Tile-Draining Land.

Tile-Draining Land.

Many people have been put to large extra expense in doing this work through the advice of mere theorists, who, knowing nothing practically about the work, and having read in books that the tile must be laid at equal distances, have caused the draining of much land that did not need it. In all first at tempts at draining only the sloughs and soft places should be improved. In other words, the soft places need to be made homogeneous, so far as possible, with the higher and dryer land. In a rolling country, the intelligent farmer should be able to tell what land needs draining, nearly as well as a drainage engineer, certainly better than the mere theorist, who knows little of draining, and perhaps nothing of the soil to be drained. In all those cases where there is a good fall and plenty of outflow, it does not require the nicety of leveling, and the accuracy of detail that is required when the fall is light, and the bottom difficult to manage. In all these common cases the farmer should be able, with a few simple tools, to do all the work, from the engineering to the opening of the ditch, the laying of the dite and the filling; certainly so by the and of some simple and practical treatise on the subject. We decidedly discountenance any and all draining until the owner of the land has first made up his mind as to the necessity of the same, and the cost; for where it may pay to thoroughly drain one piece of land, it will not pay to touch another. Here the farmer must be guided by the worth of his lands, the crop to be raised, and the cost of laying the tile. If his judgment says it is feasible, and his pocket will pay the cost, then go ahead. It will be money well spent, and amply pay the interest on the investment; and if the work be properly done, the tile will continue to draw better each year until the maximum is reached, and then remain permanently good. Hence the draining must be regarded as a permanent investment, of which the yearly interest is to be charged to the
