A. O. F. DISTRICT MEETING.—A meeting of representatives of the various courts of the Ancient Order of Foresters comprising the Perth and Huron District was held in Listowel on Wednesday 5th inst. Among those present were Mr. F. Chaplin, late C. R. of the Listowel court, who was in attendance as delegate for Court Myrtle, Woodstock. The chief business of the meeting was the question of establishing a subsidiary High Court for Canada. We understand that the meeting was in favor of establishing such a court, and adopted a resolution to that effect.

DEAR SHOT.—The carcass of a huge black bear, weighing nearly 600 pounds, was exhibited here on Saturday last. The animal was shot in Grey township by Mr. John Smith, who is somewhat of a hunter. It was brought to bay in a small piece of bush by several parties who had got upon its track, and three bullets were lodged in its body before it was despatched. While being chased his head was reported to have tossed over fences and other obstacles in his path with such ease as to convince his pursuers that his strength was in proportion to his monstrous size. It is a matter of speculation how this great brute came there, and it is supposed that he had been driven out of the swamps in that neighborhood by the bush fires.

Mr. John Morrison, of Neve, carried off the cheese sweetstakes—gold medal and \$50—for the best made and most perfect kind of cheese in any class that had taken a first prize. The Gotham factory, Hammond, also took a prize, value \$15, in the colored class. All honor to the Elma dairy-farm, and to the established for themselves so high a reputation.

TOWNS COUNCIL.—The regular monthly meeting of the Town Council was held in the Council chamber on Monday evening, 3rd inst. Present, the Mayor in the chair, the Reeve, Deputy Reeve, and Councillors Binning, McDonald, Dingman, Fennell, Woods, Scott and Riggs. Twelve minutes of previous meeting were read and confirmed. Communications laid over from last meeting were read. In reference to communication of Ira Bates, claiming damages for injuries sustained at Wallace street bridge, the matter was referred to the Town Solicitor for his opinion. The petition signed by Robt. Gamble and others was read, asking that a sidewalk be built on Jefferson street; also an extension of sidewalk on Wallace street to E. P. Dugman's residence. Jno. Riggs moved, seconded by R. Woods that the request of Robert Gamble and others be granted in reference to the sidewalk asked for on Wallace street, and the work be done as soon as lumber can be obtained—carried. A communication was read from J. M. & A. Clinie & Co., asking the Council to take action to prevent Mr. Brooks from turning the refuse water from his factory into the river, as it was a cause of great annoyance to parties using the water for steam purposes. J. A. Hacking moved, seconded by R. Woods, that Mr. Brooks be instructed to take such steps as will remove the nuisance complained of by Messrs. Clinie & Co., and that the Chairman of the Board of Health be instructed to interview Mr. Brooks in regard to the matter—carried. Several accounts were read and referred to the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee reported as follows: Recommend payment of account Hart & Rawlinson for stationery \$21.25; Thos. Foydys, lighting street lamps, \$9.75; Jas. Freeman, watering streets, \$19.37; Listowel Gas Co. \$73; Ferguson & Elliott, \$100.95. Think some of the charges are excessive, would recommend \$80 in payment in full; W. Woods, leaving \$98.25—as this account appears to be certified to by one of the parties we would respectfully suggest that in future such accounts should not be allowed. The following minority report was read by Councillor Dugman: The minority report of the Finance Committee submitted that the item of \$19.37 should not be paid by the Council, and the grounds for such a conclusion are: 1st.—The Council of the town has never during the current year authorized any such expenditure; but on the contrary expressly voted that no sum be expended for street watering; 2d.—that it is establishing a dangerous precedent for this Council to ratify contracts let by councillors before the session of Council; J. A. Hacking moved seconded by T. G. Fennell, that the report of the Finance Committee be adopted. It was moved in amendment by D. B. Dingman, seconded by Jno. Binning, that the street watering account recommended by the majority report of the Finance Committee be given to the Council as the Council never authorized the letting of the contract on the amendment.—Yeas—Dugman, Binning, Scott, Riggs, Woods, Hax, Fennell, Hacking, McDonald. The motion was then put and carried. J. W. Scott moved, seconded by Jno. Riggs, that the Public Building and Fire Protection Committee be instructed to have all the coal oil lamps on posts already up, and also particularly a post and lamp at the railway crossing on Main street, lit on every night that the gas is lighted—carried. D. B. Dingman moved, seconded by T. G. Fennell, that the Road & Bridge Committee be instructed to construct a curb for the protective purposes near the railway crossings on Main street, forthwith, at a cost of not exceeding \$45—carried. J. A. Hacking moved, seconded by T. G. Fennell, that the Chairman of the Fire Protection Committee be instructed to purchase a hose reel at moderate cost—carried. Mr. Dugman gave notice of motion as follows: Notice is hereby given that by law will be introduced at the next regular meeting of this Council to prohibit the vending of notions and trinkets by itinerant vendors, and to take it unlawful for licenses to issue to such hawkers and peddlars. The Chairman of the Board of Health reported in reference to the sanitary condition of the town, suggesting that certain amendments be made in town by-law regarding the keeping of loaves within the town, also suggesting that the dam east of the town be enlarged so as to have a head of fresh water to be let off occasionally during the dry season. J. A. Hacking moved, seconded by R. Woods, that the Chairman of the Board of Works be instructed to build a two foot sidewalk on Jefferson street from Wallace street east 20 rods; also a crossing over York street—carried. Council adjourned.
