The Prime Minister of Canada gave an official reception on September 13. On the 16th, Mr. Churchill and Mr. Roosevelt held a press conference.

VISITS BY COMMONWEALTH AND FOREIGN

DIGNITARIES AND OFFICIALS

From September 11 to 18, meetings were held in the city of Ottawa between the President of the United States and the Prime Minister of the United Kingdom, who were accompanied by their respective Ministers of State. On the 18th, Mr. Churchill and Mr. Roosevelt held a press conference.

2. The second session of the Council of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration was held in Montreal from September 16 to 27. Mr. L.B. Pearson, Minister at the Embassy in Washington, headed the Canadian delegation and was named Chairman of the session. The other Canadian delegates were: Mr. Brooke Claxton, M.P., then Parliamentary Assistant to the Prime Minister, Dr. Gaspard Fauteux, M.P., Mrs. R.E. McWilliams, Mr. H.F. Angus, Chief of the Economic Division of this Department, and Dr. J.G. Bouchard, Assistant Deputy Minister of Agriculture. The Prime Minister addressed the Council on September 18.

(E) APPOINTMENTS AND CHANGES IN THE CANADIAN EXTERNAL SERVICE

1. Mr. J.A. McCordick, Third Secretary at the Embassy in Moscow, left there on September 1 to return to Canada for duties in the Department.
2. Mr. B.C. Butler was appointed Consul and Trade Commissioner at the Consulate General in New York, as of September 1.
3. Lt. Col. E.H. Jones became Acting Assistant Secretary at the High Commissioner's office in London on September 4.
4. Mr. John D. Kearney, High Commissioner to Ireland, left Canada to return to Ireland on September 5.
5. On September 8, Major-General G.P. Vanier, Canadian Representative in Algiers, together with Mr. S.F. Rae and Lt.Col. M. Forget, transferred the Canadian mission to Paris.
6. The Prime Minister announced on September 7 that Mr. Pierre Dupuy, Charge d'Affaires of the Legation to the Allied European governments in the United Kingdom was proceeding to Brussels to assume the post of Charge d'Affaires in Belgium. He is to be accompanied by Lt. Col. Charles Hebert, as Military Attache. Mr. T.A. Stone will take over Mr. Dupuy's duties in London.
7. During September, Lt. Col. Unwin Simson, Administrative Secretary at the High Commissioner's Office in London, proceeded to Paris to assist in the work of the Canadian mission there.
8. Mr. E.B. Rogers, Second Secretary at the Embassy in Washington, was transferred to Rio de Janeiro on September 16.
9. Major-General V.W. Odlum, Canadian Ambassador to China, reached Canada from Chungking on September 27.
10. Mr. G.L. Magann and Mr. J.M.S. Careless arrived in Ottawa on September 27 from the "Gripsholm" exchange which took place at Gothenburg, Sweden.
11. Mr. Charles Ritchie, First Secretary at the High Commissioner's Office in London, arrived in Ottawa on September 29.
12. Mr. C.L. Miles terminated his duties with the Special Section of the Department in Ottawa on September 30.
