THE EXODUS OF THE LOYALISTS FROM PENOBSCOT AND THE LOYALIST SETTLEMENTS AT PASSAMAQUODDY

The decline of Penobscot helped to populate the smaller harbor farther east, shortly after the War by loyalists who may have come either from St. John or directly from the States.

Another settlement worthy of mention was that of the Cape Ann Association in what is now the Parish of St. David.

Thus far we have been dealing almost exclusively with the settlements formed on the mainland by loyalists, or in the case of St. David, with a settlement in which loyalists had some small share.

Both Appleby and Leeman have descendants now living on Deer Island. Another settler from St. John was Isaac Richardson, whose name is perpetuated in that of Richardsonville.

The island just named had been granted, no doubt, to Gideon Pendleton, as other smaller islands were granted to members of the Crown.

The historical merit, of which the above is the fifth installment, was written by Prof. W. H. Stebbins, of the Ohio State University, and is reprinted from the Collections of the New Brunswick Historical Society, No. 9, 1914.

News of the Sea

—London, Oct. 29.—Lloyd's announces that the Danish steamer Sif, of 106 tons gross, and the Russian three-masted schooner Ingera, of 239 tons, have been sunk.

—Copenhagen, Oct. 30.—The Politiken says the Norwegian steamer Jylland has arrived at Friedrichshafen with sixteen members of the crew of the Norwegian steamship Marisa, which was torpedoed, making in five minutes.

—Paris, Oct. 31.—A Lisbon dispatch says that a German submarine has sunk three Norwegian and British ships, twenty-seven Norwegians and 29 Italians have been landed at various ports.

—London, Oct. 29.—The Greck steamer Marisa has been sunk by a German submarine, says a dispatch from London. The Marisa was carrying 2,186 gross tons, was last reported arriving at Newport, England, on Sept. 25, from Gnos.

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News in Brief

—Athens, Oct. 29.—The French authorities here have arrested M. Christou, who is the head of over 70,000 revolutionaries and royalists throughout Greece.

—London, Nov. 1.—Lloyd's announces that the British steamer Rio Parichy has been sunk. Thirteen members of her crew were landed, but one boat from the steamer is missing.

—London, Oct. 26.—Lloyd's announces that the following vessels have been sunk: The Norwegian steamer Venus II, of 774 tons gross; the Danish steamer Ulf, of 1,313 tons; the Belgian steamer Comtesse De Flandre, of 1,810 tons gross, and the British schooner Tweed, of 200 tons.

CANADIAN NEWS

—Ottawa, Oct. 26.—Thirty recruits for the British navy, the first batch of Canadians under the new recruiting system have left Halifax for England.

—Vancouver, Oct. 27.—At a meeting of the Liberal members elected to the Provincial Legislature held yesterday, H. W. Brewster was formally nominated as leader of the party.

—The trial at Dorchester of Capt. John E. Merrill, charged with the murder of John Fletcher Rogers, a Canadian Government Railway clerk, at Moncton, Oct. 17, was finished on Thursday afternoon, Oct. 26. The jury returned a verdict of not guilty by reason of insanity.

—Ottawa, Oct. 31.—The customs revenue for October amounted to \$11,960,930, an increase of three and three-quarter millions over the same month last year.

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WINTER COURSES OF STUDY FOR TEACHERS

A Teachers' Winter Short Course in Nature Study and Elementary Agriculture will be given at Sussex and at Woodstock beginning January 8th, 1917 and continuing one week.

The Course is open to teachers who have not attended Rural Science Schools or the Winter Short Course of 1916.

100 teachers can be accommodated at each school. The Nature Study Course prescribed by the Board of Education will be given special attention.

Railway fares on the standard certificate plan will be refunded. Application should be made to the Director, R. P. Stogers, at Sussex.

The above item indicates that it has been definitely decided by the Department of Agriculture and Education in the province to continue to extend to teachers for another year, free of cost to them, the advantages of instruction in a subject that has direct relation to our productions and industries.

PROGRESS OF THE WAR

[October 26 to November 1] THE week under review was marked by great activity on nearly all fronts of the fortunes of war fluctuating from one side to the other, the net result apparently being to the advantage of neither.

In the Western campaign the French and British made further advances on the Somme front. In the Mediterranean the French held all the ground taken in the preceding week, and the further gains in the direction of Fort Vaux. There was considerable activity in Flanders, where the Belgians and British made some slight gains of trenches. At other points, notably near Rheims, artillery duels were in progress, but without marked advantage to either side.

In the Eastern campaign the Russians made some gains in Volhynia west of Lutsk; but in Galicia, in the Carpathians, and in the Transylvanian Alps, the Russians and Rumanians barely held their own.

There was some activity in the Caucasian campaign and in Persia, where the Russians are said to have gained some minor successes. An unconfirmed report from Constantinople claimed a victory for the Turks over the British near Kut-el-Amara, in Mesopotamia.

The week was without any news of the Egyptian campaign, and the only report in the direction of East Africa was of a victory for the Portuguese over the Germans at Newala, north of the Rovuma River, which town was taken by the Portuguese, who secured considerable booty of guns, munitions, and military stores.

In the Balkan campaign the Entente Allies made considerable progress at several points in Macedonia and Serbia, but in the Rumanian province of Bucovina the Russians and Rumanians were unable to oppose successfully the advance of the enemy forces under Von Mackensen. The situation in Greece was one of uncertainty and much anxiety. There were conflicts between the royalist troops and those of the Nationalist party, whose headquarters are at Salonika. Greece seemed on verge of a civil war, which, if it occurs, will greatly complicate matters.

The Italian campaign made some progress, and that favorable to the Italians, in spite of adverse weather conditions. In "News of the Sea" will be found an account of a naval engagement in the English Channel, in which British and German ships were engaged, and each side sustained losses. Under the same heading will be found the week's report of the vessels destroyed by mines and German submarines, the list of vessels lost being nearly as long as that of the week preceding. The torpedoing of the Mariner, and the resultant loss of the lives of Americans among the passengers and crew, is likely to lead to complications between America and Germany after the Presidential election is over.

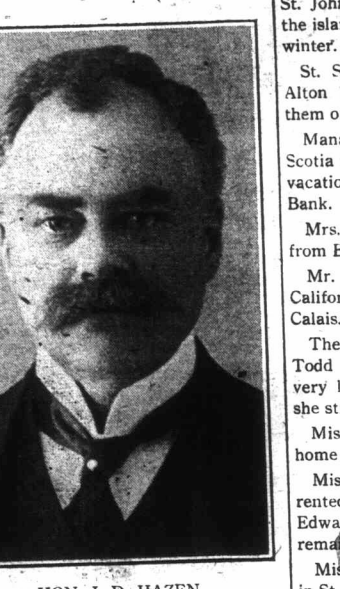

INTERVIEW WITH THE HON. J. D. HAZEN, K. C., MINISTER OF MARINE AND FISHERIES AND NAVAL SERVICE

CANADIANS have won undying fame upon the battlefields of Flanders and France. An equal opportunity for distinction in the sea is now offered. A Canadian Naval Overseas Division which will be attached to the Grand Fleet is being organized. Five thousand men are being called for. The new force will be as distinctly Canadian as are the four divisions now fighting on the Somme. There will be Canadian rate of pay, Canadian preference allowances, and assistance from the Canadian Patriotic Fund. The sailors from the Dominion will wear a special Canadian badge no matter where or in what unit of the navy they are serving. The organization and maintenance of the division is under the direction of Hon. J. D. Hazen, minister of naval service, who is taking an enthusiastic personal interest in the matter and is making a special plea for recruits for this service.

"What was first broke out," explained Mr. Hazen, "The Canadian Government asked the British authorities how we could best help, and suggested raising recruits for the navy as well as a land force. At that time all naval reserves had been called out and the Admiralty had a surplus of men. We were informed that they needed no men for the navy and we could best serve the interests of the empire by raising land forces. All our efforts were accordingly so directed."

"Since then the naval building programme has been greatly accelerated. The many new ships which have been put in service have had to be manned and there has been an increasing call for sailors. In addition when conscripts came into force in the United Kingdom recruiting for the navy stopped. New channels to supply the necessary men had to be found. To-day the Imperial Navy, which has swept the seas, bottled up the German fleet in the Kiel Canal and has guarded the whole of the Empire requires men. The navy at all costs must be maintained at full fighting strength."

"As soon as Canada was made aware of the change in the situation in regard to the navy she offered to form an overseas division of the Royal Naval Canadian Volunteer Reserve and lend them to the Admiralty for service in the Imperial Navy. The Admiralty were pleased to accept the offer and asked if possible three thousand men would be sent of which two thousand would be required by the end of the present year."

"Every recruit Canada gives to this force will mean the saving of one soldier for the British Army for if the necessary men are not secured conscripts at present serving in the army will have to be transferred to the navy."

Explaining the arrangements for pay Mr. Hazen said: "The pay of men in the Imperial Navy is very much less than that in force in the Canadian Navy, and consequently the Dominion Government decided that in order to put the Overseas Division of the Royal Naval Canadian Volunteer Reserve on the same footing as the Canadian Expeditionary Force, they would give them similar pay. However, it was pointed out that it was not desirable on a man-of-war to have men serving on board side by side receiving different salaries. The men of this Overseas Division will only themselves receive the same pay as their shipmates in the Royal Navy; the balance of their pay will be retained in Canada until their return, although a portion of this balance will be sent forward monthly to the wives or dependents of the men, the remainder accumulating until their return."

"All recruits as soon as enrolled will be given standard uniforms and sent to either one of the Naval Depots in England for training. They will be sent overseas as ordinary seamen, and those who wish to serve in the stoking ratings will be entitled to volunteer for such service. The question of their 'dividend' is higher than that of the men in the hands of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and should they desire to make promotions in this overseas division, the Canadian Government will increase the men's full Canadian pay to the equivalent rate of pay in the Canadian Expeditionary Force for the relative rank."
