HAD TO SHOOT HIM.—

Yesterday morning a horse belonging to Mr. A. Moyer, employed at Messrs. Hess Bros', ran wild in crossing the bridge lately erected on the firm's property, the animal's leg struck a post of breaking in two places. It was found necessary to shoot the poor brute.

McCallum, of this town, who it was announced had left on a trip to the upper lakes, upon arriving at Southampton found the boat so crowded that they declined taking passage in her. Those gentlemen are to be commended for their common sense in foregoing the pleasure of a trip rather than run any risk on an overcrowded boat.

"RURAL CANADIAN"—This is the title of a fortnightly journal, devoted to horticulture and rural affairs which is announced to be issued from the office of C. Blackett Robinson, publisher, Toronto, and will be edited by our townsman, Rev. W. F. Clark, whose acquaintance with agricultural and horticultural matters well fits him for the position. The subscription price will be 1.00 per annum.

A HEAVY CRASH.—Messrs. G. S. Clime & Son met with a heavy loss on Wednesday evening by the floor of a building on Wallace street, which they were using as a store room, giving way, and letting some thirty or forty new stoves tumble through a distance of about six feet. Scarcely a stove escaped without more or less damage, many of them being converted into complete wrecks by the crash.

Messrs. Clime & Son will probably be about of two hundred dollars at least.

GOING TO THE NORTHWEST.—Mr. J. B. Jackson, station agent for the G. T. R. in this town, is about to take his departure for the Northwest. During Mr. Jackson's stay in this town, which extends over three years, he has won by his kind and obliging manner the good will and esteem of the large community with whom he has had business relations, and we are sure that his departure will be generally regretted. Mr. Foster, of Stratford, has been appointed to the position which Mr. Jackson vacates.

CIVIC HOLIDAY.—Thursday next, 4th August, has been proclaimed a civic holiday in Listowel. A cheap excursion to Toronto is announced by the Grand Trunk Railway for the purpose of celebrating the trip being 1.00; children half price. Arrangements have been made for visiting Hanlan's Island and points of interest in the vicinity. It is probable that many of our citizens will be induced to visit the provincial capital on that day. Further particulars will be learned by consulting our advertising columns.

NEW TIME TABLE.—A new time table came into effect on the Georgian Bay and Lake Erie Division of the Grand Trunk Railway on Monday last. There has been no alteration in the time for arrival and departure of daily express trains at Listowel. The following changes have been made in the running of the mixed trains: Trains Nos. 7 and 8 now run between Stratford and Durham, No. 7 leaving Listowel for Stratford at 2.15 p. m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, and No. 8 arriving in Listowel from Stratford at 3.35 p. m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. A daily mixed train has been placed on the road between Stratford and Listowel, leaving Stratford at 6 a. m., and returning to Stratford at 7.40 p. m.

FIRE.—About three o'clock on Monday afternoon a fire broke out in the stable in the rear of the M. E. Church parsonage. The fire was quickly extinguished, and did not cause any damage to the buildings adjoining. The roof of the building was considerably damaged. The roof of Henry Goldard's house was also ignited, but was extinguished before it had time to do any harm. There was no insurance on the stable. The fire is supposed to have originated from a spark from some of the smokestacks in the neighborhood.

HIGH SCHOOL BOARD.—At a meeting of the H. S. Board on Wednesday evening the contract for painting the new fence around the school was awarded to Mr. T. Perry, at 1.32 per rod, the material and work to be subject to the approval of the Board. The Board then adjourned until Thursday morning, when the applications for the positions of first and second assistant teachers for the school were examined and considered. There were a large number of applications for each of the vacancies. The Board by resolution selected Miss Henrietta Charles as second assistant teacher, salary 450.00 per annum. Miss Charles is a young lady who has won unusual distinction for her scholastic attainments. From a pupil of high standing in the St. Catherine's Collegiate Institute, this young lady matriculated at the Toronto University in 1879, taking honors in Mathematics, English, French and German. In 1880 Miss Charles passed the first year examination at the University, and taking honors in the above named subjects, in addition to which she gained the distinction of being first in general proficiency and modern languages. As Charles' scholastic acquisitions are certainly of a very high order. As she is also not without experience in teaching, the Board have no doubt acted wisely in selecting this young lady for the position. The selection of a first assistant was postponed until Thursday evening.

GRAND TRUNK, GEORGIAN BAY AND LAKE ERIE RAILWAY.—A large meeting was held in the Council Chamber, in Woodstock, on Monday, of the shareholders and bondholders of the various roads now amalgamated under the name of the Grand Trunk, Georgian Bay & Lake Erie Railway Company. The meeting was called to take into consideration the amalgamation of the various roads, and an agreement to give consent to an agreement for the use, lease or working of equipment and maintenance of the railway and property of the above companies, and the transfer of the Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada. The meeting was called to order by the appointment of Henry Parker, Esq., Chairman, and P. Charles, Secretary. The President, Col. Tisdale, of Simcoe, was called upon to explain the position of affairs, and the nature of the agreement. There was a good deal of interest manifested. A resolution was passed giving consent to the said agreement. An offer was read from Mr. E. B. Oler, of Toronto, offering to purchase the bonds for all first preferential bonds, not including coupons. This offer was pretty generally accepted, and only a few have not as yet signed. The town of Simcoe accepted this offer, and so did the Directors of the road. The Trustees of Toronto, and P. Charles, Secretary, of the Grand Trunk Railway, and the Trustees of the second bonds are Messrs. S. S. Fuller, of Toronto, and J. Bell, Solicitor, Belleville.
