## Inland Revenue.

This is believed to be largely due to the fact that the Government guarantee of age—when bottled in bond—is becoming known and appreciated abroad, and the enforced maturing has necessarily improved the quality. There seems to be good reason to believe that Canadian whiskies will soon constitute an appreciable proportion of the exports of our manufactured goods.

The aggregate revenue derived from excise duties and license fees, in connection with the production of spirits has now reached \$4,142,057, as will be seen by the following table.

**CULLING TIMBER:**

The amount accrued upon culling of timber was, during 1892-93, \$11,493.33, the cost of the service having been \$27,628.69.

With the decay of the square timber trade, which is declining year by year, the main purposes for which the Cullers' Act was passed, have been served. It seems desirable to consider whether it has not outgrown its usefulness and whether—a fair provision being made for those who have spent many years in working under its provisions—the time has not now arrived for its repeal.

If its entire repeal would be a serious inconvenience to those engaged in exporting square timber and deals across the seas, then its working could be placed under the General Inspection Act as in the case of cereals, flour and other staples, when the expenses would be borne only by those voluntarily invoking the provisions of the Act. They would cease to be a charge upon the revenues of the country.

**WEIGHTS AND MEASURES AND GAS:**

The usual special reports in relation to these services have been prepared, containing full statistical information.

The revenue accrued from these services and from law stamps of the Supreme and Exchequer Courts was \$57,245.80.

**PREVENTION OF ADULTERATION OF FOOD AND AGRICULTURAL FERTILIZERS:**

The usual supplementary report in relation to this service will be submitted containing details of the work done and the reports of the analysts.

# INSPECTION OF FOODS AND DRUGS AND FERTILIZERS.

To the Honourable the Controller of Inland Revenue.

SIR,—I have the honour herewith to submit the reports of the official Analysts of the Dominion for the fiscal year ended 30th June, 1893.

The following is a summary statement of the whole number of samples analysed by them.

From the foregoing table it will be seen that 20 per cent of the samples analysed were found to be adulterated, and nearly one-third were either adulterated or doubtful.

The large percentage of doubtful items is due mainly to milk. The Chief Analyst has long urged the establishment of a standard in the case of milk and of the desirability of some such standard there can be little doubt. He has recommended persistently that  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent of butter fat and 12 per cent of total solids should be determined as the basis of such standard. I have been unable as yet to see my way to endorse his recommendation, inasmuch as while under favourable conditions this standard could generally be exceeded in respect of the proportion of butter fat, genuine cow's milk sometimes falls below that standard and though it may be very desirable to keep the

standard reasonably high—it would be a manifest hardship to convict an honest man of fraud when such apparent fraud is merely the result of natural causes.

The practice of adulterating lard with cotton seed oil and other things appears to have become very prevalent, so much so that nearly half of the samples analysed proved to have been so adulterated.

The large proportion of adulterated tinctures and drugs is due mainly to a deficiency of alcoholic strength as called for by the “British Pharmacopœia.”

#### *Lard.*

The adulterant in each case was cotton seed oil.

#### *Milk.*

Six samples were skimmed and 1 watered. The 14 doubtful cases were probably skimmed or watered, as the case might be; if not so, they were milks of very inferior quality.

#### *Drugs.*

In 10 samples the alcohol employed was not of the strength required by the Pharmacopœia.

#### *Vinegar.*

Deficiency of acetic acid was found in 6 cases; free mineral acid was found in 1 only.

The only subject calling for special remark appears to be the tinctures, many of which were found deficient in alcohol, whether from incorrect manufacture or from long and bad storage may be matter of question, but they are doubtless below the requirements and standard both of the British and American Pharmacopeias. The general quality of drugs and of pharmaceutical preparations appears to me an important field of inquiry on a wider scale than has yet been attempted.

# Adulteration of Food.

## \*Milk.

Thirty-two samples of milk were analyzed of which 19 were genuine, 3 were undoubtedly adulterated, and 10 were doubtful.

Of the three samples returned as adulterated, 2 numbers 12819 and 12826 were adulterated by admixture with water. The solids, other than fat, in both cases fell considerably below 8 per cent. The other sample number 12828, was deficient in cream, the fat being 2.23 per cent, and this fact in connection with a somewhat high proportion of solids not fat, leads to the conclusion that it has been skimmed.

Those samples in which the solids not fat were between 8.0 and 8.5 per cent, I have reported as doubtful, as also those in which the fat was between 2.5 and 3 per cent, because I am satisfied that genuine cow's milk, sometimes, though rarely, gives figures as low as these. I have been informed by medical health officers and others, that my statements to this effect, previously published, are being made use of by dishonest milkmen to defend fraud. This I regret, but the facts remain facts and had better be faced. To shut one's eyes to the exceptions to any rule, no matter how general, appears to me unscientific, and to certify to uncertainties even with the best of motives, is in my judgment, immoral.

It cannot be too often reiterated that there is only one way of protecting the public in this matter—namely, by enacting limits below which milk may not be sold. We know enough now of the composition of milk, and our methods of analysis are sufficiently reliable to permit us to fix these limits, so as to secure protection to the consumer, without injustice to the dealer.

## Beer.

Fifteen samples of beer were examined. The results of the examination are exhibited in the annexed table.

\* I regret to say that in my official return of number 12829, a sample taken from T. J. Horricks, No. 453 1/2 Yonge Street, Toronto, I inadvertently returned an incorrect figure for the butter fat namely, 4.34 instead of 4.1 per cent. This made the solids other than fat, 7.76 per cent instead of 8 per cent, the total solids being 12.1 per cent. This error was, I am sorry to say, not discovered until it had been printed in Bulletin No. 32.

In column I. will be found the specific gravity of the beer after expulsion of the carbon dioxide.

Column II. gives the specific gravity of the distillate made up to the volume of beer taken.

Column III. gives the percentage of alcohol by weight deduced from the figures in II. by means of the tables adopted by the American Association of Agricultural Chemists, and published in their proceedings for 1892 (U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, Div. Chemistry Bulletin, No. 35.)

Column IV. gives the specific gravity of the residue after distillation, made up to the original volume. All these specific gravities were determined by means of a pycnometer, at a temperature of  $15.5^{\circ}\text{C}$ .

Column V. gives the number of grammes of extract in  $100^{\circ}\text{C}$  of beer, calculated from this specific gravity by reference to Balling's table.

Column VI. gives the number of grammes of extract in  $100^{\circ}\text{C}$  beer, determined by evaporating  $10^{\circ}\text{C}$  of the beer in a tube loosely packed with asbestos and drying to constant weight in a water oven at  $90^{\circ}\text{C}$ . Columns V. and VI. in most cases will be found to agree fairly well, except in the case of No. 37.

Column VII. gives the "original gravity," *i. e.*, the specific gravity of the wort from which the beer was brewed before fermentation. It is calculated from columns II. and IV. by means of the tables of Graham, Hofmann and Redwood.

Column VIII. gives the extract contained in this wort obtained by Balling's tables.

Column IX. gives the percentage of nitrogen. This was determined in  $10^{\circ}\text{C}$  of beer by Kjeldahl's method.

Column X. gives the number of grammes of albumenoids in  $100^{\circ}\text{C}$  of beer, obtained from the nitrogen by multiplying by  $6.25$ .

Column XI. gives the albumenoids calculated to the percentage of the extract contained in the original wort as given in column VIII.

In column XII. the numbers were obtained by treating the dry extract with alcohol. They include the sugar and whatever other matters may be soluble in alcohol.

Column XIII., under the head of "Dextrin," &c., gives the numbers obtained by subtracting from the total extract in column VI. the sum of the sugar and albumenoids.

I have been asked to state whether in my opinion, these analyses throw any light upon the question of the source from which the alcohol has been derived, whether from malt alone, or from some malt substitute such as starch sugar. A careful study of the results obtained, together with a comparison of them with all the published analyses of beers, English, American and German at my disposal, has obliged me to answer the question in the negative. The most hopeful indication in this direction appeared to be the quantity of albumenoids when calculated as I have done in the percentage of the solid matter contained in the original wort. The mean of 22 analyses of English Brewers malt by Grimmer (König Nahrung und Genuss-mittel p. 795) gives 5.49 as the percentage of albumenoids in the extract. The same chemist found in experiments with German worts an average of 4.215 per cent of albumenoids in the extract before the addition of hops. After treatment with hops the average percentage was 3.923. The treatment which the malt undergoes in brewing, the temperature of the infusion and other circumstances greatly influence this quantity, and in published analyses from reliable sources from 6 to 3.5 per cent. In the beers submitted to me it varied from 5.6 to 3.9—numbers which do not warrant any definite conclusion.

Useful information might perhaps have been obtained by the action of polarized on the unfermentable residue. But the quantity remaining at my disposal after the determinations given above had been made, was not enough for this purpose.

#### *Soap.*

Five sample of Castile soap were examined and reported genuine.

#### *Cod Liver Oil.*

Three samples were examined and reported genuine.

# Adulteration of Food.

## Olive Oil.

Four samples were examined. Two were reported genuine, and two were found to be adulterated with some foreign oil, probably cotton-seed oil.

## Glycerine.

Three samples were examined. Two were genuine; one contained about 80 per cent glycerine.

## Drugs.

Of 29 drugs examined, I reported 18 genuine, 6 adulterated, and 5 doubtful. The adulterated and doubtful samples were all tinctures, and the nature of the adulteration was deficiency in spirituous strength below the standard of the pharmacopœia.

The subjoined table shows the alcoholic strength and percentage of extract contained in 23 samples.

The tinctures examined were those of arnica, buchu, calumba and capsicum, of each three samples. Tincture of rhubarb and compound tincture of camphor, of each two samples. Four samples of compound tincture of gentian, and one each of tincture of myrrh and compound tincture of cardamoms.

The menstruum directed by the B. P. for the tinctures of arnica, capsicum and myrrh is rectified spirits, for all others, proof spirits. It is obvious, however, that if the directions of the pharmacopœia are followed, that the spirituous strength of the resulting tincture will be less than that of the spirit prescribed for its preparation, because the tincture will contain in addition to the spirit, all the water of the drug and also the

solid matter extracted by the menstruum. In nearly all the tinctures the quantity of powdered drug directed to be taken is 2·5 oz. to the pint *i. e.*, 25 per cent. Vulpius has shown (Arch. d. Pharm. Dec., 1887, p.p. 1044-1049 and Proc. Am. Pharm. Ass., xxxvi., 274) that the quantity of water existing as hygroscopic moisture in well air dried drugs average 11 per cent, while if kept in a moist atmosphere they frequently contain as much as 20 per cent. Rhubarb for example, when kept in a dry atmosphere usually contains about 10 per cent water, but in moist air it may contain 20 per cent. The official tincture of rhubarb contains rather less than 5 per cent of solids. If then a tincture were made by the official method from the dry powder with proof spirit, the product would contain about 5 per cent extract, 2·5 per cent water, and 92·5 per cent proof spirit, while if the tincture were made during damp weather, it might contain 5 per cent of water, 5 per cent extract and 90 per cent proof spirit. In the first case the percentage of alcohol would be 45·32 per cent and the second 44·1 per cent. The latter is an extreme case, but taking into consideration the loss of alcohol which is likely to take place from evaporation during the process of manufacture, I should think that 46 per cent of alcohol was as high as could reasonably be expected in a tincture directed to be made with proof spirit, and 80 per cent in one for which rectified spirit was ordered.

With regard to the tincture of arnica, there are two preparations of that name, one of the root, and the other of the flowers.

The B. P. directs the tincture to be made from the root and with rectified spirits; the U. S. P. directs it to be made from the flowers with dilute alcohol. It is the American preparation which is so largely employed as a remedy for bruises.

I have taken pains to find out what is the alcoholic strength of the best and purest tinctures obtainable in the market, and I have found that in nearly every case, the alcoholic strength for a proof spirit tincture is considerably below that of proof spirit.

As a provisional limit pending further investigation in this matter, I would suggest 40 per cent for proof spirit tinctures, and 75 per cent for rectified spirit tinctures as limits below which the alcoholic strength should not fall.

In accordance with these limits, I refer to the foregoing table in which I have classified as adulterated, all those samples which fall decidedly below this limit. Those which fall a per cent or two below, I have classified as doubtful.

#### *Fertilizers.*

All the fertilizers examined fall within the limit of the Act.

#### *Vinegars.*

I have examined 15 samples of vinegar which are given below.

From this examination it appeared that all the samples were free from metallic impurities, except that No. 12935 contained a notable quantity of iron, and Nos. 12,936, 12944 and 12948 contained a trifling quantity.

Only two of the samples contained any free mineral acid. The quantity present in both cases was less than one gallon in 1,000 gallons.

With regard to their origin, vinegars fall into three classes: 1st.—Those made from a fermented saccharine liquid. 2nd.—Those made from a distilled spirit. 3rd.—Factitious vinegar, made by mixing water with or without a little flavouring and colouring matter with acetic acid, obtained from the distillation of wood.

The first class comprise wine, beer, cider, malt and starch-sugar vinegars. The vinegars of this class are distinguished from those of the other two classes by their larger content of extract and of ash.

In seven of the vinegars examined the extract is above one per cent. In eight it falls below this figure. In the first seven the average is 3·4 per cent. In the second 0·3 per cent. In only one of the first class does the extract fall below 2 per cent.

In only one of the second class does it rise above 0·4 per cent. We have here then the vinegar of the first class sharply marked off from the rest. A determination of the ash leads to the same result. In one only of the first seven samples does the ash fall below 0·2 per cent. In one only of the other eight samples does it reach 0·1 per cent and in most cases it falls below 0·05 per cent.

The seven samples of class one are designated as follows: two samples are called "Canadian Malt," two samples are "English Malt," two samples are "cider," and one "honey."

The eight samples of the second class are designated as follows:—one sample of "Canadian malt," six samples "white wine," and one sample "proof."

The sample called Canadian malt No. 12937 has an extract and ash percentage intermediate between the two classes. No. 12934 with a very low ash has an extract only just above 1 per cent. Both these are perhaps made from a mixture of fermented liquid with spirit.

The sample 12935 called "Honey vinegar" contains much dextrin and is evidently made from starch sugar (glucose).

The two samples called "cider vinegars" agree with the characters of vinegar from that source. The remaining "malt vinegars" are no doubt correctly so called, while the "white wine" and "proof vinegars" have been made from spirit.

In the case of the fertilizers and beers, I did not state in the certificates any opinion as to the genuineness or otherwise, of the samples.

With reference to the classification of the vinegars in the above table, I may say that two of these samples were sold as white wine vinegar, and three as cider vinegar. The two former, I found adulterated, one of the later, I found genuine, one adulterated, and one doubtful. The remainder of the samples being sold simply as vinegar. I took as a standard the British Pharmacopoeial definition, namely, that made from malted and unmalted grain by fermentation and containing 5.41 per cent of real acetic acid, according to which standard all were condemned.

The delay in reporting these has been caused by press of other work, and by my absence from Ottawa on departmental business. I have, nevertheless, to recommend the publication of this table because of the information it contains, both with reference to the results of the district analysts and to those obtained in this laboratory from the same samples. It will be seen that there is, in general, substantial agreement between the two analyses. In some cases there are differences which I am inclined to ascribe to want of care on the part of one or two food inspectors, who may not in all cases have properly mixed the sample taken, before dividing it into the three portions as required by law.

SIR,—I submit herewith the annual report regarding the agricultural fertilizers which are being offered for sale in the Dominion of Canada during the present year. An increase in the number of brands registered is observable this year also, the number being 82 as against 74 for 1892. Full information regarding the origin, composition and analysis of these artificial manures is to be found in the accompanying tabulated statements. Table I. gives the commercial names of the fertilizers, the names and addresses of their manufacturers, together with information regarding the materials from which they have been produced and, in some cases, the prices at which they are offered for sale. Table II. contains the analyses and a statement of their relative values as required by the Fertilizers Act. The manner in which the latter have been ascertained has been described in the Fertilizer Bulletins for 1891 and 1892 (Nos. 22 and 30).

APPENDIX K.

BULLETIN No. 34.—ALCOHOLIC TINCTURES.

E. MIALL, Esq.,  
Commissioner of Inland Revenue.

SIR,—I have the honour to transmit herewith a report by A. McGill, Esq., B.A., &c., Assistant Analyst, on pharmaceutical tinctures, together with tables I. to XI. accompanying the same, and giving the results of analysis as well as the description of the tinctures examined. I would respectfully recommend that these be published for the information of the public.

A considerable number of samples have been found to be deficient in alcoholic strength, and it is reasonable to suppose that, as a consequence, they are defective as regards the extract they should contain and the medicinal properties they should possess. Be this as it may, so much is certain that according to the Adulteration Act every drug is to be regarded as adulterated within the meaning of the Act "If, when sold, or offered " or exposed for sale, under or by a name recognized in the British or United States " Pharmacopœia, it differs from the standard of strength, quality or purity laid down " therein."

The pharmacopœias mentioned prescribe the quality of the alcohol which should be used in the preparation of these tinctures, and Mr. McGill gives these and other details in his report. He also shows that the loss of alcohol in their preparation does not exceed 2·42 p. c. in those cases where proof spirit is used (and which may be called class I.) and 3·18 p.c. when rectified spirit is the solvent (class II.) Since the U. S. Pharmacopœia allows *alcohol dilutum* of 45·5 p. c. alcohol to be used for these tinctures (class I.) which according to the B. P. require to be made with proof spirit of 49·24 p.c., it follows that such tinctures should yield a spirit containing a least (45·5—2·42) 43·08 p.c. alcohol. In order, however, to be on the safe side in passing judgment, 40 per cent has been assumed as the limit, and tinctures belonging to class I., containing less have been characterized as "adulterated according to the Act." In the same manner as regards tinctures belonging to class II., prepared with rectified spirit containing 84·08 p.c. alcohol, it is supposed they should yield a spirit of at least (84·08—3·18) 80·90 per cent. Allowing a similar margin as in the preceding case, all the tinctures of class II. containing less than 78 per cent alcohol are regarded as adulterated according to the Act.

It has not been considered necessary to give in these tables, the names of the parties from whom the tinctures were procured, because the provisions of the Act have been applied in all cases of adulteration where the samples were taken in the manner prescribed by the Act. The following statement shows the number of cases challenged and the manner in which they have been disposed of up to the present :—

# Adulteration of Food.

SIR,—I have the honour to submit herewith the results of analytical and experimental work done upon pharmaceutical tinctures during the past three months. The tables, numbers I. to XI. include, as you will see, duly accredited results obtained by several of the local analysts in addition to those found by myself in this laboratory. The total number of commercial samples analysed is as follows:—

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In addition to the above, six samples have been prepared in the laboratory, and subsequently analysed with a view to the determination of limits of accuracy in methods employed, necessary loss of spirits in manufacture, and other points.

The spirit strength of a tincture will seldom be exactly identical with that of the menstruum employed in making it. There must always be some loss of alcohol through evaporation during the process of manufacture; water is often introduced as moisture proper to the solid matters used; and it is even conceivable that the dehydrating qualities of some hygroscopic substances might have the effect of withdrawing water from the dilute spirit employed, and thus raising the alcoholic strength of the tincture above that of the menstruum. While no general rule can be laid down in this regard, my experiments prove that the amount of loss of alcohol in the six tinctures made by me is much less than is generally supposed to occur. Only one pint of each tincture was made, and the loss should be a maximum on this account. The following are my results:—

The average loss in tinctures made with proof spirit is therefore less than 1·5 per cent, and in tincture of myrrh, made from spirit somewhat above the strength of rectified spirit, B.P., the loss is slightly over 3 per cent.

Valpiers (Archiv. der pharm., 1887; 1044) found the amount of moisture in 77 powdered drugs to average 19 per cent. When, however, we consider the relatively small proportion by weight which the solid matter bears to the weight of the finished tincture, we can readily understand the inconsiderable reduction of spirit strength caused by the presence of even 19 per cent of moisture in the drug used.

Unfortunately the standards adopted by the British and United States pharmacopœias for tinctures of the same name are not identical, and the difference is complicated

by the fact that, while the B.P. directs the weighing of solid ingredients and the measurement of the resulting tincture, the U.S.P. directs the weighing both of ingredients and of tincture with, however, alternative directions for measurement. The following table gives the comparative constants for the tinctures reported on, calculated from the directions of the two pharmacopœias on the assumption that the tincture gravity given is correct.

With reference to this table it has to be noted that:—

1. The asterisk prefixed to the gravity number indicates that the number given has been determined in this Laboratory.

2. The letters F. and S. in gravity column refer respectively to the table of F. W. Fletcher, F.C.S., published in the "Chemist and Druggist, London, Eng., Jan., 1889, and to that of J. Spilsbury, F.C.S., published in "The Analyst," vol. XIV., p. 208.

3. *Tinctura Camphoræ Composita* of the British Pharmacopœia is compared with *Tinctura Opii Camphorata* of the United States Pharmacopœia. Both are popularly known as "paregoric."

As regards the methods employed in making the determinations recorded in the tables, I have to make the following explanations:—

*Residues (total dissolved solids)* were obtained, in the case of tinctures worked by Prof. Ellis, by evaporating 20 c.c. in flat-bottomed platinum dishes. The residue was dried to constant weight on the water bath. Spilsbury used porcelain dishes, or glass beakers of two ounce size, and dried at 212° F. for two hours. Fletcher's numbers were obtained by evaporating 10 c.c. and drying at 120° C. In all other cases the residues were obtained by drying 10 to 25 c.c. of the tincture to constant weight at 95° to 100° C. in asbestos tubes as described in the "Analyst" for April of this year. It is evident, from the above considerations, that the solid residues so obtained cannot be directly compared with each other. In many cases a considerable loss of weight must occur

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between 100° and 120° C., and it is greatly to be desired that some uniform temperature should be fixed upon for drying the residues. It is of scarcely secondary importance that a uniform mode of manipulation should be adopted.

*Determination of the Spirit Strength of Tinctures.* In many cases the alcohol can be correctly estimated by dilution of the tincture with water to two volumes and careful distillation, making up the volume of the distillate to two volumes, taking care to make all measurements at the same temperature. This method succeeds perfectly with Tincture of Calumba, Tincture of Jalap and Tincture of Squills. In compound Tincture of Gentian the slight error due to the presence of traces of essential oils in the distillate is too insignificant to be taken into account. Compound Tincture of Camphor is neutralized with soda before distillation in order to fix the benzoic acid, the oil of anise being present in too small quantity to affect the result. In this tincture the alcoholic strength may be safely judged from the gravity of the tincture itself, provided that the extractive (residue) does not exceed 0.65 per cent. Compound Tincture of Cardamoms, Tincture of Rhubarb, and Tincture of Myrrh give distillates containing a considerable amount of essential oils. I have, however, ascertained that the error due to the presence of the small quantity of volatile oil in the distillate is not greater than that introduced by the treatment usually employed for separating the oil before distillation. Allan (Com. Org. Analysis, vol. I., p. 112) recommends the dilution of the tincture to 8 volumes after separation of the precipitated volatile oil by large previous dilution with entanglement in a precipitate of calcium phosphate. Any error in the gravity number is multiplied by 8, and experiments show that a loss of 3 to 4 per cent of alcohol may easily occur, a loss quite double that of the greatest error that could result from straight distillation to two volumes.

For example, Tincture of Myrrh No. 11818, diluted to 2 volumes gave gravity 0.9418. Hence  $46.14 \times 2 = 92.28$  per cent alcohol by volume. An error of 0.0005 in determining the gravity number would give:—

Volatile oils which are compound ethers (e. g. Wintergreen oil) may be prevented from coming over by saponification, but in this case an equivalent of homologous alcohol comes over, thus vitiating the result as much as would be the case did the volatile oil itself appear in the distillate.

The majority of essential oils occurring in tinctures are terpenes, and in this case saponification is not available. I have tried various methods of retaining the oil or of separating it before distilling, as by entangling it in a precipitate as recommended by Allen (loc. cit.) and by precipitating it by dilution of the tincture with water, and subsequent separation with aid of an immiscible solvent. I have obtained the best results with petroleum (refined high grade coal oil). The following numbers illustrate this method of working:—

A dilute alcohol was prepared by mixing pure alcohol with distilled water. Alcohol (by distillation to 2 volumes) 52.41 per cent alcohol.

On shaking up 50 c. c. of this dilute alcohol with 100 c. c. water and 50 c. c. petroleum, separating the petroleum and distilling the aqueous fraction I obtained 51.13 per cent alcohol showing a loss of 1.28 per cent. Repeating this, using only 50 c. c. water, I obtained 52.77 per cent alcohol, an error (excess) of 0.36 per cent. These experiments show that petroleum can be used to separate (terpenes, &c.) from alcoholic solution, without causing any serious loss of alcohol. On using olive oil in the same way a loss of 1.98 per cent of alcohol occurred. (All the above work was verified by duplication.)

A sample of oil of lemons having a specific gravity 0·8591 was mixed with strong spirit of wine (S. g. 0·8125) in the following proportions:—

Oil of lemons.....	25 c. c.
Spirit of wine to make.....	250 c. c.

The specific gravity of the mixture was 0·8161. On distilling carefully after addition of an equal volume of water (the distillate being made up to two volumes) the gravity of the distillate was found to be 0·9389. This is a mean of three attempts. The oil of lemon separated from the dilute alcohol so that it was difficult to obtain a constant weight for the emulsion formed by shaking vigorously. 50 c. c. of the solution of oil of lemon was now treated with 50 c. c. water, which caused a precipitation of the essential oil. 50 c. c. petroleum was now added, and well mixed by shaking. The petroleum solution of the oil does not separate perfectly, but after taking off the bulk of aqueous alcohol, the addition of 10 c. c. water enables a perfect separation to be effected. The aqueous alcoholic portion was now distilled, and a clear distillate, nearly free from oil was obtained. Its gravity was found to be 0·9473. This corresponds to  $42\cdot76 \times 2 = 85\cdot52$  per cent alcohol by volume in the solution of oil in alcohol. The true content in alcohol is  $\frac{1}{10}$  of  $95\cdot95 = 86\cdot36$  per cent (volume). The error, assuming the oil of lemons to be free from alcohol, is therefore 0·84 per cent (loss). The acceptance of the gravity of the mixture as an indication of its content in alcohol would lead to an error of  $95\cdot00 - 86\cdot36 = 8\cdot64$  per cent alcohol by volume.

It is seldom that an error of as much as one per cent of alcohol can occur through the presence of volatile oil in the pharmaceutical tincture, since the amount of such oil is generally very small. Greater errors in alcohol estimation from the direct gravity result in consequence of the dissolved solids present. The extent of the error so resulting I have remarked, with other matters, in the following special notes to the various tables:—

TABLE I.—COMPOUND TINCTURE OF GENTIAN.

The following constants apply to the tincture made according to the instructions of the British Pharmacopœia:

100 vols. of the tincture represent  $7\frac{1}{2}$  parts by weight gentian root.

100 " " compound to  $12\frac{1}{2}$  solids used.

Specific gravity of the tincture 0·935 (nearly).

From this gravity 100 parts by weight of the tincture represent 13 parts by weight of solids used.

Made according to the directions of the United States Pharmacopœia:

100 parts by weight correspond to 8 parts gentian root.

100 " " " " 14 " solids used.

The density of the tincture made according to the instructions U.S.P. has not been determined. It will probably be slightly higher than that of the B.P. tincture from the somewhat higher proportion of solids used in its preparation, and the lower alcohol strength of the menstruum. The extractive matter in the case of B.P. tincture is from 3·5 to 4 per cent of the weight of the tincture. It is therefore evident that the density of a sample is not a safe guide to its alcoholic strength. The error in a particular case of a genuine tincture (Table I., No. 24) amounts to 12 per cent of proof spirit. The table gives the results of analyses of 23 samples collected on the open market, together with certain constants. It should be explained that the residues in the case of samples worked by Dr. Ellis were got by drying in flat platinum dishes at 100 c.c.—not in asbestos fibre as was the case with all the other samples.

No. 27 is not directly comparable with the other numbers in the table. I have not been able to discover any constant relation between the amount of extractive and the strength of the spirit used in these samples. It is not unlikely that some of them have been prepared with excessive amounts of the solids prescribed, while others seem to have been reduced in strength both of alcohol and of extractive by fraudulent addition of dilute spirit.

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TABLE II.—COMPOUND TINCTURE OF CARDAMOMS.

Twenty fluid ounces of this tincture require  $3\frac{1}{2}$  ounces of solid matter—or taking 0·940 as the gravity of the tincture, 100 parts by weight of the tincture correspond to 16 parts by weight of solids used in its preparation. The extractive matter constitutes about 4·5 to 5·0 per cent by weight and consists chiefly of sugar from the raisins. The United States Pharmacopœia prescribes honey (1870) instead of raisins, and still later (1883) directs glycerine to be used. The dried residue at 100° C. will probably be lower in this case, but a sample according to the U. S. P. directions has not been made in this Laboratory. Including the glycerine, the weight of material to prepare 100 parts by weight of U. S. P. tincture is 11·5 parts, and the glycerine, unlike the raisins, is entirely soluble.

In the case of a tincture of this kind the amount of alcohol per cent cannot be directly ascertained from the gravity of the sample. An error of about 15 per cent of proof spirit would thus occur in No. 12.

The error in spirit estimation due to the presence of volatile oils in the distillate is quite insignificant.

The results shown in the table show that the tincture as found in the shops has no constancy of character, either as regards its spirit strength or its extractive.

TABLE III.—COMPOUND TINCTURE OF CAMPHOR.

Twenty ounces (measure) of this tincture are made from (40 + 40 + 30) 110 grains, or about  $\frac{1}{4}$  oz., of solid matter, extracted with proof spirit. The specific gravity of the tincture differs, therefore, but very little from that of the spirit with which it is made. The minute amount of oil of anise does not introduce any appreciable error in the spirit indication from gravity. The amount of error resulting from using the gravity of the tincture as an index to the spirit strength does not exceed 2 per cent of proof spirit, except in cases where the solids are abnormal. (e. g. Nos. 1 and 2).

The following results were obtained on a sample made in the laboratory :—

These results show that, for practical purposes, the spirit strength can be safely inferred within one per cent from the gravity of the tincture, when the extractive is known to be not more than 0·65 per cent.

TABLE IV.—TINCTURE OF MYRRH.

“ Myrrh is a mixture, in very varying proportions, of resin, mucilaginous matters and essential oil. A sample yielded 27 per cent of resin, completely soluble in alcohol. Operating on the 25 lbs. of the drug we obtained 0·75 per cent of volatile oil.” Fluckiger and Hanbury *Pharmacographia*, 1879.

Ruickholdt got 2·18 per cent; Bley and Diesel (1845) from 1·6 to 3·4 per cent, and Fritzsche states that good myrrh distilled on a large scale yields as much as 4·4 per cent of oil. (Footnote to *Pharmacographia*, p. 144.) Braconnot (*Ann. de chim.* 67; 52) found as follows :—

It is evident that the object in view, in prescribing rectified spirit as the solvent, is to get the volatile oil and the resin as completely as possible into solution, leaving the gum undissolved. A weaker alcohol will have the effect of dissolving the gum in proportion as it leaves the resin undissolved, so that while the total solid matter in solution may be unchanged in amount, it will be greatly changed in character. The volatile oil of myrrh has a density of about 1.000 (0.988 Fluckiger and Hanbury) and a boiling point of about 280° C. I have found that very little error in the determination of the alcohol results from diluting carefully until about 2 volumes come over. The maximum difference between this method of working, and processes in which the volatile oil is separated before distilling amounts to less than  $1\frac{1}{2}$  per cent of alcohol in the tincture.

The British Pharmacopœia directs the preparation of this tincture by the use of 12.5 oz. avoirdupois of myrrh, and 100 fluid ounces of rectified spirit, afterwards made up to 100 fluid ounces of the tincture by addition of the necessary volume of rectified spirit. Calculating from the following constants :—

The United States Pharmacopœia prescribes the use of 20 parts by weight of myrrh in the preparation of 100 parts by weight of the tincture. The spirit employed is stronger than that authorized for B. P. tincture in the rates of 94.00 to 88.76 ; the respective densities of the two spirits being 0.820 and 0.838. The effect of this change in spirit strength will probably be fully counterbalanced in its influence on the density of the resulting tincture by the greater weight of myrrh employed. I have not prepared a sample according to U.S.P. directions ; but No. 18 in the table was made according to the British Pharmacopœia, one pint being prepared, and shows that an apparent loss of about 3 per cent of rectified spirit occurred in the process of manufacture.

A. H. Allen (Analyst, IV., p. 102) finds, however, that rectified spirit is increased in volume by solution of myrrh to such an extent that a considerable error results on calculating the strength of the alcohol used in making the tincture from the results of distillation of a measured volume of tincture. He deduces from his experiments the factor 1.037 for conversion of proof spirit by volume in the distillate to proof spirit by volume in the menstruum employed in making the tincture. If this factor be applied to the results obtained by distillation in the case of No. 18 the products are 85.92 per cent absolute alcohol by weight, 91.05 alc. by vol. or 100.65 p. c. rectified spirit. For the alcohol actually used in preparing this tincture the numbers are 86.58 wgt., 90.70 vol. and 102.1 rectified spirit. Error (uncorrected) 3.27 p. c. rec. sp. deficit. Error (corrected by Allen's factor) 1.54 rec. sp. deficit. The error resulting from taking the gravity of the tincture to indicate the alcohol present amounts to about 4 per cent of rectified spirit when the tincture is properly made.

TABLE V.—TINCTURE OF RHUBARB.

The British pharmacopœial tincture contains the soluble matter from  $2\frac{3}{4}$  oz. solids in 20 fluid ounces of the tincture, or 100 parts by measure, employ 13.75 parts by weight,



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or taking 0.94 as the average gravity of the tincture, 100 parts by weight require 14.6 parts solids.

The U.S.P. employs 14 parts solids for 100 parts tincture, omitting coriander fruit and saffron. The extractive matter in the two tinctures, while not strictly identical in kind, will differ but little in percentage amount. A sample prepared in the laboratory according to B.P. directions gave 3.89 per cent of extractive (weight in volume) and had a specific gravity of 0.936. No doubt the different varieties of rhubarb will yield slightly different amounts of extractive to proof spirit. In this tincture an error amounting to about 13 per cent of proof spirit would result from taking the gravity of the tincture to indicate the spirit strength of the menstruum. The error due to volatile oil passing over with the distillate on distilling to two volumes is less than 1 per cent of alcohol.

TABLE VI.—TINCTURE OF CALUMBA.

This is made with proof spirit, and 1 part of the bruised root is used to make 8 parts by measure of the tincture. The gravity being taken as 0.925, this corresponds to 13.5 parts by weight of the root for 100 parts by weight of the finished tincture. The U. S. P. prescribes 10 parts of the root (in No. 20 powder) to make 100 parts of tincture. The menstruum directed is a mixture of alcohol (*s.g.* 0.820) 3 parts to water 2 parts; *i.e.*, a dilute spirit containing 54.6 per cent by weight of true alcohol.

The U. S. P. tincture of calumba will therefore have a lower gravity than the B. P. tincture; and the extractive (weight in volume) will be less.

In order to ascertain the necessary loss of spirit entailed in making the B. P. tincture a sample (one pint) was made in this laboratory, and the apparent loss of proof spirit was found to be less than 2 per cent.

The error resulting from judging the alcoholic strength of the tincture, directly from its gravity amounts to from 1 to 2 per cent of proof spirit.

TABLE VII.—TINCTURE OF GINGER.

The B. P. directions prescribe 12.5 parts by weight of the bruised root for 100 parts by measure of the tincture. Taking 0.84 as the gravity of the tincture, this is equivalent to nearly 15 parts of ginger for 100 parts of tincture by weight. Rectified spirits (*s.g.* 0.838) is the menstruum.

The U. S. P. directs the use of 20 parts ginger for 100 parts of the tincture by weight, with alcohol (*s.g.* 0.820).

The amount of extractive in the seven samples tabulated is exceedingly variable, and cannot be accounted for except on the supposition of carelessness in manufacture.

TABLE VIII.—TINCTURE OF SQUILLS.

The B. P. tincture is made from 12.5 parts by weight of dried bruised squills for 100 parts by measure of tincture. If the gravity of the tincture be taken as 0.940 this corresponds to about 13 parts by weight of squills for 100 parts by weight of tincture. The U. S. P. prescribes 15 parts of squills for 100 parts of tincture.

The amount of extractive found in Canadian samples is very variable.

TABLE IX.—TINCTURE OF JALAP.

This tincture is not official in the U. S. P.

According to B. P. it should be made from 12.5 parts jalap by weight for 100 parts measure of the tincture, proof spirits being the menstruum. This is equivalent to about 13.3 parts by weight of jalap for 100 parts of the tincture, the gravity of the tincture being taken = 0.940.

TABLE X.—TINCTURE OF ARNICA.

The British Pharmacopœia directs the use of the bruised root 1 part by weight, and rectified spirit to percolate 20 parts by volume.

The United States Pharmacopœia prescribes the use of 18 parts of the root in No. 40 powder, and diluted alcohol to make 100 parts (weight). This United States Pharmacopœia tincture is known as the tincture of arnica root to distinguish it from the tincture of arnica flowers, which is made by treating 20 parts of the flowers (in No. 20 powder) with diluted alcohol to make 100 parts by weight of the tincture. The following are the relations between these tinctures and their components, taking 0·843 as the specific gravity of the British Pharmacopœia tincture:—

It is evident that the three samples reported upon by Dr. Ellis have been prepared ostensibly according to the United States Pharmacopœia. While one of the samples is slightly above the strength required, two of them fall considerably below it. It is inconceivable that a loss of 13 per cent of diluted alcohol need occur in the preparation of this tincture, whether made from the root or from the flower.

In a private communication Dr. Ellis states that a sample of tincture of arnica, "which he has every reason to believe was made according to British Pharmacopœia directions," gave 75 per cent by weight of alcohol. This is equivalent to 81·28 per cent of alcohol by volume, or 91·57 per cent of rectified spirit, showing a loss of 8·5 per cent rectified spirit.

The amount of extractive in these samples is strangely variable, and its high percentage in No. 5951 requires explanation.

TABLE XI.—TINCTURE OF BUCHU.

This tincture is only official in the British Pharmacopœia. It is made from 12½ parts by weight of bruised buchu leaves for 100 volumes of tincture; proof spirit being the solvent. If we take 0·936 as the gravity of the tincture, this is equivalent to 13·4 parts by weight of buchu for 100 by weight of finished tincture.

The samples in Table XI. are all deficient in spirit; and it is remarkable that while the deficiencies in spirit strength are great, the amount of dissolved solids is practically constant.

## APPENDIX L.

### BULLETIN No. 35.—VINEGAR.

E. MIALL, Esq.,  
Commissioner of Inland Revenue.

SIR,—I have to submit for your consideration the following report on the samples of vinegar which were, in accordance with your instructions, collected in various parts of the Dominion in April, May and June last, and submitted to analysis. The results of this investigation are of unusual interest on account of the manner in which the question "What is vinegar?" has been ventilated and decided before the Courts of the United Kingdom. The prosecutions there for the sale of adulterated vinegar have been very numerous, and have generally resulted in convictions, it being held that in order to be legally sold under the name of "vinegar" the article requires to possess the composition and origin defined in the British Pharmacopœia. The proceedings in one of the most important cases of this sort are recorded in the "Analyst" for August, 1893. It was an appeal heard at the Birmingham Quarter Sessions on the 3rd July, and resulted in a confirmation of the judgment of the Lower Court. The article in question was admitted by the defence to be acetic acid produced from the distillation of wood, which had been diluted and coloured. The essential points in the case are given in the judgment, which may here be transcribed:—

"The Recorder said that he saw no useful purpose to be served by reserving judgment. Having listened very carefully for a day and a half to the arguments so ably adduced on both sides, he thought he was in a position to give his decision at once. The question really was whether the substance which had been sold on this occasion by the appellants could be allowed to bear the name of vinegar. If it ought not to be sold as vinegar, then there had been sufficient prejudice to the purchaser to justify a conviction under the Food and Drugs Act. There was no dispute as to the constitution of the substance. As to whether it was entitled to be called vinegar, counsel for the appellants had, with great skill and perseverance, endeavoured to establish the affirmative on three grounds. The first ground was, that the substance was recognized by law as vinegar. Without going through the Acts of Parliament and the decisions that had been quoted, he (the Recorder) would say that he did come to the conclusion that the contention that vinegar and preparations of acetic acid were in law the same thing could not be accepted. The object of the Acts of Parliament quoted was to take care that certain excise duties were enforced, and for that purpose they enacted that persons who had or received into their custody and possession, amongst other things, vinegar or acetic acid, or other matters for certain purposes, should be deemed vinegar-makers. Those enactments did not mean to enact that acetic acid should be vinegar, or that the makers or purifiers of acetic acid or pyroligneous acid, although they were to be deemed vinegar-makers for the purpose of these acts, should be entitled to have the acetic acid which they produced termed vinegar. He thought that the words 'deemed to be vinegar-makers' showed conclusively that it was for the purpose of these duties that they were to be taken under the generic name 'vinegar-makers,' which included a number of things, and he could not hold that it had been recognized by these various Acts of Parliament that dilute acetic acid, coloured, was vinegar. The decisions which had been quoted, and which had reference to excise questions, he interpreted in the same manner, and therefore the argument depending upon recognition by law was unfounded. As to the second point, whether this mixture was entitled by long use to be termed vinegar, evidence had been given that for a great number of years it had been sold as vinegar. On the other hand, it was admitted that the public had not known that it was merely dilute acetic acid coloured that they were buying, and that it had not been discovered by the public until quite recently, when the analysts had found out what the exact constituents of the substance were. Therefore, he did not think that this substance had made out

its title by long usage to be recognized as vinegar. The third point made by the appellants was that the substance was really vinegar in point of fact. It was clear that before the invention of this substance the original definition of vinegar was a vegetable juice or infusion which had passed through the alcoholic and acetic fermentations. In the 'British Pharmacopœia,' Professor Atfield defined vinegar as a substance 'prepared from the mixture of malted and unmalted grain by acetic fermentation.' He was surprised, therefore, to hear Professor Atfield say on Monday that this definition of vinegar, for which he was responsible in so important a publication as the 'British Pharmacopœia,' was put in simply for the preparation of soap-plaster. On the very same page of the book the Professor, alluding to vinegar, stated what the dose was to be; and he could not believe that a gentleman of eminence who was responsible for so important a publication could have been guilty of what would have been unpardonable carelessness of putting in such a definition of such an article as vinegar simply for the purpose of soap-plaster. But in the 'Pharmacopœia,' in addition to defining vinegar, Professor Atfield had also defined dilute acetic acid. Therefore he (the Recorder) came to the conclusion that as far as Professor Atfield was concerned the definitions of vinegar and dilute acetic acid were distinct. Reviewing the other expert evidence, the Recorder pointed out that Mr. Allen had said that dilute acetic acid not produced from any process of fermentation was not true vinegar, but was 'as different from it as silent spirit is different from wine. In fact, in the evidence one might just as well be called upon to decide that alcohol and water was wine as that coloured acetic acid and water was vinegar. Therefore the case of the appellant seemed to be a *reductio ad absurdum*. Under these circumstances, he was forced to the conclusion that what was sold in this case was not entitled to the name of vinegar. He did not think there was very much weight in the arguments of the great disturbance of trade that would be caused by a decision adverse to the appellants. In a case of that kind the law could not take that into consideration at all; but he would point out that a similar argument was used with regard to margarine. It was said that the public would cease to buy margarine if that substance were given its proper name, but it was common knowledge that the margarine trade was now in a more flourishing state than ever before. He had no doubt that his decision in this case—which, if it should be confirmed elsewhere, would have a far-reaching effect—would cause a good deal of disturbance and inconvenience to the manufacturers of this article. The substance, however, was no doubt extremely valuable for many things, and served the purpose of vinegar in many ways, and he could not help thinking that the discussion which had been raised by this case must have shown the public the value of the substance for what it was, as well as what it was not. The article appeared to be a valuable thing in itself, and would find its place in commerce, and therefore he did not think that in the end the manufacturers of it would be at any loss. But it was not entitled to be called vinegar, and consequently the appeal must be dismissed, with costs against the appellant."

From this it appears to be definitely settled that in England it is only the article made from malted and unmalted grain which can be sold as "vinegar." It follows that all other varieties, even those which have been produced from fruit juices by the various acetic fermentations, must be sold under other appellations, such as "Wine Vinegar," "Cider Vinegar," "Sugar Vinegar," "Wood Vinegar," "Diluted Acetic Acid," &c.

At present no positive standard for vinegar exists in Canada, *i.e.*, the Governor General in Council has not yet exercised the power given under the Adulteration Act to establish a standard for and fix the limits of variability permissible in the article. If, therefore, cases of vinegar adulteration were brought before Canadian Courts, the decisions would no doubt be largely influenced by the English precedent above referred to. It would not be difficult to show that this would result in much embarrassment to the trade, for while "in England malt vinegar is held in high esteem" and "in America cider vinegar is largely used,"\* the article most favoured in Canada is that made from spirit. There is no doubt that if the English law as now interpreted were adopted in Canada, the work of the analyst in determining what is and is not vinegar would be

much easier. As it is at present, there are sold under the name of vinegar, with various prefixes, not only imported malt vinegars, but also articles made from spirit, beer, fruit juices, and strong acetic acid. Large quantities of the latter, made from wood, are imported for making vinegar by dilution and colouring, and the manufacture of strong acid from imported acetate of lime has already been established for the same purpose. To distinguish these latter products from each other, is a matter of extreme difficulty as will appear from a consideration of the figures given in this report and the table of results appended to it. If for instance, that made from spirit were adopted as the article legally entitled to be sold as vinegar it would be impossible to distinguish it from diluted acetic acid to which a slight quantity of alcohol has been added. On the other hand if it were established that the article from malt could alone be sold as vinegar then the vendors would be obliged to sell the other products as "Cider Vinegar," "Wine Vinegar," "Spirit Vinegar," "Diluted Acetic Acid," or otherwise as the case might be. They would also be free to use the names "Compound Vinegar," or "Vinegar Mixture" as suggested by the Adulteration Act. There does not appear to be any other practical way in which the provisions of the Act can be carried out in reference to vinegar unless by adopting the modern English practice. It must be remembered that this is not a case in which the additions of substances injurious to health has to be considered. The object is to make it certain that when the public purchase vinegar they shall be made aware of the source from which it is derived, or of the material from which it is manufactured.

In the tables appended to this report there are described 93 samples of vinegar as sold in Canada. The results of the analyses by the district analyst are given, as well as those obtained on the duplicate samples by my assistant, Mr. W. H. Babington. The latter are stated in the lowest of the two lines placed opposite to each sample. In order that the particulars there given may be properly understood, the following explanations may be made as regards the figures placed in each column :

Column 1 contains the specific gravity of the sample taken at 15.5° C.

Column 2 shows the total amount of solids or dry substance contained in 100 cubic centimetres of the sample dried at 100° C. This result should be serviceable for distinguishing the varieties from each other, malt vinegar being high and spirit vinegar low in extract, but, unfortunately, artificial additions may vitiate any conclusions drawn from this figure. This determination is made by evaporating 50 cubic centimeters of the sample in a platinum capsule to dryness. If sulphuric acid is present the residue is charred ; if the sample contains 0.02 p.c. of the acid the residue separates into oily brown drops, so that this phenomenon can be used to ascertain the presence of that small quantity of sulphuric acid.

Column 3 gives the amount of ash ascertained by incineration at a dull red heat. In column 4 its reaction is stated, which is as a rule alkaline. It is tested by adding to the ash a few drops of water and placing a piece of good red litmus paper in it until the latter is thoroughly moistened. If it is not found to be alkaline the reaction with blue paper is next tried. If the ash is found to be neutral it is fair to conclude that a mineral acid is present.

Column 5 gives the total acidity obtained by simple titration of 25 cc. of the sample with normal soda. It is stated in terms of glacial acetic acid,  $C_2H_4O_2$ .

Column 6 contains the percentage of acetic anhydride present, since the mode practiced by the Inland Revenue Officer according to the departmental instructions of 25th March, 1893, results in giving the percentage in terms of hypothetically anhydrous acetic acid, which, under the old notation when acetic acid was written  $C_4H_4O_4$ , had the formula  $C_4H_3O_3$ .

Column 7 gives the percentage of organic acid, combined as well as free, in terms of acetic acid. This was obtained by taking the solution from the ordinary titration (column 6) evaporating it to dryness in a platinum dish, igniting, exhausting the residue with hot water, filtering, treating the filtrate with 50 cc. normal sulphuric acid, boiling off the carbonic acid, and titrating back by normal soda. Then the number of c.c. of the latter— $50 \times 0.06 \times 4$  gives the percentage of organic acids. This determination is of use in the case of vinegars which darken in colour in approaching the neutralizing point in

the first titration. It is also serviceable with vinegars containing sulphuric acid or acetates. If sulphuric acid is present the organic acids will be less, and if acetates are present the organic acids will be more than in the first titration.

Column 8 is for sulphuric acid, and the quantity present is given when the determination has been made.

Column 9 contains the result of a qualitative test for phosphoric acid performed as follows:—The ash is dissolved in a few drops dilute hydrochloric acid, about 10 c.c., water added, and filtered into a test tube; one half of this is reserved to test for metallic contamination, and to the other molybdate of ammonia is added. The quantity of phosphoric acid present is indicated by the words "none," "trace," "slight precipitate," "heavy precipitate." Its presence indicates that the vinegar was produced from malt or grain, and its absence points, as a rule, to a derivation from spirits or distilled acetic acid.

Column 10 gives the result of a qualitative test made to ascertain the presence or absence of reducing sugar. 10 c.c. of the sample are placed in a test tube, neutralized with soda solution, 10 c.c. of Fehling solution added, and heated in a water-bath for ten minutes. From the amount of reduction observed, the quantity of sugar present is expressed by the words "none," "trace," "slight reduction," "heavy reduction." The use of this test is for separating spirit and acetic vinegars from those produced from malt, wine and fruit juices. The latter give indications of the presence of sugar; the former show none or only a slight reduction.

Column 11 shows the amount of alcohol present. 100 c.c. of the sample are rendered alkaline by soda and distilled into a 100 c.c. flask. The specific gravity of the distillate is taken and the percentage obtained from Hehner's tables. The presence of alcohol indicates vinegars from spirit, wine and fruit vinegars, but the indication of course fails with dilute acetic acids, to which small quantities of alcohol may have been added.

Column 12 gives the result of testing for metallic contamination with sulphuretted hydrogen on the portion reserved from the phosphoric acid test. When any heavy metals are present this is indicated, and the quantity stated in cases where the determination has been made.

In order that a comparison might be made of the commercial vinegars with samples of known origin, with distilled acetic acid and mixtures of known composition, the following analyses were also made by Mr. Babington, the methods of examination followed being those above mentioned:

With reference to these samples and results, it appears necessary to make the following remarks:—The spirit vinegar (No. 3) shows considerable solids, which is explained by the fact that the addition of other material, besides spirit, such as beer and cider, is permitted in the bonded factories by the Inland Revenue authorities. From the point of view of the analyst this practice is much to be regretted, because it makes it impossible for him to distinguish between the two great classes of vinegars, viz. : those obtained from distilled products, and those produced by fermentation alone. The acetic acid bought as B. P. (No. 9) is too strong, the standard prescribed being 33 p. c. That is also the case with the sample bought as diluted acetic acid which contained 5·10, whereas the Pharmacopœia requires only 4·27 p. c. In this connection it may be mentioned that *vinegar* requires to contain 5·41 p. c. of acetic acid according to the British Pharmacopœia.

The vinegars described in the tables appended to this report show wide variations as regards their total acidity. The percentages of acetic acid range from 2·86 to 7·99, which facts at once suggest the inquiry as to what the proper strength should be. The proof vinegar of the Inland Revenue Department contains 6 per cent of acetic anhydride, which is equal to 7·06 per cent of acetic acid. This is of course too strong for domestic purposes. The vinegars described in the tables show the following averages:—

From these figures it would appear reasonable to adopt as standard the vinegar of the British Pharmacopœia, and place the strength at 5·41 per cent, which is equal to 4·6 per cent of acetic anhydride.

In concluding this report, I beg to suggest its early publication for the information of those engaged in the manufacture and sale of vinegar, as well as of the public generally.

## APPENDIX M.

### BULLETIN No. 36.—FERTILIZERS AS SOLD.

E. MIALL, Esq.,  
Commissioner of Inland Revenue.

SIR,—In April, May and June last 91 samples were collected of the various grades of fertilizers sold in the Dominion, and submitted to the district analysts for examination. In many cases very appreciable differences were detected in the amounts of their fertilizing constituents as compared with the standard samples sent in at the beginning of the year and with the guaranteed analysis of the manufacturer. The particulars, as regards these differences, are given in the tables accompanying this report, which I respectfully recommended should be published for the information of the public.

In these tables, which refer to 91 samples of fertilizers, three lines of figures are given opposite the name of each brand. The top line gives the manufacturer's guarantee, the second shows the results of analysis by the local analyst, the third contains the analysis of the standard sample deposited with the Department at the beginning of the year (1893). In some cases the examinations of the local analyst are incomplete, and where certain of the fertilizing constituents have not been estimated the word undetermined (undet.) will be found. Among the samples collected will be found a few whose vendors or manufacturers have ignored altogether the provisions of the Fertilizers Act, or at least neglected to furnish standard samples to the Department. In such cases the lines opposite the words "guaranteed" and "standard" will usually be found vacant.

To the Honourable  
The Controller of Inland Revenue.

SIR,—I have the honour to submit herewith my annual report on the inspection of weights and measures and gas, with the usual statements in connection therewith, for the fiscal year ended 30th June, 1893.

1. The total revenue collected during the year for the inspection of weights and measures was \$39,411.06, as against \$38,549.66 collected during the year ended 30th June, 1892.

2. The total expenditure was \$71,766.06, as against \$70,052.55 expended during the year ended 30th June, 1892.

3. Appendix "A" gives a summary statement of the receipts and expenditure of each inspection division.

4. In Appendices "B," "C" and "D" will be found a detailed statement of weights, measures and weighing machines presented for verification, verified and rejected during the year. The number of all descriptions may be summarily stated as follows:—

5. Since the date of my last report Mr. Robert Magness, one of the assistant inspectors of the Hamilton weights and measures division—a practical officer who has had large experience in original inspection of weights and measures and weighing machines—has been appointed general supervisor of inspections in manufactories of that class of goods, and is, I am pleased to report, giving satisfaction to manufacturers as well as to the officers whose work he supervises.



6. I have again to draw your attention to the fact that the expenditure in the Weights and Measures Branch might be considerably lessened in many of the divisions without affecting the efficiency of the service, by reducing the staff of assistant inspectors.

#### INSPECTION OF GAS.

7. The total revenue collected during the fiscal year ended 30th June, 1893, for the inspection of gas and gas meters, was 13,205.91, as compared with \$8,693.75 collected during the year ended 30th June, 1892.

8. The total expenses were \$19,241.03, as against \$18,654.72 expended during the year ended 30th June, 1892.

9. Appendix "E" gives a summary statement of the receipts and expenditure of each Gas Inspection District.

10. The details of gas meter inspection will be found in Appendix "F." The result, as compared with last year, may be stated as follows:—

## REPORT OF PROGRESS.

21. Since the date of my last report we have had verified all the gas-testing apparatus in the following offices, viz. :—

London, St. Thomas, Woodstock, Ingersoll, Chatham, Ont., Windsor, Stratford, Listowel, Sarnia, Berlin, Galt, Guelph, St. Catharines, Barrie, Owen Sound, Brockville, Cornwall, Napanee, Kingston, Lindsay, Brantford, Dundas, Sherbrooke, Winnipeg and Victoria ; and repairs were made in the offices at St. Thomas, Woodstock, Ingersoll, Chatham, Ont., Guelph, St. Catharines, Sherbrooke and Victoria, B. C.

New inspection offices were fitted up and opened for business at Vancouver, New Westminster and Nanaimo, B. C.

The whole of the foregoing work, verifying and repairing of apparatus, was done by Mr. McPhie, who reports having left all the offices visited by him in good working order.

22. In addition to the foregoing, the following repairs, etc., were made under supervision of Mr. Aubin :—

Repairs to apparatus in the Quebec gas inspection office ; the removal of apparatus from Cornwall office while the office was undergoing repairs, and the replacing of them when repairs were completed.

23. Gas companies still complain of unfairness on the part of the Government in insisting upon the closest inspection of gas and gas meters, whilst their rivals, the electric light companies, are permitted to sell their light without inspection of its illuminating power, or of the correctness of the meters by which it is measured out to customers.

24. I have pleasure in calling your attention to the fact that the revenue for gas inspection for the year ended 30th June, 1893, is \$4,512.16 greater than the receipts of any previous year, and I have no doubt but that by a careful re-classification of gas companies, and some slight alterations in the tariff, the revenue can easily be made to balance the expenditure, and that, too, without grievously over-burdening gas-producers.
