominion. Denmark with 863,522 cwts., France with 542,687 cwts. and Sweden with 228,885 cwts., are the largest shippers, and no less than £9,119,399, over forty-five millions of dollars, were paid to those countries for butter this year. Canada's share of this trade is therefore still insignificant. The Australians have entered the field and large quantities

of their butter are arriving in first class condition. With a view of showing what they were doing I sent specimen cases of their butter to the Minister of Agriculture this year. As you are aware Professor Robertson has been in this country endeavouring to stimulate business in our dairy products and he will no doubt return full of information. The Government of Denmark has done a great deal to develop their trade in dairy produce and Sweden has followed suit. The Danish Government does not allow margarine to be made or shipped unless it bears a distinctive colour directly opposite to that of butter and their Agents here prosecute dealers who sell margarine as Danish produce, and press for convictions against retailers who sell other butters as the Danish article. Their example is worthy of imitation by the Government of Canada. As our butter must eventually find its way to this country it would be advisable to have it stated distinctly that no margarine is allowed to be exported from the Dominion and that prosecutions will be instituted against wholesale or retail dealers here who are found disposing of inferior butters made in other countries, as Canadian. When the article shipped here is of good quality it is of paramount importance that everything should be done to maintain the prestige of the brand.

In former reports I have gone into the particulars of the trade in tinned butter. I was glad to find when in Manitoba this year that several factories have been established there with excellent results and there is room for a great extension in the business. Through the financial crisis in South America the European tinned butter trade received a severe check, but it has recovered and there has been a marked improvement in the export of this article from Liverpool to South Africa, Mashonaland, Beira and the Cape, and to the Brazils. In the Brazils the demand for Danish butter has greatly increased owing to the discovery that a large proportion of the French tinned butter contained boracic acid, put in for the purpose of preserving it. The Danish Government always active in pushing their butter trade at once obtained and published certificates of analysis from the Brazilian Consuls in Denmark showing that Danish butter was absolutely pure and did not contain this deleterious ingredient. It is very difficult to obtain reliable statistics as to the trade in tinned butter between Europe and South America, but the exports during 1892 are known to be at the value of more than \$1,000,000.

The Irish trade in tinned butter has scarcely been so profitable as in former years, not on account of the demand but from the action of trade rings.

I have sent specimens of the various tinned butters to the Dominion from time to time and, if desired, can obtain and forward samples of the products of Denmark, Sweden, Holland, France, and New Zealand, the latter being the newest competitor, more especially in the Cape market.

I am indebted for a great deal of information and assistance respecting butter, cheese, and other dairy products, to Messrs. Richard Harrison and Company of Liverpool, who conduct the principal export trade from this port in cheese, tinned butter and butter for ships' use on long voyages, and this trade in ships' butter is one of annually increasing importance.

All that is required is a little attention on the part of Canadian manufacturers to the requirements of the different markets to put them in a favourable position in the competition.

#### MARGARINE.

Holland, although still sending about three times the quantity of butter we receive from Canada, appears to be devoting less attention to this trade than to margarine, which by the way, analysis has shown to contain from 5 to 25 per cent of water. Of the total of this product imported, namely 1,305,350 cwts., Holland sent 1,196,756 cwts. valued at £3,360,707. All other countries show decreasing quantities. Very large consignments of fat are made from Great Britain to Holland for use in the manufacture of this commodity, a very large business being done from Liverpool in connection with the American cattle slaughtering establishments. A novelty in the margarine trade is the putting up of the product in tins in a similar manner to butter, and these and all the other packages used in the business are got up in a most attractive manner. One dealer in this city sold during the year no less than 80 tons of this tinned stuff for ships' use.

#### CHEESE.

Last year there was a falling off in the quantity of cheese imported as compared with 1890, entirely owing to the great decrease in the United States' product. But the total this year is higher than ever 2,232,814 cwts. against 2,041,317 cwts. in 1891 and 2,144,074 cwts. in 1890. The total value this year is returned at £5,417,777, or say twenty-seven million dollars. Canada is the principal contributor, sending in 1891, 857,841 cwts. valued at £1,991,597 and in 1892, 1,038,599 cwts. of the value of £2,493,625. The imports from the United States recovered to some extent to 817,433 cwts. but this is still 100,000 cwts. less than in 1890. Holland is the only other country from which there has been any variation, 273,822 cwts. compared with 307,925 cwts. in 1891. The Dutch are continuing to pay great attention to new markets for their cheese, and there is now a large quantity of English cheese being specially manufactured, principally in Wiltshire, for export. It is so salted and prepared that it will keep in good condition for from two to three years. When in Canada, I found that near Moosomin, North-West Territories, and at other points a very superior Gruyere or Swiss cheese is being made.

Mr. Wagner, M.P.P., of Ossawa, has been very successful in manufacturing varieties of German and other soft cheeses which find a ready sale not only in Winnipeg but in St. Paul, Minnesota and other places in the North-Western States.

Gruyere is now quoted here at 60s. to 72s. per cwt. as compared with 50s. to 60s. twelve months ago; Canadian is quoted 40s. to 56s. as compared with 38s. to 56s. last year at this time; finest English Cheddar is 56s. to 76s. as compared with 40s. to 72s. in 1891.

To show the various prices the Dutch receive for their cheese and at the same time give the names of the different countries for which it is specially prepared, I

cannot do better than quote the following from the circular of Messrs. Heil & Zonen:—

For an extra quality, the pick of the stock, the price for both Edams and Goudas, is 65s. per cwt. The terms are f. o. b. at Amsterdam or Rotterdam and nett cash.

In August last, the Royal Manchester, Liverpool and North Lancashire Agricultural Society held their exhibition at Liverpool, and I was honoured by being placed on the Executive Committee. American traders are always exceedingly anxious to obtain medals and prizes at such exhibitions for use as advertisements on bill heads, &c., and on all the packages they send out, so with a view of assisting Canadians, I obtained the offer of special prizes for three cheeses of Canadian or American manufacture. In due course a very fine lot of cheese was selected by Professor Robertson, from the Experimental Dairy Stations and elsewhere, and sent over. I am glad to say that all the prizes were won by Canadian manufacturers, the first (£3 and the Society's Gold Medal) went to a maker whose name was not indicated at the time; the second (£2 and the Silver Medal) to Messrs. S. Tilley & Son, New Brunswick, and the third (£2) to Messrs. Ayer, of Montreal; the very "highly commended" to Mr. J. Gero, of Napanee, Ontario, and the "commended" to the Government Experimental Dairy Station of Perth, Ontario. This was most gratifying, but I regret to say that the specimens of butter sent over did not meet with such success.

## EGGS.

The imports of eggs again show an increase from 10,681,137 great hundreds in 1891 to 11,139,419 great hundreds, in 1892, the latter being valued at £3,793,018. The only specified country which shows a decrease is Russia. From France we got 3,512,174 great hundreds valued at £1,437,203.

I have pointed out in previous reports that Canadian eggs do not come into competition with French, but their size and quality enable them to keep the market against all others. The *declared* values on their entering the country work out as follows:—

Canada is not returned separately, but is included in "other countries." it comprises, however, few but Canadians, and the table shows pretty accurately the relative values.

The prices obtained for Canadian eggs have suffered in common with other articles of food, but rather less so perhaps than the eggs from many parts of the continent. The quality has been good and the packing has left nothing to be desired, a marked contrast to the first shipment that was made. So long ago as 1876, I urged Canadians to enter into this trade with Great Britain, and in 1877 I sent a circular letter to the Canadian press in reference to the manner in which the eggs should be packed. These points will be found noted in my reports to the Minister of Agriculture for those years.

The value of this trade from Canada has become large enough to affect the particular grades of continental eggs with which they come into competition, and contracts are not so readily made for these latter as in former days, and this again will tell in favour of our trade, so that in 1893 Canadian shippers may expect to materially improve their position.

The total quantity of Canadian eggs shipped to Great Britain in 1892 is given as 3,987,655 dozens, and the success achieved justifies the persistency with which I have advocated the trade and the full details I have given as to requirements in my reports to the Minister of Agriculture during the last sixteen years.

Whilst Canadian shippers have not realised such profits this year as in 1891 they appear to be well satisfied with their venture. Their consignments to this country whilst profitable in themselves have also helped them, and others, in their dealings with the Eastern states, by keeping prices up there. Without the British outlet, the Canadian egg trade would have been in a sorry position. Large quantities of eggs are used here for manufacturing purposes, such as refining, &c., and any material reduction in the price always brings this class of buyers into the market. As I have stated, little if any improvement in the packing suggested by me in 1877 can be made, but I may note that some eggs from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island have been received this year packed in the usual long cases but laid in wood shavings instead of straw or chaff, and they arrived in the very best of condition. The eggs landed in Liverpool from the provinces just named and from Nova Scotia, have been remarkably good in point of size and colour. They were well mixed with brown eggs which give an excellent appearance to the whole, and they were considered almost equal to the best French.

There is one point, however, and a most important one which the dealers here have requested me to represent to your Department, and it is to urge the Canadian farmers, who have the first interest in the extension of this trade, *to deliver their eggs to the dealers more frequently. The shippers also should be strongly advised to despatch them to this country with the least possible delay.*

#### POULTRY.

The value of the poultry imported during the year increased from £456,979 in 1891 to £583,430.

From Russia there has been a decrease of about £7,000, but Belgium and France have each increased their shipments to England to the extent of about £50,000. Under the head of "other countries" which in this instance includes Canada, there is an increase of £20,000, a part at least of which must be credited to the Dominion.

It is estimated that about 100,000 Canadian turkeys have been landed at this port, the greater portion coming by way of New York in fast steamers. When treated and packed, as most of them were, according to the methods I recommended some years ago, and which were embodied in my last report to the Minister of Agriculture, they arrived in splendid condition. A few shippers neglected the instructions given or did not carry them out fully, and suffered a loss. Contrary to my advice a considerable number of geese were sent over plucked, with the result I predicted, the majority of them were in very bad order and were seized by the health authorities. On the other hand a few were sent in the feather and the other recommendations I had made were acted on; they arrived in perfect condition and readily realized 16 cents per lb. As I have said in previous reports I think it advisable for Canadian shippers to confine themselves to turkeys. This year the whole of England has been flooded with continental geese, chickens and ducks. It is reported that during eight days 221,488 geese were landed at Newhaven and Southampton alone from France, and that the fattened poultry from such French districts as Sarthe and Calvados sent for the Christmas markets in England, reached the enormous total of 850,000. In London and also in Liverpool the consequence of this was that large contractors found themselves overstocked with geese, and very many fine birds, heavier than anything sent from Canada, which had cost \$1.50 had to be sold at prices ranging from 50 to 75 cents each.

The prices realised for turkeys have scarcely been up to those quoted by me last year but they were sufficient to leave a handsome profit. This year for the first time we have participated in the large orders which are given by big brewery firms and others whose custom it is to present turkeys to their clients at Christmas; there is no doubt that Canadian turkeys are building up a reputation for themselves and are coming more and more into the favour of both dealers and private consumers, and an expansion of the trade is anticipated. I have received numbers of enquiries from various parts of the Dominion respecting this poultry trade and I trust that the information I have afforded has enabled a remunerative business to be done, but there have been some people who have not profited by advice, and who have consigned turkeys to parties not in the trade; these firms have sent the birds to the public auction rooms and I fear the result has been disappointing to the shippers.

#### HORSES.

The total number of horses imported into Great Britain has decreased from 21,715 in 1891 to 21,026 in 1892. A large number of black stallions have hitherto been imported from Germany for funeral purposes; horses of this colour only being used here on such occasions and the most notable feature in the return is the decrease in the number of such stallions received from Germany (59 compared with 1,138 last year) and the increase in the total from Canada the numbers being 1,058 in 1891 and 1,745 in 1892. From the United States there were received 1,076 against 590 in 1891 an increase of 486, but undoubtedly some of these were geldings from Western Ontario shipped from United States ports. The majority of the horses received however still come from Germany, the number this year being 11,642. There has been a decreased number received from the Argentine Republic although exceptionally low rates of freight have been offered, and with few exceptions the importations have given great dissatisfaction.

The last lot by the "Helenes" in June averaged £8 each, the highest price £15 5s. and the lowest £4 10s. As a rule these horses have proved most vicious and have been badly reared and handled, and consequently the Dominion need not fear competition from South America for a long time to come, as a breed of horses is not readily changed.

The export of stallions—Clydesdales and Shires—to Canada and the United States has been on a greatly reduced scale; in fact stallions are not being reared so much now as hitherto, breeders having found that they can obtain nearly as much for geldings as for stallions for export. Indeed the thorough-bred draught mare has



in a large number of cases proved the sheet anchor of the tenant farmer during the past season of bad weather and low prices.

Still a few shipments have been made to the Dominion the most notable being that made by Messrs. McGregor and Company of Brandon. Included in this was the celebrated Shire stallion "Nailstone Standard" which was awarded the first prize in his class at the Royal Show at Doncaster in 1891 and the second prize for the championship for the best horse of that breed. There were also a number of useful Cleveland Bay and Hackney stallions. The effect of Mr. McGregor's enterprise in past years is noticeable from Winnipeg to the Rocky Mountains and there cannot be any doubt as to the enormously increased value of the stock in the prairie province and the Territories brought about by their importations.

From inquiries made at the leading repositories where cart horses are sold, I learn that notwithstanding the general depression no particular fall in prices has taken place other than the usual decline in the winter months, but this is always followed by a revival in the spring. During the year really first class cart geldings fetched from 80 to 90 guineas, good geldings 16.3 hands sell readily at 60 to 70 guineas, and ordinary from 40 to 50 guineas. The best trade is in the best sorts which are always more or less scarce. Weighty big 17 hands horses are what breeders should aim to produce. I have for many years endeavoured to promote a trade between Canada and this country in all classes of horses, but the greatest success has been attained with carriage horses and hunters. During the past season we have again had a few shipments of first rate horses of these classes, and they have been sold without difficulty at remunerative prices. One consignment made by Mr. Folkes was sold in London in the spring. The highest price was 160 guineas and the average £65. A pair of well matched carriage horses realized 140 guineas and a bay gelding 110 guineas.

In my last report to the Minister of Agriculture I went at some length into details in the matter of the horse trade and the requirements of this market.

I have already mentioned the Meeting of the Royal Manchester and Liverpool and North Lancashire Agricultural Society held in July last in connection with the subject of cheese, but horses were the great feature of the show. There being no place in the world where there is a better demand or where higher prices are offered for really first class heavy draught horses, than in Liverpool, I made two suggestions in the matter to the Executive Committee, of which as I have before said, I had been made a member, and both were accepted. The one was for a grand parade of the heavy draught horses of the city, and the other for the offer of Special Champion prizes by the merchants of Liverpool, open to all the world. With the assistance of a few friends I secured subscriptions to the extent of \$1,000 and the prizes offered were as follows:—For a pair of draught horses, mares or geldings the Society's gold medal and \$500; second prize, silver medal and \$125; third prize \$50; fourth prize \$25. For a single draught mare or gelding, first prize, the Society's gold medal and \$125; second prize, silver medal and \$50; third prize \$25; for van horses, first prize, gold medal and \$50. These prizes, it will be readily understood, attracted some of the finest stock in the country and a magnificent show was the result. I had hoped that if not in the heavy draught class at least in the van horse class we should have had competitors from the Dominion. Even if they had not taken prizes, it would have been a capital opportunity of showing the dealers and users what Canada can produce. When in Canada this year I was in company with some excellent judges of horse flesh from England and they expressed astonishment at the good quality of horse they had seen in different parts of the Dominion. I am sure it will not be long before Canada will be able to send a supply of the horses required here, and great profit will be found in the trade. There is a strong demand for van horses and relatively they command even better prices than heavy draught horses. A reference to my last year's report will give enquirers the size, weight and ages of the different classes of horse in demand. The heavy draught gelding which took the first prize

in the single class belonged to Liverpool and was a magnificent animal as the following weight and measurements will show :—

Some 600 heavy cart horses took part in the parade and the whole show was an immense success, over \$20,000 being taken in entrance money to the show yard and stand.

At the meeting of the members afterwards held in Manchester, Colonel Starkie in the chair, the secretary was instructed to convey to me the best thanks of the Society for the great services I had rendered and which had contributed so much to the success of the Liverpool meeting. Such action on my part has a far-reaching effect and will I hope have a beneficial influence on my work in Canadian interests.

#### HAY.

I have been making exhaustive inquiries with regard to the present position and the prospects of the trade in hay between Canada and this country. I am now able to inform you that during the present season there have been some 6,000 tons of Canadian hay imported into Liverpool and that the prices realized for it have been from £4 to £4.10 per ton of 2,240 lbs. It is important for Canadians to note that in all English calculations 2,240 lbs. are reckoned to the ton, and not 2,000 lbs. as in the Dominion. We have been receiving hay from Canada in fluctuating quantities for the past 15 or 16 years. The quality is very well known in Liverpool and the surrounding districts, and there is always an active demand for it at certain prices. Some years ago there was a dearth of hay here something similar to that prevailing at present, and when endeavouring to establish a trade from Canada I found that one of the principal impediments was the difficulty of disposing of the hay immediately after landing. The same difficulty exists to-day. When it is borne in mind that the demurrage on hay left on the dock quay is six pence per ton per week, and cartage to storage costs 2s. 6d. per ton, and storage itself sixpence per ton per week, the necessity of prompt sale becomes apparent. *Warehousing* is only done by the month, and four weeks' charge is the minimum rate even if the hay has only been stored for a day.

The best hay for this market is that containing the largest amount of clover; some timothy of course would not be objected to, but the hay must be of good colour. The bales should be pressed very tight, if possible by Deadrick's press, in bales of 100 to 150 lbs. The bulk of this hay goes into the hands of small consumers, such as cab proprietors, cow keepers and private carriage owners, such as doctors, &c., who have but small storage accommodation, and very large bales will not go through the small windows which are customary in the ordinary hay lofts in this country.

The present price here for Canadian hay of the quality indicated is from £4.2s. 6d. to £4.10s. per ton (2,240 lbs.) ex quay. A large quantity of hay is being brought from South America. It is *asphalfa* (a kind of clover), is shipped in bales of 150 lbs., and can be contracted for delivery here at £2.18s. per ton for ordinary quality, and for the finest quality, that is the third crop after sowing, at about £3.10s. ex quay Liverpool. This low rate is helped by the small rate of freight, it being placed on steamers in space which cannot otherwise be filled on the return voyage.

From what I can ascertain here the expenses on Canadian hay shipped to Liverpool are \$13.50 per ton, made up as follows:—

Pressing, \$2; inland freight to Boston, New York, Portland or Halifax \$3.50 from points in Ontario and Quebec; ocean freight \$8. This from the value here, say \$21, leaves \$7.50 to the shipper, which compares favourably with the return from the best United States markets at New York and Boston. The value there is \$16 and the expenses are pressing \$2, freight \$3.50, commission (which can be saved in Liverpool) \$1, duty \$4, total \$10.50, leaving only \$5.50 to the shipper. Of course inland freight will not in all cases be so much as \$3.50, shippers from the Maritime Provinces, for instance, will get an advantage in this respect which may materially increase their profits, and from other places through rates to Liverpool may be obtainable at a reduction on the quotations given. Rates of freight on hay, however, will always be ruled to some extent by the rates for other commodities, and in this connection it may be interesting to give a few relative values. A ton of hay will occupy about the same space as one bullock, and the shipowner will prefer the latter at the same rate owing to the difference in expense of loading and discharging. A ton of hay will occupy the same space as 20 barrels of apples, and the current rate for the latter being 2s. 3d. per barrel, the apples are the better paying freight. A standard of deals measures 165 feet, and rates have varied this season from 40s. to 50s. per standard, but a ton of hay, although it will not measure so much, will occupy almost as much space. From this it will be seen that while other freights are offering there will be no reduction in the rates on hay. It may be useful to those unaccustomed to ship to add that one ton weight of hay makes three tons measurement. I have learned in the course of my inquiries that there are parties here who would send a ship to Boston, Portland or Halifax specially for 1,500 to 2,000 tons weight of hay for 40s. per ton, or probably less.

From what I have said it will be seen that it is necessary to dispose of the hay *ex quay*, and to do this satisfactorily dealers would prefer shipments in say 100 ton lots, previous advice of shipment always to be sent, so that arrangements may be made for immediate distribution.

#### MILLET AND CANARY SEED.

Mr. Bedford at the Experimental Farm at Brandon showed me some millet and canary seed grown on the farm. They were wonderfully good samples and I feel confident that a profitable trade could be conducted with such to this country and other parts of Europe. There is a large business done and the following quotations show how prices have advanced since last year:—

*Millet*.—French white, which was 50s. to 62s. in 1891, is now 50s. to 64s. per quarter, and both commodities are scarce at these figures. I have obtained samples of the different varieties and have sent them forward to Mr. Bedford, with price each is now realizing.

#### APPLES, &c.

The imports of apples, almost entirely from Canada and the United States though the separate figures for each place are not available, increased from 3,147,373 bushels in 1891 to 4,514,700 bushels in 1892. This increase is due to the enormous apple crop in America last year, this seasons' shipments showing a falling off, both in quantity and quality. Our apples this season have arrived in very inferior condition so much so as to seriously jeopardise the magnificent reputation

Canadian apples made in this market in 1891. I understand the matter is receiving the attention of apple growers and shippers. I referred to this trade at some length in my last year's report and can add nothing to the information then given.

During the year very elaborate attempts have been made to bring grapes, pears, peaches and other fresh fruit from Cape Colony, California and Florida in cold storage but the result has not been satisfactory.

#### WOOD PULP AND PAPER.

Wood pulp is being imported in increasing quantities, and enquiry might be made as to whether Canada is not in a position to compete with Norway in this trade. Last year the imports amounted to 156,464 ton; this year 190,938 of the value of about five million dollars. It is principally to use, as you are of course aware, in the manufacture of paper. The quantities of paper itself imported are also annually increasing, the total of all kinds, except hangings, being 2,263,618 cwts. in 1890, 2,588,776, in 1891, and 2,886,650 in 1892, the value of the latter being returned at nearly twelve millions dollars. By far the greater proportion of it is for uses other than writing or printing.

#### WHISKEY, WINE, &C.

Through the enterprise of Messrs. Hiram, Walker & Sons, and some others, Canadian whiskies have secured a footing in Great Britain, and I am glad to learn that they are extending this business to the Continent, the Cape, India and elsewhere.

The first attempt has been made this year to introduce Canadian wine from Pelee Island, a small parcel having been received by a Liverpool firm from Captain Hamilton.

Canadian manufacturing interests are not being neglected; the agricultural machinery of the Massey, Harris Co., has been to the fore at the leading shows; Canadian organs to the number of 3,846 have been landed at Liverpool; the trade in wheels and spokes has been developed.

I was directly concerned with the first consignments of these articles some years ago, the shipper being introduced by me to firms who now take his manufactures in large quantities.

A new trade has been initiated in wire mattresses, which are rapidly increasing in favor not only for private use but for hospitals and other public institutions. 2,930 cases have already been received. There is every probability of a great expansion in this business and there should be little difficulty in opening up many other branches of trade in articles in which wood forms one of the chief component parts.

Trusting that my report may be considered satisfactory and that my efforts may meet with your approval, and with an assurance that I shall continue to give Canadian trade interests my best attention,

## REPORT OF DUBLIN AGENT.

(MR. THOMAS CONNOLLY.)

NORTHUMBERLAND HOUSE,

BERESFORD PLACE, DUBLIN, 31st December, 1892.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit herewith my report upon Canadian Trade with Ireland for the year 1892 with particularly reference to the Dublin market.

## GRAIN.

The average prices for grain at the Dublin Corn Exchange for 1892 were as follows:—Wheat 19s. per barrel of 280 lbs.; oats, 12s. 6d. per barrel of 196 lbs.; and barley 15s. 2d. per barrel of 224 lbs. It is noticeable that although, owing to the wet season, the barley crop was badly saved and deficient in colour, this average is 10d. higher than last year's. During the season now closed there must have been from 15,000 to 20,000 barrels of Canadian barley sold here. A good deal of this barley was placed on the market by Liverpool houses, but a considerable quantity of it came direct by a line of steamers which run monthly from Baltimore to Dublin. The prices paid for it were not quite up to the figures for home grown barley, but some time ago Messrs. Guinness purchased about 2,000 barrels of fine Canadian barley at 13s. 6d. per barrel of 224 lbs. I have no doubt but Canadian barley has now a solid footing on the Dublin Corn Exchange, and it will continue to be appreciated if carefully dressed and sufficiently blown to exclude the light and chaffy grains, which latter can be profitably used in Canada for feeding purposes. The fullness of the berry, the dressing, the colour and the specific gravity are the chief factors which regulate the price of barley in the Dublin market.

There have been several parcels of Canadian oats sold here during the year and the army contractors bought it largely. There are more than 50,000 barrels of 196 lbs., required for the cavalry in Ireland, 30,000 of which is consumed in the Dublin district, including the Curragh Camp. The contract is usually for six months, and the contract price for the current term is 12s. 1d. per barrel for oats which must weigh 38 lbs to the bushel, but the contractors are supplied with Canadian oats delivered at the barracks for 11s. 6d. per barrel which leaves them a profit of 7d. per barrel.

## APPLES.

Canadian apples are much appreciated here and sold very well during the season. The market was also well supplied with Tasmanian apples which come in boxes 2 feet long, 9 inches broad and 1 foot high. The covers consist of two pieces running longitudinally and nailed sufficiently apart to admit the air. The space contained in the box is divided into two compartments by a transverse partition and in these compartments the apples are packed with the greatest care, each of them being carefully wrapped in soft tissue paper, so that notwithstanding the long voyage you will scarcely find a bruised one in the entire box. These apples bear the old names, "the pippin," "the pear-main," &c., and they are so fresh and highly coloured that one would think they were varnished. Each box contains about 40 lbs. weight of apples and, when Canadian apples are out of season, importors here pay about 13s. 6d. per box in the Covent Garden market. With a view of advertising, the names of the grower and of the district from which they come are printed on a slip of paper enclosed in each box, which I think is a very useful practice, for a large importer here tells me that when he sees the names of Peterson, Smith or Simmons on the end of a barrel of Canadian apples he is satisfied they are sound and the quality good.

## EGGS.

I learn that a considerable quantity of Canadian eggs has been sold in Dublin, but the cross-Channel freight, in addition to the ocean freight, militates against their sale in Ireland.

## HAY.

I had several letters from Canada in reference to the price of hay here to which I promptly replied. We have had such an abundant harvest of hay in Ireland that there was no need for importation, in fact from Sligo, Limerick and other ports there have been large quantities of hay shipped to England; and the prices remained steady during the season at the following figures: Best horse hay 4s. to 5s. per cwt.; old meadow, 3s. 6d. to 4s. per cwt.; inferior sorts, 2s. to 2s. 6d. per cwt.

The prices for products in the English markets are their true economic values and the market is almost illimitable. Therefore it only remains for Canada to improve the quality of her productions and convey them to Great Britain in the cheapest and most economical manner.

A reference to the returns of the English Board of Trade will I think best explain the great development of several branches of Canadian trade. In cheese the value of the increase over last year has been £502,000, and in timber £1,014,000. But I think the increase might be still more if Canada sent more of her timber manufactured to Great Britain. From the north of Europe there is a large trade with England in dressed timber, mouldings, panelled doors and sashes, and I think this trade which employs many hands should be more developed in Canada. I have lately examined some Canadian panelled doors which reached here by a Baltimore line and I never saw cleaner wood or better work in my life.

There has been a decrease of £226,000 in the value of the cattle trade this season as compared with last year, and I fear the late restriction in reference to the landing of Canadian cattle is calculated to derange the trade for some time to come. However, I think it is the French that say there is a bright side as well as a dark side to every question, and I believe that before long Canada will have a large dead meat trade in addition to her live cattle trade. Then there would be constant light profitable freight for a fast line of steamers. In connection with the slaughtering of cattle new trades would be called into existence at which thousands of Canadian workmen would get remunerative employment; and above all the leather trade in all its branches would attain vast dimensions. Surely this would be a more natural and profitable trade than sending stockers to the markets of Great Britain and shipping hay to feed them there.

In conclusion I wish to state my belief that the Canadian people on the whole are amongst the most comfortable and law-abiding on the face of the earth and no country can look forward to a more prosperous future.

## REPORT OF BELFAST AGENT.

(MR. H. MERRICK.)

VICTORIA CHAMBERS,

SIR,—I beg to submit herewith my report upon trade subjects for the year 1892.

## HORSES.

There have been very few Canadian horses sold in Ireland during the past year, so far as I can learn after making a good deal of inquiry, indeed I may say very few Canadian shippers send shipments of horses, cattle, poultry, or eggs to Ireland. I think nearly the whole of the trade in Canadian exports, with perhaps the exception of timber, is done between Liverpool, Glasgow, Bristol and London and Canada, and scarcely any of it with Ireland direct. Indeed I may say that it has now become a matter of complaint that Irish dealers have to pay commissions and other incidental expenses to brokers and dealers in England and Scotland before they can handle any of the Canadian exports, and therefore what would otherwise be a profit to them has to be paid across the channel, the benefit of which does not accrue to the shipper in Canada. There were several lots of ranch horses from the Argentine Republic sold at the auction mart and I attended at two or three of the sales but the prices realized were exceedingly low. Horses from 15.2 to 16 hands sold at from £16 to £25 and inferior from £10 to £15, but the whole lot were unbroken, wild, thin in flesh and many of them vicious, in fact not suited for the market, and were principally purchased by dealers who intended breaking and putting them in good condition before offering them for sale. Notwithstanding the extremely low prices realized I am convinced that a first class Canadian horse suitable for the market would command a ready sale and afford a handsome profit to the shipper. The class of carriage horse usually bought in Canada for the American market by the American buyers would find an equally ready sale here. The prices for good carriage horses in Belfast is from £50 to £70. Cobs standing 15 to 15½ hands, with good action and sound, are worth from £30 to £45. Ever since I came to Ireland I have been impressed with the exceedingly high prices realized for good active driving horses. I am convinced that a visit from one of Canada's large horse dealers would result in opening up a considerable export trade in Canadian horses.

## APPLES.

The apple trade has increased enormously within the last three years and I am pleased to say that the Canadian apples hold a first place in the market and are much preferred to those coming from the United States, and the trade can be made a most profitable one if ordinary business care is exercised. In the first place there should be uniformity in size, and one variety only in each barrel, and the name of the apple, the place where grown and "Canadian" should be plainly marked upon each barrel. When the size is not uniform and two or three varieties are found in the same barrel the apples will not bring a high price. I have seen two barrels of Baldwins sold together on the market, one bringing 18s. the other 9s. 6d., all in consequence of their mixed appearance. It pays to send only the best apples to this side, as the cost for freight, commission and other expenses is the same for poor lots as for good.

I have made considerable inquiry amongst the fruit dealers and all agree that a large and profitable trade can be done in Canadian apples, and the profit can be increased in proportion to the care in packing and first class quality of the variety of whatever kind sent.

Messrs. P. & I. Nichol have furnished me with their report which is hereunto annexed, and their suggestions are well worth the attention of Canadian shippers.

#### IMPORTATION OF AMERICAN AND CANADIAN APPLES.

"The importation of American and Canadian apples in the city of Belfast has increased about 50 per cent during the last seven years and has completely paralyzed the trade in Irish apples. There is no direct importation of American apples into the city and this will no doubt be considered strange when we mention the fact that continental fruit of all kinds (Belgian, Dutch and French apples, French pears, cherries, plums, tomatoes, &c.) is brought direct. All the supplies of American apples come from Liverpool where they are bought on commission or to order. During the past season the number of barrels of American apples brought to Belfast has been something extraordinary. We proudly claim the honour of importing more than all others combined, and this will be readily understood when we mention that there were shipped to us nearly 10,000 barrels of American and Canadian apples. These all arrived in four months being over six hundred barrels weekly. These embraced about five thousand States apples and the remainder Canadians. Canadian apples are far and away more popular in this market than the States apples and we anticipate a greater demand for them in the future and the public are becoming better acquainted with them and can rely on their turning out sound, which is more than can be said for some of the States apples. We think that in one respect at least the States packers should take a lesson from their Canadian friends. We refer to the fact that Canadian apples are packed in good clean barrels made especially we understand for the purpose. States apples are often packed in flour barrels which give them a bad appearance, and during the past season (end of August to December) we disposed of upwards of 5,000 barrels of Canadian apples alone. These comprised "Kings," "20 oz. Pippins," "Baldwins," and in fact every variety of Canadian apples. "Kings" are considered by those entitled to know the best eating apples and they are therefore more in demand amongst the upper classes than any other. "20 oz. Pippins" are also pretty well in demand but they are used rather for cooking purposes than for the table. We think, however, that "Baldwins" are more popular than any other class, and this probably arises from the fact that they are much cheaper than either "Kings" or "Pippins." There is another variety of apples which has a good number of supporters—we refer to "Greenings." These apples we consider to be good value and often recommend them, as they are generally reliable. We do not think the present system of packing apples as practised in Canada could be improved on. The barrels are clean and in good condition and the packing is in our opinion as perfect as possible."

"Our busiest months for apples are September and October. It will no doubt be considered strange that there are no Canadian apples sent direct to Belfast, the commercial capital of Ireland and the third port in the United Kingdom. Yet such is the case as they are all brought from Liverpool. Continental fruits of all kinds (French, Belgian and Dutch, apples, pears, cherries, plums, &c.) are all imported direct."

#### TOMATOES.

I have taken some pains to get information regarding the demand and sale of tomatoes in this city and other parts of Ireland, and find that a very large trade can be done and only awaits development. The demand here would be exceedingly large if the prices could be somewhat reduced. Indeed, I may say that only the well to do can afford to buy them at present prices, when, from a Canadian point of view, one finds tomatoes sold in the shops at from 18 to 32 cents per lb., it does seem as if Canadian tomatoes might be sent across and afford a handsome profit. Messrs. Nichol have sent me the following report of the tomato trade, and its prospects, which I think well worth the attention of Canadian fruit dealers. They say:—

"We would not like to venture an opinion as to the value of Canadian tomatoes as we have never received any of these. We would however point out that English tomatoes sometimes realise 28 cents per lb. wholesale. The other kinds brought to



this city are French, Guernsey and Canary Island. These draw at certain times 8 to 16 cents per lb. ; 8 to 18 cents per lb. ; 24 to 49 cents per box (6 lbs.) respectively. They are most in demand during the summer months (June, July, August and sometimes even September). It will of course be understood that in these as everything else the price is ruled by the supply and demand. Often indeed the prices are considerably lower than those quoted above. Tomatoes are packed in various ways—each country having a system of its own. French tomatoes are packed in two styles : 1st. in handled baskets containing about 15 lbs. or 16 lbs. each ; and 2nd. in sawdust in boxes containing 30 lbs. to 40 lbs. Guernsey tomatoes are all packed in baskets each containing about 16 to 20 lbs. Canary Island tomatoes on the other hands are all packed in boxes, some in sawdust and some without it. There are about 40 lbs. of tomatoes in the boxes packed with sawdust and about 6 lbs. in the boxes without sawdust.”

“ With regard to Canadian tomatoes we think they should be packed in sawdust in boxes containing 30 to 40 lbs. tomatoes. This would, we believe, be a convenient size. It will of course be understood that tomatoes require to be packed in good sound condition. When this is not done they are over-ripe when they arrive and have to be cleared out quickly or they would be valueless. We anticipate a fair demand for tomatoes in September.”

The prices quoted are for large sized suitable for table use, say, from 5d. to 1s. per lb., and for small, for pickling, 2d. to 4d. per lb. Messrs. Nichol gave directions for packing, and I am sure a small consignment, as a trial, sent to Liverpool would prove profitable and satisfactory.

#### POULTRY AND EGGS.

As the Canadian shipments of eggs and poultry have been principally to Liverpool, Mr. Dyke will no doubt furnish a full and exhaustive report upon them. None so far as I know, come direct to Ireland, although both have been sold in this market. The poultry, I am told, was exceedingly satisfactory ; but I do not think the quantity brought to Ireland, at least Belfast, was very large.

#### BARLEY.

I am exceedingly pleased to be able to report that a considerable quantity of Canadian Barley has been used in this vicinity during the past year. “The Irish Distillery Limited” having used, in part of the year only, nearly 9,000 tons or say about 360,000 bushels. I think the late Minister of Agriculture, the Honourable Mr. Carling is deserving of great credit, for bringing about the successful introduction of the Canadian barley to the British market. I may say that it will be worth while considering whether it will not be to the advantage of shippers of Canadian barley to ship some cargoes to Ireland and especially to Belfast.

The Irish Distillery Limited have pointed out in their letter in answer to one of my questions that “Direct steamers with as few intermediate agents as practicable” would be of advantage. I am positive that a large barley trade can be done in Belfast if properly looked after and if properly placed upon the market. The annexed letter answers pretty fully the important questions regarding the quality and adaptability of the Canadian barley to this market.

DEAR SIR,—In reply to your enquiry of yesterday :—

Quantity of Canadian barley used by us in part of last year, 9,000 tons nearly.

Quality of malting barley 53–54 lbs. per bushel.

Suited fairly well for our purposes. The sort we used compares well against Black Sea or Danubian barleys.

Direct steamers with as few intermediate agents as practicable. Last year was exceptional. Owing to the prohibition of exports from Russian Ports, barley of distillers quality was scarce, and owing to the tariff in United States of America, Canadian barley was forced on this market. If Canadian malting barley of the same good qualities continues to come at same money and at the same weight per bushel as Danubian or Black Sea barleys, we are, in the meantime rather inclined to favour it.

HAY.

I have had a number of letters from Canadian hay pressers from the provinces of Quebec and Ontario, and one or two from the Maritime provinces, to all of whom I furnished detailed information regarding the market prices, mode of shipment, &c. Messrs. Cullen and Allan have just written me to say that they have in Liverpool, just arrived, a considerable quantity of Canadian hay, and I am confident the prices will prove satisfactory if the hay has been judiciously purchased in Canada. In conclusion I may say that the duties of your agents upon this side having been largely increased, by having added to them matters of trade, the correspondence has in consequence largely increased; and I think Canadian exporters have found some advantage in the change. By the large amount of Canadian correspondence and the shipments of produce as a result, I am convinced that the inauguration of this policy will prove satisfactory.

## REPORT OF GLASGOW AGENT.

(THOMAS GRAHAM.)

40, ST. ENOCH SQUARE,  
GLASGOW, 31st December, 1892.

SIR,—I have the honor herewith to submit my report upon *Trade* matters for the past year.

As compared with former years, the trade to and from the Clyde has been very satisfactory, more than the usual quantities, as a rule, of the various articles of trade coming and going, and this is particularly the case in regard to imports in such articles as eggs, hay and timber. Grains of various descriptions and provisions of the usual kinds have also arrived in fully their usual quantities taken altogether. Cattle have come over in considerably less numbers than last season, this being to a large extent due to the restrictions put upon them during the latter part of the year.

## HORSES AND CATTLE.

Horses have again arrived in largely increased numbers, and this trade decidedly promises to be a very fruitful one in the future, with due care being exercised in the selection of suitable animals in our various provinces.

A number of animals of pure breed of various descriptions as in the past were sent out during last season, but from the continued prevalence of pleuro-pneumonia in this country, there have been much fewer cattle than would otherwise have been the case.

The first consignment of these, shipped for Halifax per steam-ship "Manitoban" on 25th August, consisted of 43 animals in all, chiefly shorthorns (30), sent by Mr. Duthie of Collynie, to various parts of Canada; another lot (7) being sent by Mr. Bruce of Darlington, to the Ontario Government Agricultural College at Guelph, consisting of Sussex, Shorthorn, Ayrshires and Jerseys, and the remainder (6) being sent by Mr. Wallace, Auchenbrain, to the Hon. Mr. Ballantyne, Stratford, Ontario, consisting entirely of Ayrshires. All were very fine animals.

The second consignment shipped for Halifax per steam-ship "Nestorian," consisted of one Polled Angus heifer which was sent by Mr. Stables, Lynemore, to Dr. Craik of Montreal. This was a very fine specimen of the breed.

At the Spring Stallion Show here there was a very fine display of horses, almost entirely Clydesdales, the quality being in every respect equal to that of former years. I met with numbers who are connected with the trade in such animals to Canada, and with other owners of such stock, and had long conversations with them as to its future prospects.

In regard to the horse trade generally, I can add very little to my special report of 12th February last, beyond what is referred to in my special report of my trip to Canada. I may say however, I find those in the trade here consider that the demand for good animals will still continue from Canada and that there is nothing better for heavy van or lorry horses than those with a good deal of Clydesdale blood in them.

There is also getting to be a great demand for hackneys of good quality in all parts of Canada.

Besides the animals before referred to in regard to the Highland Society's Show, there was a good exhibit of other descriptions of horses, such as carriage horses, hunters, &c., as well as of Highland, Shorthorn, and Polled Angus cattle, and Cheviot, and black faced sheep. I had many conversations with people there in connection with stock of various kinds adapted to our country.

I ascertained when out in Canada that the crossing of the usual breeds, with Cheviots particularly, which I have advocated for a long time in my annual reports, has proved exceedingly successful, the produce having so much more character and uniformity in every respect, and coming to maturity so much quicker, lambs frequently coming to great weights early in the autumn. As I have often observed before also, their not being subject to pleuro-pneumonia is a matter of great importance in introducing this description of stock into our various provinces, in varieties according to where the lands are most suitable for them.

There were sent out from the Clyde to Canada during last season.

From the above it will be seen that including ponies there has been a very great decrease as compared with last year in horses. Cattle and sheep have been sent in small numbers as usual.

I herewith give the statistics of the arrivals of live stock from Canada to the Clyde, Aberdeen and Dundee, during 1892 and the previous year.

As will be seen by the above horses have come over in largely increased numbers, cattle showing a very considerable decrease for reasons before referred to, and very few sheep. Notwithstanding the very severe storms during the season, the "Allan" line only lost 6 horses out of 1,055 shipped, and 58 cattle out of 12,425 shipped. The "Donaldson" line did not lose a single animal out of 94 horses shipped, and only lost 54 out of 15,075 cattle shipped, so that the percentage of losses by these lines has as usual been very small. Aberdeen and Dundee are referred to later on.

As regards the cattle trade generally I fear that, as in former years, shippers as a rule will have made nothing this year, in fact it has been the worst year the trade has yet experienced, and many must have lost heavily. Prices throughout have ruled very low in the British market, though in the early part of the season as usual the best business was accomplished, as the animals were in the best condition at that time. Far too many thin animals were sent over in the latter part of the season to pay those concerned in the trade satisfactorily, and particularly at the very end of the season, for reasons hereafter referred to.

The trade to Aberdeen shows a very considerable falling off, the losses on the passage being 165 out of 6,635 shipped, so that the percentage of losses was very considerable, to be attributed to a great extent to the stormy weather, and the inferior description of some of the vessels going to that port. In respect to Dundee there were only 8 lost out of 8,559 shipped which is a very noticeable feature in regard to this port, the percentage of loss being very much less than during the former season.

I herewith as in the past insert a letter from Messrs. John Swan and Sons of Lawriston Place, Edinburgh, which firm has from the first taken such an active interest in the cattle trade, in which they give their views as to the present position.

" SIR,—Regarding the Canadian cattle trade just closed we are afraid, so far as shippers are concerned, that it will have been a very unprofitable and unsatisfactory one. The system of taking space in advance without regard to the value of cattle on this side or the cost on the other, has had much to do with this result. Although freights have been low latterly still the value of cattle in this country has

materially fallen, and trade has frequently been more satisfactory with freights at £4 and £5 a head.

“ A very large number of the shipments to Scotland this year have been taken by farmers for winter feeding, and Canadian cattle are surely getting more into favour. It is also satisfactory to note a wonderful improvement within the last two or three years of the breed of the cattle shipped to this country.

“ Regarding the scare about pleuro-pneumonia it is the nearly unanimous opinion of every one on this side of the Atlantic that no such disease existed amongst the animals sold at Dundee and which caused the destruction of about 1200 cattle and a loss to the ratepayers of £7,000 or £8,000. It is not the first mistake Professor Brown has made and we would take the opinion of Professor Williams a long way ahead of that of Professor Brown.

“ It is an open secret that it is thought were all foreign stock prevented coming alive, it would materially assist the farmers in this country. Those who hold this opinion know nothing about the facts of the case, as if Canada were to continue, as at present, to be scheduled the price of stockers would necessarily go up to a great extent, and supposing Canadian cattle had to be slaughtered and sent to market as beef, there would be nothing but serious loss to the shippers and with the risk of warm weather in many cases entire loss.

“ We observe that Canada has taken a wise course in inviting three delegates of this country to make inquiry as to the health of cattle in Canada, because if pleuro-pneumonia exists there in an epidemic form it cannot be hidden. It is a very extraordinary thing that out of the many thousands of Canadian which our firm has handled this year there has not been one complaint.

“ The United States had made application to get the embargo removed from their stock, but we don't think this will be given effect to.

“ There is no doubt that if these restrictions on Canadian cattle continue next year, urgent representations will be made by feeders in this country to have them removed.

“ The present has been an exceptionally bad year for all connected with agriculture, and prices have, especially for sheep and lambs, scarcely ever been so low.

“ Strikes are driving trade out of the country and lessening the demand amongst the working population, and there is apparently no chance of any immediate improvement. It seems that the agricultural depression is uniform all over the world.

There have been very few shipments of Canadian sheep here this year and these we presume have not been profitable.

Pleuro-pneumonia still continues in existence in various parts of this country, and as a result in my opinion the greatest caution should be exercised in permitting cattle to go to Canada until this disease is completely stamped out here.

As usual, I received from the Clyde Trust, the Custom house, and otherwise, the following statistics respecting the general articles of import from British North America, and the tonnage of vessels for the past year :—

By the above figures it will be seen that the total amount of the tonnage is much the same as the year before, and the estimate for the half year is rather more for steam vessels than last year, and a great deal more for sailing ones, chiefly on account of the much larger quantity of timber imported.

The ports of Aberdeen and Dundee have also taken other descriptions of cargo in the ships which have come from Canadian ports, as well as the cattle before referred to.

The following are the articles imported to the Clyde during the year 1892, which I have prepared in a similar manner to former years:—

Numerous other articles were sent over, not being however in such quantities as to warrant a specification of them. As formerly there is a great variety of articles imported, increasing from year to year as in the past.

It may be noticed that grapes and tomatoes are beginning to come over, and I do not see why they should not come in much larger quantities in the future, from what I saw when in Canada.

Barley and rye have increased very largely in quantity from the preceding year, and other grains about as usual.

In regard to eggs the increase is very marked. In connection with this trade I append copy of a letter I have received from Messrs. John MacLeish & Co., which gives a great deal of valuable information on this subject. I may say they are by far the largest importers of this article to Glasgow, they doing more than double the amount of trade, as compared with all others combined. Their eggs have been chiefly brought over in large cases whereas the reverse is the case in most other instances. Their letter is:—

“ *Re* CANADIAN EGGS.

“ Mr. GRAHAM.

“ DEAR SIR,—Following up our conversation on this subject we have pleasure in informing you that the consignments of Canadian eggs entrusted to us for sale this

season, cover the respectable total of 8,465 cases containing 120 doz. eggs each, and 2,607 cases containing 30 doz. eggs each—or a total of 1,094,010 doz. eggs, or 13,128,120 eggs.

“These eggs met a fairly good market, the earlier shipments in May and June, realizing almost Irish prices. As the season advanced however, a greater difference in price was established, and Canadian eggs were more difficult to sell. This, in our opinion was caused by the *great heat* in Canada in the early fall and many lots of eggs were caught in the *hot wave*, coming to hand with a greater proportion of bad, than the trade here expected. As a result buyers were very critical and made purchases with care and deliberation, protecting themselves against loss. A policy of this kind naturally caused prices to hang, and not until October was a firm rise established.

“Regarding prices. Good ordinary fresh eggs, 15 lbs. per 120, opened on the average at about 6s. per hundred, fluctuating from 6s. to 6s. 6d. and 7s. over the fall, in October a rise to 8s. 6d. to 9s. was established for fresh stock, and to-day, December, 10s. to 10s. 3d. for same class might be got.

“In pickled eggs, good sizable 15 lbs. eggs may be said to have averaged from 7s. 3d. to 7. 6d. all season, some lots bringing a little less.

“The value of the Glasgow importations may be taken at roughly £50,000.

“Regarding the trade in eggs it appears to us that Canadian merchants have fairly well caught the market here. Dull trade may have prevented importers from getting as much money as they would wish for the stock, but all round prices have been fair, and *drawbacks* comparatively light.

“As a rule claims for drawbacks may be put at say 3 per cent. on the value of the eggs. This again is liable to be reduced if proper care is taken in the packing on the other side, and the cases well handled in transit.

“Some dealers prefer the cases of 30 doz. eggs and will pay more money for them, others again will not have them at all. It is therefore difficult to suggest any improvement in the size of the package, and a judicious consignment of both is perhaps best.

“Fresh eggs at all times should be examined before being packed, and any eggs that got damp should not be sent over, as they almost invariably get *spotted* on the way, and spotted eggs spoil the reputation of the stock.

“The grading of the stock, may be said to be a matter of importance as large eggs always bring a good price especially if proper care is taken in excluding all faulty eggs.

“We would impress you with the fact that stock of this nature highly perishable as it is, should have all the attention that shippers and carriers can give to the trade as the entire business is worked on very low margins all round.

#### APPLES.

Apples have come over in rather more than the usual quantities, though in the first part of the season they were not of the quality usually obtainable at that time, and this to a great extent was due to the cold and wet weather in May which was so prevalent, so unusual, in some parts of Canada at that season of the year.

#### HAY.

In regard to hay I find that the Canadian article continues to be highly thought of here, and that the probabilities are that after the New Year it will be in increased demand at higher prices than at present.

#### POULTRY.

In respect to poultry, as far as I can learn, only one consignment has come direct to Glasgow this season, consisting of about 400 turkeys to Messrs Stevenson & Poe, though a few have come *via* Liverpool. I believe, however, that it is only a question of time, when articles of all descriptions in this line of trade will be sent direct to Glasgow.

## CHEESE AND BUTTER.

Cheese and butter have come over in about the usual quantities, the quality of the former having been so well established for a long time, and the latter, it is quite anticipated, will come over in much larger volume, and of better quality than in the past, from the energy which is being exercised by the Agriculture Department of the Dominion.

## TIMBER.

Timber has arrived in unusually large quantities during the past season, and this I imagine is due to the smallness of stock in this article held in this country of late.

## GRAIN.

In regard to grain I find on consulting friends of mine in that trade, that no Ontario wheat of this season has come to this market as yet. Barley, oats and oatmeal have kept coming on a liberal scale all the year round. The quality of the new crop wheat from the Province of Manitoba has again brought her to the front. An almost total immunity from frost has enabled her to export freely very handsome wheat, heavier and more attractive than that from Minnesota, so that the grade No. 2, Hard Manitoban has become very popular this season in London, as well as Glasgow, and has been dealt in largely. It has been selling at from 29s. to 30s. per 480 lbs.

The other usual articles of trade have come over much as in former years both as regards quality and quantity, and all the indications are that a healthy and improved business in most of them is likely to be the result to all concerned in them in the future.

## CATTLE.

SIR,—I am pleased to report, that as far as Bristol and Avonmouth are concerned, the arrivals of Capadian beasts have been free from disease.

The reports I get from local butchers, dealers, graziers, &c., are all unanimous that the quality of Canadian cattle is undoubtedly improving year by year. Canadian farmers will do well to note this and endeavour still further to improve their stock, as the trade can only be maintained on a sound basis by shipping to this country animals of the primest sorts. Prices, it must be admitted, have ruled very low during this season, but it is a source of gratification to learn that Canadian beasts have fetched better prices than Irish and equal to the best English, in fact I have often heard butchers state Canadians have sold for more per cwt. than English in the same market. In the fall markets, the prices for store cattle fell very low, and hay, roots and feed of every kind being so dear, farmers were compelled to dispose of their fat cattle to raise money, the poor ones selling for scarcely anything. Canadians will do well to bear this in mind and feed accordingly, as beef in the English markets next spring is sure to be very dear, and shipments of Canadian beasts at that season will be certain to sell at good figures.

I am sorry to see further restrictions put upon Canadian cattle arriving at this port, compelling them to be slaughtered on landing, and such being the case, I would advise Canadians to push the carcass trade. By taking great care in killing only the best cattle and giving every consideration to the method of packing and shipping, this business might be made a very flourishing one, and when we look to the economy of money, in both the matter of freights, and the cost of feeding and looking after the live animals during transit, there certainly seems every reason for paying more attention to this branch of trade. The prospects of such a trade with England for the year 1893 are good. Farmers are feeding thousands of cattle less this winter than in other years, and there will be a great scarcity of good animals next spring, when prices are sure to advance.

Canadian stores purchased by the west country farmers are doing well and seem to give entire satisfaction.

The Bristol Christmas market for the sale of fat cattle was held on the 15th December instant, but, owing to the fact that most of the local buyers had supplied themselves at the various country markets in the neighbourhood of Bristol, did not compare favourably with last year. There were altogether about 500 fat beasts on sale, but, speaking generally, the quality was not superfine. A few exceedingly fine Devons were readily sold at prices ranging from 70 shillings to 72 shillings per cwt. There were also some excellent short-horns and steers penned, and these made 62 shillings to 65 shillings per cwt., without much difficulty. The second and third rate qualities were altogether neglected, in fact, most of this class remained unsold. Irish cattle were not plentiful, but a few of the best quality found ready purchasers. The absence of really first-rate stock is to some degree accounted for by the fact that many of the local graziers sold privately a week or two ago on their farms. Some very fine Devons, which were quickly bought up by the local butchers, sold for £30 and upwards. A lot of ninety steers and heifers on offer averaged 63 shillings per cwt.

## HORSE TRADE.

Once more I must urge upon Canadian farmers the value of the markets here for Canadian horses. During the year I wrote a short report on this trade, and the same was duly forwarded to Canada by the High Commissioner, Sir Charles Tupper. I shall be glad to find Canadians throwing more energy into this branch of trade which certainly merits more consideration, and is one, if only properly conducted, which must prove remunerative, looking to the high figures always obtainable for first class animals. But as yet little interest has been awakened. I am sure it is a business which once fairly started will increase annually, and Canadians who go into this matter and breed specially for the English market will find the enterprise very satisfactory. It is surprising to me that Canadian farmers have not received the idea with greater favour. Let me advise all Canadian farmers who have the slightest chance of keeping good brood mares to do so, as such would produce hunters, carriage horses, &c., for which animals there is a splendid market in England, and there are few things that would pay better or yield more certain returns. The following are the probable prices a breeder may expect:—

Hunters from 5 to 6 years old. . . . .	£ 80 to £100
Carriage horses, as pairs. . . . .	£150 to £200

## BARLEY.

The growing and exportation of this article are of the utmost importance to the Dominion and every care should be taken by growers of barley to see that they are sowing only the best seed, and also that the threshing operation and harvesting are not carelessly performed. I learn many otherwise good lots of barley have been practically spoilt by the folly of some farmers, who have allowed a small quantity of rubbish to be mixed with the bulk thereby rendering it as a whole, totally unfit for the maltster. However, this is a thing that will effect its own cure and right itself in the long run, as farmers will soon find out that such a policy if persisted in will deprive them of the British market altogether. I think many of them have learnt a lesson this year which will teach them the wisdom of sending to England only the very best article they can raise, as in this trade as in others, exports to this country will only receive any preference by being of superior quality. There should be I am told no mixing of the two row and six row varieties, as it is considered very desirable to have them in separate lots, quite distinct. Dealers in barley in the Canadian market for export to England, I would advise to be very particular and examine every bag before it is shot into the bulk. To obtain the top price, barley for the markets in this district must be plump in the berry, of good weight, mellowness, colour, condition and uniformity, all of which qualities it is well barley growers should bear in mind and strive to procure. With all the mistakes made in shipping barley last year much valuable information has been obtained and such errors should not occur again. Merchants who have handled considerable quantities of last season's Canadian barley report that some of the shipments, both of the two row and the six row varieties, obtained good prices, and gave satisfaction for brewing and distilling purposes. The greatest drawback was the extreme irregular quality found in some lots. As uniformity of quality is one of the most desirable conditions, I must again advise farmers and dealers to be very particular on this point, if they wish to successfully compete in the British markets. I am informed that barley from New Zealand is securing good figures at present in the English markets. Surely Canadian barley should fetch as much as the product of the much further off country New Zealand.

## HAY TRADE.

Some months ago I reported, through the High Commissioner, the probability of a great scarcity of hay in this district. I watched the matter very closely and as the season advanced I found I was correct in my prediction and wrote again to Sir Charles Tupper, who very promptly communicated with the Department at Ottawa and put the matter in such a form that I may say a new trade, and I hope a profitable

one, has sprung into existence. I gave Sir Charles Tupper the names of some reliable men who were willing to go into the hay business and they received many letters from all parts of Quebec and Ontario resulting in the shipment of hundreds of tons of hay to this city, the quality of which, I believe, has given great satisfaction, but unfortunately freights have been too high to make it very remunerative at present to the shippers. I would advise the people of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia to carefully consider this matter during the winter and the coming spring, when hay will be selling here at a high figure. I advocate the shipping of hay, if possible, from St. John and Halifax, by sailing ships direct to Bristol, and not to Avonmouth, as hay landed at the wharf in this city will have an advantage of quite 4s. per ton more than if landed at Avonmouth where dock dues, harbour rates and railway freights are considerable. The freight by sailing ship would I think be less than by steamer, and time would be no great object as prices for hay will still further advance for a few months at least. There have been some shipments to this port of hay from Detroit, Michigan, *via* Philadelphia. It was good stuff and met with a ready sale at £5 per ton. The freight was only £2 per ton through from Detroit to Bristol. I am giving great attention to this trade, and hope later on to have some valuable information to report as I know of several local men who intend going into the business energetically and who will leave the details of the working somewhat in my hands.

#### BACON AND PORK.

This trade is making progress though perhaps not so rapidly as may be desired as the markets here are good, and Canadians have every facility for going into the business on a large scale. There was a lull in the exports from Canada for a few years, but a fresh start seems to have been made, which I think is a good sign and an indication of further development of this trade, which it will well bear. It is true that pork and bacon have been selling low for a long time and until this fall no improvement took place, but now the price has gone up fully 2d. per lb. There is no prejudice against Canadian pork or bacon in the Bristol and surrounding markets, but I must again advise shippers to be very particular and ship bacon in as dry a condition as possible, as the demand here is only for quality. The present prices of pork are almost certain to be maintained, as all through Great Britain, owing to this industry being so very bad for so long, the breeding of pigs has been largely discarded, in fact hundreds of farmers have given up pigs altogether, and consequently there will follow a great deficiency of these animals throughout the Kingdom. According to the agricultural returns I see there were in the year 1891 in Great Britain 4,272,764 pigs, and now in the present year 1892 only 3,265,898, a decrease in one year of 1,006,866. These figures alone should be, I think, sufficient to induce Canadian farmers to seriously consider the trade, which in my opinion affords them an opportunity which they certainly ought not to neglect, so many advantages have they for the profitable rearing of hogs.

#### CHEESE.

The cheese trade has been very satisfactory, the returns have been increased and the quality on the whole maintained, though in some instances I have heard complaints, though not of a very serious nature, affecting more particularly the exports from certain parts of Quebec, where it is stated the cheese manufactured is often much below the average standard of finest Canadian. This matter is being attended to by Professor Robertson and the High Commissioner in London, who no doubt will be able to do something to put things right with the Bristol Provision Merchants. The merchants here complain of the manner in which some Canadian houses ship their goods and they have taken steps to protect themselves against unfair dealing, which it is alleged has been practised upon them by certain firms. It is stated that the cheese require grading, as it is no uncommon thing to find a parcel of Canadian cheese on arrival to consist of several distinct sorts, even when the quotation has been for the finest Canadians, which is very damaging to the trade. I am informed that such things do not occur in the shipments from New York. The

merchants here seem very firm and decided on the matter and I hope that the authorities in Canada will look into this and see that either a system of grades is adopted and a range of prices quoted accordingly, or that the inspectors will make themselves quite satisfied that no inferior makes are mixed with the better class of goods to the deterioration of the bulk.

#### BUTTER.

This industry is making fair headway, but with the splendid facilities in Canada for the manufacture of this class of goods of the very best quality, and the proximity to the British markets Canadians ought certainly to participate to a far greater degree in the trade with England in this article. Other countries are working hard for this trade, notably Denmark and now Australia, who are sending to England excellent butter, but no better than the Dominion can produce and place on the markets here at a figure as low as that of any other country.

#### EGGS.

The trade in Canadian eggs is still progressing and, from the inquiries, I have made, is giving satisfaction in this city and neighbourhood. Many thanks are due to the High Commissioner in London for the rapid advance this trade has made. I am watching this trade carefully but have nothing very important at present to report.

#### POULTRY.

This is a trade which is much neglected and does not improve as much as I would like to see it. Christmas seems to be the only time we hear of Canadian poultry, which should not be the case, as the market here is a very good one for poultry for several months. I believe Canadian poultry could be profitably shipped weekly from October to April. In the year 1874 I had several hundred turkeys shipped from Toronto to Bristol direct, this being I think the first consignment to England. I gave special orders how they were to be shipped, and as the birds arrived in splendid condition, I beg to again lay the instructions before you.

First. Fast all poultry for 24 hours, then kill and hang up in a cool dry room. Secondly. The next day pack up tight in barrels, always in the feathers, no matter what kind of poultry or game.

#### SALMON.

During the year I wrote to Sir Charles Tupper advising Canadians who deal in salmon to ship it in the kippered state, that is to say, slightly salted, dried and smoked, and my remarks on this matter were forwarded to Canada, but I am sorry to say I have no knowledge of this plan being tried. Thousands of tons of fish cured in this way are annually sent to England and of much inferior quality to Canadian salmon. I think a saving would also be effected in general expenses in comparison with the canning process.

The above mentioned process of kippering would also of course apply to mackerel and is one well worth the attention of fishermen in the Maritime Provinces, where I believe mackerel are caught in large quantities.

## BRITISH WEST INDIA ISLANDS.

With a view to encouraging and promoting trade with these islands, which afford to certain classes of Canadian goods the most profitable market in the world, the Government has, as before mentioned, subsidized a line of steamers to guarantee direct, regular and rapid communication, and has also appointed commercial agents to look after trade matters in the principal islands.

The reports of these agents are appended, together with statements of the imports and exports of each island or presidency for the years 1890 and 1891, with portion taken from and sent to Canada in each case. A summary of these statements is here given.

From this statement it will be seen that, while in every case the total imports of 1891 show a marked decrease from those of 1890, the imports from Canada have increased in every island except Barbados.

Taken altogether the imports have decreased \$4,269,000, while at the same time the value of imports taken from Canada has increased \$136,000, and from the agents' reports it will be seen that the increase in 1892 has been much greater.

A careful study of these reports will impress upon the minds of Canadian exporters the necessity of manufacturing, packing and shipping goods to suit the requirements of the trade in these markets. The secret of Great Britain's success in establishing and maintaining her hold upon the markets of other countries has been the care taken by her manufacturers to furnish goods to suit the particular market for which they are manufactured, and also the care taken to ensure the purchasers that in every case none but articles of a uniform good grade will be furnished.

The British West Indian market is not a large one, but the imports of certain articles are in such quantities as would justify their manufacture or production exclusively for this market.

Take, for instance, the articles of flour, butter and cheese. The total imports of flour in 1891 amounted in value to fully \$3,000,000. Flour for this market requires to be closely packed in heavily-built barrels with round hoops and to be

ground from carefully selected winter wheat, but the extra price realized would make it profitable to establish mills to grind flour especially for this market.

The imports of butter were to the value of about \$500,000 in 1891. The principal objection to Canadian butter has been the size of the package and frailty of the tubs in which packed. It would appear that tinned butter is the best suited to this market, and the size of the market would justify the establishment of creameries to make butter for this market only.

The imports of cheese amounted to over 1,000,000 lbs., of the value of over \$135,000. Here again the only objection to Canadian cheese is the size of the package and the covering. Cheese for this market should never be larger than 30 lbs. in weight and from that down to 5 lbs. or less. It is worthy of notice that the average import price of cheese in this market is about 13½ cents per pound against about 10 cents per pound in Great Britain, to which country Canada exported last year over \$11,000,000 in value. It is evident that several factories in Canada could with advantage turn their attention to the putting up of cheese to suit this market.

It is remarkable that the objection to three such important articles of Canadian exports as these should in all cases be on account of coverings, and that these coverings should all be of wood, while at the same time there is no country in the world which possesses such exceptional advantages as Canada for the manufacture of such articles. It should also be remembered that the same objection to the size of the package and packing has been made against Canadian cheese and butter in Great Britain as in British West Indies.

## BARBADOS.

### REPORTS OF COMMERCIAL AGENT.

BRIDGETOWN, BARBADOS, 28th June, 1892.

The Honourable

GEORGE E. FOSTER, D.C.L., M.P., Minister of Finance,  
Ottawa, Canada.

SIR,—1. In response to your communication of the 28th May, I have the honour to make the following report upon "The openings for Trade with Canada" in this island.

2. It must be premised that a large number of the articles which are produced or are made in Canada, and are suitable for exportation to this colony, also form items of importation from the United States of America, with which country, owing to the facilities and cheapness of transportation, and to the frequent opportunities of communication; there will always be a very extensive business done, in comparison with what is likely to be effected with the Canadian provinces, under existing circumstances. And another important factor in the case is the large market that exists in the United States for the sugar of this island, the bulk of the production being purchased by merchants and refiners there. (Formerly large orders for sugar were sent here from the Canadian refiners, but in the last few years these have ceased. The reason of this I am unable to give.)

3. Then, too, the American shippers have, for a series of years, studied the wants and prejudices of the people of this island, and thus, by observation and long experience, they have been enabled to adapt their productions to the requirements of each particular branch of business, in accordance with the desires of the users and consumers of such goods.

4. To get properly into touch with the necessities of "the trade" here, much trouble has, therefore, been taken and time expended, and in many instances pecuniary loss has been entailed. If Canadian business men desire to share, to any appreciable extent, in the trade with this colony, they must, therefore, be prepared to make similar sacrifices; and even then, if they succeed in turning out such articles as are approved by our people, they must be further willing to meet the continued and earnest competition with similar goods imported from the United States of America and which, from a monetary point of view, is not always attended with satisfactory results.

5. The foregoing remarks refer more particularly to goods such as butter, cheese, corn, cornmeal, flour, hams, oleomargarine and other butter compounds, lard and porkstuffs.

6. But there are some other articles that require little or no special attention, save as regards the manner in which they are put up for exportation, and in respect of which there does not seem to exist any reason why shipments could not be made from Canada and leave some margin of profit, viz. :—Round and split peas, pollard, hay, white oats, dried and pickled fish (of the former say, cod and haddock; of the latter, salmon, mackerel, herring and alewives,) potatoes, shingles, and white pine and spruce lumber.

7. Of the articles last named lumber and shingles are already imported almost exclusively from places within the Dominion; fish of all sorts is imported principally from Newfoundland; hay from St. John, N. B.; while the importations of oats are shared between the United States of America and Prince Edward Island, and peas and pollard come almost entirely from the United States, except small lots of the latter article from England.

8. Since the establishment of the line of steamers from St. John to the West Indies there have been regular shipments from Canada of flour, pollard, peas, hay and oats, and if shippers will follow the instructions of their agents, and are prepared to sell in competition with importations from other places, it is not beyond the range of possibility that a good business may, in time, be developed in these goods.

9. For manufactured goods, such as cottons, woollens, &c., there is little or no opening at present, the importations being almost entirely from the United Kingdom, and I fear that it will be very difficult to overcome the prejudices of the people of this colony in respect of importations of this class of goods from places other than those in the United Kingdom, the experiment to do so, even from the United States having been repeatedly tried and failed.

10. In regard to hardware, edged tools, agricultural implements, builders' sundries, harness and saddlery, &c., as also furniture, it is possible that a better chance of success exists, but manufacturers would have to run the risk of making shipments on their own account, and so introduce their manufactures before dealers in such articles would be inclined to order. At present importations of this class of goods are made from the United Kingdom principally, and also from the United States of America.

11. As it may be of some interest I subjoin a statement of the exportation of sugar and molasses from this island last year to the United Kingdom, United States of America and Dominion of Canada :—

SIR,—Confirming my communication of the 28th June last, I have now to acknowledge the receipt of your telegram, of the 23rd current, requesting me to send immediately trade report and latest blue books.

2. I think it right to mention that the reason why I have not sent any report for the quarter ended 30th September last, is due simply to the fact that so little business has been done between Canada and this island since the date of my last report. There has therefore been, so to speak, nothing on which I could base a report, and it was my intention to have addressed you some time next month, combining in one document a report for the two quarters, September and December, 1892. In view, however, of your telegraphic instructions I hasten to give effect to your wish.

3. It is unnecessary for me to go over the ground mentioned in my previous report as regards the conditions affecting the trade between the Dominion of Canada and this colony. The position remains unaltered, and I can only impress upon those parties in Canada, who are anxious to develop the trade between the two countries, the absolute necessity of studying the requirements and prejudices of this market,

without which the chances of extending the business relations of the respective places will prove abortive.

4. Moreover, if even this be done, manufacturers and others in Canada must be prepared, as pointed out in the 4th and 10th paragraphs of my previous report, to make shipments on their own account, as the Americans have done and still do, which after a time may lead to orders from this side.

5. But up to the present there does not appear to have been much desire on the part of Canadian shippers to do any of these things, and the consequence has been that during the time which has elapsed since the date of my previous report although there has been regular and direct steam communication between Canada and Barbados, the importations from Canada have been very limited and show a considerable diminution in the quantities of the items previously mentioned as having been sent to this colony during the first couple of years of the direct steam communication.

6. For instance, in the item of flour I observe that there has been hardly any of consequence imported. The reason for this may be explained by the complaints that have been made as to the non-keeping qualities of Canadian manufacture, which are said to be due to the description of wheat used, to the soft wood of which the barrels are made and to the loose manner in which the flour is put into the barrels, owing to the packages being too large for the quantity of flour put into the same. In this connection I inclose a newspaper cutting being the leading article of the "Barbados Globe" of the 19th inst., in which reference is made to the defective qualities of Canadian flour, and I think that the points touched upon are deserving of some attention.

8. In conclusion I subjoin a statement of the produce of this colony (sugar and molasses) exported to the United Kingdom, United States of America and Dominion of Canada, during this year, viz. :—

(Extract from *Barbados Globe*, 19th December, 1892.)

Our readers will remember that when the Canadian Minister of Finance was on a visit to this island, he assured us that Canada was in a position to supply us with flour, cheese and other stuffs, quite equal to what we obtained from America and at a cheaper rate. Considering the consumption of flour, meal, cheese, and the like, in this island, we heard the statement with satisfaction, and we looked forward with pleasure to the time that would insure a considerable trade between Canada and this island. That time has not come yet. We know that not long ago some flour was imported from Canada, but the experiment was not a success. It was said that the flour was inferior to American flour, and retailers would not purchase it. We saw one or two samples of the flour, which were certainly acid and hard. Since then we do not think there has been any attempt to force the importation.

There can be no doubt that American flour has secured a monopoly in this market, and for a good reason. The flour from the States is of excellent quality, it is of moderate cost, and it is well put up for exportation.

It has been well said that if Canada flour is to secure a position in the West India markets, it must do so upon its merits. It is hopeless to suppose that an inferior article will be purchased because it is the product of British industry. The fact is any article produced in Barbados would not sell in preference to a better article of the same description from another colony. This very year we have seen the fruit of Dominica and St. Vincent purchased largely in preference to Barbados fruit, because the fruit was better and cheaper than the other. In the past there might have been a feeling for home productions, no matter how inferior to foreign; but all that is over and gone, and the rule is to buy the best article in the cheapest market, without question about nationality. There is no changing that law. If, therefore, Canadian produce is to secure a position in these islands, or to displace American products, the Canadian must be superior to, and cheaper than the American.

For ourselves we shall certainly be glad if Canada can compete with America, and even beat her in the supply of foodstuffs in these islands. And if the Canadian exporter will be made wise by the information furnished him from the West Indies he will no doubt soon be able to compete with the American. A Committee sat recently at the Royal Agricultural and Commercial Society of Demerara, and the reasons for the failure in the past of Canadian flour were threshed out. They seem to have been loose packing, which occasioned acidity, and inferior packages, which caused the flour to cake to the sides of the barrel. These are defects that surely can be remedied without difficulty, and must be if Canadian flour is to sell here. Our cotem of the *Demerara Chronicle* observes, with good sense, that the Canadians, in approaching the West Indian flour market are in reality approaching one that is already very well supplied from the United States and they must, therefore, be prepared to offer some advantage of a tangible nature, if they desire to supplant those who are already in possession. In the course of time frequent consignments at their own risk, packed and forwarded in the manner approved by West Indian dealers would, no doubt, secure for Canadian flour a large share of the patronage of those who as we have already stated are predisposed in favour of British produce, and, where all other conditions are equal, are prepared to give the preference to the article imported and manufactured by men of their own nationality. It is undoubtedly very bad policy on the part of our Canadian brethren to supply an inferior article to people who require the best they can produce, especially when they are trying to make a market. It is worth while going to a good deal of trouble, and suffering not a little loss in order to establish a good reputation; whilst, on the other hand, it is impossible to calculate the evil results that may follow upon the possession of what is generally known as a bad name. The public are pretty good judges in these matters; and are quite prepared to accept the eating as the proof of the pudding whether it be made of flour from Halifax or New York. Of course, whilst it has been made quite plain that the method of packing, and the material in which the flour is packed, have a good deal to do with the nature of the reception it receives, it is desirable in every way, that the flour should be of the kind that has

been found peculiarly adapted to meet the requirements of the tropics. We notice that a merchant at Halifax, N. S., has stated that "The class of wheat which should only be used for making flour for export to the West Indies is the best grade of winter wheat. Spring wheat should on no account be mixed with winter; and no spring wheat flours are safe, not even in limited quantities, excepting our highest grades of Manitoba." The gentleman who was instrumental in getting the Committee appointed is certainly to be congratulated upon the information that has been elicited; and we trust that at no distant date his efforts must be productive of still more tangible results.

## REPORTS OF COMMERCIAL AGENT.

GEORGETOWN, BRITISH GUIANA, November 3, 1892.

The volume and direction of the trade of this colony may be gathered from the following statistics for last year:—

With reference to the current year, I have found it impossible at an earlier date to send on a report for the quarter ended 30th June last, the first after my appointment as commercial corresponding agent here, and the principal reason of the delay has been inability hitherto to obtain official data, the work of the statistical department of our Customs being less forward than it otherwise would have been owing to the books of analysis having to be brought into consonance with the new tariff of import duties which came into force on April 1st, the commencement of our financial year. Those tariff changes were the outcome of the negotiation as to "reciprocal trade" with the United States, whereby this colony secured for its sugars continued free admission into the American market under the McKinley Tariff Act, but the reductions and remissions of duty effected at the instigation of the Washington Government were in no sense differential or more favourable to the United States than to any other country. Through the kindness of the statistician of the Customs Department here, I am now able to attach as an appendix to this report a statement in detail of the imports from the Dominion of Canada in the three months from April 1st to June 30th, which may be summarized as under:—

I now proceed to offer some remarks on some of the heads of imports comprised in the detailed statement appended:—

*Bacon and Hams.*—The average monthly demand in this colony is about 18,000 lbs., yet only 500 lbs. came here from Canada. The supplies are mainly from

the United States and the United Kingdom—mostly from the former—and sales are made at from 8 cents to 13 cents per lb., according to quality. The duty is 1 cent per lb., bacon and hams being among the articles reduced 50 per cent since April, in accordance with the Washington basis of "reciprocity." The bulk of the American hams that come here are of a low class, and I am of opinion that if Canadian exporters would ship here hams of similar quality they would not only be able to enter the market, but could work out a good deal of the American business. But high-priced, high quality goods will not effect it. The consuming class is chiefly black and coloured labourers.

*Flour.*—The average demand is 12,000 barrels per month, and an increasingly large proportion is sent to the goldfields of the interior. The duty, which was formerly \$1 a barrel, is now 75 cents, and the most popular kind coming here is the St. Lawrence brand of the United States, although others of late have been gaining ground, and notably the El Victorioso and Merrie England brands, also from the United States. The Cook's Friend brand of Canada fetches the same rate as the St. Lawrence, but the complaint is that it dries and sours too soon. I should mention that a committee of our Royal Agricultural and Commercial Society has been engaged recently inquiring into the reasons militating against success of a local trade in Canadian flour, and I understand that the report of that committee is intended to be forwarded to the Dominion Board of Trade direct. Our dealers have been accustomed for many years to round-hoop barrels, and as the Canadian flour comes in flat-hooped barrels there is a deep seated prejudice against it on that account. Other objections are that the packages are too large, and the contents too loosely packed, the consequence being that the flour does not keep either so long or so well as the American. But I do not think there can be any doubt that the Manitoba flour is superior to any American kinds at present holding the market, and one of the principal bakers informed me that he paid from 60 to 70 cents more for that flour than for any other. My opinion is that the chief drawbacks to the Canadian trade are as I have already stated, but if the barrels were made smaller, and the flour compressed better, and the shippers saw their way to meet the tastes of the dealers in regard to the style of package, for it should be understood that the prejudice in favour of round hooped barrels is universal and strong, I see no reason why Canadian flour should not very speedily become a formidable rival to the established American brands.

*Fish of all descriptions and Potatoes.*—I do not consider that these branches of trade can be any further developed, the demand being now fully met by supplies from the lower provinces, especially Nova Scotia.

*Lumber.*—At one time Nova Scotia and Maine used to supply all the lumber for this port, but latterly the Nova Scotian trade has been broken off entirely, and our receipts are principally Canadian lumber *via* New York. On reference to the accompanying detailed statement of imports it will be seen that in the period covered by this report only 68,210 feet came direct from the Dominion, whilst 1,117,930 feet were shipped *via* New York. So long as the supply is equal to the demand, I do not think that the trade as now being conducted can be either improved or its channels diverted.

*Pork.*—The duty is the reduced one of \$1.12½ per 200 lbs., and the average monthly demand is 1,500 barrels. Only 25 barrels reached us from Canada in the three months under review. It is quite clear to my mind that the pork packers do not understand our trade, and I am confident if they could witness the packing in a Boston or New York establishment for this particular market some valuable hints would be picked up. All the Canadian pork that I have seen has been undoubtedly superior to the American, and particularly for family use, the only difficulty being that there was not enough of it to be had. But for the ordinary trade, a different style of packing is essential to bring the article into greater favour.

*Oats.*—The oats from Prince Edward Island are considered equal to any oats imported here, and in fact obtains a preference in many cases. It will be seen from the detailed statistics that 16,665 bushels were imported in the three months, and



the average demand being 2,000 sacks per month that represents a considerable share of the trade.

*Boots and Shoes.*—I regret to have to state, but candour impels me to do so, that the most of the boots and shoes received here from Canada are considered to be very inferior indeed as regards quality, and in the face of an unenviable reputation in this respect it will be difficult to extend trade relations in this line. Thanks to the McKinley people at Washington, boots and shoes are admitted just now at one half the *ad valorem* rate, that is to say 4 per cent.

*Exports.*—The figures I quoted in opening this report, and which are from the colony Blue Book, show that we are much better customers of the Dominion than Canada is with us. The smallness of the export to Canada of our leading staple is surprising. Up to date, the sugar shipments to Canada only amount to 1,175 tons, as compared with 32,000 tons to the United States and 22,945 tons to the mother country. With reference to rum and mollasses, this year's shipments to date to Canadian ports are 1,973 and 959 puns, respectively.

*Inquiries.*—Since my appointment as Commercial Corresponding Agent here, I have answered thirty-seven letters of inquiry from various parts of the Dominion with reference to the shipment of goods of all descriptions.

*Opening for Trade with Canada.*—I feel that I am entitled safely to say that the commercial community here would be very glad and very willing to do all the trade they can with Canada. Notwithstanding the extensive business relations with the United States, there does not exist the slightest prejudice against the Dominion as a competitor; and price for price a good Canadian article will find as good sale in this market as the products of any other place. Now that Messrs. Pickford and Black's line of steamers are making their trips so very regularly and landing their cargoes in good order, with facilities such as this I fail to see why Canada does not do a far larger share of trade with us than appears to be the case. What is required is simply energy and push, with of course attention to the long-established peculiarities of the market, for the dealers are conservative to a fault. With reference to the tariff there is nothing whatever to be apprehended on that score. All countries stand upon an equal footing, and there is nothing in the tariff favouring any one nation at the expense of another or the rest. The alterations made in March to which allusion has been made already were not exceptional concessions won by the United States alone, but apply generally and all round. It was a sacrifice of revenue solely to retain the American market for our sugar-growers, but if I read the signs of the times aright, the dissatisfaction prevalent in regard to the arrangement is so strong and widespread that next spring, when the Combined Court meets for the annual consideration of the tariff, a determined effort will be made to bring about a reversion to the old rates of duty.

DEMERARA, 5th January, 1893.

SIR,—I have the honour to report the following: The arrivals from the Dominion have been 27 sailing vessels since the 30th June, as follows: 3rd July, 8th August, 1st September, 8th October, 2nd November, 5th December, and all with full cargoes. Fish of all descriptions, potatoes, hay, oats, lumber and gypsum, a few horses and sheep. Subsidized steamers, "Duart" and "Taymouth Castle" have been up to time, dates of arrivals as follows: "Duart Castle" 7th July, 1st September, 27th October and 21st December. "Taymouth Castle" 9th August, 29th September, 25th November, and will be due here on or about the 20th. The average cargoes for this port have been about 3,000 bbls., until the last trip of the "Duart Castle," her cargo was about 1,800 bbls. She brought no flour. I have been informed that the Canadian shippers are trying to meet the requirements of the trade by changing their packages and mode of packing. We look for a large supply by the "Taymouth Castle" due here as above. In the face of all that has been said of Canadian flour, the dealers take a great interest in it, and I feel satisfied that in a short time, with the improved packages, it will form a very large proportion of our flour imports, providing it will leave the shippers a margin of profit. The "Taymouth Castle" sailed from here with 500 tons refinery sugars for Montreal, and the "Duart Castle" followed her with 400 tons, all that could be obtained on an order of 1,500 tons. We have had a sale of Canadian horses recently, at auction, they realized the following prices: \$200, \$240, \$280 and one, a fine animal, \$340. A lot of sheep sold at \$8 per head with all faults. These figures should give the shippers a fair profit.

I have replied to many letters of inquiries, which I hope may result in considerable trade. I am making every effort to encourage trade by supplying the dealers with all the information they require and all the particulars or details of the trade, and I look for an increase in Canadian business this year. Trade at present is rather dull in all branches, but there will be a change later on. Our gold exports for the year has reached the sum of \$2,303,162.93.

## JAMAICA.

## REPORTS OF COMMERCIAL AGENT.

KINGSTON, JAMAICA, 20th July, 1892.

SIR,—I have the honour of submitting to you my first quarterly report ending 30th June.

I entered on the duties on the 1st April last, as Commercial Agent in this Island for the Government of Canada, and during the quarter just ended have received several communications from Merchants, &c., in the Dominion, soliciting various information as to the advisability of opening trade between the Dominion and this Island, to all of whom, I have given the necessary information.

I have also given to my countrymen here, such information as they have applied for, been interviewed by many, and explained to them the benefits to be derived by their opening a good trade with the Dominion. Several have, however, brought to my notice two of the chief hindrances to their doing so, which I strongly emphasize, and which unless amended will retard business transactions.

*Finance.*

The first is,—The present mode for satisfaction of indents or consignments from your side is to draw on the party or parties through the bank at a short sight, hence before the articles arrive here—which is generally the case—the drafts have been presented, become due, and have to be satisfied before quality can be approved of, or sale made for those consigned.

If arrangements can be made, whereby they could be placed on the same basis as now exists between this and the United States, viz.: a credit given for a fixed amount and time for satisfaction, say 60 and 90 days from date of shipment, I have no hesitation in saying that operations will commence to the satisfaction of both countries.

*Direct Steam Communication.*

Dissatisfaction is universal in regard to the rates of freight now charged from Halifax with additional dock dues; hence importers endeavour to have their requirements from Montreal, &c., come *via* New York, which is fully 25 per cent lower, with free dock charges here.

The return rates are also excessive, especially on fruit and produce, therefore shippers who are inclined to encourage a new market for their products have to adhere to the American markets; one or two of the large shippers, however, do so to Canada *via* New York. This retards business and if the grievance be removed there is a possibility of a large import and export trade with Canada and this country.

This is a very important matter and should be carefully looked into, as by the means of cheap freight, say equal to the present existing rates from New York, importers would be enabled to land goods from Canada to compete with the same classes from America.

*Breadstuffs, &c.*

The first article of importance under this head is flour. Several shipments have arrived during the quarter, and I regret to report that almost the entire shipments have gone bad, being sour, dry, and quite unfit for bakers' purposes, in fact they refuse to use it, as in many instances it makes a dark and sour bread.

After being in the Island for a short period it gets sour and dry, and has to be sold as second quality on the market, and to sell as such has to be forced at auction.

I have been informed that the American flour shipped is blended with spring and winter wheat, therefore will keep longer in this climate, and makes a superior bread; the packages also are better than those used by Canada, the wood being of a harder nature, and banded with round hoops instead of flat, hence the staves do not shrink, as in the case with the Canadian packages, which allow the air and other climatic influences to act on the contents. If both complaints be remedied and the same quality of flour shipped as exhibited and made up at our exhibition, I am certain that Canada will enjoy a share of the trade which now goes entirely to the United States.

#### *Cheese.*

Several parcels have been imported, and the quality proves satisfactory, but the size of the article, 65 to 70 lbs., is too large for the trade here; if they be reduced to 30 and 35 lbs., the demand will be increased fourfold. This I recommend strongly.

#### *Butter.*

The same remarks on cheese applies to this article, *re* the quality. The packages (tubs) shipped in are too frail, hence, on arrival they are landed broken and the contents wasted, and when landed in good order, the seams in the tubs open, and allow the butter to ooze out. If the quality of the wood and the shapes of packages be improved on and made equal to the kegs now imported from the United States (weights not to exceed 60 lbs. net), a good demand will be the result.

#### *Fish Stuffs.*

No remarks necessary on this class of goods. The shippers are fully aware of the requirements of this market, Halifax, N.S., having had the monopoly for years. Within the last two, however, Newfoundland has been endeavouring to secure a share, and will do so if shippers in Canada are not careful to send good quality stuffs and at reasonable cost, as now supplied by Newfoundland.

#### *Lumber.*

White pine boards are equal in quality, size, &c., to that shipped from the United States, but shippers should take advantage of shipping by sail, on account of cheap freight and careful handling, as very often cargoes are sold afloat, deliverable at our outports.

#### *Oats and Hay.*

A limited demand for these articles. The quality shipped is superior to that from the United States, and if the standard weight of oats, 40 lbs. to the bushel, be retained, a larger trade will arise.

KINGSTON, JAMAICA, 30th November, 1892.

SIR,—I have the honour to forward herewith the latest Blue Book of Jamaica Collector-General's Annual Report for the financial year ended 31st March, 1892, also comparative statement of articles imported and exported for quarter ended 30th September.

The Collector-General, in his annual report, states that the imports into this Island from Canada during the year ended 31st March last exceeded any previous year, the percentage of the total imports furnished by Canada being as follows:—

1888-89,— 9·2.

1890-91,— 7.

1891-92,—10·4.

and goes on to say that "The trade with Canada exhibits some indications of embracing goods other than fish stuffs and unmanufactured wood to which it has been so long practically confined.

"Canadian manufactured goods are now finding their way to this market as the following will show.

"During the year, carriages, to the value of £1,380 were imported; clothing, £1,543; furniture, £827; hardware, £678; cottons, £427; boots and shoes, £513; woollens, £572; musical instruments, £429; and unmanufactured goods, £854, and also to the value of £5,358; whiskey, £273; flour, £1,264; and foods such as cheese, butter, hams, &c., to the value of £1,547, came from our sister colony during the year."

The remarks do not embrace the value of fish stuffs and unmanufactured wood, but further on in page 381 of the report in the comparative return the quantities and values of dry and pickled fish far exceeds the four years past, viz.: 1888 to 1891.

Newfoundland contributes a small portion within the last three years.

Unmanufactured wood from Canada is not specified separately from that which is imported from the United States, but, although the general quantity and value do not exceed last year (on account of the extra importation for our late exhibition), it has almost doubled any of the previous years.

Canada secures only about one third of the quantity imported, the article used chiefly being pitch pine, of which little or none comes from there. White and spruce pine, which is supplied, invariably never come up in quality to that from the United States (although originally shipped from Canada). It is also, as a rule sappy, knotty and narrow. If more care be taken the consumption will be equalled, if not more, than from the latter place.

The quantity imported will I am confident create a desire with shippers to secure a larger proportion of the requirements, which can only be accomplished if they desist in sending their poor stuffs and adhere to the best.

The exports from here to Canada have increased chiefly in such articles as sugar, oranges, bananas, lime juice and hides. If this be improved, and a larger consumption be created for Jamaica coffee, a better exchange for such articles as clothing, furniture, &c., will be carried on with Canada.

One of the reasons given for all the foodstuffs, &c., coming from the United States to this, is that they take almost all our exports such as sugar, coffee and fruit chiefly.

To exemplify this I quote herewith a New York agents circular issued on the 21st instant:—

"Notwithstanding the attempts of our Canadian neighbours, this market still holds the lead as the cheapest source of supply for breadstuffs, provisions and groceries, generally suited to the West Indies, as well as for lumber and staved supplies."

It also shows many advantages for the disposal of Jamaica produce.

#### *Butter.*

Small lots of Canadian having been imported during the quarter, I am pleased to say reports have given satisfaction as to quality and price.

The packages (tubs) are very frail and this acts considerably against the quality. If put up into kegs made of oak, and to contain 60 lbs. net, I am certain, general satisfaction will be given and larger orders will be the result.



*Refined sugar.*

Several parcels have been introduced during the quarter and satisfaction given; shortly I hope to advise that the demand has increased fourfold.

*Milk.*

This article manufactured by The Truro Milk Co., "the Reindeer Brand," is now giving satisfaction and I trust shortly to see it firmly established, similar to a brand from Switzerland, "Nestle's," the consumption of which is above two thousand cases monthly.

*Oats.*

Canadian oats are largely used, the demand is increasing, and I may state that the quality has entirely displaced United States, which was almost the only description used before the exhibition.

*Hay.*

A very large quantity lately was placed on the market at a ruinous price, but as the quality proved good, I expect on the completion of this parcel, orders will be sent to Canada for supplies, which in all cases must only be filled in limited quantities.

*Flour.*

It is to be regretted that importations from Canada have almost fallen through during the quarter under review.

I regret to report none arrived. This is the most important article of the trade, which Canada should endeavour to secure, promptly attend to and follow up.

*Steam communication.*

I have also to report that during the quarter, another line of steamers has started direct from Montreal and Halifax; thus Canada has fortnightly two lines and both fairly supported.

## ANTIGUA.

## REPORTS OF COMMERCIAL AGENT.

ANTIGUA, LEEWARD ISLANDS, W.I.,  
19th March, 1892.

SIR,—I am glad to be able to report as to the excellent crop prospects here. Reaping is now general and produce coming forward freely, and in most cases the yield is exceeding planters' estimates.

I understand that most of the sugars purchased by your refiners are bought through New York agents, and I beg to submit that it would be to their advantage and increase trade between Canada and these Islands if they drew their supplies direct from the West Indies.

*Sugar.*

The usual terms for purchasing sugar here are on a basis of 87° polariscope test (determined by Government analyst) with an allowance of 2½ cents per degree above, and 5 cents per degree below this standard, down to 84°, under which an allowance of 7½ cents is made. The contract is understood to be for sugar in hogsheads, which average about 2,000 lbs. net, and for which casks \$5 is paid by the buyer, and in proportion for smaller casks. When delivered in bags or barrels 25 cents per 100 lbs. additional is paid, and no allowance made for the packages. The tare when in casks or barrels is taken at 10 per cent of the gross weight, and when in bags the tare is taken at 5 lbs. per bag.

*Molasses.*

Molasses is sold here per imperial gallon, with an allowance of \$4 for the puncheon, of which the average net gauge is about 90 gallons.

This season sugars are lower in test than usual, ranging from 80° to 86°, but will probably improve now.

Sugar opened at \$2.10 and \$5 for the cask, but is now dull with last sales at \$2.

Molasses opened at 14 cents and \$4, but has lately fallen to 13 cents, and is only in moderate demand at this rate.

The changes in our local tariffs consequent on the conditions of the McKinley Bill, came into force on the 1st February, and I beg to enclose sheet giving the new rules. One advantage of the change is that the tariff is now practically uniform throughout the Islands of this Confederation.

Our market is fairly supplied with foodstuffs and lumber.

The weather has been dry and favourable for reaping, but rain is now desired for the young crops.

ANTIGUA, LEEWARD ISLANDS, W.I., June 30th, 1892.

THE OPENINGS FOR TRADE BETWEEN CANADA AND THE LEEWARD ISLANDS, WEST INDIES.

SIR,—Dealing first with what these Islands can send to Canada, sugar and molasses are the most important.

In my report dated March 19th, I urged that the Canadian refiners could with advantage draw their supplies direct from these Islands, and that their doing so would give a great impetus to an exchange of trade.

I am glad to say that within the last few months there has been a distinct growth in this direct produce trade, and from Antigua alone the last Canadian steamer took forward:—

Muscovado sugar, ordered.....	138 tons.
do consigned .....	10 “
Vacuum Pan Crystals, consigned.....	95 “
Molasses, ordered.....	188 puncheons.

In my report of 19th March, I gave fully the terms on which produce is sold in this market, and to which I would refer those interested.

Besides sugar there is lime juice, raw or concentrated, to be had chiefly in Dominica and Montserrat; cocoa in abundance and coffee from Dominica; essential oils and essences, the famous Black Pines from Antigua in May and June; oranges, limes, bananas, etc., from Dominica; Guava jelly and other preserves, &c., &c.

So far the trade from Canada has consisted chiefly of white and spruce pine, cedar and pine shingles, dried fish, pickled fish and butter. The conditions and working of these branches are thoroughly understood by Canadian shippers.

The following are articles imported to these Islands, many of them in considerable quantities, and in most of which Canada could, I believe, compete successfully. As an instance, these Islands in 1890 imported of Indian corn 71,687 bushels from the United States and *none* from Canada; of linseed meal and oilmeal 2,194,168 lbs. from the United States and only 1,960 lbs. from Canada; of cheese, 65,975 lbs. from United States and only 1,522 lbs. from Canada; of hams, bacon, etc., 59,776 lbs. from United States and *none* from Canada.

In all the following articles I think traders interested should make enquiry:—Artificial manures, cornmeal, flour, bread and biscuits, pork, salt beef, canned meats, whiskey, fruits, (dried or preserved), apples, &c., in season, oats, peas and beans, tallow, oils, candles, soap, lard, cement and temper lime, paints and varnishes, leather and saddlery, perfumery, boots and shoes, matches, woollen goods, stationery and wrapping papers, sheep, mules, bricks, tiles, etc., and hay.

Generally, I would warn traders that these markets are small and therefore variable, and they should in making consignments only send small quantities at a time. Often disappointment, and sometimes loss, arises from several shippers simultaneously delivering here for sale considerable quantities of a particular article, and so overloading a small market to the prejudice of all.

In conclusion, I may report that the sugar and molasses season here will soon be closed.

The crop has been an exceptionally large one, and in spite of poor prices the financial results will be satisfactory.

The season so far has been rather dry, but the promise for next year is good.

## ST. KITTS.

## REPORTS OF COMMERCIAL AGENT.

St. Kitts, 9th July, 1892.

SIR,—I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 28th May and its contents have since engaged my careful attention.

The various pamphlets and reports which you have been good enough to furnish me with, from time to time, have been laid on the tables of the Public Library and reading rooms, as being the best means of placing their interesting contents before our people, and the map of the Dominion I propose having mounted and hung in the same place.

The impetus given to the development of trade relations between Canada and the Islands by the establishment of a regular line of steamers assisted by Government subsidy, has steadily increased, and the wisdom of this liberal policy is to-day evidenced by the unqualified success which has attended the enterprise. Not only have the steamers been extensively patronized by the manufacturers and exporters of Canadian products, who doubtless have been sufficiently encouraged by the results of their ventures to our Islands to continue such shipments, but shippers on this side have also been stimulated to seek an additional market for their produce, and this happily at a time when the prop on which they had been mainly relying seemed to be proving a delusion and a snare.

As you are aware, in January last, at the dictation of the United States Government, a complete revolution was effected in the tariff of the various Islands, in order to meet the requirements of the McKinley Act, and although no discrimination was directly permitted in favour of any particular country, the duties levied upon such goods as are mainly imported from the United States were considerably reduced and in some cases altogether abolished, the deficiency in our revenues being made up by a corresponding addition to the rates charged on other goods, and by other sources of taxation. I sent you at the time a copy of the new tariff, and append another copy herewith for further reference.

It was most humiliating thus to be forced to make sweeping changes in our fiscal arrangements at the bidding of a foreign state, even to the detriment of business relations with the mother country, but we were led to expect in return therefor correspondingly large advantages for our sugar in the markets of the United States. That these advantages have not been in any degree realized we have alas discovered only too late, and we are to-day left in the unhappy position of being burdened with heavily increased local taxation, while the price of our sole staple in the market, which we had so dearly purchased, is found to be mischievously controlled by enormous trust combinations, and instead of our having, as we expected, an improved and open market, we have left to us virtually but a single buyer. There is thus a wide-spread and increasing feeling of disappointment and chagrin amongst us, and our planters are naturally looking hopefully to any other opening which promises favourable results for their produce. Every facility therefore which can be offered by your government for developing trade with us, and especially for receiving our produce on equitable terms, will, I am sure, be hailed with undisguised satisfaction.

St. Kitts-Nevis are almost exclusively sugar producing Islands, although some minor industries have been engaging attention of late years, and give promises of more or less success in the future.

I append a statement of the crops of sugar, rum, and molasses exported from the two Islands during the past five years, with the places to which sent, which will doubtless be interesting.

During the present season some considerable parcels of sugar have been shipped to Canadian ports, principally under direct orders from your side, and to a more limited extent, by consignments from some of our planters, and in every instance the results have, I understand, been sufficiently encouraging to warrant the growing belief that this trade will in the near future be largely increased.

Our sugar, which in colour averages 12 to 14 D.S., ranges from 85° to 91° by Polariscopes, and is now sold in the local market on the basis of 87° test, with an allowance of 2½ cents additional for each degree above, and a reduction of 5 cents for each degree under, down to 84°, below which the allowance is increased to 7½ cents. It is packed in hogsheads of about 2,200 to 2,400 lbs., barrels of 260 to 280 lbs. and bags 220 to 250 lbs., the latter package being in excess. In local sales, casks are not charged for. At present most of our sugar is shipped to New York on the planter's own account, but when fair prices are offered, sales are largely effected on the spot on the basis above stated, and if this trade could be extended by means of increased orders from your side for shipment by the steamers, it would naturally encourage planters to try the same market with shipments on their own account.

Since the abolition by your Government of the duty on sugar and the consequent free introduction into your markets of the cheaper grades, the demand for West Indian molasses has fallen off to a considerable extent, and while formerly the bulk of our crops found its way to your ports, this season only some 20 puncheons have so far been shipped to Canada out of an estimated crop of 5,000 puncheons. This has been a serious loss not only to our planters, but I presume, also to your own shipping, as the trade afforded remunerative employment to a large number of your sailing crafts. We would gladly welcome any scheme whereby this article could be again utilized on your side and a profitable business re-established. Molasses is usually sold here at a given price per wine gallon, including casks. In rum, a large business might be done if a market could be found on your side.

This Island produces an excellent spirit, which is much appreciated in the London market. It is sold locally at 35 cents to 50 cents per imperial gallon for 40 per cent O.P. Trial shipments would doubtless suggest the profitable use of this spirit in connection with many of your home industries.

With regard to minor productions, this Island possesses extensive salt lakes, producing annually large crops. The quality of this salt (giving by analysis 99¼ per cent of chloride of sodium) is already well known in your fishing ports and could doubtless be more extensively used.

Tamarinds, limes, lime juice, cocoanuts, peanuts, sweet potatoes, yams, turtle and indeed most tropical productions are or could be obtainable here, and might form the basis of enterprise if followed up. There are also extensive tracts of land in both Islands which could doubtless be profitably cultivated with fibre, if sufficient encouragement were given to the industry.

On the other hand we can take, and do now very largely consume considerable quantities of your fish, lumber, shingles, flour, potatoes, dairy products, boots and shoes, woollens, &c., &c., in all of which a steady trade has been created, which must largely increase if the vigorous policy of the past few years be followed up.

Our market is but a small one, the population of the two islands (St. Kitts and Nevis) under last year's census being 30,876 and 13,087 respectively. Of this number 9,628 reside in Basseterre, the principal town in St. Kitts, and 1,563 in Charlestown, Nevis, the balance being scattered over the country villages and sugar plantations, so that direct trade is restricted to a limited area.

It is therefore incumbent on consigners to avoid glutting the market, as excessive stocks tend to reduce values and are difficult of redistribution, while the expenses of transshipment to other ports are heavy. We have, it is true, the small adjacent Islands of St. Martin, Saba and St. Eustatius (Dutch), St. Bartholomew (French), and Anguilla and the Virgin Islands (English) as additional trade outlets, but in most cases the islands are poor and the trade with them very limited.

In fish, lumber and shingles, the islands have for so many years been almost wholly dependent on supplies from your side, that the trade may be said to be already firmly established.

Efforts have lately been made here to introduce Canadian flour and although our small market was at the outset and before the brands were known, glutted with over consignments, these mistakes were almost inevitable in a new trade and must speedily right themselves. An opportunity was, however, afforded for testing the quality of the various brands, most of which have already earned for themselves a favourable reputation, and the unreasonable prejudice previously existing so strongly against Dominion flour has been, to a great extent, removed. With cheap freight and moderate shipments this trade must ultimately succeed, but it will be advisable for some time, at least, to ship only such grades as nearly correspond with the New York brands now generally imported, and to which our dealers appear to be religiously wedded.

Canadian butter has also been largely sought after. If it could be shipped of uniform quality, packed in hermetically sealed tins of 1, 2, 5, 10 and 25 lbs., similar to the Copenhagen and American brands, a good trade might be relied on, but the supplies received up to this point have been small and uncertain.

In cheese the quality sent has been much liked but the sizes are too large to keep for any time in our climate. If they could be pressed of 28 to 30 lbs. each the sale would be largely increased.

A limited demand also exists for light saddle and draft horses, about 14 and 15 hands high.

The establishment of the parcels post and money order system between the Leeward Islands and the Dominion are steps in the right direction, but the arrangements with regard to the latter service leave much to be desired. Money orders can be issued here, but as the advice of them goes only from Antigua (possibly weeks after their issue) great loss of time must necessarily result before they can be paid on your side, and although the facility would be much appreciated for small remittances, I understand that no orders have yet been issued or received, which, under the circumstances, is not at all surprising.

In view of our infrequent mails, the heavy cost of telegraphic communication is a great drawback to trade, the present scale of 10s. 3d. per word being almost prohibitive. When the Bermuda cable is extended with cheaper rates, increased business should follow.

Our Islands being comparatively new markets, the greatest care and discrimination is necessary on the part of your shippers to avoid mistakes, which result in loss, and they cannot do better than send out travellers with samples to find out for themselves the various requirements of the several Islands (each different in its way) and so be able to supply the exact article needed. Such personal intercourse has much to recommend it and would tend to familiarize us with each other, and will be the best means of drawing closer the bond between us. The trade which all these years has been almost exclusively enjoyed by the United Kingdom and in a great measure also by the United States, cannot of course, be diverted even in part to other channels all at once, but with the vast resources of your country and the magnitude of her manufacturing and other growing industries, I feel confident that success must ultimately crown any well-directed and sustained efforts towards the expansion of trade between two countries so nearly allied as we are. The feeling in favour of such trade is growing on this side daily, and when both interest and sentiment incline in the one direction the result should not be long doubtful.

I shall defer to a subsequent report further remarks on other points.

SIR,—Since the date of my last report there has been a steady increase in the volume of trade between this Island and the Dominion. Each steamer arriving from Canada has brought well-assorted shipments of fish-stuffs, dairy products, and other goods, and the Canadian trade may now be considered as firmly established, with every prospect of further development.

The regularity in the movements of all steamers subsidized by your Government has naturally tended greatly to this success, as shippers and importers can calculate with comparative certainty when goods will reach their destination.

In a new departure such as the opening up of this trade has been, some mistakes have of course been inevitable. Hence during the past few months, our small market, in common with nearly all the markets in the West Indies, has been inundated by over-consignments of fish-stuffs; some direct, but a good deal from the over supply of other Islands re-exported in the hope of finding a better market. This has had the effect of crippling legitimate trade to a great extent, and reducing values, and doubtless in many cases the results have proved disappointing; although on the other hand, these excessive shipments, and the consequent low prices, have undoubtedly stimulated our consumption.

The Government statistics show that our average consumption of fish during the four years, from 1888 to 1891, amounted annually to 9,224 quintals dried and 1,915 barrels pickled, while the consumption for the present year has reached 10,210 quintals dried and 2,262 barrels pickled.

The effect of the direct trade with the Dominion, principally though the medium of the recently established steam-ship line, in the item of fish alone, (the chief article of export to these Islands) may be fairly judged of from the following figures:

So that a stimulus has not only been given to consumption, but to the carrying trade of the Dominion. Care should, however, be exercised in order to avoid over-shipments. Our market at the best is a limited one, even including the outlet to the small adjacent foreign islands, so that if more stuff is sent than we can reasonably consume, as there is seldom an opportunity for re-shipping with advantage to the larger islands, some is sure to deteriorate in our warm climate before it can be disposed of, and thus prices must suffer. This experience has been verified on several occasions recently.

With regard to Canadian flour, as I reported in my last, efforts have been several times made to introduce it with varying success. Some brands are liked and if not kept too long, the quality answers quite as well as the products of the New York mills which have had so strong a hold on our market for so many years. Competition with this latter can, however, only be maintained by closely watching the grades, and

paying strict regard to the keeping qualities of the wheat. That the business is worth cultivating may be estimated from the fact, that our consumption of flour averages about 23,000 barrels annually, all of which must be imported; while during the present year, the United States alone have sent us 23,135 barrels.

Our sugar crop has been a fairly good one this year, the shipments amounting to 18,948 tons, as against 17,110 for 1890, and 12,941 for 1891. Canada has taken of this crop only some 666 tons, while 15,972 have been sent to the United States, 1,951 to the United Kingdom, and 359 to other places. There is, however, every reason to expect that the shipments to Canada will largely increase during the ensuing season, as I understand the results of several consignments made at same time this year to Halifax and New York showed a decided gain in favour of the former, owing in part to cheaper freight and lower charges, as well as to a slight advantage in the prices obtained for the goods at the time. If these advantages can be maintained on your side, and the facilities set prominently before our exporters, the result should be a large increase in the business done.

Formerly nearly all our molasses found its way to Canadian ports and was much sought after, but latterly the trade in this has been entirely stopped, much to our loss. The article has been a drug this season and in the absence of buyers has had to be freely used in our distilleries. Canada has taken from us only some 131 puncheons against an average of about 3,000 puncheons in former years. If trade in this could, by any means, be resumed it would doubtless prove advantageous on both sides.

I am glad to report that the prospects for next year's harvest continue very promising and an average crop is confidently expected. The want of rain during the last month or two is causing the canes to ripen rather earlier than was desired, and grinding will in consequence have to begin on some estates next month.

PORT OF SPAIN,

TRINIDAD, B. W. I., 2nd June, 1891.

SIR,—In further reference to your letter of 27th January last, wherein you mentioned that you would be glad to receive a short trade paper bearing on the commercial relations between Canada and this colony, I have the honour to report:—

1. According to the official return, the total imports of Trinidad for 1890 were £2,248,893 8s. 2d., and the exports, £2,179,432.

2. Of the imports we received,

3. British East India heads the list from British Colonies with £97,696, principally rice, of which an immense quantity is consumed by our coolie immigrants; British North America is second with £57,288.

8. The foregoing statistics point conclusively to the fact that the United States have secured a far larger proportion of Trinidad trade than the excess of population over that in the Dominion would account for. There is no doubt this is attributable in great measure to the want of regular and rapid communication between Canada and West Indian ports, but there are minor causes worthy the attention of your manufacturers and producers to which I may allude, viz. :—

9. *Butter*.—It is objected that butter from British North America has been shipped in tubs, which on arrival here are dirty looking, insecure, and too large for the retail traders to handle—containing from 45 to 70 lbs. The butter itself is good, but the package renders it to some extent unmerchantable, and sales can only be effected at a lower price than for inferior butter put up in a better manner. The American butter is shipped in 100 lb. cases, containing 1, 5, 10 or 25 lb. tins, packed in saw-dust, neatly labelled and marked, and each tin reaches the dealer or consumer as fresh looking as when it leaves the manufacturer. But it should be mentioned as proving that the weight of the package is not so prejudicial as a bad outward appearance, that a considerable trade is done here in French butter which comes in strong firkins, containing 66 lbs., and half firkins containing 33 lbs., net. This finds a ready sale at prices varying from \$13 to \$18 per firkin, according to season, the higher value being attained in the winter months.

10. *Cheese*.—The same remarks apply to cheese and lard as to butter. The Canadian cheese is excellent, but the package—weighing 60 lbs.—is frail, unwieldy and unsightly. Neater and stronger boxes are required, and the weight should not exceed 28 to 33 lbs. For superior kinds very much smaller packages even than these would probably meet a remunerative market.

11. *Oats*.—Prince Edward Island are much appreciated and the trade would probably expand if more actively pushed.

12. *Flour*.—It is difficult to understand why British North America should have been so completely shut out of this market in the West Indies, unless, indeed, her flours find their way to the Islands *via* New York and under the mark of U. S. houses. The few samples which have found their way here during the past twelve months have found much favour with our leading bakers. Two or three barrels sent to the Trinidad and Tobago Exhibition from Manitoba were afterwards practically tested and pronounced excellent. But it should be borne in mind that no true estimate of the value of our market will be gained by spasmodic and irregular shipments of small quantities. Superiority will tell in the end here as elsewhere, but perseverance is necessary, and perhaps, at first, a slight loss may have to be faced. Certain brands of American flour such as *Knickerbocker* and *St. Lawrence*, have long been known favourably and sell in large quantities. It is not reasonable to expect that new and unknown marks will supersede them until their excellence has been proved and the regularity of supply assured. I am happy, however, to inform you that the fallacy prevalent until recently that flour manufactured from

Northern grown wheat would not keep in tropical climates has been dispelled by practical test with some of that imported last year.

13. *Malt Liquors*.—Scotch stout and porter and German lager beers are largely consumed. The former sell from \$5.50 to \$6.25 per barrel of 7 dozen pints. The latter from \$6.25 to \$7.50 per case of four dozen quarts. Attempts made to introduce American lager beer in bottles have not been successful, but kegs of American lager are imported by most vessels bringing ice.

14. *Soap*.—Is imported in boxes of 56 lbs., containing 30 bars. Blue mottled is preferred. There is a considerable trade but much competition, and it is hard to effect sales until the quality of a brand is known and approved.

15. *Lumber*.—The kinds coming from Nova Scotia are inferior. There is a good market for finer grades which reach us through New York, but are said to be the produce of Ontario.

16. *Shooks, staves and wood hoops*.—In consequence of the substitution on our largest estates of bags for tierces and hogshead as the package for our principal staple—sugar—the trade in cooperage materials gets smaller every year and is not likely to be worth much attention in the future.

17. *Shingles*.—At one time were extensively used, but galvanized iron has now completely taken their place.

18. *Ice*.—An Ice factory is now working successfully, and the proprietors intend to duplicate the plant. When this is done, they will be in a position to supply the local demand, and the importation of natural ice to any extent will then probably cease.

19. *Horses*.—Those from Prince Edward Island have always been liked and have proved to be serviceable animals, well adapted for the climate.

20. *Potatoes*.—The bulk of those arriving from the Maritime provinces are more or less in bad order. This is no doubt due to the long passage, but it has resulted in Irish and Madeira potatoes commanding much higher prices. A weekly steam-ship line from Liverpool (England) lands potatoes here in 16 days, and from the regularity of shipments from the same people, it may be presumed that the returns are satisfactory.

21. *Peas*.—It is well known that the peas imported are the produce of Canada, though coming almost entirely through New York.

#### *Steam Communication, Freight, etc.*

22.—The table of exports speaks for itself. The explanation of the paucity of the trade work of the Dominion is perhaps, mainly to be found in the absence of regular means of communication. The first steamer of the new line established by Messrs Pickford and Black, the "Taymouth Castle," has just completed her first voyage, and is certainly, in point of speed and freight and passenger accommodation, a great improvement upon the class of boats hitherto coming from Halifax and St. John. The freight charges appear to be moderate. In this connection, however, I notice that your railway charges to port of shipment are in many cases prohibitive. Let me give two instances which have come under my personal observation. The first is for a small box of catalogues (no value) sent from Toronto *via* St. John, N. B., per S.S. "Loanda"; the bill of lading is dated 6th October, 1890, and in the margin, the following charges appear:—

You will see that the express rate from Toronto to St. John was more than five times the amount of freight from St. John to Trinidad. An export trade for general goods under such circumstances is impossible. The second instance occurred in

respect of 17 small boxes drugs, &c., received by a friend, also per "Loanda." The Bill of Lading is dated 31st March, 1891. The freight from St. John to Trinidad is \$6.55. The charges from Toronto to St. John, \$6.88. It has been explained that great reduction in Canadian Railway freight is made when full truck loads are sent. But this is an advantage that can only be obtained by shippers of bulky goods. A paint company write me that they obtain best rates for car loads of 20 tons, and hope that I will order that quantity. If they wait for the economical introduction of their special class of paint (and it must be economically introduced to compete with English paints) until they receive an order for 20 tons, equal to 1,600 tins 28 lbs. each, I am afraid their manufacture will never be known here. It is the same with other articles. Of course, the managers of your railways know their own business best, but looking at the matter from the view which one would take who was desirous of seeing the export trade of the Dominion extended, the policy seems to be suicidal. Similar difficulties in England were overcome by the carrying contractors who received numbers of small packages from different persons, and sent them to their destination in car loads. It appears to me that your railways might with advantage to themselves and the export trade alike, provide special cars to take at special rates, and on certain dates, all goods intended for shipment by West Indian and other steamers. Amongst the many consigners whom cheap freights would encourage, full car loads would before very long be made up.

23. *Molasses*.—It is satisfactory to report that the first cargo of molasses loaded in this harbour for Montreal for 15 years is now being taken by the barque "Sabrina," which sails for that port in a few days, and I hope others will follow.

24. *Sugar*.—It has been brought to my knowledge that although several small lots of centrifugal sugar have been sent recently to Canada, they do not appear to be taken up, although largely appreciated and going into direct consumption for table purposes elsewhere.

25. Trinidad is an absolutely free port for shipping. There are no harbour, light or tonnage dues levied. The "Custom of the Port" is for ships to pay their own lighterage, a heavy item. If it is desired otherwise, the exemption from lighterage charges must be distinctly stated in charter party and Bill of Lading. This applies principally to sailing vessels. All steamers (with the exception of the "Loanda") have paid expense of landing their own cargoes, and it is not desirable, with so many different consigners, that the rule should be changed.

26. Finally, I regret to state, that complaints have reached me of the want of prompt and satisfactory advices either of consignments of goods or movements of steamers. More general information as to state of markets, &c., is required to be regularly received. There would also appear to be something wrong in the postal arrangements *via* the United States. Letters often arrive here many weeks after date.

27. I have been compelled by the early departure of the mail to conclude this report more hurriedly than I had intended, but I trust it may be of some little service to you in your endeavours to promote trade between Canada and Trinidad.

1. From statistics gathered from Customs Returns as to the total volume and distribution of trade in the Colony in 1891 :—

2. The value of imports was \$10,204,329, and of exports, \$10,019,303.

3. For the purposes of this report it is necessary only to specify the value of imports and exports from the United Kingdom, the United States and British Colonies :

5. *Imports.*—As has been the case for many years past, since East Indian immigration has been largely carried on under government auspices to supply the pressing need of labour on the sugar estates, the imports from India, almost solely of rice, amounting to \$608,545 have largely exceeded the value of imports from other British possessions, but British North America comes second with a total of \$321,214 as against \$278,801 in 1890, an increase for 1891 of \$42,413.

6. *Exports.*—Regarding exports, we sent to United Kingdom \$3,547,790, to colonies \$340,667 and to United States \$3,583,546.

7. Of the total value exported to British Colonies, British North America, took \$113,860, against in 1890 \$86,700, increase in 1891, \$27,160.

8. It is worthy of note as bearing upon the question of inter-Imperial reciprocity—a subject of which the proposals made in the Dominion Parliament are warmly approved of here—and the results of the adoption either of free trade or protective principles, that the commerce of this Colony has been steadily diminishing with free trade Britain and increasing in proportion with protectionist America.

9. The most significant fact to be noted in the foregoing figures is that for the first time since this colony has been a British possession the exports to the United States have exceeded those to the mother country

10. The gradual improvement of trade with Canada, as evidenced by value of imports and exports, is satisfactory so far as it goes, but its volume, even with this increase, is still far below the amount it ought to be and which I trust it will soon reach.

11. I am pleased to be able to report, from advance statistics furnished me by the customs authorities, that the value of imports from British North America for the half year to 30th June, continues steadily to progress, the value bring over \$170,000 to date.

12. *Sugar*.—The exports, however, have decreased on the half year except in the item of sugar of which we have shipped 112 hogsheads 208 tierces 1,268 barrels and bags as against 960 bags and barrels last year. Even with this improvement, the shipments of sugar to British North America are invariably small in comparison with the average total shipped from the Colony to all parts, say 65,000 hogsheads or tons annually. The United States took from Trinidad in 1891, 10,869 hogsheads, 4,327 tierces 200,503 barrels and bags. Shippers in Tobago are well pleased with proceeds of the sale of the lots of common process Muscovado sent from that Island to Canada, but Trinidad shippers still lean towards United States as the best market.

13. *Molasses*, of which we sent to British North America 4,242 puncheons in 1891, has this year gone principally to Martinique for the manufacture of rum, whence it is exported to France on favoured terms for the French Colonial exporters. Shipments of this product to British North America have in consequence fallen to 1,157 puncheons for the half year. So long as the present inducements are offered for the manufacture of rum in Martinique, prices offered for our molasses in that Island are likely to monopolize the supply.

14. *Cocoa*.—Trinidad cocoa, though realizing highest market rates in London, and much appreciated in United States, appears to be making no headway in British North America. The average crop is about 100,000 bags of 160 lbs. each, of which about  $\frac{4}{10}$  goes to London, and  $\frac{1}{4}$  to New York.

but I note that we have shipped 350 bags for half year to date, a more satisfactory feature. It may be presumed that a portion of the cocoa sold in New York finds its way to the Dominion, but the direct importation should, one would think, be more convenient. Looking at the great success which has attended the manufacture of chocolate in Europe and the growing demand every where, the smallness, apparently, of the trade in this article between Canada and this, the principal British cocoa producing Colony, leads to the supposition that this important industry has been somewhat overlooked in the Dominion.

But intending purchasers should be warned that the greatest care should be taken in ordering cocoa, as there are many varieties of the bean in Trinidad and much depends upon the manner it has been cured, &c.; much also depends upon the commission merchant to whom the buying is entrusted and care in the selection of the buyer, as well as of the article bought, is very necessary.

15. *Coccanuts*.—This is another item of our exports which does not seem to be appreciated in Canada as elsewhere. These nuts have been supplied and put on board vessels direct from the estate at from \$9 to \$10 per thousand for the greater part of the past year, and would seem at that rate to be worth attention, especially as cheap freight can usually be secured by the returning fish schooners. The total production is 14,000,000 of which 13,000,000 are shipped to London.

16. *Asphalt*.—Some years ago what appeared to be a practical monopoly over the great "Pitch Lake" of Trinidad was secured from the Colonial Government by an American company called the Trinidad Asphalt Company. The large revenue which this company derived from the lake attracted the attention of speculators who purchased or leased from the owners or occupiers the surrounding lands upon which more or less asphalt, the overflow of the lake, was found. Several ship loads of this "Village Pitch," as it has been named, being a mixture of more or less asphalt and

earth, were sent away. Much litigation ensued, especially on the question of title of the lands which had been sold or leased. In the end, injunctions preventing the shipment of this "outside" pitch have been granted, much of it, already dug and carted for shipment has been seized, and certain cargoes, it is reported, have been seized on arrival at destination. The injunctions may or may not be set aside, but it is necessary to caution intending buyers, who may be tempted by cheaper rates, against negotiating at the present time for the purchase of asphalt cargoes excepting from the authorized American company.

17. Turning to imports, the improvements in value from British North America before noted of \$42,413, in 1891, as against 1890 is made up principally as follows:—

This shows an excess in 1891 of about \$73,000, but from that has to be deducted over \$29,200 short received in lumber.

18. *Cheese*.—Taking the above enumerated articles *seriatim*, I regret that the trade with British North America in the very first item, the importation of which in 1891 compared so favourably with 1890, viz. : cheese, has fallen off comparatively to nothing. For the first five months of 1892, not a pound of cheese was imported from British North America, but a small lot of 612 lbs. was landed in June.

I regret further to know that the proceeds of the consignments received last year left a heavy loss to the consigners. This is certainly discouraging on the face of it, but the result is more unsatisfactory in view of the fact that the cheese itself was very good and would have been placed at a remunerative price but for the apparently trivial circumstance that the packages in which it was sent were unsuited to the requirements of this market. This, I have reason to know, was pointed out to the shippers, unfortunately without effect, by consignees at this port. The trade in cheese here is comparatively large. The imports in 1891 were 263,498 lbs., value, \$39,858, of which 202,529 lbs., value, \$30,495 came from the United States. It is surely, therefore, worth the attention of Canadian exporters. The cheese from the United States are, as a rule, 28 lbs. each, and are put up in strong round boxes, which almost invariably arrive in good order, and are of a handy size for sale to retailers. Those from British North America have come in unwieldy and often defective packages of 60 lbs. and over, which are usually landed in more or less bad order, the packages being too slight for the contents, and the contents too much for the requirements of the generality of small shop-keepers all over the country. It is also to be noted that American cheese, perhaps from being inferior or from a knowledge of manufacture suitable to the tropics, is harder and does not *run* so much. It also keeps better. But notwithstanding these advantages attaching to the well-known article, there can be no question that the Canadian cheese is superior and would realize higher rates if put up in suitable packages, say, of 7, 14 and 28 lbs. each. The trade is accustomed to the smaller packages and will buy nothing else. As it

is, while the United States cheese has been commanding a market at prices ranging from 15 cts. to 22 cts. per lb., the superior cheese from Canada has been practically unsaleable, or has been perforce sent to auction and sacrificed at ruinous prices, sometimes as low as 3 cts. per lb. In reply to a caution on this subject addressed to a Canadian merchant, the answer was received that they "could not do otherwise. Only one package was made, and the cheese was made to fit it." If the Dominion desires or hopes to compete in these Islands with the United States, she must learn that the success of the latter has consisted in suiting itself to the requirements of our markets, and she will have to do the same. Packages should be made for goods, not goods for packages.

19. *Butter*.—It is most unsatisfactory to record that the trade in butter which had increased from a value of \$78 in 1890, to \$1100 in 1891, should only total \$136 for the half year just ended. To discover the reason, very similar remarks may be made as were applied to cheese. The butter itself is excellent. The packages altogether unsuited for a tropical trade. Here again a lesson may be learned with profit from the American packer. Butter coming from the States is put up in cases of 100 lbs., containing tins neatly labelled, of 5, 10 and 25 lbs. each. These are the handiest sizes for common cooking butter. Another form of package, very salable, is the strong firkin or half firkin, 66 and 33 lbs. net, in which a large quantity of French butter arrives. Superior table butter should be put up in 1 lb. tins, and it is in this last quality I fancy that a large and profitable business ought to spring up with Canada. But it is only throwing away money to send butter in the insecure leaky packages in which it has previously come. The butter, in hot weather, runs through them like oil.

20. *Flour*.—Next only to rice, this is the largest item in our import trade, the quantity received in 1891, being 114,324 barrels, value \$583,557. Of all articles it is that which, in the ordinary fitness of things, it would seem we should receive most naturally from Canada. Yet up to two years ago, not a barrel came from that great wheat country, a fact which appeared greatly to astonish the directors of the Toronto Exhibition, whom I had the honour of addressing in 1890. I am happy to be able to report a slight change for the better. We received from British North America, in 1890, 10 barrels, in 1891, 157 barrels, and for the first 6 months this year 1,403 barrels. But if this trade is to go on increasing and to assume the dimensions it should assume, the greatest attention to detail—the same as is applied in the United States—will have to be maintained, especially in regard to the nature of the packages, and the uniform quality of the different marks shipped. I have made the most careful enquiries amongst the merchants who have been receiving Canadian flour and the result is, generally speaking, satisfactory. They have certainly been compelled, in introducing new brands for Canada to the market, to make slight concessions in price as against perhaps inferior, but well-known makes from the United States. That must be expected, and will very shortly right itself. But they are all hopeful of the ultimate success of the business. They point out to me, however, defects which must be remedied if it is expected that the trade should expand to its legitimate extent. Here again the American package comes into favourable competition. It is the same size, but is made of well curved red oak staves, set up with *round* hoops and made perfectly tight. This is most important in tropical countries as flour rapidly deteriorates and spoils from exposure to the dampness of the climate. I am not prepared to say that there is any special preservative quality in red oak, but it is a noticeable fact that the barrels containing flour sent from the United States to ports further South are made with red oak heads as well, which is not the case with those coming here, a voyage of only 8 to 20 days as sail or steam may be employed. The Canadian barrels are made of white staves with flat hoops. The staves have not sufficient curve, and the flat hoops do not seem to bind them so securely as the round. As a consequence, the barrel is not tight, so much so, that the flour escapes in rolling, and the admission of the air sours it in a short time. If therefore it does not find an immediate market, serious loss occurs. A case was recently brought under my notice. Part of consignment sold well on arrival. The balance was stored for one month, became spoilt, and had to be sold for half price. The colour and quality of the

flour is right. It ought to command the market, and will undoubtedly do so before long if this matter of the package is looked into and remedied. If not, I fear the promising aspect of trade in this article will soon be hopelessly dimmed.

21. *Oats*.—Prince Edward Island oats have long been in high repute and continue in steady demand. Small lots of Canadian, recently received are not so "heavy" but sell fairly well and hold their own with ordinary American. Good strong bags are recommended; also uniformity in weight. Each bag should contain 160 lbs net. There is no advantage in a bag containing more than this. On the other hand a strong prejudice exists against bags of less weight, indeed, in the case of some recently received of 140 lbs. each, it was almost impossible to place them without repacking except at a lower price than the mere difference in weight involved.

22. *Furniture*.—There is a fair outlet here for light inexpensive furniture of all kinds. Total value of imports, 1891, \$53,913, of which the United States sent \$14,319, Canada, \$881. The figures speak for themselves.

23. *Hardware*.—The same remarks apply to hardware. Total imports, 1891, \$337,382, of which \$252,833 from United Kingdom, and \$50,754 from United States, against \$1,440 from British North America. The trade with United States in hardware increases yearly.

24. *Leather Manufactures*.—A very considerable trade in boots and shoes is done with the United Kingdom, France, Germany and Austria, and there is no good reason why a fair share of it should not go to Canada. I have interviewed the dealers who have placed the small orders with Canadian firms which appear in our Customs' returns for 1891-92. They are satisfied with the goods so far as quality of material in relation to price is concerned, but they all agree that the style, except in childrens' shoes, will not do, and that their orders will, in consequence, not be repeated. The better class of natives of Trinidad are distinguished for their shapely feet and high insteps and they will not wear the style of boot suitable for the flat foot of the Anglo-Saxon, such as are made in Canada, and as the lower orders would rather suffer martyrdom than not imitate their betters, the same style of boot is worn all round. The Austrian and German manufacturers, through their intelligent travellers, found this out long ago and were very nearly diverting the whole trade from England. English makers, however, when they found business declining, procured the Austrian lasts and have since recovered lost ground to a certain extent. May not Canadian boot and shoe manufacturers take the hint?

25. *Drugs and Medicines*.—Canadian medicines and drugs seem to be making steady headway, and judging from the extent of advertisements helping to disfigure the walls here as elsewhere, the "patent" medicine man of the Dominion finds Trinidad a good field.

26. *Spirits*.—Rye whiskey has been introduced but with indifferent success. Perhaps the taste of our people has to be educated up to it; at present the favourite stimulant is the same ardent whiskey of Scotland which is very largely consumed.

27. *Wines*.—I have been surprised to find that with the exception of one small shipment of 87 gallons, no serious attempt has been made to introduce Canadian wines. Fair light wines, at a moderate price are much in demand. They should be sent in wood with labels for bottling. The duty is 20 cents per gallon if containing less than 23° of proof spirit as tested by Sykes Hydrometer; less than 32°, 30 cents and less than 42°, 60 cents per gallon. Every degree beyond, an additional 6 cents the gallon. A considerable advantage is therefore to be gained if the wine tests under 23 degrees, which should not be lost sight of.

28. *Fish*.—In salted fish Canada has had, and no doubt will retain, a practical monopoly of the markets of these Islands for many years.

29. *Horses*.—Ordinary Canadian horses find sale at \$195 to \$243 each, and are much esteemed for their quiet temper and hardy constitution.

30. *Meats salted and dried*.—Total value of imports, 1891, \$288,511 of which from United States, \$240,564, and British North America, \$2,922 a trade which will repay attention if quality and price can compete with those of American packers, and

reasonable railway freight is obtainable. That this is not so at present would appear evident on the face of documents which I am permitted to inclose herewith, viz. :—

(a.) Invoice from a firm in Montreal for 9 bbls. and 10 half-bbls. salted meats consigned to Trinidad, \$186.

(b.) Memo. of charges before shipment, including \$19.80 freight from Montreal, \$20.55.

(c.) Bill of lading showing freight to Trinidad and wharfrage, \$10.15.

The charges, therefore, previous to shipment amounted to double the ocean freight, which is of itself very high. Thus handicapped, it is impossible that the trade can be carried on with advantage. In this instance the inevitable loss occurred and the shipper will probably be too much discouraged by his first venture to attempt a second.

31. *Peas*.—The imports from British North America of split peas which only amounted to \$44 in 1890 have risen for present half-year to \$7,139. It is feared, however, that the last shipments received will have resulted in a loss owing to an over stocked market and other causes, one of the principal of which may be mentioned. A traveller, representing a Halifax house, visited this colony some months ago and booked large orders for split peas on the strength of offering them, landed here, at 30 cts. a barrel, or thereabouts, cheaper than usual rate. These orders were mostly executed by one steamer and, being in addition to regular supplies, weakened the market which at once dropped .75 cts. per barrel. It was then found that the cheaper barrel only contained 196 lbs., in place of 210 lbs., the weight which has been recognized as a barrel of peas since the trade has been known here. Strong representations regarding this transaction were made to Halifax, and it is only fair to add that the shippers agreed to make good the difference, but such things are calculated to destroy confidence and do immense harm to a young trade.

32. *Potatoes*.—While showing a substantial increase in 1891 over 1890, the results for first six months of 1892 are yet more favourable. The value of potatoes from British North America, 1st January to 30th June, being \$5,212, or nearly as much as during the preceding twelve months. The annual imports being over \$48,667, it is evident that there is much further room for improvement. Only the best keeping qualities should be sent.

33. *Refined Sugar*.—Strange as it may seem, and in spite of a protective and almost prohibitive duty, imposed in the interest of our staple product, there is a good deal of crushed sugar imported, mostly from United States, and used in the colony in preference to the vacuum pan sugar made here. A highly respectable firm of importers and dealers recently ordered a sample barrel to test the Canadian market from which none had hitherto come. Having applied to this firm for information as to the result, they have been good enough to write me, and I attach their letter as received, deeming that it contains matter which may be of value to your refiners. As will be observed, a heavy freight is again the stumbling-block in the way of trade. (See inclosure.)

#### STEAM COMMUNICATION.

34. There can be no doubt that the expansion of trade generally which I have noticed is due mainly to the facilities offered by Messrs. Pickford & Black's steamers, but there is still much room for improvement, which must be made in that line if this trade is further to develop as it should do. No one is blind to the difficulties facing the inception of a new enterprise, but as the great advantage of steam navigation is its supposed regularity, it must be manifest that such irregularity as the following can only have a most prejudicial effect on the trade which has relied on it.

Another serious cause of complaint is that goods on which bills of lading have been granted, (against which bills of exchange are drawn) have been afterwards shut out and the bills of exchange mature in some cases before the goods arrive. In my personal knowledge I can refer to an instance, a consignment of split peas from Guelph, Canada, was drawn against at 60 days.

The draft to which shipping documents were attached came by steamer *via* New York in about 14 days from date, and was accepted. The goods were sent by Messrs. Pickford & Black's line. The draft matured and was paid before the steamer arrived and delivered the peas, instead, as should have been the case, the goods arriving in time to be sold and proceeds collected to meet the draft.

On other occasions expected goods have not arrived, to the inconvenience of the importer. The next steamer has brought the lot shut out, and fresh supplies, a double quantity tending to demoralize the market.

Another instance will suffice. By my influence, the proprietor of a match factory transferred his orders for splints from Europe to Canada. Ample time was given for a large lot to arrive before the old stock was exhausted.

The steamer in which the splints had been advised as shipped, arrived without them, having left them behind. As a consequence, the factory had to shut down for nearly a month, causing heavy loss to all concerned.

Goods are now received so rapidly and regularly by the direct steamers from New York, that the trade with Canada is at a disadvantage. I am inclined to think that sooner or later it will be necessary to recognize that the trade of Trinidad and Demerara is important enough to command special direct steamers which will deliver goods from shipping port, whether St. John or Halifax (the delay between the two is most vexatious) within 24 hours of the time occupied from New York.

Having delivered their outwards perishable cargoes with the desirable rapidity, they could call at the other Islands for freight on the homeward route, if necessary, and a separate steamer could supply the wants outwards of the Lesser Antilles with a terminus, say, at Barbados or, if need be, at Trinidad.

35.—Finally, may I impress upon Canadian exporters that in catering for the West Indian trade, they place themselves in competition with others who have studied and built it up patiently during the past century. It is the greatest mistake to think that "anything will do for the West Indies." The inhabitants know perfectly well the difference between good things and bad. West Indian merchants are as shrewd and know their business as well as similar men anywhere in the world. They will have the article they want, put up as they want, and as they know to be suitable for the trade. Unless these conditions are complied with, only failure and disappointment will result. There is in this and the neighbouring colonies a natural and profitable outlet for a fair proportion of the food products and manufactures of Canada. It depends mostly upon Canadian merchants and steam-ship agents, helped by liberal freight arrangements on the railway lines, to grasp the situation and avail themselves of it, or the hopeful trade which has been initiated by the wisdom and foresight of the statesmen of the Dominion may dwindle away to nothing.

## INCLOSURE—REFINED SUGAR.

PORT OF SPAIN, TRINIDAD, 4th July, 1892.

EDGAR TRIPP, Esq.,

DEAR SIR,—The writer had some conversation with you the other day with respect to the importation of refined sugar from Canada. You asked him to address you in writing, which he now has much pleasure in doing.

Some time ago, looking at the high cost of refined sugar in the United States as compared with the low value there of the raw material, especially since the trust was formed, it occurred to us that possibly the refiners in the Dominion, to secure our trade in this article, might be disposed to supply us cheaper. We accordingly asked a firm in St. John, N.B., to advise us about it. This firm in reply sent us by the Canadian steamer a sample  $\frac{1}{2}$ -barrel containing 90 lbs. of Cut-Loaf. The first cost, including the packages, was 5 cts. per lb., and the freight on same, 77 cts.

Now, the first cost of both *cut-loaf* and *crushed* (latter being small pieces of irregular shape and size and much preferred to cut-loaf) was at same time in New York also 5 cts. per lb., but exclusive of package, which is 30 cts. to be added. But as against the freight by the Canadian steamer of 77 cts. on 90 lbs. of sugar, we get about 110 lbs. from New York by direct steamer for  $27\frac{1}{2}$  cts., with the result that the American article costs us put in this port exactly  $\frac{1}{3}$  ct. per lb. cheaper. Again, with New York there is the advantage of obtaining the sugar within 25 days after mailing our order as against double this time used in getting it from the Dominion.

Referring to the *Royal Gazette* we observe the total imports of refined sugar last year amounted to 254 English tons, all of which, excepting 20 tons, came direct from the United States. No doubt this 20 tons, which nearly all came in from the neighbouring colonies was also American refined. It is a question for the refiners of the Dominion to consider, whether this item of our trade is worth competing for by underselling the trust in the United States. Of course they would have to give us the sugar (and if possible the crushed kind) at a sufficiently low rate to compensate our going past a near and handy market for a distant one. It should not be lost sight of that if our local Government should one of these days remove the heavy import duty of \$2.40 per 100 lbs. the imports of refined sugar would undoubtedly soon reach 1,000 tons per annum, as the people here would largely give up the consumption of our inferior make for the refined.

SIR.—I have the honour to forward regular quarterly report to 30th September.

1. Having dealt somewhat exhaustively upon the openings for trade between Canada and the West Indies in my last report, I do not propose in the present one to do more than shortly summarize the course of trade between the Dominion and this colony during the last three months.

## IMPORTS.

2. The approximate value of imports for quarter under review was \$87,600, showing a slight increase over two preceding quarters which amounted together to about \$170,000.

3. The improvement although slight is apparently satisfactory, but upon investigation of details some features present themselves which are not so encouraging.

4. In view of the encouragement and assistance afforded by the Government of the Dominion, in view also of the opening up of steady steam communication, and the commercial relations naturally resulting thereupon, I had hoped to be in a position to report something more favourable than this very gradual rate of progress.

5. Improvement was to be noted in the following items:—Fish, horses, meats, sugar and shingles.

6. Falling off occurred in the following:—Dried fruit, split peas, potatoes, leather manufactures, cheese, flour, hardware, lumber, oats, &c.

7. *Salted Fish*.—The increase of consumption of this article was most marked, the quantity imported averaging 560,000 lbs., value \$23,333 per month, against an average during the previous six months of 350,000 lbs. per month. This is no doubt to be accounted for to a great extent by our fresh meat supply having been considerably interrupted by the revolution in Venezuela whence nearly all our cattle for slaughtering purposes are obtained. Beef, in consequence, reached a price almost prohibitive to the poorer classes. With the termination of hostilities, in the neighbouring Republic, this state of things has ceased.

8. *Refined Sugar*.—Referring to previous remarks under this head, I am pleased to state that in quality and price crushed sugar from Halifax holds its own, and has the advantage of being put up in a package very suitable for local requirements and also for the Venezuelan trade, to which country much of that imported here ultimately finds its way. About 11,000 lbs. were imported against only 90 lbs. for previous quarter. The total is small but marks a growing appreciation in the trade. Imports of a similar article from the United States are averaging 75,000 lbs. monthly.

9. *Shingles*.—Small lots of fair quality have met a market. Large shipments are not, however, to be recommended. The use of them in our towns is prohibited for fear of fire, galvanized iron and slate being in general use.

10. *Split Peas*.—I regret to note that the trade in split peas which appeared early in the year to have been entirely diverted into Canadian hands has suddenly dropped to a nominal amount. Shippers have gone from one extreme to the other. First, they flooded the market, and then, discouraged by the fall in price which naturally followed, ceased shipping altogether. New York merchants were quick to grasp the situation and at once supplied the deficiency and regained the trade.

11. *Cheese*.—Only one small lot of 175 lbs. cheese reached this colony from Canada during the quarter. It was a sample lot put up in small packages according to frequent recommendations which had been addressed from here. This cheese realized from 4c. to 6c. per lb. more than cheese from the United States, whereas a similar article previously shipped in extra large packages, had sold for much less than

American cheese. This bears out my remarks under this head in the last report, and I hope that the trade which at first looked so promising will be revived and maintained under the more favourable conditions indicated.

12. *Flour*.—This trade which also opened with such apparently fair prospects, and which is of more importance and value than all others, is also apparently under a cloud. Landings of Canadian flour got less and less. No doubt a slight loss may have attended the first shipments to a new market. Competition is keen and immediate success of new marks against those which had been established in the colony for many years was not to be expected. But still the outlook was favourable. There was only one opinion as to the flour. It was good, but the package was unsuitable for the climate. I wrote at length on this subject in last report and have only to confirm what I then said, adding that there is a large and profitable trade to be done if only the requirements I have referred to are not neglected, and a small amount of patience is exercised.

13. *Potatoes, Lumber, Oats*.—The increase in importations of potatoes, lumber and oats may be treated as temporary only, and will no doubt be made good later on. It is remarked that all the better qualities of white pine, prepared, &c., come *via* New York, only second quality being shipped from Canadian ports. Oats continue to preserve the reputation gained. The Dominion ought to monopolize this trade, and probably soon will do so. But I have been asked to point out that it would be an advantage if the bags were newer and more attractive looking. Some of the oats recently received per Halifax steamers have been packed in dirty second-hand bags, rendering them quite unmerchantable for the ordinary course of trade. The consequent loss is far more than the difference between the value of new and old bags.

14. *Leather Manufactures*.—Some harness recently received is reported strong and good but wanting in finish, and therefore unsuitable for this market.

Canadian boots and shoes for men and children recently imported by a large firm here are well spoken of, and meet with ready sale for good qualities. In cheaper kinds, the dealers prefer to purchase in Europe. There is still the complaint that although the ladies' boots and shoes from Canadian manufactories are of good quality and finish, the shape leaves much to be desired. It is said that ladies have to take two sizes larger to procure a fit than they ordinarily use.

15. *Tinned Fish*.—Some lots of tinned lobster recently received have turned out very bad, and caused serious loss to the purchasers. Whether it arises from want of pickle, or of the proper description of pickle, or from the action of acid on the tin, is not known but the contents in almost every case, although smelling fresh and good, have turned out more or less black, and, as such, have proved unsalable. I send by parcel post two of these tins which I have no doubt when opened will illustrate what I say, and perhaps some one of your packers of tinned goods may be able to explain the reason of the defect and prevent its repetition.

16. *Salted Meats*.—Salted meats from Canada appear to be gradually growing in favour with our dealers. I hear no complaints except that pork heads have been packed in light herring barrels instead of the more suitable heavy staved pork barrels.

17. *Steam communication*.—This, I am glad to say, has of late been much more regular and reliable, but I must repeat that so far as Trinidad is concerned no line of steamers can expect fully to compete with the steamers from New York unless they come here in the same way, *viz.*, direct.

18. *Exports*.—This report being the record of our off-season, there is little under the head of exports calling for special notice.
