be having at the present time.

The construction of a two-story house
on Princess Royal Street by Mr. Charles
Malloy has already been started. The
contractor for the work is Mr. Frank Gil-
man, who is making rapid progress, and
now has the frame work up and the sides
boarded in.

Contractor Gilman has just completed
for himself a large house situated in the
Western part of the town.

A memorial service was held in the
Methodist Church, St. Stephen, on Sunday
afternoon last, by Court Scoodic, I. O. F.,
in memory of Private Walter Bateman, a
member of their lodge who had been
killed in action. It was also made the

that the 4th Pioneers will go to St. An-
drews. The engineers go down on Friday
to arrange with C. P. R. for water supply.
Expect to have them there by the six-
teenth. Will go sure if we can get the
water.

T. W. Mitchell, formerly of Back Bay,
N. B., but who has been in the employ of
the operating department of the St. John
street railway during the past three years,
has resigned his position and will enter
the fish business at the place of his
nativity.

This will give Back Bay its first local
fish stand. Heretofore the people have
been forced to take their fish to Eastport
or other points to market them, but with
the inauguration of this new business
they will be able to deal at home.

Mr. Mitchell, who is still a young man,
saw some years ago the necessity of a
plant at his native town, and determined
to erect one as soon as it was possible for
him to do so. The new plant is now al-
most complete, and he will take possession
in a few days. If he meets with success
in his new business venture he says he
will enlarge his plant so that he can
participate in the canning business.—Tele-
graph, May 9.

The almost instantaneous death of Wil-
liam Charlton, a teamster, living on St.
Patric kstreet, took place on Friday night
in Paradise Row as his team ran away.
It was about 9:30 p. m., when Charlton
was delivering some goods in an alley just
above Millidge street. His horse took
fright and backed rapidly out of the alley.
Charlton rushed after it and caught up
with the shaven man coming out of the
alley and swinging round. Nobody seems
to know exactly how it was that Charlton
was thrown against a telegraph pole and
then picked up by Mr. John McCauley, of
the I. C. R., who was unconscious and badly
bruised about the head. First aid was
tried when he was carried to a store, and
from there ordered to the hospital, but he
died almost on admission.—St. John Globe,
May 6.

Mr. W. F. Hatheway has been ap-
pointed by the Dominion government,
with three others from Quebec, Montreal
and Toronto, to visit immediately Great
Britain, France and Italy, to consult with
merchants and manufacturers about
trade, pointing out what they can buy
from us and sell to us. Mr. Hatheway
and his colleagues will leave in a few days
for their trip overseas. They are now
seeking information from merchants and
importers as to whether or not there are
any lines of crockery, china, leather
goods, copy or dry goods which they
have at any time during the last ten
years bought from Germany, Austria, or
Hungary which you might buy now or
after the war is over from Great Britain,
Italy or France. They are also asking
merchants what products they wish to
import from Europe. Mr. Hatheway
represents the Maritime Provinces on
this important board, and is
particularly anxious to secure prompt
reports from merchants on the questions
asked.—St. John Globe, May 6.
