Situated at the core of a rich agricultural district, having direct railway communications north, south, east and west, with the best possible facilities for shipping by means of sidings built expressly for the accommodation of manufactures, and enjoying the general advantages of a thrifty community, this town presents more than ordinary inducements for the industrial capitalist to establish himself here. The question of what particular manufacturies it would be most desirable to encourage is one that can readily be solved by due consideration of the circumstances. Perhaps the milling, furniture, carriage building and tanning business are as well represented at the present time as could be wished for; certainly these industries form a very important element in our trade and are a great credit to the entorprising gentlemen who own them. We cannot apeak as favorably of our agricultural works as we would desire, and it is all the more to be regretted from the fact that few if any other towns in Canada are better situated for carrying on an agricultural implement manufactory on an extensive scale than is Listowel. He thinks an immigrant with a small family can get through a year there while looking out for land for about \$400, and to commence with, the simplest contrivances can be used for breaking the ground; the roads are good in dry weather, and there is plenty of stone to make them good always.

His Excellency thereupon was pleased to state that as the federal system introduced by the British North America Act, 1867, was until then unknown in Great Britam or her colonies, there were no precedents to guide him to a decision in the present case, and as it would settle the future relations be remments so far as the office of Lieut-expedient to submit the advice offered in and the whole case and attendant circumstances to her Majesty's Government for their consideration and instructions.

This announcement caused not a little excitement in the House, and shortly afterwards Messrs. Ouimet, Cockburn and Mousseau, Quebec members, spoke in strong terms on the position which the case had now assumed. The former gentleman contended that the Governer-General had undertaken to refuse to be guided implicitly by the ministers of the crown on a subject peculiarly within the power of our constitution.

Sir John Macdonald did not agree with Mr. Ouimet that there had been an infringement of the constitution. The Queen ruled in Canada as well as in England. Her Majesty's representative had asked for a reference of this case to Her Majesty. Sir John said he would like to see Governor Letellier dismissed, and he wished his advice had been taken, but Canada and Canadian interests were as safe in the hands of the Queen as of the Queen's representative, and could not see that we need fear the results of a reference.
