BRITAIN'S NAVAL PROGRAM.

If there is to be another naval armament race, Great Britain is not going to be the one to start it, nor will history find her responsible.

Great Britain is making every sincere endeavor to reach an understanding with other nations with regard to reduction in naval armaments.

A great navy is vital to the very life of the island nation in time of war, and she cannot view naval activity on the part of another country with unconcern no matter how friendly that country may be.

CANADIAN COAL RECORDS.

Of particular interest to the people of this country is the report of Canada's coal output for 1920, as compiled by the Bureau of Statistics.

This report once again brings to the forefront the whole question of Canada's coal supply and its utilization for the benefit of Canada.

The coal industry of Canada, above all others, is one which should be developed and encouraged. When it is considered that coal alone accounts for nearly \$200,000,000 of the adverse trade balance with the United States, the force of this statement will be felt.

Canada has the kind of coal needed, in sufficient quantities. She has the engineers to produce it; she has the railways and the lake steamers to carry it.

LENINE DISCARDING COMMUNISM?

The most hopeful pronouncement on Russia that has been ventured for some time was made by Mr. Lloyd George in the House of Commons on Tuesday.

Most of us have come to the conclusion reached by the Prime Minister, that reports regarding Russia coming from Helsingfors and Reval are not to be credited.

Mr. Lloyd George professes to see signs of what may be a better thing for Russia than even a successful revolution against the present Government—signs that the men who are in the saddle at Moscow are coming to their senses.

Notwithstanding the terrible crimes that Lenin and Trotsky have perpetrated against Russia, it may be easier for the agonized country to find a measure of restoration under a reformed Government directed by them than through revolution against their regime.

The British Premier says he never doubted that the Bolshevik leaders were able men. Undoubtedly they have shown tremendous strength and ability.

In the trade agreement negotiated between Great Britain and the Moscow Government, the British Government has not prejudiced its claims or the claims of British nationals against Russia.

Somebody has described Premier Drury as a dreamer, who is trying to administer public affairs on idealistic theories. It may be so; but if he can realize some of his ideals and make some of his dreams come true the country will have no reason to complain.

Gabriele d'Annunzio, the Italian poet and hero of Fiume, has been out of the papers for some time; but he threatens to break silence unless some of his wishes are complied with.

WAR'S AFTERMATH

Canadian Flax Not Right Vainly to Produce Fibre, He Says

MONTREAL, March 28.—The considerable fall in prices which has already taken place will be followed before long by a sharp recovery in business, if the forecast of M. Ireland, of Ireland Brothers, Limited, Belfast, proves to be correct.

Was Canadian flax good enough and cheap enough to compete with that grown on the continent of Europe, he was asked, to which he replied that Canadian flax had not proved a great success. This was not due to poor quality, but because flax was mainly grown in this country for the purpose of manufacturing inseed, and the resultant product was not suitable for fibre.

Unemployment was a serious question in Great Britain, said he, and Ireland was now about to have similar troubles. That this would cause any social disorganization, he did not for one minute believe.

Labor as a whole was satisfied, recognized the depression was temporary, and appreciated the efforts of the Government and employers to prevent distress.

The shipbuilding industry was in a very bad way, said Mr. Ireland. Ships which were now on the stocks were being completed, but no new orders were coming in, and there had been, in fact, a cancellation of orders in many cases.
