REPORT OF THE DEPUTY MINISTER.

To the Honourable W. B. IVES,
Minister of Trade and Commerce.

SIR,—I have the honour to submit this third Annual Report of the Department which is self explanatory and does not seem to call for any extended introductory remarks.

The report has been somewhat curtailed in consequence of the publication of quarterly reports in which is given to the public information in respect of Tariff changes and other trade regulations, current reports from Canadian Commercial Agents and other matters of interest to those engaged in trade which it is desirable they should be in possession of as soon after receipt as possible without waiting for the issue of the Annual Report by which time much of it has become more a matter of history than of current interest. It will be noticed that both the imports and exports for the year have fallen off considerably from those of the previous year—this diminution however is less comparatively than that of nearly every country publishing trade reports—and comprises in most important classes both quantity and value showing a conservative caution on the part of Canadian dealers which has no doubt contributed much toward lessening the effect so far as Canada is concerned of the world wide depression felt throughout the year. For the second time since Confederation the *total* exports have exceeded the imports—in neither instance however did the *domestic* exports equal the imports.

Owing to the necessity for issuing the report somewhat earlier than usual, figures representing the trade of several countries could not be inserted, reports not having come to hand, while this omission is regrettable it has been unavoidable.

As regards those of Canada, the law provides that the denominations of money in the currency of Canada shall be dollars, cents and mills, the cent being the one-hundredth part of a dollar, and the mill one-tenth part of a cent.

That—The currency of Canada shall be such that the British sovereign (the pound sterling) of legal weight and firmness, shall be equal to four dollars eighty-six cents and two-thirds of a cent.

In like manner the law provides as respects weights, that the unit shall be the standard pound (avoirdupois) of 7,000 grains, one sixteenth part of the standard pound shall be an ounce ($437\frac{1}{2}$ grains) one hundred pounds a cental, and two thousand pounds a ton, and that four hundred and eighty grains shall be an ounce Troy, or 5,760 grains a pound troy.

As regards measures—that the unit or standard measure of capacity, as well for liquids as for dry measures, shall be the gallon containing ten standard pounds weight of distilled water weighed with the water and air at a temperature of sixty-two degrees Fahrenheit, with the barometer at thirty inches, that the quart shall be one-fourth part of the gallon, and the pint one-eighth part of the gallon, and that eight gallons shall be a bushel.

This gallon, commonly known as the "Imperial Gallon," contains 277.274 cubic inches, or 253.036 cylindrical inches.

The standard measure of length is the yard, one-third part of which it is provided shall be a foot, and the twelfth part of such foot shall be an inch.

In many countries the Metric system of weights and measures has been adopted. A separate table of Canadian equivalents of these is given in order to avoid repetition, the word "Metric" being used in the general table in each case where the system is in vogue, as indicating a reference to that table.

The equivalent value of the monetary unit can only be given as respects those countries having a gold standard. Where silver is the standard, the value of the currency necessarily fluctuates correspondingly to the market value of silver bullion, and were any attempt made to quote the value of any such currency it would, under present circumstances, be misleading, therefore, the weight in decimal parts of an ounce with the fineness of the coin is given instead, which will enable any one to approximate the value of the currency according to the current value of fine bar silver. As an example, say fine bar silver at 75 cents an ounce, the Bolivian dollar weighs .801 of an ounce, its fineness is 900, therefore $75 \times .801 = 60.075$ which $\times .900 = 54.0675$, or a small fraction over 54 cents, as the actual intrinsic value of the pure silver contained in the coin, to which should be added a reasonable allowance to cover the value of the alloy, the cost of the coinage, and in some instances Exchange, the aggregate of which would be approximately the current value in Canadian currency of the dollar in question.

Unless carefully noted, the quotations as usually given of the current value per ounce of silver may be misconstrued and lead to misapprehensions, as it is sometimes quoted per ounce *fine*, and sometimes per ounce *standard*; thus, for instance on a certain day the London quotation reads "fine silver per ounce standard 32 d." while on the same day it is quoted in New York " $69\frac{1}{2}$ cents per ounce fine;" as 32 d. is equal to a fraction over $64\frac{1}{8}$ cents, there would appear a difference of about $4\frac{5}{8}$ cents per ounce between the two prices, the New York price appearing that much in excess of the other, were it not noticed that one is based upon *standard* fineness and the other upon absolute fineness, but by reducing the New York "fine" to London "standard" (of .925 fine, or 444 grains fine to the ounce) the actual difference between the two quotations is found to be only about $\frac{5}{8}$ of one cent per ounce, the London price being that much in excess of the New York.

The tael is in reality not a standard of value (there is no such coin), but of weight, and when used in the sense of a value it only represents its weight in gold or silver, as the case may be, the real difficulty is to establish its exact equivalent in grains. Authorities differ greatly, as also does the practice in different sections of China. The Chinese are far from being inexact, and the probability is that there exists a standard, and a further probability that it is equal to 10 Japanese monmes, or 579 72 grains, which figures have been used in computing the value as above. It will be observed, however, that these figures fall short about 3 61 grains from the weight usual (say 1 1/2 oz. per tael) in dealing with the weights other than those of gold and silver.

No. 8.—STATEMENT showing the Transactions under the CHINESE IMMIGRATION ACT to the 30th June, 1895.

The Act went into force as respects arrivals by vessels sailing from ports in North America on the 20th day of August, 1885, and as respects arrivals by other vessels on the 1st day of January, 1886, *vide* 48-49 Victoria, chapter 71.

The Act as it appears in the Revised Statutes, chapter 67 (1886), is slightly changed from the original. There have been since then two amendments thereto, *viz.*, as per 50-51 Victoria, chapter 35 (1887), and 55-56 Victoria, chapter 25 (1892).

The administration of the Act was by Order in Council of 1st September, 1885, assigned to the Department of Customs and transferred to the Department of Trade and Commerce by Order in Council of the 13th of March, 1893.

TREATIES AND CONVENTIONS.

A.—FRENCH TREATY.

The Commercial Treaty negotiated between Great Britain—on behalf of Canada—and France, signed at Paris on the 6th day of February, 1893, having received the sanction of the Parliament of Canada, as per terms of the Act 57-58 Victoria, chapter 2, was ratified on the 4th October, 1895, and the Proclamation, bearing date October 10th, necessary to bring the Treaty into force (as required by Section 4 of the said Act) was published in the *Canada Gazette* of Saturday, October 12th, naming October 14th as the day from and after which the Treaty is to have force and effect.

Appended will be found the text of the Act 57-58 Victoria, chapter 2 above referred to, and of the Act 58-59 Victoria, chapter 3, extending the advantages granted to France by the said Treaty, to Great Britain, to the several British Colonies and possessions, as well as to such Foreign Powers as are under Treaty entitled to like advantages—and of the Proclamation above referred to.

The Foreign Powers entitled to the advantages granted to France are Argentine, Austria-Hungary, Belgium, Bolivia, Chili, Columbia, Costa Rica, Germany (Zollverein), Muscat, Norway and Sweden, Russia, Salvador and Uruguay until the 22nd May, 1896.

In order to correct any misapprehension that might arise with reference to the meaning of the words "Non-sparkling wines gauging 15 degrees by the centesimal alcoholometer or less, or according to the Canadian system of testing containing 26 per cent or less of alcohol"—as they appear in Article 1—it should be observed that the Canadian equivalent of 15 degrees Cent. is 26 per cent of *proof spirits* and not 26 per cent of alcohol—that therefore the word *alcohol* as there used must be read as meaning *proof spirits*.

57-58 VICTORIA, CHAPTER 2.

An Act respecting a certain Treaty between Her Britannic Majesty and the President of the French Republic.

[Assented to 23rd July, 1894.]

Whereas, on the sixth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, an agreement or treaty, for the purpose of facilitating and extending commercial relations between Canada and France, was entered into by plenipotentiaries appointed by Her Majesty and by the President of the French Republic; and whereas by the said treaty it is provided that it shall receive the sanction of the Parliament of Canada before it is ratified; and whereas it is expedient to make provision for that purpose: Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, declares and enacts as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as *The French Treaty Act, 1894*.
2. The treaty of the sixth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, which is set forth in schedule A to this Act, is hereby sanctioned.
3. It is hereby declared that the duties of customs mentioned in article one of the said treaty as existing on the sixth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, on the several articles therein mentioned, were on that date as set forth in schedule B to this Act; and the reduction of the duties then existing as agreed upon in the said article shall take effect immediately upon the coming into force of this Act.
4. This Act shall not have force or effect until a day to be named by proclamation of the Governor General; and if the said treaty ceases to be binding on Canada, this Act shall cease to be of any effect on and after a day to be named by proclamation of the Governor General.

SCHEDULE A.

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the President of the French Republic, being alike desirous of facilitating and extending commercial relations between Canada and France have resolved to conclude an agreement to this end, and have named as their plenipotentiaries, that is to say :—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland : His Excellency the Marquess of Dufferin and Ava, a peer of the United Kingdom, member of the most Honourable Privy Council, Vice-Admiral of Ulster, Warden and Keeper of the Cinque Ports, Constable of the Castle Dover, etc., Her Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Government of the French Republic, and Sir Charles Tupper, Baronet, High Commissioner for Canada in London.

The President of the French Republic : Son Excellence M. Jules Develle, Deputy and Minister for Foreign Affairs, and Son Excellence M. Siegfried, Deputy, Minister for the Department of Commerce, Industry and of the Colonies.

Who after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon the following articles :—

ARTICLE I.

Wines, sparkling and non-sparkling, common soaps, savons de Marseille (Castile soaps) and nuts, almonds, prunes and plums of French origin entering Canada shall enjoy the following advantages :—

1. Non-sparkling wines guaging 15 degrees by the centesimal alcoholometer or less, or according to the Canadian system of testing containg 26 per cent or less of alcohol, and all sparkling wines shall be exempted from the surtaxe or *ad valorem* duty of 30 per cent.

2. The present duty charged on common soaps, savons de Marseille (Castile soaps) shall be reduced by one-half.

3. The present duty charged on nuts, almonds, prunes, and plums shall be reduced by one third.

ARTICLE II.

Any commercial advantage granted by Canada to any third power, especially in tariff matters, shall be enjoyed fully by France, Algeria and the French colonies.

ARTICLE III.

The following articles of Canadian origin imported direct from that country accompanied by certificates of origin shall receive the advantage of the minimum tariff on entering France, Algeria or the French colonies.

Canned meats.

Condensed milk, pure.

Fresh water fish, eels.

Fish preserved in their natural form.

Lobsters and crayfish preserved in their natural form.

Apples and pears, fresh, dried or pressed.

Fruits preserved, others.

Building timber in rough or sawn.

Wood pavement.

Staves.

Wood pulp (cellulose).

Extract of chestnut and other tanning extracts.

Common paper, machine made.

Prepared skins, others, whole.

Boots and shoes.

Furniture in common wood.

Furniture other than chairs, of solid wood, common.

Flooring in pine or soft wood.

Wooden sea-going ships.

It is understood that the advantage of any reduction of duty granted to any other power on any of the articles enumerated above shall be extended fully to Canada.

ARTICLE IV.

The present agreement having received the sanction of the Parliament of Canada and of the French Chambers shall be ratified and the ratification shall be exchanged at Paris as soon as possible. It shall come into operation immediately after this formality has been accomplished, and shall continue in force until the expiration of twelve months after either of the contracting parties shall have given notice of their intention of terminating the same.

It is agreed likewise that if non-sparkling wines gauging fifteen degrees at the most, or sparkling wines, become subject later on to an increase of duty in Canada, the French Government by denouncing the present agreement could terminate its operation immediately without waiting until the expiration of the twelve month's delay provided for above.

In witness whereof, the respective plenipotentiaries have signed the present agreement and affixed thereto the seals of their arms.

SCHEDULE B.

Non-sparkling wines, containing 26 per cent or less of proof spirits, whether imported in wood or in bottles (six quart or twelve pint bottles to be held to contain a gallon), 25 cents per gallon, and for each degree of strength in excess of 26 per cent of spirits as aforesaid, an additional duty of 3 cents per gallon until the strength reaches 40 per cent of proof spirits; and in addition thereto, 30 per cent *ad valorem*.

Sparkling wines, in bottles containing each not more than a quart but more than a pint, \$3.30 per dozen bottles; containing not more than a pint each but more than one-half pint, \$1.65 per dozen bottles; containing one-half pint each or less, 82 cents per dozen bottles; bottles containing more than one quart each shall pay, in addition to \$3.30 per dozen bottles, at the rate of \$1.65 per gallon on the quantity in excess of one quart per bottle, the quarts and pints in each case being old wine measure; in addition to the above specific duty, there shall be an *ad valorem* duty of 30 per cent.

Castile soaps, 2 cents per lb.; nuts, n.e.s., 3 cents per lb.; almonds, shelled, 5 cents per lb.; almonds, not shelled, 3 cents per lb.; prunes, 1 cent per lb.; plums, 30 cents per bushel.

58-59 VICTORIA.—CHAP. 3.

An Act respecting Commercial Treaties affecting Canada.

[Assented to 22nd July, 1895.]

Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

1. So soon as the French Treaty Act, 1894, chapter two of the Statutes of 1894, is brought into force by proclamation of the Governor General, the advantages granted to France by the treaty with that power mentioned in the said Act, with respect to its commerce with Canada, shall extend to any and every other foreign power which by reason of the operation of such treaty is, under the provisions of a treaty with Great Britain, entitled, in whole or in part, to the same or to the like advantages with respect

to its commerce with Canada, to the extent to which in manner aforesaid such other foreign power is entitled thereto; and such advantages shall continue to so extend to such other foreign power so long as the said Act remains in force, or until the right of such other foreign power to such advantages under its treaty with Great Britain is sooner determined.

2. So long as such other foreign power continues to be entitled to such advantages, the operation of all laws inconsistent with its enjoyment of them shall be suspended to the extent to which they are so inconsistent.

3. The advantages so granted to France by the said treaty shall extend also to Great Britain and to the several British colonies and possessions with respect to their commerce with Canada, so long as France continues to be entitled to such advantages; and during the period for which France is so entitled to such advantages, all laws inconsistent with the enjoyment thereof by Great Britain and such British colonies and possession shall be suspended to the extent to which they are so inconsistent.

And whereas it is expedient that the said Act should have force and effect upon, from and after the fourteenth day of October, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five,—

Now know Ye, that We, by and with the advice of our Privy Council for Canada, do by this our proclamation declare that the said Act passed in the 57th and 58th years of our reign, chaptered two, and known as "The French Treaty Act, 1894," shall have force and effect upon, from and after the fourteenth day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

Of all which our loving subjects and all others whom these presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice and to govern themselves accordingly.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent and the Great Seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed. WITNESS The Honourable SIR HENRY STRONG, Knight, Deputy of Our Right Trusty and Right Well-beloved Cousin and Councillor the Right Honourable SIR JOHN CAMPBELL HAMILTON-GORDON, Earl of Aberdeen; Viscount Formantine, Baron Haddo, Methlic, Tarves and Kellie, in the Peerage of Scotland; Viscount Gordon of Aberdeen, County of Aberdeen, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Baronet of Nova Scotia; Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, etc., etc., Governor General of Canada.

A despatch has been received from the Home Government to the effect that the Uruguayan Government have denounced the Treaty of Commerce between that country and Great Britain, signed on the 13th November, 1885, and that that treaty will therefore expire on the 22nd May, 1896.

C.—TERMINATION OF TREATY WITH CHILI.

A despatch has been received from the Home Government to the effect that the Treaty with Chili of the 4th October, 1854, has been denounced and will terminate on the 3rd of September, 1896.

REPORT OF THE HIGH COMMISSIONER TO THE HONOURABLE
THE PREMIER.

SIR,—As you will be aware, it is my practice to prepare each year a report on the various matters that engage my attention on behalf of the different Departments.

A separate report is rendered, relating to the important work of disseminating information about Canada, and of stimulating emigration to the different provinces of the Dominion.

A special and voluminous report is also prepared annually, respecting the trade interchanged between Canada and the United Kingdom.

I need not enter largely into these matters in this communication. A perusal of the reports will show the extent of the work that is performed, and I venture to think they will repay perusal on the part of those who are interested in the encouragement of trade, and in the stimulation of a stream of desirable immigration.

The copying of the Canadian archives, from matter contained in the Public Records and other offices here, is also supervised in my office, and forms the subject of a special report each year.

You will be cognisant of the fact that my staff is a very small one. In addition to the Secretary and the Assistant Secretary there are only four clerks, but considerable clerical assistance is also rendered by the messengers, who are expert type-writers. The voluminous nature of the correspondence, however, frequently necessitates the employment of temporary assistance, as otherwise it would be impossible to deal promptly and satisfactorily with the large correspondence.

Mention has already been made of the emigration branch of the work. The correspondence varies from 5,000 to 10,000 letters per annum, or even more, according to the extent of our advertising, and to other circumstances which need not be mentioned here. In addition many thousands—one might almost say hundreds of thousands—of pamphlets are distributed annually direct from the office. There are also a considerable number of sets of magic lantern slides of Canadian scenery in use, which are employed for the illustration of the many lectures that are delivered on Canada in the course of the year, a large proportion of which are arranged through my department.

The correspondence in the branch of the office which deals with matters relating to trade and commerce is continuous and heavy; and there is also the analysing of the trade returns, and the preparation of information for importers and exporters, and for the periodical reports which are made to the Department.

But these subjects, after all, form only a portion of those dealt with in the office. There is besides the general interchange of correspondence between the Dominion Government and the Imperial Government, which is large and increasing, often necessitating interviews with various departments. There are also frequent discussions and correspondence with the representatives of the other colonies in regard to matters in which we are jointly interested, besides a large general correspondence dealing with inquiries of all kinds.

There is also the correspondence with the different departments, for many of which stores are purchased and money expended for various services—work necessitating a considerable amount of personal supervision and the expenditure of large sums of money, of which returns are rendered periodically for the information of the departments and of the Auditor General. It is more especially the matters referred to in this paragraph dealt with during the last year, that I propose to mention in this report. It will be understood of course that many of the subjects that have been dealt with are more or less of a confidential nature, and can only be very briefly referred to.

Having been appointed Canadian delegate at the International Railway Congress, correspondence took place with the authorities as to the procedure to be followed upon the occasion. I also deemed it desirable to prepare a paper dealing with the development witnessed in Canada as the consequence of railway extension. That paper, a copy of which is annexed, was read to the Congress and printed in its proceedings. I also attended regularly the meetings of the Congress, and took part in the various discussions that were interesting and valuable from a Canadian point of view.

Correspondence has also taken place in relation to the establishment of a steamship line between Belgium, France and Canada. I arranged for the insertion of advertisements calling for tenders for the service, and distributed a number of copies of the terms and conditions upon which the tenders were invited. The tenders were forwarded to Canada direct, and are, I believe, still under consideration. Too much importance cannot be attached to the provision of communication between Canadian ports and France, Belgium and Germany. Such a line is necessary for the stimulation of Canadian trade, and in order to take advantage of the French Treaty and the favourable position the Dominion occupies in other countries, and it is important also in the interests of immigration.

Attention has also been devoted to matters arising out of the Ottawa Conference of 1894, particularly in regard to the Pacific Cable, and to the provision of a fast line of steamers across the Atlantic. Considerable correspondence has taken place with the Government on these subjects. There has also been much personal and written communication between myself and the Agents-General of the other Colonies; and we have also had interviews individually and collectively with the Secretary of State for the Colonies. I need not go into these matters in detail, and it may be sufficient to state the results that have been achieved as the consequence of our efforts to obtain the co-operation of the Imperial Government in carrying out these important works. In the matter of the Fast Atlantic Service, after much discussion and negotiation, it is well known that Her Majesty's Government have agreed to join the Dominion Government in the financial arrangements that are necessary to ensure the early organization of the service. Arrangements are now being made for the invitation of tenders, and I am hopeful that at no distant date, there will be a line of fast steamers passing regularly between Canada and Great Britain, equal to any vessels on the Atlantic. Constructed, as they will be, under the supervision of the Admiralty, and available as armed cruisers, they will form an important factor in increasing Canadian trade, and a source of additional strength to the defences of the Empire.

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In the matter of the Pacific Cable also progress has been made. Her Majesty's Government have taken a lively interest in the matter, recognizing the importance of alternative cable communication between Great Britain and the East by lines that will pass entirely through British territories. By the instructions of the Government, I pressed upon the Secretary of State for the Colonies the desirability of appointing a commission on which both the Imperial Government, the Australasian Governments and Canada should be represented, in order to formulate some scheme by which the proposal could be best carried out to the advantage of everybody concerned. My colonial colleagues and myself subsequently had a meeting with Mr. Chamberlain, who fell in very cordially with the proposal, and expressed the readiness of Her Majesty's Government to appoint a committee of the nature suggested. The matter is now under the consideration of the governments concerned, and I hope before many months are passed, this important proposal will be brought very much nearer completion than it is now. A good deal of information is available, for the consideration of the committee, in the tenders for the laying of the lines by alternative routes which were obtained.

Correspondence also took place, in the course of the year, in regard to the Behring Sea Award and legislation, and I had several interviews with the Colonial Office on the subject.

The details connected with the bringing into operation of the Treaty between France and Great Britain relating to Canadian trade also occupied my attention, and correspondence was interchanged between the Colonial Office, the Government, and myself.

From the time of the abrogation of the McKinley Tariff, up to the early part of last year, Canada enjoyed preferential treatment in the Spanish West Indies, over the United States; but I had to report in March the conclusion of an arrangement by which the last named country received most-favoured-nation treatment, which also gave to the United States the advantages of the lower tariff.

Owing to the disturbances in Cuba, the negotiations for a commercial treaty between Spain and Canada relating to the West Indian trade have not made any progress. It is satisfactory to note, however, that under the agreement at present in force between the two countries, Canada enjoys most-favoured-nation treatment in the Spanish West Indies.

During the visit of the Hon. Mr. Ward, the Treasurer of New Zealand, I had some conversations with him in regard to trade between the two colonies, and in relation to the Pacific Cable and steamship communication. I am glad to say that I was able to induce him to return by way of Canada; and I know from letters subsequently received from him that he much enjoyed his visit, and that he was impressed by the kindness everywhere extended to him. Although the agreement he made with Mr. James Huddart, for the improvement of the Pacific service was not passed by the New Zealand Parliament, or, for the matter of that, the treaty with the Canadian Government, on commercial matters, there is every reason to believe that these questions are simply postponed, and I venture to hope that they may be taken up again at no distant date. A considerable improvement in the commercial and general relations of Canada and the Australasian Colonies must take place as the result of the provision of improved steamship communication, and the laying of a cable across the Pacific.

At your request I brought to the notice of the Colonial Office the Act of the Canadian Parliament, providing for the appointment of a Deputy Speaker of the Senate. In order to remove any doubt upon the subject, it was arranged that a bill should be introduced into the Imperial Parliament confirming the Dominion Act; and as you are aware, this was duly done towards the end of the session.

You will have seen from the correspondence what passed between myself and Mr. Chamberlain, in regard to the important despatches on trade matters, which he has addressed to the governors of the various colonies of the Empire. Several of the suggestions I made were adopted, and I am looking forward with much interest to the information which will be gathered together as the result of those despatches. Mr. Chamberlain is undoubtedly impressed with the necessity of encouraging, in

every possible way, the development of the trade of the empire, and there is no doubt that his endeavours, in that direction, will be as cordially supported in the colonies, as they have been in the mother country. The United Kingdom forms the largest market in the world for many of the commodities which the colonies are able to produce. On the other hand, the colonial markets are not only important now, but have potentialities in the future which Mr. Chamberlain has been quick to grasp. If, therefore, some arrangement can be made by which the colonies may secure a larger share of the trade of the United Kingdom, while the United Kingdom may retain, and even increase, its trade with the colonies, the result must be exceptionally advantageous from an imperial standpoint.

The question of the entry of Newfoundland into the confederation engaged my attention at the time of the negotiations in Ottawa, and I had important communications upon the subject with yourself and with the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

A correspondence took place between myself and the Colonial Office in regard to the trade statistics issued periodically by the Board of Trade. At the present time they give but an imperfect idea of the imports from, and exports to, Canada. This arises from the fact that all Canadian imports by way of the United States are entered in the returns as imports from the United States. On the other hand, exports to Canada via the United States, are treated in the returns as exports to the latter country. I have been trying to get this amended, and have made other suggestions also, by which the utility of the returns would be increased, especially from an imperial point of view. If the trade of the colonies could be summarized in the returns, month by month, or for each quarter, it would form a valuable object-lesson to the people of the United Kingdom, as to the trade of the empire. The matter is now under consideration, and I am informed that some improvements are to be made in the returns.

During the year arrangements were made by me at the request of the Finance Department, for the preparation of bronze and silver coinage to the extent of \$162,000. It was also packed and shipped under my directions.

Statements were obtained each quarter from the Treasury and the Bank of England, as to the investment of the sinking funds of the guaranteed loans, and were promptly transmitted.

Correspondence has also taken place with the Finance Department and with the Bank of Montreal, in regard to the securities deposited with the bank under the Insurance Acts. These securities are in the name of the manager of the bank and of myself, and as they are changed from time to time, it necessitates certain correspondence and interviews.

As usual, all the stores required by the Militia Department from this country were obtained through my office. The requisitions are received and forwarded to the War Office. When the stores are ready, arrangements are made for their shipment, and the various accounts are paid by my department.

The contributions of the Canadian Government towards the expenses of the Esquimaux defences are also made through me.

Many applications for special campaign pensions from old soldiers settled in Canada, have been brought to my notice by the War Office authorities. They have asked me to obtain medical and other information in regard to the applicants, necessitating communication with the Militia Department, and I am glad to think that in many cases it may lead to well-deserved pensions being granted to the brave men who have fought for their country in the past.

The arrangements connected with the appointment of Lieut. Lesslie to the Royal Military College at Kingston also formed the subject of correspondence; and I have also had much pleasure in being of some service to the officers of the permanent forces who came to this country during the past year for courses of instruction. The same remark applies to the mission of Captain Gaudet the superintendent of the cartridge factory at Quebec, who has been spending some time in the United Kingdom.

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At the close of the year, when the mother country seemed to be in a position of some embarrassment, in regard to her relations with foreign powers, I received many applications from young Canadian officers in the imperial forces, who desired to place themselves at the disposal of the Canadian Government, should their services be required, and I had much pleasure in bringing these cases to the notice of the Government.

For the Department of Marine and Fisheries also I made arrangements for the purchase of certain stores. I also procured samples of Tussac seed from the Falkland Islands, for use on Sable Island; and in this connection I wish to express my appreciation of the courtesy which was extended to me by the governor of that colony.

The department was kept duly informed of the proceedings of the committees that have been dealing with the question of the rule of the road at sea, and the screening of the side-lights of ships, &c.

During the year, the crews of one or two Canadian ships that were wrecked came to me for assistance, and I was able to make arrangements for their return to their homes.

I am sorry to state that the number of distressed Canadians who have applied to me for assistance during the year, shows a considerable increase. Many came to this country with the idea of getting work and of improving their position. In nearly every case, they seem to have learnt by experience that they were much better off in Canada than they could ever hope to be here. In other cases men came over with cattle, and instead of accepting a passage back, took a certain sum of money in lieu thereof, and after it was spent, found themselves in difficulties. Others were in distress owing to their having entered into agreements with the steamship companies which they did not understand. In some instances they apparently agreed to come over for a small payment, without a passage back. This they did not appear to understand, and on arrival here their troubles commenced. Some of the distressed Canadians I have been able to help, but considerable discretion has to be exercised. It will readily be understood that such cases might increase to an indefinite extent, if assistance could readily be obtained on application to my office; and it is necessary therefore to exercise considerable care in dealing with them. I have been able to deal with these matters at a very slight expenditure of money, and I am much indebted to the assistance that has been rendered to me in various quarters.

Considerable difficulty has been experienced during the recent season in regard to the men who come over in charge of horses. Formerly the same trouble was experienced in regard to the cattle-men, but that difficulty was got over by a requirement obliging the steamship companies to enter such men on the ship's articles. In that way the ships became responsible for the payment of the men's wages, and for their passages back, instead of the former, and the new arrangement has worked admirably. The trouble with the horse-men is the same that prevailed in regard to the cattle-men before the present arrangements came into force. Many men have been to me this year stating that they were promised a passage back to Canada as a part of their arrangement. In some instances this was confirmed by the foremen themselves, but even then the steamship companies refused passages back on the ground that they had received no advice of such a requirement. In others, on communicating with their agents in Montreal, by telegraph, the reply came that the passage back was not part of the bargain. Considering, however, that the men could always come over in charge of cattle, and be sure of their wages, as well as a passage back, it is not reasonable to suppose that any of them would be prepared to come over with horses on less favourable conditions. Many of the men were French-Canadians, not able to speak English very well; but it is not conceivable that in any case Canadians would come over here at the beginning of the winter season, simply for the few shillings they receive for taking care of horses, and without the assurance of a passage back to Canada again. These complaints necessitated a good deal of correspondence and labour. I am now in communication with the Department of Marine and Fisheries, in order to see whether arrangements

cannot be made by which the evils to which I have referred may be removed another season. The difficulty, I may add, has occurred almost entirely with one line of steamers, which it is not necessary to name in this report.

An interesting trade has been developed in the last year in the shipment of frozen salmon from British Columbia to London. The preliminary experiments were so satisfactory that arrangements were made for the trade to be conducted on a much larger scale. A difficulty arose, however, owing to the Fishmongers' Company having refused, under the powers conferred on them by Act of Parliament, to allow some of the fish to be exposed for sale. The ground of their action was that the fish were not salmon at all but trout. I am glad to be able to report that as the result of my action in the matter, the difficulty has been overcome in a way that is satisfactory to the gentlemen who have identified themselves with the business. Arrangements are being made for the continuance of the trade, and I expect that Canadian frozen salmon will be a familiar feature in the London and provincial markets at times when British salmon is not available.

My communications with the Department of the Secretary of State referred chiefly to the distribution of Canadian official documents on this side, and to the transmission of Imperial official documents for circulation in Canada. Frequent correspondence takes place also relating to the library attached to this office, in order that the newspaper supplies, and the books in the library, may be kept thoroughly up to date. There is correspondence also from time to time, relating to Canadians who have got in distress in foreign countries. Such cases are assisted by the British representatives, and claims for repayment frequently have to be dealt with, the payments invariably being made through this office.

The correspondence with the Department of Trade and Commerce is naturally increasing. As will be gathered from my Trade Report, letters are frequently exchanged between importers and exporters in Canada and my office, in regard to trade. I also prepare periodical reports on matters likely to be of interest to Canadians. The following matters formed the subject of special correspondence with this department during the year:—the application of the *Compagnie Internationale des Huiles minérales*, relating to the importation of Canadian oil into France; offers of services from firms in London in regard to the development of the butter trade; the supply of the statistical year-books to various colonies, and to the consular officers in foreign countries, with the idea of disseminating information relating to trade and commerce; the application of the Netherlands Government through their consular representative in London, urging that coffee from the Dutch colonies sent to Amsterdam and shipped from thence to Canada, might be placed on the free list. The tariff provides that coffee purchased in bond in any country, in which a duty is imposed may be sent free to Canada, if a certificate is given that its quality is such as would ensure its being admitted into the country, in which it is bonded, for consumption purposes. In Holland, however, there is no duty on coffee, and consequently it is not bonded, but the Netherlands Government are prepared to give any certificate the Canadian Government may deem necessary, in order to prevent the possibility of the importation of adulterated coffee into Canada from the Netherlands. Reference has already been made to the steamship service between Canada, France and Belgium, as well as to the commercial treaty with New Zealand, about both of which matters there was correspondence with the Department of Trade and Commerce, as well as with the Premier. I drew the attention of the department to a suggestion of one of my correspondents as to the encouragement of the exportation of green corn cobs. British Consular Reports, the Board of Trade Journal and other publications have been regularly transmitted to the department, as well as the publications issued by the International Customs Bureau. A series of resolutions were adopted by the Bills of Lading Committee of the London Chamber of Commerce, in reference to the improvement of bills of lading, and this I brought to the notice of the department. Proposals relating to the establishment of factories in Canada have from time to time been officially transmitted.

The desirability of Canada being represented officially at the Dairy Show in London each year was brought to the notice of the department. An exhibit of

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butter, cheese and eggs of the finest quality and properly labelled, could not but be advantageous to Canadian interests, while the expense would be small. It would be possible to sell the exhibit at the close of the show, and the opportunity might be afforded of disseminating information, among interested persons, with regard to the various products of the Canadian farms.

An interview appeared in a Scotch paper containing the views of a Scotch distiller on the value of Canadian barley. This I communicated to the department. I also had some correspondence with the Department of Agriculture in reference to the great falling off in the export trade in barley from Canada. A large market exists here for this product, and if the export of a regular quantity, of uniform quality, could be managed, I cannot but think that it would be beneficial to Canadian farmers. Representations were made to me by Messrs. Hiram Walker & Co., in reference to certain difficulties experienced in connection with the importation of Canadian whisky into India, and I am still in communication with the Colonial and India offices on the subject.

My correspondence with the Customs Department has chiefly related to inquiries, with regard to the tariff on certain articles upon which the ordinary public documents did not contain the necessary information. Some cases of dispute between shippers and the department have also been brought to my notice and have formed the subject of correspondence.

For the Post Office Department we pay periodically the moneys that may remain to the credit of European countries, in connection with the interchange of money orders. It entails the obtaining of drafts for the various sums, their transmission to the countries concerned, and the collection and forwarding of the receipts to Canada.

The tenders for the rails required for the Government railways are issued through this office. Arrangements are also made by me for the inspection of the rails when completed, and for their shipment to Canada, and the accounts are paid and dealt with through this office.

We also purchase military and other stores for the North-west Mounted Police. The force seems to be a very popular one in England, judging from the number of applications that are received from young men who desire to join it. Owing, however, to the reduction of the force, we have not been able to hold out any encouragement to them.

I have had correspondence with the Department of Justice with regard to the organization of some better arrangements for informing the Supreme Court of the decisions of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, and the matter is still under correspondence. The judgments in Canadian cases are obtained from the Privy Council Office, and regularly transmitted. There has also been some correspondence relating to general legal matters with this department. I have also had some correspondence with the institutions in Canada, and with the committee here, appointed to deal with the matter, relating to the distribution of the Challenger reports, and arrangements have been made for a further number of this most valuable work to be sent to the different provinces of Canada.

During the year I attended many public gatherings at which an opportunity occurred of speaking on some Canadian subjects. I also delivered a special address at the meeting of the Tyneside Geographical Society on Canada, on November 21st; and addressed a meeting of the Newcastle Chamber of Commerce on the following day. Newspaper cuttings referring to these gatherings are inclosed.

It will readily be understood that in this report I have only dealt with the more important of the subjects that have engaged my attention during the year. It will serve, however, to give an idea of our work, when I state that the number of letters written to the Imperial Government and to the various departments of the Canadian Government, in the year just past, was about 1,100. In the general correspondence branch, about 3,200 letters were written. In the emigration branch nearly 4,000 letters were sent out, in addition to the large number of circulars used in connection with the more general inquiries, and to the many thousands of pamphlets distributed through the post. Nearly 1,500 letters were despatched by the accountant's

branch, and the total amount of the accounts for the various departments in the calendar year reached a total of nearly £62,000, or about \$300,000. In connection with the accounts, no less than 300 foolscap folios of detailed statements of expenditure, with vouchers in duplicate and triplicate, were rendered to the various departments during the year.

In addition to the correspondence, reference may also be made to the numerous personal applications that are daily received concerning inquiries on emigration and general subjects in connection with the library, which is becoming utilized to a greater extent every year by commercial men and by the press.

During the past year I have had the library belonging to this office, consisting of 2,800 volumes, thoroughly overhauled and recatalogued, and it is now a very good library of its kind for reference purposes. As already mentioned, it is largely used by commercial men and by the press, as well as by the legal profession. In the course of a few mails, I hope to be able to send out a copy of the catalogue, so that it may be placed on record at Ottawa. In addition to the printed books, there is probably an equal number of pamphlets, &c., on every possible subject connected with Canada. In the reading-room there are filed regularly thirty daily papers, from the principal centres in the different provinces, and twenty-four Canadian magazines and class and trade papers.

The facilities afforded by the office are also utilized to an increasing extent by Canadians who are travelling in this country on business or on pleasure. Many of our visitors have their letters addressed here. Those that are not called for are re-addressed and sent to any addresses that may have been registered. We are also appealed to by travelling Canadians for advice and assistance in various matters. In the summer season a considerable time is occupied in procuring tickets of admission to various places of interest for Canadians and their families, and in providing passports for those who may be going to the continent.

In concluding this report, I desire to place on record my appreciation of the courtesy and consideration I have received from the Colonial Office on the occasions of my personal interviews, and in regard to the increasing correspondence which takes place, not only from the Marquess of Ripon, and from his successor, Mr. Chamberlain, but from the permanent secretary, Sir Robert Meade, and the other gentlemen who are associated with him in that department. The same remark applies to the other departments of the Imperial Government with which I am brought into communication.

I have also to express my appreciation of the services that have been rendered to me by my staff, to whose cordial co-operation I am much indebted.

NEWCASTLE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

ADDRESS BY SIR CHARLES TUPPER.

ENGLAND'S COMMERCIAL RELATIONS WITH THE COLONIES.

The Hon. Sir Charles Tupper, Bart., G.C.M.G., &c., High Commissioner of Canada, who on the previous night lectured to the members of the Tyneside Geographical Society on "Canada," yesterday addressed the members of the Newcastle Chamber of Commerce in the Merchants' Court, at the Guildhall, on "England's commercial relations with Canada, the Colonies, and India." There was a large attendance of Quayside merchants, Sir C. M. Palmer, Bart., M.P., president of the Chamber, being in the Chair.

The Chairman welcomed Sir Charles, and spoke of the high honour he had conferred upon them by this visit. He need not say that in the history of the Dominion of Canada the record would show that Sir Charles Tupper was one of the most eminent statesmen and benefactors of that great country. (Hear, hear.) This Chamber had always taken a special interest in Canadian affairs. It might be that many men were not entirely agreed or in accord with the commercial operations of Canada, but he wished to remind them that that country was especially placed under circumstances which were different from those of all our other colonies. It had a long and important frontier bordering on a country that lives and prospers, he might say, under high protection, and drawing therefore from Canada by the temptation of higher wages the working classes. Canada must therefore pursue a policy in its own interest, of which they ought not to complain. The question of our colonies was at the present time engaging the public mind of this country to a very large extent. They saw that other countries were protecting their commerce and industries by import duties. The greatness of this great empire was derived from its great dependencies, such as Canada, India, Australia, and elsewhere, and there the question as to how they could meet protective duties levied by other countries was occupying the public mind at the present time. It appeared to him—and eminent statesmen held the same view—that the only true course to be pursued with regard to the colonies was to bring about a broad imperial federation. Canada would be one to be brought into that federation, and there was no doubt that this country would greatly benefit by such a system of bringing our colonial possessions more in harmony and more in keeping, if it could possibly be, with the mother country. There was a latent affection on the part of the colonies for the mother country, and it only required to be fostered. They should be thankful that they had so enlightened a statesman representing in this country the Dominion of Canada as Sir Charles Tupper. (Applause.)

Sir Charles Tupper, who was cordially received, said he would like to make a few observations to them in reference to a question which he regarded as closely interwoven with the best interests of the empire whether at home or in any of the outlying possessions. At the meeting on the previous night he was greatly impressed with the statement of Sir Edward Grey, and the rather strong response which his remark elicited from a person present, that the colonies imposed high duties against the mother country. (Hear, hear.) He (the speaker) had thought it not inadvisable that he should avail himself of that opportunity to address one of the foremost Chambers of Commerce in the United Kingdom with regard to the position which Canada occupied with reference to that fiscal policy, and he hoped to be able to remove some misapprehension from the minds of the people of this country with regard to that matter by a brief statement of the position that Canada occupied in that regard. The Chairman had already drawn their attention to the fact that the position of Canada was somewhat unique in that respect. There were in the Dominion of Canada five millions of people bordered by an invisible line which separated

them from the great republic of not less than 62½ millions of people. (Hear, hear.) They would at once see that the circumstances placed them (Canada) in relation to their fiscal policy in a somewhat different position from what they would have occupied if they were not so situated. He would not presume to address them or to instruct them on the abstract questions of protection and free trade; but he held the opinion, and he would venture frankly to state it to them, that great errors were held on that subject on both sides of the question. He believed with regard to the fiscal policy of a country that what would be good at one time might not be an advantageous policy at another time. He believed that they must carefully and judiciously adapt their fiscal policy to the existing condition of things that they found around them at the time, and while he did not venture to offer remarks upon the differences of opinion existing with regard to protection and free trade, he hoped to be able to show that the policy which Canada had adopted to give incidental protection to the industries for which this country is adapted was not an anti-British policy. (Hear, hear.) He hoped to be able to show them by evidence of a conclusive character that the policy that now prevailed in Canada—and had prevailed since 1878—the policy of incidental protection had been not a matter of choice but a matter of absolute necessity, which had been forced upon Canada by the condition in which she found herself, and that there was no feature which presented itself more strongly to the minds of Canadian public men than the necessity of changing the comparatively free trade policy which had existed up to 1878, in order to preserve their connection with Great Britain, and to promote alike the interests of Canada and the United Kingdom. Canada was prosperous from the date of the union of the colonies under one great Dominion down to 1873, but they must not forget that the industries of Canada enjoyed at that time the most unusual protection in consequence of the condition of things existing in the United States of America. They were engaged in a great internecine war which disorganized the industrial affairs of the Republic, and consequently promoted to a very great extent the progress and prosperity of Canada. But when that was removed, and when the war was at an end, and the United States had adopted a strong protective policy as a means of providing themselves with money to discharge the enormous debt that had been placed upon the shoulders of the people in connection with that great struggle, everything entirely altered, and they found that the five years which followed were for Canada five years of disaster, retrogression, and five years in which the progress of the country was completely paralysed. The public men of Canada saw that it was absolutely necessary in the interests of the mother country and Canada alike to adopt some means of preventing Boston and New York from becoming permanently the commercial capitals of Canada. In these circumstances the policy of incidental protection was introduced, and they adopted the policy which was called the National Policy. No person had, perhaps, more to do with the introduction of that policy than himself. At that time it was his duty to deal to a large extent with the financial criticism of the government of the day, and in discharging that duty from the opposition side of the House he endeavoured to point out to the government, to whom they were opposed, and to the people of Canada, the absolute necessity for the reasons which he had mentioned, of making a radical change in the fiscal policy of the country. He would give them a brief illustration of the condition of Canada as it was under the free trade policy and as it was under the policy of incidental protection, which was introduced. For the purposes of contrast he would take the most serious depression that existed in Canada, the five years from 1889 to 1894. It was scarcely necessary for him to say that that was a period during which the great American Republic, their neighbours, underwent the most serious financial crisis that perhaps was ever known. From 1874 to 1879, the exports of Canada fell 18,000,000 dollars; from 1889 to 1894, under the present fiscal policy, and notwithstanding the depression, the exports rose \$28,000,000. (Applause). The imports of the former period fell \$46,000,000, and the imports in the latter period rose \$3,500,000. In the former period the duty collected decreased \$1,500,000, and the increased duty collected in the latter period was \$4,400,000. The tax increased by the tariff in the former period was \$1,500,000, and the tax decreased in the

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latter period was \$6,000,000. The percentage of duty increased 4 per cent in the former period, and decreased in the latter period 4·5 per cent. The debt of Canada was increased during the former period \$40,000,000; in the latter five years it increased, despite the depression, by only \$8,650,000. The net interest on the debt, which increased \$1,500,000 during the former period, increased \$100,000 in the latter period. The credit of the country, taking the loan negotiated in the country at that period, came to 44·75 per cent, as contrasted with the credit of the country in the latter period in which the loan was floated on terms that came to 3·16 per cent. The net deficits in the former period rolled up to \$5,500,000, while in the latter period the net surplus was \$7,500,000. (Applause.) The remission of taxation during the former five years was nil; during the latter five years, and under the present fiscal policy, no less than \$18,000,000 had been taken off the shoulders of the people. The savings of the people as announced by the deposits in the banks decreased in the former period $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent, and increased during the latter period 40 per cent. (Applause.) He thought he had said enough to show that the difference between the condition of Canada under what was called the free trade policy and under the policy of incidental protection was such as was certainly calculated not to lead those who promoted the change to the conclusion that they had made any mistake in the interests of Canada. (Applause.) He wished it to be understood that when they sat down to construct that incidental protection they were debarred from giving any preference to the mother country, not by their own wishes or desires, but by the policy of the mother country, because they knew that in the treaties that had been made by the mother country with Belgium and Germany, it was impossible to give any direct advantage to the trade of the mother country. They had, however, endeavoured to frame their tariff as far as possible to increase the trade between the mother country and Canada, and he was able to stand there on that occasion and say that the closest examination of the condition of the country from 1878 down to the present time, showed that the policy of incidental protection introduced by Canada was a matter of necessity, of self-preservation, and that it had resulted in increasing the trade of this country instead of decreasing it, and that the trade was vastly greater to-day than it would have been if that policy of incidental protection had not been resorted to. The speaker then quoted figures dealing with the exports from England to Canada in support of his last contention. In 1879 the imports to Canada had fallen to \$30,943,000; in 1894 they had increased to \$38,711,000 under the national policy. Generally speaking it might be said that the imports from Great Britain had increased since the higher duties had been enforced, or at any rate had maintained their volume notwithstanding the great development of similar industries in the Dominion. He then went on to argue that the great bulk of the trade between Canada and the United States which had been complained of was trade in which the mother country was not interested, and therefore there was no competition in that respect with the mother country. At the same time he quoted figures to show that in the matter of staple manufactures, such as woollen and cotton goods, the exports to Canada had increased. He then went on to speak of what the Dominion had been able to do since the introduction of the present fiscal policy, and he referred especially to the adding of 10,000 miles of railway, for the construction of which, 1,368,617 tons of rails were purchased from the mother country and admitted to Canada free of duty. (Applause.) In this connection he spoke with great emphasis on the importance of the construction of the great Canadian Pacific Railway without a farthing of cost to the mother country. (Applause.) He went on to speak further of the advantage to be derived from the Canadian Pacific Railway, and said it was absolutely necessary in the interest of Canada that a railway should be erected from the Atlantic to the Pacific shore. In that they had furnished a great highway 4,800 miles long without calling on the mother country for a single dollar. That was the most gigantic undertaking ever carried out by any country in the world possessing only five millions of inhabitants. By this they had bound all the Dominion together, and they had also provided a great line which the military authorities could use in case of war—which God forbid should be necessary—to transport troops right across Canada, and place them rapidly within striking distance of India, thus rendering unnecessary the passage through Suez Canal,

which they all knew was a very insecure means of transport for this country. In addition to this advantage he might mention that this important highway had opened up the great granary of the country—Manitoba. Although only the fringe of this country had been touched, so far they had been able to produce as much grain as the whole of the United Kingdom this year. It was well known that the mother country could only raise one-sixth of what was required for the needs of the population, and it must be a source of satisfaction to feel that one of the colonies lying within five days' journey from this country was able to supply all that was required. He might mention that in 1892 the Canadian Parliament passed a resolution to the effect that, if the Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland would consent to admit Canadian produce into the United Kingdom on more favourable terms than it allows to the products of foreign countries, then the Parliament of Canada would be prepared to grant corresponding advantages by a substantial reduction in the duties imposed on British goods. (Applause.) That was done as much in the interest of England as of Canada, and its object was to make this great country stronger still. The policy was followed up, and last year a great conference was held at which Australasia, New Zealand, and South Africa were all represented. That was regarded as a very important conference. It attracted the attention of British statesmen, and was mentioned in the address from the throne. At that gathering a resolution was passed in favour of provision being made by the Imperial legislature enabling the dependencies of the empire to enter into agreements of reciprocity and the making of preferential tariffs with Great Britain, or with one another. He thought that that was a proposal that would commend itself to a great many people in this country. (Hear, hear.) The fact remained that England was the only country in the world that treats her colonies as foreigners. No one appreciated more than he did what she had done for her colonies. After arguing that what tended to increase the mutual interest and advantage of England and her outlying dependencies must also tend to strengthen this great empire, he said that under these circumstances he felt that the time had come when attention might be fairly drawn to a question of this kind, and that these great dependencies might ask the mother country:—"Can you not put us in the position of children, members of the same family, instead of keeping us in the position of foreigners?" (Applause.) Since 1890 the trade of this country had fallen off by £17,706,000. If, therefore, there be any means by which that trade could be revived and re-invigorated it certainly was worthy of the careful attention and consideration of men responsible for the destinies of this great empire. (Hear, hear.) Evidence of the advantages of drawing the outlying portions of the empire into closer relation with the mother country herself was established by the trade return of this country. Sir Charles went on to refer to the German and Belgian treaties which were said to stand in the way. Lord Ripon, before leaving office, made as very elaborate reply to the proposals forwarded from the Ottawa Conference in regard to trade, and his answer might be summed up in the words, "We can't do it." He questioned the figures that Lord Ripon gave in the course of that reply, and argued that in developing the colonies they would secure more trade, and had more interest than they had with regard to Belgium or Germany. In the colonies they had a place that was continually increasing, jumping up by leaps and bounds, while in Belgium and Germany, from 1870 to 1891, there had practically been no increase in the trade. It was said that such a scheme as he had indicated would restrict trade. He did not think they had found much friendship on the part of foreign countries in trade matters, and referred to the McKinley tariff as an instance. They had got an empire that produced in one part or another everything that man requires, and all it needed was developing. He believed that the time was advancing when not only the public men but the artisans were coming to the conclusion that they had not fair play at the hands of foreign countries. In conclusion, he wished to return thanks, in the name of the people of Canada, to the members of the Newcastle Chamber of Commerce for the valuable assistance they had rendered.

On the motion of Mr. W. S. Dalglish, seconded by Mr. Geo. Renwick, a hearty vote of thanks was passed to Sir Charles Tupper for his presence and address. The chairman was also thanked on the invitation of Mr. W. D. Cruddas, M.P., and the meeting separated.

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REPORT OF THE HIGH COMMISSIONER.

SIR,—I have the honour to transmit herewith the reports relating to the interchange of trade between Canada and the United Kingdom for the year 1895. The inquiries received upon commercial subjects are continually on the increase. Not only does this apply to the United Kingdom, from all parts of which such inquiries are constantly received, but from Canada correspondence of the kind is largely on the increase. I venture to think that I have been able to obtain for many of my correspondents much useful information; and if the facilities possessed by the department are availed of to an even larger extent in the future, it will be a matter of gratification to me.

As you are aware, the staff under my directions is comparatively limited—there being only four clerks, in addition to the secretary and assistant secretary. On the other hand, the duties are onerous and the correspondence exceptionally heavy. Among the subjects dealt with are matters under correspondence between the Imperial and the Canadian governments, the transaction of business in London for the various departments, the Secretary of State, the Finance Department, the Trade and Commerce Department, the Railways and Canals Department, the Post Office Department, the Justice Department, and others. Besides there is the supervision, to a certain extent, of the financial business of the Dominion in London, the general correspondence, and the large emigration correspondence, as well as other matters that need not be discussed in this report. In consequence what may be called the commercial branch of the office work has not been taken up on so large a scale as I think is desirable, although I am sure it would be profitable to the Dominion. I have, however, under consideration a scheme by which it will be possible to bestow even more attention to the import and export trade than has hitherto been done, dealing not only with the distributing centres like London, Liverpool, Bristol and Glasgow, but with the trade in the large cities and towns in the interior.

I propose to follow the course adopted in previous years, and to give extracts from the British Board of Trade returns, so far as they chiefly affect Canada, with a few remarks about the different branches of the commerce of Canada, based upon the correspondence that has reached me.

WHEAT.

It will be seen that the importation of wheat in 1895, was largely in excess of that for 1894, the value of the imports being £22,526,171, as against £18,760,505. There was a considerable increase in the importation from Russia, from the United States, and the British East Indies; a slight falling off is shown in the imports from the Argentine Republic, while the quantity brought from Australia remained about the same as in the preceding year. It is a matter for regret that the statistics, so

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far as regards Canada, should be so unfavourable. The exports of grain to the United Kingdom which in 1893 were £1,023,905, fell in 1894 to £773,952, and last year to £556,920.

The industry of wheat-growing in the United Kingdom certainly seems to be in a bad way. In 1870 the acreage under wheat was 3,500,503 acres. In 1895 it had fallen to 1,417,641 acres, a decrease of over 2,000,000 acres. In order to emphasize this point, it may be mentioned that while in 1842, before the repeal of the Corn Laws, the production of wheat reached 22,000,000 qrs., in 1895 the yield was only 4,700,000 qrs. So far as can be gathered from the available returns, there does not seem to be any great improvement in the agricultural industry in other directions. It is true that in the last twenty-five years permanent pasture has increased from 12,072,856 acres to 16,610,563 acres, but on the other hand, the number of cattle in the United Kingdom has increased by less than a million, while in the case of cows alone, the increase is only a little over 300,000. Sheep actually decreased from 28,297,589 to 25,792,195. Pigs increased from 2,171,138 to 2,884,431.

During the last year prices were very low indeed, largely the consequence of the immense quantities of Russian wheat thrown upon the market at very low prices. Writing of the future of the Russian wheat trade, Her Majesty's Ambassador at St. Petersburg states under date of March 12th, 1895:—"We are now in a position to approach the question of what competition the British farmers must reckon with in the future from Russian wheat. Low prices notwithstanding Russia's wheat-growing area, and wheat crop, have, during the last few years alike been on the increase, and her wheat exports show a tendency in the same direction. The inference is that if prices fall no lower the production and export will tend to increase further. There is abundant room for an increase in two distinct directions. Agricultural methods may be much improved and fresh areas of fertile soil may be brought under the plough." This statement is an important one when it is remembered that the expression "if prices fall no lower" was written when good Russian wheat was selling off the British coasts at 20 per quarter.

Unless something, therefore, is done to improve the condition of the agricultural industry in this country, it is certain that wheat-growing, at any rate, will become one of the things of the past, except in specially favoured districts; and that the United Kingdom will have to rely more than ever upon outside sources for its chief item of food supply.

Some valuable information has recently been forthcoming with regard to the corn crop of 1895, and I do not think I can do better than ask you to reprint the article upon the subject from the *Mark Lane Express* of the 20th inst. It gives information as to crops in the United Kingdom which it will be observed have fallen nearly 50 per cent in the last five years, the yield in 1890 having been 9,390,000 qrs., and in 1895 4,790,000 qrs. On the other hand it will be noticed that in France, Germany and Holland, there is a tendency to maintain a regular quantity, while in Russia, the yield has increased from 34,350,000 in 1890 to 52,000,000 qrs. in 1895. The Indian crop is said to show a deficit, and the harvest in the Argentine Republic is expected to be about the same as the previous year.

The following is the article in question:—

THE GRAIN CROPS OF 1895.

The area of corn land which the international character of the grain trade brings into consideration is so enormous, and the climates of the different countries are so diverse, that something like an average seems, year after year, to be struck. There is, however, no ascertained scientific reason why this should be so, and we must, therefore, be prepared at any time for a year when a large net deficiency or surplus should be presented. In 1895 this has actually been the case with respect to the fourth cereal, maize, which has yielded over average returns per acre in almost all the countries where it is systematically cultivated.

With respect to wheat, the yield in the United Kingdom was admittedly very deficient, a brilliant summer failing to compensate us for a trying winter, and a rain-

less spring. The Government estimate published in December has been generally accepted by the trade, and the United Kingdom wheat crops of the nineties are accordingly reckoned as follows:

The French wheat crop was at first regarded as somewhat seriously under an average, and the *Echo Agricole*, from whose well-considered estimates it is always risky to differ, put the total at 37,250,000 qrs. only. On the other hand, the two "Baltic" lists, which have certainly no penchant for inflated estimates assume the yield at 41,100,000 qrs. and at 42,000,000 qrs. respectively. The French Government have not issued any definite report. Under these circumstances it is difficult to advise our readers, but *Dornbusch*, though no longer owned by a Frenchman, is noted for its exclusive advices of French affairs. We accordingly give a preference to its estimates in this case:—

Germany is not a great wheat-producing region, its population being nourished more largely on rye and potatoes than on the more favoured "white bread" of England and France. There is, however, a demand sufficient to lead to thirteen millions being grown in an average year, such as 1895 appears to have been. The German wheat crops of the last six years have been:—

Austria-Hungary contains a large area of singularly fertile wheat land, but the consumption of wheat per head of population, though in advance of that of Germany, is less than in either the United Kingdom or France. It is probable that 22,000,000 qrs. meets the home requirements, and that anything over this admits of exportation. Switzerland is a constant buyer, for this mountainous country grows about half a million qrs. only, while consuming $2\frac{1}{2}$ millions. Austria-Hungary in 1895 had a very satisfactory wheat crop, the average yield being put at $23\frac{1}{2}$ millions by most authorities, and the Vienna Congress reckoning the recent yield at 25,700,000 qrs. We are not inclined to entirely accept the figures of the Vienna gathering, but the advices which we received last autumn from trustworthy sources enabled us

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to estimate the crop at 24,460,000 qrs., which is above an average, though not so remarkably so as in the Vienna estimate. We put the Austro-Hungarian wheat yields at the following figures:—

The wheat harvest of Russia is of enormous importance to the corn trade, but owing to the vast area under cultivation, a full return is most difficult to procure. Opinion has recently favoured the idea that the 1895 crop was less than an average, but the analogy of Roumania would point to an over-average crop in the south-west, while the Caucasus is credited with a full crop by local correspondents. A very pessimistic preliminary estimate has been issued by the Government, but it should be borne in mind that Russian authorities hardly seem to make their first estimate even superficially inclusive. Thus, in 1893 the preliminary estimate was 51,000,000 qrs., and the definitive return 56,450,000 qrs. We give the following figures on our own responsibility, believing that they will not be found much out when definitive returns are to hand:—

Roumania in 1895 is credited with 8,300,000 qrs. of wheat.

The Indian wheat crop of 1895 was gravely deficient, and as the growing wheat to be reaped in April next is of even poorer promise than last year, no plethora of Indian wheat is to be feared on British Exchanges for many months to come.

The two great producing regions of America remain to be considered. The United States possess some very remarkable statisticians, and the estimates which appear in that go-ahead country are not believed to have that absolute independence of corn market enterprise which marks the English and French returns.

The American Government's corn estimates, varied by 6,100,000 qrs. in 1894, and in 1895 they varied by 8,400,000 qrs. These colossal differences have led us to make our own calculations on the returns of the separate States, estimates which are rendered the safer by comparison with the opinions of the American press. The American wheat crops since 1890 include the great yield of 1891, which our

own advices put at over seven millions more than in any other year, but which some other authorities assumed at what we believe to have been impossible figures.

Argentina is now reaping a new wheat crop, so that returns for 1895 are of the yield in January last. The yield in January, 1894, was probably twelve millions; in January, 1895, ten millions; while the crop now reaping may be assumed at as nearly as may be half-way between these figures. There will, we believe, be quite 11,000,000 qrs. reaped, but a wet and late harvest will postpone shipments by nearer two months than one.

The following letters have reached me:—

From Messrs. Bruce, Boyd & Co., of Leith:—"Your 'circular' came duly to hand, and we have little to say in reply. Grain shipments from Canada to here this season have been quite insignificant, supplies of wheat being drawn more from New York than Montreal. We don't know of any particular reason why this should have been the case, excepting that transit facilities are greater in the one port than in the other for this market. The quality of the wheat shipped from Montreal this season has been very satisfactory and as the spring wheat crop, in the different provinces of Canada has turned out so large, we quite expect to see a much bigger business ensue after the re-opening of navigation."

From Messrs. Robert Procter and Sons, of Liverpool:—"We are in receipt of yours asking for a report of Canadian produce. We have handled a fair quantity of wheat during the past 12 months shipped from and through the Dominion, both of the 1894 crop and the 1895 crop. With regard to the former it was mostly the highest grade, No. 1 Hard Manitoba, which proved very satisfactory to our millers, many of them preferring it to the No. 1 Hard Duluth, which has hitherto held the pre-eminence.

"This year the wheats all show a decidedly larger sprinkling of soft wheat, which is of course a great drawback to any spring wheats which are used here by our millers for their strength, and there are also signs of frosted grains even in the highest grades, which would seem to indicate that the weather through which the crop has had to pass in its growth must have been of a severe character.

"There has been a good demand for frosted grades which we think is likely to continue owing to the scarcity of Indian wheats.

"We fear that we have no suggestions to offer on the point of increasing the demand for Canadian produce. It is always pretty sure of a good consumption here.

"Over the climatic causes which contribute so largely in deteriorating some years' crops, no one of course can have any control. It must be most satisfactory to the Canadian Government to have had such large yields of wheat this year."

From Messrs. Crichton & Co., of Glasgow:—"We are in receipt of your inquiry regarding Canadian grain handled by us during the past year. The principal article has again been wheat. The 1894 crop was of fine quality, the 1895 crop, which has been slower to move this year than formerly, is more varied in quality, and the arrivals so far have been mostly of the medium grades.

"Manitoba wheats continue to maintain a ready sale in this market."

Messrs. Marriage & Son, of Colchester, write:—"In reply to your favour I beg to inform you that we have during the past year imported a considerable quantity

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of wheat from Manitoba. The quality of the 1894 crop was exceedingly good and superior to the hard wheat from the United States side of the border. The wheat of this year's crop (1895 lowest) does not seem to be of equal quality to the previous year's wheat being deficient in gluten and there are many frosted grains. I have no suggestions to offer in reply to your inquiry. The wheat from the North-west of America I consider the best in the world, and it will find its way in this country amongst millers whose trade requires a high quality and where they can afford the correspondingly higher price.

FLOUR.

It is gratifying to notice that while the importation of Canadian wheat has fallen off considerably, the flour from Canada is more than double that of the previous year. At the same time, we only send flour to the value of £1,003,779, out of a total of £1,679,017, of which the United States supplies £5,384,658. A proportion of the imports from Canada, although shipped from Montreal, no doubt really belong to the United States. There is a considerable decrease in the flour coming from the United States and the importation from Austria remains about stationary. The great feature of the year, however, has been the increasing importation from France. A larger trade would no doubt be done in Canadian flour but for the fact that the prices asked are higher than those at which the United States article is offered. This has prevented many of the houses who are disposed to favour Canadian flour from taking part in the trade.

The following are extracts from some of my correspondents' letters:

From Messrs. Rolands and Phillips, of 37 Mark Lane, London:—"In reply to your inquiry respecting Canadian flour, the only observations likely to interest you are the facts that the flour is in excellent repute here for high class goods, and certainly the mills of the Dominion know how to manufacture flour that will compare favourably with any other. The Canadian trade, however, is in a restricted circle as far as flour is concerned, and the bulk of any trade in London is done by two mills. The Dominion hardly seems prepared for the export business, as we think is evidenced by our friend Mr. W. W. Ogilvie, of Montreal, (the largest flour man in British North America) being able to sell all his products at home at prices which prohibit us importing them."

From Messrs. Hamilton & Sons, 25 Robertson Street, Glasgow:—"Regarding flour, we have not been able to import any Canadian flour during the last twelve months. From all accounts, the Canadian millers who export flour usually from the eastern seaboard have had a very good home trade during the past six months, and they report that they have been grinding their full capacity and have nothing left for export; the consequence is that no flour of any importance has been received here from the last crop of wheat. No doubt this is much better for the Canadian millers, as the prices they seem to get at home are very much more profitable to them than if they were to ship to this market."

From Messrs. Kruger, Darsie & Co., of 18 Brunswick Street, Liverpool:—"Answering your circular letter, we beg to inform you that we have ourselves handled no Canadian flour whatever during the past twelve months; neither have we heard of any of our neighbours having done so to any extent during the same period. We may remark that the bill of entry shows a certain quantity of flour imported from Canada into this port, but we know that by far the greatest bulk of this—if not the whole of it—is flour from the Northwestern States of the United States of America, mainly from the states of Minnesota and Dakota, and shipped during the summer on through bills of lading via Montreal to Liverpool."

"As far as regards Canadian flour from the older provinces, mainly Ontario, business in these—which are mostly winter wheat flours—has been practically impossible during the whole period, on account of the prices remaining steadily above those of similar grades of flour produced in the United States.

“Respecting spring wheat flour from Manitoba, we believe a limited business is done in this, and more business might be done were the milling capacity in that province more developed than it is at present. As it is, the export from Manitoba is mainly in the shape of wheat, in contradistinction to that from the North-western States of America, in which the export is mainly in the shape of flour. It is, however, generally understood that those mills in exporting their flour do not look so much to making profits as to disposing of their surplus production of flour.

“As far as present appearances go, there is now less chance than ever for a revival in the winter wheat flour business with the Dominion, at least before another crop is harvested, as similar flours are at present produced by our English mills at much lower prices, say by 2s. to 2s. 6d. on 280 lbs. cheaper than by Canadian mills.”

Messrs. Mowat Brothers of Glasgow:—‘In reply to your favour of January, we have done so little with Canada, that we are unable to offer any suggestion.

“We can usually buy cheaper from the States, both of spring and winter wheat, and naturally go there for supplies. We presume the lakes give the States an advantage over Canada in carriage.”

From Messrs. Kosmack & Co., of Glasgow:—“In reply to your inquiry with regard to Canadian flour and oatmeal, we beg to say that we have done nothing in Canadian flour this season owing to it being considerably dearer in price than United States flour, and also French flour, the latter of which is greatly taking the place of Canadian flour. We do nothing in oatmeal.”

The following articles from the Mark Lane *Express* of January 6th, may be of interest to Canadian farmers and shippers, as giving the history of the grain trade in the United Kingdom during the last year:—

“THE CORN TRADE IN 1895.

“The history of business in wheat during the past year divides itself with some distinctions into three chapters. The first relates to January, February and March, the second to April, May and June, while the last six months of the year present a general similarity enabling us to discuss them as a whole. The first period was one of arctic severity in the weather, and of considerable retail needs, yet value, which started at 20s. 6d., a very low price, did not mend by a single penny. There was, indeed, a short spell of extreme depression, when under 20s. was accepted. The reason for these singularly disappointing episodes at the beginning of the year was to be found in the large purchases of the new Argentine crop, and in the continuance of Russian shipments all through the winter. As Argentina had been credited with two million quarters less wheat for 1895 than for 1894, the effect of slightly increased shipments was disastrous. It may here be mentioned that La Plata actually did have two millions less than 1894, but elected to ship practically all her surplus in the first seven months of the year. This threw the whole burden on the first half of 1895, but, of course, afforded a commensurate relief to the last months of the year. It has had some considerable share in bringing about the year’s closing quotation, which is 4s. 6d. higher than opening value.

“The second period was one of brisk recovery, and prices, which at the end of March were as low as 20s. 6d., had reached 25s. 8d. by June. Much has been written about this ‘speculative wave,’ and we have seen practical corn merchants gravely lectured by elderly professors on the sins of gambling. As a plain matter of fact the 5s. 2d. improvement in question was amply justified on entirely agricultural and non-speculative grounds by the gravely under average promise of the growing crops of winter wheat in the United Kingdom and the United States, in Russia, and in Italy, and by the very poor out-turn of the new crop in India. Subsequent events modified the outlook in America and Russia, where large areas of spring wheat are sown, and where the latter crop proved as favourable as the former turned out to be deficient. But the British and Italian farmers, who have to depend entirely on

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winter wheat, reaped in July and August quite as small crops as were predicted in May, and the American and Russian deficiencies in winter wheat were by no means wiped out by the good yield of spring-sown corn. The fine summer made the crops of France, Germany, Austria, Hungary and Roumania up to a handsome total, for these regions enjoyed a much heavier rainfall than our own usually far wetter ones.

“The third period has been marked by moderation, both in prices and in opinion. Value has never been so low as in March, or so high as in June, but has fluctuated between 23s. and 25s. per quarter. The lowest price, as is only normally to be expected, prevailed immediately after harvest, and it is a hopeful sign that the year closed with a 25s. quotation.

“Farmers sold wheat with greatest freedom in February and March, when prices were at their lowest. This loss of hope in a crisis can only be described as deplorable, but in 1894 there had been no price advance after Easter, and those who held in to summer lost their interest in their grain's money value. Thus the precedent which was in every farmer's memory said ‘sell,’ and the altered circumstances of the position were urged in vain by ourselves and by our agricultural contemporaries. It is satisfactory to note that the trade in English wheat has steadied since the spring, and that sales since harvest have been moderate. There has been general rejoicing over the excellent quality of the 1895 new wheat; in fact, millers cannot easily procure as much English grain as they would like to have.

“Personal inconvenience has in this matter sharpened millers' sympathies with farmers, and the National Association of British and Irish Millers has resolved that they view ‘with the utmost concern the decline of the production of cereal crops, and particularly of wheat, in the United Kingdom, to the loss both to the agricultural and to the milling interests intimately connected therewith,’ so that they pray ‘the administration to take such steps as may commend themselves to arrest what is nothing less than a great and pressing national danger.’

“The trade in barley during 1895 had simply two periods, the period before harvest and the trade after, for the only foreign harvest of barley which really affects our trade is that of Russia, and takes place coincidentally with the home gathering. From 1st January to 24th August value ranged between 19s. 4d. and 22s. 2d., and a majority of weeks quoted value at 20s. and 21s. levels. On the 31st August, the good new barley beginning to be offered made prices advance to 23s. 5d., and by October 19th, 25s. 8d. had been attained. From that value there has been a slight ebb, but the year closed with a 24s. quotation, against an opening price of 21s. 5d. per quarter. The new barley is decidedly above the average in quality. With respect to foreign sorts, Russian is not nearly so plentiful as it was a year ago, and value has risen 3s. on the year. The new crop in Russia is probably 10 to 15 per cent smaller than that of the previous season, while the quality may be guessed as

averaging 1s. better. California has secured a good crop of serviceable brewing barley, for which there is an excellent demand in England without the home trade being injured.

"Oats have been a disappointing trade. The opening price was 14s. 2d., closing value 13s. 10d. per quarter. Only in June and July was 16s. exceeded for fine old oats of the 1894 crop, and immediately after deliveries of new oats began to be fair in quantity, prices fell 3s., 13s. 2d. being taken on the 28th September, and subsequent recovery not exceeding the insignificant amount of 8d. Fine, heavy 336 lb. oats must not be judged by these prices, but it is clear that oats, as a rule, have hardly paid to grow, except for use on the farm. The Russian crop of 1895 is put at 52,114,000 quarters only, against 61,764,000 quarters in 1894. As, however, Russia shipped 8,275,000 cwt. of oats to the United Kingdom in 1893, out of an 1892 crop of 36,169,000 qrs. only, it is probable that Russian oats can be put upon the English markets in 1896 to any extent that inquiry may invite. The price which Russia is willing to accept is about 12s. 6d. per qr., and this keeps English oats from advancing in value. For American oats 13s. to 14s. is accepted, and the crop is stated to be over an average. If this is so, oats seem doomed to some continuance of present low rates.

"Maize on the 1st January, 1895, was commanding 4s. 10d. per cental at Liverpool, which is the centre of the trade in Indian corn. On 1st July, 4s. 4d. was quoted, the Argentine new crop proving heavy and Russian and Roumanian acreage being spoken of as increased. At the end of the year value had fallen to 3s. 3d. per cental, which is a record price of cheapness in the history of trade. The event which brought about this further and remarkable decline was the realization by the American farmer of the largest maize crop ever grown. A splendid summer, such as we had in England also, was, in America, made wonderfully fertile for maize by a sufficient rainfall in the belt of land devoted to Indian corn. The figures given by United States authorities for the yield in American almost surpass belief, but the more sober estimates current at Mark Lane accept statistics which show 250,000,000 qrs., against 150,000,000 qrs. in the previous year. An increase of a hundred million quarters baffles calculation; in the presence of such a surplus, the novelist's inquiry, 'What will he do with it?' is about the only thing which the Englishman is tempted to say concerning his American cousin.

"With reference to other articles, it will suffice to mention very briefly that beans have increased a little in favour in the year, value for English now ranging 2s. to 3s. higher than it did in January last, while Egyptian, then quoted at 23s. only, are now saleable for 25s. Peas are firm, 25s. was taken for Canadian a year ago, where 26s. is now obtained. The trade in linseed has been active. Calcutta has not been over plentiful, and value has been fairly well supported, but both Argentina and Russia have entered with vigour into competition with India, and have given English farmers an excellent choise of this splendid 'fattener' for stock, at 32s. to 33s. per qr. Cotton seed has been gradually declining in price until the year, which opened with five guineas per ton demanded, closed with no more than 90s. paid. At the last named price the value of this cattle food can scarcely be over-estimated, especially at a time when 'early maturity' is coming to be more and more accepted as the farmer's true policy as a breeder."

BARLEY.

The barley trade, shows a falling off as compared with 1894, and is even rather less than that for 1893. The summary returns for 1895 do not indicate the countries from which the grain comes. On referring to the detailed returns for 1894, however, it would seem that out of a total import of £7,090,579, only £3,876 came from British possessions.

Canadian barley at one time seemed likely to make a reputation in the British market, but the imports which in 1891 were valued at £122,149, fell in the following year to £13,650, in 1893 to £5,866, and in 1894 to £972. No doubt the causes which have led to this falling off in the export trade are perfectly understood in

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Canada, but I still think the matter is worthy of the attention of the Canadian farmer. During the past year I have had communications on the subject from some of the leading brewers in the United Kingdom, inquiring as to whether there was any likelihood of a development in the trade. There is no doubt they are quite prepared to purchase Canadian barley, if it can be grown of the quality that is required, and if the quality can be made at all uniform. Then, again, I obtained some interesting information with regard to six-rowed barley which indicated that it was held in high favour by Scotch distillers, and that a large market could be found for it if the prices were such as to tempt the Canadian shippers.

OATS.

In oats, the quantity imported has shown a tendency to increase since 1893, but there has been a falling away in the price, the result being that while nearly two millions more cwt. were imported in 1895, than in 1893, the value of the imports was £500,000 less. According to the statistics for 1894, the import of oats from foreign countries was £3,741,928, those from British possessions amounting to only £158,168, of which £25,238 were from Canada. The largest part of the imports come from Russia, Sweden and Germany taking the next two places respectively. With regard to Canadian oats, Messrs. Hamilton & Sons of Glasgow write as follows:—"In reply to your inquiry regarding our connection with Canada for the past year, we regret to state that it has not been of such an important nature as usual. The enormous crop of Indian corn in the United States has driven the price of oats so far down in this country and made the sale of home oats so dull, that Scotch millers have been able to undersell us in most districts with oatmeal. In most seasons we are able to distribute Canadian meal all over the United Kingdom at a profit but this year we have been intercepted at all points with cheap offers by local millers. The crop of oats in Canada must have been very good last year as the quality of the meal which we have received is equal if not superior to any we have had during the past decade.

"The use of flake oatmeal or rolled oats is increasing in this country and may be the oatmeal of the future but, as a number of new mills are starting machinery to make it both in the States and Canada, the quantity sent to this market is rather in excess of the demand."

Messrs. John Richmond & Co., of Glasgow, state that they have done a fair business in oatmeal of various qualities, and that they have found a considerable improvement in Canadian manufactures of late.

Messrs. Crichton & Co., of Glasgow, write:—"Of oats we have again received comparatively few, their place being taken principally by Russians. The No. 2 White and No. 2 Mixed Canadians are most suitable to this market.

"Whenever Canadian grain can compete in price with that of other countries we see no reason why the demand for it should not increase."

PEASE.

The import of pease remains about stationary. According to the returns for 1894 the imports from foreign countries were £309,625, the principal countries being Russia and the United States. The imports from British possessions were £337,569, of which £199,076 came from Canada.

Messrs. Bruce, Boyd & Co. of Leith, writes:—"There was no market for Canadian pease here this year. Apart from scarcity in Canada, the supplies from the Baltic ports were unusually large and they monopolized the demand."

MANUFACTURES OF GRAIN, &C.

Messrs. Richmond & Co. of Glasgow, in writing upon other matters make the following statements with regard to manufactures of various grains and cereals:—

In reply we beg to state, that we have had a fair business with Canadians during the past 12 months, not only in flour, but oatmeal of various qualities, of which

they have improved considerably in the manufacture of late. Still, there are a great many articles Canadian millers could manufacture if they would only spend a little time, trouble, and expense in getting up, that is, viz., split peas, split lentils, also pearl and fine 2nd pot barley. Split peas are manufactured principally in Scotland and shipped from here to all parts of the globe. Our opinion has been for years, as we bring the peas from Canada, Canadians ought to be able to make split peas, and that would employ a great deal more labour in Canada. We may also state that we have had consignments of them, but not one of the millers yet have been able to make them like our Scotch millers. Why this should be so we are at a loss to understand. We ourselves have sent out several millers to Canada, with the hope that the millers would employ them and get back the article like what is manufactured in Scotland, but up till now their manufacture of split peas also barley is far short of the quality wanted in this market. What they require are proper millers who can be had from Scotland for that purpose, and we have no doubt if proper millers were employed, that a very large addition to the milling trade would be the result. *Re* split lentils. There are millers in Calcutta who make this article, but for good quality principally in London and Scotland. As the above branches of milling are just in their infancy we fail to see why Canadians cannot get a share of it. We are at all times willing to give all the information that we possibly can on these subjects, and if there are any millers that we have failed to give this information to we shall be more than pleased to hear direct from you or from those that we have over-looked, as we are still of opinion that these branches of the grain trade could be introduced into Canada without much trouble. All they have to do is to get proper machinery, (which can be had in Scotland), and proper millers. Of course there are millers of pot barley by itself and millers of split peas, also split lentils, but we are informed that there are several millers in Leith who apply themselves to all these articles named; therefore, they do not require to get a miller for each. Pot barley is commenced being made in immense quantities in Hamburg and Germany. The dictator of this letter was in one mill in Scotland that can do more than 3 tons per day; still the bulk of pot barley is manufactured in Scotland. We understand that the outlet for German manufactured pot barley is in Austria and Russia. The cereals employed in the manufacture of the above named articles are principally grown in Canada and the Baltic. The latter have commenced to make split peas, which should have been in the hands of the Canadians 20 years ago as it is fully that time since the dictator of this letter suggested to several; but up till now while they have made several consignments they have failed to make the quality required for this country. Now this should not be because they have the pick of the peas and barley in their country, and they ought to be able to make a finer article than even what is made here. Hamburg millers have started proper because they are making the articles which was suggested by us five years ago, but have taken three years if not more to think over it; however, they are not the largest manufacturers of split peas and pot barley that we know of.

"If you are in communication with the Canadian millers you might say that we will be more than pleased to send them large samples of the above articles, and any further information, we can give them shall be attended to."

INDIAN CORN.

Indian corn remains about stationary, both in quantity, quality and in price. In 1894 the total imports were £7,952,258, £7,783,793, coming from foreign countries, and £168,447 from British possessions. The leading countries from which the imports come are Roumania, the United States and Russia, Canada supplying almost the entire imports as declared from British possessions.

Since this report was commenced Messrs. L. Norman & Co., 3 East India Avenue, London, E.C., write as follows on the Canadian grain trade:—

"In accordance with your request we have much pleasure in submitting a brief summary of the grain trade with this country during the past year, having particu-

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lar regard to the Canadian export of cereals, which unfortunately continues to show no improvement.

"The year opened with very quiet markets, white English wheat selling from 22s. to 25s. and Red 20s. to 22s. 6d. In foreign wheat Californian sold from 24s. 9d. to 25s., c.i.f. La Platas about 22s. c.i.f. No. 1 Manitoba at about 25s. c.i.f., and Russians 19s. to 23s. according to quality.

"The severe weather experienced here and on the continent during the early part of the year caused considerable anxiety with regard to the autumn sown crops, and the market in April and May aided by unfavourable news with regard to Russia and the United States, advanced rapidly, showing at the end of June a rise of 5s. to 6s. per quarter.

"During the second six months, with slow trade, owing to almost entire absence of demand, the greater part of this advance was lost, but prices all round showed an improvement on the year, Californians on the 30th December, selling at 27s. c.i.f. La Platas 24s. c.i.f., Manitobas 26s. c.i.f. and Russians from 24s. to 26s. 6d. c.i.f., according to quality. Home grown wheats owing to scarcity showed a better improvement in values than foreign, English white selling from 26s. to 29s. 6d., and Red from 25s. to 28s. 6d.

"The export of grain from the Atlantic ports has again been moderate, Canada in particular showing a marked falling off. The fine prospects of 1894, proved deceptive, the crop turning out the smallest since 1889, the province of Ontario being nearly 1,000,000 quarters short of expectations. The scarcity of wheat was so acutely felt that in the early part of the year, wheat that was in transit for export had to be bought back, and in the month of May, wheat was quoted at Canadian lake ports 1s. per quarter over value quoted here.

"The present Manitoba crop leaves room for an extensive export trade, but with regard to Ontario the quantity harvested will be only sufficient for home consumption and leaves no hope for export except in the case of peas which at the best is a very small item.

"In Canadian barleys the export to this country has ceased. Canadian farmers appear to have given up the cultivation of the two rowed variety for export, which would have found a ready market here, and the six-rowed variety cannot compete, either in weight, colour or price with South Russian and other cheap varieties."

The following return relates to the import of live animals:—

In the case of oxen, it will be seen that the total importations show a falling off, the decrease being attributable to a smaller number of animals having been sent from the United States. It is gratifying to observe, however, that the export trade from Canada was not only maintained, but even increased, notwithstanding the restrictions that have been placed upon the trade. Another feature of the return is the growth in the live cattle trade from the Argentine Republic. In 1893 their exports were only 6,862 head; in 1894, they were 9,534 while in 1895 they were

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39,436 head. It is evident, therefore, that the Argentine Republic is to be regarded as a factor in this trade in the future. The number of cows imported shows a considerable reduction, which is not a matter of surprise, in view of the increased interest the dairy industry is attracting in many countries. The imports of sheep have more than doubled during the past year, a result which has been brought about by the decrease in the number of sheep in the United Kingdom, to which reference has already been made. Canada, the United States, and especially the Argentine Republic, have contributed to the increased trade, and judging from the reports that have been received, the business upon the whole seems to have been a profitable one, except in the case of those shipments which were slaughtered at the port of landing, in consequence of scab disease having been discovered amongst them.

During the past year one or two cases of alleged pleuro-pneumonia were detected among the cargoes from Canada. I was not informed until some time after the reports were made, of the cases in question, and no opportunity was given to me of having the lungs of the suspected animals examined by our veterinary expert. As soon as the necessary particulars reached me, I communicated with the Department of Agriculture on the subject, and the cases were investigated by Dr. McEachran and Professor Adami of McGill University. It is evident from their reports that the disease or affection from which the animals were suffering presented the same characteristics as the other cases that had been reported upon during the past few years. Our experts, and their evidence has been corroborated by eminent scientific authorities like Dr. Klein, Professor Williams, and Professor Nocard, state positively, that there are important differences in the symptoms of the disease in the Canadian animals, and those of true pleuro-pneumonia contagiosa. This, in a measure, is also admitted by the departmental officers of the Board of Agriculture, but they endeavour to get out of the difficulty by the statement that the appearance of the lungs in the Canadian cases was very similar to that of pleuro-pneumonia, and that if such indications came under their notice in English animals, they would be brought within the operation of the "Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act." It seems to me, however, that the contention I have advanced from the first, supported by the Department of Agriculture, and its veterinary officers, that the disease cannot possibly be pleuro-pneumonia, is proved by the fact that pleuro-pneumonia contagiosa has not made its appearance in Canada. It is now over five years since the first cases of suspicion were reported from Dundee, and three years since Canadian cattle were placed on the scheduled list. If the disease had been pleuro-pneumonia considering that the animals came from all parts of Canada, and that the affection is described by veterinary experts as highly contagious and fatal, especially in countries where it first obtains a footing, Canada ought now to be full of the disease from one end to the other. And yet not a single case of suspicion has been found! On the other hand, the diagnosis of the British veterinary experts has been controverted by other experts, and it evident that there are other diseases affecting the lungs of cattle which present characteristics somewhat similar to pleuro-pneumonia contagiosa, although the differences are such as may be readily distinguished.

In the report of the Board of Agriculture of the year 1894, which has just been issued, the following paragraphs appear in relation to the cases reported upon in that year:

"It was suggested by the Canadian authorities that the disease was not pleuro-pneumonia, but one which had been contracted on the voyage, and to which the term 'transit pneumonia' was given.

"Whatever name may be given to this disease, it is certain that it possessed all the characteristic appearances of contagious pleuro-pneumonia. The fresh specimens were submitted to several experts in the veterinary profession, who stated that the lesions and appearances were such as had always been regarded as indicative of contagious pleuro-pneumonia, when found in the lungs of cattle in this country. Like that disease, it is clearly specific, and of low infective power, otherwise further cases would have been found in some of the cattle when the cargo was slaughtered."

Hitherto the disease has been described as highly contagious, but how that term and low infective power can go together, appears to me to be difficult to explain. This is especially the case, having regard to the conditions under which the animals are carried, both in Canada and across the Atlantic, all favourable to the rapid development of the disease if it really existed.

Whatever may have been the reasons which led to Canadian cattle being placed on the scheduled list, it is undoubtedly regarded as a measure of indirect protection to the British agriculturist. Now, that animals from almost every country are required to be slaughtered at the port of landing, it is stated that measures are under consideration to render that state of things permanent. In my judgment this would be much better than that which exists at present. The hope is sometimes entertained that the restrictions may be removed, but now that this appears to be extremely doubtful, it is in the interest of everybody concerned that the conditions on which the trade is in future to be conducted, should be made permanent in their character, so that farmers and shippers may know where they are.

It is a question open to some argument whether it is not more advantageous for Canada to send fat stock to England than store cattle; but at the same time, we cannot help feeling regret that as the consequence of an error in judgment, and of insufficient scientific evidence, Canadian cattle are stamped before the world as being infected with a contagious disease which does not really exist in the country.

In the early part of the year I devoted considerable attention to the question of the cattle trade with Belgium. As the result of indirect negotiations, I was able to report that the Belgian government were prepared to admit several shipments of Canadian cattle, on the understanding that a special investigation as to their condition should take place. The understanding was that, if the animals were found to be healthy, the existing restrictions would be removed, and the trade allowed to develop on the old lines. For some reason or another, however, Canadian shippers did not seem prepared to take the responsibility, and the matter remains in the position that it did when the restrictions were imposed in November, 1894.

Another feature of the cattle trade this year has been the opening up and developing of a trade with French ports, particularly St. Malo. The trade seems to have been carried on under some difficulty, owing to the imperfect arrangements that exist at those places for dealing with cattle, but I am sorry to notice that the business is not looked upon favourably by the local French agricultural societies. They have complained to the government that the cattle are landed and sent away in so short a time as to make a proper veterinary examination difficult, if not impossible; and further that in the circumstances, it may arise that the customs revenue does not receive the benefit that it would do if the individual animals were weighed. Representations have been made to the French government upon the subject, and an inquiry has been promised. I hope, however, that nothing will arise to prevent the development of the trade with France, which I believe to be advantageous to both countries. It emphasizes the necessity of extreme care, however, on the part of shippers, to ensure that none but the best quality of cattle are sent over; and the steamship companies should also take every measure to observe the local regulations, so as to give no cause for complaint on that score.

I regret to have to report that the trade in live sheep, which seemed to be a promising one, and to be capable of much development, has been brought to a close by the issue of an order requiring the animals to be slaughtered at the port of landing, after the 1st instant. Canadian sheep seem to be very popular throughout the country, and the farmers were glad to get them, as a good profit could be realized upon them, after a few weeks' feeding. The interruption in the trade has been brought about by the arrival of several cargoes of sheep from Canada during the past year, in which cases of scab disease were found. In most of the instances investigation indicated that the suspected sheep were really American animals which had been shipped from Montreal. It will be readily understood, however, that the officials of the Board of Agriculture here are unable to distinguish between American and Canadian sheep. They naturally regard all sheep coming from Canada, as Canadian, and those coming from United States ports as American. I reported

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regularly all the cases that were brought under my notice; and in view of the action of the agricultural press, which regarded the importation of possibly infected sheep as a source of danger, I was not surprised at the action taken by the Board of Agriculture. Indeed, I had so informed the Minister of Agriculture, as a reason for making any extra exertions that might be possible to keep the trade going. What effect the restrictions may have upon the future trade remains to be seen, but if any sheep are sent over alive, it will certainly be in the interest of the trade that they should be in a condition fit for slaughter, otherwise nothing but loss can result.

As a measure of indirect protection to the British farmer, I do not think the restrictions placed upon the cattle and sheep trade will prove a success. It is true that the price of stores in the country districts may be increased, but on the other hand, the necessity for slaughter at the ports of debarkation will cause a glut of meat in those distributing centres. The prices at those places tend to regulate the prices through the country, and any falling off that may result from an over-supply must naturally react not only upon foreign and colonial shippers, but upon the farmers in the United Kingdom.

I am glad to observe that the arrangements under which cattle are now carried across the Atlantic have a tendency to improve every year. This conclusion must inevitably be drawn from the very small percentage of loss which the regular steamship companies engaged in the trade are liable to show.

You will be aware that a Royal Commission on Agriculture has been continuing its labours during the past year. In several of the reports of the assistant commissioners on Agriculture in the different provinces, reference has been made to the Canadian cattle trade. I quote an interesting extract from the report of Mr. R. Henry Rew, on agriculture in the county of Norfolk:—

“A question to which considerable prominence was given during my inquiry was that of the exclusion from this country of store cattle coming from Canada. If not exactly a subject of purely local interest, it is at any rate one in which Norfolk is particularly concerned. A large number of store cattle are bought every year by Norfolk farmers, and a considerable proportion of these comes from a distance, comparatively few being reared in the county. When store cattle from Canada were allowed to be freely introduced into the country some of them found a regular market on Norwich Hill. Consequently, when on November 31st, 1892, the Board of Agriculture, in consequence of pleuro-pneumonia being found among Canadian cattle, prohibited them from being landed except subject to slaughter at the port of debarkation, the cessation of the supply naturally affected the farmers of Norfolk.

“At the North Walsham meeting this question was introduced by Mr. R. Wortley, who expressed the opinion that Canadian stores were of benefit to the country, and that they ought to be allowed to come in without being subject to slaughter at the ports. Mr. Bugden stated that they were paying £2 per head more for their stores than they would have to pay if Canadian cattle were admitted. He also thought that they might be admitted under special regulations to Norfolk and Scotland, “the two parts of the country where they are wanted.” I pressed the meeting on these points. Lord Wodehouse suggested that the stores might be admitted into “all grazing counties”; but those present did not appear to be greatly interested except as regards their own country, and eventually the meeting decided in favour of a suggestion that Canadian cattle should be allowed to come into Norfolk.

“As to the statement that stores were dearer in consequence of the absence of Canadians, a farmer stated that he paid £2 per head more for small bullocks, and 30 shillings per head more for big cattle than he did two years previously, when Canadians were admitted.”

At the London meeting the following resolution was adopted:—“That in the opinion of this meeting the importation of store cattle from Canada and other countries is of great importance to Norfolk graziers, and it earnestly desires the Board of Agriculture to consider the feasibility of admitting them from some districts; and if necessary to subject them to quarantine before shipment.”

“At the King’s Lynn meeting an entirely opposite view prevailed, and the following resolution was passed unanimously:—

“That this meeting does not endorse the opinion that Canadian stores should be introduced into this country.”

Mr. Anthony Hamond, in moving this resolution, observed, that “East and West Norfolk are as different as chalk and cheese. One idea suggested for the benefit of East Norfolk was that Canadian cattle should be imported. The western side of the county is a breeding district. In the east the people buy a few steers and if they are diseased they can easily kill them and get compensation; but if we got disease imported into West Norfolk it would be a very serious matter indeed.”

The following statistics relate to the importation of meats of various kinds and they deserve the study of Canadian farmers and shippers, as showing the extensive markets the United Kingdom offers for articles of the kind,

BACON.

The quantity of bacon imported during the last year shows a considerable increase, but there has been a falling off in prices. This will be better understood when it is stated that 3,198,857 cwt. in 1893 were valued at £8,479,815, while in 1895 4,063,418 cwt. only realized £7,935,799. The position of Canada in the trade has somewhat improved as regards quantity, although the products have naturally felt the falling off in prices. There is, as will be seen, a very large market for bacon and hams, the total importations at present prices being valued at over £10,000,000 per annum, to which Canada only contributes less than £700,000. Denmark and the United States are our principal competitors, but the testimony is almost universal of the improvement in the quality of the Canadian product, which justifies the hope that the trade may be indefinitely expanded if proper care is taken to maintain the reputation Canadian bacon and hams have so far acquired.

The following are letters from some of my correspondence on the subject:—

From Messrs. T. L. Boyd & Co., of Wellington Chambers, London:—"In reply to your letter just to hand we have to remark that, as far as quality goes, there is no doubt, whatever that the product from the Canadian hog is very much superior to that derived from the American hog. This is now so well recognized by the trade, that the Canadian Wiltshire cut bacon, the cut that practically almost the whole of the Canadian bacon is exported under, has quite driven the American Wiltshire cut bacon, in which formerly a large trade was done from America, out of the market.

"The Canadian Wiltshire cut bacon now enters into competition with the Irish and Danish Wiltshire bacon, but at a lower range of prices. There are two reasons for this difference in price. One of these we think could and should be surmounted, while the other we fear cannot be altogether removed.

"The first is that the Canadian farmers will continue making their hogs too fat, while the trade prefer and are always willing to pay a premium for, lean bacon, and have to be tempted by a lower price to buy the fat bacon.

"American packers make their fat hogs into other cuts, and the best of these are exported to the English markets at prices that preclude the Canadian packers from competing with them, because the price of hogs is generally higher in Canada than it is in the States and also because the hogs in the latter country yield 14 per cent of lard compared to only 6 or 7 per cent in the former, and this makes the shrinkage between live and dead weight tell heavily in favour of the American hog, and in these heavy cuts the superior quality of the Canadian meat does not command the relatively higher price as it does in the Wiltshire cut.

"The second reason is that the public taste is for mild cured bacon and it seems to be impossible during many months of the year to lay down Canadian bacon in the English markets, cured as lightly as either Irish or Danish bacon, on account of the nearness of the latter countries, and the great distance of the former, from the place of killing to the consuming point."

Messrs. Bamford Brothers, of Liverpool, also write a very satisfactory letter:—
"We are in receipt of your circular letter *re* Canadian produce, and in reply, beg to state that we handle a considerable quantity of Canadian bacon and hams. Our experience is, that a great improvement has taken place in the cut, cure, and quality of the meat during the past 12 months.

"It is very desirable that every effort should be made to keep the quality up to a high standard.

"Regularity in packing is very important, viz.:—to have lean meat packed by itself, and distinct from stout stuff. By doing so packers get the fullest returns for their shipments, and if they exercise ordinary care in selecting, curing, and packing, we look for the trade making considerable headway."

Messrs. William Tittle & Sons, of Bristol, write:—

"*Bacon.* We have had a large quantity of sides and hams this season, and it is a trade that will grow as the quality generally has been very good, and the meat is leaner than that cured in the States. Unfortunately there has been for the last two or three years, a considerable amount of taint, but, doubtless, the curers will know how to prevent this in future."

Messrs. Moorhead, Sinclair & Co., of Glasgow, write:—

"We are favoured with your circular wanting our views regarding the suitability of Canadian products for our Scotch markets. Of beef and pork products we have not handled much of recent years, but we have nothing to say against the quality of what occasionally finds its way to our markets, indeed we rather commend it as being more like the home-fed article so far as hog products are concerned.

"Our Scotch markets are chiefly supplied from western United States markets—Chicago, Cedar Rapids, Omaha, &c., and they are so much accustomed now to the class of cure for these markets that they do not want anything better, and won't give a higher price required or at least demanded from Canadian markets. English markets respond more freely to this request, but our Scotch markets won't.

"There is always a good demand here for boneless beef buttocks, 50 to 70 lbs. cured mildly in pickle, and bright in the colour. Present value of these vary from 36s. to 46s., according to classification and quality. These are packed in tierces holding about 350 lbs.

"Mess beef for ships' use is also in good demand here, but must be of a high class quality to pass the government inspection. This is packed in tierces of a uniform weight of 304 lbs. Present value varies from 65s. to 75s. per tierce.

"Mess pork also for ships' use is packed in barrels of 200 lbs., each piece being about 4 lbs. weight. It requires to be thoroughly cured, bright in colour, and not too fat. Present value of this article per barrel varies from 44s. to 50s. It also must be of a high class quality to come up to survey requirements.

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“ Other articles chiefly used in Scotch markets are New York cut shoulders (not square shoulders), long cut hams, 14 to 16 and 16 to 18 lbs., also long clear bacon, 24 to 28 lbs., A.C. hams 14 to 16 lbs., also 18 to 20 lbs. These all must be very mildly cured and bright in the colour. If over-salted it is the greatest condemnation they can now have, almost worst than mild taint. We consider there is immense room for a great development of Canadian hog and beef products in this market so soon as they are in a position to compete with United States markets.”

In the other items of the tables Canada is not at present interested. In view, however, of the restrictions that have been placed on the cattle and sheep trade, the matter is one that will be carefully considered in the future; and I may say that Prof. Robertson's lectures on the subject of the development of a trade in chilled beef, &c., have attracted much attention in the United Kingdom. Hitherto the great difficulty in the way of a trade of the kind has been the absence of refrigerating accommodation on board the Canadian steamship lines—a difficulty which I am glad to say is now in a fair way to be removed. I need hardly say that if the government decides to take it in hand temporarily, the development of the dead meat trade, both I and the agents of the Interior Department in the United Kingdom will do everything that may be possible to bring about its success.

As bearing upon this matter, I beg to quote some extracts from the report of Messrs. W. Weddel & Co., who are among the leading merchants engaged in the Australian trade in these commodities:—

The past year has witnessed wider variations in values, and probably more important changes in the course of trade than have many of its predecessors. It opened with heavy stocks in London, and owing to the forwardness of the season in New Zealand and Australia, shipments came to hand a month earlier than is generally the case. The market had thus no breathing space in which to clear off old stocks, so that sellers were handicapped almost from the outset by an excess of supplies over the ordinary consumptive demand. Supplies were pressed forward as rapidly as possible after the season opened in New Zealand, with a view to obtaining high prices in the Spring months—similar to those secured in the opening months of 1894. These exceptionally high prices had resulted entirely from the fact that arrivals were then abnormally light, and the special effort put forth to catch the early trade of 1895 completely defeated its own ends, as with no scarcity there could be no such extreme prices as ruled for the early arrivals of 1894. The imports for the first and second quarters were excessive, and prices fell rapidly at a time of year when, as a rule, some advance takes place. Many speculative buyers must have lost heavily at that time, as purchases had been made in New Zealand without due regard to the statistical position of this market. The rush of supplies, however, had spent itself by midsummer, and as soon as arrivals slackened prices recovered themselves rapidly, more especially during August and September—a time of year when quotations more commonly recede. Reports of a severe winter in New Zealand, and a serious drought in Australia, imparted some fictitious strength to the market during October, but the heavy arrivals of November soon dissipated all such firmness, and the latter portion of the year was a season of depression for most descriptions of frozen meats.

Although the steady shrinkage in values of all kinds of frozen meats, which has been a feature in the history of the past ten years' trading, was not maintained uninterruptedly during 1895, owing to the operation of special temporary conditions, it is doubtful if the outcome of the year's business has been any more profitable to producers than were the results of the previous year. It is true that charges for freezing, freight, and realization have been further reduced, and also that more meat has been sold; but, on the other hand, some very low prices have necessarily been accepted for a large proportion of the year's imports, while in the case of Australia the drought has compelled producers to press forward supplies with the result of raising the value of stock there, and subsequently depressing the price of meat here. Every year that passes goes to prove that the people of the United Kingdom are relying more and more upon colonial and foreign supplies of fresh meat, and also

that it is only by keeping down costs to the lowest possible level that the increasing productions of the Australasian Colonies and River Plate can depend upon finding a profitable market in this country.

Mutton and Lamb.—Importations of mutton and lamb show an increase of 451,318 carcasses from New Zealand, 29,541 carcasses from Australia, and 200,427 carcasses from the River Plate. There has been some diversion of Australian shipments to ports other than London, notably 19,500 carcasses per "Urmston Grange" (s) to Liverpool, and 16,000 carcasses per "Timaru" to Manchester direct, besides sundry small parcels of beef and mutton, from Queensland and New South Wales respectively, shipped to Port Said, Malta and Gibraltar.

The development of the Australasian trade direct to ports other than London is somewhat slow, but where special terms for freight and insurance have to be arranged, and extra risks have to be taken, while established interests have to be competed with, it is difficult for most consignees to take the necessary steps to open up new markets. Such departures are therefore left to one or two firms who are free to act in the interests of large shippers whose immediate and future requirements demand the extension of markets in every likely direction, even though the immediate results of such experiments may be less encouraging than hoped for.

Nine-tenths of the imports of River Plate sheep are delivered at Liverpool in order to supply the Northern markets at the least expense and in the best condition, thus showing how strong a hold Merino and small Crossbred sheep have upon an important section of the community. Hitherto Australian mutton has been unable to gain a satisfactory footing in these markets owing to the heavy handicap of rail-age from London, and occasional loss of condition in transit, besides the dissimilarities arising from the intermittent nature of the supply available after providing for the wants of the London district. Hereafter there will be no such serious obstacles to contend with in the effort to secure a fair proportion of this trade for Australian shippers. A beginning having been made at Manchester by the delivery there of the cargo per the "Timaru," to be followed by the "Gulf of Siam" (s) early in 1896, the way is being prepared for the regular monthly steam service (arranged for by the Victorian Government and heartily backed up by Victorian and New South Wales shippers) which will commence in May next.

The increase in the importations during 1895, as compared with 1894, was quite a natural one, about 10 per cent, but the first quarter's arrivals represented an increase of 65 per cent on the light arrivals of the corresponding quarter of the previous year. In March and April the stock of secondary grades had accumulated far in excess of normal requirements, and the efforts made by weak holders to push sales resulted in the gradual reduction of quotations to the lowest level on record, viz., 3d. per lb. for prime North Canterbury sheep, and 2d. per lb. for good Wellington sheep, these prices being touched on 17th May. This quotation for Wellington sheep was actually lower than that current at the same date for small Australian and River Plate sheep, but this position was caused more by the exceptional market conditions than by the inferiority of quality. A prompt recovery was made during the next four weeks and prices remained fairly steady till August when the fears of at least a temporary scarcity led to considerable speculative buying and consequent advance in prices, which ultimately touched 5d. per lb. in October for best North Canterbury sheep. These did not again recede below 4d. per lb., but the closing quarter's trade was a disappointingly slow one.

Throughout the greater part of the year prime grades have held their own relatively well as compared with secondary and inferior, the premium paid for lines of prime graded North Canterbury sheep during the last quarter amounting to $\frac{1}{2}$ d. @ $\frac{3}{4}$ d. per lb. over good average quality sheep from other parts of the colony.

During the whole year the general level of quality has been fairly well maintained. Sheep from the North Island were perhaps in some cases in poor condition at time of shipment, but on the other hand the quality of much of the South Island output reached a higher level than in some preceding years, more especially in the case of South Canterbury shipments. The more general adoption of good systems of grading for quality and weight is doubtless having the effect of slowly but surely

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raising the standard of quality of New Zealand sheep, even when seasons are not altogether favourable; and in view of the ever-growing competition with Australian and River Plate crossbred mutton, this steady tendency towards improvement cannot but be viewed with satisfaction. If shippers would only realize that the forwarding of a comparatively small proportion of inferior carcasses has often serious consequences upon market values for the better qualities, the sending of such inferior lines would be made impossible by the general consent of all those engaged in the trade.

Australian.—A fractional decrease in the quantity of mutton imported from the various Australian colonies has taken place during 1895, but arrivals have not been regularly distributed over the year, and the retail trade has thus grown somewhat spasmodically, though it has amounted to an average weekly consumption of about 25,000 carcasses. Prices, on the whole, have been somewhat disappointing, and were certainly rather more irregular than in the case of New Zealand descriptions. This was partly owing to the glut in the spring months being followed by scarcity during the summer, and again by a fresh glut in the closing quarter of the year. The last named adverse factor was aggravated by specially active competition with River Plate supplies in the Midlands and Northern Counties, which started simultaneously with the first direct arrival of Australian sheep into Manchester. The importance of that as yet undeveloped centre for the distribution of Australian meat is, to some extent, indicated by the earnestness with which River Plate importers seek to retain their position there; but it is certain that Australian mutton cannot be kept out of that market, in view of the freight contract advised as having been already entered into by the Victorian Government for direct steam service to Manchester.

The general quality of shipments received from the Victoria, New South Wales and Queensland during 1895, was somewhat irregular, some districts sending good useful sheep throughout the whole period, while others shipped some very inferior carcasses which arrived towards the close of the year. During the spring months the value of small Merino carcasses, weighing 40 to 45 lbs., was fully equal to the price per pound obtainable for prime 60 to 70 lbs. Crossbreds, an anomaly caused by the temporary serious depression in secondary New Zealand mutton. The autumn and winter months, however, witnessed a marked change in this respect, the heavier 60 to 70 lb. carcasses of both Merino and Crossbred Sheep (more particularly of those received from the Riverina district) commanding a premium of $\frac{1}{4}$ d. to $\frac{3}{4}$ d. per lb. over small 40 to 45 lb. carcasses. Many of these latter showed unmistakable signs of having suffered from the drought, and in the interests of the whole trade there is little doubt but that it would have been better to have utilized such sheep in the colonies for purposes other than freezing. The all round lowering of prices in the British markets, resulting from the offering of such sheep must represent a much larger loss to colonial shippers generally than any loss likely to arise from non-completion of an individual shipping contract, or from one shipper missing the chance of making a possible profit. It seems necessary even at this late stage in the history of the trade to press for adequate steps being taken to prevent the shipment of inferior lines by or through any freezing company.

River Plate.—Though the general quality of arrivals in 1895 has not been especially good (owing to the somewhat wet season prevailing in the Argentine Republic) it has been, as a rule, fairly satisfactory. Very few really inferior parcels have been marketed. Prices were at their best during the summer and autumn months, and though much lower rates had to be accepted afterwards, the results of the year's operations will probably prove to have been more than usually remunerative. Some slight augmentation has taken place in the number of steamers engaged in the trade, and in the output of some of the refrigerating plants, but no new freezing works have been erected, and the four existing works are now practically controlled by three companies, who are usually prepared to act together when occasion arises to regulate prices. Importers express their confidence in the near future of the trade, despite Australian competition and the rapid growth in exports of live sheep from the Argentine Republic.

Falkland Island.—A single cargo, consisting of 19,438 carcasses per “Hornby Grange” (s), was landed during 1895. There was no appreciable improvement in the quality as compared with previous years’ imports from this source.

LAMB.

New Zealand.—The 1895 season opened clear of old stocks, but earlier in the year than usual heavy supplies began to arrive. Unlike the course pursued in 1894, when receipts in the early spring were abnormally light, prices soon dropped from 6d. @ 6½d. per lb. for prime carcasses down to 5d. per lb., in the neighbourhood of which they remained during April to July. A further reduction to 4½d. @ 4¾d. per lb. ensued, and at that lower level a very large volume of trade passed, new buyers being attracted from many quarters by the cheapness and excellent quality of the article. The over-sanguine advices sent from this side as to market prospects had misled shippers into expecting a much higher range of prices, and increasing disappointment was felt as the season went on. In September, however, the trade revived again to an unusual extent, owing to the abnormally hot weather, and rapid clearances of stocks were effected. Though small shipments continued to arrive right up to the end of the year, quotations were almost nominal during the closing quarter.

Receipts for 1895 from New Zealand exhibited an increase of 286,845 carcasses, or nearly 64 per cent, as compared with 1894, and of 262,398 carcasses, or 56 per cent, as compared with 1893.

So unexpectedly rapid an increase in the imports from one colony might well have caused much greater disorganization than actually took place, and though prices did rule lower in 1895 than in earlier years, it speaks volumes for the vitality of the demand to be able to report a practically complete clearance of stocks by the end of September. So far as can be ascertained there will be no old stocks to carry forward to 1896.

Australia.—The Australian lamb trade, though more than twice as large as in 1894, was not of very great moment, only 46,655 carcasses coming to hand as against 15,585 in 1894, and 9,222 in 1893. Both quality and prices were irregular, and no steady trade can be said to have been established as yet in this description. As a rule, sufficient attention has not been paid hitherto to the selection of suitable qualities for the British markets—prime carcasses, plain and rough carcasses, tegs, and sometimes sheep, being all sent forward in one line. Preparations are, however, being made for developing this branch of the trade on lines more in accordance with the requirements of the home market.

River Plate.—The number of lambs received from River Plate has been insignificant—only 4,785 carcasses—and at no time was there sufficient stock on the markets to make quotations other than nominal.

It seems not improbable that a further increase in the consumptive demand for prime lambs will be experienced next year, the expansion of sales in this branch of the trade during the past year warranting the anticipation of some further growth in the near future. Possibly there may be some falling-off in shipments from New Zealand, owing to the unfavourable winter recently experienced, though there will be some augmentation of exports of good quality, carefully graded, from Australia. Should the total not represent more than a 20 per cent increase, it may be reasonably hoped that prices will be maintained at something better than the past year’s moderate level.

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BEEF.

The following figures give the importations of Australian, New Zealand, River Plate, American-killed and continental-killed beef, during the past four years, viz :—

Except in the case of Australian frozen beef the figures for 1895 would hardly call for special notice, but from Queensland and New South Wales the quantities imported have nearly doubled in one year; and as stocks in London at the close of December are in quite moderate compass, it is manifest that the consumption of frozen beef in the United Kingdom has greatly extended.

The record of the trade for 1895 in frozen beef is a distinct improvement on that of 1894, owing largely to the much greater regularity in arrivals, New South Wales shipments serving to fill up any temporary gaps in arrivals from Queensland. Except for a fortnight in April when the market was absolutely bare of supplies, there was no lengthy period of scarcity such as occurred in 1893 and 1894, nor, on the other hand, was there any serious glut in arrivals involving the detention of steamers. The general run of quality, too—more especially of Queensland consignments—was very satisfactory, and buyers who required prime sorts for their trade, could almost always obtain supplies. These favouring factors gave stability to the retail trade, while the light receipts of American chilled beef during the spring, summer and early autumn months enabled shippers to secure fairly good returns for their cattle. The competition which importers of Queensland beef experienced from the arrival of numerous lines of New South Wales beef was viewed at first as a misfortune, but these arrivals really proved to be a blessing in disguise by serving to maintain a more constant supply on the market—a consideration of the first importance in developing the trade. In April, when heavy shipments came to hand after a period of comparative scarcity, and again in November, without so much reason, the market was very rapidly depressed by reason of the various consignees competing with one another to secure buyers. On the latter occasion a strong effort was made by the principal holders of stocks to support prices—despite the somewhat conflicting nature of their interests as agents, dealers, &c.—but some holders failed to do their part at the critical moment, and the others thereafter each felt bound to watch his own interests, without reference to what results his action might produce upon the market value of other parcels in the same vessel, from the same port, and in some cases, belonging to the same shipper. The trade during November was a particularly disappointing one, prices falling steadily under the adverse influences of heavy stocks and bad weather. The closing month of the year witnessed some slight recovery in values, induced partly by the non-arrival of the “Duke of Argyll” (s), owing to a breakdown in the Mediterranean. In view of possible short shipments following the drought in New South Wales and Southern Queensland, there is now more hope of some revival in values. The retail trade is fairly good and likely to be fully maintained next year, so that there are reasonable prospects of more remunerative returns being obtainable in the opening months of 1896.

Importations from New Zealand (partly chilled) and River Plate have been of only small volume, and have had no practical effect upon the general course of the market.

The general improvement in prices for frozen beef in 1895 compared with 1894 would probably have been unattainable in view of the large increase in importations, had not the American chilled beef imports shown an appreciable falling off in 1895; but the fact that on more than one occasion frozen beef rose at a time when chilled

beef fell in value tends to demonstrate that a trade is being built up for the Australian article, more or less independent of the market for American chilled beef. The large volume of the older established trade must, however, still continue to dominate the general course of prices for frozen beef, more especially as regards the influence of fore-quarters of chilled beef upon the value of frozen fores and hinds.

STORAGE.

The greatly increased storage accommodation provided by the London and India Docks Joint Committee and by the proprietors of private stores obviated any such difficulties as were experienced in 1894, as regards the discharge of vessels on arrival in London. It is fortunate that the storage capacity of the various refrigerated warehouses was so greatly augmented during 1895, for at times there were very heavy stocks on hand, and, but for the ample accommodation available, the depression in values in April and May last, must have been seriously aggravated. During April the equivalent of 600,000 carcasses arrived in this country, and during May 650,000 carcasses (including beef, mutton and lambs) calculated on the basis of 56lbs. sheep. Speaking roughly, the various London stores alone can now hold the equivalent of about 1,000,000 sheep, which is equal to nearly three months' receipts of frozen mutton, lamb and beef. There are also numerous provincial stores already at work, and no difficulty about storage need be apprehended in the event of consignments from Australasian ports being directed to Liverpool, Manchester or Cardiff.

The question of storage of meats in the colonies, in order to facilitate shipping arrangements and secure regularity in arrivals, has received a good deal of consideration of late, though some authorities have expressed views adverse to the general adoption of such a course. The great advantage, as an alternative, to storing in London, lies in the comparative ease with which frozen meat can be kept in bright condition for a long period, if it has never been exposed to the air outside the freezing chamber; while, as a matter of commercial prudence, it is never desirable to keep large stocks in sight at the place where sales have to be made. The stocks in London cannot be hidden from buyers, while those in the colonies are too far off to have much influence on values here.

FOREIGN MARKETS.

The hopes which were entertained a year ago of establishing satisfactory business relations with continental markets have not been realized. In Germany and Austria the sale of frozen beef was checked by an advance in values in this country occurring almost simultaneously with a fall in values on the continent. The physical and economic difficulties in the way of opening up these markets had been largely overcome, but so soon as it became less profitable to sell in those countries than in Great Britain, the newly started retail trade in frozen beef disappeared, resulting in no small loss to the enterprising pioneers in both Germany and Austria.

In neither France nor Belgium has any real progress been achieved in the introduction of frozen meats, though the former country continues to import limited quantities of mutton direct from the River Plate, under severe restrictions as to preparation for the French market and treatment after arrival. It is reported that the "Severus" (s) now on passage from Australia, will deliver some 10,000 New South Wales sheep at Havre or Dunkirk with a view to testing the capabilities of this market as a fresh outlet for colonial mutton. If suitable quality be shipped there is no reason why Australian sheep should not sell as readily as do River Plate sheep in France.

At the present moment the principal Mediterranean ports appear to hold out the greatest promise of benefit for Australian shippers. Frozen meats can be economically landed at Port Said, Malta, and Gibraltar, from Australian steamers homeward bound. The erection of excellent stores at these important places has now rendered it possible to enter into contracts for the regular supply of frozen beef,

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mutton and lamb to the British troops at these centres, and these contracts may be expected to form in each case the nucleus of a steady distributing trade to the general public.

THAWING PROCESSES.

The past year has witnessed much less rapid development in the artificial thawing of frozen meat than was anticipated. Three or four processes are now available to any one who desires to utilize them, but they do not differ from each other very greatly in respect of either charges or results. Roughly speaking, the operation costs nearly $\frac{1}{4}$ d. per lb., and has resulted in the addition of $\frac{1}{4}$ d. @ $\frac{1}{4}$ d. per lb. to the value of the meat. Sometimes even more has been added in a favourable market, but, on the other hand, it has happened not infrequently that artificially thawed beef or mutton could only be sold at the price current for the same article in a frozen state, while on a few occasions it had to be cleared out even at a reduction from ordinary frozen values.

In so far as the sale of beef and mutton so treated enables importers to secure a few buyers who would not otherwise touch frozen meats, the introduction of artificial thawing processes is to be welcomed; but a full year's experience of the trade in thawed meats seems to indicate that the market cannot yet be relied upon to absorb any large or any regular quantities. The financial advantages attached to the trade do not always appear to be very tangible, owing to the risks involved in having to sell without delay any meat which has been defrosted, even if, at the date of sale, trade is in a depressed state. Only the prime meat can be satisfactorily dealt with by any of the existing processes, partly because bruises and blemishes are rendered so much more conspicuous when the frost has been removed from the carcasses, and partly because buyers of defrosted meat can only work with prime quality.

CHILLED BEEF.

Following upon the first trial shipment made in 1894 per "Port Pirie" (s), the result of which was inconclusive, there have been three experimental shipments made during 1895. The first and second, per "Gothic" (s) to Wellington, N.Z., were made with the Shiel's Thermostat as an essential feature of each trial; the third, per "Rakaia" (s) to Brisbane, Queensland, was made without any special means to regulate the temperature. The earlier of the two shipments per "Gothic" (s), certainly left the best financial result, as it reached an exceptionally brisk market for American beef, and was, moreover, in nice, bright condition, though slightly frozen. The other shipment, per "Gothic" (s), was still more lightly frozen, but on arrival was found to be more or less affected by mould, which, unfortunately, developed considerably before the consignment was all cleared off. It reached a bad market, and left a loss to those engaged in making the experiment. The third shipment, per "Rakaia" (s) laboured under several serious disadvantages, as the drought in Queensland rendered the securing of prime beef at Brisbane an impossibility, and the steamer was unduly delayed on the Queensland coast. After being 49 days on board the beef had to be frozen, and when it arrived, after a 70 days' voyage, it was almost indistinguishable from ordinary frozen beef, and, not being in bright condition, realized poor prices.

The net results of these various experiments need not by any means destroy the hope that beef will yet be brought chilled from Australia to the United Kingdom. It is only to be done on the fastest steamers, with the best quality of beef, in specially constructed chambers, and it will probably be found that only by sterilizing the atmosphere of the refrigerating chambers can the meat be kept sound for a sufficiently long period; but, of course, the cost of doing so must be moderate, otherwise the enhanced value of chilled over frozen beef would not cover the extra charges involved. In any case, however, the trade for frozen beef would probably not be materially affected by the receipt of Australian chilled beef, as the present

“frozen” trade could not be carried on were prices raised to that level which would render profitable the importation of Australian beef in a chilled state. The chilled beef and the frozen beef trades are quite distinct at present, and likely to remain so in the near future.

GENERAL OUTLOOK.

Supply and Demand.—The decreases in the numbers of cattle and sheep in the United Kingdom in 1895, as compared with 1894, are comparatively unimportant, viz., 27,482 cattle and 262,965 sheep, and apparently the rapid decline of our flocks and herds since 1892 has been checked, partly by the favourable season of 1894-95, and partly by reduced consumption. The restrictions placed upon the importation of live store cattle since the end of 1893 appear to have affected materially the stocks of cattle in the United Kingdom; but, on the other hand, the increased importation of live sheep has not sufficed to maintain the flocks of the United Kingdom at their former level. As no foreign store sheep are to be admitted into this country after 31st December, 1895, even Canadian sheep having now been interdicted, it is reasonable to assume that in the near future home flocks may fail to maintain even their present position.

Prices of beef have been high in the States during the greater part of 1895, but latterly have lost ground considerably, and although the supply of stock is less now than it has been since 1889, the maize crop just secured is so plentiful and of such excellent quality that American exporters do not anticipate any rise in values unless some material improvement takes place in the local demand. It is difficult, however, to believe that this reduction in numbers will not tend to keep up prices of American beef in this market next year.

As regards foreign supplies of live stock, it is evident that there may be some shortage in the United States, though not in Canada, nor in the River Plate next year, unless some unexpected development takes place. The latest official returns from the United States give the number of cattle for 1895 as only 50,868,000 head, compared with 53,095,568 in 1894, and 52,378,283 in 1893. The number of sheep has further decreased to 42,294,064 in 1895, as compared with 45,048,017 in 1894, 47,273,553 in 1892, and 48,322,331 in 1885. It is stated that supplies of sheep are still, however, in excess of home requirements, and that the export will continue for a time, even at low prices. The latest Canadian figures indicate no material change in the statistical position in that colony, the total number of cattle in Ontario, the principal province, being 2,099,301 in 1894, as compared with 2,057,882 in 1893; and of sheep 2,015,805 in 1894, compared with 1,935,938 in 1893.

The statistics available for the River Plate are not very reliable, but the rapid growth in exports alluded to in earlier paragraphs appears to indicate that there is no lack of available supplies of either cattle or sheep.

The course of prices attending this steady increase in importations has been an equally steadily declining one, top average values for prime New Zealand (North Canterbury) wether sheep having dropped from 5½d. per lb. in 1885, to 4½d. per lb. in 1888, and, after a recovery to 4¾d. per lb. in 1889, has since fallen by easy stages to 3½d. per lb. in 1895. The reduction in price has apparently borne a close relation to the growth of imports.

The consumption of frozen meats now amounts to an average of about 85,000 carcasses of mutton and lamb, and 6,000 quarters of beef weekly, and the daily sales now aggregate almost as much as the total import in the year 1881.

In view of the severe winter just passed through in New Zealand, and the recent serious drought in Australia, these colonies may be expected to ship short of their estimated capacity next year; but the River Plate will probably increase its output to a moderate extent; and contracts have been entered into to erect freezing plant and ship mutton to the extent of 50,000 to 100,000 carcasses per annum from Patagonia to the British markets.

It is satisfactory to find that the general trade of this country, as revealed by the monthly returns of the Board of Trade, has shown a steady growth for months

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past, and though at the close of the year there are some labour troubles to cloud the horizon, the great masses of the people not improbably earn more money now than they did a year ago, and may be confidently relied upon to spend a due proportion of their argumented earnings in the purchase of various kinds of animal food. Altogether the outlook is somewhat more encouraging than it was at the close of either of 1893 or 1894, and unless something unforeseen should occur, shippers of all kinds of frozen meats may look for fairly satisfactory returns, on average, during the coming year.

To the High Commissioner of Canada :

Through the courtesy and at the request of our good friends Messrs. George G. Gileriest & Co., Brokers, Victoria Street, Liverpool, we have been asked to furnish the High Commissioner of Canada with a few remarks likely to be of service to the Dominion government on the general aspect of the English Provision Trade for the year 1895.

HOG PRODUCTS.

A very severe depression has characterized the trade in these goods, and more especially in singed Wiltshire cut sides, during the greater part of the year from the same cause that has doubtless been at work in other branches of Commerce, namely, over-production, and this factor has at one time or another during the year driven prices down to a wretchedly low point when goods were sacrificed at tremendously heavy losses to shippers and curers, and sales were practical at from 30s. up to 36s. and occasionally up to 44s. for branded and unbranded fat and lean selections of Danish and continental goods, and at 38s. to 42s. and up to 48s., or even less, for ordinary and favoured brands of well known Irish curers bacon. The enormous importations of frozen mutton and fresh beef which have been flung recklessly on the English market year after year, have also contributed to the fall in the price of bacon, though it is satisfactory to notice that bacon has gone into consumption more freely since the middle of 1895, though even from that time until now it cannot be said to have exhibited much firmness. The highest quotations of the year were in August, when leading brands of Irish were held for 60s. to 70s., and Danish from 56s. to 58s., and Canadian "Pea-fed" Singed Sides from 52s. to 54s., but the frequent reductions which afterwards took place have counteracted the advances and the present currency is extremely low. English home cured bacon has had a large share of patronage on account of its very excellent quality and its low value. In this connection we may mention Canadian "Pea-fed" bacon has made most rapid progress in the estimation in which it is held by English consumers, and it is of importance to note that in addition to the other leading packers of Canadian bacon who ship regularly to the English market another leading firm in Montreal is making a specialty of this trade, and their productions are undoubtedly destined to take a leading position on the English markets. The English public appreciate Canadian meats and are willing to take them regularly at what would be very remunerative prices but for the violent fluctuations which are caused by the reckless and foolish flooding of the English market with very mildly cured Danish meat. Severe losses seem to make no check to this state of affairs and unexpectedly the British markets are suddenly deluged with this excessively mild cured meat. In this connection the following extract, as to the system adopted in the curing and marketing of Danish bacon as just described by a correspondent in the London Grocers' Gazette, may be of interest to you:—

"The farmers of a certain district form among themselves a guarantee fund of, say, £4,000, each putting down his name for the sum he is prepared to risk, and on the strength of this guarantee the bank advances them the £4,000, or such other sum as may be required, for the construction of a bacon-curing factory for the district in question. The bank also advances a further £500 for the payment of the preliminary working expenses. The factory is then constructed, replete with all the latest

methods in machinery, &c., and inclusive of large storage for the ice which forms so important an item in the work. In some instances a factory will have room for 50,000 tons of ice, which is gathered in during the winter at the cost only of the requisite labour, and is so stored that it lasts until the next winter. The factory is put in charge of a special staff, and the farmers devote their own energies solely to pig raising, for which purpose they have excellent stock of animals, while swine fever seems to be practically unknown. The farmers sell their pigs to the factory at full market rates, being paid at first out of the £500 already referred to. At the factory the pigs are killed and turned into either bacon or 'mess pork' for ships, and these products are in due course sent to London, where they are sold, and the London agent sends to Denmark a cheque for the amount due. The bank through which the whole thing is worked deducts its charges, which may come to 8 per cent, and the remainder stands to the credit of the factory for the payment of expenses and for eventual division among the farmers, in addition to the market rates they have already been paid for the pigs. There are now about 20 of these factories in Denmark, and, generally speaking, they have been established without any actual call being made on the guarantee funds. Altogether these factories will sometimes deal with 10,000 pigs in one week, and the total output has now attained such proportions that our imports of bacon from Denmark alone amounted last year to over 1,000,000 cwt."

We cannot help thinking, however, that this matter must sooner or later work out its own cure, and so good is the quality of Canadian meats, so highly appreciated and so steadily growing in value, that we feel sure that there is an exceedingly brilliant future in store for the Canadian packers. There is one point, however, that the Canadian Packers will require to pay the closest attention to, that is, to the mildness of the meat. The tendency of the Canadian packers is to pack their meat too salt, more especially their "fancy cuts" such as Cumberlands, etc. Another point that Canadian packers are only just awakening up to is, that instead of devoting the whole of their attention, or nearly the whole of their attention, to what is known as singed Wiltshire cut, which is so very much affected by the fluctuations of Danish markets, they will be able to obtain a wider selection of hogs by devoting their attention to the other cuts in request on the British markets.

CHEESE.

With regard to the American and Canadian cheese business, the season of 1895 opened with exceedingly low prices, and, owing to the losses which have been sustained, all holders of fall made cheese have acted with the greatest caution, but certainly the caution was justified, for, taking the whole season through, the demand has never yet come up to the supply. The summer make of Canadian cheese has not been considered by the British Public up to the average quality, and there are heavy stocks on hand which it is probable there will be further losses on. There are also large stocks of cold storage cheese. These cold storage cheese have not kept anything like as well as in previous years and will have to be cleared out at low prices. The fall made cheese has been much more satisfactory and the public have appreciated it, but even the demand for this high-class article is at the present time of a very uncertain character. The great feature of competition which is springing up around the Canadian cheese trade is the magnificent quality of the cheese which begins to arrive here from New Zealand about the months of January and February. At the present time really magnificent goods are being offered at 40s. as against Canadian Septembers at 46s. or 47s., and, unquestionably, the quality of the New Zealand is exceedingly fine. Another factor that the Canadian cheese makers will have to take notice of is that a fortnightly service of steamers direct to Liverpool and Manchester is being inaugurated for the carriage of Australian and New Zealand produce, and this will help the Northern trade of England which is carrying the war into the stronghold of Canadian cheese on the British markets.

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BUTTER.

The great feature of the butter season of 1895 was the remarkably low prices that ruled, certainly the lowest prices in the memory of many merchants here. Take, for instance, Cork butters which were quoted at 65s. per cwt. certainly the lowest price ever known. It is a price that a few years ago the lowest quality of butter exceeded. All through May, June and July and into early August this state of affairs continued. It was caused by what may be considered an exceptional state of affairs. Into this country have poured Australian and other butters from distant parts of the globe. A quantity altogether beyond the capacity of the country. Large quantities of these remained unsold when the new grass Irish butter came into the market. This state of affairs compelled the holders of foreign butter to force sales rather than face the cost of warehousing and other charges during the season. The goods were simply thrown away reckless of cost and in a panic to get out. It can only be hoped that the lesson which this state of affairs should have taught will not be lost sight of by shippers from Australia and other countries, more especially from the Argentine, which seems inclined to follow the disastrous policy pursued by the Australian shippers last year. The quantity consigned from these countries was altogether apart from any consideration of prudence or probable requirements of the markets. It can easily be understood that when supplies are poured in by shippers from all parts of the world without any concerted action or any information to guide them, the position can only end in a glut and a disaster to consignors. We think, however, that the experience of the last year may to some extent work out its own cure. It is beginning to be understood by the shippers from Australia that goods cannot be shipped right across the world, refrigerated, and bear the heavy expenses and charges incidental to such a trade without entailing heavy losses, and that shipments must be regulated so that the bulk of the foreign made butter will be cleared before the new home grass made butter begins to appear on the market.

With regard to the Canadian butters. There is no doubt about it that they are growing in appreciation on the English market, but a word of warning may be appropriately given to the Canadian shippers now who are looking forward to a large business on this market. We would warn them that in the Argentine they have a reckless opponent, liable at any time, owing to the position of the gold premium, to flood the British markets and so cause heavy losses. We should advise that their shipments to their clients on this side of the water on consignment should be regulated strictly by their daily cable advices, and that they should endeavour to fit the English market sending small shipments at a time, *but regularly*, and so avoid an ever present danger. It is no doubt a very great temptation when a parcel of butter or cheese has been shipped to Great Britain, and has realized a profit to the shipper, to supplement it by a shipment twice as large, or three or four times as large, and this is the cause of the disasters which occur. Shippers of Canadian butter are living in a fool's paradise if they think they can jump largely into the English trade. Bear in mind that the competition is growing from all parts of the world. Therefore, our advice would be, to act with caution and we think the results will be satisfactory.

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BUTTER.

It will be seen that the importations of butter continue to rapidly increase. The great feature of the statistics is the development of the trade from Denmark and from Australasia. It is satisfactory to notice also that the exports from Canada last year were much greater than those in 1894, although still behind the figures for 1893. When it is stated, however, that the contribution of Canada was only £153,401, out of a total of £14,245,230, it will be seen what a splendid opportunity exists for the expansion of Canadian trade in this direction. The inquiries that have been made indicate a substantial improvement in the quality of the butter from the Dominion, although in many respects there is still room for improvement. The action of the Canadian Government in taking steps to promote the increase of the trade, has attracted considerable attention in agricultural and in commercial circles. If the business should expand to the extent that is expected, and if Professor Robertson's prophecy that in a few years the butter trade will equal that in cheese, is realized, it will be seen from the figures that have been quoted, that no difficulty will be experienced in disposing of the article, always assuming that it is of good and regular quality.

As an instance of the rapid manner in which the trade has been developed, I may mention that in 1870, and even in 1880, the exports of butter and bacon from Denmark to Great Britain were comparatively small. It will be seen, however, that in 1895, the export of butter from that country was valued at £5,948,463; bacon at £2,504,697, and eggs at £417,709. This is almost entirely the consequence of the stimulus given to the dairy trade by the Danish government.

Messrs. William Titley & Sons, of Bristol, write:—

Butter.—We have shipped several thousand packages Canadian creameries this season, and on the whole, quality has been fairly good, but it is not nearly fine enough or sufficiently uniform in quality to compare favourably with Danish, Australian, or the best French butters. We have had several very fine parcels, and on the strength of these have ordered more with the result that the succeeding lots have not been nearly as good. The principal faults are, either the butter is too salt or that there is too much moisture left in, and that it has not been shipped soon enough and was consequently stale. Your butter makers must find means to get rid of the large amount of whey that still remains in the butter. This, of course, goes sour and the flavour of the butter is thereby spoilt. Then it ought not to be a difficult thing to use only sufficient salt, and that of the right grain, to ensure it keeping a reasonable time. We think directly the butter is made it should at once be put into a refrigerator, and in no part of its progress from the factory to our side should it be subjected to any heat. We see no reason why Canadian butter should not be as good as Australasian, and as far as we are concerned, we would much rather do business in Canada, as owing to our proximity the business is much more easily controlled."

Messrs. Peterson & Co., of Glasgow, write:—

Butter.—Shipments to our port have not been large, and the quantity consumed in this district has been comparatively small, most of the receipts here having been disposed of to East Coast markets or to Midland, England. The quality has been an improvement on anything received of late years, and while flavour has not been so delicate and attractive as finest Danish, yet it must be acknowledged that the Canadian butter has been on the whole a creditable production."

Mr. John T. Warrington, of 49 Tooley St., London:—

Butter.—There seems more or less a demand springing up for this article in London, and if greater facilities were offered in the way of refrigerator transport, and more convenient packages such as 56 lbs. square boxes I think the trade could be made into a good steady business. The quality of the finest creameries is very fine, and if it were only made milder, that is, less salted—would suit the London market admirably."

Mr. Henry Robertson of Dundee, writes:—"In answer to your inquiry regarding butter and cheese, my experience during the past season was again very mixed but the most unsatisfactory lots were of late made October and November production. My opinion as to the cause is that owing to short supplies of butter on this side and the price consequently advancing considerably, the producers in Canada had set themselves to stimulate the cows by extra feeding, which caused a strong development of oily taste in the butter.

Messrs. Houston of 30 Cochrane St., Glasgow, write:—"In reply to your request for my report as to Canadian produce handled by me during the past year, I may mention it has been quite a pleasure to handle anadian goods of all kinds.

"The improvement is specially noted on creamery, which has been of very uniform quality and being put up in 56 lb. boxes there has been very little waste to the retailer in this country. Of course there are quantities which have arrived in the old style, viz.: tubs, but my opinion is that the sooner they are abolished the better.

"During the scarcity here as high as 140s. per 112 lbs. was obtained on this market for choicest creamery."

Messrs Crew, Widgey & Co., of Bristol, write:—"Replying to your inquiry we have already written Prof. Robertson asking him to recommend Canadian farmers to pack all butters in future in 56 lb. square boxes similar to those sent from Australia and New Zealand, and to discontinue entirely the old fashioned tub at present in use in Canada. We are convinced that Canadian butter all round would realize from one to two cents more packed in boxes, and being the largest importers of Canadian butter in Great Britain our opinion is based on wide experience and the result of extensive inquiries during the past two years."

CHEESE.

There was a slight falling off in the quantity of cheese imported, particularly from the United States, and it is well known that the prices were not up to the level of those that have prevailed in previous years. The imports from Canada showed a slight increase. In fact the cheese from the Dominion is larger in quantity than from all the other countries put together, from which cheese is imported. Fewer complaints than usual have reached me as to quality, but it will be seen that the desirability of the branding of the cheese with the month of its manufacture is still referred to. In my correspondence, some other suggestions are thrown out in different districts, both as to the quality of cheese and as to the packing, which deserve the attention of the trade. There is no doubt that Canadian cheese enjoys a very high reputation on the market, and if it is maintained no reason appears to exist why the Dominion should not retain the premier position it now occupies.

The following are extracts from letters that have reached me on the subject:—

Messrs William Titley & Sons, of Bristol:—

"*Cheese.*—We do not consider quality this year has been up to the usual standard. During the summer, we had several shipments of very hard poor cheese. Possibly this might have been the result of unfavourable weather, but we think had also to do with the make. There is much improvement needed in the boxing of cheese; the wood so often used not being strong enough to bear the weight. When cheese arrive in broken boxes, they soon get out of condition and it always interferes with the sale. This may seem a little matter to you but it is most important on this side. The cheese should all be marked with the date of the month in which they are made, and we think you ought to have an act to make this compulsory, and a heavy penalty for any breach of the law."

Mr. Arthur J. Rowson, of 35 Tooley St., London:—"In reply to your esteemed inquiry, I have the pleasure to report as follows:—

"Canadian cheese have shown good average quality during the whole of the season, and there has been an absence of any one month's make showing up inferior

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as in other seasons, in fact, I should say taken as a whole this season has shown some improvement on its predecessors.

“Owing to a succession of bad markets some people have placed blame on quality, but I think there are no just grounds for complaint.

“Canadian farmers can have no hope of a season of high prices unless the Act of God produces a great drought.”

Messrs. Peterson & Co., of Glasgow:—“Cheese have shown regularity of quality and carefulness of handling, when the variations of heat are taken into account. The same complaint which we made last year has again to be repeated, namely, a considerable proportion of the factories received have had a tendency to hardness of texture, and as the popular demand in this district runs more and more on a soft creamy cheese, the amount of public favour extended to Canadian has not increased but rather the reverse.

“The sale has further been interfered with by the large make and very low price of Scotch cheese, so that the amount consumed here has been certainly much under the average.

“Prices have kept up fairly well owing to the very short supplies from the United States, otherwise we should have had a sick market, and a very unsatisfactory finish, which we do not think is now likely to be the case.

“We would again emphasize the necessity of avoiding the hard brittle texture in cheese, if the demand is to be kept up and increased in this country.”

Mr. John T. Warrington, of 49 Tooley St., London:—“This article is steadily growing in public favour and the Canadians, I consider, want to take the greatest possible care in keeping up their good reputation for this article. A great many complaints have been made during this season about the Western Canadian cheese being made too dry, and just the reverse has been the complaint about a large proportion of those made in the province of Quebec, also in this province the shape of the cheese is frequently far from desirable. Great dissatisfaction is still expressed that the Canadian Government has not taken any steps to enforce the compulsory branding of the date the cheese is made, on its side, so that one could always be sure that he was getting what he had bought when ordering. If no notice is taken of this I consider it will greatly militate against business in future. It is a very frequent thing to hear importers complain that they have had a different month's make tendered them than they bought.”

The Scottish Co-operative Wholesale Society, Leith:—“I am in receipt of yours regarding Canadian cheese, but have no special observation to make on the subject.

“We do a fairly large and satisfactory trade in Canadian cheese which seems to point to the fact that buyers appreciate the quality which our Canadian friends manufacture and export.”

Mr. Henry Robertson, 12 South Lindsay St., Dundee:—“Regarding cheese, the taste among the great bulk of consumers is for mild, soft, meaty character, but the Canadian makers seem to lose sight of the fact that the natural creamy flavour is the first quality to be produced and retained, and that the use of any sort of acids or chemicals which reduce or deprive the cheese of that character is a mistake.

The Co-operative Wholesale Society, London:—“In reply to your inquiry *re* Canadian provisions, I may say that they have given us the utmost satisfaction during the year, and so far as cheese is concerned, they are steadily cutting out United States cheese; in fact, in the south and west of England we do not use any States whatever.”

Mr. Archibald Houston, 30 Cochrane Street, Glasgow:—“Cheese on the whole has been about the usual quality, although earlier makes were not so good as former

years, being inclined to be sour and acid, but the August make was exceptionally fine, and were taken on this market in preference to September States, and realized as high prices."

I have called the attention of the departments concerned on more than one occasion to the desirability of an endeavour being made to secure a footing in the market here, and on the continent, for fancy cheeses, such as Gruyère, etc. The taste for this article is increasing in the United Kingdom. There is also a large demand on the continent, and the following particulars may be interesting to the trade. I commend the matter to the notice of the Department of Agriculture and to the dairy experts throughout the Dominion:—

"The course of the cheese market in 1895 has been marked by a serious decline in values which was largely due to the accumulation of stocks. These were, however, gradually disposed of, and a substantial recovery in price took place, but quotations remain considerably below the level of 1894. The causes may be found (1) in the rapid development of cheese making in the United Kingdom, on the factory system, and (2) to the intervention of further outside competition, and in this connection I refer more particularly to the exports from New Zealand and Australia. The receipts from this quarter appear now regularly in the monthly returns of the Board of Trade, and some idea of their growth recently may be gathered from the following figures:—

The tendency of the competition, therefore, will probably be to increase rather than decrease, and the question of an alternative market for the growing output of the Canadian cheese industry becomes a matter of some importance. It is hardly necessary for me to say that an alternative market must mean to some extent the manufacture of varieties of cheese other than cheddar, and competition with the leading cheeses of Switzerland, Holland and Italy, in the foreign markets of these countries.

"The consumption of the English market in Dutch (Edam and Gonda), Swiss (Gruyère) and Italian (Gorgonzola) cheeses is large, apart from the re-exports of these cheeses through the channels of British trade and tropical countries, where the first two countries find a considerable market. The United Kingdom imported and re-exported the following quantities of cheese, mainly of the above varieties, during the last three years:—

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“ A most favourable opportunity and one lying ready at hand consists in gaining access to the French market which is a very large consumer of imported cheeses from the countries in question. The Swiss or Gruyère cheese is the most important class of cheese consumed in France, where it holds the same position in popular esteem that Cheddar cheese does in this country. It is followed by Dutch cheese (Fromage d'Hollande) which is much appreciated in the southern departments, where the imports of cheese, are almost entirely confined to this variety. The imports of cheese, into France in 1894 amounted to 20,284,933 kilogrs. (44,708,000 lbs.) valued at fcs. 26,979,027 (say \$5,400,000) of which under one quarter was re-exported. It will be remembered that in concluding the Franco-Canadian convention in 1893, letters were exchanged by the Plenipotentiaries agreeing on a basis for the addition of Canadian cheese to the list of articles conceded to the Dominion for minimum tariff treatment in return for a reduction of the duty in the Canadian tariff on pictures, prints, engravings, etc., from 20 per cent to 5 per cent.

“ The French general tariff on cheese is 25 francs per 100 kilogrs. and the minimum tariff is 15 frs. Since the 16th August last the minimum rate on *Gruyère cheese alone* has been reduced to 12 frs. per 100 kilogrammes.

“ At the time when the offer referred to was made, France and Switzerland had been unable to agree on the question of tariffs, with the result that each country imposed its highest scale of duties on the other's exports. Switzerland providing practically 65 per cent of the French imports of cheese was thus handicapped to a very serious extent by the heavy duty. This position of affairs it was anticipated would have been Canada's advantage had the proposal in question been carried out. France, however, has recently arranged matters with Switzerland and the French minimum tariff is now in operation on imports from that country. The offer therefore has no longer the same value to Canada. At the same time the French proposal is worthy of every consideration, seeing that the loss in revenue to Canada it would involve, on the basis of the tax returns available (1893-4) would amount to only \$1,182. Canada it is true does not make as yet the varieties of cheese mentioned, but the manufacture of Gruyère cheese alone made from skim milk would seem to be an admirable *side industry*, in connection with the winter butter making on the creamery system, for the winter months, for the development of which such great efforts are now being made in Canada. It is not unreasonable to assume that the alternative markets of France and of the United Kingdom—not to mention the United States—are wide enough to afford an outlet for any quantity of these cheeses Canada would be able at present to furnish.”

The following *data* have been compiled from information furnished to me by H. M. Consular officers in France:—

“ The countries chiefly supplying France with cheese are: Switzerland, Holland and Italy; whilst those to which French-made cheese is chiefly exported from France are: The United Kingdom, Italy, the United States of America and Algeria.

“ With regard more particularly to the Cheese trade of *Bordeaux*, the total importations and exportations (from, and to *all* foreign countries) during each of the last two years were respectively as follows:—

“ It will be seen from the above figures that the total importations increased, whilst the exportations decreased in 1894, compared with the year preceding.

“ The share taken by the United Kingdom in the cheese trade of *Bordeaux* during the last two years will appear from the following figures to have been comparatively inconsiderable, viz.:—

About 90 per cent of all cheese importations to Bordeaux came from Holland, about 5 per cent from Switzerland, and the remaining 5 per cent from the United Kingdom, Italy and other countries.

"The more important kinds of French cheese, nearly all of which may be found in the Bordeaux market, are:—

Marolles, Brie, Camembert, Neufchâtel, (Seine Infu) Livarot, (Calvados) Coulomier, Pont l'Eveque and Auvergne. French (so-called) Gruyère is also extensively made in this country. The preceding sorts are made from cow's milk.

"The best kinds of cheese made from goat's or from sheep's milk are produced in the departments of Isère, Cévennes and Avignon, but the well-known "Roquefort" cheese made in the department last named, is generally considered superior to any other kind of French (or foreign cheese). Nearly eight or nine hundred thousand sheep are kept in Avignon for the purpose of cheese production—the principal centres where the "Roquefort" cheese is produced being Saint Affrique, Millan and Lodeve, as also Treves and Carmarque, in that department.

"Another kind of cheese (from sheep's milk) frequently met with in the Bordeaux market is Port-Salut which is made by the Trappist Monks at Port-du-Salut.

In addition to the above named cheeses, French cheese of good quality (though under no particularly well-known name) is made in the Departments of Vosges, Jura, Doubs, Ain, Savoie, Pyrennes, Meuse and Yonne.

(The octroi duty on cheese at Bordeaux is 10 francs per 100 kilos, which is equivalent to 4s. 1d. per cwt.

These prices do not include customs duties.

Before closing my remarks on the subject of the cheese trade it is necessary to refer to an unfounded charge that was brought against Canadian cheese last autumn in one of the Scottish agricultural papers. It was stated that a considerable proportion of Canadian cheese was adulterated. I at once brought the matter to the notice of the Government, with the result that I was placed in a position to give an unqualified denial to the statement in question. The paper which made the charge at once withdrew it and so far from having done the trade any harm, it seemed to emphasize the purity of Canadian cheese, a subject which was much commented upon for some weeks afterwards in the press of the United Kingdom.

EGGS.

The trade in eggs is also increasing, as will be seen from the tables, the total value of the imports now being £4,003,440. The exports from Canada appear to be increasing gradually, and as Canadian eggs become better known, they will probably be in greater demand. I have referred to this matter so fully in previous reports that it is unnecessary to go over the ground again. I am, however, watching the matter very carefully, and will write to you from time to time with any suggestions that occur to me as likely to result in an improvement in the trade.

Messrs. William Titley & Sons, of Bristol, write:—“ *Eggs*—We have had several consignments, both of fresh and pickled which we have been able to dispose of advantageously to the shippers. The mode of packing and size of case is just what is wanted and if the quality can only be maintained, there will be a large business done in this article.”

The Continental Egg Company, Grimsby, write:—“ We are obliged for your esteemed favour, but we have no suggestions to offer to Sir Charles Tupper. We are glad to say the trade is working into steady regular lines, and has certainly been more satisfactory this year than in previous years.

“ The undersigned leaves for Canada in April with the object of making further and more extensive arrangements for supplies. This we presume is a significant proof that as far as we are concerned the trade is satisfactory.”

POULTRY.

Canada has not yet participated to any extent in this business. A few isolated shipments come over every Christmas, and they are more or less successful according to the condition of the birds when they arrive, and of the markets at the time of their arrival. Most of the consignments of this year went to Liverpool, which is an important distributing centre. A few have also made their way indirectly to London, Bristol and Glasgow. In my previous reports, I have referred to the extensive market in our large cities and towns for poultry, especially during the winter months, as well as at Christmas time, and I quite expect to see a development of this trade, now that the steamers are considering the desirability of providing refrigerating accommodation. If proper arrangements can be made for a regular trade, advantage could no doubt be taken also of the cold storage accommodation that is now found in the leading markets in Great Britain.

Mr. Dyke, the Liverpool agent, writes to me as follows with regard to the shipments that have recently been made:—

“ In response to your request for a special and separate report on any turkeys and poultry recently imported, I have to inform you that during the month of December, 1,058 packages of turkeys arrived at Liverpool. They were nearly all

from United States ports, but they were Canadian birds. The Ontario shipper who has either brought or sent a consignment each year for the past seventeen years, had about 100 barrels, all in the feather, experience having shown him that this is by far the best way in which to pack. This gentleman engages part of a warehouse, and retails the birds, and naturally having been in the business so long he has secured a large number of regular customers. This year the consignment arrived in the usual first rate condition about a week before Christmas, and was cleared out in a few days at the following prices (in the feather and undrawn) :—

“ A firm to whom a large consignment was made (158 barrels and cases) inform me that these birds were mostly in the feather, and in good order. They express a decided preference for this style of packing. Their consignment was sold in bulk to various dealers and brought from 6½d. to 8d. per lb. They have only one complaint to make, and that is with regard to the markings on the packages. A case marked say ‘twenty birds, average weight 12 lbs.,’ would be found to contain birds of various sizes ranging from 9 lbs. to 16 lbs. I would once again urge shippers to keep the birds in each case or barrel as near one size as possible; this will possibly save some loss, and much trouble and annoyance will be avoided.

“ Another large consignment was received by one of the principal Liverpool wholesale and retail poultry dealers. They came dressed, and the condition, while it may be described as good, was not so satisfactory as in the case of those which were packed unplucked. For obvious reasons I am unable to give the prices realized.

“ A firm of general agents received 20 cases—408 birds, plucked and drawn. They were in bad order, and the dealer to whom they were handed for sale was unable to return more than 5d. per lb. for the lot. There is a great difference between this price for a dressed bird and the average of 8½d. obtained by the first mentioned shipper for birds in the feather and undrawn.

“ One New Brunswick shipper accompanied a consignment, fortunately not a very large one, and arrived with it a few days after Christmas, when the market was over. With some difficulty a portion was disposed of at 6d., but it was thought that the remainder (which was put into the cold storage) would have to be sold very cheap.

“ Four barrels of geese—in the feather—arrived in good order, and were sold in bulk at 5d. per lb.

“ The cool weather affected the birds favourably, and I am sure that taken altogether, shippers have every reason to be satisfied with the results.”

The total imports of poultry and game in 1894 were £480,884, of which only £1,147 came from British possessions. Of the balance, France contributed £222,909, and Belgium £118,355. The countries next in order were Holland, £48,092, Russia £43,289, and Germany, £27,115.

APPLES.

The import of apples in 1895 was smaller than in the previous year, no doubt owing to the large local crop, which had to be disposed of before any considerable import of Canadian apples became possible. Still, however, Canadian apples have become so popular that a fair trade has been done, but larger importations are expected during the spring months of the keeping varieties, as the English crop is now about exhausted.

I have received many interesting letters upon the subject from my correspondents, and I quote some of the letters :—

Messrs. Simons, Jacobs & Co., of Glasgow :—

“ The Canadian apple season, 1895, has been in happy and marked contrast to that of 1894. The fruit for the most part has arrived in excellent condition, and

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there has been a gratifying absence of that false packing, technically known as 'deaconing,' which was unfortunately too frequently evident then. The prices, too, up to the end of the year have resulted favourably for all concerned in the trade, and the present season is worthy of notice on account of an exceptional feature, namely, that while Europe has been full of apples, the demand for American fruit, especially Canadian, has been equally as strong as, if not stronger than, what has been exhibited in years of European scarcity. The absence of quality in connection with home supplies is no doubt the cause to which this is to be attributed. It is estimated that about 70,000 barrels have arrived in Scotland. The average price for Baldwins and other good red varieties may be reckoned as about 17s.; Greenings, 14s. to 15s. Just now prices are considerably higher than these figures, but the averages stated may be taken as a fair representation of what has been actually done. Unfortunately arrivals at this date are very much out of condition, having evidently been chilled and heat generated in course of conveyance, but really good fruit would realize quite as much as usual."

Messrs. Ivens & Co., of Bristol:—"In reply to your circular, the imports of Canadian apples to Bristol this season have been very small, we believe only a few hundred barrels, which have sold slowly from 8/ to 15/ per barrel. This we think is owing to a very large apple crop this year in the west of England."

Messrs. W. N. White & Co., of Covent Garden:—"I am in receipt of your favour *re* apples from Canada during the past year. I must say that the supplies for the season 1895-96 have only been about half of 1894-95. This is partly owing to the very large crop in this country and also to the partial crop in Canada. The fruit has been of better quality than the previous season; so much so that last year the Canadian apples were the lowest as compared with the United States, where this year they are the best and are realizing much higher prices than the American. The fruit seems to be of a more healthy character and of better keeping quality; and we think now for the remainder of the season they will realize good prices.

A slight departure has been made by one or two shippers by sending their apples in boxes instead of barrels. We do not approve of the change and have written out to tell them so. Our customers and buyers are used to receiving barrels of a certain size, and if the fruit is fairly packed, no small fruit in the centre, and free from worm, the barrels will do better than the boxes, although the latter have come forward for 4 or 5 different sales. But results have fully borne out our ideas that the buyers do not care for them in boxes."

Messrs. J. Adam & Son, of Liverpool:—"In response to your circular we beg to offer the following remarks *re* Canadian apples:—

"So far this season business has been only moderate, due principally to the heavy yield of apples in this country and on the continent, which left no opening for falls from the Dominion. Fair values, however, have prevailed for stock at all good, but samples in many instances were not first-class, particularly of spies, which is always a favoured variety on this market, and one that sells well. The grading and packing too has not been up to the usual standard, but no doubt there will be an improvement in remaining shipments, as apples &c., packed in fruit house, are always better in this respect than those put up in the orchard.

"We notice there is a growing desire on the part of small growers to send forward their own produce, but for our own part we do not advise this as mixed sorts, say two or three barrels each, cannot be handled to such advantage as can lines of over 20 barrels of the same variety and brand, in fact the longer the trade remains in the hands of experienced packers, the better it will be for all concerned."

Messrs. Watson & Phillip, of Dundee:—"We have your circular letter in regard to the apple trade in Canada, and we take the liberty to make the following suggestions as we are distinctly of opinion that the system of trading can be amended to the benefit both of Canadian shippers and the receivers on this side.

"At present the trade is done in what is called 'assorted' apples, *i. e.*, in purchasing 500 barrels the lot will consist of 8 or 10 varieties, comprising Kings, Baldwins, Northern Spies, Russets, Greenings, and a number of other similar kinds, these sorts being allocated at the will of the shipper after the purchase is made.

"We are strongly of opinion that each of the varieties ought to be sold by itself on its merits and code books arranged accordingly. Further, at present these assorted apples are in many cases invoiced as 'assorted' apples, and the kinds and quantities of each kind are unknown to the receiver until after the arrival of the steamers on this side, when the lots have to be divided into their different varieties and thus for the first time does the receiver know what he really has bought, whereas had he been exactly informed at first of the actual facts as to his purchase he might have been selling the goods a fortnight before their arrival. There are no second-hand buyers on this side who will purchase apples without knowing the kinds they are buying. Otherwise we think the trade is conducted on the right lines."

Messrs. Williams & Co., of Glasgow:—"Most of the Canadian apples sold in this port this season were purchased in Canada and not sent on commission. Of those sent we have found high prices to rule for really fine stock, up to 26s. for Kings and from 15s. to 20s. for other fine varieties. It is always of the highest importance that only selected stock should be shipped (as the freight is the same) and inferior wasty arrivals demoralize the market."

Messrs. Macgeorge and Jardine, of Liverpool:—"In reply to your circular we can report little of general interest with special regard to Canadian apples this season.

"Our statistics do not keep them separate from American apples as regards quantities.

"Although there has been a large apple crop this year in the United States it has been located chiefly too far west for shipment to this country and the Eastern States being short of fruit, the quantities sent have been comparatively light, thus favouring the demand for Canadian apples here.

"Total arrivals of apples to this market this season have been some 280,000 barrels as against 650,000 barrels at same date last season.

"On the other hand, the English crop of apples has this year been so large it has been a great surprise to many that our market should have been able to take the quantity it has done at remunerative prices, since home grown apples of equal quality have been obtainable at much less money.

"The explanation of this is the superior packing and greater uniformity of classing of American and Canadian fruit, which, perhaps, owing to the more limited holdings of farmers here and the absence of a middle man or packer (the farmers marketing their own crop themselves) who by getting large quantities together might be able to assort parcels as to sizes and qualities. This has been specially marked as to green apples, which preponderate here and were so abundant and cheap that it was thought Canadian greenings would have no chance here this season, and yet on account of their more even running size and better style of packing they are the description which have perhaps made best profits for shippers.

"The only suggestion we have to make is that more care should be observed by the Canadians in marking the description of apples on each barrel. There is seldom a mistake in this respect in American shipments while through pure carelessness there are frequent errors (and sometimes we fear wilfully an inferior description is marked a better one) in Canadians."

Messrs. Keeling and Hunt, of London:—"Apples—From the province of Nova Scotia we have during the season received several parcels of apples of very good quality and showy in appearance. Much better than those received during the last few seasons, the fruit being clean, bright and of good size. They were disposed of as usual by public auction, the result generally being moderate prices, owing to the

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heavy supply of our own crop at the time, but which is now practically cleared. This should much improve the value of those Nova Scotians that have yet to come forward, provided they reach here in sound condition and free from frost.

With regard to selection and packing, those that we have received have in this respect been excellent, leaving nothing to be desired.

“Great care is at all times necessary in selecting fruit for this market, and too much care cannot be given to the packing. Brands so treated soon become known, to the advantage of the sender.

“All soft, common and doubtful fruit should be disposed of on the local market.”

Messrs. Houghton & Co., of Liverpool:—“We have pleasure in handing you the following observations in reply to your communication respecting Canadian apples. The arrivals to Liverpool so far this season fall considerably short of those for the same period last season. This is partly accounted for by the fact that during the present season a very limited quantity of Canadian fall apples was sent here, shippers waiting until they could send the genuine winter stock, and we fancy that this has been found the best policy. The early fall apples generally arrive in poor condition, and, as they are not of keeping quality, they require to be pushed off quickly into consumption here, so that it sometimes happens that our market is flooded with low-priced non-keeping apples, just before the good-keeping winter fruit comes on. In this way the demand is in a measure forestalled and a needless low range of prices established in this country. Good red varieties are most in request by the British public, and it is notable that this season’s ‘Greenings’ have formed the bulk of Canadian shipments. Canadian apples are now thoroughly well-known and appreciated by the trade and throughout the country, and their consumption does not require any artificial stimulating. Prices are, of course, regulated by the supply and the arrivals from other sources. It is most important that shippers should maintain a high standard both of quality and in excellence of packing.”

The visit of Mr. Faville, of the School of Horticulture at Wolfville, Nova Scotia, attracted a good deal of attention in the press, and I have no doubt he has acquired information that may be most useful to the shippers in the maritime provinces, as well as in other parts of Canada. There is a possibility also that in the future a trade may be developed with France and Germany. There is a large consumption of apples in those countries, and if the trade can be initiated, there is little doubt that it will expand and tend to increase the markets for Canadian apples.

According to the detailed returns for 1894, the value of apples imported in that year was £1,389,421, the countries participating in the trade, according to the value of their importations being: Canada, £317,154; United States, £438,114; Belgium, £289,562; France, £124,399; Holland, £116,677; Portugal, £18,168, and Germany, £15,152. About £65,000 worth of apples also came from Australasia, but of course they do not in any way interfere with the Canadian trade, arriving, as they do, principally towards the middle of the summer season.

HORSES.

The following statistics relate to the importation of horses :

The *Sporting Life* of 22nd January, had an interesting article on the subject of the horse trade, which I think might with advantage be reproduced :—

The *Sporting Life*, January 22, 1896 :—

“The year 1895 has been marked by a very important increase in our foreign trade in horses, both imports and exports being larger in numbers and values than has ever before been the case, the most remarkable feature having been the great increase in the imports from Canada and the United States. Some idea of the growth shown by the figures this year is given in the following comparison of the details of the trade during the past twenty-two years :—

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During the whole of the seventies attention was being directed to the need we had of improving our horses, but it was not until the early eighties that the various national horse shows were established. These brought about an increase in our exports, and a very considerable decrease in our imports, but the latter has been entirely lost during the past two years. The increase in our exports is, however, still satisfactory, although there is one feature about them that is not. Hitherto the average value per head of our exports have been higher than that of our imports, but in 1895 the position is, for the first time, reversed.

VALUES PER HEAD.

This is shown in the following table, in which I give the values per head of the horses exported and imported during the past two years:—

It will thus be seen that our exports of breeding stock are of superior value to those imported, but that our geldings, or work animals, are inferior, and that it is the great number of these that reduce the average of the whole to a lower value than the imported animals.

OUR EXPORTS.

So far as our exports are concerned there is not much that need be said. Their chief interest is concentrated in the exports of breeding stock, and for this our chief customers were Belgium (1,335 mares and 16 stallions), Holland (729 mares and 2 stallions), France (702 mares and 4 stallions), the United States (30 mares and 16 stallions), and Canada (23 mares and 16 stallions), 'all other countries' taking 741 mares and 530 stallions between them. By far the greater bulk of our exports are geldings, and of these Belgium takes 8,777, or more than half, Holland coming next with 4,859, and then France with 2,982. Only very small numbers are sent to any other country.

OUR GROWING IMPORTS.

It is not to our exports, however, that the chief attention ought to be directed, but rather to the enormous increase in our imports. The preparations which are being made to extend this trade from Canada, Australia, and the United States indicate that not only has the foreigner secured a not unimportant slice of our horse trade, but that this will be materially increased in the immediate future. It is, therefore, very useful for us to note the countries now sending us horses, and the extent of the trade with each. This information I have prepared in the following tables, in which I give the full details for 1894 extracted from the annual report on foreign trade, while those for 1895, are extracted and prepared from less detailed monthly report for December and the year which has just been issued. The first

table gives the number of horses imported into the United Kingdom in 1894 and 1895, and the countries from which they come, and is as follows:—

The imports from Canada have thus increased by no less than 7,484 head, and from the United States by 5,508 head, a total increase from these two countries of no less than 12,992 head, or considerably more than the total increase, which is only 11,043 head. Russia seems to have almost entirely dropped out of the market, while there is an appreciable decline in the numbers sent from Germany, the Argentine, and Belgium.

THE VALUES OF OUR IMPORTS.

The values of these imports have gone up in greater proportion than the numbers, owing probably to the higher quality of the Canadian and American horses. The following table gives the values prepared in the same way as the above table, but with an important addition for 1894. In that year we have also the values of certain "unenumerated" horses, amounting in the aggregate to £55,444, and these are included in the following statement. The corresponding figures for 1895 will not be published till about August, but they will have to be added to the following figures for that year:—

[NOTE.—Omitting the £55,444 for unenumerated horses, for which no numbers are given in 1894, the grand total for that year would be £548,058, which is the value of the horses of which the numbers are actually given in the previous table. The increase in the trade which can be actually compared is thus—£374,757, or about 37 per cent.]

This table shows us that in values, as in numbers, the total increase is more than made up by the increase in the values of Canadian and American horses, the total increase being £319,313, and the increases in the value of Canadian (£188,178) and American (£165,656) imports no less than £353,834.

BRITISH OR FOREIGN SUPPLIES.

A very interesting feature of these tables is the indication they give of how far we are dependent on our own possessions and empire and how far on foreign countries. Speaking roundly, they show us that we obtain about one quarter of our horse imports from British possessions, for which we pay about one-third of the total sum we expend. This speaks well for the quality of the horses sent us from Canada. As the trade with the Dominion is still in its infancy, and as Australasia is also about to commence supplying our markets, the proportion of animals we are likely to receive from our own colonies will very probably be largely increased in the near future.

The imports from Canada have expanded very rapidly, in fact more horses were imported from Canada last year than from any other country, and I venture to think that this result is not entirely unconnected with the attention devoted to this matter in my report for the last few years. Mr. Hunting, F.R.C.V.S., has rendered me valuable assistance in this matter; and I quote a further report he has made on the

trade during the past year. I commend his recommendations to the consideration of those engaged in the trade, as no one is able to speak with more authority on this subject than Mr. Hunting:—

“The horses imported from Canada continue to give great satisfaction to purchasers. They possess good limbs and sound constitutions, and stand the test of hard work.

“The most useful and saleable class is the ‘light vanner,’ suitable for work in omnibusses and mineral-water vans—a horse about 16 hands high and weighing from eleven to 12 hundred pounds. This animal must have courage and activity, with as much quality as possible, and be clean of limb. It should be at least five years old, and not over seven.

“Considering the cost of transit, no profit can be expected on four-year old horses. Experienced buyers know that animals of this age cannot stand work, and therefore the demand, except at ridiculous prices, is limited to men who have yet to gain their experience. When their experience is gained by purchasing the four-year old from a Canadian lot, they ever afterwards blame the whole class for the defects shown by an unsuitable individual. Every unsuitable horse imported helps to damage the whole class.

“Persons acquainted with the English market and the value of horses here, may be able to buy in Canada cheap horses and sell in England at a profit. Other persons venturing to send horses should avoid the lower-priced horse and consign only what are readily saleable. The nearer all the animals of any consignment are to a uniform type the better. Buyers of that type then attend a sale in numbers, and competition follows. When a consignment of ‘all sorts’ arrives, no great attraction is opened to any special class of buyer, and competition is slight. Whether a consignment consist of ‘vanners,’ ‘cabbers,’ or heavy-draught horses, it should be limited to the one class, so as to offer the greatest attraction to buyers.

“During the past year many good horses have come from Canada in addition to the ‘light vanner.’ A smaller horse, suitable for cab-work has given great satisfaction after trial, and will find a good market here again in the spring. March and April are the best months for their arrival in London, but few are wanted after the end of May. The horse should not be more than 15·2 in height, short-legged, with courage and a sharp, active style of moving.

“I have always thought that the heavy wagon horse, suitable for town drays, and coal wagons could not be supplied from Canada to compete with our Shire and Clydesdale horses. This opinion I am inclined to modify in view of some of the big horses sold in London during the last year. If a profit can be obtained on Canadian horses which sell here by auction at from £40 to £50, there is a market. This price is, however, not obtainable for the narrow, long-legged animals which have predominated amongst the heavier class imported. Such horses have been sold for £30 or less, and even then are not easily sold. This draught horse should stand 17 hands high, have good feet and short legs. The nearer he approaches 18 cwt. in weight, the greater the chance of his being profitable to the importer.

“Now that Canadian horses have established a good reputation for themselves in Britain, every horse imported across the Atlantic is called ‘Canadian.’ It is very important that this reputation should not be injured by any unwarranted accusation against the health and stamina of the animal. Twice during the past year glanders have been discovered in imported and so-called ‘Canadian’ horses. In both instances inquiry has resulted in tracing the disease to horses bought at Chicago. This is a subject for the consideration of the authorities, and suggests the advisability of careful inspection at the port of embarkation. In England we are rapidly stamping out glanders from amongst our horses, and when a clean bill of health has been attained, our authorities are certain to take active measures to prevent reinfection from abroad. It is satisfactory to be able to report that one large company who renew their stock almost entirely from Canadian horses, have for two years past tested all the new purchases with mallein, and so far not detected a single infected animal.

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"This is strong evidence in favour of the health of horses from Canada, but it is known that horses from the United States now come here as 'Canadian' and not a few of the states are infected with glanders. Some of the larger towns in the states are credited with a great deal of disease and Chicago has been specially named in American veterinary literature as being badly infected.

"Nothing would be more adverse to the trade in horses from Canada than the discovery of glanders in newly imported horses. I therefore think some watchfulness should be exercised over horses coming into Canada from Chicago or New York."

I also quote some letters received from persons who are engaged in the trade.

Mr. H. Goddard, Old Kent Road, London:—"In reply to yours, I found the Canadian horses I imported very good, but would be more saleable in London if they were better bred, at present what we get are only fit for light van work, or what we call machiners."

Mr. Joseph Isaac, 70 Delancey Street, London, N. W.:—"In answer to your letter respecting horses, Canadians, I can tell you that I have bought several thousands, and am still buying them and they are giving the greatest of satisfaction, viz.: for 'bus and tram work, also heavy draught work. All my customers know they are Canadian horses and are willing to buy them in preference to English horses. In fact there is not enough horses bred in England to supply the demand, and I should strongly advise Canadian farmers to breed more, and the better the horse, the more money they will realize. Also the Canadian hay is well liked here, it stands in front."

Mr. Herbert Rymill, of London, a well known auctioneer in the horse trade:—"Your favour of the 22nd. I think that there is every prospect of the trade in horses with Canada being largely developed. In the interests of the Canadian stock breeders it should be firmly impressed on them that they should not breed from stock with any unsoundness likely to be transmitted to the produce, such as side bones, roaring, &c. The horses should be thoroughly broken to harness and should not be less than 5 nor more than 7 years old. Special care should be taken to send only reliable men in charge of horses, as very much depends on the treatment they receive both on rail and on board ship, how long they will have to be kept after landing before they are in saleable condition.

"The railway officials should be instructed to make the long journeys by cars as comfortable as possible for the horses, with facilities for feeding and watering better than I am informed now exist.

"Short legged thick-set horses with plenty of bone and good action are the most saleable, those higher on the leg such as I believe are not so saleable.

"Any further information in my power to give you I shall be pleased to offer, with a view to increasing the trade."

Messrs. W. and S. Freeman, of Aldridge's Repository, London:—"The class of Canadian horses consigned to us during the past 12 months has tended more to those adapted to heavy work, such as omnibus, tramways, parcel carts, vans, army remounts, and also the heavier draught horses, which sold remarkably well until the end of the year, when the market became somewhat overstocked.

"As there is an all year round trade for this description, we think importers cannot do better than continue with them, at the same time not forgetting that during the months of February, March, April, May, and June (what we call the London season) there is always a good demand for high class carriage horses 15.3 to 16 hands high, ages say 5 and 6, such as we have had here in the past, and which have realized 50, 60, 70 to 120 guineas. These kind of horses seem to have been overlooked by the Canadians lately.

"Trotting or track horses are not in such request in this country as across the Atlantic, and therefore do not realize the prices expected by the importers."

"Generally speaking, importers should only bring sizeable, thoroughly broken horses, five to seven years old and 15.2 to 16 hands high; three and four year olds unbroken do not find a ready market, and importers should consign to supply the trade all round, and not go in for a speciality, as the latter necessitates obtaining a special buyer at a cost of more time and money, and the result often disappointing."

Messrs. Maughan & Co., of Newcastle-on-Tyne and the Great Northern Depository, London, write:—"Last year we sold in consignment about 1,600 Canadian horses landed at London, Liverpool, Bristol, and Newcastle. We found in London the most certain and reliable market. The trade is now being carried on in Canada by experienced and enterprising men, who have realized that only reliable horses of a good class, five and six years old, are suitable to export and by following this up, the result is that the public of this country are now buying Canadian horses with much more confidence than at the beginning of this practically new export trade.

"In this country there is a large opening for medium to good horses, reliable, and five and six years old. We believe the Canadians have realized this, and expect to see a large increase in the export of horses from Canada to this country this year.

"All the large omnibus and tramway companies in London are buying Canadian horses, and we are in hopes the Government will buy largely this season, as the Canadian is an excellent general purpose horse, and the heavier class are quite suitable for artillery purposes. The lighter class make excellent chargers for cavalry purposes.

"The Canadian export for this season has already commenced. By ss. "Bordeaux," we have 53 horses, and by "Manitoba," we have 50 horses. Both vessels are due in London in a few days."

I now refer to certain articles which do not appear in the ordinary trade return.

HAY.

The imports of hay into the United Kingdom in 1895 were only 118,795 tons, as compared with 254,214 tons in the previous year. The direct imports from Canada show a falling off from 28,711 tons to 16,899 tons. The imports from the United States, which are also largely Canadian, although described as American, decreased from 152,423 to 36,176 tons. The falling off is of course attributable to the low prices that have prevailed in consequence of the more or less abundant crops of the last year. Then again, farmers and consumers have not allowed themselves to run so short as they did two or three years ago, which resulted, in conjunction with the scarcity, in a great increase in prices to the advantage of the Canadian farmer. It is expected that in the spring there will be an increase in price, but this of course remains to be seen. It has been understood also that the crop in Canada was not as large as in some former years and that there is a local demand in Canada and the United States at comparatively higher prices than have prevailed in this country.

Messrs. Underwood & Son, of Nine Elms, write:—"Referring to your inquiry *re* Canadian hay; we are sorry to inform you that at the moment and practically for some months past, Canadian has been entirely out of this market, and unless the English prices rise or the demand in the United States falls off, little or no trade is likely to be done between Canada and here."

PHOSPHATES.

The Anglo-Continental Guano Works inform me that the phosphate market during the last year has been in a very depressed and demoralized condition, in consequence of the supply exceeding the demand. This condition of things has been brought about chiefly through the discovery and the working of the Algerian phosphate deposits, and they seem to think that there is no prospect of the Canadian mines being worked at a profit for some little time to come.

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THE TIMBER TRADE.

The following letters have reached me with regard to the timber trade :

Messrs. J. & P. Coats, Ltd., of Paisley, write as follows regarding the trade in spool wood :—“In reply to your circular letter we beg to state that for the reasons given in ours of 23rd January, 1895, we did not import so much Canadian spoolwood last season as in the preceding year, and our opinion of the wood imported is much the same as before. Another objectionable feature cropped up during the past season, namely, the shipment of a large quantity of open-grained wood, which is not at all suitable for spool-making.

“In our opinion, the only means of increasing the demand for Canadian spoolwood in this country is for the producers thereof to be more careful about quality. Those producers on the southern shore of the River St. Lawrence should be especially careful in this respect, because in the absence of a sheltered loading-place and consequent liability for demurrage on vessels employed exceeding their lay-days, the hold they have upon the business is a very slender one.

“If the High Commissioner were to refer to these matters in his annual report in a general way, pointing out the objectionable features, the publicity thus given might cause those interested to bestir themselves to try and prevent the trade going past them altogether.”

Messrs. Jonas Brook & Brothers, also write me as follows :—

“In reply to your inquiry we have nothing to add to our report of last year, except to say that the defects then pointed out were more or less repeated in the 1895 supplies, and that we have in consequence not placed any contracts for spoolwood in Canada for this current year.”

Messrs. Edmiston & Mitchells, of Glasgow, writes :

“We have yours inquiring for some information *re* Canadian timbers and have pleasure in complying with your request by handing you our annual Timber Circular from which you will obtain all information except that of spoolwood, and on this article we beg to offer you the following comments :—This trade continues to expand. Thirteen vessels have arrived with whole cargoes of spoolwood chiefly from Portland and Bangor, Maine, and these together with some shipments of the regular liners have brought up the total quantity consumed and to be consumed in this market up to about 6,200 St. Ptg. Standards, which shows a substantial increase on last season's import. The price has remained fairly steady at about \$21.50 per 1,000 sup. feet f.o.b.”

Messrs. Clark & Co., of Paisley, write :—

“In reply to your inquiry *re* spoolwood imported from Canada, we may say that we are large users of that class of timber in the form of squares varying from 1- $\frac{1}{8}$ inch to 2 inches diameter.

“We handled last year fully five million superficial feet, half from Canada, and half from the States.

“In order to insure an increased demand in this article, the chief points to receive attention are—(1) that the wood be thoroughly well seasoned ; (2) white and solid, free from redheart and knots ; (3) accurate sawing both in diameter and lengths.”

Messrs. Lumley, Lloyd & Co., of Liverpool, write me as follows, with regard to the trade in manufactured lumber :—

“We are in receipt of your letter. We have imported a very large quantity of doors from Canada during the last year, and the demand for these goods is increasing every year.

"We are glad to state that the quality has been considerably improved, both as to material and manufacture, and this, with the prices being much lower than similar goods can be produced in this country, is a guarantee for a further steady increase in the demand in future."

The Secretary of State for the Colonies has sent to me the following letter he has received from Mr. Llewellyn Morrison, of 193 Beverley Street, Toronto, upon the subject of building up an extensive veneer trade which is worthy of consideration:—

"I notice by the press reports of your efforts for the increase of trade between Great Britain and the colonies. This is my reason and apology for troubling you with this communication. I desire to call your attention to a line of industry wherein the manufacture of the raw material could be done in Canada for shipment to the United Kingdom and there made into useful and necessary goods so as not only to be profitable to the firms or corporations engaged in the enterprise but to build up a large and important trade. I refer to veneer and cut-stock. We have in Ontario considerable areas of suitable timber for both "slicing" and "rotary-cut" veneering, such as maple (4 varieties), birch (3 varieties), oak (3 varieties), elm (3 varieties), beech, sycamore, basswood, ash, balm and white-wood; adjacent to a line of railway so as to be convenient for shipping. The most improved machinery for this class of work can be obtained here in Canada, and the veneering or cut-stock, properly dried, cut to size, and carefully bundled can be shipped to Great Britain and made into furniture, house decoration, packing boxes, nail kegs, barrels, butter tubs, and an almost infinite number of lesser, though by no means small or unimportant lines of goods. I have given a great deal of attention and study to this veneer industry and have noted its development and extension from one line of manufactured goods to another (such as pianos, organs, sewing machines, &c.), until at this present time large lines that were formerly manufactured of solid material are now "built up," so as to be cheaper, more durable and substantial and much lighter and many other lines of industry are moving into the using of veneer for constructive material. A trade could be built up reaching into millions per annum, and as the industries provided for are increasing daily necessities, so the business would increase from year to year.

"The capital for the industry on a large scale, however, would have to come from your country. The few large lumbering and timber firms that are in this country are all into pine, and so special provision for capital would have to be made. This, I take it, would not be difficult, everything being right. This matter will bear, and grow under, investigation. I will be pleased to render any assistance within my reach or furnish any information and data obtainable."

WOOD PULP.

I have nothing specially to add on this subject to my report of last year. The use of wood pulp continues steadily to expand, the imports for 1895, 297,094 tons, valued at £1,574,400, showing an increase of nearly £150,000 over 1894. I am glad to notice that the industry is attracting more attention in Canada every year, and although apparently the present large local consumption somewhat retards the export trade. I have no doubt that with the completion of the large mills at present under construction in advantageous positions, Canada will definitely enter the market as a powerful competitor with present sources of supply to a much larger extent than at present.

That the scope of the market is large is shown by the returns of the details of the total imports of 1894, the latest available, being 279,766 tons, valued at £1,432,400, of which Canada supplied £82,841. Norway held the first position with £694,919, Sweden coming next with £344,021, Germany supplying £76,287, Holland, £66,563, Russia (Finland), £50,880, the United States, £48,489 (mainly of Canadian origin), and Austria, £25,960.

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I see it stated that prominent French importers of wood pulp are investigating the Canadian sources of supply. Of equal interest to Canada is the continued growth in the British imports of foreign paper which may be summarized as follows:—

Transatlantic news and printings are already known on this side, and more than one London daily paper is using this product. With our cheap supplies of raw material, the trade generally regards the outlook for Canadian export of paper to the United Kingdom as encouraging. In connection with the manufacture of paper, I should draw attention to the market that exists for certain classes of minerals, found in Canada, which are used for fillings, &c., such as asbestos, talc, asbestine pulp, magnesite, powdered plaster, satinite, &c.

To return to the subject of Canadian wood pulp supplies to the United Kingdom, Messrs. Kennedy & Sons, of Glasgow, write as follows:—

“ In reply to your circular *re* wood pulp, we have to state that very little came into Scotland last year, owing to Scandinavian makes being offered at prices which Canadian mills would not entertain.

“ Outside of price, buyers here have a strong objection to the manner in which Canadian pulp reaches this country—ground pulp with 50 per cent moisture instead of being packed in canvas like Scandinavian pulp, comes in loose bundles without any covering at all, and so licks up all the dust and dirt of the landing sheds at ports of discharge, besides all the loose coal dust in wagons used to railing it to mills. The consequence is that it arrives at the mills in a very dirty condition. This is an important point which Canadian mills should look to if they wish to do business in Scotland.

“ Chemical pulp should also come in bales. Hitherto it has come in rolls, which are difficult to handle. Space being lost in packing on board ship, there is a waste of room; consequently a higher freight is demanded than for bales.

Messrs. Steinhoff, Sons & Muir, Limited, of 20 Jewry Street, London. E.C., write:—“ In reply to your inquiry, we may state that as regards Canadian mechanical wood pulp, as far as we are concerned, there has been a considerable increase in the imports to this country during 1895, and we have been successful in introducing this material in several quarters where it had hitherto not been used. As regards the total quantities imported, we can say nothing, the official statistics only distinguishing between pulp from Norway, and that from other countries. This, by the way, is a matter that calls for adjustment in the proper quarters.

“The quality we may safely assert to be, generally speaking, superior to Scandinavian makes. We have found this opinion endorsed by consumers, whom we find willing to pay higher prices than for other grades.

“Owing to an unprecedented drought in the United States, during the autumn of 1895, a large number of pulp mills were obliged to stop altogether for a time. In consequence there has been a brisk demand there for pulp from Canada, prices ruling very high; and it seems highly probable that only a very limited quantity will be shipped to this country during the year 1896.

“The greatest obstacle to the development of trade here is to be found in the high rates of freights charged by the regular lines, on which shippers are bound to depend, as compared with the low rates from Scandinavian ports. Another drawback is the poor manner in which Canadian pulp is baled, many consumers objecting to the dirty state it arrives in owing to insufficient protection.

“The Scandinavian product is infinitely superior in this respect, and it is a matter well worthy of the attention of Canadian makers who wish to cultivate a regular trade with Great Britain, which in normal years is certainly the legitimate outlet for Canada, especially the Maritime Provinces.”

COTTON MANUFACTURES.

The following is an interesting letter I have received with regard to the increasing trade in Canadian cottons for Australia, New Zealand and the Cape, in which a considerable trade is being opened up through the London agencies and firms doing business in those articles:—

“Cotton piece goods, although in infancy as to exports, have formed a market abroad through London, Manchester and Glasgow, and Canadian-made cottons are now going to Australia, New Zealand, British South Africa and other countries. The goods are bought and paid for in London mainly, while the cloths go to Australia and New Zealand via Canadian Pacific route or via England, when they are transhipped, in some instances, in the Thames, almost on arrival from Canada. The cloth that is intended for British South Africa is mostly sent from New York to Cape Town, but a certain amount proceeds from Montreal to Birkenhead, Liverpool, where it is placed on board ships for African ports. The goods for China, with whom Canada has done business in cottons for the past ten years, reach their destination via the Canadian Pacific or New York.

“It may seem like sending coals to Newcastle to sell Canadian cotton goods in London, but the fact remains that they are sold, and not only in London, but in New York and Boston from day to day. The export trade in piece goods, through sales in London, is only eighteen months old, and at present confined to a few of the very largest shippers, who are repeating and increasing orders, particularly for Australia and New Zealand, and giving good reports on Canadian goods. The sale of piece goods in London has not been confined to the export trade, as several English manufacturers and wholesale houses that now supply makers of waterproofs, have ordered over and over again and increased their orders in a manner that should be gratifying to the Canadian manufacturers in the cradle stage of an export business.

“There are several reasons why Canada can sell cotton cloth in London. Her natural resources, cheap water power, cheap seaboard, cheap coal, cheap skilled labour, cheap taxes and desirable climate for cotton bleaching and dyeing, all tend to enable her to sell cloth against the world. Lancashire, in England, is rightly king of the cotton trade, but to some extent handicapped with dear water power, dear fuel, dear transit, and dear taxation. Raw cotton costs nearly one cent per pound more at a mill in Lancashire than in Canada by reason of transit from the seaboard. The cost of water power and fuel compared with Canadian is doubled and the cost of freight from a mill in Lancashire to London is double what it is from Montreal to the Thames, and when goods are sent from Lancashire to London via the Manchester Ship Canal to get a low \$7 per ton freight, they are frequently ten days on the road, or almost as long as from Montreal.

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"Distance of mills from the seaboard in the New England States and dear water power have had their drawbacks, but notwithstanding this they have fought Lancashire for a place in the Australian and New Zealand markets for their cotton ducks, and dozens of other cloths, and succeeded, and since that Canada has stepped into the field in an humble manner and takes a small share in scores of different kinds of goods out of the hundreds that she manufactures. There are between half a million and a million of cotton spindles in Canada, and over half of them are controlled by a Montreal firm of agents, who have a good representative in London, and this is one of the secrets of success in exports that other trades might notice.

"The purchasers in London want no middle-men beyond the agent or agents, and it would be well for manufacturers to bear this in mind as some of the Canadian mills have tied themselves to conflicting interests concerning sales in London, and there is no reason why this matter should not be amended.

What has been done lately in the Canada cotton trade should be done in many other industries. At every step and turn, at shops in London, you see American made goods that Canada makes just as well and cheaper, and it will only take more knowledge on the part of Canadians to claim a fair share of that trade which figures largely.

"The Americans are worthy of being followed in the development of their export trade, and the great warehouses in London that their agents occupy give evidence that they had to come to London to manipulate sales. At one time they tried to do without London but it did not pay. They were forced to employ London agents and do business from London to increase exports, as their anticipated direct trade with Australia was found impossible. It has cost the Americans much money to find out how and when to sell, and the Canadians are learning rapidly, and it is to be hoped that the woollen industry of Canada will benefit by cotton trade examples and that hardware and tools, wooden ware, sashes and doors, manufactured timber, and a variety of goods that Canada can sell in London will obtain further attention. The manifesto of the ships coming from Montreal and St. John exhibit a variety of Canada made goods coming to London and the steamers from Boston to London, bring goods that should open the eyes of Canadians on what can be done.

"Probably an association of the Canadian boards of trade, with headquarters in London may under good direction find out what will sell in London and how to increase the exports."

BOOTS AND SHOES.

I have had some correspondence with Canadian houses during the last year as to the possibility of opening up a trade in Canadian boots and shoes. The following is an extract from the letter I sent to one of my correspondents:—

"I am directed by the High Commissioner to acknowledge your letter of the 26th July and to state that the matter to which you refer is too large to be dealt with by correspondence.

"Inquiries have been made with the view of eliciting some information that might be useful to you, but it appears that the wholesale trade in England is largely in the hands of the manufacturers, and that they themselves supply the shops engaged in the retail trade.

"If you have any serious idea of endeavouring to open up trade in boots and shoes in Great Britain, the better plan would be for you to send a representative to this country with samples of the products which you are in a position to supply. He would be able to visit the large towns and cities, get into communication with the persons engaged in the retail trade, and in that way perhaps be able to arrange for the opening up of a business which might develop into considerable proportions if endeavours were made to satisfy the requirements of the local markets.

"If at any time you should adopt this suggestion, the High Commissioner would be happy to be of any assistance to your representative that might be in his power."

I also quote a letter received from a house in the trade which tends to confirm my remarks:—

“Replying to your communication, we beg to state we do not handle any boots and shoes manufactured in Canada.

“*Re* your inquiry as to the best means for increasing the demand for Canadian produce in this country, we beg to offer the following remarks:—

“There is a growing trade being carried on between the United States of America and Britain in leather boots and shoes, and in India-rubber overshoes and snow boots.

“If the manufacturers in the United States can compete successfully in the British market, we think manufacturers in Canada ought to be able to do the same.

“Most British merchants are patriotic and loyal, and it is only when *foreigners* offer goods which *conclusively beat in value* those offered by British manufacturers, that they place orders outside of this country.

“Of course, the styles, fittings, and other details necessary for the British market, would require to be studied; but this, any energetic up to date manufacturer can easily, successfully do.

“We hope the above remarks may be of some use to our Canadian friends.”

CANNED PRODUCTS OF VARIOUS KINDS.

The following interesting letter has been addressed to me by Messrs. Joseph Travers & Sons, who occupy a leading position in this trade in London:—

“The trade in all kinds of tinned fruits and vegetables has been under a cloud during the past season, owing to the glutted state of our market. Tomatoes in tins have suffered more proportionately on this account than other vegetables, and the prices have been the lowest on record. We have been able to purchase good average quality, in standard tins weighing about 2½ lbs. gross, at 2s. 6d. per doz. tins, delivered, freight paid to London. There have been quotations slightly under this price, but the quality could hardly be classed as “good average of the season.” The bulk of these cheap sales was made by packers in the United States, the Canadian and European packers preferring to hold rather than sell under the cost of production. Generally speaking, the Canadian packed tomatoes are better than most of the United States brands in point of flavour, but are not so regular in colour or so solid. The labels of the United States brands are brighter, and the general appearance gives the impression of having been treated with greater care than those packed in the Dominion. The brands which have good hold were first introduced by United States packers by advertising (which has recently been dropped) but during the depression of last season these brands were easily sold within 5 per cent of their abnormal value, whereas other unknown brands fell from 25 per cent to 35 per cent.

“The prosecution on the part of our government instituted against retail grocers for selling tinned peas, on account of an admixture of sulphate of copper being used for colouring purpose, has caused the trade to either discontinue the sale or to attempt to get peas which are guaranteed pure and free from injurious colouring matter. It is now proposed by some French packers to discontinue the use of copper, and stamp the tins ‘guaranteed pure.’ The peas, under this treatment, will probably resemble the colour and condition of American peas, and there may be an opportunity to introduce similar goods at the same time.

“For other vegetables, we are of opinion that there is not much prospect just now.

“We hear of an unusually large quantity of tinned fruits having been shipped from California to the English market this year, and we also hear that there is an unusual proportion of apricots in these shipments. The prices have been declining lately almost to the extent of 1s. per dozen, and we have been able to purchase the standard apricots, packed by the best canners, so that they can be retailed in England at 6d. per tin, and leave the usual margin for this popular price. Pears and peaches have not fallen to the same extent, and we are of opinion that, so far, these two descriptions, if the quality turn out to be equal to the Californian, will be able to be disposed of to advantage in the spring months on our market. We have been

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receiving pears from the Eastern States, which we have considered even better flavour than the Californian, although the size is slightly smaller, and we believe this trade might be cultivated in the Dominion.

“We are glad to be able to say that the quality and colour of tinned apples which we have lately received from Canada, show a marked improvement on the shipments of former years, and also the quality is better than that of American packed goods that we have this year seen. We have no doubt that if this improvement continues, we shall be able to command a better price than American apples, and that the position in the future will be reversed.

“The trade here suffered a great deal last year in their purchases of dried apples and apple rings, owing to the fruit going mildewy and musty, which was no doubt due to indifferent processing. The result has been that a great many grocers have fought shy of the fruit, and we are afraid that the prospects of the coming season are not so good as usual on this account. The condition complained of occurred in the States apples, and we have no knowledge of the same fault in Canadian packed fruit. We are of opinion that if your packers could arrange a uniform grade of better quality fruit than what is usually shipped here, a better trade could be built up, but this would probably take one or two seasons to perfect, and would mean a risk of a few consignments before the brands were established.”

Messrs. Wurzburg & Co. write as follows with regard to the lobster industry:—

“The lobster canning industry of the past year has seen the introduction by a Halifax merchant of a new method for preventing the formation of sulphide of iron, commonly called smut, in the cans. As a preventive of the old evil, the method which consists mainly in the addition of gelatine to each can has been a decided success, but it would be premature to say to-day whether lobsters canned in this way will find general favour amongst consumers of the different nationalities. All the wholesale buyers have expressed their great satisfaction with the new article, but it remains to be seen whether the consuming public is equally satisfied.

“The catch of lobsters during the past year may well be called a good one, and prices realized by canners have been most satisfactory to them, thanks to the excellent precautions taken by the Federal government to stop illicit packing, which has prevented the dumping of inferior qualities on the English markets, and thus lowering the prices at the opening of the season.

“The Pictou lobster hatchery is doing excellent work and the packers in that district all admit a decided improvement in the fishing. It would be a great boon to the industry if other hatcheries of this kind were started in other parts of the provinces, provided the management was entrusted to equally reliable and efficient supervision.

“A new departure has been made in Nova Scotia by the erection of a cold storage warehouse in Dartmouth, and the experiments carried on during the past season have shown results likely to lead to the installation of depot storage throughout the Maritime provinces.

“This department combined with effective refrigeration on the steamers trading to England, should give a decided impetus to the development of the market in perishable food products and increase production both in the agricultural and fishing resources of the districts in question.”

Messrs. Henry A. Lane & Co., 15 Philpot Lane, E. C., write me about Canadian canned meats as follows:—“Replying to your favour regarding Canadian canned meats, we will say that our consignments from Canada are very small in comparison with what we receive from the United States and Australia, and we are not in a position to make any extensive observations in regard to this product of Canada.

“We may say, however, that the quality of Canadian tinned meats has been steadily improving of late years, and now it compares favourably with the brands from the two countries mentioned above.”

CIDER.

I have had several letters from Canadian manufacturers as to the opening up of a trade in cider in this country. The imports at the present time are valued at about £18,000, of which the greater part comes from the United States. It is believed that Canada could easily secure a share in this industry, if not almost monopolise it, in view of the fact that the samples of cider that have been received from the Dominion are much superior to those from the United States. I communicated with all the leading dealers in the different parts of the country, and was able to place my correspondents in communication with them. I hope the result will be a development of this trade. Especially at times when apples are at low prices here, or exceptionally plentiful, or even in the case of apples which it does not pay to export, they might be manufactured into cider or utilized in many other ways in which apples are now manipulated. I have also sent to you various papers relating to the manufacture of cider for the British market, which may be of interest to the makers and shippers.

The following figures are taken from the detailed returns recently published of the trade with the United Kingdom for 1894. In the summary returns for 1895 the proportion contributed by Canada to the importations of various articles is not generally given, and it is necessary therefore to wait for some time until the returns for 1895 are issued:—

FISH, CURED OR SALTED, UNENUMERATED.

The total import for the year was £1,527,015, of which £763,668 came from foreign countries and £763,627 from British possessions. Canada and Newfoundland contributed the greater portion of the latter, the amounts respectively being £631,731, and £125,116, while in the case of foreign countries the United States shipped £302,273, Norway £217,891, and Denmark £87,351.

FLAX.

The total imports were £2,296,365, of which only £1,718 came from British possessions, namely Australasia. The greater part of the flax imported comes from Russia, namely £1,690,786, Belgium contributing £101,699, Holland £96,791, and Germany £63,515.

HIDES.

Although Canada does not participate to any extent in the trade in raw and wet hides, the value of the imports reaches about £2,000,000 annually, the following may not be without interest. It is extracted from the *Mark Lane Express* of January 6th:—

“In July last the London Chamber of Commerce, at the instance of its Leather Trades Section, drew the attention of the Australasian Chambers of Commerce to the great depreciation in the value of hides caused by the present system in the colonies of branding cattle. The section, while fully aware of the difficulties of properly identifying the animals, especially in districts where various owners have rights of grazing, the fact of hides from the River Plate, commercially more valuable—owing, in a great degree, to the better system of branding which prevails—seemed to the section a strong reason why some other system should be devised. A smaller brand, placed on a less valuable part of the hide, or a distinctive mark made on the horn or hoofs of the animals, were amongst the suggestions that appeared to be most worthy of consideration. The Chamber expressed the hope that the effect of bringing the subject under the notice of the Australasian Chambers might result, so far as their particular districts were concerned, in the adoption of measures which would improve the value of hides, to the advantage of producer, distributor,

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and consumer alike. On Tuesday the secretary of the London Chamber received the following satisfactory communication from the Maryborough (Queensland) Chamber of Commerce:—

“‘SIR,—With further reference to my letter to you of August 22nd last, I have now the honour to inform you that a communication has been received from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, from which the following is an extract:—The Government intend to introduce during the next session of Parliament a measure permitting owners to brand on portions of the hide of the least value to the tanner, and a code of earmarks is being arranged by all the colonies, which, when adopted, will render branding in prominent portions less necessary than at present. You will thus see that the representations of the Chamber have been productive of good, and trust all concerned will eventually benefit thereby.

“‘Yours faithfully,

“‘(Signed) D. GARDNER, Secretary.’”

HOPS.

The total imports were £774,378, of which £769,716 came from foreign countries, and £4,662 from British Possessions, Canada contributing £2,774. It is well known that the hops from British Columbia are popular on the London market, and the belief is entertained by those in the trade that if the quality is maintained, there is a possibility of a development of a considerable trade in this direction. I have had some correspondence with persons in Canada who are interested in the industry, and I hope the shipments may increase. Prices have been very low the last year or two, but they vary considerably.

The following are the imports of meat preserved, other than by salting:—

BEEF.

Imports from foreign countries, £600,836, the United States contributing £429,126, and Belgium £159,430. The imports from British possessions were £212,862, of which Australasia contributed the greater share. Canada sent only £8,117.

MUTTON.

Of preserved mutton the imports were £195,166, of which £185,025 came from British possessions, and £10,141 from foreign countries. The greater part of the supply is naturally shipped by Australasia.

CONDENSED MILK.

The total import of condensed milk was £1,079,236, of which £1,076,893 came from foreign countries, France sending £545,407, Holland £368,997, Norway £77,856, and Belgium £69,874. This in no way represents the consumption of condensed milk in this country, as some of the foreign countries have factories in the United Kingdom, and there are also some English companies, notably Messrs. Cleeve, of Limerick, who secure a large share of the market.

MOSS LITTER

was imported to the extent of £167,538, the greater part coming from Holland, £156,720. There are no imports from British possessions. From time to time I have made inquiries into this trade for the benefit of persons in Canada who were of opinion that a trade might be developed, but nothing so far seems to have come of the matter.

SEALSKINS.

The total import was £550,594, of which £326,331 came from foreign countries, £224,163 from British possessions. The United States £260,000, Norway £21,979, and Japan £19,287 were the principal sources of supply so far as regards foreign countries. Canada and Newfoundland contributed nearly all those coming from British possessions.

FURS.

The import of furs for the year was £814,245, foreign countries sending £457,689, and British possessions £356,556. About two-thirds of the trade is in the hands of the United States and Canada, in the proportion of £307,494 and £242,973.

The following figures relate to the import of wood and timber :—

WOOD, UNENUMERATED.

Total import, £208,981; from foreign countries, £80,160; from British possessions, £128,821, of which Canada contributed £104,030.

SAWN FIR.

Total import. £11,537,617. Total from foreign countries, £8,692,152, of which Sweden sent £3,244,980; Russia, £3,170,872; United States, £1,070,515, and Norway, £1,025,536. Total from British possessions, £2,845,466, Canada's share being £2,779,539.

SAWN WOOD, UNENUMERATED.

Total imports, £369,116; from foreign countries, £278,378, the United States sending £97,952; Russia, £53,074; France, £42,229; Holland, £37,263; Sweden, £29,027; from British Possessions, £83,540, Canada's share being £83,521.

FURNITURE WOODS AND HARDWOODS, UNENUMERATED.

Total import, £604,262; from foreign countries, £498,877, the United States contributing £365,681; from British Possessions, £105,385, Canada's share being £25,175.

HOUSE FRAMES, FITTINGS, JOINERS' AND CABINET WORK.

Total import, £668,325; from foreign countries, £642,673, the United States sending £206,922; Germany, £115,993; Sweden, £89,861; Belgium, £76,391; France, £66,351; Holland, £63,125. From British Possessions, £25,662, of which Canada sent £19,520.

The following is a report made by the Curator of the Canadian section of the Imperial Institute as to the utility of the collections from a commercial point of view :—

“ Although the provincial collections still remain, as a whole, in a very incomplete condition, the improvements effected early in the year in the Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia courts, have not only rendered the section more attractive, but have caused a considerable increase in the number of inquiries made regarding articles exhibited.

Unfortunately a large proportion of the applications received refer to products which, whilst amongst the first that persons with any knowledge of Canada's resources would expect to find on exhibit, are still only conspicuous by their absence.

In order to endeavour to secure additional exhibits and thereby render the display more representative, I made a special trip to Canada last autumn, spending about ten weeks between Quebec and Vancouver. During that time I visited the capitals of the various provinces and had interviews with the ministers and heads of departments of Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, North-west Territories and British Columbia. I also spent a week at Ottawa, and called upon most of the ministers

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and permanent officials. I further visited the principal Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce and had the advantage of conversation with leading business men and likely exhibitors.

From promises made, I have every reason to hope and believe that the existing collections will be materially strengthened in the near future and have already advice of the immediate despatch of exhibits from Montreal and Toronto.

A general opinion was expressed by representatives of the Provincial Governments that, whilst they could certainly improve their collections, the Federal Government had in the Experimental Farms, Geological Survey and other institutions, facilities for rendering assistance which were not possessed by the smaller bodies and that, without interfering with the provincial control, valuable exhibits would be provided without any appreciable expense. I placed this matter before the Premier and other ministers and the heads of the Departments of Agriculture, the Interior, Marine and Fisheries, Indian Affairs, all expressed their willingness to lend their co-operation provided that the necessary authority were given. The recent development of the Imperial Government's policy should form an additional reason why samples of Canada's resources, both natural and industrial, should be on view at the Institute, and as the Ministers were also kind enough to express their approval of the matter, I trust that some definite action will follow. In view of this, it would certainly simplify matters if some individual official at Ottawa were charged with the supervision of, and correspondence in connection with, institute affairs. In the case of the North-west Territories, the absence of exhibits is to be greatly deplored in view of the continued efforts of the Government to attract settlers to that country and at the request of the Hon. Mr. Haultain I had a long interview with the Minister of the Interior urging the preparation and transmission of a representative collection.

In Montreal I called upon a number of business men, and was definitely promised a large variety of exhibits. In Toronto, at the suggestion of the Minister of Agriculture, I visited the exhibition and made a list of articles shown there which I considered it would be desirable to have at the institute, and canned fruit and vegetables, wine, honey, and other exhibits are now being collected. The Manitoba and British Columbia authorities took notes and promised to send further exhibits.

During the past twelve months inquiries have been made specially about wood pulp and its manufactures, canned fruit and vegetables, maple sugar, birch bark, wood, wool, mica, asbestos, iron ore, felspar, to enumerate a few of the applications.

As regards pulp, there seems to be a large demand for pulp boards, but inquiries made in Canada tend to show that the majority of manufacturers are at present occupied with local trade. I have throughout emphasized the desirability of having a representative display of the manufactures of pulp, and whilst in Ottawa called twice upon the E. B. Eddy Co., and endeavoured to again induce them to make an exhibit. Unfortunately I could arrange nothing definite. The Canada Paper Co. has, however, offered to make an exhibit similar to that shown at Chicago, illustrative of the manufactures of paper. Goods such as made by the Eddy Co. should be capable of introduction here, and even if local demand takes all present supply, the output of these articles will doubtless increase, when Canadian makers would probably desire new markets.

Experiments are being conducted by a large pottery company with samples of Canadian Felspar from Buckingham, which seem likely to be successful and would cause a demand for the material.

Numerous inquiries have been made in connection with the Ontario fruit exhibit, surprise being expressed that neither preserved fruits nor vegetables were shown at the Institute. In view of the recent development of this industry in Ontario it has, as before mentioned, been decided to send over a number of samples, which with prices will be submitted to some of the large London buyers.

In view of the efforts being made to introduce American breakfast and other foods to the British market, I spoke to several manufacturers of rolled oats and similar productions, and see no reason why Canada should not compete in this direction.

It is to be hoped that Nova Scotia will shortly follow the example of Ontario and furnish samples of her celebrated fruits. British Columbia has promised to prepare a selection, and I suggested that in view of the probable transmission of Ontario fruits in cold storage samples of them should be exhibited at the Institute. This course has been adopted by Cape Colony with much success I learn from the Curator.

The desirability of exhibiting such perishable articles as beef, mutton, cheese and butter, properly protected in refrigerator during the summer season when there is a large number of visitors might be worthy of consideration.

The Geological Survey has throughout sent us many valuable additions. On the receipt of a special commercial exhibit of mica, I communicated with the trade, and had visits from a number of dealers and notices were published in several trade journals.

Monthly reports of Trade and Commerce in Canada in addition to immigration, labour and other matters have been furnished, and have appeared in the monthly Institute Journal which is supplied to all the leading Chambers of Commerce, clubs &c., in the Empire.

In conclusion, I can still only emphasize the urgent necessity of rendering the Canadian collection more complete, and with the addition of exhibits, particularly those of ordinary commerce, will come more direct proofs of the utility of the Institute. All exhibits should be accompanied by price lists and other information.

It may be well to mention that I have been able to arrange, at the request of the manufacturers, for the agency of the Acme Wallet Manufacturing Co., St. Thomas, Ont., by the well known house, John Walker & Co., Ltd., and have practically concluded arrangements whereby the United Asbestos Co., Ltd., will represent the house of Colin McArthur & Co., of Montreal, and introduce their wall papers to the British trade. It is also proposed to exhibit a few of E. W. Henry & Co's, Canadian Vehicles into the section during the spring. American buggies and light carts have been introduced into England with success and an order recently placed with Mr. Henry seems to show that Canadian vehicles can compete against these."

In concluding my report, I may state that there have been some signs during the past year of the long anticipated revival in trade in the United Kingdom. The total imports from foreign countries and British possessions were valued at £416,687,630, as compared with £408,344,810, an increase of £8,342,820. The exports increased from £215,824,333, to £226,169,174, an increase of £10,344,841. The re-exports of foreign and Colonial merchandise showed an increase of over £2,000,000.

It is too early yet to deal to any extent with the effects of the Franco-Canadian Treaty. I believe, however, that it will prove to be mutually advantageous to both countries, and will lead to an extension of trade as soon as the present means of communication are improved. It is a matter deserving of mention that the position of Canada in Europe has considerably improved as the result of the Treaty in question. The Austrian and Spanish Governments have deemed it of sufficient importance to make representations upon the subject of the extension of the concessions to them, and Italy has also expressed a wish to negotiate a commercial treaty on a somewhat similar basis. All these things must have a tendency to make Canada better known on the continent than at present, to stimulate the development of its commerce and to attract the attention of the continental public to the advantages Canada offers for settlers.

I will only add that I hope producers and shippers will not hesitate to apply to me at any time for information they may desire, calculated to aid the development of the commerce of the Dominion. The markets in the United Kingdom and on the continent are so large as to permit of an almost limitless extension of our trade, especially in view of the reputation which Canadian products have secured for themselves.
