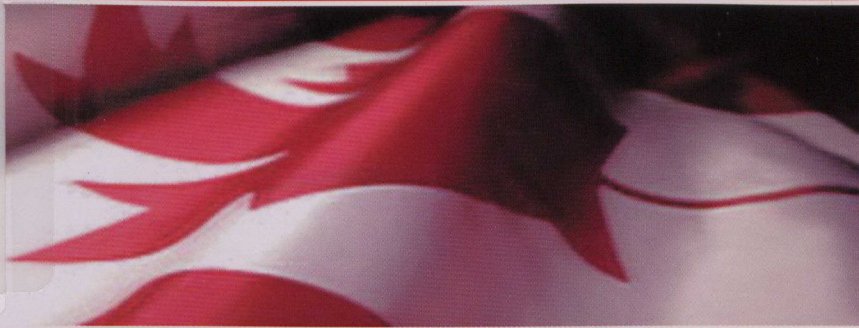

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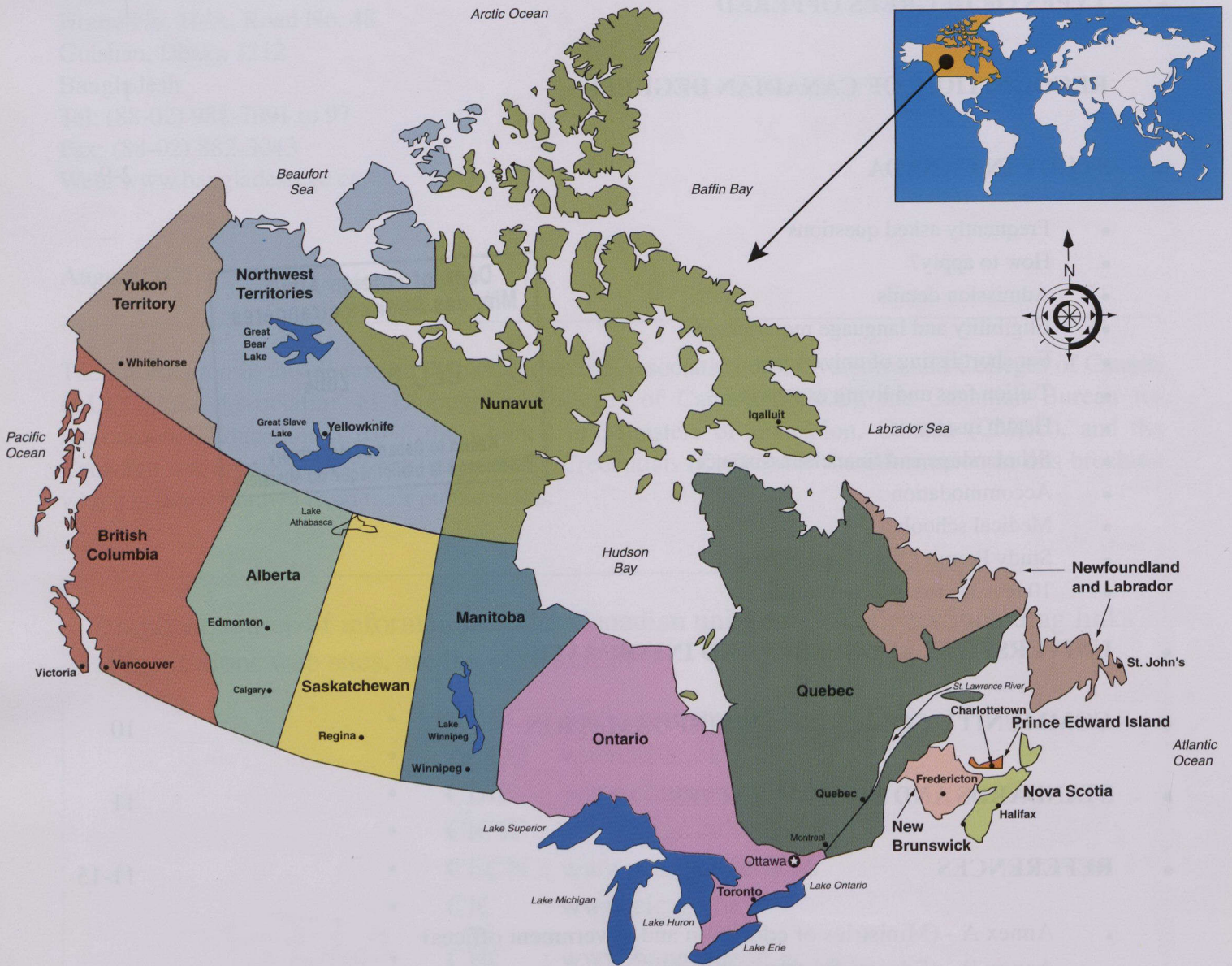
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CANADIAN UNIVERSITY SYSTEM

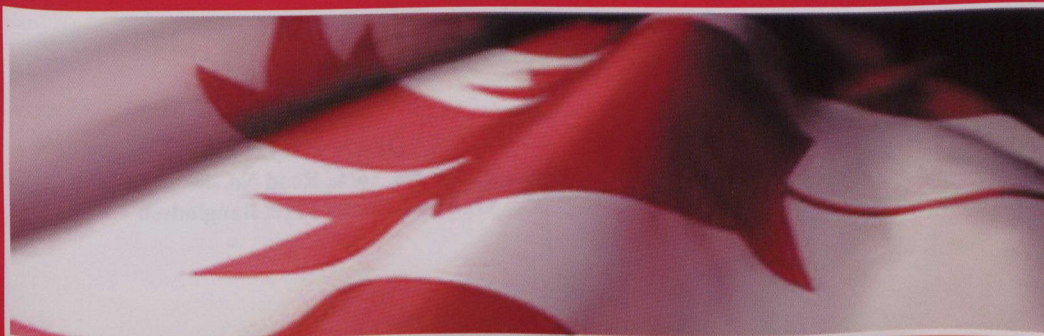
- Canada's universities and colleges are well known for their **high standards and educational excellence**. This high level of quality is consistent right across Canada. There is no ranking amongst the Canadian universities.
- The educational system is **publicly funded**. In Canada, universities receive about 2/3 of their operating funds from government. Donations and tuition fees make up the rest.
- The higher education system is also **decentralized**. In Canada, education is the responsibility of the 10 provinces and 3 territories.
- Finally, the system is **diverse**, offering students a wide range of choices. Universities in Canada range from large urban, multi-campus and research-intensive universities to small liberal arts college, offering a wide range of undergraduate, graduate and professional programs.

TYPES OF DEGREES OFFERED

- Undergraduate programs leading to a **bachelor's degree** (3 to 4 years depending on the province).
- **Master's degrees** generally require at least one year of full-time studies including a thesis (a long essay based on original research), practicum or research paper.
- **Doctoral, or PhD degree**. Doctoral programs require a minimum of three years of full-time study.

RECOGNITION OF CANADIAN DEGREES

- Canadian university degrees are recognized around the world.
- Canada does not have an institutional accreditation process similar to that found in the U.S. The closest equivalent to accreditation is the appropriate provincial charter coupled with membership in the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada (AUCC). AUCC members offer academic programs of the highest quality, with a reputation that extends far beyond our borders.
- In addition, across Canada, provincial higher education bodies or government departments review and appraise all new university programs and monitor existing programs, usually on a 5 to 7 year cycle. This on-going quality assurance takes place at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.
- In addition, professional accrediting bodies (for example, in the fields of nursing, architecture, engineering) participate in the establishment and periodic review of curriculum standards and content.



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STUDY IN CANADA:

- **FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS:**

- **How can I go to Canada to study?**

There are several steps involved in going to Canada to study. First, you must have a strong academic background, solid financial support and very good English or French language skills. If you plan to apply for a Bachelor's degree program, you must have completed at least 12 years of primary and secondary school or the equivalent of an S.S.C. and H.S.C. in Bangladesh.

Next you must decide which colleges or universities you want to apply to. Your selection will probably be based on several factors : does the school offer a good degree program in your field, how competitive is it, how much does it cost, does it offer financial aid, how big is the school, where is it located?

After you have selected institutions that interest you, you should write/ email to each university requesting application forms and more information about admission requirements and the specific program you are interested in. This process should be started at least one year before you plan to enroll. Most students enter Canadian universities in September (Fall), some universities also admit students in January and March.

You will need to register for any examination the college or university may require. Eg: IELTS (International English Language Testing System), TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language), GMAT etc.

Finally, after you have received information and application forms from the universities, you need to select a few institutions and officially apply to them. Send completed application forms, along with all other required documents, directly to the college or university. Be sure you know each school's application deadline date.

When you have submitted everything the school requires, you will eventually receive a letter from the college or university either accepting or rejecting your application. If you are accepted, the institution will send you a letter of acceptance called the ACCEPTANCE LETTER. You must have this letter before you can apply for a study permit (visa).

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- **Can I gain admission to a college or university without the test of English as a foreign language IELTS / (TOEFL)?**

All Canadian universities require **evidence of proficiency in the language** of instruction, either English or French. When applying, ask the university if a test is required.

Most universities require the IELTS or TOEFL for foreign students from countries where the medium of instruction is not English. By preparing for and taking the IELTS / TOEFL, you will know your level of standard spoken English, and also have a chance to improve your English language skills before going to Canada. Good English is a very important factor in success at an English medium Canadian college or university.

While TOEFL is the standard test used, most graduate schools also consider and accept other internationally recognized English language tests such as IELTS, MELAB and CAEL (The Canadian Academic English Language Assessment). However, you must make sure that the university will accept a particular test before submitting the scores in place of a TOEFL result.

A few universities will conditionally admit students without a TOEFL score, but these students must sit for an English examination at the university before they can enroll in classes. If their scores are not high enough, they must take English as a Second Language (ESL) courses before they can enroll in a degree program. These courses are expensive and can delay the start of your degree program by as much as one year.

- **What score do I need on the IELTS / TOEFL to be admitted?**

Test scores required vary. IELTS band of 6.0 - 6.5 or TOEFL scores of 213 - 237 are accepted. (Always check with the institution also).

- **What other examinations do I need to take?**

Each university or college decides what tests it requires. In addition to the TOEFL exam, tests frequently required depending on the subject and degree applied for may be:

SAT, The Graduate Record exam (GRE), The Graduate Management Admission Test (GMAT), Medical College Admission Test (MCAT), Law School Admission Test (LSAT).

- **What is the ranking of the institute that I have selected ?**

There is no official or recognized ranking for educational institutions in Canada. Most educational institutions in Canada are publicly funded and provide quality education with worldwide recognition and acceptance.

- **Is there an application fee for the institutions in Canada?**

Yes, most universities and colleges have a non-refundable application fee that can vary from CAD \$30 - \$250.

- **How do I find out if an institution is officially recognized?**

Provincial legislation grants charters to universities giving them the right to operate as degree-granting institutions. Similarly, provincial legislation regulates the establishment of colleges. In the absence of a national accrediting body for institutions, individuals should verify whether an institution is recognized or authorized to grant degrees, diplomas, or certificates by contacting the ministry or department responsible for post secondary education in a given province or territory, by visiting the Web site at www.cicic.ca/postsec/indexe.stm for a list of recognized institutions.

- **Can I get my certificates certified at the High Commission?**

Canadian High Commission's 'Consular Section' certifies documents. A fee is charged for such services. For further detail contact the Consular Section at the High Commission.

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HOW TO APPLY?

FIRST STEP :

- **ACCEPTANCE LETTER :**

- The student must be accepted in a program of study by a recognized Canadian institution, and receive an acceptance letter.
- University and college admission requirements, program and course offerings, and fees vary from one institution to another. You must therefore find out which institutions offer the programs you want to take and contact them directly for more detailed information.
- The **Academic Section** at the Canadian High Commission, Dhaka offers Student Group Information Sessions. **Although the Academic Section is not in a position to recommend specific universities or programs**, the Canadian High Commission is able to provide a list of the universities and colleges along with their addresses.
- Excellent sources of information about Canadian universities, including links to Canadian university web sites, are the web sites of:

- After selecting the institution of choice the student sends the completed application package with all the relevant documents to the institution.
- Once the student is accepted by the institution they will send an ACCEPTANCE LETTER.

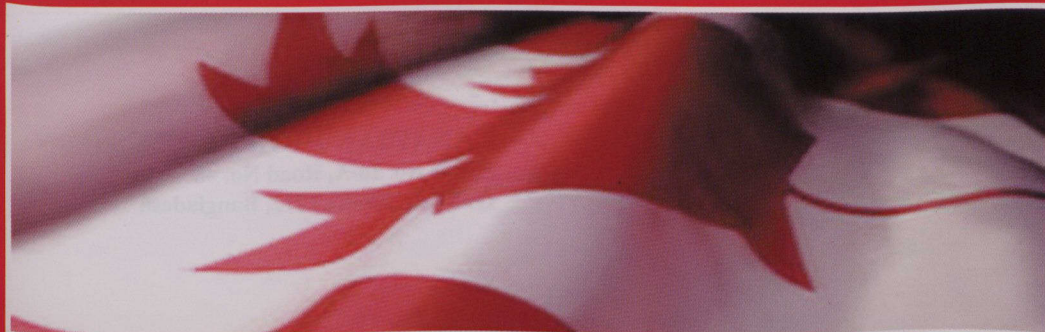
SECOND STEP:

- **STUDY PERMIT :**

After receiving the ACCEPTANCE LETTER the student should contact the **VISA SECTION** at the Canadian High Commission, Dhaka to find out.

- How to apply for STUDY PERMIT.
- Application requirements to support.
- *Important note:* It takes approximately +8 weeks to process STUDY PERMIT APPLICATION. You should apply 3-4 months in advance of commencement of your studies.
- **For detailed / updated information contact the Visa / Immigration section at the Canadian High Commission, Dhaka.**
- Information is also available on the web-site of the Immigration Section www.cic.gc.ca/english/applications/student.html
- Applications are processed on a first come basis.

Together, these two procedures take time, and you should apply well in advance of when you wish to begin study in Canada.



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- **ADMISSION DETAILS :**

- There is **no Canada-wide entrance test** or examination for admission. Each university sets its own admission standards and assesses the qualifications of its applicants individually. The university will determine the individuals equivalency status at the time of application. The final decision rests with the university.
- **For all provinces except Ontario**, write to the registrar at the universities of interest to you, requesting an undergraduate prospectus and application form. Be sure to indicate your field of study. In Ontario, only the prospectus can be obtained through the university registrar. The prospectus gives you details of admission requirements and procedures, tuition fees and other costs, as well as scholarship information. Application forms must be requested from the Ontario Universities Application Centre (address in Annex B).
- **For graduate programs**, write to the dean of graduate studies of each university of interest to you, requesting a graduate prospectus or check the web add. You will get details about research opportunities, admission requirements, and fees as well as scholarships and research grants.

- **ELIGIBILITY AND LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS :**

- University and college admission requirements, program/ course offerings, and fees vary from one institution to another. You must therefore find out which institutions offer the programs you want to take and contact them directly for more detailed information.
- All Canadian universities require evidence of proficiency in the language of instruction, either English or French. When applying, ask the university if a test is required. Most Canadian universities recognize (IELTS) or (TOEFL).

• **TUITION FEES AND LIVING EXPENSES :**

Students must request precise tuition amounts from the institution they wish to attend. Students must be adequately prepared to meet the tuition fees and the costs of living in Canada. These vary with each institution, from province to province and from year to year.

The range of tuition fees shown below is for eight (8) months of study (a normal academic year) in a university, and does not include incidental fees that might be required to complete registration.

- For those provinces that do not cover international students under their provincial health care plans students must arrange for private medical coverage.

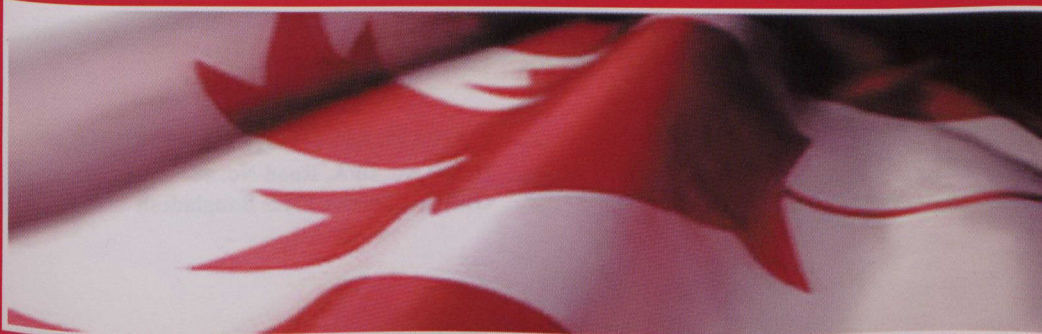

POSTSECONDARY INSTITUTIONS:

Universities:

There are 93 degree granting institutions in Canada. Universities offer bachelor's, master's and doctoral (usually a PhD) degree programs in subject areas as diverse as business, astronomy, genetics and fine arts. These degrees prepare students for a variety of professions and careers.

University Colleges:

In British Columbia and Nova Scotia, these institutions combine university and college traditions to offer students both degree programs and college diplomas and certificates with the latter often "laddering" into the former. In Alberta, university colleges operate at the level of university studies and are accredited by the Private Colleges Accreditation Board. In Ontario, some university-level colleges have recently chosen to adopt the university college nomenclature to differentiate themselves from community colleges that, also recently, have received applied-degree granting powers from the provincial government.

Cegeps

College of General and Vocational Education, or Cegep, is a two or three-year general or technical education that Quebec offers between high school and university.

Community colleges

There are 175 community colleges in Canada that help meet the training needs of various industries by providing diplomas for vocationally-oriented educational programs for secondary graduates. 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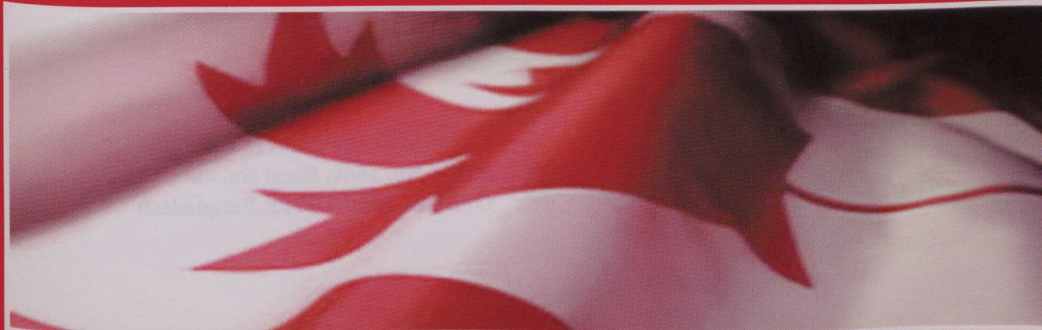

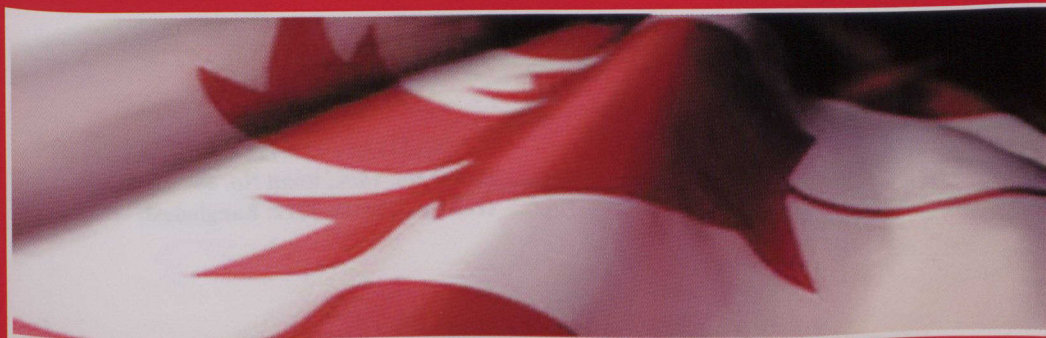

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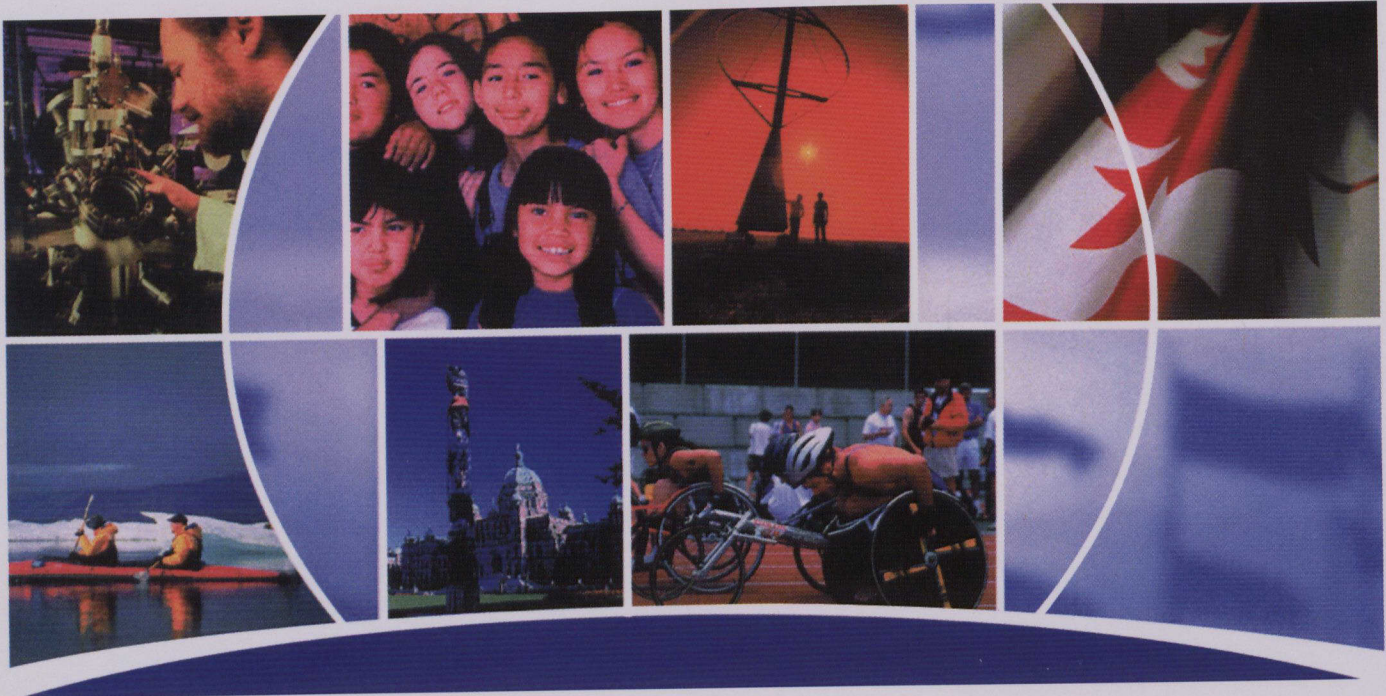
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
